To the Inhabitants of the Town of Tuftonboro in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Tuftonboro Town House in said Tuftonboro on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, next at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

It is anticipated that the meeting will proceed at that time with Article 1; with the remaining articles adjourned until 8:00 P.M. of that day at the Tuftonboro School.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To see if the Town will vote to approve of having 2 sessions for the annual town meeting in this town, the first session for choice of town officers elected by an official ballot and other action required to be inserted on said official ballot and the second session, on a date set by the selectmen, for transaction of other business.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to appoint a Deputy Treasurer with the compensation of such Deputy Treasurer established by the Selectmen until the next Town Meeting following approval.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector, with the approval of the Selectmen, to appoint a Deputy Tax Collector with the compensation of such Deputy Tax Collector established by the Selectmen until the next Town Meeting following approval.

5. To see if the Town will vote to go on record in support of immediate action by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of Tuftonboro and to the health and welfare of the people of Tuftonboro.

These actions shall include:

- 1. Reduce by at least half the major cause of acid rain, sulfur dioxide emissions, by the year 1990.
- 2. Conclude negotiations and adopt a treaty with the government of Canada that will commit both nations to this same goal.

The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation and to the President of the United States. This article was submitted by Petition. 6. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the action taken at Town Meeting of March 8, 1982 authorizing the Selectman to sell to PAK 2000 a portion of a parcel of land including five acres more or less, belonging to the Town located in the Mirror Lake section of Tuftonboro, to north of, and abutting, property held by PAK 2000.

7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell a landlocked portion of a parcel of land including five acres more or less, abutting property of PAK 2000 and/or Beatrice R. & Roy L. Johnson at public auction or by advertised sealed bids, authorizing the Selectmen to determine the minimum amount for which the property will be sold and the terms and conditions of the sale. The proceeds of sale are to be deposited in a special account and to be expended only by vote of the Town upon recommendation by the Selectmen and Budget Committee.

8. To see if the Town will vote to have the Appraisal Division of the Department of Revenue Administration or a private firm conduct a complete revaluation of all taxable properties in the Town starting in 1983 or thereafter, and to establish a Capital Reserve Fund of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) representing a portion of the cost of conducting such revaluation and to appoint the Selectmen as agents to administer the fund. This was not recommended by a majority of the Budget Committee.

9A. To see if the Town will vote to defer the publication of a complete listing of taxpayers' names and assessed valuations until a revaluation of all taxable property in the Town has been completed.

9B. If Part A of this article is not approved, to see if the Town wil vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) for the publication in 1983 of a complete listing of taxpayers' names and assessed valuations.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500.00) as recommended by the Budget Committee for data processing services and to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a contract with a Data Processing firm or with the Department of Centralized Data Processing for the maintenance of fiscal or other records. Such contract shall include but not be limited to the provisions of RSA 8-C:11.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) for interest charges, as recommended by the Budget Committee, and authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of collection of taxes for the current year and issue notes therefore. Said notes to be repaid from taxes.

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of Eleven Thousand Dollars (\$11,000.00) from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provision of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, for

use of purchasing a new radio system and equipment for the Tuftonboro Fire Department. This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.

13. To see is the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fourteen Thousand Dollars (\$14,000.00) for rebuilding and repairing of the docking area along the Melvin River. This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to retain the unexpended portion of its 1983 appropriations. Such funds to be placed in a special conservation fund in accordance with RSA 36-A:5.

15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same, the sum of Three Hundred Sixty-five Thousand Five Hundred Eighty and no/100 Dollars (\$365,580.00) as recommended by the Budget Committee, plus additional sums as may be required to cover the costs of additional items voted at the meeting and in accordance with RSA 32:8.

16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to grant a thirty feet by thirty feet ($30' \times 30'$) easement on land owned by the Town on Rte 109A between the Library and school playground to the New England Telephone Company. This is for the purpose of placing electronic pair gain system known as a Subscriber Loop Carrier to provide additional telephone facilities and for future growth. The New England Telephone Company has agreed to pay the Town Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) and to fence the area if easement is granted.

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

The Moderator announced the results of the School Ballot, Moderator George Walker 415; School Board Member at Large John A. Redmond 204, Peter D. Shulman 159; School Board Member-Tuftonboro Ellen Laase 287; School Board Member-New Durham Joanne Murphy 171, Donald Scott 173. These results are sent to the Clerk of the Gov. Wentworth School District.

The Moderator announced the results of the votes on Article Nine;

Number One required 2/3 vote therefore did not pass; Number Two and Three passed by a majority vote.

2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Ninety-Eight and 92/100 Dollars (\$798.92) for Town Road Aid as approved by the Budget Committee. The State will contribute Five Thousand Three Hundred Twenty-six and 14/100 Dollars (\$5,326.14).

The motion was made by Dan Lewis and seconded by Thad Coleman to adopt article two as read. Voice vote in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Fifty-three and 37/100 Dollars (\$7,053.37) as approved by the Budget Committee, and authorize its withdrawal from State Highway Subsidy (Chapter 241 Section 14 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended). This money is to be applied to maintenance, construction, or reconstruction, of Class V highways in the Town.

The motion was made by Don Linnell and seconded by Lincoln Page to adopt article three as read. Voice vote in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator. 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Six Hundred seventy-five and 82/100 Dollars (\$7,675.82), (estimated), as approved by the Budget Committee, and authorize its withdrawal from State Additional Highway subsidy (Chapter 241, Section 15 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended). This money may be used only for construction, or reconstruction of Class V highways in Town.

The motion was made by Dan Lewis and seconded by Thad Coleman to adopt article four as read. Voice vote in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fourteen Thousand and 00/100 Dollars (\$14,000.00) for interest charges, as approved by the Budget Committee, and authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of collection of taxes for the current year and issue notes therefor, said notes to be repaid from taxes.

The motion was made by Dan Lewis and seconded by Thad Coleman to adopt article five as read. Voice vote in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of Nine Thousand and 00/100 Dollars (\$9,000.00) from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, for use of puchasing a Police Cruiser. This item has the approval of the Budget Committee.

The motion was made by Mark Leone and seconded by Don Linnell to adopt article six as read. Unanimous voice vote in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty Thousand and 00/100 Dollars (\$60,000.00) for renovations and repairs to Town House as approved by the Budget Committee. Said Sixty Thousand Dollars to be raised by borrowing and to issue notes therefor, said notes to be repaid from taxes in the fiscal years of 1982, 1983, and 1984. And further to see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand and 00/100 (\$3,000.00) to pay interest on said notes for the year 1982.

The motion was made by Thad Coleman and seconded by Potter Campbell to adopt article seven as read. Thad Coleman gave an explanation of the renovations to be done at the Town House; reason being to consolidate all town officers in one place, and a vault for the safety of records, as this was to be paid for by the issuance of notes the article required a 2/3 vote to pass. Vote was by paper ballot. There were 188 votes cast; necessary for passage 125. There were 107 Yes votes and 81 No votes. The article was defeated and so declared by the Moderator.

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell PAK 2000 a portion of a parcel of land, including five acres more or less, belonging to the Town, located in the Mirror Lake Section of Tuftonboro,

to the north of, and abutting, property held by PAK 2000. This item is on the Warrant by Voter Petition.

The motion was made by Susan Ramsbotham and seconded by Marsha Hunter to adopt article eight as read. Permission was granted by the Moderator to Peter Roessiger to address voters. He explained the intent of PAK 2000 with regards this article. Clarence Flint made the motion and it was seconded by John Gribbel to table article eight indefinitely. This motion to table was defeated by a voice vote in the negative and so declared by the Moderator. This article by petition presented to the Selectmen was to be voted on by paper ballot, with a majority to pass. There were 195 votes cast; 113 Yes and 82 No. Article was declared passed by the Moderator.

9. To determine what action the Town will take on the Amendments to the Zoning Ordinances prepared by the Planning Board. The Amendments to the Zoning Ordinances will appear in the form of questions on the Official Town Ballot.

The following three (3) amendments are a complete list of all proposed changes and will be on file and available at the Office of the Town Clerk and on the day of the Town Meeting, will be available for inspection at the Town House:

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #1 as submitted by Petition for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows?

Amendment No. 1 Article VI - To Amend Article VI of the zoning ordinance to add to the first sentence the following: "and the area on the east side of Rte 109 beginning 200 feet east of the center line of the highway, extending from the southeast corner of property now or formerly of Laase on the North to a stone wall marking the northern boundary of property now or formerly of Roger Johnson on the south an extending 2,000 feet." Does not have approval of Planning Board. This required a 2/3 vote.

Defeated Yes 163 No 295

Are you in favor of the Adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows?

Amendment No. 3 Article III-R-Special Exceptions-Certain uses of property may be permitted as Special Exceptions to the Zoning Ordinance as hereinafter stated. The Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA), prior to reaching a decision under this section, shall were practical, view the site of the proposed use. This viewing shall be a joint viewing by at least three members of the ZBA, and the applicant or his designated representative. The ZBA shall make a reasonable effort to notify abutters and others known to be directly interested in viewing.

1. The ZBA prior to granting an application for a special exception shall bear in mind the following conditions:

a) The specific site is an appropriate location for the proposed use.

- b) No factual evidence is presented that property values of adjacent or nearby properties will be adversely affected by the proposed use.
- c) The proposal shall not create any undue nuisance or unreasonable hazard. This shall include, but not be limited to, vehicular or pedestrian traffic considerations.
- d) The proposed use shall have been reviewed and given preliminary approval, subject to the ZBA's review, by the Planning Board.
- e) Approval of the proposed use shall not be unreasonably withheld, provided that the spirit of the provisions of this section has been met.
- f) Setbacks from roadways, property lines, streams or other potentially sensitive areas shall be dealt with individually by the ZBA. In no case shall these setbacks be less than those normally required in the zone involved without the prior granting of a variance.

2. Uses permitted by Special exception and their appurtenant conditions:

- a) Hotels, Motels and Restaurants in Zones 1 & 2:
- (1) The septic system shall be designed by, and the plans and specifications bear the seal of, a New Hampshire Registered Engineer. The septic system shall be approved by the N.H.W.S. and P.C.C. without the granting of waivers.

(2) Parking spaces shall be provided at the rate of at least one space for each three seats in a restaurant; one and one half spaces for each rental unit in a Hotel or Motel.

(3) Motels and Hotels shall be on lots containing a mimimum of 5000 square feet of land per rental unit.

b) Boathouses (zone 2)

(1) Shall comply with sideline setback requirements; Shore front setbacks shall not apply.

(2) Shall in no case be utilized for residential purposes.

(3) Abutters views, boat access, and use of property shall not be unduly affected.

(4) Applicable State or other permits shall, in general, be procured prior to application for Special Expection provided, however, that the ZBA may, in its discretion, grant approval conditional on the applicants subsequent receipt of said approvals.

c) Business usage outside Zone 3.

(1) Shall not involve the manufacture $_{\rm OT}$ disposal of hazardous waste products.

(2) Shall through screening and by the nature of the particular business blend harmoniously with the neighborhood.

d) Commercial Gravel of other Excavation or Mining.

(1) The provisions of R.S.A. 155-E shall be followed.

- 3. Planning Board review of proposed Special Exceptions
- a. The Planning Board shall review all applications for Special Exceptions prior to the review of the ZBA. The Planning Board shall complete its review within 35 days of its receipt of a completed application,

which receipt shall occur at a regular Planning Board Meeting. The Planning Board shall examine the application for conformance with the Town Plan, bearing in mind that a proposed use which directly conflicts with said plan is of more import that an omission of the proposed use in said plan. The Planning Board shall supply the ZBA with a written summary of its review of the application noting the preceding points, whether the proposed use conflicts with the ordinance, and any other matters the Planning Board feels are pertinent for the ZBA review.

Passed Yes 229 No 214

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows?

Amendment No. 4 Article V V.A. 3 Condominiums

- a) The provisions of Chapter 356-B "Condominium Act" of New Hampshire R.S.A. shall be incorporated in this ordinance when applicable. The applicant shall provide a sworn statement by the applicant, or by his counsel, to the effect that all applicable provisions of New Hampshire R.S.A. 356-B shall be complied with.
- V.B. 2 Lot and building requirements for Residential Condominium Units.
- a) There shall be a minimum of one half (1/2) acre for each condominium unit.
- b) There shall be a maximum of six (6) units per structure.
- c) Minimum frontage on a lake or pond shall be one hundred fifty (150) feet for the first two (2) units and twelve and one half $(12\frac{1}{2})$ feet for each additional unit.
- d) Any pre-existing non-conforming lot that can support a duplex residence without variance will be allowed up to two (2) condominium units.
- e) Lots not on a lake or pond shall have a minimum of two hundred (200) feet of frontage on a public road.
- f) Condominium structures containing residential units shall have a minimum setback of one hundred (100) feet from any lake or pond; thirty (30) feet from a road right of way; twenty five (25) feet from any other lot line.
- g) There shall be minimum of two (2) parking spaces per unit. There shall be no parking within the one hundred (100) feet water front setback. Provisions shall be made for adequate drainage. Applicant may be required to prove the safety and suitability of parking area layout and access as shown on plans.
- h) Sewage disposal systems for condominium subdivisions of four or more units shall be designed by a professional engineer licensed in the State of New Hampshire. Final approval of a proposed condominium subdivision by the Planning Board must be preceded by subdivision

approval from N.H. W. S. & P.C.C. (New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Commission).

i) Condominium conversions of existing structures shall conform with all applicable regulations.

Passed Yes 303 No 147

10. To see if the Town will vote to affirm, alter, or annul the following ordinances enacted during the past year, by the Selectmen, as authorized by Article 7 of the Town Warrant adopted at the annual Town Meeting on March 14, 1978.

1:1 Prohibit Dogs From Town-Owned Beach, Piers, and Docks

- In that the Town adopted Art. 4 at the annual Town Meeting on March 14, 1978 which "Prohibits dogs from town-owned beach, piers, and docks during the period from June 1 to October 1 each year. The penalty for this offense shall be the same as provided for in RSA 466:31a. Specifically, the offense shall consider the dog to be a "menace", thereby providing for a civil forfeiture of fifteen dollars (\$15.00) or otherwise disposed of as a violation in Wolfeboro District Court.
- 1:2 Unlicensed Dogs
- In addition to the provisions of RSA 466:4 any police officer, constable or dog warden may enforce RSA 466:1 by issuing such owner or keeper of an unlicensed dog on or after June 1 or any year a summons, whereby said owner or keeper shall within 96 hours cause such dog to be license, pay all accumulated late charges including a civil forfeiture of fifteen dollars (\$15.00) as provided in RSA 466:13. Otherwise, failure to comply with this provision shall cause the matter to be disposed of as a violation in Wolfeboro District Court.

3:1 Camping on Public Property

- It shall be unlawful to use any motor vehicle or trailer, including travel trailers, camper pickups, and the like for the purpose of camping, including sleeping overnight and/or the preparation of cooked meals, while such motor vehicle or trailer is parked on the highways or other public property of the Town of Tuftonboro. This does not prohibit picnic-type cook-outs.
- 2. It shall be unlawful to tent, camp, set-up or inhabit any camp site including kindling of any type fire upon any town owned property or upon private property with the exception of the land owner or those privileged to do so by the land owner without obtaining written consent of the land owner or his agent.

3:2 Alcoholic Beverages

The consumption of alcoholic beverages is prohibited on all property over which the Town of Tuftonboro has supervision and control.

PENALTY: Each offense in Article 3:1 and 3:2 shall constitute a violation and be punishable by a fine not to exceed One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00). This article was taken up and voted on by section. Section 1:1 Motion was made by Dan Lewis and seconded by Wm. Keyes to adopt section as read. Section 1:2 Motion was made by Don Linnell and seconded by Marjorie Stickle to adopt section as read. Section 3:1 Motion was made by Ed Dagnino and seconded by Paul Bernard to adopt section as read. Section 3:2 Motion was made by Dan Lewis and seconded by Barbara Southard to adopt section as read. This article passed by a voice vote in the affirmative on each section and so declared passed by the Moderator.

11. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Winnipesaukee Motor Craft Road (now known as Winn-Mirr), off Route 109, in the Mirror Lake Section of Tuftonboro. The motion was made by Dan Lewis and seconded by Elizabeth Campbell to adopt article eleven as read. Voice vote in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

12. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same, the sum of Three Hundred Ninety-Two Thousand One Hundred Eleven and 59/100 Dollars (\$392,111.59) as recommended by the Budget Committee, plus such additional sums as may be required to cover the costs of additional items voted at the meeting and in accordance with RSA 32:8.

The motion was made by Jacquelyn Rollins and seconded by Ken Craigue to adopt article twelve as read. The motion was made by Dan Lewis and seconded by Thad Coleman to amend this figure which had been decreased by the defeat of article seven by \$63,000 to \$329,111.59 to raise \$5,000.00 to the budget for a new roof and repairs to the Town House. This amendment was passed by a voice vote in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator. The Amended article was passed by a voice vote in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator. The town voting the total sum of \$334,111.59 for town charges.

To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Under this remaining article, Selectman Dan Lewis read letter from State regarding procedures allowed at the Landfill. The attendant may burn refuse one day a week from seven until noon, and no liquids will be allowed.

Recognition was given to Charles Whitten upon his retirement from the Board of Selectmen.

He has served the town as Selectman for Four Terms; on the Budget Committee, Planning Board, and Fire Ward.

Recognition was also given "Bill" Severance, who is retiring from the Trustee of Trust Funds and as a Supervisor of the Check-List.

Mary Craigue, Town Clerk Sworn in Richard H. Lester as Moderator.

Meeting adjourned at 11 P.M. There were approximately 200 voters in attendance.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDENS AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Forest fire prevention, our business, your business, good business! This slogan has been the motto of the N.H. Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Fire Service since 1909 when the first forest fire laws were passed by the Legislature.

These laws set in place a cooperative forest fire protection program of State and local forest fire personnel that has, in the past 75 years, established New Hampshire as a leader in forest fire prevention and control. Our annual acreage loss to forest fires of one-half acre per fire is the best in the nation. This fire record has come about through the cooperative efforts of our state/town forest fire protection program. The state provides detection of fires, training for local forest fire wardens, low cost forest fire suppression equipment to local fire departments, and technical advice at the fire ground. Local governments provide the volunteer fire fighters who are appointed as wardens and deputy wardens and who respond quickly to suppress reported forest fires.

This program has resulted in a steady decline in annual acres lost to forest fires since 1910 when the average fire burned 33 acres compared to the modern day loss of one-half acre per fire.

Only by the continued cooperation of the State/towns and our entire citizenry can this record by maintained.

TUFTONBORO FIRE DEPARTMENT

In 1982 the fire department responded to approximately 35 calls with the majority being woodstove related, indicating Townspeople burning wood must improve installations and maintenance of their stoves and chimneys.

In June of 1982, we took delivery of the new mini pumper for the Mirror Lake station. This was the replacement for the previous one destroyed by fire and vandalism. A special thanks goes to the Tuftonboro Association for their part in the fund raising for this piece of equipment.

In July of 1982, the First Responder Team was initiated. This team consists of eight members of the fire department who have undergone up to 60 hours of classroom study and practical experience in techniques of quick response medical aid and rescue. They are properly equipped with the help of donations and fire department operating expense. They have responded to all fire calls and eleven medical aid calls from July thru December 1982.

As the snow leaves the ground and woodlands the Town Forest Fire Warden will be the Chief of the Tuftonboro Fire Department, all forest fire duties will come under T.F.D. jurisdiction.

The Tuftonboro Fire Department is growing as the Town grows, meeting more and larger needs.

We have an excellent team of officers and men who work well together and are dedicated to the safety and well-being of the Town and all the people who pass thru, play and live here.

JUVENILE PROGRAM

Jan. 18, 1982

Tuftonboro Central School Students participated in a Cold Weather Safety Program which featured keeping off thin ice, wearing proper clothes in winter and getting emergency help for ice rescue.

The Telezonia Program, borrowed from New England Telephone Company in December 1981, was kept in continued use. This program's importance lies in the fact that it teaches children how to use the telephone in emergencies such as fire or accidents in the home and elsewhere.

Feb. 4, 1982

A Snow Machine Law and Safety Program was presented. Because many of our children have access to snow machines, they need to become fully aware of their responsibilities when riding. Lieutenant Dave Hewitt of Fish & Game was the guest speaker.

March & April, 1982

In order for the children to become acquainted with the state's legal processes, they studied court procedures in the classroom. Afterwards, they were taken on tours of the Carroll County Sheriff's Department and the Superior Court in Ossipee. The duty judge talked to the children about the proceedings and had each court official relate his duties.

May 7, 1982

Patch the Pony, a program discussing "Stranger Danger" was presented to the kindergarten and first grade students. Tuftonboro Cooperative Nursery School students also were invited to view the program.

May 21, 1982

The Third Annual Bicycle Rodeo involved participation of all children in grades K through 6th. The object of this program is to stress riding skills and safety. All bicycles were registered and inspected. Grades 4, 5 and 6, accompanied by their parents, went on cross-country rides. The length and route of each grade's ride were designed for the particular age group. Grades 2 and 3 practiced their riding skills on mini roadways set up on the school grounds. Grade K and 1 students had their practice sessions in the school gym.

Oct. 15, 1982

Again this year, as last, Halloween Safety was the subject of discussions with the students at both the Central School and the Cooperative Nursery School. Hot Dots were handed out to be put on jackets and costumes so that the children would be more readily visible on the roads after dark.

Nov. 9, 1982

The 4th and 5th grade children were taken for a tour of the New Hampshire Highway Safety Department. This gave the children an idea of highway safety rules, how records on individuals were kept and the nationwide radio communication's network operations.

Close relationship has been maintained with the State Police on items that might concern our children.

ADULT PROGRAMS

Several talks on Crime Prevention and Safety were given to adult groups.

May 18, 1982

An Alcohol and Drug Program was given in the school gym to the parents of Grade 6 students. The purpose of the meeting was to acquaint the parents with the alcohol and drug program which was to be given in classroom sessions to their children. Don Nuiry of Mental Health was the guest speaker.

PROGRAMS IN PLANNING STAGES

Additional preparatory work was undertaken on both the proposed Court Diversion and Crisis Home Programs.

Training

Police certification was received this year. Membership was maintained in the New Hampshire Safety Council and the New Hampshire Youth Workers Coalition. Training Seminars were attended.

1982 CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

During the past year the Conservation Commission added two new members, Thomas Hadley and Brian Hastings, whose expertise in the fields of forestry and wildlife, respectively, well qualify them for their positions.

The Commission had a very busy year checking out Dredge & Fill Permit Applications, as a total of nineteen applications were received. Most of these required site investigation, and in many cases, recommendations were made to the state Wetlands Board. Subsequent monitoring of approved projects was often necessary. One public informational hearing was held in regards to two of these applications, and public input helped to shape the Commission's recommendations to the Wetlands Board. One violation of the Wetlands Board Rules & Regulations was reported and investigated, and the landowner was informed of the proper procedures to follow in the future. Two informal site investigations were also made at the request of landowners seeking recommendations regarding wetlands. In October, the Commission hosted a regional meeting of town Conservation Commissions with representatives from the New Hampshire Association of Conservation Commissions and the Wetlands Board to review the dredge & fill application process and investigatory procedures. Conservation Commission representatives were present from Moultonboro, Tamworth and Wolfeboro.

Other projects included Ralph Kirshner taking on the task of making twenty pairs of snowshoes for the Tuftonboro Central School. This is to enable students to use the nature trails on the Davis lot for winter studies. Some preliminary work on starting a wetlands inventory was begun, and subscriptions to several children's environmentally oriented magazines were supplied to the Tuftonboro Library.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS

- During 1982 the trustees have taken advantage of the temporary high money markets funds which, earnings-wise, peaked early to mid-1982, but have tumbled with the reduction in prime rate during the fall months. However, we were able to increase the earnings for the Cemetery Funds by 13.7%, which will enable us to underwrite improvements in various Town Cemeteries during the year 1983.
- 2. The Shepherd Scholarship Fund of \$20,000.00 specifies that the annual earnings be awarded to deserving students in the Town who plan to further their education beyond high school. This year, six students benefited and payments were sent to the Bursers of the institutions of their choice to be credited to either tuition or other direct college expenses. Payments are made semiannually and the entire interest earned on the Shepherd Certificates of Deposit is paid.
- 3. The Tomb Fund for the benefit of the Tuftonboro Library is a "matching fund" with equal amounts of money appropriated by the Town, for the purchase of additional books, periodicals, etc. Payments to the Library Trustees are made quarterly.

Improvements planned for 1983 include water supply pipes being run from the Town House, under Rt. 109A to the Town House Cemetery, water from the Town House being used. We plan to have four outlets conveniently located with faucets which automatically shut off when not in use.

Also in the planning stage are improvements to various cemeteries of resetting grave markers and improving stone walls.

The Trustees would like to thank Brad and Cy Hunter for doing an outstanding job of mowing and trimming cemetery properties, as well as Roy Johnson for his help in closing the Trustees' books for the annual NH State reports and the Town audit.
