

TOWN WARRANT The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Loudon in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs: (L.S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Loudon on Tuesday, the 5th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Polls will open at 9:00 A.M. and close not earlier than 7:00 P.M.

- 3. To see if the Town will vote to allow 2% discount on all property taxes paid within thirty days after presentation of tax bill.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums of money not to exceed in the aggregate more than 75% of the anticipated amount to be collected in taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town of Loudon negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be paid in 1974 from taxes collected during the current municipal year.

- 5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the Highway Capital Reserve Fund.
- 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$357.00 for the Concord Hospital to help defray their estimated deficit for the year of 1974.
- 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund as set up in the 1963 Town Meeting.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the regional planning commission, now organized and named the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. This Commission has membership of more than ten municipalities and has jurisdiction over the planning region delineated by the Office of State Planning. The objective of the Commission is to plan for and encourage regional planning analysis, provide consensus of major problems of regional concern and to assist in the effectuation of projects within, and which extend beyond, the boundaries of a particular town.

The Commission has only the authority conferred on it by Chapter 36:45-53, Revised Statutes Annotated 1955, and is advisory to local governments in the Region. Members of the Commission shall be appointed by the Selectmen in accordance with State Law. Two representatives will be appointed from Loudon, N. H.

9. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,206.00 as the Town's share for the studies and operation of the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. These funds will be used for financing the staff, operation expenses, planning studies, technical assistance and other programs of the Commission. These funds may be used in conjunction with other State and Federal funds available for planning purposes.

- 10. By Request: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the Loudon Conservation Commission, to be used for the purpose of acquiring land for conservation purposes. Any money not spent may be held for future acquisition.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$430.00 to maintain and continue the delivery system of services to the poor through the Concord Center of the Belknap-Merrimack Community Action Program Inc.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of \$500.00 to be used to erect basketball poles, backboards and nets located on the Loudon School grounds for citizen use.
- 13. To see if the Town will transfer the special account of money received for the sale of the old fire truck to the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund.
- 14. By Request: To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to sell to Davis Forrest Industries for \$3,000.00, the towns undivided half interest in the 20 acre Taylor lot. The other undivided half interest being purchased by Davis Forrest Industries for \$3,000.00. The property is landlocked, and abutts Wage Corporation on the north, Soucook River on the east, Concord Lumber Co. on the south, and Royal Page and Davis Forrest Industries on the west.
- 15. To see how the Town wishes to dispose of the balance of money left from the Bicentennial Committee.
- 16. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to use Capital Revenue Funds to buy a new diesel truck with body to replace existing 1970 gas truck with body (estimated cost to be \$17,500.00).

17. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund and transfer to the following accounts as listed \$14,718.20.

OFFICE OF SELECTMEN

Nineteen Hundred Seventy-Three was our Bicentennial year and our Bicentennial Committee deserves a well done and many thanks for the outstanding job they did. For many it meant renewing memories with old friends from past years and for others meeting new people and making new friends for years to come.

Our Fire Department has made many improvements and the guarantee of response when help is needed is even more assured then ever. We thank you.

I believe our Police Department has to be commended for its fine work and many hours. Many of us forget it is not a full time Department. Their income more than offsets their cost this year even after buying a new Cruiser (by the way, no help from the Crime Commission, we paid for the whole car).

Our Highway Department has been plagued by many breakdowns this past year. Much of our equipment is in need of replacement. An orderly method of replacement should be adopted by raising a predetermined amount to be deposited in Capital Reserve Fund so as replacement will not create ups and downs in taxes. The depreciation per year should be raised and adjusted by current replacement cost each year.

We face many problems in the coming year such as approximately a 30% increase in our school Budget for our Town which will be reflected directly in our Tax Bills. We feel we will have to take a long hard look at land values.

The time for a non-burning Dump is fast approaching and we feel many problems may arise in this area.

The demand for a Tax Map and keeping it up to date is getting more important every day.

Our planning board and several interested Citizens have spent a lot of time trying to come up with some kind of zoning package. Your suggestions as how they can write up this package will be appreciated and helpful. There will be a special Town Meeting later on this year to handle this.

On April 4, 1:30 P.M. at the Loudon Town Hall, there will be a Second hearing on the new proposed Loudon By Pass. We hope everyone will be able to be present.

REPORT OF HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

The Highway Department report for 1973 is as follows:

Town road Aid (T.R.A.) project was the necessary trimming, and cutting, drainage and excavation with gravel was completed from Cate residence to Carter Hill on the Ridge Road. It also was tarred.

1974, hopefully, will see the remaining section completed from Route I-29 to Cate residence.

The Duncan Fund account was utilized on the Old Shaker Road, from the Canterbury end to the bridge. This involved cutting the right of way, necessary drainage, and graveling. 1974, hopefully, will see the paving of this part of Old Shaker Road.

There were numerous culverts put in this year.

We had a 1000 yards of gravel made into bank crush run that was put on dirt roads for grading.

We cut numerous banks on Page Road, Youngs Hill Road, Bee Hole Road, and Capation French Road.

Approximately a 100 yards of cold patch was put out on the tarred roads.

About \$3,000 worth of tar was used on the Ridge Road.

We cut a good section of the trees and brush on the half mile extention of the Bee Hole Road. In 1974 we plan to complete this extention.

This was a bad winter for salt, approximately 150 tons were used during the ice storms.

I regret that during one of these ice storms the oldest member of our crew, ARCHIE PAGE, was accidently killed while doing his job. As a friend and co-worker for many years, he is very much missed. At this time I would like to call to your ATTENTION that experienced help is hard to obtain at the present salary paid per hr. with only straight time.

Therefore, I respectfully request that the taxpayers of the Town Loudon consider raising the salary level.

At present, the road crew consists of only two men, Oliver Green and myself.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

1973

Your Fire Department has advanced more this past year. We are in full operation with the Concord Dispatch System — all Fire emergency calls go through them — 225-3355. This is 24 hour coverage on reporting emergencies. We have twelve tone alert monitors in the homes of firemen and hope to add some more this year.

Also, in updating and planning for better coverages, we have formed an overlapping system with the Lakes Region Mutual Aid in the Ridge and Upper City areas. Two companies from Lakes Region Mutual Aid will run first call with us on "structual fires." This will give these out-lying areas far better coverage than they ever had. All this new Fire Emergency Coverage is interlocked in the new radio alert network.

I might add, anyone who is interested in looking over this new dispatch system in Concord, please feel free to make arrangements with your Chief or Deputy Chief Andrew Downes.

We have enjoyed the interest of several young men joining the Fire Department. We are very proud of them, as you all should be. They have joined with us in more schooling and the work we enjoy in the Fire Service. On many occasions, these young men have picked up the slack spots and made things work more smoothly.

As the growth of Loudon climbs, so do our fire calls. We feel we have kept up with them in keeping losses at at a minimum. Your calls, as soon as possible, — no matter how small, can help us help you with any emergency before it gets out of control. PLEASE REMEMBER the telephone number is 225-3355.

Don't wait for the fire to strike before you check your home for fire hazards.

Are attic, basement, closets and garage FREE OF RUB-BISH?

Are furnaces and stoves in good working order and placed well away from combustible walls and ceilings?

Are worn electric cords and defective appliances repaired promptly?

Are flammable liquids safely stored?

Plan in advance for fire emergencies. Don't give fire a place to start.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

The New Hampshire Forest Fire Service is represented in every town, city or unorganized place in our state by the forest fire warden. Anyone wishing to kindle an outside fire when the ground is not covered with snow must first obtain the written permission of the fire warden. Except for cooking fires, no fire can be kindled between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. unless it is a commercial or industrial burn or it is raining. The fire warden is assisted in his work by the District Forest Fire Chief who works for the Department of Resources and Economic Development Forest Fire Service.

Fire prevention was, again this year, the most important part of the Forest Fire Warden's job. Fire statistics show the need with 72% of the fires caused by smoking, debris burning and children. Smokey the Bear is an important prevention tool but he still needs much help from the public. Parents should warn their children of the hazards of playing with matches. Children tend to forget that a lighted match held in their hand is a potential forest fire

The Police Department would like once again to thank the people of our town for the added interest and excellent cooperation we have been given.

On different occasions, it has been learned that the summonsing of an ambulance has been hindered due to lack of information given. Hurds Ambulance Emergency number is 224-5591. When the Police Department is needed be advised that valuable time can be saved by calling the Loudon Police Department directly 783-4476. If no answer then the State Police in Concord will usually cover the emergency. In each case, be sure to give your name and exact location.

Last year there were 503 court cases in the Loudon Municipal Court and \$9,400.00 in court fine that the town received.

The purchasing of a new Police cruiser has added to our goal of efficiency in serving our community. In it are proper radio communications in which we have contact with Concord Police, Merrimack Sheriff Department, and the N. H. State Police as well as our own radios. The Loudon Police Association also purchased a siren and a wailer. The cruiser has proven to be more efficient in emergency conditions as well as traffic patrol.

Once again, I would like to stress the importance of giving your name, nature of your call and exact location when calling the police department so our dispatcher may give you the prompt and efficient service you deserve.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

Since our last annual report, the conservation commission has become involved in many varied projects as a result of its dozen official meetings.

First of these was to successfully sponsor an article on the 1973 warrant to have Currier Road designated scenic under N. H. Statute, thereby protecting its natural beauty. Later in the year, Loudon's Scout Troop 247 held a cleanup of Currier Road at the recommendation of the conservation commission. Three truckloads of debris were removed by the boys.

A \$750.00 Ford Foundation grant was awarded to the commission in mid-summer, to be used for a study of agriculture as a way of life in our community. As many of you know, we have already commenced the project with a survey of Loudon farms. A report of our findings, complete with maps, charts, illustrations, and conclusions is to be published, hopefully to be available by the coming summer.

Commission funds were made available to send an eligible Loudon child to Spruce Pond Conservation Camp for a week, but no one came forward to apply.

Questions concerning the environmental impact of a proposed Route 106 bypass were answered for the commission in a special meeting with representatives from the State Highway Commission.

Booklets on emergency home heating were provided for the townspeople, and may still be obtained free of charge at the selectmen's office.

Two new members were seated on the conservation commission; Raymond Cummings and Raymie Rattee.

One member whose term expired, Bob Hibbard, went off the commission after having served as its first Chairman.

Finally, your commission assisted the Planning Board in the preparation of a proposed zoning ordinance for Loudon. We feel that the town should grow, yet in an orderly fashion that would preserve its rural and agricultural character. For this reason, the Loudon Conservation Commission has voted to officially support the zoning proposal.

The Loudon Planning Board dedicated itself in 1973 to widely publicizing and fairly administering the town's subdivision regulations. The Board evaluated ten times the number of subdivision requests considered in 1972, ranging in scope from one lot subdivision to complex residential developments. These regulations have been effective in controlling the direction of Loudon's growth.

A great deal of the board's time has been spent considering the need for further regulation. A zoning ordinance proposal has been prepared and is currently under discussion by the town's voters. The board believes the town is in an era of explosive population growth and feels it is essential that the people of Loudon decide how the town will develop.

REPORT OF THE REGIONAL REFUSE DISPOSAL PLANNING COMMITTEE

The Refuse Disposal Planning Committee representatives appointed by the Town Moderator in 1972 joined with eleven other communities to form the Capital Regional Refuse Disposal Planning Board. The Board action in May was taken under N. H. RSA 53-B:3. The cooperating communities are Allenstown, Bow, Canterbury, Concord, Dunbarton, Epsom, Henniker, Hopkinton, Loudon, Pembroke, Salisbury, and Warner.

In June, the Central N. H. Regional Planning Commission received a \$40,000 Federal grant to plan a refuse disposal system to meet the needs of the cooperating communities according to New Hampshire law. The Refuse Planning Board works with the Regional Commission as the refuse planning operation. The 30 cents per capita solid waste assessment in 1973 was a condition of the Federal contract for all communities in the Disposal Planning Board. These funds are held in escrow to be used to further the disposal planning program with acquisition and site work as necessary. No further solid waste assessment is requested in 1974.

To date, seven sites have been investigated under the engineering contract with the Anderson-Nichols Company to determine the capability of the sites to accept solid waste in landfill operations as required. In 1974, under the 24-month contract, the detailed engineering, operations requirements, costs, financial and legal data will be developed to be presented to member communities for final action in 1975.






