### **ELEANORE DANE EVANS**

Born in Nashua, N.H. April 12, 1916 Died - September 15, 1985

Eleanore Evans came to Madbury in 1946. She was the owner and operator of Edgevan Dairy Farm from 1947 to 1977 which was initially located on the property now occupied by the Skaltsis family on Evans Road.

During these years, she served the town as a Supervisor of the Checklist and as a member of the Planning Board in 1966 and 1967. She was a charter member of the Madbury Community Club and of the Madbury Historical Society. She served on the Board of Directors of the Historical Society, as well as that of the Oyster River Visiting Nurses, and of the Pudding Hill Thrift Shop.

The Thrift Shop occupied a large place in her life from the mid-1970s until her death. She (and the other directors) used the proceeds from this non-profit enterprise to help the Madbury Fire Department, and to enhance the quality of life for some Madbury residents who needed a little support from time to time.

Eleanore was a native of Nashua, a 1937 graduate of the University of New Hampshire with a B.A. in History. She was a member of the Chi Omega Sorority and the Daughters of the American Revolution.

### RECORD OF TOWN MEETING March 12, 1985

To the inhabitants of the Town of Madbury, County of Strafford, and the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Madbury on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, A.D., 1985, at 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon for the purpose of voting on Articles 1 through 3 and at 7:30 o'clock in the evening for action on Articles 4 through 19. The polls which open at 1:00 P.M. for the purpose of voting on Articles 1 through 3 will close at 9:00 P.M. unless extended by vote of the meeting.

The annual Town Meeting of Madbury was called to order promptly at 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon by Moderator Robert E. Houston, Jr. The warrant was read and certified to posting. The polls were declared open. The following ballot clerks were sworn in by the Moderator:

Moderator Houston called for a moment of silence at the beginning of the evening meeting to remember all those deceased and listed in the Vital Statistics section of the Town Report.

ARTICLE 1. To choose the following Town Officers. Sample ballot with totals follow on Supplement #1.

Selectman for the ensuing three years, Joseph B. Moriarty Treasurer for the ensuing year, John W. Printy

Two Auditors for the ensuing year, Barbara G. Houston and Sheila M. Libby Trustee of Trust Funds for the ensuing three years, Georgia G. Drew

- ARTICLE 2. Voted to adopt all three amendments to the Zoning Ordinances as proposed by the Planning Board. Sample ballot with total votes and complete amendments follow on Supplements #1 and #2. CARRIED
- ARTICLE 3. Voted to adopt TITLE LXIV, "Planning and Zoning," Chapters 672 through 677. These Chapters are new Legislation and amendments enacted by the General Court through July 1983. They are a re-codification of the laws relating to the performance of planning and land use regulation by municipalities in New Hampshire.

  CARRIED
- ARTICLE 4. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to choose and appoint all other Town Officers. CARRIED
- ARTICLE 5. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow monies in anticipation of taxes.

  CARRIED
- ARTICLE 6. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,350.00 for the purchase and installation of new energy efficient street lights and further authorized the Selectmen to dispose of the existing fixtures.

Selectman Moriarty explained that Public Service would replace all eight of the Town's existing street lights with newer more energy efficient ones. No new lights

would be added. Selectmen expect great savings on the electricity used in the future by these street lights.

ARTICLE 7. Voted to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund for use as setoffs against budgeted appropriations for the following purposes and in the amounts indicated herewith:

Appropriation
Road Maintenance

Amount \$4,000.00

Selectman Evans explained that they intend to do a lot of pot hole repairing this year and would like to use these Revenue Sharing Funds totally for road maintenance budget setoffs.

CARRIED

ARTICLE 8. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the Madbury Conservation Fund.

Conservation Commission Chairman Craig R. Seaver spoke in favor of the article and reported that there is presently about \$4,000.00 in this Fund.

CARRIED

- ARTICLE 9. Voted to retain the unexpended portion of the 1985 Conservation Commission appropriation, said monies to be placed in the Madbury Conservation Fund.

  CARRIED
- ARTICLE 10. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the purchase of new fire equipment.

Fire Chief Kenneth Wolcott explained that "new equipment" referred to items that the Volunteer Fire Department men NEED, not pieces of large equipment or vehicles.

CARRIED

ARTICLE 11. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for a well and septic system for the fire station and further to authorize the Selectmen to enter into the necessary contracts and agreements to implement this purpose.

Fire Captain Bob Hodgson spoke in favor of this article and answered many questions pertaining to it. When asked if three-thousand dollars was enough for a well and septic system, he replied the Madbury Fire Department would make it do! Board Chairman Jay Moriarty said that the Board of Selectmen supported this article.

CARRIED

ARTICLE 12. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for an Oxygen System and medical equipment for the Fire Department FAST Squad.

Dave Raynes explained that they need the \$500.00 to purchase a very special piece of equipment. That amount is more than the FAST Squad could expect to raise by their normal means—garage sales, raffles, etc. Lori Chase said that all members of the FAST Squad are already trained to use this Oxygen System.

CARRIED

ARTICLE 13. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the Fire Apparatus Capital Reserve Fund.

Woody Fraser made the motion and Peg Irish seconded it, to pass the article. However, Selectman Moriarty moved and Selectman Evans seconded to table the first motion in view of the substantial increase in Madbury's portion of the Oyster River School District's 1985-86 budget and the 18+% increase in the Strafford County 1985-86 budget plus many necessary increases in the Town budget. A hand vote to table the Article was counted.

YES - 47 NO - 47 NOT CARRIED

Moderator Bob Houston then called back the original motion to pass Article 13. Discussion centered around the need to continue to add to this Capital Reserve Fund now even though it may mean an increase in property taxes.

ARTICLE 14. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the purpose of purchasing a fire hydrant and installing same on the Portsmouth pipeline and further authorized the Selectmen to enter into any necessary agreements and contracts with the City of Portsmouth and as may be required by the Public Utilities Commission.

Fire Chief Wolcott strongly urged passing this article. Selectman Moriarty spoke to support the article as well. He pointed out that the Town has put this off for twenty years and the cost involved is increasing all the time. Specifically, a hydrant on Evans Road was urged by the Fire Department. The City of Portsmouth is receptive to the idea if Madbury accepts all costs and responsibilities.

ARTICLE 15. Voted to approve and accept the amended budget of \$176,941.00 for the current year.

The proposed budget of \$165,791.00 was amended by \$50.00 with passage of Article 6—new street lights; by \$2,500.00 with passage of Article 10—new fire equipment; by \$3,000.00 with passage of Article 11—Fire Department well and septic system; by \$500.00 with passage of Article 12—FAST Squad equipment; by \$2,500.00 with passage of Article 14—fire hydrant; by \$2,500.00 with passage of Article 13—Fire Apparatus Capital Reserve Fund; and by \$100.00 by passage of article 13—Fire Apparatus Capital Reserve Fund; and by \$100.00 by passage of the budget by \$100.00 to reinstate the Conservation Commission's budget." CARRIED

- ARTICLE 16. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal or state grants, which may become available during the course of the year, and also accept and expend money from any other government unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money, provided, (1) that such grants and other monies do not require the expenditure of other town funds, (2) that a public hearing shall be held by the Selectmen prior to the receipt and expenditure of such grants and monies, and (3) that such items shall be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32 relative to limitation and expenditure of town monies, all as provided by RSA 31:95-B.
- ARTICLE 17. Voted to terminate the existence of the Capital Reserve Funds—
  (a) Establishment of a System of Waste Disposal, and (b) Town Hall Expansion as both funds have fulfilled their purposes.

Selectman Sylvia Grimes explained that the Department of Revenue Administration recommends voting at town meeting to do away with Capital Reserve Funds with 0 funds. CARRIED

- ARTICLE 18. There were no Committees to report to the town meeting this year.
- ARTICLE 19. A. Selectman Grimes called voters' attention to the town's representative to the Oyster River School District School Board, Barbara G. Houston. Mrs. Grimes said, "Barbara Houston has been Madbury's representative to the School Board for over 17 years. I think it's very appropriate to recognize a lady who has spent so much time on our behalf." Mrs. Houston, who chose this year not to run again for school board, having served exactly 17 years and 4 months, received a round of applause and a standing ovation from all those present at the meeting.
  - B. N.H. Representative and Madbury resident Beverley B. Bryant introduced William Morong of Madbury Beach who offered a resolution: "RESOLVED: That the

citizens of the Town of Madbury request that public input be made before final determination is made of the route for the proposed I-393 to Spaulding Turnpike Highway. – March 12, 1985" Mr. Morong enumerated many adverse conditions relating to the eastern end of Alternate #1 of this proposed new road. He outlined in detail the financial, social, and economic impact of the proposal, having drawn his data from the Wilbur Smith feasibility study recently released. The consensus of the meeting supported Morong's contention that further study and input and discussion among the residents of the towns involved must take place. Mr. Morong announced that he had a petition for anyone to sign after the meeting.

An animated discussion followed. Robert Bruce of Evans Road said he opposes Alternate #2 since it would go right through his road and possibly yard! C. Jeanne Shaheen of Perkins Road said maybe we should send a strong message to Concord—that we don't want this road at all. Mr. Morong said he admittedly thinks that we will need a new East-West road in N.H., but that more study should be done. Maybe the road should be further north so not to conflict with the new Route 101 from Portsmouth to Manchester. Patricia Gleske from Moharimet Drive urged residents to work together to maintain the integrity of the Town as a unit in order not to have it split as Newington was by the Spaulding Turnpike. Deanne Wang of Garrison Lane was the lone speaker in support of the new road and its need.

Representative Bryant urged all to write to the Public Works Committee of the Legislature as soon as possible. Selectman Moriarty said that the Board of Selectmen would write to the Committee if this proposed Resolution passed. An affirmative vote was unanimous.

CARRIED

- C. Selectman Chairman Moriarty recognized Joe Cole for his many years of service to the Town as Selectman and Road Agent. Although he was not present Joe received a hearty round of applause.
- D. Barbara Houston recognized Ethel Hayes of Mill Hill Road for her 35 years of safe driving of school buses. She was recently honored by the New Hampshire School Bus Drivers' Association with a 35 Year Safety Award. Ethel also received a standing ovation and round of applause.
- E. Dianne Mrak of Evans Road and a Madbury Water Commissioner announced that there would be a "Toxics Clean-Up Day" on Saturday, April 20, 1985 at the Public Works Barn on River Road in Dover. This is a great opportunity for residents of Madbury, Lee, Durham, Dover and Rollinsford to make safe disposal of their common household chemicals. This program is sponsored by the N.H. Division of Public Health Services and the Dover/Durham League of Women Voters.

Since no other business was brought up at this time, the meeting was adjourned at 9:07 P.M. to count ballots. Ballots were counted and the meeting was officially adjourned at 9:58 P.M.

#### SUPPLEMENT #1

ARTICLE 2. To vote on amendments to the Zoning Ordinances as proposed by the Planning Board.

"Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. as proposed by the Planning Board for the Zoning Ordinances as follows?"

Amendment 1. Article III. Definitions (Add the following Sections.)

SECTION 19: Cluster Development, Cluster Subdivision: A residential subdivision of a tract where, instead of dividing an entire tract into house lots of conventional size, the same number of housing units may be clustered on lots of the same or reduced dimensions. The remaining land in the tract, which has not been built upon, is reserved for common area to be held in some form of undivided ownership or easement so as to prevent it from ever being subdivided.

SECTION 20: Conservation Land: Land given to the public body which has been reserved and dedicated to the conservation of forests, park land, or other uses of a similar nature with the intent of preserving it in its original natural condition, safeguarding water supplies or diminishing flood danger.

SECTION 21: Open Space Land: Land in which development rights have been legally restricted, either by deed or public purchase of those rights. The restriction could permit restricted public access, allow recreational development or other uses of a similar nature. Restrictions would have to be tied to the title of the land, regardless of its subsesquent ownership.

Amendment 2. Article V-a. Residential Cluster Development Overlay District.

SECTION 1: The purpose of cluster zoning is to encourage the preservation of open space, to promote the more efficient use of land in harmony with its natural features, to allow more efficient use of services. It encourages flexibility and variety in residential development within prescribed limits so as to enhance and protect the health, safety, convenience and general welfare of the inhabitants of Madbury. Residential Cluster Development is an alternative to the development of land for residential purposes following strict adherence to basic provisions of the zoning ordinance.

#### SECTION 2: Definitions:

- A. Common Area: Any parcel of land and/or area of water set aside as a result of the alternate dimensional controls. This area would be designated and intended for the benefit and enjoyment of the residents of the cluster development and cannot be dedicated to a Public Body.
- B. Mandatory Homes Association: A private, non-profit corporation, or other non-profit legal entity established by the developer for the benefit of the residents of the Cluster Development. Membership would be mandatory for property owners and made a required covenant in any deed issued or passed. The Association would provide voting and use rights in the Common Area when applicable and could charge dues to cover expenses, which may include tax liabilities, recreational or utility facilities. Articles of Association or incorporation would have to be reviewed and approved by the Planning Board.

SECTION 3: Standards and Conditions Required for the Approval of a Cluster Development:

- A. Type of housing units permitted:
  - Single family dwellings;
  - Two family dwellings

Dwellings may be so arranged as to be commonly connected by an accessory structure and shall not exceed two 2-family dwellings or four single family dwellings connected by accessory structures.

- B. Location: A cluster may be located only in the residential and agricultural district.
- C. Net Developable Area: The area of the tract to be subdivided less 15 percent for street and utilities.
- D. Minimum Size Development: The tract of land on which a Cluster Development is located shall have a total area of at least six (6) acres.
- E. Minimum Common Area: The Common Area for any Cluster shall be not less than 25 percent of the total area of the tract to be so subdivided and shall exclude parking areas and vehicle access facilities.
- F. Minimum Buffer: All Cluster Developments shall have a minimum of a 75-foot perimeter buffer between any structure and a perimeter property line.
- G. Permitted Density: Is the number of dwelling units in the development which shall not exceed the number allowed using conventional lot requirements for the zoning districts in which the development is proposed minus 15 percent for streets and utilities. The number of units shall be determined by dividing the number of net developable acres by the conventional lot size for that zoning district.
- H. Sewage Disposal: Plans must have been approved by the N.H. Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission. Despite such approval, the Planning Board, on the Advice of a sanitary system engineer of its own choice, may approve or disapprove, or, approve with modifications such plans if it determines that the State approved plan is insufficient and may make additional requirements. In no case will discharge of pollutants into surface water or wetlands be permitted, nor will any system which utilizes mechanical or powered devices be permitted unless a copy of a service contract, prepaid at least twelve (12) months in advance, giving the Town the power to call for repairs, should be submitted to the Planning Board, and after approval, it should be renewed annually. It shall be understood that failure to renew and/or bid-repaired failure of such sewage system, shall be grounds for eviction of residents of such cluster, whether owners or tenants, unless and until the system is repaired.

#### SECTION 4: Other conditions which may be considered:

- A. . Maintenance of Common Area:
  - · Home Owner Association:
  - · Fees:
  - Ownership of Common Land:
  - Conservation Land:
  - · Open Space Land;
  - Special Studies:
  - · Public Hearings;
  - Design Requirements;
  - · Frontage and Setbacks;
  - Interconnection to any existing or new water and/or sewage system.

#### SECTION 5: Procedures:

- A. Cluster Development: A Cluster Development shall be subject to the granting of approval of the site plan by the Planning Board.
- B. Site Plans and Impact Statements: A detailed site plan of that subdivision or development at a scale of approximately one inch equals forty feet and prepared by a registered architect, landscape architect, civil engineer, or land surveyor, must be presented to the Planning Board for the review process. The site plan must show existing and proposed contours at an interval of two feet, existing and proposed roads, adjacent development, existing and proposed buildings, and water courses, trees and other natural features. The plan must be accompanied by an impact statement, which details the probable effects of that subdivision or development on the following aspects of concern to the Town:
  - Attendance at public schools;
  - 2. Increase in vehicular traffic;
  - 3. Changes in the number of legal residents;
  - 4. Increases in municipal costs;
  - 5. Load on public utilities or future demand on them;
  - Public safety;
  - 7. Changes in tax revenue;
  - 8. Changes in surface drainage;
  - 9. Increased refuse disposal;
  - Increased consumption of groundwater;
  - 11. Pollution of water or air;
  - 12. Land erosion or loss of tree cover;
  - 13. Disturbance to other aspects of the natural ecology;
  - 14. Blocking of views; and
  - 15. Harmony with the character of surrounding development.
- C. Review Process: The Planning Board shall review the site plan and statement, giving weight to the factors in two (2) above as they affect the future of the Town and of the neighborhood adjacent to the site. Should the Board determine that any and all conditions would create any undue stress upon the health, safety, or financial ability of the Town, the Board may disapprove of a plan.
- D. Implementation of Cluster Development: Failure to diligently pursue construction of the cluster or a portion thereof for a period exceeding three (3) years shall constitute abandonment of the plan or pertinent portion thereof and shall render all permits issued for that portion null and void.

#### SECTION 6: Further Requirements:

- Uses will be the same as those permitted in the general Residential and Agricultural Districts.
- B. No lot shown on a plan for which a permit is granted under this section may be further subdivided, and a notation of this effect shall be shown upon the plan.
- C. The Board may impose other conditions, safeguards, limitations on time and use, pursuant to its regulations.
- D. Except, insofar as provided elsewhere in this ordinance, the approved permits granted under this section shall lapse within two (2) years if a substantial use has not sooner commenced or if construction has not begun, except that the Planning Board may grant an extension for good cause and shall grant an extension if the delay was caused by the need to seek other permits.

SECTION 7: Saving Clause: If any section, clause, provision, portion, or phrase of this Residential Cluster Development Overlay District Ordinance shall be held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent authority, such holding shall not affect, impair, or invalidate any other section, clause, provision, portion, or phrase of this Overlay District.

**Amendment 3:** Article V. General Residential and Agricultural District. Add Section I-H: (Advertising Signs) . . . set back at least 25 feet from the right of way; flashing or rotating lights are not permitted.

A Town Clerk-Tax Collector for the ensuing three years.

A Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Two Auditors for the ensuing year.

A Trustee of the Trust Funds for the ensuing three years.

A Supervisor of the Checklist for the ensuing six years.

ARTICLE 2. Meaning and intending to describe the parcel of land conveyed by Fiduciary Deed to Edward Hall, executor under the will of Archie L. Davis, to Frank S. Davis and Betty L. Davis, said deed dated Dec. 15, 1975 and recorded at Book 978, Page 407, Strafford County Registry of Deeds.

- ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the purchase of a portable generator for emergency power at the Town Hall.

- ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to receive in the name of the Town a title deed for Moss Lane and Fernway, as shown on the Final Plan of Subdivision: Old Stage Road, as recorded at the Register of Deeds, Strafford County.
- ARTICLE 18. BY PETITION: To see if the Town will vote to request the Representative(s) to the General Court to propose legislation to amend RSA 208:3 to include the Town of Madbury such that "wild deer shall not be taken by the use of any firearm, other than a shotgun loaded with a single ball or loose buckshot, muzzle loading rifle, or bow and arrow."
- ARTICLE 19. BY PETITION: To see if the Town will request the Board of Selectmen and the Madbury Planning Board to consult with the town fire chief, police chief, road agent or acting road agent and any other appropriate persons for assistance in determining priorities for improvement to town Class V roads, to develop a schedule for such road improvement and to report on these actions to voters at the 1987 Madbury Town Meeting.
- ARTICLE 20. To hear the reports of the Committees chosen, and act on any motion relating thereto.

ARTICLE 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before the Meeting.

### MADBURY VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT

We have been busy with our well project. Thanks to the combined efforts of Jerome Chase, Cliff Fitch and Bob Jennison, as well as our own men, a well has been dug and water piped into the station. The pump is working and Bill Long has offered to help us with the interior plumbing. The donated labor and equipment have really helped keep the cost of this project down.

We are awaiting approval of a septic plan and hope to tackle this job in the spring.

The Evans Road hydrant to go on the Portsmouth pipeline has all the necessary approvals and Fitch Construction will do the installation in the spring. We also have a hydrant to install at the Bellamy Reservoir on Route 9. We are still trying to work out a solution to the Moharimet Drive hydrant situation.

Donations from Pudding Hill Thrift Shop, Madbury Community Club and our own yardsale/bakesale were used by the FAST Squad to purchase a "Resusci Annie" mannequin for training use.

We take this opportunity to thank all of you who have supported the Fire Department including the Evans Family for the Eleanore Evans memorial gifts, Hanscom's Truck Stop and others who gave in different ways.

### REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Between July 1984 and June 1985, we experienced more forest fires throughout our state than in any year in the last fifty. Two of the leading causes of the 1,605 fires were children and fire kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden. Both causes are preventable, but only with *your* help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulations is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden.

If you own forest land, you will become responsible for the timber tax payment starting April 1, 1986. This is a change in the Timber Tax Law that will impact all forest landowners. Contact your Board of Selectmen for timber tax forms.

### MADBURY CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT

The Madbury Conservation Commission completed a five year study in 1985, which resulted in publication of the *Inventory of Properties Owned by the Town of Madbury*. The document has been presented to the Board of Selectmen and copies given to the Planning and Water Boards. It describes the parcels, assesses the state of their boundaries, and recommends management steps for each. A copy is available for public inspection at the Town Clerk's office.

Other actions in 1985 include the production of a new batch of Madbury notepaper, the award of a scholarship to help Madbury student Lisa Bergeron attend Youth Conservation Camp, the first steps taken in thinning the Demerrit Park pines, and attendance at meetings on groundwater and of the N. H. Association of Conservation Commissions.

The Commission voiced support for the successful cluster zoning amendment to the Madbury Zoning Ordinances, and opposed the I-393 alternative 2 proposal.

James Jackson IV resigned from the Commission recently, having served since 1982. We will miss his willing hand.

### MADBURY PLANNING BOARD

The Madbury Planning Board met monthly in 1985. The Board considered 10 subdivision applications, approved 5 and disapproved 5. Four Site Plan Reviews were conducted and 2 property owners were referred to the Zoning Board of Adjustment after consultation with the Planning Board.

After extensive work, the Board placed on the Town Warrant the Residential Cluster Development Overlay District which was passed by the townspeople and incorporated into the Ordinances.

The Board then began reviewing and considering the Non-Conforming use regulations and Building Regulations with the view of clarifying and updating the same. The Board of Selectmen also charged the Planning Board to update the Sand and Gravel Regulations. This task became a joint effort between the Board of Selectmen and the Planning Board.

1985 also found the Board bidding farewell to two of its members, Beverley Bryant and Carol Bischoff. Chairman Dennis Salter also tendered his resignation. The Board will miss Mr. Salter's firm, guiding personality. A note of appreciation to these people for their service and dedication to the Board and Town of Madbury must be mentioned.

For 1986, the Planning Board will be reviewing the Master Plan, Zoning and Regulations along with a policy and meeting procedure format. Another busy year is anticipated for the Board as Madbury grows.

### STRAFFORD COUNTY REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION

The Strafford Regional Planning Commission (SRPC) provides professional planning services to member communities in both Strafford and Rockingham Counties. SRPC staff expertise is primarily focused in four areas: transportation planning, environmental assessment, community/economic development and land use planning. Technical assistance is also provided in solid waste management, federal grant preparation and local zoning and site review regulations.

This year SRPC completed a comprehensive groundwater study of the Strafford region which will assist communities in their erfforts to protect regional groundwater supplies. The Commission also prepared a septage management plan which will assist municipalities in SRPC's jurisdiction in complying with state law mandating that each city and town have a fifteen year plan for the disposal of waste from septic systems.

SRPC continues to plan for an efficient regional transportation network through its contract work with the New Hampshire Department of Public Works and Highways and the Cooperative Alliance for Seacoast Transportation (COAST) mass transit system. SRPC, in cooperation with these groups, have identified a number of highway and mass transit needs and is working on developing methods to finance these improvements.

In 1985, SRPC consulted with Madbury's Zoning Board of Adjustment on operating procedures and provided information to Planning Board members and Selectmen on proposed highway changes.

### REPORT OF THE LAMPREY REGIONAL SOLID WASTE COOPERATIVE

The Directors of the Lamprey Regional Solid Waste Cooperative are pleased to report that the incinerator/energy recovery plant located on the University of New Hampshire campus is operating on a continuous twenty-four hour, seven day a week schedule.

The day-to-day operation is carried out under the supervision of the Cooperative's Administrator, under the general supervisory control of the three-member Operations Committee from the Joint Board of Directors. The plant personnel, in addition to the administrator, includes two mechanics, a truck driver, two daily shifts of 12 hours each involving 8 persons, plus daily clean-up crew and the secretary. This organization operates the incinerator system, maintains records, and coordinates with the University's Power Plant staff to monitor the boiler and steam production elements of the plant. The Cooperative's organization also handles the collection of refuse from the transfer stations of five communities, and handles the ash removal and its transfer to the landfill site.

During 1985 the Cooperative purchased a new Mack chassis with roll-on capability to handle the ash containers and the Canisters from the five communities with transfer stations.

The decline in the price of oil during the past year was of course welcomed by home owners and business operators, however, the price drop significantly reduced the income of the Cooperative for the sale of steam to the University, as the revenue from steam is controlled by the price of fuel oil. Some unexpected maintenance items coupled with the

plant being shut down for two weeks during which the University had the area between the plant and the recently relocated fire station regraded and paved also reduced the Cooperative's revenue from the sale of steam.

The rubbish from member communities increased by 9.375% in 1985 over that of 1984.

A major problem to be resolved during 1986 will be to locate an approved site for ash disposal. The regulatory agencies have rather arbitrarily taken the position that the ash must be disposed of within a secure landfill.

### OYSTER RIVER HOME HEALTH ASSOCIATION NOW

### SQUAMSCOTT HOME HEALTH (EFF. 12-01-85) 742-7921 869-5055

Squamscott Home Health is a Medicare certified voluntary, non-profit home and community health agency resulting from a merger of the Oyster River Home Health Association and the Dover District Nursing Association. The agencies have been providing home health and clinic services in Dover since 1909 and in Durham, Lee, Madbury, and Newmarket since 1967. The primary purpose for merging the two agencies into one organization is to enable the expansion and extension of traditional services and the addition of such other services as are deemed necessary and fiscally feasible.

### HOME CARE PROGRAM

Home care services include nursing; physical, occupational and speech therapy; and homemaker/home health aide as prescribed and approved by the patient's physician. The goal of the program is to allow individuals to receive care in the comfort and privacy of their own homes. In many instances such service is covered by Medicare, Medicaid, and other private insurances. In cases of medical necessity when there is no insurance coverage, fees are covered through private pay when able or the use of town funding, United Way support, and private donations.

### MATERNAL CHILD HEALTH PROGRAM

Well child clinics are held regularly providing physical examinations, immunizations, testing and dental care aimed at the promotion of good health and early detection of problems. This comprehensive program for lower income families is available to children from birth to entering first grade.

### **HEALTH PROMOTION PROGRAMS**

Activities aimed at the promotion of good health are provided through the conduction of screening and health education sessions for adults in a variety of settings. The availability of public financial support directly affects the agency's ability to conduct these free public health services.

Monies received from the towns are used to cover: home visits to individuals without insurance and unable to pay any or all of the fee, approximately fifty percent of the cost of the Maternal and Child Health program, and the health promotion activities in each community.
