TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newbury, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Newbury on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the Year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To hear reports of Town Officers, Agents and Committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to disposing of property acquired by tax deed.
- 6. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to accepting from H. E. Staniels, the sum of one hundred (\$100.00) dollars, the same to be held in trust and the income from said trust fund to be used for the perpetual care of the "Craig-Staniels lot in the Marshall Cemetery".
- .7. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to widening and straightening the Pine Cliff Road and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 8. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to oiling Pine Street, at Blodgett Landing and raise and appropriate money for same.
- 9. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to repairing and oiling Frog Street, at the east shore of Lake Todd from Sweet's Corner at the north end of Lake Todd to the Newbury- Bradford Town line and raise and appropriate money for same.
- 10. to see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to rebuilding and oiling the gravel parts of Bowles Road in conjunction with the T.R.A. appropriation balance and raise and

appropriate money for same

- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred twenty-five (\$125.00) dollars for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town, together with the other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred (\$400.00) dollars for the planting of fish in the waters of the Town of Newbury. The same to be turned over to the Sunapee Mountain Fish and Game Club. An accounting to be given to the Selectmen of expenditures made by the Fish and Game Club.
- 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.



During the past year, several people in Newbury have raised the question of the possibility of combining the two schools in Newbury so we could have the children all under one roof. Each person that I have talked with has had the same general idea but would go about it in a different way. Which way, if any, would be up to the people of the District to decide. Certainly, there are many advantages in having all the pupils together in one building. If there is enough interest in Newbury for providing better housing for the children, I think that there is a definite line of action which should be taken. It has been successful in two other Districts in the Union, and a third is preparing to come into this March meeting with a definite proposal for a new school.

School construction is expensive and there is no evidence that costs of construction are going down. Because of the high costs, school buildings have to last a long time and will have to meet educational needs over the life time of the building. If careful consideration is not given to these educational needs, the District may find, after a few years, that they have invested their money in something they do not want and will have a building on their hands which to dispose of will be very difficult.

The large majority of school districts that feel that they need a better building for their children, set-up a Building Committee to aid the School Board in making a study of the educational needs of the Community to act in an advisory capacity to the School Board. Membership in this Committee is usually made of selectmen, citizens, teachers and, recently, school children have been added to the Committee. Surprisingly enough, school children, very often, have good suggestions.

After a careful study by the Building Committee, they may reach any one of three conclusions. First, that the present facilities are adequate and no new construction is necessary. Second, they may feel that an addition night be made to one of the present buildings. Third, they may decide that neither of the buildings can be utilized and a new building should be constructed.

In the event that the Committee feels that some sort of change should be made, they should consult an architect who is experienced in school construction. He will draw up sketches of various plans and will be able to get fairly accurate estimates of what the costs will be. Then the program should be presented to the people of the District for their judgement.

The two most important things to be done whenever a District considers new construction are:

- Careful study of the whole educational program so that we know what we want this year, ten years from now and twenty years from now.
- 2. That every one in the District is fully informed by the Committee about the plans before School Meeting so

they will be able to vote intelligently on the project.

I have enjoyed working with the School Board and Teachers of Newbury. They are doing a fine piece of work and are getting results.
