To the Inhabitants of the Town of Wakefield in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Wakefield Municipal Building in said Wakefield on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

ARTICLE 2. Are you in favor of the adoption of the following amendment proposed by the Petition of the voters of this Town for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: Expand the Business/Commercial Zone at the intersection of Routes 109 and 16 to include the entire property of lots 67, 68, & 69 on the Wakefield Tax Map No. 31? (APPROVED BY THE PLANNING BOARD)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Wakefield on Saturday, the twelfth day of March next at seven o'clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 3. Are you in favor of entering into a contract with the Union Fire Precinct to furnish fire protection for the rest of the Town outside the Precinct in the amount of thirteen thousand, three hundred seventy five dollars (\$13,373.)? (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against the following budget appropriations in the amounts indicated: (This will close out the Federal Revenue Sharing Account).

Town Officer's Salaries	\$10,000.00
General Government Buildings	10,000.00
Administration Salaries	10,000.00

TOTAL \$35,414.27 + interest (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to lease the Old Town Hall at Wakefield Corner to the Parish Helpers for a period of ten years at the rate of One Dollar (1.00).

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six thousand, two hundred dollars (\$6,200.) for the purchase of a Highway Spreader. (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirteen thousand dollars (\$13,000.) for the purchase of a police cruiser, authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply three thousand dollars (\$3,000.) plus interest of Police Capital Reserve funds to said purchase, and raise the balance through taxation. (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000.) for the renovation of the Old Fire Station for a Police Station. (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eleven thousand dollars (\$11,000.) for the construction of a Bath House at the Lovell Lake Beach, authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply the Bath House Capital Reserve funds of five thousand, five hundred dollars (\$5,500.) plus interest to said purchase, and raise the balance through taxation. (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000.) for the State ordered reassessment of all property, authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply the Reassessment Capital Reserve funds of sixty five thousand dollars (\$65,000.) plus interest to said expenses and raise the balance through taxation. (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven thousand, two hundred eighty nine dollars (\$7,289.) for the purchase of fire equipment for the Sanbornville Station. (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town of Wakefield will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty thousand, nine hundred sixty nine dollars (\$30,969.) for the debt service and operation of the municipal sewer department, to be offset with revenues in like amount. (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 13. To raise and appropriate the sum of eight thousand dollars (\$8,000.) to purchase sixteen (16) complete sets of Turn Out Equipment for the Wakefield Fire Department. (By Petition) (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 14. To see if the town will vote to set a maximum weight limit of 15 tons on all roads and highways owned by the Town of Wakefield. The only exceptions to this weight limit would be vehicles providing essential services to the inhabitants and vehicles belonging to the Town of Wakefield, and by permit issued by the Selectmen, such permit shall be valid for one trip, on one day only, and only one permit shall be issued at a time, to the same business or organization. (By Petition)

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town of Wakefield will accept, as a Class V highway, Blackberry Lane which is adjacent to and the only extention of White Birch Lane (White Birch Lane is a town maintained, Class V Highway). Blackberry Lane is approximately $\frac{1}{2}$ mile in length, has a gravel bed, has been built to state specifications at one point, and is now in fair condition. (By Petition)

ARTICLE 16. "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 80:58-86 for a real estate tax lien procedure? These statutes provide that tax sales to private individuals for non-payment of property taxes on real estate are replaced with real estate tax lien procedure under which only a municipality or county where the property is located or the state may acquire a tax lien against land and buildings for unpaid taxes". (By Petition)

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of RSA 36-A to establish a conservation commission for the proper utilization and protection of the natural resources and for the protection of watershed resources in the Town of Wakefield and that said Commission shall consist of 5 members to be appointed by the Selectmen. (By Petition)

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to pay the Town Clerk compensation in lieu of statutory fees as provided in RSA 41:25. (By Petition)

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the optional fiscal year as provided in accordance with RSA 31:94-a (By Petition)

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to change the date of its Annual Town Meeting to the second Tuesday of May in accordance with RSA 39:1-a (By Petition)

ARTICLE 21. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to accept private donations of land, interest in land or money for the purposes of contributing to the local matching portion required for acquiring conservation land or interest in land and other costs associated therewith for permanent conservation use under the N.H. Land Conservation Investment Program (LCIP) RSA 221-A, and authorize the Selectmen to apply for and accept the state matching funds under the LCIP for the purpose of acquisition of the fee or lesser interest in conservation land. Said appropriate funds and state matching funds may be expended by majority vote of the conservation commission with the approval of the Selectmen.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Wakefield Fire Commissioners to dispose of one 1950 GMC 720 Fire Truck as is.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed by public auction (or advertised sealed bid) or in such a manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to pay Town bills in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 25. To see if Town will authorize the Selectmen to make application for and to receive and expend, in the name of the Town, such advances, grant-in-aid or other funds for municipal purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government and/or separate agencies and/or other sources, in accord with provision of NHRSA 31:95B.

ARTICLE 26. Are you in favor of the Board of Selectmen revising the Landfill Ordinance to require the separation of all recyclable items and charge one dollar per tire for the disposing of tires?

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of (\$1,471,331.) one million, four hundred seventy one thousand, three hundred thirty one dollars and no cents to defray town charges as submitted by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 28. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

The accounts of the Town of Wakefield for the year 1987 have been examined by the independent auditing firm of Carri, Plodzik, & Sanderson of Concord, N.H. Their report, although not available in time to be printed in this report, will be available for public inspection at the Selectmen's office by the end of March.

WAKEFIELD AREA AMBULANCE REPORT

The Wakefield Area Ambulance Corps responded to 211 calls during 1987, representing a 9% increase in calls over 1986. These runs included: 63 motor and water accidents, 133 home accidents and sudden illnesses, 5 fire standby's, 5 runs transporting patients home from the hospital, and 5 calls reporting an apparent accident, but none was ever found. We transported a total of 176 patients.

We currently have 14 members, of which 9 are Emergency Medical Technicians. We have 2 more members that want to take an EMT course as soon as the next one is held in our area. During 1987, the 14 Corps members logged 1500.44 voluntary man hours on ambulance calls. This does not include man hours spent in monthly training, attending monthly Emergency Medical Services meetings at Huggins Hospital, attending one day continuing education courses and seminars, or taking basic, advanced, or refresher courses.

Statistics proved this year that we responded to more calls on Fridays, Saturdays, and Sundays, and the busiest months were June, July, and August.

By the fall of 1987 we had received our Cardiac Monitor and have been able to use it on many patients. Due to the fact, that Huggins Hospital has had a problem finding a full-time Head Emergency Room Doctor, we have not been able to take a defibrillating course. Now that Huggins has hired Dr. Andes, our EMT's have been promised a course within a couple of months and then our defib machine will be attached to the cardiac monitor.

Last Spring also saw the formation of the Wakefield Am-

bulance Association, made up of interested townspeople and Corps members. Its function is to raise monies for Special Equipment and Training not covered in our annual budget. This is done through Memorial Donations, regular donations, and sponsoring money raising activities. This year the Association bought the Corps a Cold Water Rescue Suit and in Jan. of 1988, they bought us a snowmobile to be used with the Firemen's sled for winter rescue. They also went halves with the Fire Association to purchase a T.V. and VCR for training purposes for both departments. Any person who would like to help the ambulance, but do not feel they could be an attendant, could do so by joining the Association. Any interested person can call Charlotte Palmer.

Please remember the Corps still holds a monthly Blood Pressure Clinic, the first Wednesday of each month, at the Town Hall from 10 A.M. till noon. Anyone is welcome to come in and have their blood pressure checked free of charge.

We are always looking for new people to become Corps members. Any interested person can call the Selectmen's Office or get directly in touch with a Corps Member. The more people we have the better job we can do for Wakefield Residents and visitors to our town when they need medical services.

1987 HIGHWAY ACTIVITY REPORT

In addition to regular road maintenance, repair work and snow removal, the Highway Department worked on the following projects:

- 1. Reconstruction of approximately 2500' of Pine River Road. This project was done as scheduled with the exception of the stone/oil surface. The construction completed late which did not allow time for the surfacing to be scheduled. We are, however encumbering funds from the 87 appropriation to surface this piece of road in 1988.
- 2. Reconstruction of approximately 1500' of Gage Hill Road, as proposed.
- 3. Perkins Hill Road-Reconstruction of 1500', shimming the remainder of the road and stone/oil surfacing the entire road (1 mile).
 - 4. Dearborn Road-Stone/oil surface of .8 mile, as scheduled.
- 5. Witchtrot Road-Stone/oil surface approximately 2700', as scheduled.
- 6. Tarring and Sealing-Union Village, as Scheduled. Also, sealing of Garney Road was substituted for Long Ridge Road.
- 7. Pickpocket, Brackett, and Oak Hill were all scheduled for ditch work and approximately 1000 yards of gravel. The ditch work was done and a small amount of gravel was put on Pickpocket and Oak Hill. Time and manpower did not allow completion of these projects.
- 8. None of the roadsides (1/3 of roads were scheduled) were mowed as we could not hire anyone to do it.

The proposed 88 Budget therefore, includes the addition of a full-time position to the highway crew. This will hopefully cut down the reliance on part-time help and allow the department to better keep up with road maintenance and improvement projects.

RECREATION DEPARTMENT Town of Wakefield

1987 got off to a good start as basketball continued with two new coaches. By the 1987-88 season we hope to be in the new gym.

The summer recreation program was going well, with the hiring of a new part-time recreation director. Unfortunately, with the shortage of lifeguards, the director had to take over the Town Beach, leaving the town with no other summer programs. This year with another director and enough lifeguards we now hope to offer track and field and soccer. Providing safe and adequate coverage of the waterfront continues to be a priority and needs of the parks recreation department.

In the spring of 1987, we saw the start of Little League, and the Babe Ruth Team (not sponsored by Parks and Recreation Dept.) and the Tri-Town Softball League using the field behind the Town Barn. The Recreation Department still sponsored the T-Ball program for the boys and girls too young for Little League.

The Fall programs started off great, with our first year of two Soccer Teams, Grades 7-8 and 4-6. There also was the start of a Football League (not sponsored by the Recreation Dept.). Both groups did well in their first year of competition.

The committee used surplus lifeguard salary funds to build a new ice skating rink. The response was great, with times set aside for senior citizens, hockey and free skating.

A SPECIAL THANKS to Carol Butler Briggs, our new Recreation Director hired in the Fall and to all the coaches who participated, especially Don Hayward, Wayne Robinson, Richard Russell, Vic Macedo, Jim Keating and Jim White.

Our area has a lot of natural beauty, however we hope that in the future we can improve on that by planting a few more trees in the Sanbornville area. We do maintain our public beach areas of Lovell Lake and Weeks Beach, and plant the flowers in the center of Town. Any ideas in this area would be welcomed.

We hope you will all continue to support our programs. We

welcome anyone interested in becoming a coach, as many volunteers are needed to ensure a good Recreation Department.

For 1987 fifteen applications were presented for public hearings. One application was for rental property, ten on housing and four for businesses. This is an increase of 4 applications over 1986.

The responsibility of the Zoning Board of Adjustment is to act only in the accordance of state legislation, and local zoning ordinances. This board does not have the powers to change ordinances. Your ZBA hears appeals and administers special provisions by the ordinance, dealing with variances, special exceptions, and administrative decisions.

WAKEFIELD HISTORIC DISTRICT COMMISSION

Early last year the Board of Selectmen requested the Historic District Commission to carry the responsibility for activities and events related to the Celebration of the Bicentennial of the United States Constitution in Wakefield. Our first assignment was to work toward having Wakefield become a Designated Bicentennial Community. This was accomplished very early when only a few other towns in our State were so honored and we were able to raise the Bicentennial Flag on May 2 - Wakefield's Pride Day. A certificate of Honor for the Town was presented to the Selectmen by the Commission soon after. This hangs in their Office for all to see.

On September 16 Members of the Commission presented a Bicentennial Flag and an American Flag to the children at Paul School and then participated with the children as President Reagan led the school children throughout the country in the Pledge of Allegiance to our Flag. The following day at 4 P.M., with the cooperation of the Wakefield Clergy, all of the Church Bells were tolled in joyous sounds of freedom as they joined other bells in ringing throughout every town in the country. Many of Wakefield's people are currently wearing the official pin honoring the Beacon of Democracy of 200 years.

1988 will see numerous additional Town activities and reminders of the National Celebration. The final Wakefield event will take place on June 21 - the date New Hampshire cast the 9th vote in 1788 necessary to ratify the Constitution and make it the law of the land.

WAKEFIELD POLICE DEPARTMENT Town Report - 1987

The accelerated growth of our town during 1987 created a record number of calls for service for the Wakefield Police Department. Year-round homes built in 1985 and 1986 totaled 108, as compared with 156 homes built in 1987. This impact has had a profound effect on Department activity.

My concern for the future is to be able to continue to staff the Department with qualified personnel. Hiring police officers is a difficult process, and establishment of a competitive salary base is essential in this job market. The sensitivity of the duties required by officers, and the responsibility of their performance with regard to public service and safety, makes selection of the right candidate a demanding obligation. Attracting the best is my continued goal.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Between July 1986 and June 1987, we experienced fewer fires than normal. The three leading causes of forest fires were again children, fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden and debris burning. All causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest tax law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden, or Concord Forest Protection Headquarters at (603) 271-2217.

If you own forest land, you became responsible for the timber tax payment starting April 1, 1986. This is a change in the Timber Tax Law that will impact all forest landowners. Contact your Board of Selectmen for timber tax forms.
