THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Troy in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in the Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in Said Town on Tuesday, the 13th of March, next at 10:00 in the forenoon for balloting upon matters specified in Article 1, listed below, and you are hereby further notified to meet at the Troy Elementary School on Wednesday, the 14th day of March next at 7:30 PM to act upon the remainder of the listed Warrant.

Article 1. To bring in your votes for one Selectman for three years, and for all other town officers elected by ballot, as passed by Town Meeting, or State Statute for the specified number of years.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to provide Workers' Compensation coverage for eligible employees by participating in the New Hampshire Municipal Association Self-Funded Workers' Compensation Program commencing July 1, 1979, and to authorize the Selectmen to take such action in furtherance of this vote as may be necessary.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the following Town expenditures for the ensuing year.

- a. Town Officers' salaries - \$16,200.
- b. Town Officers' expenses - \$6,500.
- c. Election and Registrations - \$1,000.
- d. Town Hall - \$5,500.
- e. Parks - \$700.
- f. Vital Statistics - \$100.
- g. Insurance - \$13,000.
- h. Social Security - \$10,500.
- i. Shade Trees - \$100
- j. Interest - Temporary Loans - \$5,000.
- k. Memorial Day - \$500.
- l. Town Dump - \$10,000.
- m. Street Lighting - \$13,500.
- n. Legal Fees - \$2,500.
- o. Planning Board - \$600.
- p. Civil Defense - \$1,100.
- q. Reassessment Update - \$750.
- r. Conservation Commission - \$100.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,600. for the dog officer.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$50,000. for highway summer and winter maintenance.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$454.04 to which the State will contribute \$3,026.92 if voted and accepted, for the construction of Class V roads.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000. for use by the Troy Summer Arts Festival Committee. Of this, \$500. will be an art grant from the State of New Hampshire and \$500. in matching funds from the town. This will be the second annual festival held on Troy Common.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$16,775. for the support of the Fire Department.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$37,500. for the support of the Police Department.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$4,200. for the District Nurses Association.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$19,640. for the Water Department.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$15,000. for the Water Department to drill a well.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote and appropriate \$6,500. for the continuation of the War Memorial Program.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$4,800. for the Gay-Kimball Library.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,700. for the care of the cemeteries. \$2,700. to come from the Trust Funds.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote \$12,500. for Old Age Assistance and Public Welfare.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote \$385. for the support of the Monadnock Regional Association.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote \$850. for the support of the Monadnock Family & Mental Health Service.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,311.72 for the studies and operation of the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500. for the support of Meadowood County Area Fire Department.

Article 21. To see if the Town will appropriate \$1,500. for the support and wellbeing of the Meadowood County Area Fire Department. (By petition.)

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum \$6,131.64 to be withdrawn from the payment made by the State of New Hampshire from the Special Highway Subsidy Fund for the purpose of construction and reconstruction of Class IV and Class V highways within the town or take any action relating thereto.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$5,000. for an independent audit of financial statements conducted for the purpose of determining compliance with the Revenue Sharing Law and applicable regulations as required by HR13367, Section 123C for all towns that receive over \$25,000. in Federal Revenue Sharing Funds and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 as amended.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$15,000. for the purchase of a backhoe to be used by all departments and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 as amended.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$3,000. for the War Memorial Recreational Program and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 as amended.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$2,500. to supplement the budget of the Library and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 as amended.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$3,000. for Town Hall repairs and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 as amended.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$2,000. to complete the expansion of the Fire Department and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and

Local Assistance Act of 1972 as amended.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$2,000. to continue a program for the elderly and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 as amended.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 as amended for the Capital Reserve Funds for the following specific purposes and in the amounts indicated herewith or take any other action hereon:

- a. Fire Department \$5,000.
- b. Highway Department \$5,000.
- c. Police Department \$1,000.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to reassess the Town in 1986 or before, whenever property values indicate that such action is necessary in the opinion of the Selectmen.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500. for the Town Reassessment Capital Reserve Fund and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the Provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 as amended.

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$650. to cover the cost of a soil survey of the Town of Troy. The Selectmen are hereby authorized to administer these funds.

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$45,000. for use in the CETA Program to which the Federal government will contribute \$45,000. as an offset.

Article 35. To see if the Town will vote to accept the extension of Longmeadow Drive.

Article 36. To see if the Town will vote to accept for the Conservation Commission, 1.08 acres from Francis Boufford. The property is located on either side of the Boston and Maine Railroad and abuts the old dam site on the Ashuelot River at the corner of Route 12 and Old Keene Road.

Article 37. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to administer the Town property on the side of Perkins Pond as a conservation area.

Article 38. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept and expend any gifts, grants, legacies or devises offered the Town.

Article 39. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for Federal funds with the assistance of the New Hampshire Department of Resources and Economic Development.

Article 40. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money to pay charges and the interest thereon.

Article 41. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell tax deeded property in compliance with the latest changes made by the 1977 legislature.

Article 42. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to appoint a deputy treasurer as provided in RSA 41:29A.

Article 43. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enact an ordinance to establish safety rules and inspection of bicycles.

Article 44. To hear reports of committees, agents or officers heretofore chosen and take any action relative.

We are grateful for contributions of books and magazines received particularly from Mr. John C. Callahan Sr., Mr. and Mrs. Ervin Doyle, Chris Johnson, who has also been regularly volunteering his services, and Mrs. Cindy Patnaude as well as from those of you who made anonymous donations. Thanks are also due to the several libraries who have given us material and services. Mrs. Lynn (Robert) Smith discontinued the preschool story hour because of poor attendance. Many thanks to her and Mrs. Dorothy (Iver) Olsen who often read to the children. We miss Mrs. Peggy (Floyd) Huckins, but are happy to have Mrs. Darcy (Ervin) Doyle as our new Library Aide.

Troy was the most represented town at the New Hampshire Conference on Library and Information Services held in September. Similar groups met across the nation preliminary to the White House Conference scheduled for the fall of 1979 in Washington. Mr. John C. Callahan Sr. was one of the five interested citizens. His report to the board and librarian about the proceedings and content was most valuable. Other delegates were Miss Kim Daniels, Mr. Bill Lymberg, Mr. Lee Neugent and Sally Lymberg who was on the Citizen's Planning Committee.

Vandalism was a problem. Volunteer monitor-pages are needed for the Howe-Haskell room since the librarian on duty must cover the desk upstairs and can't be in two places at one time.

The card catalog was revised for easier patron use. All the remaining children's fiction was removed from the non-fiction and re-shelved in a lower bookcase with easier to reach shelves in the general fiction room. The non-fiction collection is completely separate and the reference section includes some new one-volume encyclopedias on energy and environmental sciences among other subjects. There is a study table next to it to make homework and other tasks easier. Some younger patrons have begun to use our library more extensively to supplement school material that is not available to them otherwise in the evening hours.

REPORT OF THE TROY WATER WORKS

This past year the Water Board hired Layne-New England Co. to run tests in search of a site for a new gravel well, around the area of the main water line. Two tests were conducted. At the first site the company ran into bedrock which ended the test at this site. On the second site water was found but at a low rate of flow and of poor quality. Layne advised the Water Board to look elsewhere in Troy for a gravel well site.

Due to the high cost of developing a gravel packed well the Water Board is asking for funds to drill a rock well. During the summer and winter months the Water Department has found that the reservoir is not meeting the town's water use. This year we have found it necessary to run the well during the winter months to supplement the reservoir.

The Troy Fire Department is made up of a membership of 33 men and five pieces of equipment.

- (1) 1957 Willys (Army surplus) pick up

Old man winter has taken his toll on our fire alarm system this year and we have had R. B. Allen Company replacing much of the old wiring around the common. This area has been a problem spot for the past few years.

For more than a year members of the department have been sponsoring the Saturday morning breakfast at the fire station. We wish to express our thanks to you for supporting them and invite those of you who have not found the time to drop in some morning.

The building addition is well underway and should be completed late this spring if the weather will cooperate. It is a 20 by 70 foot cement block addition to the rear of the building. When completed the department will have a much needed storage room and two double bay apparatus room. This will make it safer for the firemen and less chance of damaging our apparatus when responding to emergency calls. Some additional funds will be needed to complete the project and we will be requesting them at town meeting.

Our special thanks to Mr. Henry Rantilla who gave up many of his weekends this past fall assisting us with the addition.

From the time man first discovered fire it has been one of his best tools and one of the most dangerous. Fire prevention is everyone job, not just the fire departments. Plan now what your family should do if a fire broke out in your home.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

During the past year, it should be noted that there has been no new outbreaks of crime in Troy. This situation is not a result of law enforcement merely reacting to incidents, rather it is the result of intense, time consuming and constant law enforcement by this town's police department.

Given the current economic situation, it is natural that demands for emergency and safety services increase, along with many types of criminal incidents. In order to function effectively within this atmosphere, the police department needs the assistance of the town's residents. One way to accomplish this is to be certain that calls made to the police department should be of a police nature; other calls should be made to the appropriate persons or departments.

We also must remember that our town does not have 24 hour coverage. There are 2 full time officers who fill 2 shifts during the day, totaling 16 hour/day coverage. The part time officer fills the open shifts, as the 2 full time officers (myself included) cannot work 7 days/week.

As chief of this department, I feel we have an excellent police department and in the 2 years I have been here, no police officer has left the department; this gives the town experienced law enforcement officers and therefore, the town realizes the maximum amount of services for their tax dollars. The full and part time officers are an integral part of this town's safety services and this needs to be recognized.

In summary, I feel the previous year was successful as far as police work and law enforcement is concerned; our yearly statistics are as follows:

PUBLIC WELFARE DEPARTMENT

The budget for this department remains difficult to control. The State determines who may receive welfare and sets guide lines for welfare officers to follow. It is impossible to predict how many people will apply for aid in the coming year.

During the past year, all those who were genuinely in need were given assistance until their difficulty had passed or they were transferred to a County, State or Federal program. Able-bodied young men applying for welfare were offered temporary jobs with the Town road crew. Jobs in private industry were found for several women applying for aid.

Twenty-five families were given aid totaling \$4,490.58.

Payments to the State for the Town's share of Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, Old Age Assistance and nursing care amounted to \$3,948.29.

Wages, paid from welfare funds, to those who worked on the Town road crew were \$364.38.

Advances given to people in need, mostly to purchase fuel totaled \$564.48.

Two refunds were received from people who received aid, one for \$238.00, the other for \$206.00.

Total expenditure for the year was \$8,926.73.

WATER POLLUTION CONTROL FACILITIES
REPORT OF PROGRESS

The design of water pollution control facilities for Troy has been completed by the Edward C. Jordan Company and is currently under final review by the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission.

Facilities for the Town of Troy now include five separate construction contracts which are as follows:

Contract 1	Treatment Plant
Contract 2	Pump Station
Contract 3	Interceptor Sewers
Contract 4	Collector Sewers
Contract 5	Collector Sewers

The final project cost has been estimated to be 6 million dollars. The total project cost presented to the town in 1976 was estimated to be in the order of 3 million dollars. Increased project costs reflect a number of elements, some of which are: construction cost escalation, expanded facilities at the treatment plant resulting from a detailed analysis of the treatment requirements and large quantities of rock excavation that will be required as part of the interceptor and collector sewer design.

The town's share of project costs is now estimated to be \$1,660,000 after EPA and State funding as compared to \$840,000 anticipated in 1976. In addition to the EPA and state funding an application has been made for Farmers Home Administration funding. The amount of Farmers Home Administration funding is variable and dependent on available funds; however, this funding could be sufficient to reduce local costs to the level anticipated in 1976.

At the present time due to limitations of Federal Funds the Troy projects have been set back to fiscal 1980 so that advertising for construction will probably not take place until fall or winter of this year with a spring 1980 construction start.

Selectmen are in constant contact with Congressman James C. Cleveland and Senator John Durkin to secure the above mentioned grants.

1920-1978

Our fifty-eighth year shows changes due to resignations of personnel and volunteers, a new surveyor/consultant for the medicare program, a new clinic and meetings of the Directors and committees.

The Home Health Agency Task Force gave us a deadline as to whether or not we wanted to join with them. Because no specifics could be given, mainly financially, we voted NO but to keep in touch with the progress of the Task Force.

Three immunization clinics were held in the spring and attendance was comparable to last year. The W.I.C. clinics proved worthwhile, also the Flu Clinic that was held in the fall. We also help financially for the dental clinic held each year.

In July a retirement party was given for Janet Smith, our agency nurse for eight years. She was presented a gift and sum of money. A good representation of friends from Fitzwilliam and Troy attended.

In May we received our certification as we were fortunate in finding a substitute nurse and finished updating policies. Then in July, Janet Smith resigned. We offered the vacancy to Marjorie Letourneau and she accepted only to have to resign after four months. She upgraded the charting and set goals for the agency and herself. This left us without a substitute and part time nurse again. Luck was with us and the vacancy for the part-time nurse was filled by a Troy resident.

Ina Clark and Marjorie Letourneau, R.N., represented the T.V.N.A. at the Health Fair in October along with other area agencies.

The Concerned Citizens Group purchased a new answering service for our office. Thank you for a much needed item.

Our programs for the year have been two speakers. Carla Kirsh of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Services of Keene spoke on "Constructive Aging," held at East Hill Farm. Susan Ashworth of Cheshire Senior Services spoke on "Meals on Wheels."

During the year other resignations were turned in and vacancies have not been filled. Two of these need to be filled plus a substitute nurse, in order to keep our certification for the medicare coverage.

We were able to give financial aid to a child in town for

dental work through the money from our food sales.

The health services are changing worldwide; therefore, our nurses have attended professional meetings and programs to keep up with the current changes. She provides skilled nursing care to all individuals who request and need services as well as being familiar with the area health resources and ways to use them. She assists in the medical care prescribed by the attending physician.

Fees are collected through the patients and for their insurance coverage. The fee is twelve dollars for home visits and four dollars for an office visit. In instances where the patient has no source of payment, there is no charge. Troy visits were 450, a decrease, while Fitzwilliam visits were 425, an increase.

Officers for the year are President, Dorothy E. Graham; Vice President, Lynn Eaton; Secretary, Barbara Larrabee (Resigned); Treasurer, Peter Breen; Board of Directors are Katherine Chase, Ina Clark, Winonia Girourd, Delores Vose, and Gloria Beaudoin (resigned).

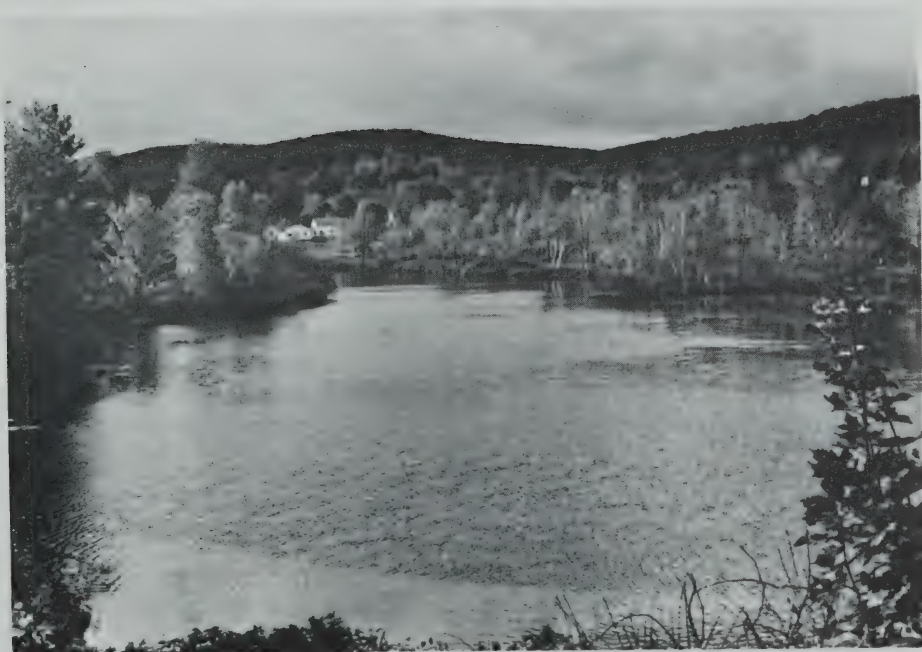
The Troy War Memorial Committee thanks Troy Mills for their continued interest and valuable assistance in this program. This year they built the new dock and donated other much needed supplies.

Once again it is time to take a few moments of your time and bring you up to date on the progress of your ambulance.

April of 1979 will close our fourth year of service to you. I feel that it has been a very trying but successful four years for a very dedicated group of volunteers.

We have gained confidence, experience, talent, and maturity in our short history. We have kept our promises to you by always being there when needed. In order to do this, a brief look behind the curtain is necessary. Education is a must - and each individual member is responsible for keeping an up-to-date education. Dedication is a must - for only a true desire to help others is the reward. Co-operation and meetings is a must - as only thru talking and understanding comes success, and finally, last but not least, you the people, are a must - for without your faith and support, your ambulance would not be in existence.

We are nearing the 600 mark in free, volunteer calls and most of these were answered in less than three minutes, in rain, snow and freezing weather conditions. Our service is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

The first term of office was to be six months (this was later extended two months to put the organization on the calendar year, and is now a yearly term of office). The fourth Wednesday of each month was picked as the time we were to meet.

Officers chosen at our May meeting were: Maurice Clark, president; Lynn Eaton, vice-president; Yvonne Matson, treasurer; and Beatrice Merrifield, secretary. A program committee was appointed, consisting of Alice Morrison, chairman; Ella and Herbert Sundholm, Winona Girouard and Ann Lagrenade. We are indebted to this committee for planning such fine special events, as dinner at Bob's Lunch (attendance 70), picnic at the Sundholm's (official attendance 101), bus tour to Bennington, Vt. (39), dinner at East Hill Farm (122). Also, we had a Christmas party at East Hill Farm (52), and Christmas baskets were delivered to shut-ins.

One high light was the Boston Post Cane presentation, by selectmen John Tyler and William Matson, to Mrs. Bertha Goodnow, Troy's oldest citizen, at the picnic.

A By-Laws committee, consisting of Charles McGinness, Sigrid Tuure, Vera Hurd, Minnie Caron, and Wilho Matson, have drawn up By-Laws, some of which need final action at the writing of this report.

We are incorporated with the State of N. H., Sept. 1, 1978, Volume 913, page 447; but to the best of my knowledge had not received charitable status with the Internal Revenue Office at the end of my term of office. The 1979 officers are: Alice Morrison, President; Lynn Eaton, vice-president; Yvonne Matson, treasurer; Ina Clark, secretary.

There are so many that I cannot name them all, but I give my thanks to all those who made our first year a success. All the people who worked so hard, particularly the volunteer refreshment committees who provided goodies for every meeting. The speakers from the Retired Senior Volunteer program, Vista, Legal and N. H. Association for the Elderly, Cheshire Senior Services, Bob Harkins (who demonstrated first aid for choking and cardiac pulmonary resuscitation). Also, for the

advice given me by the Winchester and Keene Senior Citizens groups. Last, but not least, thanks to the Selectmen, Fire Department, and East Hill Farm, who helped us so much.

There is much more that we can do but we have made more progress than I believed possible when we started. Many of us think that this organization is the best thing for the benefit of seniors in our town since Social Security and Medicare, and is a lot more fun.
