THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Plymouth in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Music Hall in said Plymouth on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. Is it expedient to revise the constitution.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Free Public Library.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance and construction of highways.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the oiling of streets.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for state aid construction of highways, or town roads maintenance in cooperation with the state.
8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day.
9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for cemeteries.
10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for expenses of the District Nurse.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Emily Balch Soldiers and Sailors Memorial Hospital.
12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Plymouth Common.
13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Band Concerts during the summer of 1937 by the Plymouth Community Band.
14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for issuance of printed matter in co-operation with other towns of the lakes region.
15. To see if the town will vote to widen High Street and what sum of money the town will raise for this purpose.
16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for suitable coasting and skating places in town.
17. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the easterly and westerly one-half rod strips of South Main Street, between Highland Street and Warren Street, which was laid out September 8, 1801, which would reestablish the original three rods road as now monumented and used, and instruct the Selectmen to obtain consent of the court.
18. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell, convey and deed a certain tract of land situated in the town and described in the deed of Nellie Barton and George F. Barton to the town of Plymouth dated October 13, 1914, and recorded in Grafton County Registry of Deeds Book 531, Page 30.
19. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road which was laid out March 21, 1803, by the Selectmen of Plymouth, recorded in Plymouth Town Records and accepted at Town Meeting held April 11, 1803, beginning at what was known as Coffrin's Ferry on the

Pemigewasset River and extending Westwardly about eighteen (18) rods to North Main Street in the town of Plymouth.

20. To see if the town will vote to raise money for garbage collection.
21. To choose a Library Trustee for a term of three years.
22. To choose a Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years.
23. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
24. To see if the town will vote to give a discount on the early payment of taxes.
25. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF COMMISSIONERS

The 1935 Legislature passed legislation placing Municipal Water Systems under the Public Service Commission and by their order, in conformity with the law, it was necessary to have a valuation of the Water System as of January 1, 1936: this has been done by Certified Accountants, F. L. Willis & Co., of Concord, N. H., conforming to requirements of the Public Service Commission and copies as required filed with said Commission, and in the future such copies (Balance Sheet as shown in the report) must be made up by the Commissioners and filed annually.

Copies of the Accountant reports as filed with the Commission, consisting of two pamphlets (one of 16 and the other of 38 pages) are filed with your Water Department Treasurer and can be examined at any time by anyone interested.

These take in values, costs, etc., from 1898 when the Water Works were purchased. Cost to the Accountants for services and expense total \$398.63.

The two floods in March were costly to the System, including partial destruction of Reservoir No. 2: this went out on the second flood and until June 22nd was wholly out of the system. Both floods made it an impossibility to operate the pumps for 3½ weeks, so during most of that time the District was dependent on the small reservoir for both Domestic and Fire purposes.

May 15th Flood damage data was filed with the State Committee and application made for assistance from funds voted by the Legislature for Flood Relief.

Flood data filed as follows: Reservoir No. 1—\$110.27: Reservoir No. 2—\$4,512.64; Main Breaks—\$181.84: Pumps and Well—\$780.06, making a total of \$5,584.81: after examination and checking by the State Committee we were allowed and paid the sum of \$3,602.84.

Since the floods last March at the Pumping Station approximately One Thousand Dollars have been expended for Repairs, Labor and Replacements on the Pumping Plant.

An expert and assistant came here, put on overalls and for two days overhauled and readjusted every part of both pumps, and their verdict was that the older pump (installed in 1918) was liable to give out at any time and that at least one pump unit should be replaced as it is necessary for the District to have two pumping units in working order at all times.

The 1918 Pump has a capacity rating of 250 Gallons per minute but its present efficiency is from 150 to 160 gallons per minute and requires constant attention.

With amount of water now required by the District it is necessary to pump 125,000 to 150,000 gallons daily, most of the time.

Meters have been installed as follows: 20 Resident: 4 Commercial: and 17 meters have been replaced.

New Construction: 110 Feet of 6 inch main pipe on Cummings and Avery Streets, with two 6 inch gates so that proper shut-offs are installed for extension both to Highland Street and Pleasant Street, when required.

During the past year there have been four breaks, viz: Langdon and Pleasant: Weeks: Highland Avenue and High: and Main and Bridge Streets.

Freezing and Thawing: but six and these occurred in February and March of 1936.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSING SERVICE

To the School Board of Plymouth:

Following is the complete report of work accomplished by the School Nursing service from September 1935 to June 1936.

726 children were examined with these symptoms of defects recorded.

Dental defects	236
Enlarged and diseased tonsils	54
Skin diseases	26
Underweight	12
Defective vision	65

Corrections of defects were as follows:

Dental	143
Tonsil operations	24
Vision	29

Underweight children were furnished with cod liver oil and milk.

All children in grades were weighed three times during the year and weights recorded on classroom charts.

The aid of state and local agencies and public clinics was solicited in carrying out the work.

189 school calls and 314 home calls were made by the nurse relative to the correction of defects and general health problems.

136 business calls were made in connection with the work.

Beginning in September 1936 the health examinations in the schools were again made with these results reported to parents:

706 children examined:

Dental defects	237
Tonsils enlarged and diseased	74

(I would say in regard to examination of throats, all enlarged as well as diseased tonsils were reported with the request that the advice of a physician be obtained.)

Vision defects	61
Enlarged glands	25
Skin	5
Underweight	25

(All cases 10% or more below average weight were reported.)

The program of work has been carried on much as last year with health education and correction of defects as its chief objective. The clinic work is being continued assisted by the local Red Cross, Woman's Club, Community Chest, American Legion Auxiliary and Public Welfare.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Plymouth:

I submit my sixteenth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

Statistics

Enrollment for the school year ending June 30, 1936 was 736.

Distribution: High School, 359; Model School, 262; Rural Schools, 122; Tuition Pupils, 208; Plymouth Residents, 555.

Average membership, 705; percent of attendance, 95; promoted, 653; failed, 21.

Visits: Members of School Board, 9; Citizens, 795; Superintendent, 947.

Total registration, February 1, 1937 was 734.

Distribution: High School, 338; Model School, 277; Rural Schools, 119; Non-resident pupils, 215; total number of Plymouth pupils, 519.

Withdrawals and removals brought the total membership to 694 on February 1, 1937, with 355 boys and 339 girls.

Few changes are to be reported in our teaching staff. Miss Elizabeth Roberts, of Concord, a graduate of Miss Wheelock's School, as kindergarten teacher has succeeded Miss Hilda Haskell who resigned to continue her education in Columbia University.

After years of scholarly and devoted service, Miss Effie Muchmore tendered her resignation. Her place is filled by Miss Ruth I. McKinnon of Lancaster, a graduate of Middlebury College, with high scholarship.

Miss Regis A. Horace of Manchester, B. Ed., Plymouth Normal School, with two years of successful experience in Milford High School, has taken over the work of Miss Doreen Nelson.

In the Junior High School, Miss Irene Szalajeska has charge of household arts and Mr. Abbott is directing the manual training.

All our teachers are improving their opportunities to keep abreast of educational progress. Six were enrolled in summer schools during the long vacation.

The Model School

Under the terms of the contract with the State of New Hampshire the Normal School is providing a corps of highly competent teachers. This year about 20 students are training during each semester, a total of 40 for the year.

The minor repairs during the summer vacation added to the attractiveness of the school. There is, however, urgent need for better accommodations. The present school building can be enlarged or remodeled. As I have pointed out in previous reports, some consolidation of our schools is feasible, if our village school plant can be brought up-to-date.

Plymouth High School

The report of the headmaster presents the detailed story of Plymouth High School. The school is administered wisely. It is sensitive to changes in the direction of an education useful and necessary to youth in a changing world. An efficient and conscientious force of teachers is directing both class instruction and many types of extra curricula activities. More than half of the pupils come to us from out of town. These eager, young people enrich our community both economically and socially. Plymouth High School deservedly holds a high place in the regard of our citizens. I hope that some way may be found to supply another teacher, as the staff is over-burdened.

Rural Schools

The membership of our one room schools has remained practically stationary in the last three years. Lower Intervale is the largest school, with a total of 32 pupils distributed in all 8 grades. Ten rural chil-

dren are attending school for the first time, and there are 16 in the eighth grade.

A large number of the graduates of these schools carry on their work successfully in Plymouth High School.

Adult Education

In adult classes, under the W. P. A., Mrs. Velna Hatch and Miss Ynes Minickiello are teaching Commercial Subjects, English, Spanish, French and Italian. The total enrollment exceeds 125 including men from the C. C. C. Camps. The school board is wise in allowing the use of the high school for these activities.

Health Service

Mrs. Lovett's services as school nurse are invaluable. Many agencies are cooperating in improving the health of the children. The Pemigewasset Woman's Club is furnishing funds for milk for the underprivileged. Doctor Olmstead is being employed as advisory physician.

General Supervisory Activities

The work of the superintendent continues along the lines already outlined in previous reports. The fundamentals are stressed and vital activities develop cooperation and creative abilities. The schools are centers of happy activity in which children are growing in knowledge and character. In order that the greatest educational service may be rendered, as complete an understanding of individual children as possible is sought, by means of tests and other sources.

In closing I commend again the fine public spirit of Plymouth which is always ready to provide the best for the schools. Parents are friendly and cooperative.

I am grateful to the members of the school board for their alert interest and kindness.

HEADMASTER'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit my eighth annual report as the Headmaster of the Plymouth High School.

The graduating exercises of this class were held in the Plymouth Theatre on Monday, June fifteenth, at ten o'clock. A class of 83 received their diplomas at that time. Of this number, at least thirty have gone to post-secondary institutions or have continued their work as post graduates, distributed as follows:

Four of the class of 1935 entered a post-secondary institution in September 1936.

The public high school of today is not primarily for boys and girls who are going to college; it must also furnish a training for that majority of boys and girls who on graduation are to take their places in the field of the employed. A diploma is not, therefore, merely a certificate that the holder is prepared to enter any college, but that he has completed prescribed courses which will enable him to face the realities of life with better chances of success, whether in college or in the outside world.

Certain colleges require a large amount of prescribed courses, but these alone are not enough to ensure success in college work. One aim of the Plymouth High School is to train its students to realize that one must learn to depend upon himself, to steer without confusion on his course, and to keep his emotions under control for his own good as well as for those about him.

The Headmaster, aided by a capable and willing staff of teachers, desires to assist every student in the school in making a wise selection of a vocation that his work may be truly successful and his leisure time profitable.

There are many activities outside the courses of study which, under well planned supervision, will aid in the education of the young people. For this reason, the school has sponsored athletics, musical organizations, dramatics, prize speaking, school parties, assemblies, a Girls' Club, a Home Economics Club, and has cooperated with outside organizations, such as the Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, and 4-H Clubs.

To keep the orchestra at full strength, there is a great need of more boys and girls learning to play some musical instrument.

More cooperation is needed in the community to carry out the program of the Boy Scouts. The latter organization with the Girl Scouts are great aids in the educational program of our public schools.

There were two changes in the teaching staff this year; Miss Ruth McKinnon, a graduate of Middlebury College, took the place of Miss Effie Muchmore as the senior-junior English teacher, and Miss Regis Horace, a graduate of Plymouth Normal School followed Miss Doreen Nelson as assistant in the Commercial Department.

For the wonderful and encouraging support that I have received from Superintendent Speare, the School Board, the citizens, the teachers and pupils during the past year, I am duly grateful.
