WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

To the inhabitants of the Town of Fremont in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Fremont Town Hall in said Fremont on Tuesday the tenth day of March next at ten of the Clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. Upon application of (11) legal voters: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$152.00 to assist the Rockingham Child and Family Services Inc., a private non-profit organization. Funds to be used for current operating expenses. (Not recommended by the Budget Committee.)

3. Upon application of (14) legal voters: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$767.00 to support the Greater Raymond Community Action Center, a part of Rockingham County Community Action Program Inc., a private, non-profit, anti-poverty agency. To be used to provide services to Fremont residents. (Not recommended by the Budget Committee.)

4. Upon application of (12) legal voters: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$119.00 towards the support of the Exeter Children and Youth project.

5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,305.80 for the purchase of 4 inch hose and adaptors and authorize the Selectmen to use the un-expended balance of loan on Class A Pumper (Art. 18-1979) as set off for this appropriate, and remaining balance to go into General Fund.

6. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set offs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in the amounts indicated herewith; and further to authorize the Selectmen to make pro rata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action hereon:

7. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and withdraw from the current surplus the sum of \$5,925.00 to be used as setoff against the

following items:

Town Hall and Other Buildings	\$4,125.00
Cemetery Pump And Mapping	1,800.00

8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for use by the Road Agent to seal town roads.

9. To see if the Town will raise, appropriate and allocate the additional Highway Subsidy Funds which may become available under the provisions of RSA 241:15 as amended for the year 1981. Said funds believed to be in the amount of \$5,051.29 and to be used for the construction or reconstruction of Class IV and V highways.

10. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and take such action as the Town deems necessary.

11. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

12. To see if the Town will vote to take deeded title to the street named Pond Lane, a cul-de-sac street located within the subdivision of Maurice Robinson and Carl Armstrong off Route 107 Main Street, from Maurice Robinson and Carl Armstrong, present owners, upon certification of the Road Agent that the road meets the requirements of the Land Subdivision Regulations of the Town of Fremont, as amended in 1973. Art. VII, Sections B,C,F, and O.

13. Upon application of (21) legal voters: To see if the Town will vote to have the Selectmen establish a committee of five (5) citizens to review the needs for an overall recreation program in the Town and make recommendations at next year's Town Meeting in accordance with the provisions of RSA 31:47. Further that any portion of this program may be initiated at any time by this committee should funds become available to accomplish it from outside sources.

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey by Quit Claim Deed to John H. Schou the former John H. Schou Heirs land consisting of 7 acres more or less, Tax Map Lot #1-34 located in Boggs meadow, so called. Said land acquired by Town on a Tax Collector's deed dated January 20, 1981, for a price representing the balance of taxes due plus all costs and interest due to date of Tax Collectors Deed.

15. To see if the Town will approve the action of the Selectmen in accepting the gift of two (2) parcels of land by Quitclaim deed from Richard E. Whittier et al to the Town of Fremont from the estates of the late Bertha M. Whittier and Horace R. Whittier. Briefly described as follows:

Parcel #1: Map Lot #3-205, two (2) acres more or less located on or near the road leading from Fremont to Sandown.

Parcel #2: Map Lot #5-56, fifteen (15) acres more or less located in the Shirkin Woods, so called.

16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to receive in the name of the Town, Deeds from the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests, present owners of certain tracts of land in Fremont, namely Tax Map Lot #4-9, 4-10, 4-11, 4-12 consisting of 109 acres more or less. Said lands to be acquired by HCRS Funds. These lands shall be under the control and supervision of the Fremont Conservation Commission.

17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Trustees of the Trust Funds to continue the practice of printing the Status of Trust Funds in summary form in the annual Town Report, in accordance with RSA 31:33, Paragraph 2, as has been practiced for the last five (5) years.

18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by Tax Collector's Deeds at public auction.

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, money from the State, Federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year in accordance with procedures set forth in RSA 31:05b.

21. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

NOTE: In accordance with RSA 39:2A adopted at the March Town Meeting of 1972, the first session of the Town Meeting for the Choice of Town Officers for the ensuing year will open on March 10, 1981 at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon and will remain open until 7:00 in the evening. The second session for the consideration of the remainder of the warrant articles will be held at the Fremont Town Hall on Wednesday, March 11, 1981 at 7:00 o'clock in the evening.

As you know, the economy in 1980 was even worse than in previous years. As the state of the economy effects the pocketbook in the home, it also effects the pocketbook of the Town. The funds are voted to cover a given budget by the Voters. The budget is prepared by the individual departments and justified to the Budget Committee who then recommends for or against any item. This year we asked the Department Heads to try to reduce their Budget requests by ten percent. Generally this request was complied with, but it's up to the voters to further scrutinize budget requests by action in Town Meeting. It's your Tax Money and it takes your vote to authorize spending it. Voice your opinion at Town Meeting.

We remind all property owners that you are obliged to report on your yearly inventory form any changes made in your property within the year. By law the Inventory of Taxable Property must be filed by you by April 15th of each year. You receive this form by mail each March.

We take this opportunity to thank all departments for their continuing efforts.

ROAD AGENT'S REPORT

This year I was able to reconstruct 1200 feet of Rogers Road with the subsidy money received from the State RSA 241:15. I plan to reconstruct another section of bad road this next year if the money comes through from the State again.

The sealing money went quite far and I was able to take advantage of a ten cent per gallon decrease in the price of sealing oil so more was accomplished than expected. We still have quite a lot more road to do so I hope you will vote in my request for an additional \$5,000.00. This is the only way we can prevent deterioration and major repairs.

In regard to the use of salt on the roads in Town. The Selectmen have directed me to not use salt on Town roads. The only exception to this directive is when we have severe ice conditions and then only in specified areas.

Sand is much more effective to prevent skidding, as salt results in slush which in itself is hazardous. Govern your speed to the road conditions.

I wish to thank the Townspeople for all their cooperation this year.

REPORT OF THE FREMONT FIRE DEPARTMENT

First of all, I would like to thank you the Residents of this Town for the help in reducing the number of fire calls this year. I feel this is quite an accomplishment with the increased use of wood stoves and furnaces. KEEP UP THE GOOD WORK!

We received our new pumper (Engine III) in early spring, but were plagued with mechanical problems. Consequently, we did not get the truck into service until November. This did not leave much time for training before bad weather, but this will be started up again in the Spring. Hopefully all the firemen will be fully trained on the new pumper by mid summer.

The 5000 gallon tanker has become a popular piece of equipment to use here as well as for mutual aid calls, as you can see by the mutual aid calls listed. It may not look like much, but it does the job!

There are still oil burners being installed in Town without obtaining permits. This could effect your Fire Insurance coverage if ever you should have a fire. Check and see if your house has a permit for the burner.

There are no permits required for wood burning stoves, but the Department does have pamphlets available on safe installation. Stop by and pick one up.

I would like to remind you, once again, that permits are required for ALL outside fires when the ground is not covered by snow. These permits can only be issued for burning BEFORE 9:00 A.M. and AFTER 6:00 P.M. This is a State regulation. These permits can be obtained by contacting any one of the Deputy Wardens listed in the front of this book.

Again, I wish to thank the Fremont Firemen's Association and The Ladies Auxiliary for their hard work and financial help.

Last but not least, I would like to thank the Firemen for the many hours they have so unselfishly given to the Department to make it the fine organization that it is!

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST FIRE SERVICE

Forest Fire Prevention: Your Business, Our Business, Good Business. Forest fire preventions slogans have been seen in association with Smokey Bear since the late nineteen forties when a national effort to check the spread of forest fires was implemented.

New Hampshire residents recognized that forest fire prevention suppression was the responsibility of every citizen, a half century before this

national campaign, when our legislature established our first forest fire laws in 1903. Since that date, the State has appointed a town/city forest fire warden who is responsible for forest fire law enforcement in his municipality.

All fires kindled out of doors when there is no snow on the ground must be approved in writing by the forest fire warden before being kindled. All forest fires must be suppressed by the warden and his deputies as soon as they are reported. The cost of fire suppression is shared jointly by the town/city and the State of New Hampshire, as are forest fire prevention and forest fire training costs.

This state and local municipality cooperative forest fire program has given New Hampshire one of the best forest fire records in the United States.

POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

I would like to report the annual account of the Fremont Police Department for the year of 1980. The following is a break down of the types of complaints and frequency encountered in 1980. (See attached)

The New Hampshire Police Standards require all police officers in the state to be certified whether they are Full, Part Time or Special officers. Police department members have attended schools in Raymond, Newton and Durham this year and will continue until July 1981 when certification will be accomplished.

On May 7, 1981 Fremont Police Department received its first Police Cruiser in town history, leaving only one town left in Rockingham County without a town cruiser. After 7 months of operation it is apparent that all phases of police work can be done in a professional and expeditious manner. It has logged over 8,000 miles patrolling and responding to complaints in the seven months of operation.

I would like to take this time to thank the residents of Fremont for their assistance and cooperation this past year. A special thanks to my police officers for their continous excellent performance.

REPORT OF THE FREMONT CONSERVATION COMMISSION

1980

The Fremont Conservation Commission maintained full membership with one new member being appointed early in the year. A regular schedule of meetings was maintained on the third Thursday of each month. The major efforts of the commission were directed towards wetland inventory, dredge and fill permit review and negotiations on purchase of property from the Society for Preservation of New Hampshire Forests.

The annual wildlife tree and shrub program was held in March and was well attended. A slide and lecture program was presented by Alex Knight of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service on efforts to restore the Atlantic Salmon to rivers in New England.

An inventory of town wetlands was completed with a map prepared and approved for filing with the State Wetlands Board. The map was also incorporated into the Comprehensive Master Plan for the town.

Negotiation continued for the purchase of 109 acres of land on Old Ridge Road with an environmental assessment and management plan prepared as part of the process. Purchase should be completed in 1981.

Three dredge and fill applications were reviewed and comment provided to the Wetlands Board on two of them recommending revision or denial. The permits were amended and conditional approvals granted.

EXETER AREA VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION INC.

The Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association, Inc. is a community health service that provides health care to individuals and families in their home, in the office, or in clinics. The care may be to prevent disease, promote, maintain, or restore health or it may be to minimize the effects of illness or disability.

The Association is a non-profit agency governed by a Board of Directors. This Board is made up of people who are appointed by the selectmen in your town.

Funding for the Association comes from Medicare, Medicaid, patient fees, local taxes, and donations. Town appropriations make the service available to the town.

HOME CARE. Professional nurses give care to the sick and disabled under medical direction, teach and supervise care by the family and others. They are responsible for the management of patient care, coordinating the services of other disciplines, within and out of the Agency. Care is family centered and consideration is given to the total needs of the patient and family for health promotion and disease prevention and rehabilitation as well as care and support during the dying process.

MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH. Free visits are made to new or expectant mothers to provide information and instruction in the care of themselves and their babies. Well Child Clinics are held twice a month and provide the following services: Physical exams by a local physician, immunizations, hearing and vision screening, lead and urine testing, special counseling, family planning and referral when appropriate. The Clinics are for infants and preschool children.

ADULT HEALTH SCREENING. Clinics are held each month to check blood pressure, provide diet and medication counseling, and general health instruction. Referrals are made when appropriate. New Clinics were added this year to test for diabetes.

FLU CLINICS. 12 Clinics are held each fall (1 in each town) to immunize hi-risk (65 and over, or chronic disease) persons against influenza.

THERE IS NO CHARGE FOR ANY CLINIC SERVICES.

The Association has many valuable volunteers who work at the clinics in addition to staff.

MENTAL HEALTH. Visits to persons who have mental and/or emotional problems. Coordination between patient, family, psychiatrist and community.

COMMUNICABLE DISEASE. Visits to persons who have or are contacts of persons with tuberculosis for testing and/or medication and general health supervision. Other communicable diseases-testing and/or care as appropriate.

CONTINUING CARE. An Agency nurse is in the local hospital part of each day to assist in planning, coordinating and arranging for care at home so that a person can move from hospital to home without any interruption in care.

10,938 units of service were provided to residents of the service area between January 1, 1980 and December 31, 1980.

3. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35,000.00 to construct a new gable roof structure over the existing flat roof at Ellis School.
4. To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to establish the position of Special Education Coordinator in School Administrative Unit No. 14 beginning July 1, 1981.
5. To see if the District will vote to terminate its Handicapped Student Programs for the age groups three-five and eighteen-twenty-one if the State of New Hampshire no longer mandates such programs.
6. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for payment of statutory obligations of the district.
7. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

School District Meeting

March 10, 1980

The School District Meeting for the Town of Fremont opened at 8 p.m. at the Laurence Pettingill Hall, Ellis School. Mr. George H. Baker, Moderator, read the official School District Warrant.

ARTICLE I.

To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Mr. Leonard Bonagura, School Board Member, moved that the District vote to accept the Article as read. Seconded by Mrs. Mary Stiner, School Board Chairman. Motion carried by voice vote.

ARTICLE II.

To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to apply for, contract for, accept and expend aid from the Federal, State and County governments in connection with the Manpower Jobs, Program for the Economically Disadvantaged for Training Program in such sum or sums as may be available from said program.

Mrs. Maureen Buhrman, School Board Member, moved to accept the Article as read. Seconded by Mr. Bonagura. Motion carried by voice vote.

ARTICLE III.

To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for, to receive and spend in the name of the District such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from Federal, State, Local or Private Agencies.

Mrs. Buhrman moved to accept the Article as read. Seconded by Mr. Robert Horsburgh. Motion carried by voice vote.

ARTICLE IV

To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to request an audit by the Municipal Services Division of the Department of Revenue Administration or employ an independent public accountant to examine the accounts of the School District at the close of each fiscal year. This action to become effective on the expiration of the term of the Auditor elected at the March 11, 1980 School District Meeting thus discontinuing the annual practice of electing an auditor as provided in RSA 197:14 and this vote shall remain in full force and effect until changed by a vote of a subsequent School District Meeting.

Mrs. Stiner moved to accept the Article as read. Seconded by Mr. Robert Horsburgh. The latter asked for an explanation. Mr. Stiner explained that until recently we were lucky enough to have a CPA living in town who audited our books each year. Now that he is no longer here, the School Board felt that it would be more efficient to hire an independent auditor to examine the books. An unofficial, approximate cost would be \$600.

The Moderator called for the vote. Motion carried by voice vote.

ARTICLE V.

To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for payment of statutory obligations of the District.

Mrs. Stiner made the motion that the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$528,442 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for School District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District. Seconded by Mr. Robert Waddell.

Mrs. Phyllis Menard made the motion to consider the budget by line item. Seconded by Mary Anderson. Motion carried by voice vote. Discussion and vote on the budget line by line commenced.

Because of new forms being used, it was rather difficult to compare the figures in this year's budget with the previous year. Items that were in one category last year are now under a new category.

Under Section 2150 Speech Pathology and Audiology, it was explained that the Supervisory Union is hiring a Speech Pathologist, and Fremont's share is 10% of the total cost.

Under Section 2220 Education Media, it was explained that this includes all software, film clips, slides, etc., and the increase in the price of anything with silver in it caused the increase in this category.

The figure for Section 2310 School Board - All Other Objects - included telephone, School District officers salaries, School Board salaries, membership and dues, liability insurance for one million dollars, etc.

Under Section 2540 Operation and Maintenance of Plant, the increase was due to a proposed fire and smoke alarm system which was demanded by the fire marshall. Also \$4,000 to replace flooring in the hall and two classrooms of the original building. Fuel was budgeted at 17,000 gallons for \$17,000.

Under Section 2550 Pupil Transportation, an extra \$250.00 was allocated for gas per month for ten months. The total figure includes transportation for special education.

Each item was voted and passed without modification.

The Moderator called for the vote on the original Article. Passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE VI.

To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

Miss Mary Anderson made the motion to adjourn. Seconded by Mrs. Elizabeth Stanley. Motion carried by voice vote. Meeting adjourned at 9 p.m.

Superintendent's Report

On August 23, 1975 the State of New Hampshire's new Public Employee Labor Relations Law (RSA 273-A) went into effect -- a law granting the teachers in New Hampshire the right to negotiate with their respective school boards, as equals, in regard to such matters as salaries, fringe benefits and "conditions of employment" -- and that the results of such bargaining shall be reduced to writing and shall become legally binding upon both parties.

Soon thereafter, the teachers in the various school districts in S.A.U. #14 (Chester, Epping, Fremont and Newmarket) along with most other teachers in New Hampshire began to organize and to form official bargaining units -- a process conducted by the New Hampshire Labor Relations Board.

Needless to say, this new state law placed an entirely new set of rules on school management in New Hampshire. No longer could school boards unilaterally determine teachers salaries and "working conditions" for its teachers. For the first time in history teachers had an official voice on how the schools were now to be managed. Not only is this change little understood by many voters, but some school board members are still having trouble accepting this change, especially new school board members.

Each year the process of negotiations begins around the first part of September or the first part of October and continues until agreement is reached sometime in early January or February. Or, if agreement is not reached by this time an impasse is usually declared by one or both parties. The negotiations sessions in themselves range all the way from being rather pleasant and congenial to being long and nerve-racking experiences. Both parties present proposals and counterproposals, with the meetings increasing in number and emotional intensity as settlements appear imminent. Sessions of from five to six hours in duration are common.

In the Chester School District the total school board, with the aid of the superintendent, negotiate with five faculty members. In Fremont, the same procedure is followed but with two less teachers. In Epping, one member of the school board, again with the aid of the superintendent, negotiate with five teachers. In Newmarket, however, formal negotiations will not begin until the fall of 1981, even though informal bargaining has occurred in the past with joint agreement reached.

As of this writing (late January 1981) both Chester and Newmarket have reached settlements on all issues for school year 1981-82, but as was mentioned, the process in Newmarket has been less formal in nature, but nonetheless, just as binding. More formal sessions will begin next fall in that district. In the districts of Fremont and Epping, impasses have been declared on salaries, while all other items of negotiations for 1981-82 have been settled.

Thus, in both Fremont and Epping a request has been placed with the State PELRB for a list of professional mediators and fact finders, hoping that resolution in these two districts may be reached with the aid

of an impartial third party. In the meantime, negotiations are continuing in these districts on an informal basis which may or may not result in agreement prior to this third party involvement.

If the services of a mediator is ultimately used in Fremont his task will be to get both the school board and the teachers to agree upon next year's salaries. If his task fails, then fact-finding will no doubt be employed.

In Epping, on the other hand, the school board and teachers have decided to skip the mediation route and go directly to fact-finding. The difference between these two methods is that a mediator is primarily interested in settling the dispute between the two parties without concern for the results, whereas, a fact finder assumes the responsibility of seeing that a just settlement is reached. The mediator issues no written report or written recommendation, and his job is finished as soon as he can get the two parties to agree on their differences. Sometimes this cannot be done -- then he/she leaves without a settlement. The fact finder, on the other hand, studies the positions of both parties and in turn submits a written report containing his/her recommendations for a solution. Both avenues can be costly and the cost must be shared equally by the school board and the teachers.

If mediation and fact-finding in Fremont and Epping do not resolve the remaining salary issues, the law requires that the cost item of differences be voted upon by the school district voters and that the school board and the teachers then return to the bargaining table in another attempt to resolve their differences. Beyond this stage there is no law governing what steps should be taken. Hopefully this problem will not have to be faced in S.A.U. #14.

Assistant Superintendent John Ball briefly reports that:

The schools in S.A.U. #14 are participants with approximately 30 other school districts in the Seacoast Area in the formation of the Accountability Program as mandated by state law. Already testing has been carried out in Grades 5 and 8 and the tests for high school students are being formulated. These tests will be first given in the fall of 1981. A management plan dealing with the dissemination of testing results is also being worked on, through the Seacoast Educational Services, the organization to which we belong for accountability services.

In the field of Special Education our S.A.U. #14, State funded Special Education Coordinator, Mrs. Patricia Johnson, reports the following:

Special Education is one of the major portions of the total education system. It is also growing. Not only are more children being identified as having needs, but there are more required testings and evaluations in order to insure that each student in need is getting "the most appropriate education".

As School Administrative Unit No. 14 Special Education Coordinator, my sole responsibility is to meet the special needs demands placed upon your school district by the Federal and State governments. The need for my services is greater all the time.

In our school administrative unit, there are approximately 165

children who are currently SPEDIS (Special Education Identification System) identified. Of that number 58 are being served out of the districts; 35 of these children are in State funded Regional Programs; 16 are in private placements; 5 are in other outside the district placements; one child is in a home-based situation and 2 are placed in out-of-state residential settings.

Currently, the school districts are responsible for twice the state average tuition for all out-of-district placements. That figure varies with the child's age. The elementary school figure is \$3,502; junior high is \$3,306 and senior high is \$3,708. The State is required by law to reimburse the districts for the balance of the out-of-district special education costs. Because of the present deficit in the State Special Education Department, they have, to date, only authorized reimbursement at approximately a 22% level. However, legal interpretation of Public Law 94:142 and Public Law 92:313, Section 504, state that lack of funding is not an excuse for noncompliance with the law.

In addition to Mrs. Johnson's report, it should be noted that after serving as Special Education Fiscal Agent for Region 9 (S.A.U. #14, S.A.U. #16, S.A.U. #17 and S.A.U. #17 and S.A.U. #21) for many years, S.A.U. #16, has indicated that it can no longer serve in this capacity.

Accordingly, joint meetings of school administrators, school board members and special education personnel are being held in an effort to resolve this fiscal control problem.

At this point in time legal counsel is in the process of drafting Articles of Association so that a non-profit corporation can assume this financial responsibility, hopefully by July 1, 1981. It should also be noted that the various special education programs that now exist in Region 9 should not, if at all, be affected by this change, as the change is managerial in nature rather than instructional.

Our New Principal, David Johnston, Jr. reports:

The 1980-1981 school year began with a great deal of excitement because of several changes in staff as well as a good many organizational changes.

New staff members hired were: Maryanne Sabat, Special Education; Florence Hall, Custodian; Suzanne Smith, Reading Specialist; Barbara White, Title I Reading Teacher; and Lauri Boyle, Second Grade Teacher.

The school had a very smooth opening. This was due to the hard work of staff members who worked throughout the summer and especially, Alvin Cate, School Custodian.

The junior high was reorganized to reflect more of a middle school philosophy. The fifth grade was departmentalized and students received 50 minutes of daily instruction in English, Math, Social Studies, Science and Reading.

As the year progressed, several new staff members were hired. They are: Victor McLean, School Lunch Director; Patricia Fay, Art Teacher; Rebecca Harney, School Secretary and Librarian; and

Richard Knowles, Guidance Counselor.

New Programs offered to students include: lunch in the cafeteria area; physical education for all grades; art for all grades; junior high soccer; and junior high student council.

Objectives for improving the school's instructional program and efficiency were determined and they are: to define the school's philosophy of education; to determine objectives according to that philosophy; to develop a curriculum to meet the objectives; to develop programs to better meet the individual needs of students; to improve the school's inventory, office, and record keeping system; to develop a more efficient maintainance program; and to improve defects in the school building structure. To date, the process of meeting all objectives has begun.

At present, the areas of greatest concern are the school's Special Education programs; the problems involved with a poorly constructed portion of the school roof; and the problems of heating a building with less than adequate insulation.

All of these areas have been continually discussed at school board meetings and it is hoped that solutions will soon be found.

The school's strengths include a generally well constructed and attractive building; a veteran and dedicated school faculty; and a town which has been willing to financially support a good educational program for its youth.

With these strengths, the school system is sure to continue maintaining its strengths and improving on its weaknesses.

School Board Report

The year 1980-81 will long be remembered in Fremont as the year of change in the administration, organization, and operation of Ellis School.

Through the insight of our new principal, Mr. David Johnston, Jr., and with the support of the Fremont School Board, many changes have been made that will hopefully improve the quality of education for our students.

Curriculum development became a major priority this year, and a learning center for special needs students was created. Evaluation procedures for students and staff members were examined and updated while staff training in the areas of special education and gifted children began. Grade 5 became part of the Junior High and all began rotating classes and started a six period day with an additional thirty minutes of instruction per day. A student governing body was formed and soccer was added to the school's sports program with art and physical education provided to all students on a weekly basis.

Changes were also made in our school lunch program. Mr. Victor McLean (former renowned U.S. Marine Corps cook) came on board as our School Lunch Director and demonstrated his expertise in the culinary arts. Student participation in the lunch program jumped by 33% attesting to the fact that the quality of the meals had been greatly improved. The children are now enjoying their meals in the cafeteria area eliminating the need to eat in the classrooms where they had been before.

Changes also came in the form of increased resources that were used or acquired for our school and not paid for through town taxes. A reading teacher has been provided for three days per week and a reading aide for two days per week through a Title I federal grant and a \$2,107 Title IV federal education grant is expected for teaching materials. A computer valued at \$1,433 has been provided through a career education grant and the town trust fund will make \$1,050 available in April from the Lillian Frost account to be used for instructional purposes. The amount of \$1,250 has been approved through a federal USDA grant for the purchase of a dishwasher and steamtable and \$950 has been gratefully received from the PTA this year for use in various school programs. Additional income is expected from state and federal aid from sources, such as; The Child Nutrition Program, Aid for the Education of the Handicapped, School Building Aid, and the N.H. Sweepstakes Aid.

Special thanks are in order at this time to those Fremont citizens who have unselfishly donated their time, materials, and money to the betterment of life at Ellis School. Your efforts will long be appreciated by the children, the staff at Ellis, and the School Board.

And now, ...what does the future hold?

Scholastically, we anticipate continued progress. With the new administration and the help of our fine professional staff we look forward to curriculum improvement with programs developed to better meet the individual needs of our children. We have the need; we have the talent; we should succeed.

On the financial side, it's a different story. We anticipate increased expenditures to correct the problems that have occurred due to the defective portion of the school roof. Renewal of contractual agreements to provide transportation for our students will also cost much more than they did under the old contract established 5 years ago.

The School Board, in an effort to reduce the financial burden placed on our taxpayers due to the aforementioned mandatory expenditures, has recommended the reduction of selected programs and services for a period of one year. Plans are to make major cuts in the art and music programs with teacher aide services substantially curtailed. The sports program is expected to change from an inter-school type of activity to an extracurricular intermural program. The cost reduction by the implementation of these changes is expected to be over \$18,000. This is considered by the School Board to be a significant amount to help offset the unexpected increase of expenses for the coming 1981-82 school year.

The School Board wishes to emphasize that the academic programs will not be effected in any way by these changes and that the changes are temporary in nature.

Regular School Board Meetings are held on the fourth Tuesday of every month at 7:30 p.m. in the library at Ellis School and are open to the public with participation encouraged.

Thanks again, to all of you who have volunteered your efforts to make our school district one of the best in the area.
