

Attendance at all council meetings was practically 100%; the prevailing spirit of friendly cooperation resulted in many accomplishments.

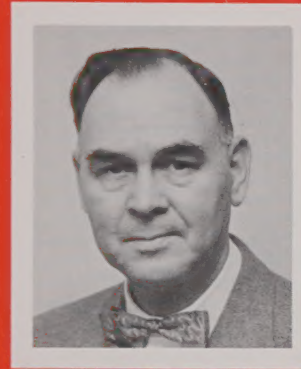
Regular council meetings are held on the last Monday of each month—7:30 p.m. at City Hall. Everyone is welcome to attend.

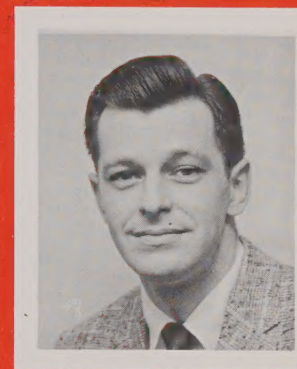

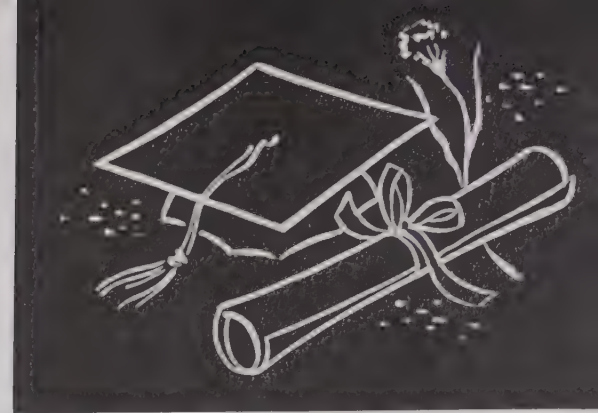

BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS

AN EXTREMELY ACTIVE AND BUSY YEAR FOR THE STREET DEPARTMENT — THE FOLLOWING PROJECTS WERE INCLUDED IN ITS REPORT:

Repairs made to Messer Street Bridge.

Completion of large portion of Main Street sewer project, including pumping station on Lawrence Court.

Following streets resurfaced: Union Avenue from Church Street to Main Street; Fair Street from Court to Academy Street; Pine Street from Main Street to Merrimack Street; Highland Street from Pine Street to Gilford Avenue; Winter Street from Highland Street to Union Avenue; Messer Street from Union Avenue to Messer Street bridge.

Sidewalks completed on Province and Rowell Streets.

Lakeside Avenue at Weirs Beach widened, a concrete bumper wall built, and 120 parking meters installed.

Surface water drains installed in Jackson Street to Opechee Park; in Olive Place and Holman Street extension; from Downing Street to end of street as laid out.

Junction of Pine and Highland Streets widened; granite curb installed.

Granite curbs installed on Pine and Highland Streets.

1600 elm trees sprayed, preventing spread of Dutch Elm disease.

Construction of Beacon Street and Rowe Court parking lots.

Installation of two-way radios in Public Works Department cars.

PLANNING BOARD

The primary duty of the Planning Board is to prepare long range plans for the improvement and betterment of the city, to make studies of any proposals that are presented to the Mayor and Council, and to advise on various projects and undertakings.

Of the many and varied projects and problems of major importance this past year, the following are of greatest general interest:

Participation by the City of Laconia in a Federal Urban Assistance Program which includes a Land Use study, Traffic Circulation plan, Aerial Photographic survey, Industrial Site survey, and a study of present and future sewer and water systems.

A complete review of Traffic Rules and Regulations, resulting in a number of changes and improvements to be included in the Revised Ordinances of 1957.

An extensive study and recommendation for a by-pass for Laconia on a carefully selected route to be presented to the State Highway authorities for approval and action.

Study and recommendation for the purchase of the Boston & Maine Railroad property at Veterans Square and Lakeport for street protection and possible use of present station at Veterans Square as a new City Hall.

Very close cooperation with the Chamber of Commerce Industrial, Transportation and Civic Committees on subjects affecting the betterment and future growth of the city.

There were 11 meetings held. The Planning Director also attended many council meetings, various public hearings and statewide meetings.

CIVIL DEFENSE

There were 30 observers on duty at the Ground Observer Corps tower on Taylor Street, averaging 90 hours per week.

In one period of 110 days, there were 1,829 planes reported to the filter center in Manchester.

The GOC in Laconia is the *only* post in New Hampshire or Maine which prints its own bulletin.

Alerts have found Laconia well prepared and public response good.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

It is the duty of this board to make decisions on petitions presented by persons wishing to construct, alter or use property in areas where such use is contrary to the zoning ordinances.

There were 11 meetings held—13 petitions acted upon—11 granted, 2 denied.

Signs of Progress on Main Street

Through a stipulation in the will of Martha A. Prescott, funds in the amount of nearly \$50,000 were made available for the construction of a new addition to the Gale Memorial Library. The Gale Trust Fund will provide enough money each year to pay nearly all principal and interest costs. Work started on this project October 9, 1956.



On March 15, 1957 the first books were loaned from the new bookmobile, acquired through the funds supplied by the Perkins Estate. The total cost of \$10,000 will be paid over a six-year period.

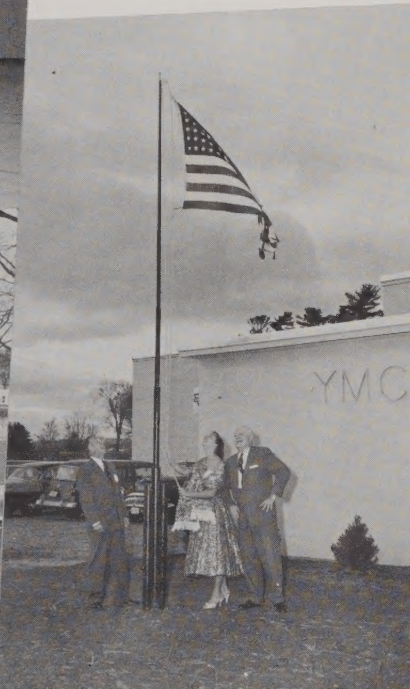
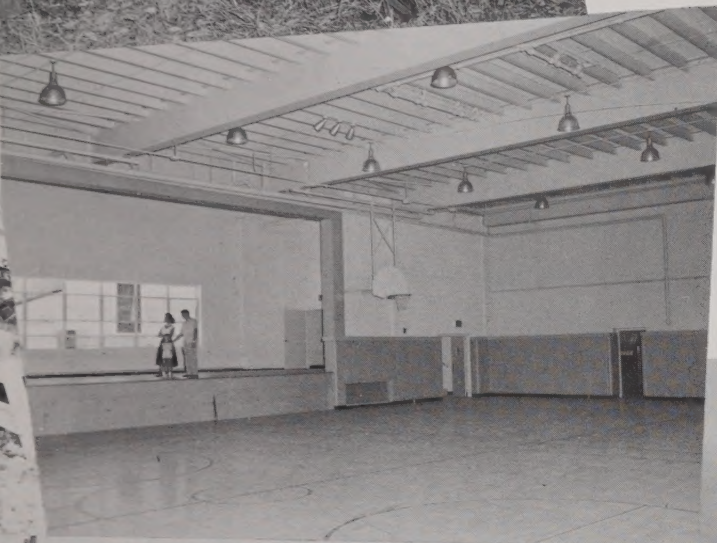
