This Town Report is dedicated to G. Malcolm Locke and Kent D. Locke who are direct descendants of John Locke. One of the original founders of the Town of Barnstead.

George "Malcolm" Locke was a life long resident of Barnstead. As a young man, Malcolm attended the University of New Hampshire where he studied agriculture. Later in life he tried his hand at bare knuckle boxing, farming, carpentry, poetry writing, and trapping where he set an unofficial world record in 1945 by catching 200 red foxes in 26 days.

Malcolm had one of the largest strawberry farms in the state during the 1940's - 1960's. He then converted his farm to raising sweet corn before it became popular. He belonged to the carpenter's union and also published three books on trapping, a cook book and a book of memoirs.

From 1942 until 1960 Malcolm served the Town as chief of police, and as a result of his boxing experience, had no trouble keeping peace. Many a young man has been taken under Malcolm's hands and emerged a better, wiser citizen.

G. Malcolm was a legend in his own time and few people left his company without a rosy glow and a feeling of having met a truly great man.

Kent D. Locke was also a life long resident of Barnstead. He was a contractor and mason until the 1960's when he developed and founded Locke Lake Colony, a planned community, within the Town of Barnstead.

In later years, Kent raised high bush blueberries at his farm, as well as low bush berries on several pastures around the area.

Kent D. was also an avid deer hunter. His exploits and skill with a rifle, are the envy of many local sportsmen, who still remember the way it used to be.

Kent served the town as a budget committee member for many years, and was well known as a real gentleman, who always had a kind word for those he met. He also will be greatly missed by citizens of Barnstead and surrounding communities.

Warrant for 2001 Annual Meeting

THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 7:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Barnstead in the County of Belknap in said state, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Barnstead Town Hall in said Barnstead on Tuesday, the Thirteenth (13th) day of March, next at 7:00 a.m. of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.

1 Selectman	3 year term
1 Town Clerk/Tax Collector	3 year term
1 Road Agent	1 year term
1 Trustee of Trust Funds	3 year term
2 Planning Board Members	3 year term
1 Library Trustee	3 year term
1 Overseer of Public Welfare	1 year term
2 Budget Committee Members	3 year term

The second session for the purpose of discussing and voting upon the remaining articles of the Town Warrant shall be held on Saturday, March 17th, 2001, at 9:00 a.m. at the Barnstead Elementary School.

2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$155,000 (gross budget) for the purpose of road reconstruction, sidewalk installation and paving of Maple Street from the exit of Barnstead Elementary School to Route 126 and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$155,000 of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33) and to authorize the municipal officials to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon. (2/3 ballot vote required). (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).

3. To see if the Town will vote, pursuant to RSA 231:62-a, to increase the term of the elected highway agent from one year to three years, commencing with the term of the highway agent elected at the 2002 annual election of Town Officers. (Ballot vote required).
4. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.
5. To see if the Town will vote to amend the appropriation under article #9 as voted at the 2000 Annual Meeting to delete paving of Varney Road and to authorize the use of the unexpended portion of the \$70,000 appropriation made under article #9 for the purpose of additional Varney Road reconstruction necessitated by unanticipated site conditions. This appropriation will continue to be a non-lapsing appropriation until the road reconstruction is completed or until December 31, 2001, whichever is sooner. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$34,500 for the purpose of purchasing and equipping a new police cruiser. This is a replacement vehicle. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).
7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to enter into a five year lease agreement for the purpose of leasing to own a fully equipped 10 wheel dump truck for the Highway Department and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$23,000 for the first year's payment for that purpose. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000 for the purchase and installation of an emergency generator set and related components for the purpose of providing emergency shelter and services at the Center Barnstead Fire Station and Town Hall. (Recommended by Selectmen). (Not recommended by Budget Committee).

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35,000 for the purpose of installing a fire cistern in the village of Center Barnstead and to authorize the withdrawal of \$20,000 from the Cistern Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose, with the balance to be raised by taxation. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 for the purpose of preparing architectural plans and specifications for the development of the Town Hall basement. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).
11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate and enter into a purchase and sales agreement, or to obtain an option, for the acquisition by the Town of property (18 acres more or less) owned by Joseph and Madeline Rogers, located at 72 South Barnstead Road, Map 7, Lot 5, on such terms and conditions as the Selectmen deem appropriate, provided that actual acquisition of the property will require further Town Meeting action; and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 for the purpose of making a down payment on, or paying for an option to acquire, said property. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).
12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be placed in the Bridge Construction Capital Reserve Fund. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).
13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be placed in the Highway Department Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).
14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35,000 to be placed in the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000 to be placed in the Cistern Capital Reserve Fund. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).
16. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Library Construction Capital Reserve Fund created in the year of 1984, said funds with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal are to be transferred to the General Fund. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).
17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell and/or trade the following surplus equipment:
 - One (1) used police cruiser
 - Two (2) Highway Dept. trucksand other items which are deemed to be surplus and not needed for municipal services.
18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,258,056.00 which represents the operating budget. Said sum does not include special or individual warrant articles. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).
19. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON FINANCIAL PRESENTATION

To The Members of The Board of Selectmen
Town of Barnstead
Barnstead, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general-purpose financial statements of the Town of Barnstead as of and for the year ended December 31, 2000. These general-purpose financial statements are the responsibility of management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general-purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general-purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the general-purpose financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall general-purpose financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The general-purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the general fixed assets account group which should be included in order to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. As is the case with most municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Town of Barnstead has not maintained historical cost records of its fixed assets. The amount that should be recorded in the general fixed assets account group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general-purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Barnstead, as of December 31, 2000, and the results of its operations and the cash flows of its nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general-purpose financial statements taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements and schedules listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general-purpose financial statements of the Town of Barnstead. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general-purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general-purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

As Selectmen we wish to express our thanks to all in the community who volunteered their time and talents. Whether you coached a baseball team, parked cars at old home day, served on a town board or committee, it is your participation and effort that make Barnstead an enjoyable community in which to live.

The Selectmen dealt with a variety of issues during the year. Stanley Post was appointed Health Officer and Marilyn Dansereau was appointed to serve as his assistant. Stanley replaces Paul Golden who passed away. Harold Miner announced his decision to retire as Road Agent and not seek reelection. Harold's dedication and talents will be hard to replace. The day to day operation of the highway department was taken over by Bob Eastman.

The grant to reconstruct Maple Street was denied by the state Department of Transportation. The Selectmen have delayed the paving of Varney Road until the water main is replaced. Originally, it was thought in 1998 a new water main had been installed. However, when work began on the road this spring it was discovered that the main had not been replaced and the original main was still in service. The Selectmen are applying for a community development grant to cover the cost of replacing the water main. The State Department of Transportation has agreed to make improvements at the intersection of NH 28 and North Barnstead Road during the upcoming year.

The Town has awarded the cable television franchise to Metro-Cast for a period of ten years.

The Selectmen have accelerated the revaluation schedule for the town. The original schedule called for the revaluation to be completed over a five-year span. Accordingly, each year one quarter of the town would be measured and cataloged by the assessor. During the fifth year current price would be applied to the collected data and new valuations would be established. However, because of a petition brought before the Board of Land and Tax Appeals the Selectmen have decided to complete the measuring and cataloging phase in the year 2001. New evaluations would then take effect in the year 2002.

BARNSTEAD FIRE-RESCUE, INC. REPORT

This year marked the completion of the first five years of operation of Barnstead Fire-Rescue, Inc. The accomplishments that this dedicated group has achieved are great but none of this could have happened without the support of the citizens of the Town of Barnstead. Thank you for your commitment to Public Safety.

As I am writing this report, the members are busy mounting equipment on our new fire engine. This 2000 International/Valley Engine (1750 GPM pump, 1000 gal tank) was delivered the 23rd of January and will complement the 1997 International/Valley Engine (1500 GPM, 1000 gal tank). The two trucks are essentially identical with Cabs designed to transport five (5) firefighters, Class A foam, removable deck guns, and hose beds for carrying up to 2000 feet of four inch (4") LDH Hose.

The members always have plenty of on-going projects. This year two very important projects were completed. A new roof was installed on Station 1 in the Parade and the driveway and parking lot were paved. The paving is expected to help considerably in reducing wear and tear on the carpet in the meeting room.

The Kid's Safety Trailer continues to be a valuable tool to send the safety messages to our children. Barnstead Fire-Rescue, Inc. was again recognized for this commitment by receiving its' 12th Gold Circle Partnership Achievement Award with the Barnstead Elementary School.

The future continues to hold many new opportunities and changes to what we do and how we do it. Planning is the only way we can prepare and control the process. The next five years will bring continued change. The Town needs to begin to plan for a Public Safety Complex (Police, Fire and EMS) to provide a centralized facility that can better serve the Town. Secondly, a Full Time Fire Chief providing for direct supervision of staff and taking additional responsibilities could better serve the increasing demands for administration and personnel management that are required.

In closing, I would like to express for the members of Barnstead Fire-Rescue our sincere appreciation for the continued support of the citizens of Barnstead, the support from the Board of Selectmen, and the enormous assistance provided by the Highway and Police Departments. I personally want to extend my sincere appreciation to

each member and their families for the dedication and commitment to our organization and the Town of Barnstead.

BARNSTEAD HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT 2000

The year 2000 saw many changes in the Barnstead Highway Department. Harold Miner, our Road Agent, retired from a job he enjoyed since 1993. After a period of reorganization, we got on with our responsibility of maintaining and improving the 80± miles of road we have in our charge.

Varney Road was our first major project. We replaced all road culverts and most driveway culverts from Peacham to Rogers Road. All drainage was improved as we went along and gravel was added to secure a good base.

Colbath Road was next as we prepared 1/4 mile for pavement. Underdrain was installed in one section of the hill where a spring leaked constantly. Road culverts were replaced, erosion stone was placed in ditches, and gravel was added. This section of road is paved 20' wide.

Pitman and North Barnstead Roads received similar prep work. Three thousand seven hundred feet of Pitman Road were paved to the North Barnstead Road. Eleven hundred feet of North Barnstead Road were paved, from Pitman Road to the existing pavement on Savelle Hill. A pavement overlay on these roads is scheduled for 2001.

Other projects include widening a short section of Wes Locke Road near Route 28, Beauty Hill West, Province Road near Route 107, and a section of Gilmanton Road.

Our highway garage has had renovations that include: interior upgrades, improved landscape, and the addition of a six bay equipment shed. This shed, built pole barn style, provides shelter for our town owned trucks.

The Barnstead Highway Department is looking forward to 2001 and beyond, with many road improvement projects scheduled. We ask for your support as we continue to upgrade our road system.

OSCAR FOSS MEMORIAL LIBRARY ANNUAL REPORT 2000

There have been many beginnings for the Oscar Memorial Library in Center Barnstead. One of the firsts was in 1917 when Sarah Foss had the library built in memory of her husband Oscar. This original building was dedicated on October 27, 1917, a most generous gift.

At one point, the library expanded within its own walls, when the Selectmen moved from an office upstairs to their new home across the street. This gave everyone a little more elbow room and volumes were added along with other services.

The year 2000 saw an advent of yet another beginning starting on March 18, 2000 when the voters of Barnstead enthusiastically passed the bond for an almost 3,600 square foot addition to the library, along with many needed renovations to the existing building. Having over ½ of the Bond money already raised, this meant the town needed to approve less than ½ of the funds to build this year. Needless to say, we were all thrilled at the prospect of adding on much needed space - a separate children's area, reading areas, large meeting room, more computer stations, work space, handicapped accessibility, to name a few.

A building committee had been formed two years prior and meetings continued as decisions were being made. First and foremost on everyone's mind was to keep the integrity and historical value of the original building. Lots and lots of thought went into the process of "blending" the two.

In April, we watched in awe as the bulldozers arrived and the grounds behind us began to change. Cameras were clicking daily as progression of the "new" began. Activity on the site was jumping! Electricians, plumbers, contractors, brick layers, sheetrockers, painters, security people and many others were here daily. Walls began to go up and it was difficult to not "peek" through each day! The Building Committee continued to meet and we had bi-weekly meetings with the contractor and crew.

The spring and summer were filled with the sounds of progress and we learned to “cope” as air conditioning was lost, interiors walls were redefined and made our small space even smaller. We remained opened through the whole process and patrons were kind and understanding as they weaved their way through the chaos.

The fall brought signs of completion and the excitement began to grow. We closed the library for a few weeks and began the move. Books were boxed, lugged, reshelved (sometimes more than once!) Computers were unplugged and set up in the new. Furniture was ordered and delivered and spaces were found for everything, because now there WAS space!

The night of October 27, 2000, the Oscar Foss Memorial Library had a re-dedication and Open House. 83 years to the day, found un now with 4880 feet of space instead of the original 1280! Unbelievable! Many, many people were on hand for this great event and everyone seemed to be genuinely pleased.

There are so many people to thank when a huge project like this takes place. I certainly would never be able to thank EVERYONE involved as there were so many aspects to the project. I would like to take this opportunity to recognize the efforts of the Building Committee, my able and dedicated assistant, Bonnie Brannigan and our three Trustees, Donna Gosse, Len Faria, and Suzanne Allison. Each and everyone of the above have given countless hours of energy, expertise and general support toward our goal. THANK YOU!

My speech the night of Open House, ended with the following that I would like to share with those of you unable to attend. “The third day we were opened in our newly expanded building, I had the opportunity to walk around and just observe. There were students at the computers, several young people working at the study tables, little ones discovering new easy-reader books and generally enjoying themselves. We had many adults, just perusing the books on the shelf or checking out a video or audio. I walked to the front of the building and saw a Dad sitting in one of the easy chairs, sharing a tender moment with his daughter while they looked through a picture book together and I knew we had made it! This is just what the library should be.” Thank you to the Town of Barnstead.

BARNSTEAD PLANNING BOARD ANNUAL REPORT

Last year was a time of conflict and reflection for the Planning Board. In many ways it was a typical year. Growth was limited to several two and three lot subdivisions that created less than 20 building lots in town. Two small businesses were approved through site plan review. Many of the approvals received some criticism from residents, but by far the subdivision connected with the proposed high school created the most conflict. In the end, though not before legal action against the Board, the application was approved. But this along with appeals to the business section of the zoning ordinance caused the Board to reflect on the future of land use planning in Barnstead.

An effort was made to identify defects in our system and resolve existing problems. Review of the zoning ordinances detected flaws in the process of locating business and industry in town. Our Capital Improvements Program was under revision as required by state statute. Many hours were devoted to creation of new regulations and plans consistent with current conditions of the town. The more effort that was spent; the more the Board accepted the position that we do not have a clear perception of the hopes and aspirations residents share for the future of the community. Therefore, until we as a Board have a better understanding no proposed revisions to ordinances and regulations will be proposed.

The Planning Board has proposed an ambitious project to clarify public perceptions, with your assistance, by revising the Master Plan, Capital Improvements Program, and land use ordinances and regulations. Our current Master Plan was adopted in 1990, and much has changed since then. A committee of citizens and department representatives will coordinate with Lakes Region Planning Commission to revise the Master Plan reflective of current resident philosophies and representative of input by citizens. Once the Master Plan has been completed, the committee will develop a Capital Improvements Program consistent with the Master Plan. Finally, Lakes Region Planning Commission will perform a thorough evaluation of existing zoning ordinances and subdivision regulations and submit a package of suggested revisions.

Over the years the base of volunteers has dwindled in town. This is understandable with all the demands placed on families today. Therefore, the Town will rely heavily on Lakes Region Planning Commission to perform data collection, coordinate committee and public hearings, as well as write the reports. Their cost to complete the project has been estimated at \$11,080, which is included in the operating budget for planning and zoning. Though these costs appear excessive without clear vision of the Town, growth management,

provision of municipal services, and the revenues required to generate them cannot be adequately assessed.

I hope you will support the Planning Board with this endeavor. Locating residents willing to serve as members or alternates has been difficult of late. If you have the time and desire your contributions would be well appreciated.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Conservation Commission saw some changes in 2000. Ed Tasker left as Chairman when elected to the Selectmen's office. He did, however, remain with the group as the Selectmen's representative on the Commission. At the same time, Jim Fougere took over as Chairman and Ernie Locke, Jr. joined the Commission as a full member.

The Commission has been focusing on several long-term projects this past year which will continue into the future, including developing an application for a new state land protection program and management of our existing properties. This past summer we developed a preliminary list of conservation properties to submit to the state's new conservation land program, NH Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP). This program is somewhat like the LCIP program of the early 90's, through which the community was able to purchase or obtain easements on several valuable properties. The new grant program has been funded for the year 2001, so the Commission will be identifying sites and submitting an application in the spring. The program requires a 50% match on funds for any easement or purchase. You will be hearing more about this program in the coming years since we intend to submit several projects.

The Committee has also been working on establishing management plans for some of our existing properties. It is our intent to manage the lands for the benefit of the community but also to improve habitat values and generate funds through timber sales if compatible with the overall plan. Our focus currently is the Harrison property on Gilmanton Road, where we hope to develop a written management plan. We plan to do some tree cutting for wildlife openings and several other projects. We have had great support from the neighbors and community on this. In the future, we intend to hold public hearings to encourage input on the use of the property.

Preliminary discussions have been held on the start up of the Suncook Watershed Greenways Project. The Commission has provided support for this effort in the hope that we could establish a wide-ranging discussion on management and conservation in the river's watershed. Some of the goals of the organization and benefits to the community include developing maps of the watershed, identifying critical resources and parcels, and providing a tool for long-term planning. You can expect to hear more about this project in the future and we look forward to working on it.

As always, anyone interested in helping out the Commission can join us during our regularly scheduled meetings held on the first Wednesday of the month at 7:30 p.m. in the Town Hall. We do have openings for two alternate members on the committee. If others want to help out

on a particular project, please contact a member of the Commission.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

There are 2,200 Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Forest Fire Wardens throughout the state. Each town has a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens who assist the Forest Rangers with forest fire suppression, prevention, and law enforcement. The number of fires reported during 2000 fire season was below average as referenced in the statistics below. Despite this, our network of fire towers and detection patrols were still quite busy with the fire towers being first to report over 135 fires. These fires were quickly and accurately reported to the local fire department for their prompt and effective suppression efforts. Wildland fires occurring in areas where homes are situated in the woodlands are a serious concern for both landowners and firefighters. Homeowners can help protect their homes by maintaining adequate green space around them and making sure that houses are properly identified with street numbers. Please contact the Forest Protection Bureau to request a brochure to assist you in assessing fire safety around your home and woodlands.

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing **ALL** outside burning. Fire permits are required for any open burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow where the burning will be done. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are eleven Forest Rangers who work for the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Protection Bureau. Forest Rangers have investigated numerous complaints regarding violations of the timber harvest and forest fire laws, and taken enforcement action to ensure compliance. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws, please call our offices at 271-2217, or for general information visit our website at www.dred.state.nh.us.

The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, 2 mobile

patrols and 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection system and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments. These factors are critical in controlling the size of wildland fires, keeping the loss of property and suppression costs as low as possible. Due to permitting and fire safety concerns, please contact your local fire department **BEFORE** using portable outdoor fire places and vessels, including those constructed of clay, concrete or wire mesh.

Please contact your local fire department before doing **ANY** outside burning.

REMEMBER ONLY YOU CAN PREVENT FOREST FIRES!!

BCEP SOLID WASTE DISTRICT

The year 2000 saw a welcomed increase in prices received for recyclables. This increase enabled the District to realize \$97,510.15 in revenue from the sale of recyclables as well as a savings of \$56,418.29 in avoided tipping fees. These two items provided a total tax relief of \$153,928.44 to District taxpayers. In addition the District has used some of its excess capacity to bail materials for several smaller towns, for a fee.

The District has a web site up and running. The site contains basic information on operating hours, holidays closed, fees and general separation guidelines. The address is www.bcepsolidwaste.com. Bookmark the site in your browser and you'll never have to wonder when we're open.

The District Committee would remind all residents that separation for recycling is mandatory. For those facility users that don't have time to properly separate, the District has instructed the Administrator and staff at the facility to aggressively enforce separation of materials for recycling, or charge for the unseparated material at a rate of \$.06 per pound (\$120.00) per ton.

If you have comments or suggestions please pass them on to the staff at the facility. If you would like to attend a District meeting, the Committee meets the last Thursday of each month (except December), at 7:00 P.M., at the Facility.

REPORT OF THE HEALTH OFFICER

The NH Department of Environmental Services would like me to address their concerns about the New Hampshire well water issue. Radon and arsenic occur naturally in our state's bedrock. They would like the homeowners with private wells to have the quality of their well water periodically tested.

The following is a public service announcement provided by DES.

PRIVATE WELL USERS!

Have you had your well tested recently?

Drinking water from private wells in New Hampshire sometimes contains contaminants at levels that can pose health risks. Only a water quality test, by a competent laboratory, can assure that your family is protected.

What types of contaminants might be present in your well?

The following contaminants, some naturally-occurring and others man-made, have been found in private well water in New Hampshire:

- Arsenic
- Bacteria
- Flouride
- Nitrate
- Radium
- Radon
- Sodium
- Uranium

It will take longer than this one year to gather all the facts, remove the emotion and false data, to get the true scientific nature of the use of biosolids. Consider the manures that are available at the various farming operations, the use of raw septage, and biosolids from sewerage treatment plants and paper fiber waste. We plan to further our education

and review the ordinance for clarification.
