WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING**March 14, 1933**

Two Hundredth and Second Annual Meeting

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall at Durham on Tuesday the fourteenth day of March, A. D. 1933, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for a term of three years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, two Auditors, and all other Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds, for a term of three years. (*C. H. Pettee.*)

3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to obtain State Aid on the following :

(1) State Aid Construction. (*Voted \$2,620.00.*)

4. To raise and appropriate funds for the repair of Town Highways and Bridges. (*Voted \$7,500.00.*)

5. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise for current maintenance expenses, including State and County taxes as required. (*Voted \$11,855.00.*)

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to extend the hard sur-

face of Mill Road as far as the junction of the highways near the residence of Fred Daniels. (*Added to town maintenance.*)

7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds. (*Voted Yes.*)

8. To see if the Town will appoint a Zoning Commission in accordance with the requirements of the State Zoning Enabling Act. (*Passed.*)

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to continue the work of White Pine Blister Rust control. (*Voted.*)

10. To see if the Town will appoint a committee of four to act with the Selectmen to study the water situation of the Town and report at the next town meeting. (*Voted.*)

11. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for Town Officers as required by law. (*Yes.*)

12. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes. (*Yes.*)

13. To see if the Town will vote to allow discounts for prompt payment of taxes as follows:

2% if paid on or before July 1.

1% if paid on or before September 1. (*Voted Yes.*)

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

March 13, 1934

Two Hundredth and Third Annual Meeting

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford, and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall at Durham on Tuesday the thirteenth day of March, A. D. 1934, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for a term of three years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, two Auditors, and all other Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds, for a term of three years.

3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to obtain State Aid on the following :

(1) State Aid Construction. (*See Budget.*)

4. To raise and appropriate funds for the repair of Town Highways and Bridges. (*See Budget.*)

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for current maintenance expenses, including State and County taxes as required. (*See Budget.*)

6. To see if the Town will vote to cooperate with the University of New Hampshire in hiring a permanent Fire Station Attendant and raise money to pay half of salary for the same.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to be expended for further improvements in the Town Cemetery.

8. To hear report of Zoning Committee and take any action relative to same.

9. To hear report of Committee on water situation, and take any action that may seem necessary.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to continue the work of White Pine Blister Rust Control.

11. To see if the Town will vote to close a section of Piscataqua Bridge Road beginning at point of new road now being built and passing the property of E. J. Ackeroyd to Old Bridge Abutment.

12. To see if the Town will accept a section of road leading from Dover Road to H. W. Loveren's residence, (known as Wiggin's Court).

13. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for Town Officers as required by law.

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize collection of ashes and garbage and raise and appropriate money for the same.

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.

16. To see if the Town will vote to allow discounts for prompt payment of taxes as follows:

2% if paid on or before July 1.

1% if paid on or before September 1.

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

HAMILTON SMITH LIBRARY

To the Town of Durham:

The town of Durham was somewhat more generous towards the support of its share in the library during the year. By vote of the people at the last town meeting the town's appropriation was raised from \$100 to \$190, with the understanding that a portion of this increase be used to rebind books of the Children's Room. This provision has been carried out so far as funds would allow. About 60 volumes have been rebound in attractive and durable binding. This has improved the appearance of the room considerably and has caused a noticeable increase in circulation of standard titles which had formerly been shunned because of their ragged and unattractive appearance.

The Librarian wishes to urge that the more generous support be continued and that the sum of \$200 be set aside for library use as a sum more suitable to the town's responsibility towards its children and the library. It is intended that the major portion of this sum be used for further increasing the usefulness of the children's collection. It would make possible the purchase of more of the outstanding new titles as published, the gradual addition of standard titles, and a further improvement of the room by rebinding more of the badly worn and unattractive volumes. That the children of Durham are avid readers is proven conclusively by a total circulation of 2,933 for the year, or an average of 23 books per borrower, and 6% of the total circulation for University and town.

During the period covered by this report a total of 3,305 volumes were added to the library, including 130 from the Durham Library Association funds, and

55 from Durham Public Library funds. The total number of accessioned volumes belonging to the library on January 31, 1934 was 77,239. Total circulation for home use, both University and town, was 48,105. This figure includes a circulation of 865 on 232 volumes left on deposit during the year at the home of Mrs. Edward Griffiths, and circulated through her generosity.

Two changes in the library staff occurred during the year. Miss Jeanette Blair, Reference Librarian, resigned and was replaced by Miss Virginia Smucker of Baltimore, Md. Miss Mary Falt, on leave of absence for two years, returned to take up her duties as Circulation Librarian, which position was filled during her absence by Miss Emily Washburn of Portsmouth.

To the Town of Durham:

The Durham water supply was sampled at regular intervals during the year ending January 1, 1934 and was found in good condition at each analysis.

All the children both in Durham Village and Packer's Falls Schools were vaccinated or presented certificates.

A slight epidemic of scarlet fever occurred about the middle of September 1933 at Packer's Falls and the school was closed for one day and fumigated.

There were very few cases of contagious diseases in Durham during the past year.

In March 1933 the State Health Inspector with the local Health Officer made an inspection of all the stores and restaurants in the village.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

For the Year 1933

Last year the forest fire record was as follows:

Date	Cause	Area burnt

During the last 10 years 26 fires in or near woodlands have occurred and burnt over $45\frac{3}{4}$ acres. By months these have been as follows: March 1, April 9, May 10, June 2, July 1, August 1, September 1, October 1. A total of 26. The causes of these fires were as follows: smokers 10, railway 8, brush burning 5, sawmill 1, bee hunter 1, incendiary 1. A total of 26. These figures show that on the average between 2 and 3 fires will occur and that over three quarters of them will be in the spring. In fact, we could more than cut our fire loss in two if we could get people to be more careful with fire in the early spring months. Railway fires are too common, but they burn over little area because the section crews are constantly on the lookout. Lastly, and most important of all, except for a very unusual fire due to lightning, *all* our forest fires are due to someone's *carelessness*. We could easily *cut* our annual loss in *two*. There are about twenty days in this climate when no one should have a fire outside a stove or furnace.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Durham:

I have the honor to present my fifth annual report.

No changes, except in cadets, have been made in your teaching force since the last report. The following changes have been made in the building's interior. The partition in the large right hand first floor room was moved to the center of the room and grades one and two assigned to the two rooms this made. Grades 5 and 6 were placed in the large room to the left of the entrance. Grades 3 and 4 were given the so called High School room on the second floor so that they might have available a recitation room. Grades 7 and 8 were assigned to the smaller room on the second floor and classes from these grades recite in the basement. Tables for recitation purposes have been provided in the basement and the windows made to give proper ventilation.

Cadet teachers are used for teaching English, History and French in the Junior High School. Principal Guy Croquette is helping Professor Batchelder supervise the Manual Training at the University shop and a cadet assists Mrs. Wilcox with the Domestic Arts class. Only one afternoon a week can be given to Manual Training and Domestic Arts and it is necessary to meet certain State requirements as to time, therefore we must extend the Wednesday afternoon session twenty minutes for the pupils in these classes. If more time could be allowed it might be possible to teach the Domestic Arts pupils in two classes. However, the numbers are so small that with two teachers it is possible to make much of the work individual.

The question is often asked how much longer will the present building meet the needs. The only reply that I can make is to say that if there was a fairly even distribution of pupils a 10% increase could be accommodated. Incidentally, this year's enrollment is a trifle less than last year (see table of statistics) and is as follows:

Grade 1. .18; Grade 2. .18; Grade 3. .26; Grade 4. .21;
Grade 5. .23; Grade 6. .13; Grade 7. .20; Grade 8. .10;
At Packer's Falls there is an even distribution of the nineteen pupils enrolled.

Miss Alma Roy, Supervisor of Art, in Somersworth, gives weekly lessons in Drawing in each room at the Village and once every two weeks at Packer's Falls. Miss Pearl Talbot continues the same schedule in Music as last year and teaches in Packer's Falls once in two weeks.

The radio and loud speaker provided by the Parent-Teacher's Association is working satisfactorily. All the pupils of the middle and upper grades listened to the opening of the 73rd Congress. On Friday mornings the Walter Damrosch program is heard and the American School of the Air provides a program in dramatization and music for the lower grades.

In May a successful operetta, "The Palace of Carelessness," was given and another is planned for this year. The Town Hall is being used by the pupils for Basket Ball and games are being played with Somersworth, Rollinsford and Dover. The Parent-Teacher's Association provided a basket ball.

The Good Citizenship Medal, provided by The New Hampshire Sons of the American Revolution, was awarded to Isabelle Zych in June.

New arithmetics and new geographies have been adopted this year, bringing our text books up to date and in good condition.

At the Village school 34 half pint bottles of milk

are being distributed each day and at Packer's Falls six bottles. This is provided free to those who need it from Federal funds received through the State Department of Public Instruction. At Packer's Falls hot lunches are provided by the teacher and pupils, but hot lunches have not proved to be popular at the Village, although an average of 40 pupils eat their lunches at the school. Most of them bring their own thermos bottles.

During the summer a sanding machine was employed to refinish the floors. The desks in all the rooms, including Packer's Falls, were refinished. This has brought about improvement in handwriting in many cases. Very few repairs will be needed on either building next summer but the Village school yard needs attention. The Superintendent would have liked to have brought about a CWA project to take care of this. At Packer's Falls a fine set of swings was added to the teter board equipment. The playground apparatus is seldom idle at any recess.

Your schools have been so little affected by the depression that probably many of you are not aware of the serious situation in many places outside of our state.* Two thousand and more schools have been closed since last June and 104,100 children are out of school this year because of the closing. In addition 900,550 more children will receive six months or less of schooling. 40,000 teachers were thrown out of work and added to the long list of waiting teachers which now numbers 200,000. The teaching profession is suffering severely and a close watch must be kept in the years immediately before us to see that our schools are not adversely affected. It has been said that in many places it will take a decade to undo the damage done. In fact it cannot be undone—a year lost from a child's education is not made up. A country advances only through its children. Our Secretary of the In-

terior, Mr. Harold L. Ickes, voices my sentiments so well that I quote: "Even in these days of tremendously pressing problems, to my mind the most important question of all is, What are we going to do about our schools? That education should be universal goes without saying. By education I mean more than the three R's. I believe that every child should be given all the education that he can reasonably absorb. This does not mean that all children should spend an equal number of years in school or that all should take the same courses. It means that everyone in order to have the best chance possible for a happy and full life should have every bit of education that he is capable of receiving and of using to advantage."

Our corps of teachers have been faithful and co-operative and we are all grateful to the School Board of Durham for their support.

Although the surrounding towns were afflicted with scarlet fever and mumps we were very fortunate in escaping both. An allotment of money was allowed the State of New Hampshire to be used in the distribution of milk in the schools. Thirty-four bottles of free milk were given to the children daily, who were found to be underweight.

A dental clinic was carried on for nine weeks in March and several children benefited by it. This was paid for in part by the Parent Teacher's Association.

I wish to thank the School Board, Superintendent, Teachers and Parents for their helpful cooperation during the school year.
