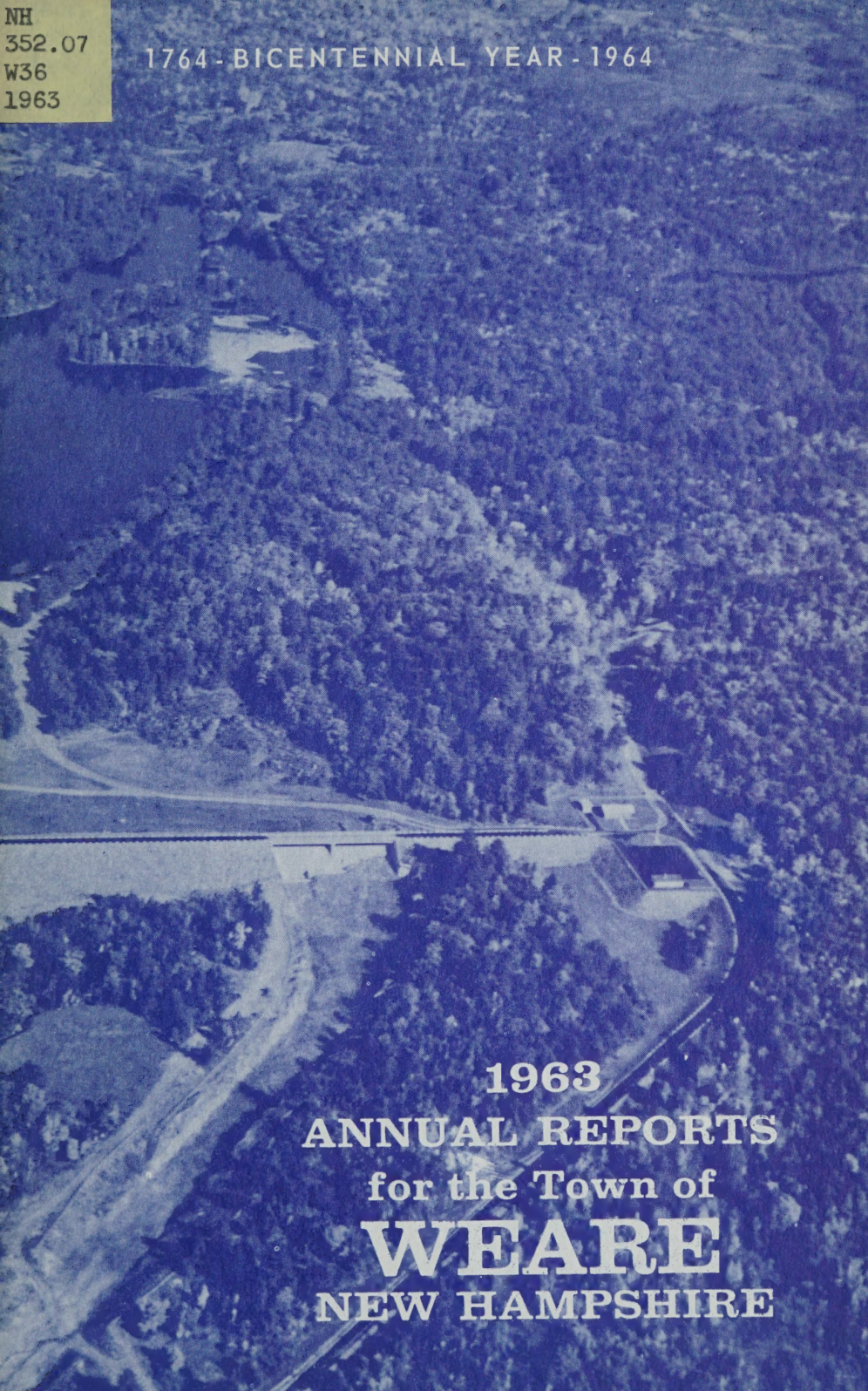


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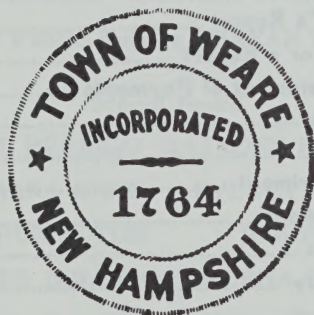

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The cover photo is an aerial view of Everett Dam on the Piscataquog River, about 1.5 miles southeast of village of East Weare, New Hampshire. This project provides urgently needed general flood protection for residential, commercial and industrial property downstream along the Contoocook and Piscataquog Rivers and along the main stem of the Merrimack River in New Hampshire and Massachusetts. Major recreational developments are proposed for the Hopkinton-Everett Reservoir, which has three permanent pools.

WEARE TOWN MEETING

March 12, 1963

Weare, New Hampshire

Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Scott F. Eastman, at 1:00 p.m.

It was voted to dispense with reading of the articles in the warrant at this time.

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

It was voted on motion of Vernon R. Wood to close the polls at to close the polls at 10:00 p.m. Proceeded to ballot for Town Officers. Total Vote cast - 357 ballots.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

On a recommendation of \$17,550.00 by the Finance Committee,

Albert S. Farmer moved \$17,550.00 be raised and appropriated under this article. Vote was in the affirmative.

Article 3. To make provisions for the collection of taxes.

On a motion by Albert S. Farmer that the Selectmen be empowered to make provisions for the collection of taxes, the vote was in the affirmative.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money on behalf of the Town in anticipation of taxes; said loans to be payable from taxes from the year 1962, and to issue notes therefore in the name of the Town, at such rate of interest and payable at such time and place within one year as the Selectmen may decide.

Burton Brown moved and it was duly seconded, that this article be accepted as read, with the exception that 1963 be substituted for the year 1962. Vote was in the affirmative.

Article 5. To see if the Town will allow a discount on taxes.

On a motion by Jon Hines it was voted to dismiss this article.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Highways and Bridges, and take any other vote relating thereto.

Recommendation of the Finance Committee was \$22,000.00. Upon motion by Harold Hall, duly seconded, to raise \$18,000.00, discussion followed and by standing vote the motion was lost. Yes - 42; No - 57. Harold Flanders then moved that \$22,000.00 be raised under this article and the vote was in the affirmative.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,576.65 to be used with the sum of \$10,511.01 to be furnished by the State for Class IV and Class V Construction, Reconstruction and Betterment Aid.

Harold Flanders moved that this article be accepted as read. Vote was in the affirmative.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Police Department.

Finance Committee's recommendation was \$800.00. After some explanation of the expenses and work of the Police Department a motion by James Bowie to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 was voted in the affirmative.

Article 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Fire Department.

The Finance Committee's recommendation was \$3,000.00. After some discussion on a motion to raise and appropriate \$4,000.00, it was unanimously voted in favor of the motion.

Article 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries.

The Finance Committee's recommendation was \$800.00.

A motion by Jon Hines to raise and appropriate \$800.00 was discussed and carried unanimously.

Article 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for band concerts.

Finance Committee's recommendation was \$300.00. A motion to raise and appropriate \$300.00 for band concerts was voted in the affirmative.

Article 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Public Library.

Finance Committee's recommendation was \$400.00. Everett Chase moved \$400.00 be raised and appropriated for the Weare Public Library. Vote was in the affirmative.

Article 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

With a recommendation of \$200.00 from the Finance Committee, Everett Chase moved that \$200.00 be raised and appropriated under this article. Vote was in the affirmative.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the Water Safety Program.

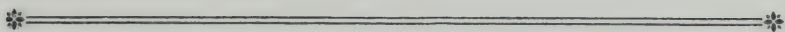
Finance Committee recommended the sum of \$200.00. Janet Brown moved this article be accepted as read. Vote was in the affirmative.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the support of the Concord Hospital.

Harold Flanders moved this article be accepted as read, and after discussion was voted in the affirmative.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for white Pine Blister Rust Control.

Finance Committee's recommendation was \$200.00. A motion to raise and appropriate \$200.00 for White Pine Blister Rust Control was voted in the affirmative.



Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to repair, re-roof and paint the Town Hall. After explanation by Vernon Wood as to the extent of necessary repairs, George Buxton moved that \$3,000.00 be raised and appropriated and that the job be let out for bid. Vote was in the affirmative.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$324.21 for the Merrimack Valley Region. With no recommendation from the Finance Committee, Katherine Hines moved that this article be dismissed. Vote was in the affirmative.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Zoning Ordinances recommended by the Planning Board. Richard Perkins moved the article be dismissed. After considerable discussion, the vote was in the negative.

A motion by Katherine Hines that the Zoning Ordinance be adopted as written and be enforced by the Selectmen was lost on a written ballot. Yes - 60; No - 83.

A motion by Gordon Brown that this article be adopted as read was lost on a written ballot. Yes - 36; No - 95.

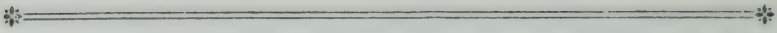
Albert Farmer then moved that this article be laid on the table for one year. Vote was in the affirmative.

Recess for Voting

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Forest Service in the Town Forest. After an explanation of Forestry Management by John Morse, he offered a motion to (1) authorize the selection of a three-man committee to be known as the Town Forest Committee. This committee, made up of three interested laymen, would give overall supervision and make final decisions as regarding woodland management, (2) that the sum of \$100.00 be authorized to be administered by the Town Forest Committee and spent directly on forest improvement. Vote was in the affirmative. Committee: Walter P. J. Brennan, Wendell Colburn and Gordon C. Brown.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to install two new lights at Riverdale. Upon a motion by Gordon Brown it was voted to postpone this this article for one year.





Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for a light at Weare Center Store Junction. Finance Committee's recommendation was \$245.00. After some explaining by Walter P. J. Brennan of the situation and figures which the State Traffic Division gave to him on cost of different types of traffic lights, Gordon Brown moved that two lights be installed at Weare Center Store junction, one an amber flashing light overhead and also a permanent light at the junction at a cost of \$245.00 to be raised and appropriated for this purpose. Vote was in the affirmative.

Recess for voting - Polls closed at 10:10 P.M.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to purchase a radio for the Forest Fire Warden.

Gerald Hight moved that \$250.00 be raised and Appropriated to purchase a radio for the Forest Fire Warden. Discussion followed. It was brought out that the Fire Department had some old radios which could be used for this purpose but after some explaining it was stated they could not be rebuilt to conform with communications regulations. Vote on this article was in the affirmative.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to relocate the family of Hazel Gilman. A motion by Ruby Sargent to raise and appropriate \$500.00 under this article. It was discussed thoroughly. It was brought out that keeping the road in repair and plowed in winter might be well above the \$500.00 in one year due to the location on a steep hill and a dead-end road. Vote was in the affirmative.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to elect a Police Chief in future, starting at the 1964 Town Meeting.

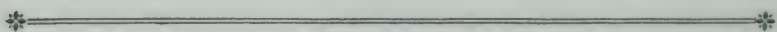
Harold Flanders moved this article be dismissed. Vote was in the affirmative.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to rent the Town Hall to individuals for the purpose of conducting dances.

Gerald Hight moved this article be dismissed- Vote was in the affirmative.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of celebrating the Town's bicentennial in 1964, and appoint a committee for the same, and take any other vote relating thereto.

George Buxton moved that \$100.00 be raised and appropriated



for celebrating the Town's bicentennial, the Selectmen appoint a committee and any money remaining be put into a fund to be carried over for 1964 bicentennial celebration use. Vote in affirmative. Committee appointed: Harold Thomson, Gordon Traver, Lyhl Perrigo, Doris Eaton, Marion Adams, Harold Flanders, Daniel Sawyer, Forrest Dearborn, Leon Taylor and Scott Eastman.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to repair the dam at Clement's Shop for fire purposes in dry times.

Verna Sawyer moved that \$400.00 be raised and appropriated to repair the dam at Clement's Shop for fire purposes in dry times. Discussion followed and an amendment was offered that the Selectmen check into the condition of the dam for more permanent repairs and report at the next annual meeting. The amendment was accepted by Mrs. Sawyer and the vote was in the affirmative on motion and amendment.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to include the road from Rt. 77 at Flanders Corner to Rt. 114 at Leighton's Grain Store in the Town Road Aid Plan.

Jackson Reade moved that the road from Rt. 77 at Flanders Corner to Leighton's Grain Store be included in the Town Road Aid Plan and that the road from Flanders Corner at Rt. 77 to the bridge be done first as this part is most heavily used. Vote was in the affirmative.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to close, subject to gates and bars, the so-called Jewett Road from Rt. 149 to Rt. 149, a distance of about 2 miles.

Harold Flanders moved this article be dismissed. After some discussion, vote was in the affirmative.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to close, subject to gates and bars, the Old Henniker Road, from Rt. 114 to the Henniker Town Line.

Albert Farmer moved this article be dismissed, stating the road had been closed at a previous town meeting. Vote was in the affirmative.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to change the road at the junction of the Martin Road and Rt. 114.

Gordon Brown moved that the Martin Road be relocated at the corner where it joins Rt. 114 at the North end. Discussion followed and it was explained that this dangerous corner could

be eliminated by moving the junction with Rt. 114 southerly by some 100 or 150 feet, with almost no expense, there being sufficient money in the highway appropriation to cover the little expense incurred. Vote was in the affirmative.

Article 33. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The Whitten Land Controversy at the Reservoir was brought up and it was voted on a motion by Katheryn Traver that the sense of the meeting be that the Town continue with this case and if this building is illegal, that it be removed. Vote was in the affirmative.

Proceeded to count ballots. Newly elected officers were sworn in by the Moderator.

Voted to adjourn 1:30 A.M. March 13, 1963.

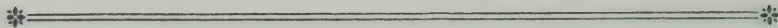

20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of celebrating the Town of Weare bicentennial in July 1964, and take any other vote in relation thereto.

21. To see if the Town will vote to accept the zoning ordinances as recommended by the Planning Board and any other vote in relation thereto.

22. To see if the Town will vote to include the road from Weare Center Store - known as "Memorial Drive" to Clinton Grove in the "Town Road Aid" (by petition)

23. To see if the Town will vote in accordance with the terms of Contract No. DA-19-016-CIVENG-59-419, as amended, between the Town and the Government, to authorize the Selectmen to discontinue, vacate and abandon in accordance with existing State law all the roads and highways or portions thereof within the Hopkinton-Everett Dam and Reservoir Area, of which the abutting land is now owned by the Government; namely, Sugar Hill Road, Cross Road (also called Sewell Hoyt Road), Middle Road (also called Dunbar Road) and State Highway Rte. 77.

24. To see if the Town will vote to purchase two snow plows and raise and appropriate a sum of money for the same, and take any other vote in relation thereto.

25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the Town Forest.

26. To see if the Town will vote to dispose of a certain tract of land at Chase Park to Mildred Moulthrop, and take any vote in relation thereto.

27. To see if the Town will vote to allow the David Eaton family to use water from the Town's supply at a nominal fee, and take any other vote in relation thereto.

28. To see if the Town will vote to elect the Police Chief for a one year term, and if accepted that the vote will be taken

by ballot. That future candidates for Police Chief will file with the Town Clerk, and take any other vote in relation thereto. (by petition).

29. To see if the Town will vote to elect the Fire Chief in the future. (by petition).

30. That a person shall not hold office of Selectman and School Board Member at the same time. (by petition)

32. To see what sum of money the Town of Weare, N. H. would vote to raise and appropriate to continue the Whitten Case. (by petition)

33. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the purchase of radio equipment for the Weare Police Dept. or take any action thereto.

34. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of the Little League.

35. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WEARE POLICE DEPARTMENT

There was a general increase in cases requiring police work in Weare during 1963. Breaking, entering and larceny cases were far more numerous than in any previous year. Motor vehicle accidents showed a sharp increase in numbers and several resulted in serious bodily injury. Our Rescue Squad is called in on most all accidents, not only to render First Aid, but to assist in traffic control which is a serious problem.

1963 saw a big increase in cases involving juveniles. Keeping our young people out of trouble is perhaps our most important job. If you as parents know where your children are and what they are doing, they will not get into much trouble.

The Red Network operators received 56 calls for police and about 40 calls were received by officers individually.

The State Police were called in to assist in the more serious accidents and breaks. Fine cooperation is received from them and we appreciate their assistance.

Sixteen house breaks were solved and most of the stolen property recovered.

A night patrol was started in August after a rash of breaks and malicious damage. This patrol was continued for 10 weeks for 2 or 3 nights a week. The service cost \$246.06 and entailed 127 hours time and 1381 miles traveled. This patrol was unscheduled and without any set pattern yet proved very worthwhile.

**ANNUAL REPORT OF THE
WEARE VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT**

The year of 1963 has been a very active one for the department. Forty-nine calls were answered: 7 building fires, 12 chimney fires, 11 brush and grass fires, 3 car fires, 2 electric power line fires, 5 dump fires, 2 alarm system calls, 3 investigations for smoke in buildings and 3 calls to check on fires burning legally. While this is the greatest number of calls ever answered in any one year, the losses were small. The two camps which burned were the most serious fires. One was on an island in the lake and the other adjacent to woods; both were all involved when discovered and unoccupied at the time.

Two brush fires were from lightning and the worst were woods fires. They burned deep and were difficult to extinguish and expensive. Several of these fires resulted from burning of brush, fields and rubbish; the fires getting away sometime afterward. We had no fires during the extremely hazardous fall fire season which proved that fire prevention was constantly in the minds and actions of our citizens.

Make certain that your heating systems are in good condition and fuse your electrical circuits properly. Report any smokes or suspicious circumstances immediately.

Over 220 calls were answered by the Red Network operators: 49 fires, 56 police, 18 for Rescue Squad, 11 information on fires, 9 information police, 4 to locate persons, 2 electric wires down, 28 wrong numbers, 29 false calls, 2 power failures. Our Red Network is very efficient and is giving 24 hour service for all emergencies. One of our original operators asked to be relieved from her duties and the phone was relocated. Mrs. Marjorie Eaton had been on duty from the start of the dial system in Weare and had rendered a great service to the town. We regret losing the services of an able and experienced operator. Mrs. Doris Hadley has taken on the duties of an operator. Cards giving the Red Network number and directions for emergency calls have been distributed by the Fire Department. If you do not have one ask and we will see that you have one. Hang it near your phone.

The Rescue Squad answered 18 calls. Eight persons seriously injured in auto accidents were cared for. Other cases handled were a broken leg, broken arm, brain concussion, heart attacks and lost children. Emergency transportation to the hospital was provided for in all cases requiring this service.

A Standard Red Cross First Aid Course was conducted. Fifteen men and women took this course. Groups were trained in the use of the resusitator and artificial respiration.

The men in the department attended 12 meetings and 7 drills and tests of equipment. Work sessions were conducted to improve and maintain equipment and facilities. The following was done at no expense to the town except for materials used: painting outside of So. Weare Station, painting floor of the East Weare Station, mowing and raking of lawns, improving of parking areas, ladder carrying rack on No. 4 truck. A new means of filling the tanks was installed on all four trucks which will greatly add to their efficiency. Compartment lights were installed. Motor repairs were made on No. 3 tank.

The department was given the following fittings and equipment: 1 gated 2½" Y connection, 1 nozzle 2¼", 1 hose holder, 2 sets of double male and female connections, a metal ceiling remover and other small items. These were overhauled and polished and installed on the trucks. We have needed these items and are glad to get them. These would cost about \$400 if we had bought them.

Purchased during the year were: 300 ft. 1½" double jacket hose, 150 ft. booster hose, 7 coats to replace some which were about 30 years old, 4 tires for No. 4 Truck, a new set of ladders for No. 1 Truck. The company purchased from its own funds a Mobile 2 way radio for No. 1 Truck to replace the one which proved to be quite unsatisfactory.

Once each month the trucks are given a road test and all radio equipment tried out.

Changes were made in the alarm system and a private telephone system with phones connecting the Central Station and the houses of the red phone operators.

Nine members attended the training school conducted by the Fire Chiefs' Club.

The time contributed by the men of the department in the various activities during the year add up to about \$2500. if they had been paid for it. The men receive the same rate of pay for their services at fires that was paid in 1933 when the department was organized.

The Ladies Auxiliary served our annual dinner and lunches after fires. They also put on a Strawberry Festival and a Christmas party. Few towns have an active auxiliary. Ours is of great assistance to us and to the Town.

The manpower situation in town during the daytime is critical. Most of our firemen work away from Weare. The few who are in town during work days have a great responsibility on them. Our equipment and training in its use are designed to make it possible for them to operate efficiently and effectively with few men.

We welcome the inspection of the Stations and equipment at any time and hope to improve the service to the people of Weare.

We wish to thank all who have assisted us during the past year.

**REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN
AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF**

During the past year New Hampshire faced the greatest forest fire threat to its woodlands in more than sixty years. The continued drought brought home to our citizens, as never before the potential threat of destructive fires to their beautiful and valuable forests, homes and livelihood. In true American tradition of meeting a common threat by volunteer effort, this fire danger was minimized by active prevention, patrol and a relinquishing of personal rights for the common good. It was the greatest demonstration of public cooperation ever experienced by those responsible for local and state fire control. The ready forces of volunteer fire services kept the losses low. For their effort and public response the general fire service expresses heartfelt thanks for a job well done.

Prevention, however, is not just an activity for the bad fire years. It must be practiced until it becomes a part of our public conscience - a habit. Just plain carelessness with fire causes too many of our fires.

The following practices and suggestions will help:

1. Always have a permit for outdoor burning and burn within the terms of the permit and in a safe place. Burn late in the afternoon when the wind is down or on rainy or damp days. Check your fire and if winds develop extinguish it promptly.
2. Carry your rubbish to the public dump - its safer. A neglected backyard incinerator causes many fires.
3. Never discard lighted cigarettes or matches. Make this a year round habit regardless of the safety of your surroundings.
4. Children-caused fires are now a major concern. Keep matches away from them and teach them to respect fire and not make it a subject of play.

Let's all join with "Smokey the Bear" and "Keep New Hampshire Green" and growing in 1964.

SCHOOL WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Weare qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 7th day of March 1963, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose Three Members of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
9. To see if the district will vote to decrease the membership of the school board to three members.
10. If the foregoing article be adopted, to see if the district will vote to decrease the membership of the board by three members each year, and to fill the vacancies thereby occurring by the election each year of one member to serve for a term of three years, until the number of members of said board be reduced to three.

11. To see if the district will vote to elect its school district officers by an official ballot and to adopt the Non-Partisan System as provided in Sections 73, 77-87 of Chapter 59 of Revised Statutes Annotated for such election.

12. To see if the School district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) to be used for the purchase of library and reference books.

13. To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States.

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

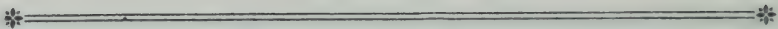
