To the inhabitants of the Town of Northwood in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Northwood on Tuesday, the 7th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, the polls to close at 7 P.M., to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt, Amendments numbered, Article III Part B Trailers, Semi-dependent Mobile Homes and Mobile Homes Sec. 2, and Article III Part B Trailers, Semi-dependent Mobile Homes, and Mobile Homes Sec. 4, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Ordinances.
3. To take the sense of the qualified voters whether the Amendments of the Constitution proposed by the 1971 session of the General Court shall be approved.

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Northwood in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Northwood on Saturday the 18th day of March, next at one of the clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,400.00 for interest on same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,960.00 for the Northwood Public Libraries.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,475.00 for Recreation, Parks and Playgrounds.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for Band Concerts.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$320.00 for the care of Cemeteries.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for the purpose of constructing a 36 casket vault at the Pine Grove Cemetery.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Highways.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,496.00 for the purpose of Street Lighting.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$674.96 for the purpose of Town Road Aid, the State share to be \$4,499.76.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 to be used in addition to the joint T.R.A. fund.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$352.00 for the Concord Hospital.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,300.00 for Ambulance Service to be paid to the Barnstead Center Fire Department.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,575.00 for the Town's per capita share of the Rural District Health Council.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to sum of \$2,200.00 for the purpose of supporting the Northwood Community Action Program.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the purpose of increasing the Highway Construction Machinery Capital Reserve Fund.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the Control of Pine Blister Rust.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to support the Northwood Bi-Centennial Committee.

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property of the Town acquired by Tax Collector's Deeds as a result of Tax Sales.

20. We, the undersigned residents of Northwood, do petition the Town of Northwood to change payment of the Tax Collector for collecting property taxes of the Town of Northwood from a percentage basis to an annual salary. The salary to be set at twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200.00) a year. This salary to become effective at the start of the next salary period. (By Petition)

21. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the regional planning commission, now organized and named the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. This Commission will have membership of at least two Municipalities and will have jurisdiction over the planning region delineated by the State Office of Planning and Research. The objective of the Commission will be to plan for the encourage regional planning analysis, provide consensus on major problems of regional concern and to assist in the effectuation of projects within and which extend beyond, the boundaries of a particular town. (By Petition)

22. To see what action the Town will take relative to the location of the Shoe Shop on the Town Property.

23. To see if the Town will vote to enact the following dog law: It shall be unlawful for the owner or keeper

of a dog to permit a dog so owned or kept to run at large without being controlled by a leash, except upon his own property or while hunting under the control of his owner or keeper.

The police shall impound all dogs found on public property in violation of the above provision and upon written complaint of the owner of private property the police shall impound all dogs unlawfully found on said private property.

The police, upon impounding any dog, may immediately make a formal complaint against the owner or keeper of the dog in the District Court.

Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine not exceeding Ten Dollars (\$10.00) for each offense.

All fines shall enure to the Police Department toward the expense of enforcement of this ordinance.

24. To transact any other business that legally may come before said meeting.

**ANNUAL REPORT
RURAL DISTRICT HEALTH COUNCIL**

January 1, 1971 — December 31, 1971

The Rural District Health Council continues to provide visiting nurse service to the member towns: Northwood, Nottingham, Deerfield, Barrington, Strafford, Middleton and New Durham. The nurses have continued to provide nursing services to patients needing care and have expanded the Family Planning Program to include all of the towns of the Council. In April, with the assistance of Mrs. Mary Caminati, N. H. Public Health Nurse, a Child Health Conference was started at the Community Center in Deerfield to provide physical examinations and immunizations for preschool children in the towns of Northwood, Nottingham and Deerfield. If indicated, the children are referred to other services. The attending physician at the monthly conference is Dr. William Whitney of Exeter. In September, with the aid of Mrs. Muriel Morin, N. H. Public Health Nurse, a monthly Child Health Conference was started at the Town Hall in New Durham for the towns of New Durham and Middleton with Dr. Wendy Tinklepaugh of Amherst, N. H., as attending physician. We are hoping to establish a Child Health Conference for Barrington and Strafford in the spring of 1972.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Lest We Forget — It Can Happen Here

Disastrous forest and brush fires that destroy hundreds of homes are more prevalent on the west coast with their dry seasons and strong dry hot winds but 25 years ago this fall is the anniversary of a disaster that devastated large areas of northern New England leaving villages in ashes with rows of cellarholes and chimneys in a number of summer vacations home locations. Many lives were lost on that destructive day of October 23, 1947 nothing could stop the wind driven flames.

It is true that such conditions are unusual for New Hampshire but they happened once, they can happen again. The fuel for fires is all around us. All it takes is a firebrand. Only by cultivating a habit of carefulness with fire at all times can we meet the challenge of protection when dry conditions prevail. Please let these reminders be your guide:

1. Never, either when walking, riding or driving, discard a firebrand — a lighted match or a glowing cigarette.
2. Always obtain a permit for any outside burning. The burning of household rubbish is not permitted if your town has rubbish collection. Burning of grass or garden litter can be dangerous. See your warden first.
3. If you camp or picnic, be sure open fires are allowed and if they are, put them **dead out** when leaving.
4. **Most important** — instruct your children in the danger of the lighted match. A lighted match and dry grass or forest litter is a dangerous combination

which leads to destructive loss and can lead to tragedy.

The past year — 1971 was a favorable year for the control of fires. There were too many fire starts in some towns. We thank those who remembered and ask others to heed Smokey's message.

There are also four students being educated in other schools because of handicaps of one kind or another. The costs to the District do not exceed the statutory requirements.

Staff

The Northwood School Staff continues to grow in competence and in adaptability. The District is fortunate in having faculty members with the interest of the pupils at heart.

We are also finding that there are more candidates for teaching positions available than there were only a year or two ago. The pressure of competition for positions should have a good effect in stimulating incumbents to improve their competencies.

Should the current trend continue, School Boards may find their tasks more difficult because of the larger number of well trained candidates being available for the openings which arise. The shortage of candidates is still evident in the early childhood area and in science and mathematics.

Salaries

Salaries should begin to stabilize with the effect of the President's economic policy and the greater availability of quality candidates each having an important influence. Though it should be noted that the smaller communities cannot, as yet, compete with the larger and more affluent districts.

Space

It should be noted that the enrollment in the Northwood School continues to grow. There were 21 more students enrolled in September of 1971 than there were in September of 1970. There are no longer any odd nooks and crannies available to house the growing num-

ber of students within the present buildings. With the need of retaining space for a physical education program and for a library, there is little likelihood that these areas may legitimately be converted to standard classrooms.

Before leaving this brief discussion of space, the most outstanding improvement in the building itself was the reduction of the reverberation level in the Level I classroom by the use of carpeting and accoustical tile. It is recommended that more classrooms be converted in similar fashion. The learning environment can be greatly improved throughout the building by this comparatively inexpensive alteration.

Statutes

Two important statutes were passed in the last session of the General Court which will have a profound effect upon local school districts. These related to changes in the health law and the law concerning the education of handicapped children.

The health law relates to required physical examinations for pupils and staff and the methods of meeting this requirement. At the present writing, the Northwood Board had not adopted a policy in regard to health, but was working on it.

The chief change in the law relating to children who are handicapped is that of making it mandatory for all such children to be educated at the expense of the district. Prior to the passage of this amendment, the only children whose education was mandated were those with physical handicaps. At this writing, four children are being educated at district expense under the provisions of the law.

Support of Schools

There is no doubt that the cost of education continues to grow and continues to place a burden upon the taxpayers of the district. It has been a tradition of long

standing to make sacrifices for the improvement of education, financial and personal. The property tax has been, in most states, the basic source of educational revenues, as much so in New Hampshire as anywhere. It is interesting to note that two recent state court decisions, in California and Minnesota, question this concept on the theory that it negates equal educational opportunity for all. In December, a federal court, speaking in Texas, made a similar decision. It is early to say, but it would seem that we will be forced to look elsewhere in the very near future for funds for education.

In completing this report, the undersigned would like to express their appreciation of the cooperation they have received from local citizens, school board members, students, professional and service staff members. Your continued cooperation and support is earnestly solicited toward the end of providing a sound educational opportunity for your children.

In the past year, the Northwood Elementary School has been moving closer to its overall goals by continually striving for a better educational system for the children of Northwood.

Some of the changes that have been instituted are an ungraded reading program throughout the school where youngsters will always be working at the level of competence where they may achieve hoped-for success; a physical education program has been accepted enthusiastically by the student body; students can be found at any hour of the day using the facilities in our newly enlarged and decorated library under the guidance of Mrs. Hooker, our full-time librarian; the music program has grown in numbers and ability, and we are very proud of the growth made by the band under the leadership of Mr. Al Forest; and elective courses were added to the Junior High program where students were allowed to choose an area of study they enjoyed — dramatics, typing, home economics, woodworking, consumer education, contemporary problems, or art.

The enrollment for the year has fluctuated between 300 and 320 students. Some areas are becoming extremely crowded, and we will have to plan carefully in the future because space is at a minimum.

All of the staff returned, with the exception of two people, and we are very pleased with the attitude and dedication of the people we have working with the youngsters this year.

In closing, I would like to thank the School Board members and the citizens of Northwood for their co-operation and understanding without which the growth and development of our school would not have been possible.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT
Northwood, N. H.
1970-1971

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The health program for the year 1970-1971 was carried out in the usual manner with an annual physical inspection of each student by the nurse. When defects were noted the appropriate referral and follow-up were made.

Students again received the benefit of preventative dental care through classroom visits by a hygienist sponsored by the N. H. Bureau of Dental Public Health. One hundred and seventy-two students responded to the Cleaning and Fluoride Clinic held in November. The Harvey Lake Women's Club donated funds to be used for this clinic enabling several students to receive preventative treatment. The P.T.O. generously donated to the Matching Funds Program enabling several students to receive corrective dental treatment. The help of volunteers contributed much toward the efficiency of these programs and I would like to thank everyone who helped in any way. A Rubella (German Measles) Clinic was held on December 8th. Fifty-one students were immunized.

First Aid was administered to approximately 305 students while 19 ill children were transported home by the nurse. Seventeen home visits were made.

Twenty-six children were registered for school entry at a pre-school clinic in May. Vision and hearing screening tests were carried out by the nurse at the tri-town preschool clinic in Deerfield in May and June.

In March a very informative program on Smoking and Cancer was presented to the 5th grade students. In May, Mrs. Marie Erickson, from the Department of Communicable Disease presented an excellent program on Venereal Disease to the 7th and 8th grade students.

The following films were shown in conjunction with the health program for the year:

1. Smoking film and film-strip American Cancer Society gr. 5-8
2. Two dental films gr. 1-4
3. Two drug and one alcohol abuse film gr. 5-8
4. First Aid Film and film strip
5. Bicycle safety film Aetna Life Insurance Co.

I would like to express my appreciation to Mr. Morgan, School Board Members, teachers and parents for their cooperation and support during the past year.
