MINUTES OF MEETING OF JANUARY 24, 1971

A meeting of the Executive Committee of the Sullivan County Delegation to the N. H. General Court was convened on Sunday, January 24, 1971 at 2 P.M. The purpose of the meeting was to hear the budgetary requests from the heads of the various county agencies. Those present were: Townsend, Frizzell, Spaulding, Chairman Nahil, Shulins, and Flint.

Mr. Henry Shaheen, Clerk of Superior Court, presented his request for a slightly increased budget. We were supplied with a supplementary line-item explanation of the budget.

Mr. John McCusker came before us with the Budget of the Sheriff's Dept. He stated that neither he nor his deputy had had a raise for 5 years -- he felt that the increase being asked for would bring salaries in line with those of other counties of similar size. There is a bill pending in the House relative to an increase in Sheriff's salary in one county. Rep. Saggiotes has offered an amendment to make the bill applicable to Sullivan County. Fees in 1970 were approximately \$1500. Expenses increased chiefly because of the \$2000 cost of moving the Mitchell murder case to Lebanon.

Mrs. Bernice MacWilliams presented the budget for the Office of the Register of Probate. She informed us that her office receives no funds from the county. She made several "kind remarks" praising the calibre of Representatives from the county.

Mrs. Zella LaForge, Register of Deeds, presented her request for 1971. She stated that higher salaries and greater expenses for supplies were the major cause of her budgetary increases.

Mr. Joel Nordholm discussed the budget of the Sullivan County Extension Service. He sought an increase of some \$1900. He supplied an explanation sheet which gave a detailed account of increases.

Mr. Albert Leahy, Jr. presented a budgetary request for the Sullivan County Mental Health Clinic. We stated that the clinic was presently seeking two qualified social workers for the staff. He explained that donations had totalled \$10,000 in 1970. This figure was much higher than had been estimated. Mr. Leahy felt that contributions would not reach that total this year. We were supplied with a line-item explanation of the Mental Health request.

Next we heard several representatives from the Sullivan County Conservation District. They sought a \$500 increase over the \$1000 "gratuity" of 1970. Members of the committee questioned the representatives as to why they could not charge a nominal fee for mapping and soil sampling (especially in the case of large land developers).

Mr. and Mrs. Omer Ahern presented the budget for the County Hospital. The huge increase in the hospital budget was caused by the fact that the new addition doubled the capacity of the hospital to approximately 150 patients. An 11-page outline of Revenues and Expenditures was supplied.

Commissioners McCusker, Woodhull, and Bascom went down the list of county budget requests which had not been discussed by the various agency chiefs. The Commissioners then told us that there was a definite heating problem in the Records Building. We were informed that it would be necessary to appropriate some \$5700 for an emergency heating fund. Hayward Refrigeration of New London had previously inspected the building and had found that it would be easy to install electric heat. The delegation was told that the installation of 4-zone electric heat was the only feasible solution. We voted unanimously to appropriate the necessary funds.

The meeting adjourned at 6:20 P.M.

MINUTES OF MEETING OF FEBRUARY 7, 1971

A meeting of the Executive Committee of the Sullivan County Delegation to the N. H. General Court was convened on Sunday, February 7, 1971 at 2 P.M. The purpose of the meeting was to scrutinize the expected revenues and expenditures of the county for the coming year. Those present were Townsend, Frizzell, Spaulding, Chairman Nahil, Gaffney, Shulins, and Flint.

We first discussed estimated revenues for 1971. We decided that the

estimates could be increased as follows:

- 1. Hospital -- \$53,490 to \$700,000.
- 2. Board and Care of Children \$2,000 to \$6,000.
- 3. Register of Deeds -- \$2,000 to \$25,000. Increases: \$57,490 to \$798,504.

Proposed expenditures cuts were:

- 1. Sheriff's Dept. -- \$5,192 to \$34,000.
- 2. Clerk of Court \$500 to \$15,000.
- 3. Board and Care of Children \$2,000 to \$60,000.
- 4. County Hospital --\$28,768 to \$700,000.
- 5. Commissioners -- \$4,500 to \$6,000.
- 6. County Farm and Dairy -- \$5,000 to \$58,724.60
- 7. Jail \$2,332 to \$35,000.
- 8. Old Age Assistance -- \$2,000 to \$68,000.
- 9. Welfare Administration Expense \$1,000 to \$17,676.
- 10. Outlay for Court House \$5,000 to \$2,725.
- 11. Outlay for County Farm -- \$1,000 to \$9,115.
- 12. Outlay for County Hospital -- \$1,000 to \$9,621.50
- 13. Soil Conservation District -- \$1,500 to No funds.
- 14. Mental Health -- \$6,920 to \$14,000. Cuts: \$66,712.

Rep. Spaulding said that she would investigate expenditures of the Extension Service. We did not act on this segment of the budget. A public hearing relative to the budget was set for Thursday, February 18, 1971 at 7:30 P.M.

The meeting adjourned at 5:30 P.M.

> Commissioners' Office Claremont, N. H. February 18, 1971

A Public Hearing on 1971 budget estimates was duly advertised and held in the Claremont Commissioners' Office at 7:30 P.M. on February 18, 1971. Those members of the Finance Committee who were present were Townsend, Frizzell, Spaulding, Chairman Nahil, Gaffney, Shulins, and Flint. Other members of the Sullivan County delegation to the General Court were Galbraith, Rousseau, Fleming, Downing, Campbell, and Burrows. Also in attendance were some 35 interested citizens.

Delegation Chairman Frizzell opened the hearing and immediately turned it over to Finance Committee Chairman Nahil. Rep. Nahil offered a line-by-line discussion of expected revenue for 1971. The Chairman then moved to an explanation of expenditures. Commissioner Woodhull responded to a query

regarding salary increases for the Commissioners. A question regarding the increased expenditures in the Sheriff's Department was also raised. It was stated that the Commissioners were responsible for the administration of the welfare program. Dr. Spock responded to an inquiry relative to a breakdown of the Sullivan County Mental Health Clinic Budget. The budget of the County Extension Service created the most discussion of the evening. Questions were raised as to the programs which the service provided for county residents. Many representatives of Home Demonstration groups were present -- they presented arguments in favor of retaining this segment of the Extension Service program.

Commissioner Woodhull stated that more state money would be necessary to fund essential services. He hoped the delegation would push for legislation placing the immediate burden of revenue raising at the state level.

The hearing adjourned at 8:45 P.M.

At the post-hearing meeting of the Finance Committee we concurred with all previous revenue and expenditure estimates excepting those relative to the Mental Health Clinic. We cut this segment of the budget an additional 1,000 to 14,000. We made no recommendation relative to the budget request of the Extension Service. The meeting adjourned at 10:30 P.M.

Delegation members and County officials met at 11:00 A.M. for a tour of the recently completed ultra-modern addition to the hospital. At 12:30 P.M. a delicious turkey dinner was served by the Aherns.

The annual business meeting began at 1:30 P.M. with Chairman Frizzell presiding. Commissioner McCusker discussed the proposed county budget and Finance Committee Chairman Nahil revealed the recommendations of that group. After a thorough discussion with questions and answers, the 1971 budget was voted as follows:

- 1. On the motion of Shulins, seconded by Saggiotes, VOTED that \$36,500 be the amount of estimated revenue from the county farm and dairy.
- 2. On the motion of Shulins, seconded by Chase, VOTED that \$200 be the estimated revenue from the county jail.
- 3. On the motion of Saggiotes, seconded by Gaffney, VOTED that \$700,000 be the estimated revenue from the county hospital.
- 4. On the motion of Fleming, seconded by Chase, VOTED that the balance of estimated revenue anticipated for the fiscal year 1971, be made up as

follows:

- 6. On the motion of Chase, seconded by Shulins, VOTED that the sum of \$12,400 be raised and appropriated for County Officers' Salaries, to be allocated as follows:

- 9. On the motion of Gaffney, seconded by Shulins, VOTED that the sum of \$7,522 be raised and appropriated for expenses of Register of Probate.
- 10. On the motion of Rousseau, seconded by Saggiotes, VOTED that the sum of \$8,000 be raised and appropriated for the care and supplies for the Court House and Records Building.
- 11. On the motion of Campbell, seconded by Burrows, VOTED that the sum of \$69,200 be raised and appropriated for expenses of Superior Court, to be allocated as follows:

- 18. On the motion of Townsend, seconded by Gaffney, VOTED that the sum of \$5,000 be raised and appropriated for all other payments.
- 19. On the motion of Shulins, seconded by Burrows, VOTED that the sum of \$27,537.50 be raised and appropriated for the Cooperative Extension Service.
- 20. On the motion of Spaulding, seconded by Chase, VOTED that the sum of \$15,659 be raised and appropriated for insurance.
- 21. On the motion of Williamson, seconded by Nahil, VOTED that the sum of \$40,850 be raised and appropriated for employees' retirement and social security.
- 22. On the motion of Shulins, seconded by Chase, VOTED that no funds be raised and appropriated for Delegation Expense.

- 23. On the motion of Rousseau, seconded by Nahil, VOTED that the sum of \$100 be raised and appropriated for Civil Defense.
- 24. On the motion of Gaffney, seconded by Rousseau, VOTED that the sum of \$1,532,965.10 be the total budget of Sullivan County for fiscal year 1971 and the amount necessary to be raised by taxation is to be the sum of \$734,461.10.

Delegation members present were: Chairman Frizzell, Townsend, Spaulding, Flint, Chase, Fleming, Burrows, Williamson, Shulins, Nahil, Rousseau, Gaffney, Campbell, Saggiotes, and Downing. Thirteen other interested citizens were present including Commissioners McCusker and Bascom.

Rep. Nahil made a motion relative to granting an increase (January '72) in salary to the Register of Deeds. This was seconded by Williamson. The motion was laid on the table for discussion at a future delegation meeting.

Rep. Spaulding made a motion that a 3-member committee (to be appointed by the Chairman) be created to report to the delegation on the feasibility of taking part in the acquisition of recreation areas. Shulins seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

Rep. Campbell made a motion that the Commissioners include a separate budget "for each request for funds which are not a part of the operation of the county government." (Salaries, travel and other necessary expenses). Saggiotes seconded the motion which passed after a brief discussion.

The meeting adjourned at 4:20 P.M.

Public Hearing On HB 740 (Friday, April 23, 1971)

The meeting was opened at 7:20 P.M. in the Probate Court Room. Those present included Frizzell, Spaulding, Barrows, Burrows, Campbell, Gaffney, Rousseau, D'Amante, Saggiotes, and Nahil.

The chairman recognized Rep. James Saggiotes who sponsored the bill at the request of Com. Richard McCusker, the County Sheriff, his Deputy, and the County Treasurer.

Proposed salary increases:

Commissioners	\$1,800 each	to	\$ 3,500
Treasurer	500	to	1,000
Sheriff	8,000	to	11,000
Deputy Sheriff	5,000	to	8,000

Commissioners. County-Attorney Tenney spoke for pay raises for the Commissioners, Sheriff, and Deputies. Commissioner McCusker spoke for the

Sheriff who was out of town and unable to attend. Former Commissioner Vincent Perkins also spoke in favor of the raises. Deputy Sheriff Paul LeClair stated that his weekly take-home salary was only \$67.38, and that he does not have Blue Cross-Blue Shield. Register of Deeds, LaForge, now receives \$7,000 yearly -- she would like a 20% increase in pay. An amendment will be drawn up in the near future relative to increasing her pay as of January 1, 1972.

Speaking in opposition to the bill was former Commissioner Alfred Pearce -- He stated that he got \$900 for the job. This salary was subsequently raised to \$1,200. He felt that the Commissioners should not get any raise.

Jack Weiner, Claremont Councilman, stated that he was not opposed to the increase for Sheriffs, but he did not feel that the Commissioners' raise was warranted. John Sumner, another Claremont Councilman, stated that Merrimack County was increasing its Commissioners' salaries to \$2,250. He proposed a \$2,100 salary for Sullivan County's Commissioners. He approved the proposed raises for the Sheriffs and Treasurer but opposed the increase for the Register of Deeds. Sidney Clarke, stated that Claremont gives a cost of living increase -- he favored an increase for the Deputy Sheriff only. Donald Clarke went along with Sumner's suggestions.

Speaking a second time was proponent Woodhull and opponents Sumner and Donald Clarke.

The meeting adjourned at 8:50 P.M. The delegation will meet in Concord on Wednesday, May 5th for an Executive Session to take a final vote on House Bill 740.

Many functions and operations of various departments have been streamlined and modern office equipment added, thus allowing for greater efficiency. This will also reflect additional savings in future years.

In the coming year the Commissioners will seek approval for construction of an additional floor on the hospital to provide 42 more beds, making a total capacity for 194 patients.

The Commissioners wish to thank all their dedicated employees for assisting us in our efforts.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Honorable Board of County Commissioners:

It is a pleasure to submit our annual report on the operation of the county institution.

This was the first full year of operation in our expanded facility and we are very pleased with the way it has functioned. We have been filled to capacity at all times and we have a lengthy waiting list.

Our new sewerage plant which will help to improve the environment has been in service since August. Our parking area has been expanded and is giving us more room for parking.

The farming operation is steadily improving. The new silos have been erected and are providing excellent feed for the herd as well as helping to cut the grain cost. Milk production is increasing which has resulted in a greater financial return.

With the assistance of ASC a farm pond was completed for further fire protection and irrigation of crops.

Our House of Correction and Jail population has shown a steady increase. The present correctional facility is very inadequate for holding men waiting for court and for those who have been sentenced. The Governor's Commission on Crime and Corrections recommended that more custodial personnel be provided for the facility. We have provided for this in our 1972 Budget. Through the Manpower Emergency Employment Act we were able to secure the services of Mr. William Potter to fill the position of Supervisor of Corrections. This has enabled us to provide greater flexibility in rehabilitation efforts.

During the year we had many donations and gifts for which we are grateful and appreciative — so many that it would be impossible to mention them all by name. We do want to especially thank the Claremont lKiwanis for furnishing a room in the Stearns building and the Claremont Lions Club for the outdoor shuffle board which required so many hours of hand labor. The Mary E. Holland Memorial Fund was established this year and the money will be used for equipment in the Stearns Building.

Once again we want to express our thanks and appreciation to our County Commissioners for the help and understanding given to us during the year, our Sheriff and his deputies; our County Attorney; Dr. Stearns, our Chief of Staff; Mrs. Waldo, our Director of Nursing Services, and her competent staff; our Chaplains and other members of the Clergy, and all our personnel who make the operation of this facility possible.

January 1, 1972

To the Commissioners of Sullivan County:

I was very pleased to know that it has been suggested that a third floor be added to Stearns Building and it is being contemplated. I know this will fill a great need for hospitalization of so many of our applicants who are not on the waiting list. I hope to see this accomplished within the next year.

During the year we had 51 admissions and 10 discharges. In the same period we had 38 deaths.

Once again, Mrs. Brenner, Claremont General Hospital Lab Technician, has done a great job doing lab work on our patients.

Many thanks, too, to our Medical Consultant, Dr. Albert Miyara, and our Surgical Consultant, Dr. Robert Maxfield. We are hoping to use Dr. Miyara's new colleague, Dr. Mario Alvarez, a heart specialist, to consult with us on our cardiac patients.

I want to thank the County Commissioners, Mr. and Mrs. Ahern, and Mrs. Waldo and her nursing staff for their fine cooperation. It has been a pleasure to serve with them.

THE SULLIVAN COUNTY MENTAL HEALTH ASSOCIATION

To the Commissioners of Sullivan County:

December 31, 1971

The Sullivan County Mental Health Clinic entered its fifth year of operation with continuing restrictions on the services it could offer to County residents. Both the State and County funding had to be reduced from the previous year due to serious limitations of, and other important demands for, their available resources. These budget reductions were somewhat offset financially by the lack of available candidates for a Clinic staff vacancy, which was not filled until June of 1971.

Despite these staff and budgetary restrictions the two-member staff continued to meet, on a minimal and expedient basis, the constantly increasing requests for evaluation, treatment and consulation from all areas of the County.

During the Spring of 1971, the Clinic Director worked with the Dartmouth-Hitchcock Mental Health Center to make plans to collaborate in an alcohol treatment program to be funded on a two-year basis by Federal grant funds to be awarded the Dartmouth-Hitchcock Center. This permitted the Clinic to recruit in October, 1971, an additional staff member to be the Sullivan County liaison on the project and to work with the Sullivan County Clinic to share the case load of the Clinic's many patients with alcoholic problems. In addition to working with individual Clinic patients, this new staff member is planning to work with various industries in the area, with the County House of Correction and with other community agencies to set up group programs related to problems of alcoholism.

In the last three months of 1971, with the regular three staff positions filled, and with the additional alcohol project social worker, the Clinic has been able to eliminate the large backlog of cases waiting for services, and to handle the 15 to 30 new referrals that are received each month. At the conclusion of approximately five years of operation, the Clinic with a professional staff of two or three members at most, has given direct service to 1 out of every 12 families in the County, as well as indirect service through consultation to many others.

There is an increasing awareness by the Clinic and the community of the crucial need for more indirect services for emotionally disturbed children and adults, such as increased consultation to the schools, follow-up care for Clinic patients through a corps of volunteers trained and supervised by the Clinic staff, and for a more adequate supportive and rehabilitative program for ex-hospitalized patients returning to the community. These programs have a high priority in plans for providing more adequate mental health services to Sullivan County.

The year 1971 was a very busy one for the Sheriff's Department. Also a year of expansion with the installation of a county wide radio system with the base station on top of 1,600 foot Glidden Hill in Unity. This system gives the Jail and House of Correction instant communication with the sheriffs office and police departments. The cost of the communication system was \$14,315.00 of which the Federal Government paid \$10,736.25. The County's share was \$3,578.75.

I would like to thank Frank Chellis of the Meriden Telephone Company for his generous help in installing the connecting link from the Jail to the transmitting tower.

Breaking and entering increased considerably this past year especially in the rural areas. This would indicate the need of the Sheriff's Department having a night patrol to help protect the residents in these areas. This is being investigated to see if funds are available from the Federal Government.

I Wish to express my thanks to the Commissioners and their staff for their cooperation and also thank my deputies for the efficient discharge of their duties.

REPORT OF COUNTY ATTORNEY

The Commissioners of Sullivan County Newport New Hampshire

Gentlemen:

The following is my report to you as Sullivan County Attorney as required by New Hampshire Statutes Annotated and concerns the matters handled by this office during the year 1971.

During 1971 this office handled a total of eighty-three felonies, which included two homicide matters one of which occurred on January 2nd, 1971 and has already been disposed of, the other occurred on April 4th, 1971 and is pending at this time.

We also have twenty-four other felony matters pending. This office also handled many misdemeanor matters for the police departments in this county and we have three pending misdemeanors at this time, we also handled thirty-four appeals from the district and municipal courts in this county and at this date have sixteen pending appeals which will be heard during the February 1972 Term of Superior Court.

This office also initiated sixty-two reciprocal support matters and this office was also called upon to handle numerous reciprocal matters which were initiated in states other than the State of New Hampshire; we also handled three civil matters for the county. This office was also involved in one extradition matter involving four respondents and this extradition matter was on behalf of the State of Vermont.

In addition to Court work, I was called to the scene of several fatal accidents, one suicide and several untimely deaths.

In totaling up the hours spent on County Attorney business, I was amazed to learn that I had devoted approximately five hurdred hours to County Attorney matters, and it is also obvious that more time is going to be devoted to the office of County Attorney in the future as crime is on the increase, most certainly.

I find the position of County Attorney very interesting and I have enjoyed my first year in office, and I wish to thank all with whom I have comein contact, both law enforcement officers and county officials, for their fine cooperation. cooperation.
