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

## MESSAGE FROM THE SELECTMEN

The year 1975 was another busy year for your selectmen, but our job was made much easier this year by the help of our secretary. Besides doing our bookkeeping, she has freed us to spend much needed time on the many town affairs which come up in our office.

The tax map has been a big project for this year and it is about eighty per cent completed at this time. Along with this project goes our reassessment project. The contract for reassessing has not yet been awarded, as more money will have to be raised at Town Meeting for completion of this project. We had hoped that Revenue Sharing money would cover these projects completely, but as of this time we do not expect the Revenue Sharing funds to continue after July, 1976.

At the last town meeting we included money for repairs to the town hall, which was meant primarily for painting. However, we found major repairs were needed to the balconies before any paint could be applied. We therefore had the balconies repaired and plan on painting them this year. The only painting we were able to do during 1975 was the south side of the town hall. The roof on the south side of the old school house, which is now our town office building,

had to be reshingled this year also. We hope to have these buildings looking good in time for our Bicentennial celebration.

The Long Pond Road construction job was completed this year with the use of Highway Subsidy funds. We also used some town construction funds to match the State's to widen and resurface the lower part of Grapevine Hill. Gorham Pond Road was again the T.R.A. project this year. Duncan Fund money was also used on this road.

This year we would like to again say thank you to all town officers and members of boards in our town for all the help they have given us and the work they have done. We are thankful for these people who are interested enough in Dunbarton to help out.

Last year's town report received a certificate of commendation in the New England Municipal Report Competition which is second place in Class II.

If your selectmen can be of help to you, please do not hesitate to call or come and see us at our weekly meetings on Monday mornings from nine until noon.

The meeting was again called to order at 7:05 in the evening. A motion that the articles of the warrant not be read at that time passed.

The motion was made by Peter Montgomery that we raise and appropriate the following sums of money to defray town charges for the ensuing year:

## Article III

The motion by Ernest Dugrenier that we raise and appropriate \$4000.00 for capital expenses: \$2000.00 of this to be for town highway construction and \$2000.00 of it to be placed in the Capital Reserve for Town Equipment passed.

#### Article IV

The motion by Peter Montgomery that we raise and appropriate the sum of \$865.37 for Class V roads to match a sum of \$5,769.13 to be contributed by the State of New Hampshire passed.

#### Article V

The motion by Jane Grant that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the expenses of the Conservation Commission passed.

#### Article VI

The motion by Frederick Mullen that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$2000.00 to start a Capital Reserve Fund for a new Fire Truck passed.

#### Article VII

The motion by Ernest Dugrenier that we appropriate the sum of \$759.60 from the Town's Federal Revenue Sharing Fund to support the service of the Belknap-Merrimack Community Action Program, Inc. passed.

#### Article VIII

The motion by Peter Montgomery that we appropriate the sum of \$5328.40 from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund, the estimated balance of income and interest, for Tax Mapping and Property Reappraisal with any unexpended balance to be held over for future years passed.

#### Article IX

The motion by Robert F. Baker that the Town vote to withdraw the interest of \$668.04 from the Winslow Town Forest Fund, the same to be used as determined by the Town Forest Committee passed.

#### Article X

A motion to to pass over Article X was withdrawn in order to have a full discussion at open meeting.

The motion by J. Willcox Brown that the Selectmen be authorized to negotiate a contract with the City of Concord for use of its sanitary landfill facilities for a period of 3 years beginning July 1, 1975, at an assessment not to exceed \$2.16 per capita for the first year and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,987.20 for such purposes, and further, that this authorization become effective only after it is evident that the law regarding dumps will not be substantially revised in the current legislative session was defeated. The vote cast by written ballot was: 50 Yes votes, 85 No votes.

#### Article XI

The motion by John Swindlehurst that the Selectmen be authorized to negotiate a contract for the purpose of residential rubbish collection at a sum not to exceed \$15,000. annually and to raise and appropriate said sum of money for this purpose was defeated.

#### Article XII

The motion by John Gravas that Dunbarton continue its membership in the Capital Regional Refuse Disposal Planning Board and that the Selectmen be authorized to continue the appointments of a special advisory committee of 3 members to serve on the Board for terms of one, two and three years from this meeting, with full three year terms subsequently passed.

#### Article XIII

The motion by John Gravas that the town designate as scenic roads, to be administered by the Conservation Commission, under the provisions of RSA 253:17 & 18,

(A) County Road - (Stone Road) - From Guinea Road southeasterly across Robert Rogers Road continuing to Montalona Road;

(B) Guinea Road - From Grapevine Road at Crosby Place southerly to Robert Rogers Road;

(cC) Legache Hill Road - From Robert Rogers Road near Harris Brook, southerly;

(D) Tenney Hill Road - From Grapevine Road at foot of Hammond's Hill northerly to Stark Highway;

(E) Black Brook Road - That section of unpaved road that begins with the intersection of Long Pond Road running south to southeast to the intersection of the paved Long Pond Road. Such Black Brook Road is also known as the "New Road," for the purposes of protecting and enhancing the scenic beauty of Dunbarton, and, further, that the Selectmen of said Dunbarton shall, regarding such road or roads designated as scenic, file the appropriate request for suspension of specifications when making application to the Commissioner of Public Works and Highways for Town Road Aid funds under RSA 241:7 (I) passed as amended.

#### Amendment 1

By Fred J. Mullen

that the town elect the scenic roads committee, which shall consist of five (5) members for terms of 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 years with full 5 year terms subsequent and be subject to the whims of the voters was defeated.

#### Amendment 2

by Peter Hecker that (A) be changed to read County Road - (Stone Road) - From Guinea Road southeasterly to Robert Rogers Road. From Montalona Road northerly to Robert Rogers Road passed.

#### Amendment 3

by Richard Hammond to include (F) Gile Road from North Bow Road to the Bow line passed.

#### Article XIV

The motion by Helen Dodds that the town vote to accept from the Dunbarton Garden Club, a "Flower Bed" of brick construction completely installed and at no expense to the town, installation to be south of the entrance door on the East Side of the Town Hall passed.

#### Article XV

The motion by Peter Montgomery that the Town authorize the Selectmen to accept, on behalf of the Town, any funds granted for town purposes by the State and/or the Federal government and to expend the same for the purposes for which they are granted passed.

#### Article XVI

The motion by Ernest Dugrenier that the Town authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend Federal funds for the purposes for which they are granted passed.

#### Article XVII

The motion by Jane Grant that the Selectmen be granted authority to dispose of any property acquired through tax collector's deeds, provided such disposal be made by sealed bid or auction procedure and only after review by the Planning Board and the Conservation Commission as to public use of such properties passed.

#### Article XVIII

The motion by Peter Montgomery that the Town pay the Tax Collector a commission of 1/2 of 1% on all taxes collected less abatements passed.

#### Article XIX

The motion by Peter Montgomery that we do not petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting passed.

#### Article XX

The motion by Ernest Dugrenier that the Town authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes passed.

#### Article XXI

The motion by Peter Montgomery that the Town accept all trust funds not heretofore accepted passed as amended.

Amendment 1 made by Walter Smith that the Town vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept any and all gifts and/or bequests in the name of the Town passed.

#### Article XXII

The motion by Peter Montgomery that we accept the reports of all Agents, Auditors, Committees and other Officers heretofore chosen, as printed, subject to printers errors and omissions passed.

#### Article XXIII

Information was given by Peter Montgomery regarding flood control insurance and any homeowner who thought he might be affected was asked to contact the Selectmen.

The request was made that a letter of appreciation be sent by the clerk to Ralph C. Walker for his years of service as fence viewer (25 years).



# TOWN WARRANT

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF DUNBARTON IN THE COUNTY OF MERRIMACK IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Dunbarton on Tuesday, the second day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, and cast ballots from that hour until at least seven o'clock in the evening of said day for such Town Officers and School Officers as they may be listed on the ballots.

You are also notified to meet at the same place at seven o'clock in the evening of the same day, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same, in amounts as follows:

3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums for capital expenses:

Payment to Capital Reserve for Town Road Equipment	\$2,000.00
Payment to Capital Reserve for a New Fire Truck	\$2,000.00
Payment to Mapping & Reappraisal Fund	\$2,500.00

4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$844.97 for Class V roads to match a sum of \$5,633.13 to be contributed by the State.

5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the Bicentennial Committee. (Petition article)

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 to be used to purchase a pump for a Dunbarton Fire Dept. tank truck. (Petition article)

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$804.72 for the continuation of services to low-income residents of

Dunbarton through the Concord Area Center of the Community Action Program, Belknap-Merrimack Counties, Inc. and withdraw this amount from the Town's Revenue Sharing Fund.

8. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$4,126.28 for mapping and property reappraisal and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund, or take any other action hereon.

9. To see if the town will vote to withdraw the interest of \$667.47 from the Winslow Town Forest Fund, the same to be used as determined by the Town Forest Committee.

10. To see if the town will accept the gift from Theodore Lenda of 16.3 acres on the south shore of Long Pond, being the northerly portion of Lot #295, with legal and survey costs to be paid out of funds of the Conservation Commission, said tract to be dedicated as conservation land to be administered by the Conservation Commission.

11. To see if the town agrees to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration.

12. To see if the town will vote to designate the roads hereinafter listed as scenic under the provisions of RSA 253:17 & 18, for the purposes of enhancing and protecting the scenic beauty of the Town of Dunbarton and, further, that the Selectmen of said Town of Dunbarton shall, regarding such road or roads designated as scenic, file the appropriate request for suspension of specifications when making application to the Commissioner of Public Works and Highways for Town Road Aid funds under RSA 241:7 (1).

A. Gile Road - From Grapevine Road at foot of Farrar's Hill easterly to the town line.

B. Line Hill Road - From Montalona Road near Robert Rogers Road easterly to Twist Hill Road. (Petition article)

13. To see if the town will rescind the power of the Board of Selectmen to appoint the members of the Planning Board and to have the Board members elected by secret ballot - the abolition of

the present Planning Board to take effect at the next town meeting in 1977, with any remaining terms null and void. (Petition article)

14. To see if the town will vote the members of the Planning Board by secret ballot at the next regular scheduled town meeting and at every regularly scheduled town meeting thereafter. Voters initially would elect two members for one year, two members for two years, and two members for three years, with the seventh member a selectman, to serve ex officio, his term as a member to run concurrently with his term as selectman. After the initial election, two members will be elected each year for a three-year term, with the seventh member the selectman, as an ex officio member. (Petition article)

This petition is intended to make the Planning Board better reflect the views of the town as a whole and be more responsive to the people and their needs. It is not intended as an affront to any one person or group of persons. (By petitioners)

15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to conduct one or more public informational meetings before the end of 1976 to consider the provisions of Chapter 391 (regarding solar energy heating or cooling systems). (Petition article)

16. To see if the town will vote to allow the Selectmen to apply for, receive, and expend State and/or Federal funds for the purposes for which they are granted.

17. To see if the town will grant the Selectmen authority to dispose of any property acquired through Tax Collector's Deeds.

18. To see if the town will vote a fixed rate of remuneration to be paid the Tax Collector for the collection of taxes.

19. To see if the town will vote to enact a dog leash law.

20. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to appoint a committee to study a recycling operation, and to report to the 1977 town meeting. (Petition article)

21. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to have the tomb in the Center Cemetery removed.

22. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting.

The Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association continued to service Dunbarton for the fifth consecutive year. They have provided skilled nursing care to anyone sick in the home, especially those needing continuity of care after discharges from the hospital. They are available to give hypodermic injections, change surgical dressings, and do other treatments prescribed by the attending physician. When indicated, family members have been instructed to give care between the nurses visits.

Special services such as Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy and Nutrition guidance have been given by the special staff and consultants in order to assist with the rehabilitation of those handicapped by arthritis, heart trouble, diabetes, cancer, stroke, and accidents.

When family members are unable to supply all the needed care, a staff of Home Health Aides are available to give physical care, do light housekeeping and assist with meal planning and preparation.

The nurses are delighted to advise new and expectant mothers in the care of themselves and their babies. They are also glad to work with families and individuals on normal nutrition, and sickness and accident prevention.

Anyone in Dunbarton may request these services -- doctor, family, pastors, friend and/or patient himself. All calls are answered, but continuing care can be provided only under a doctor's order.

A call to the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association 224-4093, between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. is all that is necessary to start service or make inquiries. Saturday, Sunday, and Holidays calls are only made when there is a serious illness. Fees may be scaled to those unable to pay the entire amount.

Mrs. Udell White is the Board Director from the Dunbarton area.

# REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF DUNBARTON FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY

The year 1975 saw a satisfying increase in books and circulation (1974 figures are in parentheses). Total circulation 10803 (8386); of these children's were 3069 (2164), high school 786 (562). There are now library cards for 365 families and individuals. The books and magazines number 10,350 (9,593), not including 308 magazines and 215 books discarded. The Bookmobile in 3 visits left 3,023 books, so that books available in the Dunbarton Library were 13,826. In addition 146 books were borrowed from the State Library by special request from individuals.

The Library hours have been increased to 14 a week, with special thought given to highschoolers, since the hours, Tuesday 3 -8, Thursday 1-6, allows students to do reference work after school.

Since July we have had Mrs. Alma Dunbar serving as assistant librarian. She took charge when Mrs. Blanchard had her vacation. Now she is charging out books on the library-school program, leaving the librarian and classroom teacher free to advise students on their selection.

The library-school program is of interest to all taxpayers. State regulations require the availability of 6,000 books for even 125 children. Since the Library has the number listed above available for pupils and teachers, including encyclopedias and reference works suited to elementary use, as well as a large fiction selection, it is unnecessary to duplicate them in the school building. An added educational value to the program is the experience gained of learning to behave as an orderly group in public as they come over, a class at a time, to select books.

Several special collections are available in the Library. There are large-type books and more are borrowed from the Bookmobile for those whose eyesight is poor. There are records and also a wide choice of picture puzzles.

This year the monthly exhibits were continued and we want to give special thanks to Mrs. Udell White and Mrs. Virginia Cochrane

for many of them. We hope that people interested in glass bottles will help make an exhibit of those in March.

The cataloguing of the Library is finished, thanks to the efforts of many and the devoted work of a few. While some cross-reference cards may still be added, it is now possible to find if a certain book belongs to the Library.

Many generous gifts of records, books, magazines, paperbacks and puzzles were made. We even have a new library sign outside painted by Arthur Powell. Memorial gifts and legacies made possible the purchase of a book cart and a magazine rack, which add to the appearance and efficiency of the Library. They also paid for the monthly best-sellers and the new bi-centennial books.

The trustees thank both librarians, volunteers and library patrons for making 1975 a successful year.

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
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## REAL ESTATE AND PERSONAL PROPERTY VALUES

## Report of the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission

At the end of 1975 and five years of operation the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission had become involved in numerous studies of both a local as well as a regional nature.

On the regional side, the Commission is currently involved in studies related to historic preservation, land use, housing and inventorying the community facilities that exist within the region. Of a general nature the Commission completed studies in the areas of conservation, solid waste management, resources inventories. Every member community received the following reports: Conservation Case Studies, Municipal Fiscal Management, A Guide for Evaluating Development Proposals. The latter was presented to members of the Planning Boards of all member communities along with two sets of N. H. RSA's relating to planning.

The Commission has been working closely with the Planning Board on the development of a master plan for the town. The Commission is providing much of the technical data compilation and advice. The Planning Board members deserve a good deal of credit for their time and determination in the project.

Member communities also received a series of 1975 aerial photographs for use by local officials and an opportunity to order enlargements of the same which could be used as adequate bases for tax purposes. The aerial photographs and enlargements were given to member communities as part of the Commission's local assistance program.

Other assistance provided dealt with aiding the Planning Board with technical reviews of subdivision plots and in many cases with assistance in revising subdivision regulations.

The Commission appreciates the support of its member communities and hopes for continual affiliation with each and every member.

# CAPITAL REGION REFUSE DISPOSAL PLANNING BOARD

In July 1975 a regional sanitary landfill went into operation with four communities participating. These were Concord and the towns of Allenstown, Bow, and Pembroke. The joint venture was the direct result of a two-year study of the area surrounding Concord, sponsored by the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission with the assistance of the Capital Regional Refuse Disposal Planning Board and funded by the New England Regional Commission. Dunbarton and other towns under 2,500 population were active in the study phase of the project.

The City of Concord closed out its old landfill and began operation of the site on Old Turnpike Road in mid-summer. The operation, for all practical purposes, has run smoothly as a joint venture. Reports on conservations with local officials of the three participating towns all indicate satisfaction with the operation. The changeover has been accepted as a matter of routine now and few, if any, complaints have been presented to the local officials. Selectmen in the three towns agree that the city has treated the towns very fairly and has not deviated from the original proposals.

The Board will continue to monitor the progress of the venture. It may seek a review of potential reclamation/recycling activities to aid or promote more efficient ways of the landfill operation, both in resource recovery and in a reduced rate of fill. If this goal is realized, it has cost reduction potential.

Dunbarton's delegates to the Board will continue their participation in Board activities. Any further developments of significance will be reported promptly to the selectmen. It should be emphasized that the Legislature's stay of execution granted to small towns on open burning dumps was for two years only. Thus the new deadline for dump closure is July 1, 1977, or barely 16 months from this Town Meeting.

## PLANNING BOARD REPORT 1976

The Dunbarton Planning Board held regular monthly meetings on the third Wednesday of each month. This year brought an increased number of subdivision applications before the board, totaling 19. The action taken on the 19 applications are as follows: Approved subdivisions 9, Rejected 4, Withdrawn 1, Required information not submitted 3, Pending at years end 2. The board conducted 8 on site inspections for the purpose of reviewing the proposed subdivisions. Due to the increased work schedule the board requested that applicants submit written notification of intent 10 days prior to the regular monthly meeting. This notification allows for a prepared agenda and preparation of material.

Tax relief was obtained for the town by a newly enacted State law of 1975, Chapter 328-- pertaining to liability on the part of the subdivider for the payment of newspaper notification of public hearings and mailing charges to all abutters prior to the public hearing.

During the year the board has utilized the services of a professional consultant. A Secretary has been hired to accurately document the minutes of each meeting, to insure that all members can participate in each meeting.

As reported last year, the board is preparing a Master plan for the town. In response to the board's request, the Central Regional Planning Commission assigned an intern to the project in September. Questionnaires were mailed to each household in October. Results of the survey are in the final stages of completion.

In addition to the boards regular work schedule, Year 1976 will be devoted to the objectives and goals of the Town Plan and utilization of the questionnaire results. Study groups will be formed and work sessions scheduled.

The Board of Adjustment must act within the limits set by the Dunbarton Zoning Ordinance and enforcement of its decision rests with the Selectmen.

Wintertime motor vehicle accidents have been on the rise, but we seem to have had fewer house breaks this year. Do continue to let us know when you are to be away for any length of time or when you see any suspicious vehicles, persons, or activities.

The portable radio which we purchased with Federal funding in March has proven itself a most useful piece of equipment. Also purchased this year from the Bow Police Department was a 1973 Plymouth cruiser to replace the 1967 Ford which had gradually grown tired and was in dire need of replacement.

In May, certificates were awarded to Officers Marshall and Montgomery, and to our new officer, Donald Andrews, for completion of the eight-week Special Officer/Part Time Officer Training Course sponsored by the N. H. Police Standards and Training Council. Other officers have attended occasional classes and seminars sponsored by nearby departments, and Officers Carlson and Andrews are presently enrolled in an Emergency Medical Technician's course.

Dog complaints continue to take up a large share of our time, with many hours being spent trying to locate the owners of strays. We hope soon to be able to do something to alleviate this situation. Meanwhile it would help very much if everyone would make a real honest attempt to keep his dogs at home and also to keep collars with identifying tags on dogs at all times.

# TOWN FOREST COMMITTEE REPORT

## REPORT TO TOWNS

Upon the recommendation of town selectmen and city councils, the Division of Forests and Lands appoints a forest fire warden and several deputy forest fire wardens in each town and city every three years. The town or city warden is responsible for maintaining a force of men and adequate equipment to suppress any wildfire that occurs in his town or city during his term of appointment. The fire warden must authorize all open burning when the ground is not covered with snow. No open fires can be authorized between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. unless it is raining, without the additional permission of the state district fire chief.

Any person wishing to kindle an open fire when the ground is not covered with snow must first obtain the written permission of the forest fire warden. Camp and cooking fires also require the warden's permission.

The Division of Forests and Lands, through its Forest Fire Service, assists all cities and towns in meeting these requirements by training the warden and deputy forces in wildfire suppression tactics, making hand tool suppression equipment available at fifth percent of cost, supplying pieces of Federal excess property for use as fire attack vehicles and sharing up to fifty percent of the cost of wildfire suppression costs.

Wildfire prevention is also a joint state, city or town program. Smokey Bear is available from the Forest Fire Service for local fire prevention programs. Posters and Junior Ranger kits are available for distribution by local fire departments upon request to the Forest Fire Service. Each forest fire warden is expected to carry on a continuous wildfire prevention program within his town or city.

# REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Conversations between the Conservation Commission and Mr. Theodore Lenda resulted in the gift by Mr. Lenda to the town of 16.3 acres on the south shore of Long Pond. This lot comprises the northerly third of Lot #295 whose southern boundary is Long Pond Road. Access to the donated land is from the public road leading to the shore of Long Pond. Under the terms of the agreement, survey and legal costs will be paid from funds of the Conservation Commission. The agreement also calls for subdivision approval by the Planning Board, which was granted on Sept. 26, 1975, and approval by the Town Meeting. The Commission will administer this property as conservation land.

At the 1975 Town Meeting five town roads were designated as Scenic Roads under the state enabling act. A sixth road, Gile Road, was added by amendment. Because the statutory requirements for designation of scenic roads had not been fulfilled in the case of Gile Road, the Scenic Roads Committee and the Conservation Commission will do so prior to the 1976 Town Meeting, so that the status of Gile Road can conform to state law.

Two field trips were sponsored by the Commission during the year. A trip on snowshoes and skis followed Meadow Road from Tenney Hill Road to Bela Brook and then along a series of beaver ponds along the brook to Grapevine Road. This proved to be a popular field trip with 20 participants. The other walk, held in the autumn, followed Town Farm Road from Rt. 13 to Gorham Pond Road. Webster Burnham, over whose property the road runs, offered interesting historical and natural history background for the trip.

# RECORD OF THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE DUNBARTON SCHOOL DISTRICT

March 1, 1975

The meeting was called to order by Arthur Powell, Assistant Moderator, at 8:00 p.m. in the Dunbarton Town Hall. The Assistant Moderator read the warrant and upon completion requested that all motions made during the meeting be written to simplify matters for the Clerk.

## Article I

Peter C. Hecker moved, seconded by Betty Ann Noyes, that the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District be accepted as listed in the budget. Motion passed.

## Article II

Charles E. Frost made the motion, seconded by Peter C. Hecker, that the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees or Officers chosen be accepted as printed in the Town Report. Motion passed.

## Article III

Betty Ann Noyes made the motion, seconded by Peter C. Hecker, to pass over the Article relative to choosing Agents and Committees. Motion passed.

## Article IV

Peter C. Hecker made the motion, seconded by Betty Ann Noyes, that the District authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept on behalf of the District any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States. Motion passed.

## Article V

Charles E. Frost made the motion, seconded by Peter C. Hecker, that the District vote to raise and appropriate \$283,665.00 for the support of schools for the payment of salaries, for school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory and contractual obligations of the District. A lengthy discussion of the budget took place with questions being raised and comments and

opinions being made with regard to the increase in tuition, teachers' salaries and the salary of the Superintendent of Schools. Upon request from the body, the rise in transportation costs was discussed by the School Board detailing as follows: rising costs of necessities, the possibility of a new bus route and new bus schedules and time schedules with respect to elementary school students arriving in early morning at the elementary school and the number of students being transported to Goffstown. Edward Ballam requested that the proposed raise given to him as custodian of the elementary school be deleted from the budget, bringing his salary to the same as last year. Questions were also answered with regard to other expenses, equipment for instruction, special education charges, the necessity of an appropriation for library books, repairs to the elementary school, sweepstakes money and lack of science books for students beyond the elementary grades. Dorothy Ballam then made an amendment to the motion, seconded by Edward Ballam, to cut the school budget by 5% in all areas of the budget. After considerable discussion, the amendment was voted upon. Amendment defeated. The motion was voted upon. Motion passed.

## Article VI

L. Webster Burnham advised the Assistant Moderator that the School Warrant stated that voting would be called for 2:00 p.m. and the polls for the Town would be open at 10:00 a.m. It was suggested that another year the School Board go through the budget with the body on a line by line basis. The Superintendent of Schools was asked to explain his use of the words "quiet revolution" in his report to the Town and was also questioned about intercommunication within the junior and senior high schools. School yard supervision was also discussed, as was the actual cost of educating a pupil. The Assistant Moderator explained that the elected Moderator, Richard C. Kohls, had suffered a slight heart attack and had appointed him to serve in his absence. Peter C. Hecker made a motion, seconded by J. Willcox Brown, that the body recess until 10:00 a.m. March 4, 1975, and that the polls for school district elections be opened at that time. Motion passed.

The meeting was then recessed at 9:30 p.m. until 10:00 a.m.

The Community Action Program, Belknap-Merrimack Counties, Inc. has continued to provide comprehensive services and assistance to low-income persons in Dunbarton through its Concord Area Center. These efforts were supported at town meeting by local-initiative dollars, enabling us to address problems requiring information on available community resources, utility assistance, food stamp assistance, emergency food assistance and job training.

Dunbarton utilized the Home Winterization Project, Community Food Pantry, Operation Green Thumb gardening and nutrition project, Out of School Work Experience Program, Public Service Employment Program, and the Rural Transportation System for the elderly. One Dunbarton child attended Copper Cannon Lodge in Franconia in the CAP Summer Camp program.

Additional services and programs available to Dunbarton were welfare assistance, housing assistance, Project H.E.L.P. emergency fuel-loan program, Re-Cycled Clothing Project. Health assistance, transportation assistance (independent of Rural Transportation), Summer Work Experience Program, Adult Work Experience, Direct Job Placement Assistance, On-the-Job Training, Rent-A-Kid, Youth Outdoor Recreation, Elderly Nutrition Program, Elderly Supportive Services, and Meals-On-Wheels.

Community Action, through its system of "neighborhood" centers in Belknap and Merrimack counties, is organized to effectively program for the local needs of the poor and to mobilize available community resources. We gratefully acknowledge the support and cooperation that Dunbarton has shown for these efforts.

## SCHOLASTIC ACHIEVEMENT

The Dunbarton Elementary School continued the testing program started in 1974. The Stanford Achievement Tests were used in 1975. The results proved very satisfying in that the average achievement in every area of learning was above the grade level and above the national average. A large chart of the results may be seen at the school.

Tests are not the end-all, but they are an objective indicator of a school's effectiveness in the scholastic content of the curriculum. For the 1974-75 student body, Dunbarton pupils were above the national average in 59 of 60 sub-sections.

The reason for any test is the progress of the child. Reasonable interpretations of scores can indicate to a teacher where individual students are or a class is and can help determine the most effective instruction to come next.

## COOPERATIVE SPECIAL SERVICES

Young people with learning problems, some already identified, some not, now have an extra opportunity for special help. Diagnosis and remediation for ten Dunbarton Central School pupils are made possible through personnel and program services provided by the Cooperative Special Services program, an Elementary and Secondary Education Act, Title I (ESEA I) project conducted jointly with Supervisory Union #19's other school districts. Dunbarton's two teachers designated as "Title I" teachers are Patricia Prescott and Dorrine Silberberg. The school's Title I educational assistant, commonly called an aide, is Clara Hammond. The school's and Supervisory Union #19's Coordinator of Special Services is Mrs. Elizabeth O'Reilly.

Though services are focused on children in the primary grades, the program is available to older pupils. Carrying out procedures determined by the referring teachers, the Educational Assistant works directly with each pupil in a special section of the school known as the "Resource Room." When you are in the school make a point to see this special quarter. Just as you will be excited by what it contains, certain of Dunbarton's pupils are excited by what it does for them.

## CAREER EDUCATION

Career Education was a major topic of my message last year. Further implementation of the practices associated with career education were advanced this year with the establishment of a union-wide Career Education Committee and the Committee conducting a day-long workshop at Goffstown AREA High School for the Union's Teacher's, Specialists and Administrators. The keynote speaker's address, Career Education in Perspective, and the repeated, ten concurrent sessions led by practitioners experienced in CE defined career education in its broadest ramifications and gave ideas for implementing CE programs.

To the teachers and administrators who found themselves at various stages in understanding career education and in putting together sets of activities supportive of career education instruction in all subjects, the workshop offered these elements as guideposts: Career Awareness, Self Awareness, Educational Awareness, Economic Awareness, Decision Making, Appreciations and Attitudes, Beginning Competences and Employability Skills.

## PRE-SCHOOL SCREENING

Dunbarton children who entered first grade September, 1975 are better understood by their teachers than prior years' entering pupils. The Pre-School Screening Program conducted in Dunbarton and Supervisory Union #19, the summer of 1975, for the first time made this possible.

The Pre-School Screening Program with a basic premise that early remediation of identified weaknesses in children could prevent or at least minimize incidences of school failure hold such successes throughout the nation that small Federal Grants were made to train personnel in the techniques and to provide certain screening materials. Supervisory Union #19 participated in such a Grant.

Techniques used in testing, systems for recording and evaluating and sample prescriptions based on an enrolling pupil's identified individual needs were taught in a workshop conducted in July, 1975. The screening, a five-station process which diagnoses each child in speech, language, hearing, motor coordination and emotional-social development, was held in Dunbarton in August. Since the trained personnel are our Union's own personnel, future annual screenings are simple to arrange.

## DUNBARTON SCHOOL LUNCH COMMITTEE

The Dunbarton School Board at its April, 1975 meeting authorized the establishment of a Dunbarton School Lunch Committee and set membership and groups to be represented. Members of the six-person committee are:

State Law requires that each school in New Hampshire have an acceptable school lunch program. Dunbarton's scheduled time for compliance is school year 1975-78.

The Committee investigated the possibility of each of three alternatives:

1. School's own hot lunch program.
2. A pre-packaged, frozen lunch program.
3. A catering lunch service from a neighboring district's hot lunch program, called "satelliting." Cost negated the first alternative, for it would require an addition to house and kitchen and expansion of the school's drainage field. Cost also negated the second alternative; for to provide an acceptable "Type A" lunch, required for participation in the Federal School Lunch Reimbursement Program, supplementary foods to the vendors' frozen lunches would make the pupil's cost critically high. "Satelliting" was most satisfactory from a cost viewpoint, from an implementation viewpoint and, probably, from the luncher's viewpoint.

To arrive at the above conclusion, the Committee or Representatives visited three school kitchens, participated in school lunches from two vendors and visited the sending and receiving ends of one very successful "satelliting" program.

The Committee recommends to the Dunbarton Elementary School Board that a hot lunch program commence at Dunbarton Elementary School in September, 1976 by "satelliting" from the hot lunch program at Bow Memorial School.

#### STAFF DEVELOPMENT

The Staff Development inservice program has become operational. It is a new approach to professional improvement and to recertification for each staff member when due. Many more locally planned activities to meet local needs are possible. Clock Hours replace credits through credit-yielding activities such as courses are still possible with the credits converted to Clock Hours. The Dunbarton School Staff has had a history of participation in a variety of inservice activities and should experience no problems in accumulating the required Clock Hours. The Dunbarton Staff Development Committee implements the program through sub-committees, the whole operation under the Chairmanship of Kenneth Koerber.

#### LIBRARY/MEDIA CENTER - VOLUNTEERS

The Library/Media Center continues to grow as the hub of the school's instructional program. The books, magazines and audio-visual teaching materials added each year increase student exposure to new lands, ideas, facts and concepts. In October, Dr. Albert Snay, School Physician, examined 38 children. 3 children had excessive ear wax and one medical problem was discovered. All were reported to parents and follow-ups made.

In December, 80 children participated in our Dental Program. Mrs. Jody Warburton arranged and directed this program which was held at the school.

The fourth grade was involved in a special dental program for fourth graders throughout the State. This involved brushing their teeth in school under the supervision of a person from the State and Miss Goddard, our fourth grade teacher.

TB Tine tests were given to all staff members, bus drivers and volunteer personnel. One positive reaction was found and followed up.

Preschool vision and hearing screening was held in May. Fifth and sixth grade girls were given a program on the menstrual process and hygiene.

130 children were given vision and hearing tests - those failing were tested three times and then referred to a doctor if retests were failed.

Head checks were made at intervals for pediculosis and only two cases were found.

No other communicable diseases were reported.
