GRAFTON COUNTY DELEGATION

Organizational Meeting

Date: Wednesday, January 13, 1971
Time: Immediately following adjournment

Room: 105 State House

Rep. Merrill opened the meeting and requested a roll. Those present: Gardner, Rich, Stevenson, Tilton, Higgins, McGee, Brummer, Chamberlin, LaMott, Mann, Anderson, Menge, David Bradley, Nutt, Radway, Gemmill, Dow, Foster, Duhaime, Trembley, Dudley, Merrill, Altman, Blain, Hopkins, Buckman, Bell, Sears, Richard Bradley, Mitchell.

Rep. Merrill opened the meeting to nominations for officers.

Rep. Richard Bradley nominated Sears for Chairman; seconded by Chamberlin.

Rep. Richard Bradley nominated Chamberlin for Vice Chairman; seconded by Gardner.

Rep. Richard Bradley nominated Tilton for Clerk; seconded by Brummer.

Rep. Stevenson moved that the acting clerk cast one ballot for the slate of three nominees; seconded by Richard Bradley. The motion was adopted unanimously.

Rep. Sears took charge of the meeting and thanked the members for their vote of confidence and asked for nominations for the executive committee. Rep. R. Bradley questioned whether the delegation should vote on increasing the size of the executive committee before making nominations.

Rep. Sears said that Rep. Merrill had told him that the executive committee was bound by statute to eight members, whereas Arthur Marx had told him that the executive committee could be any amount.

Rep. R. Bradley said that we should decide the number of members first.

Rep. Stevenson said the executive committee should represent the county districts equally.

Rep. Merrill said there should be a proportional amount of Democrats on the committee.

Rep. Brummer said that Statute RSA 24:2 gave no figure as to the number of members allowed on the executive committee.

Rep. Sears asked Rep. Merrill if she wished to be on the executive committee.

Rep. Merrill said that she would rather not, as she was very busy.

Rep. Dudley suggested that the delegation proceed with the nominations.

Rep. R. Bradley nominated Gardner, Brummer, Mc-Gee, Dudley, Duhaime and Buckman; seconded by Rep. Chamberlin.

Rep. Mann nominated Rep. LaMott; seconded by Rep. Brummer.

Rep. Rich nominated by Rep. Stevenson.

Rep. Stevenson declined the nomination.

Rep. Sears asked for any more nominations.

Rep. Stevenson moved that one ballot be cast for the slate of seven nominees; seconded by Rep. Nutt. The motion was unanimously adopted.

Rep. Brummer moved that a public hearing be held to see if the Grafton County Convention will vote to raise by bond or serial notes the sum of \$238,263.00 to complete the new court house construction as originally planned and that a delegation meeting be held to vote whatever action deemed necessary; Rep. Tilton seconded the motion.

Rep. Brummer stated he was making this motion as he considered the vote taken on December 7, 1970 to be illegal.

Rep. Brummer read the following letter:

Rep. Brummer took issue with Attorney Papademas on his statement that the vote was legal and valid based on the practice of the Delegation to conduct its business as it does at the N. H. Legislature and the recording of a vote when one is absent is within that procedure. Rep. Brummer stated that a vote is not counted when a member is absent from the House. Rep. Brummer said that serial notes did require a 2/3 vote. He did not care if it passed or not, but he wanted it done legally. As a precedent, Rep. Brummer read from the 1968 County Report showing that the \$850,-000 raised for the nursing home was for bonds or serial notes and required a 2/3 vote as stated by the Chairman of the Delegation. Rep. Brummer quoted Attorney Papademas as saying that serial notes for under a 10 year duration did not require a 2/3 vote. Rep. Brummer stated that the purchase of the Clough property for \$55,000 was financed by five year serial notes and that a 2/3 vote was required and that Mr. Papademas was County Attorney at the time. Rep. Brummer also mentioned the 1966 jail improvement vote, showing that another meeting was required to rescind the vote as the Lebanon Bank was not satisfied that the meeting had been conducted legally.

Rep. Stevenson said he did not think that another public hearing was necessary as only the legality of the convention meeting following the hearing was questioned.

Rep. Higgins agreed with Rep. Stevenson.

Rep. Brummer said the statute required the convention meeting to be held within 14 days of the hearing.

Rep. Sears said that Attorney Papademas said it was legal.

Rep. David Bradley said that the Bond Counsel has to approve our actions and suggested the delegation find out from the Bond Counsel if the December 7, 1970 vote was legal.

Rep. Merrill said we were skating on thin ice saying Attorney Papademas did not know what he was doing and recommended that the delegation accept his written opinion.

Rep. Gardner agreed with Rep. Merrill.

Rep. Bell said serial notes did not need a 2/3 vote. He quoted Bill Maynard and Bill Deachman as his authorities. He said if one bank will not take the notes, try another.

Rep. Sears said that he was not a lawyer.

Rep. David Bradley said that he was a lawyer and that what the Bond Counsel thought was all important.

Rep. Brummer quoted Lawton Chandler as his authority that a 2/3 vote was needed.

Rep. Chamberlin said that he had written to the Attorney General for an opinion and had received no answer. He quoted Ray Burton as saying a 2/3 vote was needed for municipal serial notes. Rep. Brummer said that any vote over a year's duration needs a 2/3 vote.

Rep. D. Bradley offered the following amendment to Rep. Brummer's motion: that the hearing and delegation meeting be conducted in such a manner approved by Bond Counsel. This was seconded by Rep. Menge.

Rep. D. Bradley withdrew his amendment.

The delegation voted on a roll call vote on Rep. Brummer's motion and the motion carried 15 to 14.

Rep. Stevenson moved that the hearing and delegation meeting just voted be conducted subject to the advice of Bond Counsel. The motion was seconded by Rep. R. Bradley.

Rep. D. Bradley offered the following amendment to Rep. Stevenson's motion: If the Bond Counsel declares the December 7, 1970 delegation meeting to be legal, thereupon, ipso facto, Rep. Brummer's motion is rescinded. This motion was seconded by Rep. Menge.

Rep. Brummer said his motion could be rescinded any time by future vote of the delegation.

Rep. Higgins asked Rep. Brummer why he would withdraw his motion if Bond Counsel says it is legal and not when Attorney Papademas says it is legal.

Running debate ensued on relative merits of opinions of Lawton Chandler vs Bill Maynard.

Rep. Gardner said he was trying to save the county money.

Rep. Dudley said he would reverse the order of the motions.

Rep. Sears called for a vote.

Rep. D. Bradley's amendment passed unanimously.

Rep. Stevenson's motion as amended passed unanimously.

Rep. Stevenson moved adjournment; unanimously seconded.

January 27, 1971 Immediately after Adjournment Wildlife Room, State House

Members present: Sears, Brummer, Tilton, McGee, Dudley, Buckman.

Rep. Sears called the meeting to order.

Rep. Brummer moved that the executive committee direct the county commissioners to get a legal opinion on the December 7, 1970 delegation meeting from Attorney Richard Upton within 15 days and to report back to the Chairman of the delegation for further action due to the delegation vote of January 13, 1971.

Rep. Buckman seconded the motion.

The motion passed unanimously.

Rep. Dudley moved that the executive committee appoint Rep. LaMott as liason agent between the delegation and the county extension service.

Rep. McGee seconded the motion.

The motion passed unanimously.

Rep. Buckman moved adjournment.

Rep. Tilton seconded the motion.

The motion passed.

GRAFTON COUNTY EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

Monday, March 1, 1971 Woodsville Court House 10:00 A. M.

The meeting was opened by Chairman Sears. The Clerk called the roll: Those present were: Gardner, Tilton, Brummer, Chamberlin, McGee, LaMott, Sears, Dudley, Duhaime.

Representative Brummer moved that the officers of the Delegation become the officers of the executive

committee. Representative LaMott seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Representative Sears said the purpose of the meeting was to consider recommendations for salaries for County Officers as required by statute.

Representative Brummer said we were here to study the budgets also.

Representative Sears said salaries and budgets and he recognized the Register of Deeds. Charles Wood requested a salary increase from \$11,200 to \$12,000, and he said his department was self-supporting. Representative Tilton asked how much his department grossed. Mr. Wood said he anticipated a \$41,000 gross and a \$4,000 profit. Representative Dudley said the figure of \$37,000 did not include insurance, Blue Cross, social security, etc. Mr. Wood said that she was right. Representative Brummer said we need a true cost analysis which this budget is not. Mr. Wood said he would need another girl to do it. Representative Brummer said it could be determined on a per centage basis.

Sheriff Ash requested a salary increase from \$10,-500 to \$11,500. Representative Brummer asked about the increase for the deputies. Sheriff Ash said there were more jury trials and more deputies needed for protection. Representative Brummer asked why the figure of \$6,000 was in the 1970 budget under Superior Court and not spent for that purpose. Sheriff Ash said the clerk of court paid his expenses and charged this to the county. Representative Tilton said the funds had been transferred. Sheriff Ash said the figure of \$31,661.55 was not right. It should be \$32,000. Representative Tilton said the sheriff's department had spent a lot for radios over the last four years.

Sheriff Ash said yes, the FCC was yanking licenses on all the old low band systems. Representative LaMott asked if the sheriff's present system could be modified. Sheriff Ash said yes.

Attorney Papademas requested a salary increase from \$8,000 to \$12,000. He said more prosecution should be done in the lower courts. Representative Gardner said the district courts make money for the towns they are in. Representative Brummer said the bookkeeping system doesn't correlate with the Budget. Attorney Papademas agreed with Brummer. He said the item should reflect his expenses. Representative LaMott asked Papademas for the number of his visits to district courts. Attorney Papademas said he would supply this information. Representative Dudlev asked how much of his time he put in. Attorney Panademas said well in excess of 50%. Representative Dudley gave a comparison of salaries of the other county attorneys. Attorney Papademas said we should work toward a full-time county attorney and that police shouldn't do prosecuting work.

Representative Sears adjourned the meeting at 12:10 P. M. for lunch.

Afternoon Meeting County Chapel

Representative Sears called the meeting to order at 1:20 P. M.

Superintendent and Matron Siegmund requested a salary increase from \$16,000 to \$17,500. Superintendent Siegmund said they were doing a competent job and that their salaries were low in comparison to other counties.

The executive committee spent three hours discussing the budget.

Representative Sears excused the Superintendent and Matron.

Representative Tilton moved that the executive committee authorize the commissioners to borrow \$300,000 in anticipation of taxes. Representative Gardner seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously. Representative Chamberlin moved that the executive committee authorize the Commissioners to spend \$200 to get a legal opinion on the December 7, 1970 delegation meeting and to put the \$200 in the budget. Representative Tilton seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Representative Gardner moved adjournment, seconded by Representative Duhaime.

GRAFTON COUNTY PUBLIC HEARING ON COUNTY BUDGET

March 8, 1971 Woodsville Court House 2:00 P. M.

Chairman Sears opened the hearing at 2:00 P. M. Those present: Gardner, Rich, Tilton, Higgins, McGee, Brummer, Chamberlin, LaMott, Mann, Gemmill, Duhaime, Dudley, Merrill, Altman, Hopkins, Buckman, Bell, Sears, Richard Bradley. Chairman Sears reviewed the budget asking for questions on individual items.

Ben Thompson, Hanover taxpayer, opposed the salary increase for the County Attorney, calling it ridiculous and a waste of money. He gave a comparison of salaries of other county attorneys.

Hubert Merrill, Littleton taxpayer, opposed the County Attorney's proposed salary increase, saying the Attorney knew what the salary was when he ran for the office.

Attorney Papademas gave his arguments for an increase.

Rep. Gardner asked if it would be possible for him to prosecute all the cases in the District Courts.

Attorney Papademas said just the contested cases on serious violations.

Rep. Gardner said we've been doing this for years.

Rep. LaMott asked if the County Attorney was not compounding his own problems by prosecuting in the lower courts since all convictions could be appealed to the Superior Court.

Attorney Papademas said that his prosecuting in the lower courts would reduce acquittals and appeals, and he said the figures given for the salaries of other county attorneys were inaccurate.

Rep. Brummer, Rep. LaMott, Rep. Dudley and Mr. Thompson said the figures were accurate. Mr. Rutherford of the Cooperative Extension Service explained his request for the \$4,000 increase in his budget.

Sheriff Ash explained his budget.

Rep. Brummer asked what fees were returned to the county since the Sheriff was now on a salary basis.

Sheriff Ash said no fees were returned to the county as he was too busy to do any civil work.

Evelyn Smith explained that the salaries of the Register and Deputy of Probate were paid by the State, the State gets the fees, and the County pays for all clerical expense.

Rep. LaMott asked if the probation department paid any rent.

Rep. Bell said no, but will in the new Court House.

Rep. Brummer said that the County Attorney's expenses didn't correlate with the budget.

Evelyn Smith said the figure was misleading.

Rep. Sears said the New Hampshire Tax Commission's regulations require the county to use this form for the budget.

Sheriff Ash explained the requested increase for deputy expense and the programs for the Governor's Crime Commission.

Rep. Dudley asked why \$8,000 was budgeted for the Governor's Crime Commission in 1970 and only \$1,817.06 was spent.

Sheriff Ash said the application had been denied.

Rep. Tilton asked if the county funds appropriated for this item had been transferred.

Sheriff Ash said no, the money had lapsed.

Rep. Brummer said the figures for public welfare didn't correlate with the budget.

Evelyn Smith said the individual budgets didn't reflect Blue Cross, Workmen's Compensation, Social Security, etc.

Rep. LaMott wished to go on record expressing his concern over the county taking in non-paying patients, since the county was losing \$4 a day on Welfare patients.

Mrs. Little, Superintendent Siegmund, Attorney

Papademas explained that the county had no choice and that it was a function, service, and responsibility of the county to offer this "last place to go."

Rep. LaMott wished to go on record asking if the practice of the State's taking a lien on the real estate of a ward was still in effect, as it would help pay the county's expenses.

Rep. Bell said yes, the county did receive small checks from the State from this practice, but it didn't amount to much.

Rep. LaMott wished to go on record saying that the County Attorney should pursue this lien matter and that the income figures in the budget on OAA and board and care of children were absurd and should be many times the amount received.

Rep. Brummer asked why the interest on the money borrowed for the Court House was not in the budget.

Treasurer Bromage said that the interest was segregated from the normal operating funds until the project was completed in early 1972, and that if there were an excess, it would come back to the county as income.

Rep. Brummer said the budget should show this income so that the delegation could get a true picture of county finances.

Hubert Merrill asked what had happened to the \$96,000 of Hill Burton money received for the County Hospital.

Treasurer Bromage said it was used as income on the 1969 budget.

Rep. Dudley asked why it wasn't used to reduce the Hospital bond issue.

Rep. Sears said you couldn't do that.

Rep. Brummer asked the County Attorney for a ruling on the Hill Burton money.

Rep. Bell said that the committee investigating the appraisal and survey of the Plymouth Court House had dissolved, and that the Commissioners would like something done, as the county had no use for the Court House.

Rep. Dudley said that the delegation should appoint a new committee.

Rep. Merrill moved adjournment, seconded by Rep. Chamberlin.

The Executive Committee reviewed the county budget.

The meeting adjourned at 5.30 P. M.

GRAFTON COUNTY PUBLIC HEARING ON PROPOSED ADDITIONS TO COUNTY COURTHOUSE

Monday, April 19, 1971 Woodsville Court House 10:00 A. M.

Chairman Sears opened the public hearing.

Hubert Merrill of Littleton spoke against the additions referring to the new courthouse as a Hollywood monstrosity and a disgrace.

Kenneth Curran of Littleton referred to the present courthouse situation as a disgusting fiasco and said he was considering getting an injunction to stop construction. He said the project had been railroaded through and that it was overdesigned, overpriced, and allowed for the padding of income.

Senator Smith spoke in favor of the additions reciting the needs for it and said we should not be short sighted and build for the future.

Senator Poulsen spoke in opposition to the additions, referring to the project as a snow job and asked the Littleton representatives to vote against it.

There was a discussion on the legality of the December 7, 1970 meeting.

Attorney Papademas publicly charged the county treasurer with playing petty politics.

Rep. Stevenson said the charge against the County Treasurer were unfair and reminded the County Attorney he had not acquired the Reed property by eminent domain as instructed by the delegation.

Commissioner Baker said the County Attorney's charge against the County Treasurer was grossly unfair and said the County Treasurer had acted wisely.

Chairman Sears agreed with Commissioner Baker and said the charge was ill founded.

Rep. Mann said the waters were being mudded.

Rep. David Bradley said if we vote on the same issue as we did at the December 7, 1970 meeting the legal question moot, otherwise a vote on a different issue might raise serious legal questions.

Rep. Chamberlin said if we vote for the additions, we'll be faced with an injunction, and if we vote against them, the contractor will sue us.

Rep. Richard Bradley questioned where we stood and where we go from here. He said we can't go back now and bury what we did wrong and that we have to honor our present committments.

Clarence Gordon of Littleton agreed with Rep. Bradley that we can't go back, but said we could review the uncommitted items.

Kenneth Curran of Littleton spoke again and recommended the establishment of a citizen advisory committee made up of knowledgeable people in the construction business to see if savings could not be effected at this stage of construction. He also recommended that the delegation pay Reps. Brummer and LaMott to oversee the project representing the delegation, as there was no clerk of the works.

Discussion ensued over the avoidance of the threatened injunction.

Chairman Sears said yes.

Rep. Brummer explained that if the motion was adopted the amount to be raised by taxes instead of increasing 90.3% would only increase 50.3%

Rep. Brummer said that this was an arbitrary judgement made by the Commissioners and had not been voted on by the delegation.

Rep. Merrill questioned if anything had been budgeted for a surplus.

Rep. Brummer said that there was a cash balance of \$16,000 at the end of 1970, which was not in the budget.

Commissioner Baker opposed putting the \$60,000 item into current income and said it should be segregated for courthouse use.

Rep. Brummer questioned how it could be used for courthouse use since its use had not been authorized by the delegation.

Rep. Menge supported the budgeting of the \$60,000 item as current income.

Rep. Merrill questioned if the executive committee budget provided for any salary increases for the nurses.

Rep. Brummer said yes, a 10% increase.

The motion passed 18 to 4.

Rep. Brummer moved that the total county budget be \$1,565,110.26.

Rep. Tilton seconded the motion.

Rep. David Bradley requested an explanation of the budget cuts.

Chairman Sears said it had already been voted.

Rep. Merrill asked about the salaries for county officers.

Rep. Brummer said the Sheriff had been given a \$500 raise.

Attorney Papademas said the executive committee had exceeded its authority.

Commissioner Baker said that certain salaries must be set by the convention.

Rep. Dudley said the executive committee had agreed it was impossible to intelligently cut the budget in one day and that the committee had spent many hours in Concord working on it at no expense to the county and she took umbrage with Commissioner Baker's attitude.

Chairman Sears said he couldn't support the Commissioner's budget.

Rep. Buckman said the committee was trying to do its duty and that the budget should be worked on in Woodsville—not in Concord.

Rep. Menge agreed with Rep. Buckman and said the 90.3% increase was too big.

Chairman Sears said the executive committee's work wasn't finished until Thursday, and they had been already criticized for too much delay.

Rep. LaMott said the state budget was going to be cut this year, which would mean a cut in state aid to local communities, and that this was no time to support of 90.3% increase in the county budget. He said the county budget did contain fat and felt the executive committee had done a responsible job in cutting the budget.

Harold McEwen testified that the purpose of the meeting was to get the representatives to put a little pressure on the Highway Department in order to improve the road from Twin Mountain to Littleton to Hanover. Mr. McEwen read letters expressing the need for improvement.

Rep. Tilton asked how he expected the representatives to put pressure on Commissioner Whitaker.

Mr. McEwen suggested members of the delegation sponsor a bill calling for the rebuilding of Route 302 and Route 10 from Littleton to Hanover. He expected the delegation could gain support for the measure by trading votes with other House members and that Commissioner Whitaker would quickly come to his senses and see the error of his ways.

Chairman Sears requested copies of the letters for the delegation.

Rep. Higgins asked Mr. McEwen if he supported the proposed two cent increase in the gas tax.

Mr. McEwen said yes, if we get some.

Rep. Richardson said she thought the deadline for the introduction of bills was in two days.

Chairman Sears said the bill could be introduced in the Senate.

Rep. Chamberlin said that Senator Poulsen would have been here except for a previous commitment.

Mr. Currier testified that Commissioner Whitaker had no plans to improve the road for at least five years, and therefore he did not support the 2 cent increase in the gas tax.

Vice-Chairman Chamberlin opened meeting and asked Brummer to be clerk pro tem in the absence of Rep. Tilton. He stated the purpose of the meeting was to review the budget for the last six months.

Rep. Chamberlin called on Rep. Bell to start the review.

Rep. Bell states we are overrunning the budget for the six months period. He states that the yearly projected overrun of the present budget as estimated by the Commissioners would be \$132,495.16.

Rep. Merrill questions if this estimated figure would be in deficit for the whole year?

Rep. Bell says yes.

Chairman Sears arrives and assumes the chair from Rep. Chamberlin.

Rep. LaMott asks if this estimate was added, would it mean that the County employees pay raise would be retroactive to January 1, 1971?

Rep. Bell says yes.

Rep. LaMott asks Sheriff Ash about the overdraft on his budget for the six months?

Sheriff Ash says that Superior Court is still in session and might continue for some time yet, which is

unusual and that his deputies have to be there. At present he states that Superior Court Judge William Johnson is holding court at Waterville Valley due to a law suit over a condominium built there.

Commissioner Clement states that to the best of his knowledge the suite of rooms for the Judge's chambers was costing the County \$85.00 a day and that this was an added expense to the County.

Rep. Brummer asks why this was necessary and if someone was suing at the Mittersill, would they hold the Court there?

Rep. LaMott asks if any money comes back as revenue from Superior Court to the County.

Commissioner Baker says that he does not think so. States that Sheriff's costs are high because there are too many deputies on duty. Court Judge demands these deputies and the Sheriff has to comply. Claims second six months should not be as bad as only one more term to go.

Rep. Buckman mentioned that extra added costs of Sheriff's Dept. comes about because of such recent senseless acts by the hippies at the Kancamagus highway, which the Sheriff and Deputies had to investigate.

Dr. Eastman was called on to speak by Chairman Sears and said he was just here to listen, but would like to see the employees of the hospital receive equal wages as similar local institutions.

Rep. Mann moves that the delegation instruct the Executive Committee to amend the budget and to raise and appropriate, but not to exceed the sum of \$132,495.16, if needed.

Rep. Merrill seconded this motion.

Rep. LaMott discussed the budget and claims the money is already there for wages. He further states that he never knew of a patient at the institution or hospital to ever go hungry yet.

Rep. Brummer questions legality of amending the budget as the express reason for the call of this meeting was to review the past six months expenditures and income. He states that in order to amend a budget or change it after it has once passed and adjourned, was to properly advertise in a newspaper of wide circulation for a public hearing, stating the time, place and specifically the purpose, then have an executive session afterwards to act. In other words go through the proper proceedings. The alternative is if you do not do this is to wait until after the third quarter report. The Commissioners would then petition the Executive Committee in writing to hold a public hearing through advertising and then the Executive Committee would approve or disapprove the request to exceed the appropriations.

Commissioner Baker states that Rep. Brummer may be right, but that he thinks that he is wrong and that the Executive Committee themselves can sanction a 10% increase.

Rep. Brummer says that this is drug store law.

Rep. Brummer questions why estimate on the Certificates of Deposits pertaining to interest derived and earned was not recorded in the six months summary. Asked Mr. Bromage how much money was earned at the present time?

Treasurer Bromage states that approximately \$50,-000.00 has been earned so far. He further states that the money cannot be used for anything until Court House is finished and to be used in accordance with

Chapter 33-3A of the Municipal Finance Act.

Rep. Brummer takes issue with the last statement as it is true when bonds are sold the money gotten for them, plus premiums, if any, are considered proceeds, but in his opinion, when you invest the proceeds, which is no more than idle money, then the interest derived must be used for reducing taxes and can not be put in a capital reserve fund that has never been set up and voted upon.

Rep. Duhaime moves the previous question.

Rep. Merrill seconds this motion.

Motion carried.

Rep. Sears, the Chairman, puts the question of Rep. Mann.

Rep. LaMott moved that Mrs. Smith keep records.

Chairman Sears opened the meeting at 1:15 P. M. and stated that he could find no rules governing the frequently mentioned 10% overrun on budget.

Comm. Baker said there was nothing in the Statutes to authorize 10%.

Rep. Brummer discussed Municipal Finance Act, Chapter 33, stating two things refer to county, but basically a budget passed at beginning of year, "that is it." To add to budget, must start all over with public hearing, etc.

Question from floor, "Where in Statutes? It is not there."

Rep. Brummer: If not specific in statutes, then it is no good, according to Tax Commission.

Rep. LaMott questioned, is budget not to be changed without public hearing? And must be followed by Executive Committee meeting to change?

Rep. Brummer answered yes.

Discussion followed concerning statutes. Discussion noted meeting last week was to review budget only. Should have been no good for rasing additional funds.

Chairman Sears read Statute 24:15 regarding exceeding appropriations.

Rep. LaMott says to amend budget already voted to be figured into this year's tax rate.

Rep. Brummer states tax rate would change with amendment from 50.3% to 70.9% this year. Suggest we wait until after third quarter.

Rep. Brummer read letter of opinion stating interest income has "got to be used to reduce taxes."

Comm. Baker commented statute ambiguous. Explained best accounting to leave interest income in bond account where it belongs until after completion of project.

Rep. Brummer states it's basically on current year anyway. Read letter referring to RSA 33:33A in case

where interest was used to reduce taxes. Read second letter from Mr. Chandler at Tax Comm. concerning use of interest, stating opinion that interest earned should be used against current appropriations.

Comm. Clement questions do we take opinion of Tax Commission or follow Statutes?

Discussion followed if we could use income now against first Bond principal payment. Should we until after project finished?

Rep. LaMott states building project cannot incur any additional costs over proceeds of bond. Also stated if additional budget funds were added to next year, tax would be doubled. Expenses are already up, and can expect further increases in oil, food, etc.

Rep. Chamberlin says oil barrels already filled at new court house site, and will County be furnishing heat for contractors to finish inside.

Rep. LaMott answered yes, and will also probably cost County for contractor's electricity, etc.

Rep. LaMott explained review of six month figures shows need of more funds, especially in salaries. Mentioned move at last meeting not to transfer funds without written permission from Executive Committee. Believes we should give pay raises, and we must pay oil bills, etc., and this should be done.

Chairman Sears asked minutes of last Delegation meeting in June be read to see if meeting was recessed, and not adjourned, to reconvene last Monday.

Rep. Brummer read from June 10th minutes, delegation meeting recessed.

Rep. Brummer states we (delegation) have no control of actual amount of raises. We appropriate the

money; it is the Commissioners prerogative to do what is in their power for actual expending.

Rep. LaMott: We did not state to take power, only statement of fact for 10% increase, and this budget does not have it.

Rep. Brummer says he is not so sure. Wants to see individual pay sheets. Wants to know how many new ones (employees).

Rep. LaMott states payroll numerically fairly stable, only new faces.

Rep. Brummer says closing of nursing homes would cause larger employment.

Rep. LaMott answers No, there are not.

Rep. Brummer believes we would have to get additional help if nursing homes go out.

Discussion followed: some nursing homes have gone out not meeting state standards. Noted County not receiving in payment what it costs per patient. Have not had mentionable increase in employment since last year's end, just change of personnel.

Rep. LaMott states if we need increase in budget, and public hearing, time should be now, and not wait until after third quarter.

Rep. Brummer commented on amount of additional funds needed.

Rep. Buckman states we cannot do anything unless emergency. 10% increase in payroll, no money, this is emergency.

Chairman Sears referred to RSA 29a: County treasurer, after money spent, can request the approval from County Convention for excess borrowing.

Rep. LaMott states he knows we can have meeting in Dec., Nov., Oct., after nothing left, to raise more to pay bills. Point I make is, I cannot understand why to wait until last deadline and give tax payers fictitious rate, and make double tax next year. There will be another increase next year—minimum wage of \$2.00 is coming. We are saying we don't want to pay out bills this year, carry them over to next year. We should pay this year's bills this year.

Rep. Brummer says he still wants to wait and see what this year's income will be.

Comm. Clement explains need of increase—not enough to start with.

Chairman Sears states he is to meet with Tax Commission tomorrow. Are there any questions for opinions?

Rep. Buckman states Tax Commission would not help town of Ashland, but left it up to that town to make their assessment in their own time.

Comm. Clement states in future, wage increases for employees should not be made effective until probably July anyway, after Legislature is over.

Most agree on this point.

Discussed fact that low wages employ low caliber personnel for most part and employees deserve better wages.

Comm. Bell read statistics showing last year's actual expenditures at \$1,380,328.89 as compared to 1971 budget of \$1,565,110.26 giving an increase of \$184,781.37, which is not sufficient to cover new obligation of Court House bond plus interest of \$215,000.00 not allowing operating increases.

Discussion followed

Comm. Baker states simply not enough dollars to keep up level of 1970. Reason for greater income in 1970 was surplus fund plus other income no longer coming in.

Further discussion.

Rep. Chamberlin states if not for new court house, would this be? — a lot of "flak" on this issue.

Discussion followed.

Discussed overrunning last year's budget.

Rep. LaMott: "I would like to make a motion. I move at this time to make the Executive Committee take the necessary steps to amend the county budget by the addition of \$132,495.16, said amount to be applied to the necessary line items to provide for a balanced budget."

Rep. McGee seconded motion.

Discussion.

Rep. LaMott explained reason for stating necessary steps, if opinion needed, we want interpretation from the Judicial Branch, and not from the Tax Commission; to be taken care of expeditiously, amount to be on this year.

Rep. Buckman moved the question.

Chairman Sears wants to add few words as amendment — "and said Executive Committee to take all such necessary steps to make such action legal."

Discussion shows this amendment not necessary and Chairman Sears withdrew amendment. Motion was specific.

Rep. Brummer questions if intent of Executive

Committee to get interpretation, will send letter to whom?

Comm. Baker states we do have a county attorney and we should utilize his services.

Chairman Sears states it will be up to county attorney to petition Superior Court.

Discussion.

Rep. Buckman moves previous question.

Rep. Chamberlin seconds.

Unanimous vote in favor: Yes—Gardner; Yes—Brummer; Yes—McGee; Yes—LaMott; Yes—Chamberlin; Yes—Duhaime; Yes—Sears; Yes—Buckman.

Comm. Bell, as requested before meeting, brought delegation up to date on Plymouth Court House. Two years ago Commissioners got appraisal for sale; delegation dissatisfied and appointed Committee. Original committee gone, new committee appointed. Have checked into deeds, and line between Court House and Church must be settled. Another committee including George Ray says release is necessary on original agreement if court house not used by county, we must pay heirs sum total of approximately \$600.

Rep. Duhaime states Chairman Sears should make note to include this item on next agenda.

Rep. LaMott says around September 22, 23 or 24 would be good time as delegation will probably be back in Concord.

Discussed.

Rep. Duhaime moved to adjourn at 2:30 P. M. Seconded by Rep. Chamberlin. All in favor.

GRAFTON COUNTY PUBLIC HEARING ON PROPOSED ADDITIONS TO THE BUDGET

Wednesday, August 11, 1971 Grafton County Chapel 1:00 P. M.

Chairman Sears opened the public hearing.

Rep. Gemmill asked if the last meeting was not legal.

Commissioner Baker said that upon the advice of the County Attorney they decided to call a public hearing and convention meeting.

Rep. Brummer reviewed the County Hospital budget and asked why it was \$21,000 under the executive committee's figure.

Rep. Bell said he did not understand it either, and that Mrs. Smith could explain it.

Rep. Sears said that we were \$18,000 short on nurses salaries alone.

Rep. Brummer disagreed.

Mrs. Smith said they had taken the total budget for 6 months and doubled it, and had not done the Hospital by itself.

Commissioner Baker said he did not understand Rep. Brummer's question.

Rep. Brummer explained his question.

Commissioner Baker still did not understand.

Rep. Sears said there was \$8,500 unspent for the first 6 months under "Pharmacy" and asked if it was going to be spent.

Dr. Eastman said yes.

Rep. Brummer said there was \$21,000 left over.

Dr. Eastman said that was for vacation pay and salary increases.

Rep. Brummer said the pay increases were in the budget.

Dr. Eastman said no, they were not.

Running debate followed between Dr. Eastman and Rep. Brummer.

Commissioner Baker said the requested addition to the budget of \$132,495.16 was an estimated figure.

Rep. Brummer questioned the Institution budget.

Mrs. Siegmund said they were feeling their way along and that it was very close.

Rep. Sears asked Mr. Siegmund to speak for Mrs. Siegmund as he could not hear Mrs. Siegmund.

Hubert Merrill of Littleton asked if the Hill Burton funds had been received.

Rep. Bell said yes.

Rep. Tilton said received and spent.

Kenneth Curran of Littleton said he had spent 3 years trying to get information from county officials with no results and had spent \$250 for a lawyer and had finally gotten a copy of the contract with the architect, and he wanted to know why the standard damage clause and termination clause had been eliminated from the contract. He said he was going to sue again and would like some answers.

Rep. Sears said the purpose of the public hearing was to raise additional revenue for the budget, not to discuss the Court House.

Kenneth Curran asked when could he get the answers to his questions.

Rep. Sears said the subject was not germane.

Running debate followed between Kenneth Curran and Rep. Sears.

Commissioner Baker agreed with Rep. Sears that the subject was not germane and recommended that Mr. Curran call Mrs. Smith for an appointment with the Commissioners and preferably, enumerating his questions in advance, and they would be glad to meet with him.

Commissioner Baker said that Mr. Curran rambled all over the place with his questions and that he should not prejudge, and if he was not satisfied after the meeting, then he could talk to his lawyer.

Hubert Merrill inquired again about the Hill Burton funds.

Rep. Bell said they had received two large payments and part of a third.

Hubert Merrill said the Hospital had gotten short-changed.

Mrs. Katherine Page spoke in favor of the addition to the budget and emphasizing the good work done at the hospital.

Norman McMeekin spoke in favor of the addition to the budget saying the Commissioners were not wasting county money, but that the delegation was wasting it by having so many meetings.

Robert Baker of Littleton asked if the county budget had to be sent to the State Tax Commission.

Rep. Sears said yes, the deadline was after August 15th.

Rep. Brummer said that Grafton County was the only county that had not presented their budget to the Tax Commission.

Selectman Donald Bull of Littleton said that the town of Littleton could not present their budget until the county had presented theirs.

Lucy McDonald spoke in favor of the addition to the budget emphasizing the needs of the hospital.

Hubert Merrill supported the increase in the Hospital budget.

Selectman Bull said that the budget was badly presented and by merely doubling the first six months cash flow did not put it in the proper perspective. He said where the actual money spent is more, you are going to reward them with more, and where the actual money spent is less, you are going to deprive them.

Robert Baker said it should be a line item budget.

Kenneth Curran said it was lousy bookkeeping.

Rep. Brummer said that his statement that the budget was off \$16,000 was accurate and that it was the Commissioners fault the nurses had not gotten a raise, and that Rep. Sears was the big budget slasher. He then reviewed his budget figures.

Rep. Sears asked him where he got the \$50,000 interest figure.

Rep. Brummer said from interest earned on the Court House bond issue.

Rep. Sears said the law said that money could not be touched.

Rep. Brummer said the Tax Commission said it could.

Rep. Radway rose on a point of order and asked if we should not be hearing from the public.

Rep. Sears said that he did not want the "Valley News" saying he had gagged Mr. Brummer.

Rep. Brummer said that he could not do that.

Norman McMeekin said the budget was on an annual basis and doubling the first six months was erroneous.

Mrs. Smith said she guessed she was a lousy book-keeper and that maybe Mr. Brummer should have the job. She said she had come up with the figures by July 19 deadline, which involved a trip to Concord to see the accountant, and she did not have time to review the whole budget and had to come up with a round figure for the deficit.

Commissioner Baker said it was not Mrs. Smith's fault and that there was a time problem. He said they would do a better job on next year's budget, and that there should be better communications between the Commissioners and the Executive Committee.

Norman McMeekin said the commissioners' original budget was probably correct.

Rep. Rich asked if the \$132,495.16 was the least amount needed.

Commissioner Baker said this still involved cuts from their original budget.

Rep. Rich said this would raise Littleton's share from \$146,000 to \$170,000 and asked how they were going to raise the money.

Commissioner Baker said he was aware of the burden on the property tax payer.

Kenneth Curran said the bookkeeping was bad and they should have one printed out.

Selectman Donald Bull also recommended a print out of allocations.

Rep. Sears said the bookkeeper would need two assistants.

Treasurer Bromage reemphasized the lack of time to do the budget properly.

Rep. Brummer blamed the Commissioners for the situation.

Rep. Sears closed the public hearing at 2:40 P. M.

Rep. Sears opened the meeting.

Rep. Mann moved that we consider our actions taken at the April 19, 1971 meeting.

Rep. Merrill seconded the motion.

The motion was adopted on a voice vote.

Rep. Gemmill moved that we raise an additional \$132,495.16 for the county budget, giving the executive committee authority to allocate, and making the total budget \$1,697,605.42.

Rep. Foster seconded the motion.

Rep. Richard Bradley asked if this was what we tried to do on July 19th.

Rep. Sears said yes.

Rep. Gardner said he would go for the \$132,495.16 and no more.

Rep. Merrill said we should add \$600 plus for the extra meeting.

Rep. Rich said that we should refuse the money.

Rep. Mann said not Ezra.

Rep. Brummer said we had \$700 left.

Rep. LaMott said the county was faced with the extra expense of a manslaughter charge and a first degree murder charge and suggested the need for further increase.

Rep. Gardner asked how much money was left.

Rep. LaMott said very little and that the Sheriff's department budget was two thirds spent.

Sheriff Ash said the transfer of radio equipment was included in federal money already given us.

Rep. Chamberlin said the murder trial probably won't come up until next year.

Rep. LaMott said the Siegmunds were under a hell of an expense with a prisoner in the Hospital.

Discussion on prisoner followed.

Rep. LaMott moved that Rep. Gemmill's motion be amended by further increasing the budget an additional \$56,815.84.

Rep. Merrill seconded the motion.

Rep. Higgins asked if this brought the total up to what the Commissioners had originally asked for.

Rep. Sears said yes.

Rep. Merrill spoke in favor of Rep. LaMott's amendment saying that the delegation should show faith in the Commissioners' judgement.

On a roll call vote Rep. LaMott's amendment was adopted by a vote of 12 to 10.

On a roll call vote Rep. Gemmill's motion as amended was adopted by a vote of 13 to 9.

Rep. Radway moved that the delegation reconsider its action in adopting Rep. Gemmill's motion as amended and asked the delegation to vote no.

Rep. LaMott seconded the motion.

The motion lost on a voice vote.

Rep. Merrill moved that Grafton County raise by taxes the sum of \$1,221,246.26.

Rep. LaMott seconded the motion.

The motion was adopted on a voice vote.

Rep. Radway moved that the budget allocations originally offered by the Commissioners be adopted.

Rep. David Bradley seconded the motion.

The motion was adopted on a voice vote.

Rep. David Bradley moved that the delegation instruct its executive committee and county commissioners that no future budget be presented to the delegation for final approval until both the executive committee and the Commissioners have reviewed the budget and held a meeting with each other concerning the proposed budget.

Rep. Radway seconded the motion.

The motion was adopted on a voice vote.

Rep. Mann moved that the Plymouth Court House be sold to the town of Plymouth for \$10.

Rep. Altman seconded the motion.

Rep. Brummer said it was too much.

Rep. Mann said the title was in doubt.

Attorney Papademas said there was a petition in court to quiet the title. He said things looked favorable and recommended a wait and see attitude. He said there was a boundary line disagreement between the Congregational Church and the county, and recommended that the delegation empower the commissioners to sign a boundary line agreement.

Rep. Altman spoke in favor of Rep. Mann's motion and said we should be more concerned with serving the public than in making a profit.

Rep. Gardner said the motion was the craziest thing he had ever heard of and that selling the Court House for \$10 was a disgrace and anyone that was for it must be crazy. He said that any Grafton County representative who voted for it would never get reelected.

Rep. Higgins suggested we were serving the public by building a new two million dollar court house.

Rep. Altman said he appreciated people having a

difference of opinion, but he resented being called crazy. He said Rep. Gardner had a great deal to learn about representing people and he was willing to give him lessons.

Rep. Sears said they were getting into a running debate.

Rep. Gemmill said the first step was to clear up the legal matter first.

Rep. Hopkins said the court house had been appraised for over \$80,000 and asked how long it would take to quiet the title.

Attorney Papademas said this term of court.

Rep. Sears called for a show of hands on Rep. Mann's motion.

Rep. Sears ruled the vote manifestly in the negative, and the motion was defeated.

Rep. Brummer moved that the Commissioners be authorized to sign a boundary line agreement.

Rep. Radway seconded the motion.

The motion was adopted by a voice vote.

Rep. Richard Bradley moved that the delegation adopt the following resolution.

Resolved

That the Grafton County delegation request the N. H. Dept. of Public Works and Highways to erect an appropriate sign south of the Campton interchange to inform the traveling public that the next three exits lead to the White Mountains.

Rep. Higgins seconded the motion.

Rep. Richard Bradley spoke in favor of the motion.

The motion was adopted on a voice vote. Rep. Sears adjourned the meeting.

GRAFTON COUNTY EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

Monday, November 8, 1971 Woodsville Court House 10:00 A. M.

Members present: Sears, Tilton, Gardner, Duhaime, Buckman, LaMott, Dudley and Brummer.

Chairman Sears opened the meeting and said the purpose of the meeting was to review the nine month budget statement with the County Commissioners.

The Committee reviewed the summary of revenue. Rep. Brummer said that the nine month actual revenue was \$76,000 more than projected in the Commissioner's budget, not including the \$60,000 interest from CD's. The committee reviewed the summary of expenditures and it was noted that the sheriff's expenditures were running considerably over his budget.

Mrs. Smith said the figures in Exhibit B were inaccurate, as they included Crime Commission money, and she said the figures should read:

\$61,971.00—1971 budget 46,478.25—nine month budget 62,336.67—actual

Rep. LaMott said that the actual expenditure was approximately \$16,000 over the nine month budgeted figure. The committee discussed the function and activities of the sheriff's department.

Mrs. Smith said she had \$4,000 worth of unpaid deputy vouchers in hand. Rep. Brummer asked what would happen if the executive committee didn't authorize their payment.

Commissioner Baker said the commissioners had no power to approve or disapprove the expenditure and that the executive committee had this power and that in effect, the commissioners were caught in the middle.

Rep. LaMott said the \$4,000 overdraft would put the actual expenditure figure at \$66,000 and there was still three months to go.

Commissioner Baker discussed the possibility of making a deal with the city of Lebanon whereby for an annual fee of five or six thousand dollars plus some crime commission money for better equipment, the city would take over the day by day operation of the radio equipment thereby saving the county some \$20,000 a year expense in the hiring of three men to run the radio equipment. Commissioner Baker said that similar arrangements were being made in other counties.

Rep. Brummer moved that the Chairman appoint a committee of three to investigate the proposed radio deal with the city of Lebanon.

Rep. Duhaime seconded the motion.

The motion was adopted on a voice vote. Chairman Sears appointed Duhaime, chairman, Dudley and Commissioner Baker to the committee. Rep. LaMott expressed some doubt as to the feasibility of the plan and was reassured by Commissioner Baker.

Chairman Sears decided the radio committee would report to the executive committee two weeks from date.

The sheriff's department expenditures were discussed at some length. Rep. LaMott said the sheriff's department was getting top heavy and questioned the results of the drug investigations.

Commissioner Clement said that the federal money was working indirectly to the detriment of every county.

Commissioner Baker said there was too much activity in the sheriff's department and that it was not producing results.

Rep. Brummer said that much of their work was a duplication of State Police work and that the deputies should be on salaries as is done in Hillsborough County.

Rep. LaMott expressed concern over the expense of deputy "junkets" to other states to bring back a man who was put on probation the next day.

Rep. Gardner said the expense of deputy investigations was excessive.

Chairman Sears agreed.

Rep. Brummer moved that the county do not pay any sheriff's department bills until after a public hearing on the sheriff's department budget and expenditures.

Rep. Dudley seconded the motion.

Commissioner Bell reviewed the ever-increasing expense of the sheriff's department and said he was not opposed to the motion.

Rep. LaMott asked why the county should buy lunch for the dispatcher and not for Mrs. Smith. Mrs. Smith said she guessed she was in the wrong department.

Rep. Tilton said the public hearing would allow the subject to be aired.

Rep. Sears said that if the executive committee authorized the transfer of funds to the sheriff's depart-

ment it would penalize one department's frugality to the benefit of another department's excessive expenditure.

The committee reviewed the deputies expense vouchers.

Chairman Sears asked for a show of hands on Rep. Brummer's motion, and Rep. Brummer's motion was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Baker asked if it was the intent of the motion to include the sheriff's salary. After discussion, it was decided that the county would not pay the sheriff's salary until after the public hearing.

Chairman Sears set the date of December 13, 1971 for the public hearing.

Rep. Brummer moved that the commissioners instruct the sheriff that all bills and vouchers of his department be current as of the day of the hearing, and that he have a projected estimate of his department's expenses for the rest of the year.

Rep. Tilton seconded the motion.

The motion was unanimously adopted.

Rep. LaMott moved that the sheriff be notified of the radio committee and that he not order any equipment until the radio committee had investigated the matter.

Rep. Brummer seconded the motion.

The motion was unanimously adopted.

Rep. Dudley moved that the county do not approve paying future lunches for the dispatchers.

Rep. LaMott seconded the motion.

The motion was unanimously adopted.

Rep. LaMott moved that the executive committee authorize and assist the county commissioners in the law suit regards the County Attorney's salary in limiting his salary to \$8,000.

Chairman Sears said that at the request of Judge Perkins he had polled the delegation and that the vote was 15 to 8 against giving the County Attorney a raise in salary.

No action was taken on Rep. LaMott's motion.

Rep. Dudley expressed strong dissatisfaction regards the delegation vote of August 11th.

Rep. LaMott moved adjournment, seconded by Rep. Tilton.

GRAFTON COUNTY EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

Monday, November 22, 1971 Woodsville Court House 10:00 A. M.

Members present: Sears, Tilton, Gardner, Brummer, Duhaime, Chamberlin, Dudley, Buckman, La-Mott.

Chairman Sears opened the meeting and asked for the report of the radio committee.

Rep. Duhaime said the committee had met Thursday with Baker and Page, Sheriff Ash, Chief Reynolds of Lebanon, and Bruce Cutting and that all the parties were agreeable to the deal and that there would be a savings of \$25,000.00 to \$30,000.00 a year for the county and recommended the county enter into an arrangement with the city of Lebanon.

Commissioner Baker said that there might be some start up costs, but that the county would still own the equipment and that it was Crime Commission money anyway.

Rep. LaMott moved that the radio committee's report be accepted as recommended and put into operation.

Rep. Gardner seconded the motion.

Rep. Dudley said that Chief Reynolds estimated the yearly cost of 24 hour a day radio service at \$30,000; and that Sheriff Ash was cooperative although he felt the ideal situation would be to have his department run their own system.

Rep. Buckman asked if the original deal would be for just two years.

Rep. Duhaime said yes.

Rep. LaMott spoke in favor of his motion.

Rep. Sears asked when it could be done.

Commissioner Baker said three to four months.

Rep. Dudley moved that Rep. LaMott's motion be amended by the following: that the executive committee instruct the Commissioners to complete the deal for a two year period.

Rep. LaMott seconded the motion.

Commissioner Baker said that they had no committment from Lebanon and that the City Council would have to vote on it.

Rep. Duhaime said he was on the Council and felt they would support the agreement.

Rep. Brummer spoke in favor of the motion.

Rep. Sears called for a vote on Rep. Dudley's amendment and it was unanimously adopted.

Rep. Sears called for a vote on Rep. LaMott's motion as amended and it was unanimously adopted.

The expense of the Sheriff's department was discussed at some length, and it was noted that his department's budget was considerably out of line with those of other counties.

Rep. Brummer asked the Commissioners if they were going to put equipment for the Court House cafeteria in next year's budget.

Commissioner Bell said no.

Rep. Brummer asked the commissioners regarding the door to the probate vault in the new Court House and why it was in the hall where it couldn't be watched and that Barbara Fortier and Judge Jones were opposed to its location and who had authorized its change.

Commissioner Baker said the Commissioners had discussed the door problem with all concerned and that its location had been changed by the architect in his final plans in April of 1969. In July of 1971, they had received complaints from Mrs. Fortier that she couldn't see it and that it would necessitate more walking. Upon investigation it was ascertained that it would cost two to three thousand dollars to move it, and it was the commissioners' judgement it was not worth it.

Rep. Dudley said that the executive committee should publicize the radio agreement with Lebanon through the news media, emphasizing the savings to the county.

Rep. Sears set the time for the December 13th public hearing at 10:00 A. M. on the Woodsville Court House.

Rep. Brummer moved adjournment, seconded by Rep. Buckman.

GRAFTON COUNTY

Public Hearing on the nine month budget statement with special attention to the Sheriff's Department Budget and expenditures.

Monday, December 13, 1971 Woodsville Court House 1:00 P. M.

Chairman Sears opened the hearing.

Commissioner Bell read a portion of a letter from Leonard Guaraldi and expressed dissatisfaction with its critical views of the Commissioners.

Commissioner Clement read Rep. LaMott's motion made at the July 19, 1971 Delegation Meeting which removed the Commissioner's power to transfer funds.

Chairman Sears reviewed the "overages."

Rep. Brummer asked if these were nine month figures. Chairman Sears said the figures represented the amount to be raised above the department's actual Budget.

Rep. Brummer asked if the figures were up to date. Chairman Sears said for those departments that had gone over their Budget.

Commissioner Baker said he had no over-all figures, but the estimates were brought up to date.

Rep. LaMott said he desired an explanation from Sheriff Ash as to why he had stated in August that his Budget was adequate, and now he needed \$20,000 more to finish out the year, and why there was so much newspaper publicity over the issue.

Sheriff Ash said that he had not contacted the newspaper, and that his department had supplied no information, and that he was ashamed that it had become a political issue. He said that it was impossible for him to accurately determine his budget due to the unknown expense factors of the Superior Court and the demands of the small towns for his department's services. He said there would be savings if his department owned their own vehicles and had their own gas pump. He said that many cases handled by his department went to district courts, and he felt that fines from such cases should come back to the county to help defray his expenses. He said that the newspaper report on deputy Herron was inaccurate and

that Herron had left the Maine State Police with a good service record and that Herron was not fired from the Rockingham County Sheriff's department and that he was doing a good job.

Rep. Gardner said that he was on the Executive Committee and that at the meeting of November 8th he had asked the Commissioners why Sheriff Ash was not present and that they had replied that he had been asked to attend.

Sheriff Ash said he never had been asked to attend.

Rep. Brummer asked if he got a gasoline refund on the mileage vouchers.

Mrs. Smith said no.

Rep Higgins expressed concern over the sheriff's expense being $40\,\%$ over his budget.

Rep. Brummer gave a review of his study of the deputy vouchers, expressing curiosity over the five or six trips to Holderness on an arson case and why a Plymouth deputy went to Franconia to investigate when there was a full time deputy there and why the deputies were doing local police work in the small towns and why the deputies were on duty at the Canaan Fair.

Sheriff Ash said that his department was charged by statute to conduct law enforcement within the county and that many of the small towns within the county had little or no local police force and that the Holderness case was an attempted arson that required much leg work to gather proof and that in the Franconia case the deputy was not available at that time. He said he stood by his department and his men and that they were not padding the bills.

Police Chief Plant of Holderness expressed the need for and confidence in Sheriff Ash's department.

Deputy Roden spoke in favor of Ash and said the deputies should be on salary.

Rep. Altman supported the Sheriff and suggested the Chairman appoint a committee to look into the Sheriff's money saving suggestions.

Chairman Sears said it was his intention to hold public hearings in the evening in Littleton, Lebanon and Plymouth on next year's county budget.

Hubert Merrill of Littleton asked the sheriff when he became aware that he would need \$20,000 more to finish out the year.

Sheriff Ash said he was not sure, but thought it was in October.

Chairman Sears said that the letter of October 18th, signed by Commissioner Baker, which had received headlines in the "Manchester Union" had been the product of himself and the three Commissioners and anyone of them could have signed it, and that there were no political motivations and that he had told the newspaper about it, but as yet they had not printed his comments.

Hubert Merrill of Littleton expressed confidence in the sheriff's department, although he thought the 40% over run unbusiness-like.

County Attorney Papademas spoke in favor of funding the \$20,000 estimate and said the county had got its money's worth from the sheriff's department. He said he had some reservations about some of the vouchers and that the delegation in the future would have to define the areas the sheriff should concentrate in.

Kay Ward of Littleton supported the sheriff's over run and thought the legislature should give some thought to the sheriff's idea of returning fines in district courts resulting from his work to the county.

Gerald St. Cyr of Merrimack County said that Herbert Ash was the best sheriff in the state and had told him where Tenny Mountain road was.

Chairman Sears closed the public hearing.

GRAFTON COUNTY EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

Monday, December 13, 1971 Woodsville Court House 3:15 P. M.

Members present: Tilton, Buckman, Gardner, Brummer, Duhaime, Chamberlin, Dudley, Sears, La-Mott.

Chairman Sears opened the meeting.

Rep. Brummer asked for the total of the anticipated over-runs.

Chairman Sears said \$58,627.78.

Rep. Tilton asked if the Executive Committee had the power to appropriate funds or just to transfer them.

Chairman Sears said they had the power to appropriate emergency funds.

Rep. Chamberlin asked how much of the \$20,000 was Superior Court work.

Sheriff Ash said he had no breakdown.

Rep. Chamberlin asked the sheriff why he was so far off his budget.

Sheriff Ash reiterated his inability to estimate his costs and said he had been in consultation with Commissioners devising a new system which would give the county a better picture of his anticipated expenses.

Rep. Chamberlin asked how many deputies he had. Sheriff Ash said 10.

Rep. LeMott asked if the sheriff had an exact figure as to his over-run to date.

Sheriff Ash said he had the anticipated over-run for the year and the figure to date could be provided.

Rep. LaMott said he wanted it.

Rep. Dudley said she realized it was difficult for the sheriff to budget, particularly in regards to the Superior Court, but she felt he could rely on his past experience to arrive at a closer estimate.

Sheriff Ash again reiterated his problems in accurately estimating his budget, emphasizing court work and servicing the small towns which have little or no police force.

Rep. LaMott said he didn't feel the county should furnish police for the small towns as it wasn't fair to the other towns, and that he resented the newspaper report.

Sheriff Ash said he also was perturbed by the newspaper report, but that the taxpayers of the county had a right to his services guaranteed by statute.

Rep. LaMott reiterated his disapproval of the county in effect providing small towns with local police work.

Commissioner Baker gave the sheriff's deficit to date:

Rep. LaMott moved that the sum of \$16,590.95 be transferred from available funds to the sheriff's department.

Rep. Gardner seconded the motion.

Rep. Brummer read RSA 24:15 and said it was his judgement that the executive committee did not have the power to appropriate funds in excess of the county budget.

Rep. Tilton asked if this was right.

Commissioner Baker said he thought the committee had emergency power to exceed the budget.

Rep. Brummer asked the County Attorney for an interpretation of the statute.

Rep. LaMott said the newspaper had done a poor job on publicizing the Lebanon radio agreement.

Rep. Dudley said for once they had voted together.

County Attorney Papademas said it was his opinion that the present group had the power to transfer funds but no authority to raise additional funds.

Chairman Sears called for a vote on Rep. LaMott's motion and it was unanimously adopted by a voice vote.

Rep. Dudley moved that the Executive Committee authorize the Commissioners to transfer funds from accounts with a surplus to accounts with a deficit as long as they stay within the total budget.

Rep. Duhaime seconded the motion.

Rep. LaMott spoke against the motion saying the Executive Committee would be giving the Commissioners back the power they originally had, and he felt the Executive Committee should persist in exercising its power.

Rep. Brummer spoke against the motion, saying that it was the responsibility and duty of the Executive Committee to perform this function.

Rep. Tilon asked if the full convention had voted on Rep. LaMott's motion of July 26th.

Rep. Brummer said yes.

Chairman Sears called for a vote on Rep. Dudley's motion and it was unanimously defeated with Rep. Dudley abstaining.

Rep. LaMott moved that the sum of \$22,000 be transferred from available funds to the Welfare account.

Rep. Gardner seconded the motion.

The motion was unanimously adopted on a voice vote.

Rep. Brummer moved that the Executive Committee authorize the Commissioners to transfer the sum of \$5,000 from available funds to pay for other department over-runs.

Rep. LaMott seconded the motion.

The motion was unanimously adopted on a voice vote.

Rep. LaMott moved that the Executive Committee meet at 10:00 A.M. on January 17, 1972 to balance the county budget.

Rep. Gardner seconded the motion.

The motion was unanimously adopted on a voice vote.

Rep. Duhaime said that the Lebanon City Council had unanimously voted in favor of the radio agreement giving the City Manager power to negotiate with the Commissioners.

Rep. Brummer moved adjournment, seconded by Rep. Buckman.

REPORT OF GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

To the Citizens of Grafton County:

As required by Statute, the Commissioners of Grafton County submit herewith the report of the various County Officials for the year ending December 31, 1971.

1971 has been an active year with a new Executive Committee and a new member on the Board of Commissioners. The line item budget, being more detailed and informative than a cash budget, has kindled strong interest among Delegation members and constituents, as they are able to determine how appropriations are expended.

The 1971 Expenditures show a sharp increase in the Sheriff's Department and in Welfare costs. Growing overall crime rates necessitate a larger investigative body (deputies) accounting for the noticeable deficit in that particular line item of the Sheriff's Department budget. Welfare is on the increase nationwide, and County Welfare has been no exception. Even with such overexpenditures, the year ended with a sizeable cash surplus.

Surplus Food Program continues to expand. Of the 39 towns in Grafton County, 34 now carry the program, and all seem to be well satisfied with the program and the large and varied list of commodities offered.

The year has included much activity with the new court house construction, and we end the year in great anticipation of moving into the new structure very early in January of 1972.

We wish to express our appreciation to our staff of employees, the County Delegation, the various town officials, and the State Welfare Department for their continued cooperation.

Gentlemen:

On the farm this year, we instituted steer-beef and veal programs to defray the meat costs for the patients. To date it has been most successful, with savings far out-distancing initial setting-up expenses. When the budget was finally passed, we had quite a bit of maintenance painting done, and we purchased farm equipment that should prove invaluable in the future. Under the guidance of Charles Page, our Head Herdsman, and Douglas Bigelow, our farm Manager, the farm this year has shown a net profit even after expensing all equipment purchases for the year.

In our correctional facility, we have had a very busy year. Correctional guards have completed penal educational courses at Plymouth, Littleton and Colby. Through Court Orders, we have handled inmates on Work Release successfully. We have also tried to initiate A.A. and other rehabilitative programs.

At the Main House, our population increased from 40 at the end of 1970 to 59 at the end of 1971 due in part to the closing of three private nursing homes in the area. September was a red-letter month for us in three separate, though converging, areas:

- 1. Through the Emergency Employment Act, we were able to secure the services of a Certified Occupational Therapist Aide at the Home. Mrs. Apostalos works 40 hours a week and is federally funded through Manpower.
- 2. The advent of Retired Senior Volunteer Program, again Federally funded, under the direction of

Mrs. Elizabeth Gibson. Through this agency we were able to set up our library, beauty parlor and other activities — all completely staffed by volunteers.

3. The Home was chosen by WDCR, the Dartmouth College radio station, as recipient of their three month intensive drive for publicity and funds. At December 31, the amount raised solely through their efforts was \$7,555.35 for use only by the Residents of the Home for recreation and/or rehabilitation.

The spirit of the Home has become one of laughter, sunshine and personal worth as each Resident blooms with their newly added activities.

As Superintendent, I wish to thank our Staff Doctor Cyrus Eastman, M.D.; our Nursing Home Administrator, Mrs. Rita Little; and our Director of Nurses, Mrs. Evelyn Bigelow, for having run the Nursing Home section so smoothly and efficiently.

To all other personnel too numerous to name, our thanks for your dedication, cooperation and continued support.

To our volunteers (also too numerous to mention by name) our heartfelt thanks for your time and devotion to our Residents.

To the Clergy, the community, the press and you three gentlemen, our gratitude for supporting the changes that have made this such an exciting and rewarding year for us.

And who could not thank Mrs. Evelyn Smith and her staff?

25 Residents of the Home were County recipients for a total of 8,516 days at a cost to the County of \$75,536.92, or \$8.87 per day.

The busy year of 1971 found us progressing in several areas. Under the able instruction of Mrs. Evelyn Bigelow, D.N.S. and Barbara Adams, L.P.N. a Nurse's Aide class was held with nineteen aides and three orderlies attending.

Whenever possible R.N.'s and L.P.N.'s attend seminars on Nursing Care, always bringing back valuable procedures and new techniques that are practiced in our unit.

Two employees in Food Service completed a Food Supervisor's course which was sponsored by the State of N.H.

The Retired Senior Volunteer Program, directed by Elizabeth Gibson, started a Commissary Cart last fall. This cart is well stocked with items that patients may purchase for their own use or to give as gifts to their families and friends. Workers on this project are very faithful and cooperate with our policies.

Books and magazines are brought to patients from the newly equipped library in the Main House. Movies are shown each week in the O.T. room and several of the Nursing care patients are taken over to enjoy these.

One patient has participated in the O.T. program. We are now working on a program for all patients who can utilize this therapy.

Women patient's spirits and egos are lifted each month when a hair dresser does their hair.

Many churches, schools, clubs, organizations and individuals have provided entertainment and gifts, all of which have been greatly appreciated. It is indeed gratifying to know that so many people really do care about our patients.

I extend my thanks to the Commissioners, Office Staff, Clergy, Dr. Eastman, Mrs. Evelyn Bigelow, Hospital Staff and all personnel in the Home for their continued support and interest.

Herein is my third annual report of the activities of the Office of Grafton County Attorney for the year 1971. Included herein is a comparison of similar activities for the past two years, this to show the greatly increased load and time spent on activities related to the office.

The above indicates that the caseload has increased a great deal, and this arises out of more activity by law enforcement officers throughout the County.

In the upcoming year, due to the appointment of two additional Superior Court Judges, the terms of court have been extended that will require almost a full time effort by the County Attorney's Office.

Along with the above described Court activity, your County Attorney has also worked on several serious fatal fires and fatal accidents, attended many meetings, carried some civil work that involved the County or its officers and/or personnel, and has been available to assist all law enforcement agencies, medical re-

ferees, and welfare agencies.

Lastly, I am most pleased at the dedication shown by almost all law enforcement personnel, and for this, the citizens of Grafton County should be most grateful.

To the Commissioners of Grafton County:

It is my privilege to submit this report as Protestant Chaplain to the Grafton County Home.

This has been a fairly active year in the religious work amongst the residents, patients of the Hospital and Jail and House of Correction inmates. We have continued our regular informal worship services on the first and third Sundays of each month. On the "off" Sundays (second and fourth) the Groton Baptist Church has often held services. We have appreciated this for the sake of continuity, but mostly for the benefit of those who come to worship. By the resident's own admission they look forward to these times of fellowship through hymn-singing, prayers, and lessons through the Scriptures. It is a privilege to be able to worship with them.

In addition to the services, I have made myself available for pastoral counseling (of which there has been an increase in frequency, especially in the Jail and House of Correction) and have conducted visitation on a regular basis. I have also been able to show some religious films, rented through my churches, on week nights in the chapel for the residents and inmates. We have given special emphasis toward allowing the men from the Jail and House of Correction to see these films which is something new for this year. The men have shown a great deal of interest and have attended well. on a volunteer basis.

I am also pleased to see the increased activity among the residents, the chapel area brightened up and used also as an occupational therapy center.

I have continued to make some religious and inspirational literature and devotional material avail-

able for the residents. We have given, through my churches, the New Testament "Good News for Modern Man" and other books to the residents and inmates of the Jail and House of Correction who desire to receive them.

Attending the Annual Christmas parties both in the Home and the Hospital, and taking a small part in them, was enjoyable as always. We were again able to transport a good number of residents down to the North Haverhill Methodist Church for the annual Christmas Program.

I would like to express my sincere appreciation to Mr. and Mrs. Siegmund, Mrs. Little, the staff and the correctional officers for their ready cooperation and friendly assistance.

COUNTY PHYSICIAN'S REPORT

To the Commissioners of Grafton County:

Following is my report for the year 1971:

We had a very busy year. On the average our beds were over 90% occupied. This is about capacity, because we have two locked rooms for prisoners, if ill, or the severely agitated patients. We also have two Maximum Care rooms which have no windows and are infrequently used.

This year we installed a dental chair and are scheduling patients for dental care with a dentist on call and visiting here once a month.

Our Physical Therapy department is used with 2-7 patients using the facility daily.

Our employees, mostly employed here for at least a year, are improving and I feel that we have a very efficient unit.

The health of the patients in the Resident section has been very good most of the time and if ill they are removed to the hospital section for necessary nursing care.

The kitchen and dietary service has been very good.

During the year an Occupational Therapist was added to the staff and many residents and one hospital patient have utilized this service.
