SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The revaluation of the Town has been completed by the State. We trust that any previous inequities have been eliminated. The State will be returning to review any appeals that have been received for 1994.

The Selectmen, on behalf of the Town, would like to say Thank You to the Friends of Deering and the Crew from His Mansion who have donated their time and expertise in the repairs to the roof at McAlister Station, sanding and refinishing the town hall floor and the painting of the town offices.

As you review the budget and warrant for 1995 you will see that all operating and maintenance costs for the town have been incorporated under one article. Each line item will be discussed at Town Meeting. If all articles presented are approved, the resulting tax increase would be approximately 3.3%.

The highway maintenance budget, Item 16 of Article 3, shows a modest increase of \$10,972. Peter Beard, Road Agent, has done an excellent job over the years maintaining our roads with conservative spending. The \$242,200 he is requesting is offset by the Highway Block Grant of \$76,938, resulting in a net cost to the town of \$165,262. In 1994 the net cost to the town was \$166,072 which is slightly higher than that being requested for 1995.

We welcome Mark A. Plummer as our Chief of Police. He is replacing Michael LaChapelle who will be missed. You will see an increase in the police budget, Item 11, Article 3. Chief Plummer applied for a grant under the new crime bill for a full time officer. The amount of the grant would be \$21,150, the net cost of the police budget would be \$81,836, an increase of \$7,364 over the 1994 appropriation.

The Selectmen would like to express the Town's appreciation to our dedicated and hard working Elected Officials, Department Heads, Employees and Volunteers.

DEERING CONSERVATION COMMISSION 1994 ANNUAL REPORT

The Deering Conservation Commission (DCC) has had its responsibilities under RSA 482-A (Fill and Dredge Permit) expanded. The Commission has been requested by the Wetlands Board to provide site inspections and recommendations on all permit applications and has the power to delay consideration of an application by the Wetlands Board to allow time for local review of the proposal.

During 1994, the DCC has continued its involvement with ongoing programs. The Wood Duck Restoration program saw the installation of twelve (12) new nesting boxes for a total of thirty (30) nesting boxes. The boxes are checked annually by members of the DCC. Last year the nesting boxes had an 88% usage rate!

The DCC has two members who represent the Town on the Contoocook and Piscataquog River Advisory Committee's. These committees are planning for the future use and preservation of the water quality of these two fine rivers.

The water quality testing continues at Deering Lake and is now independently funded by monies from private organizations. The DCC continues to collect and monitor all the data. In 1994, Dudley Pond was added to the Lay Lakes Monitoring Program. Also, initiated in 1994 was a monitoring program for the larger perennial streams in the Town.

The DCC continues to annually monitor the conservation easements for the Town. While our interests are based largely in the conservation and protection of the Towns natural resources, we also are interested in recreational activities. The DCC has worked in conjunction with other user groups to form a Friends of the Rail Committee for the abandoned railroad bed in West Deering and is currently working on a use management plan for the recreational area on Deering Lake, which the Town leases.

The DCC has a broad scope of activities planned for 1995. However, to continue with our ongoing programs and to implement new actions, we need the assistance of the Towns people. Our commission has several openings. Also, volunteers to participate in any of our programs or donations are always welcomed.

DEERING POLICE DEPARTMENT

Your Police Department has seen a lot of changes in 1994, first was the resignation of Chief Lachapelle. He will be missed by us, he has taken a job as Chief of Police for the Midway Florida Police Department.

We saw the purchase of a Ford crown victoria as our new Police vehicle. It has worked out very well, and should be a considerable savings to the cost of running a four wheel drive all year.

I have applied for a grant under the new crime bill to fund 75% of the cost of hiring a second full-time officer for the town. The grant will pay 75% of the cost for three years. This would better enable us to serve you and have an officer at your door when you need one. We must remember that the crime rate nationally is continually growing and we must be prepared to protect ourselves and the town.

Deering is not immune from violent crime, the department confiscated several weapons last year. we saw an increase in Sexual Assaults, Criminal Threatening, Burglaries, D.W.I.s, Weapon Cases, Drug cases and Bombings. Most of these cases were from suspects that came to Deering to commit there crimes from other communities and States.

The Police Department saw a 98% conviction rate, and as of January have 3 outstanding warrant for people who fled the state.

In 1995 we will strive to bring you a professional, motivated and better trained and equipped Police department dedicated to serving our community. I would like to thank all of the citizens of Deering and the members of the Police Department for your support over the past year.

1994 Deering Fire Department Report

The Deering Fire Department responded to 41 fire calls this year, one call less than last year. A breakdown of types of calls are as follows: 2 Structure Fires, 12 Chimney Fires, 3 Brush Fires, 1 Car Fires, 1 Tree on Wires, 1 Smoke in the building, 5 Motor Vehicle Accidents, 1 Propane Leak, 2 Fire Alarm Activations, 1 Illegal Burn, and 12 Mutual Aid calls.

The septic system at the Donovan Station was completed this year. Septic system plans have been submitted to the State of NH for approval for the McAlister Station. Construction is planned to begin in the Spring.

The Deering Firefighters have participated in numerous training opportunities throughout the year, keeping their skills honed for when they are needed.

This year the Fire Department has an article in the warrant for the purchase of a new Pumper/Tanker Fire Truck. In April of 1994, the tanker housed at the Donovan station, was taken out of service due to extremely poor mechanical condition. The proposed Fire Truck would upgrade the towns ability to provide a larger amount of water with quicker response time. Due to the limited water sources in town, we rely on tankers as our main water supply for fighting fires.

In closing, I would like to thank all the dedicated Fire Fighters, and express my appreciation for the continued support from the townspeople.

1994 Deering Rescue Squad Report

In 1994 the Deering Rescue Squad responded to 114 calls which is an increase of 13% over last year. The break down of calls are as follows: Medical Emergencies topped the list this year with 48 calls, 30 responses for trauma, and 35 responses in aid of the Fire Department. We continue to work with the paramedic intercept and Emergency Medical Technicians - Intermediates, which provides advanced life support for the critically injured or ill patient.

Currently the Rescue Squad consists of 10 members; 6 EMT-Basics, 2 members are currently enrolled in an EMT course and 2 driver/firefighter. Last summer 3 members took part in Pediatric Trauma Training, this training will enable them to offer more advanced care to the children of Deering. 1 member attended training on the care and prevention of burn victims, as well as all members keeping CPR, EOA, and defibrillation certification current.

This year we requested donations by mail from the citizens of Deering. We are pleased to report a great response to our efforts. It is our goal to use the funds received to upgrade our ambulance.

We continue to plan events in which the towns people have the opportunity to meet the members of the squad. Feel free to contact us with any questions or concerns you may have, in person, or by writing: The Deering Rescue P.O. Box 1292, Hillsboro, NH 03244.

REPORT_OF_TOWN_FOREST_FIRE_WARDEN_AND STATE_FOREST_RANGER

In calendar year 1994, our three (3) leading causes of fires were No Permit, Children and Rekindles of fires where the fire was not properly extinguished.

Violations of RSA 224:27 11, the fire permit law, and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Fire Officials, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required. This also helps to prevent unnecessary response to a controlled burn.

DEERING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT ANNUAL REPORT

The Deering Board of Adjustment received five petitions in 1994. Variance to build a screen house on an island in Deering Lake was denied. Application for variance for an addition to a vacation cottage being prepared for year-round was considered. With Board discussions indicating some problems with the plan, applicants redesigned to qualify for a building permit and the application was allowed to lapse. Variance for a porch addition within the right-of-way setback was approved after appropriate modifications to the original plan. Variance for deck addition to a Deering Lake cottage was approved, provisions of the newly enacted Comprehensive Shoreland Protection Act of 1994 having been taken into consideration. A special exception to operate a home office, also involving a variance to a side setback, was granted.

A variance granted in 1992 and confirmed after rehearing in 1993, for a pre-existing (pre-zoning) non-conforming building lot less than 2 acres with inadequate road frontage, was appealed to Superior Court by an abutter (... Rowe v. Town of Deering.) Appeal was denied and the case has been appealed to the State Supreme Court, where it is still pending

The Board responded to several inquiries from potential applicants, including informal consultations per Sec. 4-1 of the Ordinance. The Board also responded to inquiries by the Board of Selectmen involving possible violations of the Zoning Ordinance.

The ZBA's By-laws were amended to provide for payment of extraordinary costs by applicants or others whose applications or appeals obligate the Board to incur such costs.

II. 1994 marked our fifth complete year of successful operations. Some items which may be of interest follow:

The tonnage delivered to the plant by the Cooperative this year was 116,510. This was an increase of 9,621 tons over 1993, or a 9% increase. 1994 was the second straight Lyear that the Cooperative went over GAT. Our GAT for 1994 was 105,634 tons and 116,510 tons were actually delivered. A total of 67,765 tons of ash were delivered to the landfill for disposal. The landfill continues to operate well.

The 1995 budget reflects a decrease in the tipping fee of \$.50 per ton. This is the first time that the Co-op has been able to reduce the tipping fee for the communities.

The ash paving demonstration project in Laconia continues to be monitored by UNH. The final report and permitting are to be completed early this spring. All is going well with the project.

The maintenance building which was budgeted in 1994 was completed in March of 1994. The project cost was on budget and is providing the maintenace and storage space we had hoped for.

The Contoocook and North Branch Rivers Local Advisory Committee

Following enactment of legislation including the Contoocook and North Branch Rivers in the State Rivers Management and Protection Program, the Contoocook and North Branch Rivers Local Advisory Committee (LAC) was formed. The LAC is made up of individuals from the fourteen communities fronting on the two rivers who were nominated by the selectmen or city council from their municipalities and appointed by the DES Commissioner.

The focus of the Committee's work has been to develop a Corridor Management Plan for the designated rivers. Responsibilities of the Committee also include the review and comment (in an advisory capacity) on state permits for major developments within the corridor area. The Committee has been meeting on a regular basis since the Spring of 1992, and an advisory Plan was adopted in September, 1994.

The advisory Plan contains goals and objectives, results of a 1993 survey of property owners along the rivers, an inventory and assessment of natural and managed resources within the corridors, and a resources management section which outlines recommendations for current and future actions by citizens, private, local, state, and federal agencies and organizations to maintain the rivers' outstanding values.

Gary Bono is the representative for the Town of Deering.

It was voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell by private sale back to the previous owner from which title was obtained or, through public auction, property taken by Tax Collector's deeds in accordance with the provisions of RSA 80:80. This authorization will remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of the municipal meeting.

Article 6. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes until rescinded by a vote of the municipal meeting.

Article 22. By reconsideration, it was voted to adopt an Ordinance for the Town of Deering, as follows:

OPEN CONTAINERS OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES ORDINANCE

No person shall have in their possession any unsealed or open container of any alcoholic beverage or alcoholic liquor as defined in Chapter 175 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, upon any public way, or public street, public sidewalk, public parking lot or public beach or in any vehicle parked there within the limits of the Town of Deering; provided, however, that the Licensing Board may grant permission to any person or persons for the use of alcoholic beverages within the confines of a public area that the Town has control over in connection with any gathering or function on such conditions as it may deem advisable.

PENALTY Persons violating this regulation shall be subject to a forfeiture of \$25.00 (Twenty-five Dollars) which shall be paid to the Deering Town Clerk within 72 hours of the date and time of the violation. If such forfeiture is not paid within that period, a summon shall be issued for appearance in District Court and said person shall thereafter be subject to a penalty not to exceed \$100.00 (One Hundred Dollars)

Article 23. It was voted to adopt an Ordinance for the Town of Deering as follows:

PARKING RESTRICTIONS

It shall be unlawful for any person to park or let stand any motor vehicle or trailer at the Public Boat Launch, so called, in the area designated at the Deering Reservoir Dam in said areas posted with appropriate signs, except for the purpose of:

Launching or picking up watercraft.
Temporarily for the purpose of and while actually engaged in loading or unloading merchandise or passengers.

3. Work being done by employees of the Town of Decring or any governmental agency, said persons must be actively working at said time.

PENALTY Persons violating this regulation shall be subject to a forfeiture of \$10.00 (Ten Dollars) which shall be paid to the Deering Town Clerk within 72 hours of the date and time of the violation. If such forfeiture is not paid within that period, a person shall thereafter be subject to a penalty not to exceed \$100.00 (One Hundred Dollars).

Article 24. It has voted to accept an admitronal 763' of Tubbs Will road (between the Berdeman barn to Continental Cablevision's new driveway) as a Class V town highway.

Article 25. This article which was petitioned by the Deering Taxpayers Association was withdrawn asfollows: Due to the fact that the Selectmen treated Article #25 differently from all other articles submitted by petition the DTA moves to withdraw the article. Article #25 is the only article stating who Petitioned same.

Article 26. It was voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by town meeting, unanticipate money from a state, federal, or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with RSA 31:95-b until rescinded by a vote of the town meeting.

Article 27. It was voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept or purchase with appropriated moneys, on behalf of the town any federal or state surplus equipment.

Article 28. It was voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to trade, sell or otherwise dispose of any surplus town property, such moneys to be deposited into the general fund.

Article 29. It was voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept on behalf of the Town, gifts, legacies and devises made to the town in trust for any public purpose as permitted by RSA 31:19.

Article 30. Under this article the following suggestion and/or statements were made:

- 1. It was moved to commend Chuck Gaides, Moderator for his ten years of service.
- 2. Mr. Thyng, School Board Member, urged everyone to attend the School Meeting on March 15th.
- 3. Outgoing Officers were recognized Keith Murdough, Selectman and Auditors, Kathleen Yeaple and Whitney Yeaple.
- It was suggested that Town Meeting be held on Saturday next year.
 There was discussion of calling a Special Town Meeting to re-consider Article 2, Flood Insurance Program. It was felt that the voters did not understand exactly what they were voting on. Mr. Cobbett, Selectman, will look into it.

It was voted to adjourn the meeting at 2:10 PM.
