TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hebron, in Grafton County, in the State of New Hampshire, you who are qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Community Hall in Hebron on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at 12 noon to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE:

- 1. To choose all Town Officers for the ensuing year by official ballot. The polls will open at 12 noon and close at 9:00 p.m., and the business meeting will commence at 7:00 p.m.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept, on behalf of the Town, gifts, legacies, and devises made to the Town in trust for any public purpose, as permitted by RSA 31:19. (Recommended by the selectmen)
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to change the capital reserve fund titled "Future Road and Bridges" to "Capital Equipment". Two-thirds majority vote required. (RSA 35:16) (Recommended by selectmen)
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize a two percent discount on property taxes if paid within thirty days of the date of the tax bill. (Recommended by the selectmen)
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to establish a capital reserve fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of creating an EMS Fund and to designate the selectmen as administrators of this fund and to authorize them to make expenditures from it, and to raise and appropriate \$1,000 to be placed in this fund. (Recommended by the selectmen)
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to establish a capital reserve fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of creating a Wetlands Mapping Fund, and to raise and appropriate \$500 to be placed in this fund. (Recommended by the selectmen)
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to establish a capital reserve fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of creating a Communications Fund, and to raise and appropriate \$3,000 to be placed in this fund. (Recommended by the selectmen)
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000 for replacement of two bay doors at the fire station.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 for office equipment and new carpet for the Town Office. (Recommended by the selectmen)

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 for an accounting program which includes installation and consultation. (Recommended by the selectmen)
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 to map and explore the use of the Rogers property. (Recommended by the selectmen)
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 for E911 mapping. (Recommended by the selectmen)
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200 for drainage installation in Hebron Village with the State of NH, The Church and Nancy Sycamore. (Recommended by the selectmen)
- 14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to accept from Stanley Jackson the road in his subdivision known as Panorama Lane as approved by the Hebron Planning Board. This acceptance is to be no earlier than in the Spring of 1995, after thawing and inspection of the road by the Selectmen and Road Agent.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to reclassify the Hebron-Alexandria Road beginning at the West Shore Road to Panorama Lane from Class VI to Class V.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,900 to upgrade from an oil penetration and seal to a $2^{1/2}$ " pug mill mix on the Hebron-Alexandria Road from West Shore Road to Panorama Lane. (Recommended by the selectmen)
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 to seal town roads. (Recommended by the selectmen)
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 to replace teeth on the York rake and a broom on the sweeper. (Recommended by the selectmen)
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 to survey and lay out a new section of Hebron Village Cemetery. (Recommended by the selectmen)
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,250 for perambulation of the Plymouth/Hebron Town Line. (Plymouth to pay an equal share.) (Recommended by the selectmen)

- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,730 for ledge removal on George Road. (Recommended by the selectmen)
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to reclassify a portion (approx. 150') of Pike Hill Road from Class VI to Class V. The road upgrade cost from a Class VI to Class V is to be paid for by Arthur Pruneau. Inspection by the Selectmen and Road Agent.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to reclassify a portion of Pike Hill Road from a Class V to a Class V Summer Cottage Road pursuant to RSA 231:79. This portion is defined as starting from intersection of Pike Hill and property tax map 2-18 and 2-19 to the point as determined by Article 22 above.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray charges for the ensuing year.
- 25. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting. Given under our hands and seals this 20th day of February 1995.

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HEBRON POLICE DEPARTMENT Annual Report for 1994

The good news for the past year was that criminal activity has been down for the second year in a row. The Police Department received over 489 registered calls through the Grafton County Radio Dispatching Service in addition to over 75 calls to individual officers' homes and business places.

Domestic and Juvenile problems were still one of the major categories consuming department man hours this past year. Burglaries and thefts were still in the single numbers while motor vehicle complaints required selective as well as radar enforcement measures. Most of the automobile accidents involved vehicles striking deer and moose along Route 3A and personal injuries were minimal.

The members of the Hebron Police Department and I would like to thank the citizens of Hebron for their support and continuous help in making the department's goal a little easier, so we can keep Hebron a better and safer place to live.

HEBRON FIRE DEPARTMENT Annual Report for 1994

During 1994 the Hebron Fire Department responded to a total of 87 calls. This compares with 111 calls in 1993, 107 calls in 1992, and 111 calls in 1991.

The breakdown of the 87 calls is as follows: 44 medical emergencies (7 were transported in our own ambulance which went into service on November 6, 1994), 2 structure fires, 1 rekindle, 6 chimney fires, 7 power lines down, 1 LP gas leak, 1 dryer fire, 4 alarm activations, 1 unintentional false, 1 good intent call, 1 fire investigation, 2 searches for lost persons, 2 service calls, and 13 requests for mutual aid.

These 87 calls resulted in a total of 529 hours of work. This does not count the hundreds of additional hours put in each year by the members of the department for training, maintenance, inspections, preplanning, attending meetings and administration. I am grateful for the level of dedication that is shown by those of our citizenry who have joined the ranks of this department.

Nineteen ninety-four saw the Hebron Fire Department move from having a F.A.S.T. Squad to providing full ambulance service to the community. This was accomplished through an overwhelmingly successful fundraising campaign that exceeded our goal of \$17,000. This enabled the department to purchase an excellent used ambulance from Waterville Valley and some additional equipment. The vehicle was completely gone through for mechanical integrity and easily passed the state inspection by the Bureau of Emergency Medical Services and licensed for transport. The department began providing ambulance service to the Town of Hebron on November 6, 1994 at 12:01 a.m. From November 6 to December 31 we transported 7 patients to Speare Memorial Hospital in Plymouth.

I wish to thank Tom Jones who developed our fund-raising campaign and Bill Robertie who worked with me coordinating the effort. Also, I want to thank the members of the department who worked for several nights to put the mailing together.

Finally, let me thank the community for the support it has shown. Without such a high level of support our task would be much more difficult.

TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER REPORT

In calendar year 1994, our three (3) leading causes of fires were No Permit, Children, and Rekindles of fires where the fire was not properly extinguished.

Violations of RSA 224:27 II, the fire permit law, and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Fire Officials, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required. This also helps to prevent unnecessary response to a controlled burn.

LAKES REGION PLANNING COMMISSION 1994 ANNUAL REPORT

The Lakes Region Planning Commission is a voluntary association of local communities designated by area towns as the organization that brings towns and cities within the Region together. By associating and pooling resources, local governments have a highly trained professional staff available to them for a wide variety of services. Areas of current expertise include land use and transportation planning, master planning, environmental planning, capital improvement programming, economic and community development, housing, fiscal and environmental impact analysis, geographic information systems and computerized cartography, household hazardous waste collections and site plan review. Communities may also obtain the services of a professional planner on a regular basis through our circuit rider program or on a fee basis. The Commission also provides a framework to protect and further the interests of our communities with the state and federal government.

Your support helps the LRPC maintain a comprehensive regional planning effort and enables the Commission to perform various projects and activities for regional benefit. Over the past year the LRPC:

- . Provided consultation and assistance to thirty-one member communities.
- Met repeatedly with federal and state officials and agency representatives to influence policy and help keep the Region an active participant in many ongoing programs.
- Contracted and coordinated the 11th, and largest, regional household hazardous waste program in the Lakes Region serving over twenty municipalities in a one day super collection.
- Sponsored fall and spring sessions of the N.H. Law Lecture Series.
- Served as a Board Member of the Belknap County Economic Development Council, a county-wide initiative for economic betterment.
- Initiated work on an innovative study of the Route 16 corridor from the seacoast to Errol, NH, in coordination with the N.H. Dept. of Transportation and three other regional planning commissions.
- Completed a draft update of the regional housing needs assessment in the Lakes Region as mandated by state statute for local housing plans.
- Initiated work on an agreement through the Scenic Byways program
 which will enable us to computerize and display historic sites using GIS
 and scanning technology for the benefit of the Lakes Region Heritage
 Tourism Roundtable.
- Completed the Manual of Model Ordinances: a comprehensive report on best management practices containing model ordinances for shoreland protection, subsurface disposal systems, erosion and sedimentation control and wetlands protection. The report was prepared with

- support from many people including the N.H. Department of Environmental Services, Belknap and Carroll County Conservation Districts and the North Country Resource Conservation and Development Area, Inc.
- Submitted another application to the N.H. Department of Environmental Services to continue implementation efforts identified in Phase I of the Lake Winnipesaukee Watershed Project.
- Completed a major update of the Overall Economic Development Program (OEDP) which enables members to apply for economic development funding assistance from the U.S. Economic Development Administration.
- Participated in other regionally significant economic development efforts including membership on the Newfound Economic Development Council's Mitigation Fund Advisory Committee, Legislative Conference Center Committee, Governor's State Park Advisory Committee, Ossipee Valley Chamber of Commerce EDA proposal and the Franklin Economic Development and Revitalization Committee.
- Reorganized the regional transportation advisory committee to a technical advisory committee for the purpose of improving regional representation and identifying projects for inclusion in the update of transportation plans and programs.
- Initiated a region-wide land use and transportation inventory to support Department of Transportation efforts leading to the development of a statewide transportation model.
- Continued to be a planning information resource center for all municipalities, including the maintenance of an affiliate state data center of U.S. Census information.
- Continued to administer and participate in a number of master plan updates throughout the Region including, but not necessarily limited to Holderness, Sanbornton and Tamworth.
- Prepared a comprehensive soils capability analysis of the Newfound River Watershed identifying areas with high to low development capability in cooperation with the Natural Resource Conservation Service and the N.H. Department of Environmental Services.

PEMI-BAKER HOME HEALTH AGENCY

Agency in Review – Home health care allows individuals to receive care and treatment for both acute and chronic illnesses and disabilities in their homes, generating benefits in quality of life for clients and their caregivers, and in health care cost containment. In the home care business since 1967, and at 79 Highland Street for better than a year and a half, we anticipate another move in 1995. The Whole Village Family Resource Center will house 12 human service agencies from this area and the Pemi-Baker Agency will be one of those agencies. As we continue to grow and expand our services, we are continually faced with housing our increasing staff. Since our move from downtown Plymouth in 1981, we have gone from 11 employees to 43 and our visits to member towns increased 18% from last year for a total of 23,391.

In 1994 – (1.) Mad River Health Center joined our Well Child program which provides scheduled well child visits to children with no health insurance. We welcome their interest and participation in this very important service. Many thanks also to Barbara Laverack and Jane Clay for providing free dental screenings. (2.) This agency continues to provide HOSPICE care to terminally ill patients and their families by providing both medical and emotional support through a team of professionals, volunteers and clergy. The HOSPICE team works closely with the patient's physician to maintain the highest quality of life possible during the patient's final days. The Pemi-Baker Agency continues to work towards Medicare Hospice certification and should be officially certified in early 1995. (3.) Teaming up with Community Health & Hospice in Laconia, the Pemi-Baker Agency will be providing the Family First program in the Plymouth area. These visits are offered to families of newborns who would like to know more about health, development and community resources. Ongoing monitoring of development through screenings is available to families. Specializing in pediatric nursing, Angela Bascom was hired in the spring and works exclusively with our children's services. (4.) We continue to work diligently towards Joint Commission Accreditation - whose standards help support ongoing performance improvement efforts across the home care organization. This agency looks forward to adhering to the principles that standards of care should emphasize actual performance and should address what counts: the care provided to the patient and the management of the organization.

In 1994 our agency made 1,683 visits to the Town of Hebron which represents an 85% increase from 1993. Please feel free to contact me or the Pemi-Baker Home Health Agency about home care services available to you.

The Pemi-Baker Home Health Agency thanks the entire community for its continued support of our nonprofit agency and its belief that we provide quality home care services to the Towns we serve. We also thank our volunteer Board of Directors, volunteers in our programs and those community members who show their appreciation to our agency through general and memorial donations.

REPORT TO DISTRICT ONE CITIZENS

As your Executive Councilor for this Town and area, it is a privilege to communicate with you in this District of 98 Towns and 4 Cities. The Executive Council is five in number and acts much like a board of directors at the very top of your executive branch of your state government. Our authority extends to the approval of contracts with out of state government organizations, municipalities, individuals and businesses. The judges in the judicial branch of your government all receive their appointments by nomination by the Governor and confirmation by the Executive Council.

All Community Development Block Grants receive final approval by the Governor and Council. The Governor and Council also act as the final approval on all Business Finance Authority loans. Major docks and mooring fields in state waters also must receive Governor and Council approval. There are dozens of Boards and Commissions established by law that require Governor and Council approval. There are 266 Commissioners and Directors of the various departments that require nomination by the Governor and confirmation by the Council.

As we look forward toward 1995, citizens and local officials will be asked to bring forth recommendations for the 10-year highway plan for New Hampshire. Public hearings must be held in each of the five council districts. I plan to hold at least five in this large northern district and will be asking the regional planning commissions to assist in this process.

Other items to be on the lookout for would be getting applications for some three million dollars' worth of transportation enhancement projects. Much of this money is already obligated ahead (your local regional planning commission can be of help in this area). We in this district should be most aggressive in applying for some of the 8 million dollars of Community Development Block Grant money through the Office of State Planning (tel. 271-2155), and your local tourist promotion or chamber of commerce should be dreaming of ways to apply for some of the \$600,000 in matching grant money for area promotion (tel. 271-2411 for more information).

Citizens, local officials and local businesses should also be aware of the vast number of people in your state government who are available and willing to provide technical assistance and information for local and regional concerns simply by calling or writing my office.

New Hampshire State Government is small enough and efficient enough to provide friendly, courteous and timely service to those who seek information, assistance and relief if such is a part of New Hampshire State law and budget.

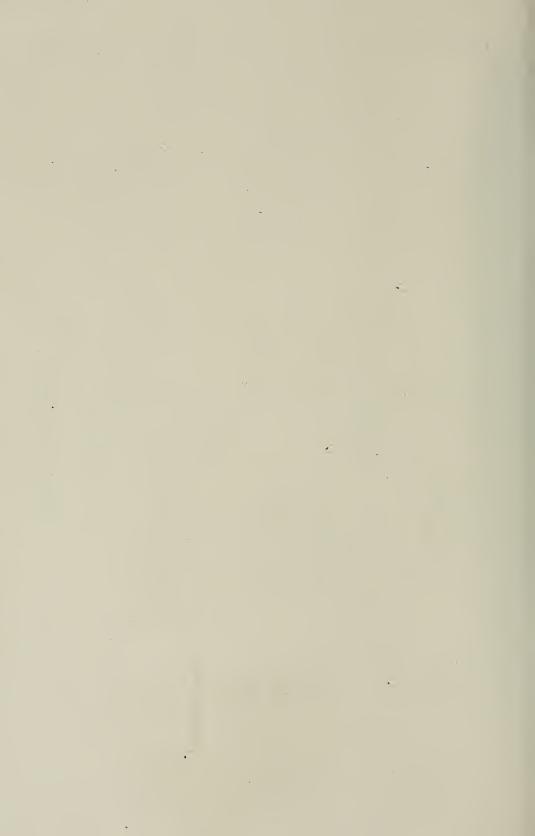
