TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bedford in the County of Hillsborough in said State of New Hampshire; qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the Eleventh day of March, next, at 7:00 o'clock in the forenoon to set upon the following Articles:

- Article 1. To elect necessary town officers and school officers for the ensuing year and ensuing three years.
- Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to amend the zoning ordinance by creating a new district called the Civic and Institutional District for the purpose of preserving land for necessary religious, educational, cultural, and recreational use to serve the Town's needs.
- Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to amend the zoning ordinances now in effect by specifically authorizing to zone several new zoning districts as proposed by the Planning Board.

The proposed new districts are as follows:

- 1. To reclassify the Commercial District on the north side of Boynton Street between Hazen Road and Woodbury Road to a classification of General Residential.
- 2. To reclassify the Commercial District on the south side of Boynton Street between Plummer Road and the Bedford-Manchester Town Boundary to a classification of General Residential.
- 3. To reclassify the Commercial District on the north side of Boynton Street between Davies Street and the Bedford-Manchester Town Boundary to a classification of General Residential.

- 4. To reclassify the property in the vicinity of John's Variety Store from a classification of Commercial and General Residential to a classification of Neighborhood Commercial.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to reclassify the property described below from its present classification of Commercial to General Residential: the property of the Sun Dry Cleaners.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to reclassify the property described below from Commercial to General Residential: the Junk Yard on Hall Street.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to reclassify the property described below from Commercial and Residential Agricultural to Neighborhood Commercial: land in the vicinity of the Donald Street Market and Dixieland Florist & Gift Shop.
- 8. To reclassify the property described below from Commercial and Residential Agriculture to Neighborhood Commercial: Land in Vicinity of the Wagon Wheel Store.
- 9. To reclassify the property described below from Neighborhood Commercial to Commercial:
 - Beginning at a point at the intersection of Nashua Road and Route 101, thence southwest along Route 101, to a point at the intersection of Route 101 and Wallace Road to a point 1000 feet from the southerly line of Route 101, and 1000 feet from the southerly line of Route 101, thence northeast in a line parallel to Route 101, and 1000 feet from the southerly line of Route 101 to a point in Nashua Road, thence north along Nashua Road to the point of beginning.
- 10. To enlarge an existing Neighborhood Commercial District by reclassifying the property described below from a classification of Residential Agricultural to a classification of Neighborhood Commercial: land in the vicinity of the Service Station and Store at Junction of Rt. 3 and Back River Road.
- 11. To enlarge an existing Limited Commercial district by reclassifying the property described below from Residential Agricultural and Commercial: Land in vicinity of the Prudential Building and Weston Associates.

12. To reclassify the property described below from Commercial to General Residential:

Beginning at a point in the South River Road south of Meetinghouse Road at the southerly entrance to the F. E. Highway and Route 193, thence along said entrance road to its intersection with the F. E. Everett Highway, thence in a northwesterly direction generally parallel to the said entrance road to a point 150 feet south of said entrance on the easterly boundary of South River Road, thence north along the easterly boundary of South River Road to the point of beginning.

- 13. To reclassify the property described below from Residential Agricultural to Service Industrial. A section of land along Route 114 By Pass from the Commercial District Boundary to the Goffstown town line.
- 14. To reclassify the property described below from Commercial to Residential Agricultural. A piece of commercial land on Gage Girls Road.
- 15. To reclassify the property described below from Commercial to Civic and Institutional: Manchester Country Club.
- 16. To reclassify the property described below from Residential Agricultural and Commercial to Civic and Institutional: State of N. H. Land around (Route 193, 101, Everett Turnpike) interchange and along the Merrimack River.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a zoning map for the Town of Bedford which will delineate all zoning classifications adopted by the Town of Bedford at prior Town Meetings, and all amendments to the present zoning ordinance adopted by the voters at this current Town meeting.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a building code for residential dwellings based on the Building Officials Conference of America, Inc., basic building code as recommended by the Planning Board and approved by the Board of Selectmen.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to have the Selectmen appoint a building inspector and fix the compensation for his services as proposed by the Planning Board.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to amend the zoning ordinance of the Town of Bedford by reclassifying the seventeen (17) acres, more or less, of the parcel of land on the east side of Back River Road and approximately one and one half (1½) miles from the junction of Back River Road and Route 3 south in the Town of Bedford, New Hampshire from Residential Agricultural classification to a Commercial classification as proposed by petition of twenty-five (25) voters under RSA 31:63-b.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to amend the zoning ordinance of the Town of Bedford, New Hampshire so that the property known as the Bailey Homestead on the westerly side of Route 3 (South River Road) directly across Route 3 from Jordan Marsh Co., be changed from a classification as a Limited Commercial District to classification as a Highway Commercial District.

Also, that Paragraph 4 of Article VIII B-Highway Commercial (HC) District which provides as follows:

"4. Gasoline service station (a gasoline service station is not permitted to be located within 2 miles of an existing station) and garage for repairs of automobiles only and not including body or fender repair or paint spraying. Used car sales lots."

Be amended by inserting the following:

"Provided, however, that on Route #3, because of the high density of use by the motoring public, a gasoline service station is not permitted to be located within one-half (½) mile of an existing station," as proposed by petition of twenty-five (25) voters under RSA 31:63b.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to amend the preliminary paragraph in Section V of the Zoning Ordinances to change the requirement from three (3) copies of the Preliminary Layout to four (4) copies and Section VI to change the requirement from triplicate to quadruplicate so that the following sections will read:

"SECTION V. Preliminary Layout.

Each sub-divider shall file with the Board four (4) black and white copies of a preliminary layout with a horizontal scale of not more than 100 feet to the inch and a vertical scale of not more than 40 feet to the inch. SECTION VI. Final Plat. The final plat submitted for approval and subsequent recording shall be submitted in quadruplicate."

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to amend the title of Section VII of the Zoning Ordinances to change the word "Variance" to "Waiver" so that the title will read as follows:

"SECTION VII. Waiver."

Voting on above Articles shall be by written ballot. Polls are to open at 7:00 A.M. and are not to close earlier than 6:00 P.M.

Action on the remaining Articles will be at the McKelvie School at 8:00 P.M.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year:

- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes if needed, and to raise and appropriate a sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) for the payment of interest on such borrowing.
- Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Eight Hundred Twenty Three Dollars and eighty nine cents (\$1,823.89) for the construction of Class V Highways within the Town, provided that the State of New Hampshire shall contribute Twelve Thousand One Hundred Fifty Nine Dollars and twenty nine cents (\$12,159.29).
- Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$10,-500.00) to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund: Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) toward the purchase of a new Fire Truck; Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) toward the purchase of a new Road Grader, and Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) toward the purchase of a new Tractor Loader.
- Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) to facilitate the handling of refuse disposal and dump requirements.
- Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen to enter into a contract on behalf of the Town for a three year period, said period being the requirement for obtaining the services of an independent contractor for refuse disposal.
- Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a tract of land of approximately one hundred (100) acres, owned by George T. and C. Arthur Wiggin located westerly of Wallace Road and in the vicinity of the Beau Reve Hotel, and to appropriate the

sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00), such sum to be raised by the issuance of serial notes of the Town, pursuant to the provisions of New Hampshire RSA 33:8 (Municipal Finance Act); and to authorize the Selectmen of the Town to negotiate said notes in the name of the Town bearing interest in an amount not to exceed four and one half percent (4½%) per annum, payable annually.

- Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars ,\$1,000.00) to remove the building on the so-called Minnie King property now owned by the Town, which is creating a traffic and safety hazard in the area of the Town Hall and the Fire Station.
- Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Seven Hundred Eighty Nine Dollars (\$1,789.00) for the purchase of a large safe delivered and installed in the Town Clerk's office in the Bedford Municipal Building for the safe keeping of Town funds and valuable records of the Town. (Submitted by Petition).
- Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) for the purpose of bringing the Town History up-to-date, such appropriation to be turned over to the Bedford Historical Society to defray initial cost of research, purchases and compilation of materials to be used in said up-dating.
- Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Five Hundred Seventeen dollars (\$6,517.00) to be used to establish and operate an integrated radio communication system for the Town government including Police, Fire, and Civil Defense units.
- Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) from Bessie M. Hood for the Minot Cemetery lot to be placed in trust, the income to be expended for the care and maintenance of the same in the Bedford Center Cemetery.
- Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) from the estate of Richard B. Taylor for the Taylor Cemetery lot to be placed in trust, the income

to be expended for the care and maintenance of the same in the Bedford Center Cemetery.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to accept Pine Drive for a distance of 513 feet, including a turn-around, 50 feet wide.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to accept South Hills Drive for a distance of 1,661.1 feet by 50 feet wide.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to accept West Drive for a distance of 1,668.2 feet by 50 feet wide.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to accept Mayflower Drive for a distance of 1,000 feet by 50 feet wide.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to accept Maple Drive for a distance of 2,400 feet and 50 feet wide, starting on Gault Road and ending on Gault Road making a circle.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to accept Hamilton Way for a distance of 728 feet to the intersection of Presential Road and Kennedy Drive, and 50 feet wide.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to accept Presidential Road for a distance of 900 feet by 50 feet wide.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to accept Kennedy Drive for a distance of 400 feet from the intersection of Presidential Road and Hamilton Way, by 50 feet wide.

To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and other officers heretofore chosen, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

As indicated in our last report to the Town, the Planning Board's primary function is planning. It can not make any legislative decisions, but it may make recommendations to the Town Meeting.

The Planning Board feels that building volume has increased to such an extent that a building code and a building inspector are needed to insure proper development of residential housing in the town. This program is designed to be self-supporting in that the fees collected will compensate the inspector for his time. This will also free the Selectmen from one of their present duties and place the control of building permits in the hands of an expert while leaving the Selectmen more time for Town administration.

The other recommendation offered this year is a revised zoning map. Since 1953, when the first map was adopted, all amendments made in the zoning regulations have been drawn using this map as a base. Now we are presenting to the Town a new zoning map which, if adopted, will invalidate all existing zoning districts which would be incompatible with new districts presently under consideration. We urge the adoption of these articles.

The work of the Planning Board during the year encompassed a full schedule of meetings at which many of the problems of the land developers of the Town were brought to our attention. An estimated 600 additional building lots were approved by the Board which indicated an accelerated demand for homes in the Town. Land is fast being consumed for houses which means we should be looking ahead for sites for new schools, playgrounds as well as other green space in order to retain most of the rural character of the Town.

Our efforts are aimed primarily at maintaining a balance between planned commercial and industrial development in previously zoned areas and single family residences in order to make Bedford a desirable place to live and raise children and not have a tax rate that will become prohibitive.

Planning Board meetings are held the first Monday of each month at 7:30 P. M. at the Town Office Building. Any one wishing to appear before the Board should notify the Secretary at least five (5) days before the meeting.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

People cause fires. Our records show that the number of fires increase in an area as the population increases and our state is growing tremendously. This means that we all must be aware of fire causes and do our best to prevent their occurrence.

When we are very young the lighted matches is an adventure, burnt fingers and a dropped match is another fire. A little older we like to have a woodland cookout, or go out by ourselves for a smoke but fire and forests get together for another statistic. We adults like to clean up in the spring, burn the old debris and the dead grass, result — escaped fires and much personal expense.

With new homes and summer cottages located in woodlands and with abandoned fields and forests crowding the back yard of our villages' streets, it is necessary that everyone be aware all through the fire season, which comes with the disappearance of the snow, of the need to be careful with outdoor fires and fire sources.

The following action will help:

- 1. To teach our children the danger of lighted matches.
- 2. To never discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
- 3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn
 - a. You need a written permit from the town fire warden all debris burning except when the ground is covered with snow. Cooking fires in outdoor fireplaces or in charcoal brasiers in your own back yard is permitted on notification of the warden.
 - b. The warden is forbidden by regulation to allow burning of household rubbish on *grass* by householders between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M.
 - c. Have equipment on hand to control the fire before you light the match.
- 4. Promptly report any fire out of control to your fire warden or fire department.

Help to keep our town out of the fire occurrence column and save your tax dollars for useful purposes.

The Radef-Communication crew of the Civil Defense organization of Bedford, also Volunteers, have kept the communication network, R.A.C.E.S. for the County Net in service the year through. To them too, we owe a debt of gratitude for the week in week out attention to the weekly network exercises.

Needing Medical Services, an attempt is being made to invite all Nurses, both active or retired to form an emergency organization, so that if disaster occurs, there will be the necessary organization existing so there would be no lost motion.

Mr. Charles Earle, proprietor of the Wagon Wheel Store, has consented to become head of rationing for food, in a Disaster. We are grateful to have his assistance.

More men with license to operate Radio are needed for the Communications Department. We earnestly appeal for any who hold such qualifications to get in touch with the Radef Chief, Mr. Richard Durette, Bedford.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE BEDFORD PUBLIC LIBRARY

(For Year Ending December 31, 1968)

It is surely no exaggeration to report that 1968 was an exciting year in the Bedford Public Library. Funds voted at the March Town Meeting made it possible for the work of the new addition to go on at an accelerated pace. There were, of course, the minor frustrations of difficulty in co-ordination from builder to floorman to electrician to painter. But through good co-operation and combined efforts, and with a wealth of volunteer help from many public-spirited citizens, the work went on. It was necessary to close the Library for a short time during the greatest upheaval. But on Sunday afternoon, October 20th, with the bulk of the work completed, Open House was held in the Library, with formal ribbon-cutting ceremonies into the new addition.

As the Town of Bedford grows, as use of the Library continues to grow, we urge you all to realize that further expansion will be necessary. Our present over-all space is adequate, but no more than that. Do not be surprised if your Board of Library Trustees presently comes to you with more ideas, more plans, more requests for your co-operation in making our Library more helpful to everyone from the youngest kindergartener to the oldest senior citizen.

It is impractical in this report to name the many friends in the Bedford community who have helped in this project with gifts and with services. Notably, we express appreciation to the Bedford Women's Club for the furnishings in the John Goffe Room, and to the Bedford Garden Club for the gift of landscaping the grounds. To all these friends the Library Trustees give deep gratitude and warm thanks. Without you all, this past year's project could not have been accomplished.

From beyond the community we have had gifts. Donors who choose to remain anonymous have given a new twenty-volume set of the "Encyclopedia International" in memory of the late Fred Silderberg of Bedford. Miss Elizabeth Farrar of Millburn, New Jersey, gives the Library each year a subscription to "The Atlantic

Monthly" in memory of her mother, a former Bedford resident. These and all such gifts we acknowledge with appreciation.

Library services under the expanded opportunities have been greatly increased. The Library is now open to the public twenty-six hours per week. (It should be noted that in compliance with the State of New Hampshire Library Policy we should, by 1972, be open for forty hours each week.)

Under the supervision of the librarians, a summer reading program was again held for Bedford children. A series of weekly film programs for children was held through the summer in the Bedford Room, with films available through the New Hampshire State Library.

A summer sale of used books held on the Library grounds netted a goodly sum of money, which was used to purchase chairs for the Bedford Room. This room, on the lower level of the building, is proving valuable in the life of the community, as it is available for use by public groups, under the jurisdiction of the trustees and the librarians.

The Reading Group, a project co-sponsored by the Library and the Bedford Women's Club, meeting bi-weekly from January through May, which had formerly been held in private homes, now meets regularly in the Bedford Room.

Area Workshops in which our librarians are involved have this year met in this room. We have found that librarians from nearby towns have been greatly inspired by the progress librarywise which has been made in Bedford.

Our librarians participate regularly in meetings of the New Hampshire Library Association, and of the Southeast District Council, which includes libraries in the towns of our immediate area. Both are active in the events of National Library Week, held each year in April. They are able to bring back to our Bedford Library many plans and projects which serve to make our Library more useful.

Finally, the Library Trustees cannot close this report without giving their personal appreciation to these librarians. We are indeed fortunate—all of Bedford is fortunate—in having two such capable,

alert, and dedicated librarians as Mrs. Ralph Wiggin, Jr. and her assistant, Mrs. Byron Peck. Their time and efforts in service to the town go far beyond the call of duty. As Trustees, we give them our own thanks, and are happy to add that we feel the entire town is indebted to them.

OF MANCHESTER

The services of the Visiting Nurse Association, a United Fund Agency are available for all of the residents of Goffstown regardless of race, creed or ability to pay. The Association is a home health agency certified to care for Medicare patients.

The Visiting Nurse provides bedside nursing care, treatment and instruction and the Registered Physical Therapist provides physical therapy; all services are carried out according to directions by the patient's physician.

Maternal and child health guidance and instruction is given before and after the arrival of new babies and classes for instruction of expectant parents are held three times yearly at the agency.

Family health guidance is also given with special emphasis on prevention of disease and promotion of health.

332 visits were made to Bedford residents in 1968. Mrs. Grace Gage, R.N., is the nurse in the Bedford area.

REPORT OF THE DUMP STUDY COMMITTEE BEDFORD, NEW HAMPSHIRE

Our Committee was appointed by the Moderator for the Town of Bedford as a result of a resolution passed by the Town at Town Meeting March 1968. It had become obvious for some period of time that the Town was approaching the crisis situation in regard to waste disposal. For many years, the Town has operated an open dump on a three acre site. This site has been fully used and an alternate method of disposal must be arrived at within the next few months.

The situation the Town of Bedford is facing is one faced by towns and cities throughout our nation. Waste disposal has become a primary problem of our society. Because of the growth in our population and the resulting pressures on our environment, state and federal authorities have become increasingly concerned about burning dumps, which add tremendously to the pollution of our atmosphere. The State of New Hampshire has adopted stringent air pollution controls, which prohibit the opening of a new burning dump such as is now operated in Bedford or the continuation of such a dump after 1970.

Thus, your Committee was faced with finding a new method of waste disposal for the Town, one which obviously would be more costly than the system presently in use. The first thing the Committee recommended to the Selectmen was a reduction in the number of days that the dump is open to the public. Bedford, previous to our recommendation, had its dump open seven days a week, twenty-four hours a day. The result was utter chaos. Material was dumped all over the site, without any regard to proper control and use of the remaining land available. In order to extend the time on the present site, the Selectmen, on the recommendation of the Committee, reduced the number of days by one and shortened the hours, closing the dump at 5:00 o'clock in the evening. The result of this was to lengthen the number of months which the current site could be used while we were contemplating alternatives.

It was the opinion of your Committee that the only feasible method of waste removal for the Town of Bedford is sanitary land-fill. Incineration is too costly in plant operation and maintenance for a town the size of Bedford. In addition, incineration does not handle all materials and the residue still must be buried at a sanitary landfill site.

Therefore, your Committee decided that the first thing to do was to determine whether there were any adequate sites available within the Town of Bedford. One of the most difficult things to determine is the area necessary to conduct an effective sanitary landfill. This depends on several variables, among which are the size of the population to be served, the quality of refuse produced per capita, the nature of the refuse produced, the effectiveness of the compaction of the refuse, and the method of operation and the landfill site. There is no practical way of physically measuring the quantity of refuse produced per day in the Town of Bedford. From studies which have been made by public agencies, the figure of 4½ lbs. per day of refuse per person is considered to be a national average. Assuming the present population of the Town of Bedford being about 6000 people, our Town produces nearly 5000 tons of refuse per year. In terms of area, assuming an average compacted depth of 6 to 8 feet and a compaction ration of 2.5 to 3 times, approximately one acre of land is currently required per year to sustain sanitary landfill operations. One variable which is very hard to determine is the exact population growth of Bedford. This, of course, affects the size of the site which is necessary in order to conduct a landfill operation which will be good for at least 15 to 20 years.

The Committee reviewed several sites in the Town which were suggested as possible sites, and then asked the responsible State officials to check some of these areas. No conclusion was reached and it was determined that it would be advisable for the Committee to obtain the services of a consultant to review some of the proposed sites and to give the Committee its opinion and report. Rollins, Kink & McKone, Inc., Consulting Engineers, of 814 Elm Street, Manchester, New Hampshire, were hired by the Committee and made a study of various sites in the Town. Their report covered six potential sites for the sanitary landfill operation. Each site was analyzed on the basis of several criteria, including accessibility, area of site, terrain, nature and extent of cover material, nature of surrounding development, potential pollution possibilities, and the overall characteristics of the site. Only two of the sites seemed actually feasible and one of them was not available.

The Selectmen, on the recommendation of your Committee, took an option on Arthur and George Wiggin's property which is located behind the so-called "Beau Rev" site, which site contains approxmately 100 acres and is located in a relatively remote section of the Town. The option provides that the Town may purchase the

land at the price of \$200 an acre, which your Committee felt was eminently fair and reasonable, with the actual acreage to be based upon a survey made by the Town. This site requires an access road which would need considerable reconstruction and, of course, will add to the ultimate development cost of the site.

As an alternative, your Committee investigated the possibility of the proposed regional landfill site which is to be located in Londonderry, New Hampshire, Currently, there is a site in Londonderry being operated as a sanitary landfill, which is available to the Town of Bedford. At the present time, it is not being operated on a regional basis but it is anticipated that in coming years it will be so operated. This site is available to Bedford if we determine to use a commercial transfer system whereby our refuse will be deposited at our current dump site in large, commercialtype transfer units and compacted there and then transported over the road to the Londonderry site. We are recommending, based on proposals of Truk-Away Service that the Town enter into a contract with that company, whereby a transfer system for residential, commercial and industrial use will be developed at our current dump site. Truk-Away proposes to furnish a Dempster Model TP-11 Transfer Packer with an oversize accumulation Hopper and one Dempster 65 cubic yard Transport Trailer for transporting the refuse to the Londonderry site. The Committee, based on the estimates of our dump needs, anticipates that the total cost to the Town of this method of waste disposal will be \$25,,-000 per year. Because of the cost of the equipment to Truk-Away, it will be necessary for the Town to enter into a three-year contract with the Truk-Away Company. Of course, as the Town grows, the cost of this disposal method or any disposal method will naturally increase. With additional refuse there will be additional costs, but these cannot be estimated at this time.

The Committee finally decided that this method of waste disposal would be more economical than having the Town operate its own sanitary landfill on the option land referred to earlier. In order to run a successful sanitary landfill, the Town would have to purchase a bulldozer which would cost between \$25,000 and \$30,000. In addition, a road would have to be built into the site and would have to be maintained year round. It is the Committee's opinion that it would be more costly for the Town to run its own landfill. We recognize that some of our figures of necessity are based on conjecture. We do not actually know the total refuse produced by the Town. We cannot fully anticipate the Town's

growth. In addition, we have the further variable that the option land has not been fully investigated and we cannot be sure that it will be a truly successful sanitary landfill site. If there is insufficient gravel and the land is too rocky, the site may be excessively expensive to run.

The Committee has also recommended that the transfer station be open for the reception of refuse three days a week, two of the three days coincide with the days on which the commercial service picks up throughout the Town of Bedford. The reason for limitation of the days is that this will reduce the cost of operating the transfer station and will also provide for better control at the transfer station. We also recommend that the Selectmen institute a system of dump stickers, wihout cost, to residents of the Town. One of the problems which has occurred in the past is that out-of-town users use our dump facility. If stickers must be affixed to all resident cars, the people who will be on duty at the transfer station can turn away out-of-town refuse. Since the Town will be paying on a per load basis, it is essential that we control the use of the transfer station to residents of the Town of Bedford or businesses operating in the Town of Bedford.

The Committee also feels that even though we do not recommend the establishment of the landfill at the option land site in West Bedford, the Town should give consideration to purchasing this site for later use if the method now being proposed is unsatisfactory. Experience will be our best guide for the future. Whether the Town runs its own landfill or whether we follow the recommendations of the Committee and use the transfer system to Londonderry, no one can give us a completely accurate picture of the yearly cost to the Town. We feel that the system we are now proposing is a most satisfactory conclusion to the problem.

The report of the Committee has been adopted unanimously.

PLANNING COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT - 1968

THE COMMISSION

The Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission (SNHPC) has now completed its second full year of operation. The municipal members include the Towns of Auburn, Bedford, Goffstown, Hooksett, Londonderry and the City of Manchester. Municipalities become members of the Commission by ordinance or resolution, payment of the established per capita fee, and official appointment of representatives who have been nominated by the local planning board.

Although officials of several municipalities have requested the Commission to increase its membership, the Commission feels that it would not be desirable to expend its membership until it completes studies on some of the immediate needs of its existing area of responsibility.

The purpose of the Commission is to develop 'regional plans' to encourage the coordinated development of the region, and to make recommendations regarding development in the region. In addition, the Commission provides local planning assistance to membre Planning Boards. This assistance takes the form of member Planning Boards. This assistance takes the form of Board meetings. The professional staff acts as advisors on regional activities and local development questions. The Local Planning Assistance provided by the Commission has been a particularly appealing aspect for planning boards. The 1969 program anticipates even greater service in the year ahead.

THE ACTIVITIES

During 1968, major Commission activities included the following: Community Shelter Plan

The Community Shelter Plan has a twofold purpose: (1) to provide a detailed plan of action and designated shelters for protection against fall-out in case of a nuclear attack upon the United States, and (2) to provide the Commission with much needed basic data on land use, population and other characteristics in the region.

Section 204 Review

During 1968 the Commission reviewed applications for Federal financial assistance that involve regional considerations. This review is required under Section 204 of the Federal Demonstration Cities and Metropolitan Development Act of 1966. Among the applications reviewed were the Route and 28-A intersection improvement proposal and the Hooksett Sewerage Improvement Plan, as well as others of importance to both City and Towns.

Regional Sewerage and Water Facility Study

In June the Commission received notification that its application for a two-thirds Federally funded Regional Sewerage and Water Facilities Study was approved. The next six months saw the Commission tooling up for this detailed study which is expected to carry a major portion of their work load over the next two years. It is anticipated that this study will provide the Commission with much development criteria. The firm of Hayden, Harding and Buchanan, Inc., Consulting Engineers of Boston, Mass., is assisting the SNHPC on this project.

Refuse Disposal

Early autumn found the Commission reviewing refuse disposal problems in the region. This consideration was a result of two factors: (1) the recent regulations passed by the New Hampshire Air Pollution Control Commission regulating open-burning dumps, and (2) a request from the Town of Bedford for assistance in locating a new site for operation of a sanitary landfill. The Commission viewed refuse disposal as a significant regional problem and undertook a study of existing refuse disposal methods and sites in the region. Initial review indicated that cooperative activity was feasible and should be studied further. Therefore, the SNHPC adopted a resolution requesting the Towns to include an article in their Town Warrant for the March 1969 Town Meeting to allow the Selectmen to appoint three people to an unpaid refuse disposal committee. This committee would meet with similar com-Regional Refuse Disposal Planning Committee. The purpose mittees from other SNHPC member municipalities as the of the Committees would be to study the feasibility of cooperative efforts in refuse disposal, and to make recommendations to the municipalities for vote at the 1970 Town Meeting. Regional Planning Policy

The latter part of the year the Commission reviewed portions of the 'goal statement' which it hopes to complete during the

ensuing months. After complete review and revision, the 'goal statement' will become the policy framework within which the Commission will continually evaluate its own activities.

STAFF

Until August of 1968, the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission (SNHPC) relied solely upon the part-time services of the City of Manchester Planning Board staff to perform SNHPC staff functions under a working agreement with the City of Manchester.

In August, the Commission hired Mr. W. Ray Walker as a full-time Regional Planner. Mr. Walker is responsible to the Commission and works under the direction of Mr. John F. Grogan, Executive Director of the Commission who also serves as Manchester City Planning Director. Also, Mr. Neil A. Sieminski of the Manchester Planning Board staff will continue as part-time technical advisor for the Region as well as project director for the Community Shelter Plan.

The hiring of Mr. Walker provides the Commission with the full-time services of a professional planner. He holds a Bachelor of Science Degree in Urban and Regional Planning from Michigan State University and did post graduate work at the University of Pittsburgh. Mr. Walker's experience in the field of planning includes two years as a Regional Planner for the Tennessee State Planning Commission and two years as a Community Planner for the Lehigh-Northampton County Planning Commission in eastern Pennsylvania.

THE YEAR AHEAD

Looking ahead to 1969 and beyond, the SNHPC finds the following objectives:

* Completion of the Community Shelter Plan.

* Substantial progress toward completion of the detailed Sewerage and Water Facilities Plan.

* The continuing Local Planning Assistance to members on an

even more intensified basis.

* An intensified effort to find and use all means of increasing the communication linkage between regional planning and the towns and cities through visual aids, publications, meetings with professional groups, local service clubs, industry, gatherings of private citizens, etc. In short, a concerted effort to encourage the Region to "Think Planning," because planning is everybody's business.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

The word today is to "tell it like it is". Three significant events in the past year point up the fact that Bedford education is at the crossroads. These are the pupil projections in the NESDEC report, the fact that in September all available classrooms will be in use and the decline in parochial school enrollments in New Hampshire and the resultant shift to the public schools. Clearly Bedford is going to have to do additional school building but what, where, how soon and how much? In the words of one of our former superintendents, "Whatever the decision, we can be sure of two things: (1) It won't be cheap; (2) It won't be permanent."

Our contract with Manchester runs out in 1972. At that time we can expect to have almost 500 high school students. At the same time our elementary school population will have increased by at least 250 students. In terms of elementary classroom spaces this means at least 10 more rooms than we now have.

In April of 1968 the New England School Development Council reported on its study of the Bedford school system and made certain recommendations to assist us in future planning. A public hearing was held and later a committee was appointed to study these recommendations. While it is still too early for them to have reached any definite conclusions, they are submitting a progress report.

As a first step your School Board has had an engineering study made of both the McKelvie and Memorial sites. This will go a long way toward answering what additions, if any, can be made to these two facilities. In the following months it is expected that our educational specifications will be completed and that the parochial and financial picture will be clearer. We are, therefore, inserting an article in the warrant to engage an architect to prepare plans which will then be presented at the next Annual School District Meeting along with a firm bid. Before that there will be several public hearings held on the proposal.

This year for the first time our school budget will exceed \$1,000,000.00. To many this will seem a staggering figure. However, an ever increasing enrollment will require increased numbers of

teachers, more classroom space, more supplies and equipment and budget increases. Last year our enrollment in grades 1-8 increased by 82 students and this year we expect an additional 85 students.

In addition, your School Board feels that we should not stand still but that each year should bring some improvement in the educational program. Knowledge is accumulating at a rapid rate and many dramatic and innovative changes are occuring in education. We owe it to the students we are educating today to prepare them for the world of tomorrow.

Our sincere thanks to: Superintendent Claude Leavitt, Assistant Superintendent Peter Dolloff, our dedicated staff and other school district employees, the P.T.G., the NESDEC and Communications committees and you, the people of Bedford, for your past support of quality education. We are appreciative of this and are confident that our recommendations will receive your continued support.

COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

FOR THE BEDFORD TOWN REPORT - 1968

The Communications Committee was appointed by the town moderator as a result of a motion passed at the last annual school district meeting.

The primary objective of the committee was to increase public awareness of school needs and problems on a continuing basis throughout the year. Through this awareness Bedford citizens should be in a better position to work with their school board or school administration during the year and to vote intelligently on school budget requests at the annual meeting.

Therefore, the first task your committee saw for itself was to develop a system which would work throughout the year to acquaint the voter with school needs, problems, and aspirations. One of the first problems we faced was how to get information to the town. We felt that a newsletter mailed to all voters at least twice a year would be useful. However, since nothing was budgeted for this and since work would have to be done on a volunteer basis, we found that this idea was impractical.

The committee met many times, attended school board meetings, discussed problems with the school administration, with parents, and with teachers. Yet, the basic dilemma remained: How do you tell the town what is happening? It was decided that one of the best communications vehicles was the PTG. Thus, a PTG subcommittee, headed by Joyce Lovell and Jane Woods, was established. Their committee attended school board meetings throughout the year. We suggest that a PTG communications committee be continued and that reports be given by the committee or school personnel to the parents at PTG meetings. We also suggest that citizens have the opportunity to raise pertinent issues at PTG meetings. A continual dialogue between the schools and the community is important and requires the effort of every citizen.

Your communications committee was instrumental in obtaining wide distribution of the NESDEC Report. We encouraged the

establishment of the School Newsletter which is being published on a monthly basis and is being made available through student distribution and placement at various public locations throughout the town. We recommend that the Newsletter be continued and published on a regular basis so that the voter will know to expect it. We suggest that it contain information from the Superintendent, published on a regular basis so that the voter will know when to expect it. We suggest that it contain information from the Superintendent, Principals, Teachers, School Board, PTG., school news and community activities pertaining to our children. We recommend that the Newsletter include any curriculum reports presented to the School Board, what the teachers are doing and would like to be able to do, classroom activities of general interest and problems faced by our school administrators. The Newsletter has been reproduced by the Spaulding Copy Center without cost to the town. We also recommend that the regular news releases continue to be made to the Union Leader and the Goffstown News.

In substance the committee feels that we should all be aware of what our schools are trying to do and the necessity and justification for budget requests. An informed voter, acquainted with facts, is not likely to be swayed either way by rumor and misinformation.

Public relations is an important task and all too often one that is totally ignored. It is a burden which is often put aside while the essentials are handled. Yet, if we as voters are to properly assess the school budget requests we must make the effort to be informed. Therefore the committee recommends the following:

- 1. Continuation of a PTG communications committee.
- 2. Monthly publication and distribution of the School Newsletter.
 - 3. Periodic press releases on matters of public interest.
- 4. Time available at PTG meetings for reports from the school and comments or questions by citizens.
- 5. That a copy of the School Board minutes be available for reference within the geographical confines of the town either at the town library, school office or town office.

After spending much time attending school board meetings we conclude that its members devote endless hours to school matters. It is our observation that appointment of committees by the

School Board to help them in fact-finding could be of assistance. Transportation, public relations, building needs, and future development committees could be of help to the Board. These committees would also broaden public participation and understanding.

In conclusion it has been an interesting year. Communications are an art and we all as a town have to expend great effort to be informed. We hope that the news media, the PTG, and our School Newsletter will be used more fully to discuss school activities as well as our school problems. Only through such awareness can we work together to support our schools and continually improve them.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Bedford School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1968, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: June 30, 1967-June 30, 1968: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1967 and June 30, 1968, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$93,657.08 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1968.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures — Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1968, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D), a revenue surplus of 6,297.39, less a net overdraft of appropriations of 2,834.29, resulted in a net budget surplus of 3,463.10.

Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibits E-1 & E-2)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1968 made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibits E-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1968, is indicated in Exhibit E-2.

Building Fund Account: (Exhibit F)

A statement of receipts and expenditures for the Building Fund account is included in Exhibit F.

School Lunch Program Account: (Exhibit G)

A statement of the School Lunch Program account is included in Exhibit G.

Statement of School Tax Account: (Exhibit H)

A statement of the School District tax account with the Town of Bedford is presented in Exhibit H. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1968, the School District had received from the Town the total amount of the 1967-68 School Tax, plus a deficit appropriation to be raised in the next fiscal year in the amount of \$3,431.00

Statement of Bonded Indebtedness: (Exhibit I)

A statement of the bonded indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1968, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit I.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased from \$4,237.02 to \$6,894.10, during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1968 as shown herewith:

Overdraft of Appropriations and Application of Municipal Budget Law:

It is noted that there was a net overdraft of appropriations in the amount of \$2,834.29—in other words, total expenditures exceeded total appropriations by this amount as indicated herewith:

The provisions of the Municipal Budget Law (R.S.A. 32:10-a) require that the School Board, with the written approval of the Budget Committee, petition the State Board of Education for a certificate of emergency which would authorize the expenditures made in excess of budgetary appropriations. Our records do not indicate that this procedure was followed.

Treasurer:

As shown on the Classified Statement of Receipts and Expenditures (Exhibit E-1), there was a total amount of unrecorded receipts of \$1,907.20. The audit disclosed that the School District Treasurer failed to reconcile the cash account with the monthly bank statements at any time during the fiscal year.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Treasurer:

Both General and Building Fund balances should be reconciled with bank statement balances at the close of each month.

A bond and coupon register should be maintained as provided under Revised Statutes Annotated 33:12. Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955 require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the School District.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Bedford School District for their assistance during the course of the audit.

REPORT OF NESDEC COMMITTEE

The NESDEC Study Committee has been meeting since last fall. Three subcommittees, Secondary, Elementary and Finances. None of the subcommittees has arrived at any definite recommendation to meet the future educational needs of the town. The subcommittees are continuing their efforts. The following are some of the areas under consideration:

- 1. An addition to the Memorial School to expand the capacity to 500 pupils.
- 2. An addition to the McKelvie School.
- 3. The feasibility of either an AREA or Co-op high school; or a high school in Bedford.

There is a need for additional elementary space in Bedford. Any such building should take into account the requirements of the future and particularly the future high school plans for the school district. Hence, the possibility of a grade 7-12 grouping should not be foreclosed by any building which is constructed in the immediate future.

The finance subcommittee has examined the resources of the district from the point of view of the capacity to pay for future school construction. This subcommittee has concluded that the district can adequately handle future elementary building but is doubtful about high school construction.

The secondary subcommittee has been inquiring into the possibility of a cooperative or AREA high school with Merrimack, the only district which has demonstrated any interest. This subject will continue to be explored. The present indications, however, are not encouraging for such a cooperative high school.

In the consideration of the subcommittees there has been present the situation in Manchester and the future of the parochial schools. Any substantial change in the number of pupils educated in the Manchester parochial schools will probably have a definite effect on Bedford. This possibility has a significant effect on the considerations of the subcommittees.

As recommendations become more concrete the voters of the district will be kept informed. In all probability public meetings relating to future needs and recommendations will be held in the fall of 1969.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Bedford:

On November 1, 1968, the elementary school enrollment in Bedford exceeded one thousand pupils. We anticipate 1086 when school opens next September. The five new rooms in the McKelvie Addition have been finished. It is expected that every teaching station and functional space will be utilized during the 1969-70 school year.

The New England School Development Council Report Blueprints For Learning published last Spring has received wide and penetrating attention. The report has undergone serious consideration by your instructional staff, school board and steering committee.

As Bedford looks to future building construction, motivated by growing school enrollments, and attempts to develop a program to meet the needs of its children, the import of the NESDEC report should be felt. The recommendations and direction afforded by this report are consistent with our present educational objectives and should be given every consideration.

Our new and continuing programs are under the direction of a very competent instructional staff. However, we have found the market for new teachers very competitive and were forced to start this school year with two substitute teachers. Both of these teachers have been replaced by full-time teachers. However, we have been successful in retaining good teachers by developing and maintaining a sound educational program and supporting a competitive salary schedule. It is imperative that we continue to maintain high standards in both of these areas to guarantee our children good teachers and a comprehensive educational program.

REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Dear Mr. Leavitt:

The following paragraphs constitute my report, as Assistant Superintendent, in the School District of Bedford, New Hampshire.

As in each of the past several years, we have seen a significant increase in the Bedford school population, with the grade one through eight enrollment passing the one thousand mark, for the first time. An important consideration, manifest in this growth is the fact that, while numbers have increased, the rate of this increase has accelerated to the point, where Bedford has shown more proportionate growth this year, than any of the other communities within our Supervisory Union. To accommodate this growth and maintain the same quality within our educational program we have added five positions to our staff during the current year.

One of the additional positions has been that of librarian. With the rapid growth of our library facilities, and upon the recommendation of the NESDEC Committee, we resquested and received the necessary funds to implement a full time school librarian. With the support of the library volunteers and the fine work previously done by our town librarians our school libraries are now functional throughout the normal school day. Our basic collection is still somewhat below minimum standards but steadily improving.

Among the improvements in our Primary Unit Program has been the added dimension provided through several pilot projects in team teaching. A group of the teachers at Memorial School have teamed up to improve instruction in the areas of social studies and art. In order to have the space necessary for large group work, they use the cafetorium to carry on this program.

Several more of the teachers in the McKelvie Primary Unit are involved in team teaching projects in large group instructional areas provided through the most recent construction. To this point we feel the instruction in these areas has improved significantly as a result of these innovative practices.

Several of the teachers in the McKelvie Middle School program have also been involved in some cooperative projects designed to provide more individualized instruction for groups whose members are achieving below grade level. Again significantly improved instruction is evident through these programs.

One of the prime concerns among educators today is the totally inadequate job that report cards are capable of doing, particularly in the primary grades. We attempt, with a few over-simplified, symbols to convey the rather complex story of a child's school experience to the parents. Several years ago, Bedford employed a highly successful program of parent-teacher conferences designed to improve rapport between parents and teachers. This year, during the first quarter, we combined an in-depth report with these same pre-scheduled parent-teacher conferences, in the place of the first quarter report card. This program appeared to meet with almost unanimous success and approval by both parents and teachers. It is hoped that during the upcoming academic year report cards in the primary grades will be replaced by a program of this type.

One of the recommendations to emanate from the recent NESDEC report is the need for great quantities of differentiated learning materials. To quote the report "the situation in Bedford is critical in this regard. Teachers and media experts should begin developing quantities of materials and appropriate space arrangements for their efficient utilization. A functioning, well equipped educational media center equipped to serve grades kindergarten through eight is essential." These needs are reflected in the instructional area of our current budget requests.

The pupil-teacher ratio in some of our special areas is now reaching the proportion where the continued effectiveness of the programs is severely threatened. We are most concerned this year in the areas of reading and physical education where the potential ratio has increased to better than a thousand to one. In order to reach all of the pupils that are in need of this specialized help, additional personnel are urgently needed.

In the process of making this Annual Report, I have tried to review some of the highlights of the current year and also take into consideration some of our more obvious needs for the coming school year. In closing I would like to thank the School Board and yourself for direction and guidance, Mr. Little, Mr. Ryerson and the entire school staff for their unfailing cooperation and finally the citizens of Bedford for their commitment to excellence in the total educational program.

Dear Mr. Leavitt:

This report will attempt to cover some of the major happenings at the Memorial School as they have occurred since January of 1968.

The publication of the study by the New England School Development Council, Blueprints For Learning: Plans and Programs For Education In Bedford, New Hampshire, and the subsequent discussions thereof, have provided the incentive for the staff to implement some of the suggestions contained in the report. We are now in the planning stages for a program of self-evaluation of the curriculum. It is hoped that through this program we will be able to make recommendations to further improve our ungraded program.

It is interesting to note that just a little over two years ago, we had to make a decision as to which way the primary school population would be divided for the coming school year as the Stevens-Buswell School was to be closed and a large addition opened at the McKelvie School. At that time, there was a significant difference in the number of students in the two ungraded units. This year, due to the population growth, there is a difference of only thirteen students between the two schools. Thus, we are able to offer primary school students complimentary and comprehensive ungraded programs regardless of where they live.

During the spring of 1968, the Memorial School was awarded a special grant of \$2,000.00 by the State of New Hampshire as part of the Title II program of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965. These funds were available in competition, with other school districts throughout the state. Fortunately, our proposal was approved and we were able to purchase more than six hundred books for our library.

Our centralized library has been in full time operation since October of 1967. During the first few months of its existence, approximately thirty to forty children checked out books each day. Now it is not uncommon for approximately one hundred children to check out books daily. There are several factors that have lead to this tremendous success some of which are and were: the past efforts of our first part-time librarian, Mrs. William Hutton; the continuing help of the volunteer aides sponsored by the New Hampshire Council for Better Schools; the financial support of the citizens of Bedford; and the efforts of Mrs. Raymond Kalman our librarian.

The teachers of levels 1-4 have been working on a modified team teaching basis in social studies, science and art. The initial evaluation of their efforts is that it is working quite well and will be continued.

The teachers of levels 5-6 were assigned various ability groups in language arts and mathematics. This is a change in teaching assignments since, in the past, teachers were assigned similar ability groups in both of these areas. We are presently evaluating the possibility of re-assigning teachers as a yearly procedure.

We feel that we have greatly strengthened our reading program this year. The purchase of needed phonics and other supplementary reading materials has enabled the reading supervisor, Miss Mary Ann Ganem, to not only make alternate suggestions to our teachers relative to teaching methods but also to give them the needed materials to implement the suggestions.

In an effort to identify children with reading difficulties earlier and to avert as many remedial reading problems before they arise, Miss Ganem's efforts have been concentrated in levels 5-8.

The 1968 summer school program sponsored by the Bedford School District helped to serve the needs of our children and those of neighboring communities. Remedial and enrichment programs in language arts and math were offered for elementary school children. A pilot program for advanced students from seven to ten years of age was offered for the first time. The emphasis of the program was on individualized reading and enriching each child's background in art, music and creative dramatics. The program was successful and will be offered again this summer. A course in driver education for young adults was held.

The Parent-Teacher Group published a handbook with some of the information pertinent to the operation of our schools. It has been of significant value to us, especially, when distributed to the new families in town. Our thanks to the P.T.G. for this publication and for their other services to the school.

Mrs. Ursula Jensen retired in June and Mrs. Evelyn Barton was re-assigned from levels 5-6 to fill the vacancy at levels 1-4. Our thanks and best wishes to Mrs. Jensen. She was a professional in all aspects of her work.

My continuing thanks to all those who have given the Memorial School the support that makes it possible to offer the children one of the finest educational experiences in the state.

A special note of thanks is extended to Mr. Claude Leavitt, Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Peter G. Dolloff, Assistant Superintendent of Schools, and to the Bedford School Board, Mrs. Eugene Van Loan, Mr. Earl Isham Jr., and Mr. John Holland for their guidance and support.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL, McKELVIE SCHOOL

1967-68

The McKelvie School has been given the task of educating the children of Bedford. This responsibility entails a thorough understanding of the nature of the educational process, of the content and methods of instruction, of the desirable types of student activities and of the outcomes attained. We must continually and thoroughly assess our basic values, keeping in mind that the needs of the students determine the nature of our program.

Today, rapid advances are being made in our society and to prepare our students for their future educational pursuits, we have organized a "Modern School Curriculum". This curriculum provides a balanced program, the necessary library services, the needed guidance services and special services in remedial reading and speech. Our basic program provides instruction in: Language Arts (Reading, writing, listening and speaking), Mathematics, Social Studies, Science, Art, Music, Physical Education, Foreign Languages.

Through this curriculum and the services provided, we attempt to:

LIBRARY SERVICES

Encourage self-development, arousing interest in reading and library habits.

GUIDANCE

Help parents and teachers understand and aid children when they show the first signs of needing help.

REMEDIAL READING

Provide instruction to all children who experience reading inadequacies.

SPEECH

Provide a consultant and correctionist to those pupils with speech problems.

LANGUAGE ARTS

Develop effective communication and analytical thinking and to provide an experience that will encourage research, originality and initiative.

MATHEMATICS

Equip pupils with the necessary skills and techniques to solve the problems which surround them in their daily lives.

Create an awareness of the structure of mathematics, its laws and principles; sequence and order; scope and content.

SOCIAL STUDIES

Help students to find information, evaluate it and learn to apply this knowledge to their own level of understanding.

SCIENCE

Create an understanding of the day-to-day technological advances and help children to understand the importance of, as well as the reasons for, scientific discoveries.

ART

Create the desire for self-expression and self-adjustment which grows out of working with the hands and mind.

MUSIC

Help children find learning opportunities through natural expressions for singing, listening, reading, creating, writing, playing and discussing.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Create activities that provide for organic, neuro-muscular, and emotional social growth.

FOREIGN LANGUAGES

Provide an intrinsic experience into other cultures through their language.

At the McKelvie School we have continually searched for new practices and approaches. Various types of organizational patterns

have been considered in order to best meet the needs of the pupils and utilize the capabilities of the staff. In the fall, the five unfinished rooms at the school were completed with a large instructional area and two additional classrooms provided for. Team teaching was initiated at the seventh through twelfth levels in the primary unit and in many of the Language Arts and Math areas in the Middle School.

Library facilities have been expanded and coordinated with the addition of a full time librarian. Additional classroom teachers have strengthened our staff and provided for more precise groupings.

The Physical Education and Art programs have been enhanced with more individualized instruction and direction. Soccer, Gymnastics and the intramural programs have been expanded and pupil participation has more than doubled. Creativity in art has reaped many rewards and students have responded enthusiastically.

Space prevents us from describing other areas of growth within the program but our obligation to prepare the children of Bedford for the duties of adult citizenship in our free American society will never diminish.

Dear Mr. Leavitt:

The past months have allowed me to serve the Bedford School System in the capacity of Elementary Counselor. It is with pleasure that I submit my first annual report.

Counseling in the elementary school is composed of two main types:

- 1. The preventative aspects of elementary counseling are predicated on the principle that dealing with the problems of the children as soon as possible after they enter school can better help to alleviate the problems and stresses throughout their school career. The emphasis here is on testing, classroom observation, and conferences with parents, nurse, teachers, specialists, principals, and other interested persons. By identifying the child's potential, the school team can better formulate a curriculum for the maximum development of the child.
- 2. Developmental counseling is different from the above mentioned. It is based on a rationale for counseling children with normal developmental concerns. Counseling is the response to the basic needs of all children, in that all children need to mature in self-reliance. The necessary characteristics needed for this type of counseling are: trust, complete acceptance of the individual, and a non-authoritarian, non-threatening, non-evaluative atmosphere. To best facilitate the developmental approach we have initiated a program of self-referral by the students. The students make their own appointments by filling out slips in the libraries of both schools, as they feel the need to do so. The results clearly indicate that the program has been successful:

Number of students requesting counseling as of Jan. 1 Number of students seen by the counselor as of Jan. 1 Number of students referred to the counselor by parents, teachers, administrators, etc. This year saw the initiation of a state-wide achievement testing program in grades 2, 4, 6 and 8. In Bedford, this affected the children in levels 5, 6 and 9-12 and grades 6 and 8. We continued our own program of achievement testing in levels 7-8 and grade 7. We are also continuing our program of giving the Metropolitian Readiness Tests to all incoming first graders.

I would like to express my sincere thanks to the School Board, Mr. Leavitt and Mr. Dolloff, Mr. Little and Mr. Ryerson, Mrs. Bostwick, Miss Ganem, the faculty, the staff of the Bedford School System, and the parents and students of Bedford for the assistance and help that has been given to me since the beginning of this school year.

I would also like to pay special tribute to Miss Cynthia Mowles whose position I assumed in Sept. Miss Mowles' devotion to students and her professional abilities allowed for the inauguration of a fine program, and Bedford was indeed fortunate to have had such a person on their staff. As she has pointed out in the last two town reports, the major drawback in Bedford is a ratio of over 1,000 students to one counselor. To help alleviate this problem, this spring we will have the services of a Counselor-Reading Specialist Team (this is a team of experienced teachers who are attending the University of New Hampshire on an NDEA Fellowship). They will be with us for 8 weeks and it will be a great help, but it just isn't enough. More counseling personnel are needed.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

January 15, 1969

Mr. Claude H. Leavitt Superintendent of Schools Bedford, New Hampshire

Dear Mr. Leavitt: (Report to the Citizens of Bedford)

Another year has added much to your school nurse's experience and many to your school census which now fluctuates around the 1000 mark.

In April, at our pre-school registration which was held at the McKelvie School, Doctors Gordon Manning and John Kennard examined 120 children who were to enter Levels 1-4 in September. Our first year enrollment as of January 15, is 143. Our total enrollment is 1013.

In May, there was a Lazy Eye Clinic held at the parish house, sponsored by the Lion's Club of Bedford for children 3 to 6 years old, with an excellent attendance. Another such clinic is planned in May this year. Lazy eye, amblyopia, is the leading cause of partial blindness in our children and is almost 100% preventable. But, tragically, few parents are aware of the danger and only a fraction of children are seen in time to save their sight.

The story of amblyopia is the story of the development of vision itself. The newborn sees with only one eye at a time; as he develops, this corrects itself until about the age of two when the images fuse as one. With amblyopia this never happens — one eye is blurred from some disorder as, farsightedness, astigmatism or an eye muscle which is too long or too short. When the child tries to fuse this blurred image with that of his good eye, he does not see as well; so, because of the discomfort, he suppresses the blurry image of his weak eye and, in so doing, stops it from developing.

Because vision development ends by the age of six or seven, it is imperative to effect this correction between the ages of 3 to 6.

As has been the practice for the past two years, a team of optometrists will again do the eye testing in our schools. The most valid reason for this testing being done by professionals is the degree of accuracy that determines problems that a child with 20/20 vision may have that the nurse, alone, may not discover.

Many children, particularly in the lower grades, have difficulty converging their vision in reading at a distance of about thirteen inches from the face. This is not understood by them to be a difficulty and they do not tell the parents or the teacher about it because they assume everyone sees this way. Such a problem, however, can cause a child incredible difficulties in trying to read which could account for poor grades, inattention or disciplinary problems.

In September a Tuberculosis Clinic was held in both schools for all first year children. This is the only age level the State Department is testing now. This is intended to be a yearly clinic.

Although we try to prevent possible hazards to the child's safety by repeated admonitions and supervision, accidents will happen and, with a collection of about one thousand students participating in gym activities and playground exercise, we are fortunate in having such a small percentage of mishaps.

Again we have experienced a moderate count of student absenteeism, due to childhood diseases, the greater number due to the common cold during the year.

Since September, I have been taking two classes a week. One course offered at the University of New Hampshire Branch at Memorial School in Manchester and the other in Laconia. Both have been excellent and most informative courses.

I have also attended a lecture on "The Child and the Law" held at the Wayfarer in October and the Governor's Conference on the handicapped, also held at the Wayfarer in the Fall.

In closing, I must again express my gratitude to all school personnel who have been so helpful and considerate to me. Another year has added to the enjoyment of being a part of the Bedford School System.


