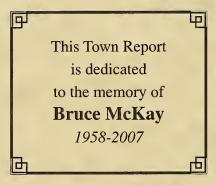

NOTES FROM THE SELECTMEN

Vox populi came through loud & clear last March when Carleen Quinn was elected to replace Ron Taksar on the Board of Selectmen. Accordingly, I take this occasion to welcome her formally to our membership. In turn I wish to thank Ron for his three years as chair of the selectboard, a position to which he brought tireless energy and unparalleled dedication.

T.S.Eliot famously called April the cruelest month, an assessment with which a majority of Franconia residents last year would have agreed. Not because of any proliferation of lilacs, but in response to the devastating windstorm that swept through town causing widespread blowdown and leaving 75% of our residences without electricity for the better part of a week. On the brighter side of this otherwise dark cloud, our emergency management plan - involving the police & fire departments, the rescue squad & the highway department - was activated at the outset of the crisis and, via the administrative assistant of the Board of Selectmen, Sally Small, working in tandem with road agent Scott Knowlton, documented our response to it from start to finish, a process that in the end enabled the Town to recover over \$26,000 from FEMA to help offset the total cost of the storm.

An emergency is one thing, a tragedy is another, and it was nothing less than a tragedy that befell Franconia on May 11th when Corporal Bruce McKay, a 12 year member of the Franconia Police Department who was on duty at the time, was shot to death by Liko Kenney, who was in turn shot to death by passerby Gregory Floyd. Dark days those were for Franconia and the ramifications of this incident continue to be felt today while the management of Town business has necessarily needed to move ahead. And move ahead we have, albeit by small but nonetheless significant increments.

In terms of community, we celebrated the Fourth of July with spectacular fireworks generously supported by the Hamblin family and additionally enabled by time and energy contributed by volunteers such as Kim Cowles, among others.

Our Holiday season was brightened by the re-lighting of the magisterial tree that stands outside the Abbie Greenleaf Library and by the Children's Christmas Party organized at Town Hall by the Mangold family that brought together families in numbers that far exceeded our wildest hopes for this new event and transformed it into a memorable occasion.

On another positive note, Kim Cowles along with the Darald and Juliet Libby, the Crosby Family, the Franconia Notch Chamber of Commerce, and monies raised from the fall soccer tournament, have been able to reach their goal of purchasing a Gazebo for the Dow Field. The donation from the Libbys was made on behalf of Frank Ferrelli who sadly passed away late in December. Concerts are already planned for this summer so please keep an eye out for more things to come.

With respect to internal procedures the Board of Selectmen has 1) revived the practice of meeting on a monthly basis with the Chief of Police in order to keep communication open and ongoing; 2) has managed to keep at bay by a 2-1 vote, at least

for the time being, the resignation of the Manager of the Transfer Station, a valued employee; 3) has undertaken to update personnel and department polices in order to guarantee all Town employees a civilized working environment; 4) has continued to work with the Infrastructure Committee in its effort to prioritize the Town's options with respect to future space and building needs; and 5) through Rich McLeod, the Board of Selectmen representative to the Water Study Group, has actively participated in addressing the serious long term challenges facing Franconia's aging water system, challenges that have been deferred for more than half a century but can be deferred no longer.

A couple of months after the May incident, artist N. Bruce McKay gifted one of his paintings to the town in memory of his son. Titled "Field of Dreams", it depicts an ample, open, abstract landscape filled with glowing color. It now hangs in the Franconia Town Hall, its space and light a reminder of the vistas we pause to savor here in the North Country during our abbreviated summers, and a reminder too of an old truth: ars longa vita brevis.

In conclusion, the Board of Selectmen acknowledges with sadness the passing of Paul Valar, a National Ski Hall of Fame member, who passed away in late December. Paul was predeceased by his wife Paula; both were members of their National Alpine Ski Teams (Switzerland and the United States) and both Olympians. They were longtime residents of Franconia at Mittersill and were committed to the community. Paul was a pioneer and leader in the ski industry on the local, national and international levels. He originated and developed the Official American Ski Techniques and was the founding president of the New England Ski Museum.

Moderator William Mead called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. The Moderator announced that the polls would temporarily close, to be reopened shortly before 8:00 p.m. to allow all those who had not voted to do so.

There was a motion and a second to waive the reading of last year's minutes. The motion passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. (By ballot.) Ballots Cast 225

The article was read, moved and seconded. Ron Taksar spoke to the article commenting that the overall budget is up 10.5% from last year. There was a comment about researching other insurance companies to be sure that the town is getting the best plan for the money. Sally Small spoke to the question saying that the town is currently in a multi-year plan with Primex but they are still researching other plans. There being no further discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 3 passed unanimously by voice vote.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred seventeen thousand four hundred fifty dollars (\$117,450.00) to be added to the following Capital Reserve Funds previously established. The selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Highway Trucks, \$17,500; Police Cruisers, \$14,250; Fire Pumper Truck, \$40,000; Fire Equip Truck, \$26,000; Life Squad Van, \$7,500; Reassessment, 8,000 and Town Buildings Truck, \$4,200.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Carl Belz spoke to the article. There being no discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 4 passed unanimously by voice vote.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy two thousand six hundred dollars (\$72,600.00) to be added to the following Expendable Trust Funds previously established. The selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Cemetery, \$6,200; Highway Improvement, \$50,000; Sidewalk Improvement, \$5,000; Museum Maintenance, \$3,400 and Library Maintenance, \$8,000.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Carl Belz spoke to the article. There being no discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 5 passed unanimously by voice vote.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of Town Buildings and Grounds Equipment and to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) for this purpose. The selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

The article was read, moved and seconded. Rich McLeod spoke to the article. There being no discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 6 passed unanimously by voice vote.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventeen thousand dollars (\$17,000.00) to install a detection and fire alarm system in the Town Hall and the Library. The amount of twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000.00) is to come from taxation. The balance of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) is to come from fund balance (surplus). The selectmen recommend this appropriation.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Ron Taksar spoke to the article. There being no discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 7 passed unanimously by voice vote.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-two thousand eight hundred thirty-eight dollars (\$72,838.00) to purchase a truck with

equipment for the Highway Department and to authorize the withdrawal of forty-five thousand dollars (\$45,000.00) from the Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose. The sum of thirteen thousand eight hundred thirty-eight dollars (\$13,838.00) is to come from general taxation. Additional funding for this appropriation will come from trading in the 2001 Ford F-550 with plow (\$14,000.00). The selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

The article was read, moved and seconded. Ron Taksar spoke to the article. There was a question from the floor about the type of truck being purchased and whether the time frame for trading is sooner than normal. Scott Knowlton, the road agent spoke to the questions giving details about the new truck and its accessories stating that the truck is larger which will handle plowing, sanding and loading more efficiently and he also clarified that the truck was actually being traded in a few years later than the normal 5-year turn around. The article was called to a vote. Article 8 passed unanimously by voice vote.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-three thousand dollars (\$23,000.00) to purchase a wood chipper the Highway Department for the purpose of wind storm clean up and the much needed brush cutting to be done along the sides of the roads. The selectmen recommend this appropriation.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Rich McLeod spoke to the article. There was opposition from Jim Hamblin the Capital Improvements Committee (CIP) Chairman stating that the \$23,000.00 amount was never submitted to the CIP and was not approved by the CIP. Jim Hamblin said that he only recalled discussing and recommending \$15,000.00 for a used chipper. Scott Knowlton, the road agent spoke to this stating that he had submitted the \$23,000.00 amount back in August to the CIP and based on discussion from a past CIP meeting comments were made by the CIP on why the town would purchase a used chipper versus a new one for the difference in cost. The article was called to a vote. Article 9 passed by a hand vote. 64 Yes, 8 No.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the town will vote to change the purpose of and existing Highway Loader Capital Reserve Fund to the Highway Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund and to raise and appropriate the sum of seven thousand dollars (\$7,000.00) to be added to the newly named fund. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (2/3 vote required).

The article was read, moved and seconded. Rich McLeod spoke to the article. There being no discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 10 passed by hand vote. 63 Yes, 9 No.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of two hundred forty four thousand nine hundred sixty dollars (\$244,960.00) for the purpose of solid waste disposal with eight thousand dollars (\$8,000.00) from the Transfer Station/Recycling Center Special Revenue Fund surplus, Town of Sugar Hill (\$33,812.00), the Town of Easton (\$15,369.00), PAYT Fees (\$74,500.00), Special Handling Fees (\$35,000.00), and Recycled Material (\$25,000.00) and to raise fifty-three thousand two hundred and seventy-nine dollars (\$53,279.00) from taxation. The selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

The article was read, moved and seconded. Ron Taksar spoke to the article. There being no discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 11 passed unanimously by voice vote.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the town will vote to appropriate two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) from the Recreation Committee's line item budget to be added to the Rink Surface Maintenance Fund previously established. The selectmen recommend the transfer of this appropriation.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Carl Belz spoke to the article. There was a question about whether we are raising the money or it has already been raised. Carl Belz answered that the money is coming from the Recreation Committee's line item budget and must be done this way because it is a tri-town organization. There being no other discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 12 passed unanimously by voice vote.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the town will vote to appropriate one thousand-five hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) from the Recreation Committee's line item budget to be added to the Dow Field Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The selectmen recommend the transfer of this appropriation.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Rich McLeod spoke to the article. There being no discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 13 passed unanimously by voice vote.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of sixtynine thousand eight hundred forty-two dollars (\$69,842.00) for the purpose of operating the Abbie Greenleaf Library and to transfer this amount to the Library Trustees for their use as they see fit. The selectmen recommend this appropriation.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Carl Belz spoke to the article. There being no discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 14 passed unanimously by voice vote.

At 7:50 PM the Moderator made an announcement that the polls would be closing at 8:00 PM.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,00.00) for the purpose of adding more security in the offices of the Town Hall. Five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) is to come from taxation. The balance of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) is to come from fund balance (surplus). The selectmen recommend this appropriation.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Ron Taksar spoke to the article. There was a question from the floor asking for more explanation of what will be done. Ron Taksar answered the questions describing that the Town Clerk side would be more secure with a window type counter and locked partitions. The Selectmen's office will replace a door on their side. There being no further discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 15 passed unanimously by voice vote.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) for the Franconia Children's Center to be used for general operating expenses. The selectmen recommend this appropriation.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Rich McLeod spoke to the article. A question was raised from the floor on whether other towns contribute. Currently, Franconia is the only town that contributes but the Selectmen mentioned that they will encourage the surrounding towns to contribute. Cindy Berlack who has been a part of the Children's Center for the past 13-years spoke on behalf of the Center telling how it helps out 40 families so that they are able to work. She feels it is very healthy for the community and hoped the people would continue to help the Center. There being no further discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 16 passed unanimously by voice vote.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00) for the study and implementation of the infrastructure improvements and to make the selectmen agents to expend. The sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00) will come from the fund balance (surplus) and no amount will be raised from taxation. The selectmen recommend this appropriation.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Carl Belz spoke to the article thanking the Committee for all of their hard work and efforts. Carl also explained that the Select Board had hoped to hold a public hearing before town meeting but there were pieces missing from the final report and time grew too short. The hope is to have the public hearing this year and get the town on board with the Infrastructure Committee's recommendations. A question was raised about what monies were spent last year and what this new appropriation of money would be used for. Carl Belz spoke to the questions stating that last year's money was used on a road survey, architect study and engineering study. The money to be appropriated for this year would be for any other expenses associated with architects or marketing for the public hearing. There being no further discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 17 passed unanimously by voice vote.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the town will vote to adopt the Optional Veteran's Tax Credit as described by the state general court, Title V, Chapter 72, Property taxes, Section 72:28. The Veteran's optional tax credit would be the amount of \$500.00. In recognition for those veterans who made sacrifices and served in the armed forces of our country and were honorably separated from service for the country, as described in Section 72:28 IV (a thru c) and V (a thru g). (By petition.) The selectmen do not recommend this article.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Ron Taksar spoke to the article endorsing the spirit of the article and gave a brief history on the veteran's credit in the Town of Franconia. There was much discussion from the floor in support of raising the Veteran's Tax Credit with many people giving examples of how other funding has been eliminated for active members of the National Guard. There being no further discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 18 passed unanimously by voice vote.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the town will vote to adopt under RSA 72:27-a an exemption from the assessed value, for property tax purposes, for persons owning real property which is equipped with a wood heating energy system as defined in RSA 72:69.

The article was read, Ron Taksar made a motion to have the article tabled due to more research needing to be done on the wording of the article. The town will consult with Town Council on wording and will place the article on the warrant in 2008. The motion was seconded and there was a unanimous vote to table article 19.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the town will vote to adopt under RSA 72:27-a an exemption from the assessed value, for property tax purposes, for persons owning real property with a solar energy system as defined in RSA 72:61.

The article was read, Ron Taksar made a motion to have the article tabled due to more research needing to be done on the wording of the article. The town will consult with Town Council on wording and will place the article on the warrant in 2008. The motion was seconded and there was a unanimous vote to table article 20.

Before going on to Article 21, Ron Taksar took a moment to thank all of the people on all the Committees of the Town and all the other volunteers who have given their time to help with the Town of Franconia

ARTICLE 21. To see if the town will go on record in support of effective actions by the President and the Congress to address the issue of climate change which is increasingly harmful to the environment and economy of New Hampshire and to the future well being of the people of Franconia.

These actions to include:

- 1. Establishment of a national program requiring reduction of greenhouse gas emissions while protecting the U. S. economy.
- 2. Creation of a major national research initiative to foster rapid development of sustainable energy technologies thereby stimulating new jobs and investment.

In addition, the town of Franconia encourages New Hampshire citizens to work for emission reductions within their communities, and we ask our Selectmen to consider the appointment of a voluntary energy committee to recommend local steps to save energy and reduce emissions.

The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire congressional Delegation, to the President of the United States, and to declared candidates for those offices. (By petition.)

The article was read, moved and seconded. Jack Cook and students from the White Mountain School spoke to the article. There was much discussion from the floor on this issue. Bernie Costa spoke in favor of raising awareness on a different level of clean air vs. global climate change. She does not feel that it is only people doing damage to the earth. Another person from the floor questioned whether the Town of Franconia was the place to conduct this business. There being no further discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 21 passed by hand vote. 58 Yes, 10 No.

ARTICLE 22. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, and committees, or other officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relative thereto.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Bill Mead spoke to the article. Bernie Costa, Planning Board Chairman spoke about meetings coming up concerning the Master Plan and Conservation Land.

ARTICLE 23. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

There being no further business to transact, there was a motion and a second to adjourn the meeting. The meeting was adjourned at 8:40 p.m.

To see if the town will vote to appropriate ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) and authorize the selectmen to contract with Ross Ambulance Service to provide transportation of Franconia Life Squad patients and to have the amount of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) be expended from the Life Squad budget. (By petition)

ARTICLE 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of same, as set forth in the following budget:

ARTICLE 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred sixty-one thousand eight hundred fifty dollars (\$161,850.00) to be added to the following Capital Reserve Funds previously established. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.

Town Buildings Truck, \$4,400; Town Buildings and Grounds Equipment \$7,100; Highway Trucks, \$41,000; Highway Heavy Equipment \$19,600; Police Cruisers, \$7,250; Fire Equip Truck, \$37,000; Transfer Station Equipment \$17,500; Legal \$20,000; and Reassessment, 8,000.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of sixty-six thousand eight hundred dollars (\$66,800.00) to be added to the following Expendable Trust Funds previously established. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.

Highway Improvement, \$50,000; Sidewalk Improvement, \$1,000; Museum Maintenance, \$12,000 and Library Maintenance, \$3,800.

- **ARTICLE 6.** To see if the town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of a Fire Tanker Truck and to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) for this purpose. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.
- **ARTICLE 7.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twentynine thousand dollars (\$29,000.00) to purchase a new Police Cruiser and to authorize the withdrawal of twenty-five thousand six hundred dollars from the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund (\$25,600.00) previously established. Additional funding for this appropriation will come from trading in the 2005 cruiser (\$3,400.00). The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.
- **ARTICLE 8.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred thirty-five thousand dollars (\$135,000.00) to purchase a new Life Squad Van and to authorize the withdrawal of one hundred ten thousand dollars (\$110,000.00) from the Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose. The sum of seven thousand dollars

- (\$7,000.00) is to come from general taxation. Additional funding for this appropriation will come from selling the 1997 Life Squad Van (\$18,000.00). The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.
- **ARTICLE 9.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred thirty-five thousand dollars (\$135,000.00) to refurbish the Sutphen Pumper Fire Truck and to authorize the withdrawal of one hundred fourteen thousand dollars (\$114,000.00) from the Fire Truck Pumper Capital Reserve fund created for this purpose. The amount of twenty-one thousand dollars (\$21,000.00) is to come from general taxation. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.
- **ARTICLE 10.** To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000.00) for the installation of water meters for both water systems with said funds to come from the Water Department surplus funds and no amount to come from taxation. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.
- **ARTICLE 11.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ninetynine thousand dollars (\$99,000.00) for design engineering and consulting plans recommended for improvements to the water system. These plans will have the cost estimates that will be used for applications to State and Federal agencies for grant and loan payments. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.
- **ARTICLE 12.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy thousand dollars (\$70,000.00) to construct a maintenance building for the Buildings and Grounds Department to be located at the end of Dow Avenue behind the Elmwood Cemetery. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.
- ARTICLE 13. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of two hundred sixty thousand two hundred eight dollars (\$260,208.00) for the purpose of solid waste disposal with five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) from the Transfer Station/Recycling Center Special Revenue Fund surplus, Town of Sugar Hill (\$38,013.00), the Town of Easton (\$17,279.00), PAYT Fees (\$76,500.00), Special Handling Fees (\$35,516.00), and Recycled Material (\$28,000.00) and to raise fifty-nine thousand nine hundred dollars (\$59,900.00) from taxation. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.
- **ARTICLE 14.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) to be added to the Rink Surface Maintenance Fund previously established. The Selectmen recommend appropriation.
- **ARTICLE 15.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand-five hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) to be added to the Dow Field Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.

2008-2014 CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS PLAN

The 2008 – 2014 Capital Improvements Plan, adopted by the Franconia Planning Board and accepted by the Franconia Board of Selectmen, was completed by a diverse group of seven citizens, appointed by the Planning Board and the CIP Chairperson. The Committee worked from April though December 2007 on this year's effort.

The Committee interviewed all Town Operational Department Heads, the Fire and Life Squad Chiefs, Recreation, Library and Heritage Society representatives and the Town's Select Board and administration to collect their anticipated capital needs, and the priority of the needs, for the time frame 2008-2014. These individual requests where then laid out in an annualized schedule and prioritized in relation to each other and the Towns historical yearly capital expenditures and the ability to raise monies to fund the projects in the future. The Committee's review and budgeting of projects was done in light of the substantial infrastructure projects recommended by the Infrastructure Study Group (ISG)

Next, a draft of the CIP was published and made available for the citizens' review. This draft plan reflected a recommendation for 2008 of \$239,150, versus a recommendation in 2007 of \$244,850, a 2.3% decrease year over year. It also represented a favorable relationship to the actual 2007 capital expenditures of \$296,431. The recommended budget over the period 2008-2014 is \$1,668,720, compared to \$1,683,120, for the period 2007-2013, presented last year. A Public Hearing was then held to elicit public comment on the draft. There was no Public comment received at the Hearing in relation to the draft, so no adjustments were made.

The 2008 CIP was presented to the Planning Board on January, 8^{th} 2008 and officially adopted. The Committee presented the CIP to the Select Board on January, 14th 2008 for use in their planning of the Town of Franconia 2008 annual budget.

The CIP Committee would like to highlight a few specific findings and concerns that it recommends receive further consideration by the CIP, Planning and Select Boards as well as the community at large:

- 1) The CIP Committee recommends to the Select Board that a Capital Acceptance Plan (CAP) or similar process be established for the large infrastructure projects that have been recommended by the Infrastructure Study Group (ISG.) A CAP type process would assist the Town Administrators and the standing Committees CIP, PB, working with the citizenry, to establish the best strategy for the execution of a given project(s) and secure its acceptance for funding. This effort would take into consideration the current Master Plan, CIP, ISG recommendations and present tax burden in crafting an acceptable and effective strategy to address the Towns substantial infrastructure needs.
- 2) The CIP Committee recommends that the Town consider long term financing, either in the form of bonding or bank financing, for some of the larger proposed capital projects. In lieu of having reserved for these needs in years past, the identified timing of these projects, and the relative present cost of borrowing, this method of raising monies seems prudent and effective in managing the tax impact of these capital expenditures.

- 3) The CIP Committee plans to continue to develop a more structured and rigorous RFP process for the proposal and acceptance of capital needs requested by the Operating Departments and Town organizations. By improving this process, the Committee, working with the requestors, hopes to improve the efficiency, accuracy and cost effectiveness of the individual requests. It is also anticipated that this effort will improve the appropriate timing and level of Reserve Fund appropriations. The Operating Departments were very helpful this year in relation to these efforts.
- 4) The CIP Committee recommends that the Select Board prepare a comprehensive long range plan for the upgrades necessary at the Town Hall (windows, insulation, ADA bathroom, etc...) This seems especially necessary in light of the ISG's recommended reconfiguring and improvements to the building.
- 5) The CIP Committee recommends that the Road Agent, working with the Select Board, Planning Board and Infrastructure Committee, continue to develop a long range Strategic Plan for the Towns roads. This plan would provide recommendations and schedules for maintenance and improvements to existing roads and identify required new construction. This plan would be used to establish appropriate and realistic annual funding to be included in the CIP.

Finally, the CIP Committee would like to thank all Town employees, administrators, board members and citizens for their generous contributions of time and consideration in establishing and delivering Franconia's 2008-2014 CIP. We are hopeful that the plan and process will be an important aid to the Select Board in their annual budgeting and result in improved capital planning and investment for the Town of Franconia.

ABBIE GREENLEAF LIBRARY

The year 2007 marked the return of a beloved tradition, the Maypole Dance. Christie Shaw-Doran led dancers as they weaved long, pastel ribbons back and forth to symbolize the shortening days of winter and the lengthening days of spring. It was a sunny day and a warm gathering for the community. The ladies and young girls were well-rehearsed and performed the complex dance beautifully. The celebration was part of the tri-town Earth Day celebration that included Circle Dances by Neskaya and the "Color Your World Green" community-wide cleanup.

An Evening of Poetry in Franconia was sponsored by the Library, Heritage Museum, and Frost Place. Jim Schley, Executive Director of the Frost Place, spoke about Robert Frost and the poetry he was inspired to write while a resident of Franconia.

Angelo Costa, Lions Club member and retired social studies teacher, gave a presentation called "What's in a Name?" about the Marquis De Lafayette, French hero of the American Revolution. The title of the program was inspired by the many local places named after him: the mountain, the Lions Club, two roads, the elementary school, and senior center. The program was inspired by the theme of this year's Old Home Day Parade: Lafayette, the Man and the Mountain.

The Friends of the Library held successful book sales on Old Home Day and Columbus Day weekend. Proceeds funded maintenance of the perennial bed, pruning, and planting of spring-flowering bulbs. The Friends worked very hard to organize book donations to make future sales even more successful.

The library has a new sign out front. It was designed with much careful consideration by the Library Board of Trustees and the Littleton Sign Company. It sports a beautiful gold leaf in honor of Abbie Greenleaf, for whom the library is named. The sign was funded by the Friends of the Library and a bequest of Elizabeth Hawes Buxton.

A chance remark on Old Home Day stirred speculation about what happened to the Bicentennial Quilt which Kathie Lovett and 38 friends presented to the town in 1977. The 45 squares depict scenes from Franconia and its surroundings. The missing quilt was found in the basement of the library and is now displayed in Town Hall for everyone to enjoy.

We received a grant from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation for the initial setup of the Overdrive Audio Book program. This is a web-based service for patrons to download books onto their computer and MP3 player. One family checked out the library's MP3 player and took it on vacation to Thailand and another downloads books from a remote village in Hungary.

The library welcomed two new staff members, Marilyn Fischer and Adam Nyborg. Ralph Brigida retired after many years as the library's bookkeeper, and his professional contributions to the library are gratefully acknowledged. Pam Yarosh of the Franconia Business Connection joined us as our bookkeeper in May. Bruce McLaren of Community Financial Services Group, LLC is the financial consultant to the Board of Trustees. The Board thanks Bruce for his community service.

FRANCONIA LIFE SQUAD

During 2007, the Life Squad had several incidents that involved severe trauma. The Life Squad managed these incidents with the same level of professionalism that it manages all of its incidents. The Life Squad has received praise for its member's professionalism and high level of skills from the Littleton Regional Hospital and from patients. Members are from the towns of Franconia, Sugar Hill and Easton and are dedicated to providing the highest quality emergency medical service to the communities it serves.

Our members are all Nationally Registered Emergency Medical Technicians and are continually training and improving their skills. Each member must have a minimum of 24 hours of continuing education each year plus every two years must take a 24 hour refresher course and an extensive practical exam.

Currently, six of our members are certified to provide Advanced Life Support and one member is a Nationally Registered Paramedic, one member is a Paramedic who serves as our Medical Advisor and two members are currently in school to become Paramedics.

Franconia is fortunate to have the highest medical credentials of any municipal ambulance or first responder service in the area.

Many of the members have other specialized training including ice rescue, swift water rescue, and motor vehicle extrication certifications. All of the members are certified in advance CPR and in the use of the heart monitor and defibrillator. Most importantly, all of our members are dedicated to providing compassionate emergency medical care from the scene to the hospital.

The Franconia Life Squad currently has 17 active members and a Paramedic Advisor which is more members than it has ever had in its 35 year history. The Franconia Life Squad is well prepared to assist the citizens and visitors to the area, twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week with quality emergency medical care. In 2007, the operating expenses were \$45,240 and income obtained from patient billing and Sugar Hill and Easton subsidies totaled \$34,452 with the net cost for the operation of the Franconia Life Squad to the Town of Franconia being \$10,788. In 2006, the net cost to the Town of Franconia for the Life Squad's operations was \$8,795. The net cost to the Town in both 2007 and 2006 is roughly half the cost to the Town paid in 2004 for the Life Squad and Ross Ambulance Service prior to the Life Squad transporting its own patients.

I sincerely thank the Townspeople for their continued support. I especially thank the Members of the Life Squad for their countless hours dedicated to serving others in their time of need.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Additional Report of Forest Fire & State Forest Ranger

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of forests & Lands work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wild land fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing <u>ANY</u> outside burning. A fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 1-800-498-6868 or <u>www.des.state.nh.us</u> for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. Help us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. For more information please contact the Division of Forests & Lands at (603) 271-2217, or online at <u>www.nhdfl.org</u>.

Fire activity was very high during the spring of the 2007, particularly late April into early May. As the forests and fields greened up in later May the fire danger decreased However, a very dry late summer created very high fire danger again from August into September, with fire danger reaching very high on Labor Day weekend. Even with the dry conditions, the acreage burned was less than half that of 2006. The largest forest fire during the 2007 season burned approximately 26 acres on the side of Wantastiquet Mountain in Chesterfield during the month of May. Our statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers is credited with keeping most fires small and saving several structures this season due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Several of the fires during the 2007 season threatened structures, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wild land fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. Additional information and homeowner recommendations are available at www.firewise.org. Please help Smokey Bear, your local fire department and the state's Forest Rangers by being fire wise and fire safe!

FRANCONIA & MITTERSILL WATER DEPARTMENTS

Most of our work in Franconia has been to respond to the March 2006 survey results sent to us by NHDES, NH Dept of Environmental Services. The report listed our deficiencies. This list was quite similar to the lists they have been sending us periodically since 1949, and can no longer be ignored.

We went to the Town Selectmen, who gave us their support and set up a town committee called the Water Source Study Group (WSSG). The commissioners hired an engineering firm to review the DES survey and implement a solution. The firm recommended an increase in our storage facility, meters throughout the system, and a systematic upgrading of our distribution system.

The WSSG met monthly to plan how to follow these recommendations, and more importantly how to finance this project. We are working with the Selectmen and representatives from the State to apply for grants and to discuss other methods of funding. The failure to address the maintenance of the infrastructure of our system has resulted in major and costly repairs. We hope to start in 2008 by installing meters throughout the system. They will not only help to conserve water, but will also make the assessing of water rates more equitable. This phase will be funded in part by our reserve fund and also with increases in the water fees.

After four years of working to connect a newly certified well at Mittersill, we are almost there. Early snow hampered the completion of this project. The final phase will be completed in early 2008. There has been plenty of rain this past year and Mittersill has no shortage of drinking water.

Thank you for your support and we hope you will stand by us as we keep working through this much overdue project!

The combined efforts of the Police, Fire, Life Squad, Highway, Maintenance, and Selectmen's Office along with the volunteers came through again in a very big way. We at the Highway Department are very grateful to all those who helped in a time of need. It seems though there is a pattern emerging with the frequency of these storms and their strength. I hope I'm wrong.

The paving, brush cutting, ditching, culvert replacement, grading, york raking and shoulder work have all gone as planned. Snow removal continues as of this writing and seems to be going along fine. The new truck is working exactly as anticipated.

I would like to thank the crew at the Highway Department and the Town's people. It's been a rough year in every aspect. Our own personal beliefs and values were challenged at every turn or at least it seemed like it and we're still here doing what we do best - our job.

With the Master Plan updated, the Planning Board is concentrating on implementing its recommendations. Our first two areas of concentration will continue to be providing mechanisms for moderate income and senior housing in our town. A third area of concern is the Town's infrastructure.

Addressing the housing situation proved more involved than anticipated, so the Planning Board has once again engaged the North Country Council to provide assistance and we're now progressing steadily.

As far as the infrastructure issues, Planning Board representatives have met with the Selectboard, Infrastructure Study Group, the Water Study Group, the Water Commissioners and the Capitol Improvements Plan (CIP) committee to determine which needs will be addressed first. Our over-riding challenge will be coordinating the implementation of the Master Plan recommendations. Those that may need to be addressed simultaneously primarily concern Main Street: water main replacement, improving parking and traffic flow (including the intersection of Church Street and Main Street) and enhancing the sidewalks in that area to create a more walkable community.

Of course, all of these improvements require our residents' and business owners' interest and commitment. The Planning Board would like to invite all interested community members to join us in forming an advisory committee to help work on the developing vision for Main Street. We plan on relying heavily on the fine work of the CIP committee to keep the vision one of reasonable scope and affordability. Many thanks for their hours of service on this vital need of our Town.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT 2007 ANNUAL REPORT

The Zoning Board of Adjustment, upon application, reviews and decides on alleged errors in administrative findings and grants variances to the Town's zoning ordinance to provide relief from hardship. The Board also has the authority to grant exceptions for use in keeping with certain provisions of the ordinance.

In March 2007, the ZBA granted a request for an equitable waiver of dimensional requirements from Article III, Section 2 of the Zoning Ordinance for Lawrence and Barbara Forlano to permit an existing barn to remain within 20-feet of a lot line.

In April 2007, the ZBA granted a Variance in relation to Article II, Section 2 of the Zoning Ordinance to permit Leo and Jean Grace to put an addition on an existing house located in Mittersill.

In May 2007, the ZBA granted a Special Exception to Article VII, Section 2 of the Zoning Ordinance to permit Dr. Andrew Chen to construct a 6,000 sq. ft. medical office building in a Residential B zone on Profile Road.

In May 2007, the ZBA granted a Special Exception to Article VII, Section 2 of the Zoning Ordinance to permit James Walker to construct an addition to an existing office building in a Residential B zone on Main Street.

In June 2007, the ZBA granted an Area Variance in relation to Article III, Section 2 of the Zoning Ordinance to permit Ken and Linda Ford to construct an addition on a building located less than 50 feet from the centerline of Main Street.

In October 2007, the ZBA granted an Area Variance in relation to Article III, Section 2 of the Zoning Ordinance to permit Chip Stowell to rebuild a barn located less than 50 feet from the centerline of Sunset Lane.

THE FROST PLACE

During 2007, The Frost Place museum and poetry center continued to draw visitors from across New Hampshire and the United States and indeed from throughout the world. More so than is true of any of his twentieth-century literary peers, Robert Frost's fame and influence continues to grow. People of all ages love his poems, and many of those who come to Franconia to see the simple house owned by the Frost family more than eighty years ago describe themselves as "pilgrims."

The Frost Place staff (now including executive director **Jim Schley** and museum manager **Meghan McCarthy McPhaul** along with seasonal interns and volunteers) enjoys telling visitors about the museum's unique partnership with the Town of Franconia, which had the remarkable foresight at Town Meeting in 1976 to approve purchase of the property to insure its preservation.

Since 1977, The Frost Place has awarded a Resident Poet fellowship to allow a contemporary poet to live and work in the house for two months in the summer, and the 2007 Resident Poet was **Jody Gladding** of East Calais, Vermont. For the second year, we also hosted a young poet as a William W. Cook Fellow, a postgraduate award for a recent Dartmouth College graduate, which this past year was given to **Todd Wooster**, who lived in the house in June and September and worked as a museum docent and conference assistant.

The Frost Place's programs have expanded in recent years to encompass four annual conferences, which have earned national acclaim: the **Young Poets Conference** (April 25-27, 2008), the **Conference on Poetry and Teaching** (June 7-July 4, 2008), the **Festival and Conference on Poetry** (July 27-August 2, 2008), and the **Frost Place Seminar** (August 3-18, 2008).

During each conference, evening readings are open to the public with no admission fee, and local poetry enthusiasts are welcome to attend.

The Frost Place also hosts an annual open house in early July, in celebration of New Hampshire's official "Frost Day," to give neighbors and townsfolk a chance to meet the staff and the new Resident Poet. The 2008 Frost Day will be Sunday, July 6, 2008, at 2 pm, and we'll be honoring Frost Place founder Dave Schaffer and longtime trustee Sydney Lea along with 2008 Resident Poet James Hoch.

As Franconia residents know all too well, 2007 was a year of widespread storm damage, and hurricane-force winds caused enormous destruction along the Frost Place's half-mile nature trail, which will require extensive restoration work in the coming years. In addition, Frost Place director Jim Schley's current priorities include energetic promotion of conferences, expansion of school programs and teacher training, and development of dynamic partnerships with local and regional businesses.. While celebrating the Frost Place's Thirtieth Anniversary, the staff and Trustees will seek to make this unusual museum better known across the region and reach out to new participants and funders to further increase the effectiveness of our poetry education programs and historic preservation work.

In 2007, The Frost Place returned to financial wellbeing, with new administrative systems in every area of operations and a refreshed sense of mission and momentum. By taking a deliberately "traditional" path - guaranteeing the upkeep of the house, barn, and gardens; offering a museum experience that is unglamorous but authentic; and providing superb poetry workshops and readings - The Frost Place appears well positioned to address the future while maintaining a powerful connection with the past.

FRANCONIA AREA HERITAGE COUNCIL AND FRANCONIA HERITAGE MUSEUM

The past year has been a milestone for both the Heritage Council and the Museum. It was the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Heritage Council and the tenth anniversary of the Museum. The citizens of Franconia have much to celebrate in having a cultural gem in our historic Museum of over 10,000 items and a very dedicated governing board as well as numerous volunteers.

Another milestone occurred with the retirement of Jewell Friedman. Jewell gave the Museum countless volunteer hours over the past ten years as its curator and administrator. Without her foresight, passion and dedication, we would not have our wonderful museum – often said to be one of the finest museums in the Country for a town of our size. Upon her retirement, she gave a gift annuity of \$20,000 to the New Hampshire Charitable Foundation – starting a Franconia Heritage Fund for the continued operation of the Museum with a paid staff person assisted by volunteers. This gift has already inspired others to give monetary sums to insure the future viability of our Museum. Jewell was honored by the Heritage Council at our annual meeting and dinner, November 20, 2007, held at the Horse and Hound Inn. She was presented with an inscribed New Hampshire wall clock and a plaque naming the exhibit room of our Museum "The Jewell Friedman Exhibit Room".

After Ms. Friedman's retirement, Sharon Penney became our first part time paid administrator. Sharon contributed much to this position and the museum but was later offered a full time position as Town Planner for Alton, NH. We were extremely fortunate to have Michele Lowry come on board as Sharon's replacement. Michele lives in Easton, comes from England, and has been in Office Management for 22 years. She has made significant enhancements in our administrative procedures and established a working liaison with the Franconia Chamber of Commerce.

We were also privileged to have two students from the White Mountain School come on Monday afternoons to help us with various tasks and thereby fulfill their community service obligation.

As in the past, the Museum and Iron Furnace Interpretive Center drew many visitors from local citizens as well as many parts of the United States and numerous foreign countries. Events sponsored by the museum included a winter skating party, snowmaking talk by Bill Roy of Cannon Mountain, flower borders talk by Dr. David Bishop, poetry reading with Jim Schley in cooperation with the Frost Place, 10th anniversary open house, annual garden party, volunteer orientation and lunch, hosted Chamber of Commerce meeting, 4th of July parade participation, Country Dance at the Franconia Town Hall, Halloween Open House, "Salute to Servicemen of the Franconia area" exhibit honoring the 75th anniversary of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, and the "Old Fashioned Christmas" open house.

We look forward to this coming year with much enthusiasm in continuing to enhance the cultural environment of the Franconia area.
