#### **RECORDS OF COUNTY DELEGATION**

Representatives' Hall, State House Concord, N. H. January 8, 1941

The members of the Belknap County Delegation met in Section 5. The meeting was called to order by Chairman C. A. Rollins. Mr. Rollins stated that the nomination of new officers was in order.

Motion was made by Mr. Hopkins, seconded by Elmer Tilton, that Charles A. Rollins be again elected Chairman of Belknap County Delegation.

Mr. Hopkins called for a vote and declared Mr. Rollins unanimously elected Chairman of the Delegation for the ensuing term.

Elmer Tilton then moved, seconded by Mr. Rivers, that Joseph W. Smith serve as Clerk of the Delegation and Joseph W. Smith was declared elected.

Elmer Tilton moved, seconded by Mr. Hopkins, that a committee consisting of five members of the Delegation with the Chairman and Clerk to act, ex officio, be appointed by the chair to act as Budget Committee for the Delegation. Chairman Rollins called for a vote and it was in the affirmative.

The Chairman then stated that this Committee would be appointed at a later date.

After remarks regarding an unsafe piece of road south of Laconia on the Belmont road known as "Dead Man's Curve" by Mr. Philbrick, he moved, seconded by

Elmer Tilton, that a committee of three be appointed to confer with the Highway Department for the improvement of this dangerous curve; the vote being in the affirmative, the Chairman appointed Messrs. Philbrick, Hopkins and Fred Tilton as members of this committee.

The clerk then called a roll of the members of the Delegation.

Those present were C. A. Rollins, Joseph H. Cotton, Samuel Philbrick, C. E. Nichols, Arthur Lord, Morse E. Brown, George Tarlson, Alfred Guay, Elmer S. Tilton, Joseph H. Roucher, Frederick A. Tilton, Arthur R. Merrill, Harry J. Rivers, John M. Ewing, C. O. Hopkins, J. Frank Neal, L. G. Pynn, Walter D. Woodman, Ned C. Rogers and Joseph W. Smith.

On motion of Mr. Guay, seconded by Mr. Rivers, the meeting was closed subject to the call of the Chairman.

Section 5, Representatives' Hall Concord, N. H. January 28, 1941

A meeting of the Belknap County Delegation was called by Chairman Rollins at 11:35 A. M. for the purpose of the appointment of a Budget Committee to examine the budget as made up by the Belknap County Commissioners. Chairman Rollins appointed Charles O. Hopkins, Chairman of this committee and the following members, Arthur Lord, George W. Tarlson, Alfred L. Guay, and J. Frank Neal, with Chairman Rollins and Joseph W. Smith, Clerk to act Ex Officio.

Some remarks were made as to a date for a meeting with the Belknap County Commissioners but no time being set, the meeting was closed at 11:45 A. M.

Room 317, State House Concord, N. H. February 13, 1941 9:30 A. M.

Chairman Rollins asked for a roll call and every member of the Delegation being present, the matter of an appropriation for the Farm Bureau was taken up.

The first speaker, Mr. Bodwell of Sanbornton, asked for an appropriation of \$5400. After some explanation of conditions and what the Farm Bureau was accomplishing, Mr. Bodwell called on Mr. Robinson of the Farm Bureau Extension Service.

Mr. Robinson said that the salaries of the different agents in this County are much under the salaries of the same officials in other states, that the salary of Mr. Royal Smith is \$248.00 less than that of County Agents in other states.

Mr. Bodwell then spoke of the value of an Agricultural Agent, also of the work of the "Home Agent" and the 4-H Club.

Mrs. Varney of Gilford was called on and spoke of the good work accomplished by the Home Agent in bettering the conditions in rural homes.

Mr. O'Shan inquired how much this department is asking for; Royal Smith said \$5400.00.

Mr. Hopkins asked for a breakdown of this department which was given by Mr. Royal Smith.

Mr. Smith said that any balance left over from any previous year would go into next year's account.

Mr. Bodwell then asked Miss Kelley for some remarks. She spoke on the value of the 4-H Clubs and the work done by these clubs for the boys and girls of today.

Mr. Bodwell then called on State Grange Master William H. Neal for remarks. Mr. Neal spoke of the value of these County Agencies. He said these Agents should get more mileage and more expense money which would enable them to get out among the farmers more, that he did not believe it was any time to cut salaries.

Mr. Fred Tilton asked if the expenses in Belknap County would be less in the future.

The public hearing was then closed at 10:30 A. M. Chairman Rollins then introduced Mr. Conway who spoke in regard to binders for the records of deeds of Strafford County previous to 1840, who gave prices of the different kinds of binders for these records and agreed to furnish the Delegation with samples of the material for these different binders. Mr. S. P. Philbrick then spoke for his committee on what had been accomplished in regard to the repairs and straightening the Belmont road and read a draft of a bill to be presented to the House of Representatives. After remarks by Messrs. Fred Tilton and Guay, it was decided to leave the matter with the present Committee to draw up a resolution to be signed by the members of the Delegation, asking the Highway Department to make necessary repairs and straighten the bad curves in this road.

The meeting was adjourned until after the present session of the House today, at 11:00 A. M.

The Delegation reconvened at 12:40 P.M.

It was moved by Mr. Morse, seconded by Fred Tilton, that the sum of fifty-four hundred dollars (\$5400) be appropriated for the Farm Bureau and the vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

Discussion by O'Shan, Morse, Rivers and Fred Tilton in regard to cutting the County Commissioners' budget and Mr. Lord spoke of cutting the relief budget to offset the \$200.00 extra to be given the Farm Bureau.

Chairman Rollins then presented a blue print of the plan for the new annex or addition to the Belknap County Court House and asked the members of the Delegation to examine this blue print and called on Mr. Fred Tilton to explain the plan.

The chair then explained the need of this addition, that the present vault is inadequate for the present records to be stored and remarked that this new addition would cost the County around \$35,000.00, possibly \$40,000.00.

Messrs. Guay and Hopkins spoke in favor of this addition. Mr. Hopkins spoke of a bond issue to finance the project.

Discussion followed by Hopkins, Woodman and Rivers regarding the building. Neal and Hopkins advised hurrying the matter along on account of the possible rise in prices of material.

Moved by Lord, seconded by Neal, "That the Delegation instruct the Board of County Commissioners to immediately contact other architects to submit tentative plans for the new Annex." The vote was unanimously in the affirmative.

Question of a Delegation meeting to be held for the purpose of inspecting the Belknap County property. The time set for this meeting was February 24 at the Court House at 9:30 A. M.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:45 P.M.

Office of the County Commissioners Belknap County Court House February 24, 1941

The Belknap County Delegation met at 9:30 A. M. with all its members present except Elmer Tilton.

Chairman C. A. Rollins opened the meeting by reading a protest by the Nurses' Alumni Association to the passage of House Bill No. 225, an act to regulate the hours of labor of nurses, stating that nursing is a profession and is not subject to the Labor Law.

The petition, asking the Highway Department to straighten and improve the Belmont Road, was presented by Mr. Philbrick and was signed by all of the members of the Delegation present.

Mr. Colby, County Commissioner, then gave a lineup for the plans for the day and introduced Mr. J. Edward Richardson of Dover, N. H., with plans for the new annex to the Court House; after his talk explaining them, Mr. Granger of the firm of Granger and Hudson of Hanover, N. H., showed and explained his plans.

Mr. Wallace of the firm of Pearson, Wallace and Williams, Inc., and Mr. Norman P. Randlett of Laconia exhibited their different plans for the benefit of the delegates.

Commissioner Colby then explained in regard to the different bids received and not received and read a copy of his letters to the different architects he had contacted.

Messrs. Hopkins, Fred Tilton, and Guay spoke in favor of the new annex. Mr. Fred Tilton then moved, seconded by Pynn, "That we build an addition to the Court House." The vote was in the affirmative. Mr. Fred Tilton then moved, seconded by Pynn, "That the Delegation take up the consideration of plans offered, at the present time." The vote was in the affirmative.

Mr. Fred Tilton then moved, seconded by Mr. Merrill, the acceptance in substance of the plan offered by Mr. Randlett. The vote was in the affirmative. Mr. Fred Tilton then moved, seconded by Mr. O'Shan, that a building committee of five be appointed. The vote was in the affirmative.

Discussion followed on a bond issue to finance the building of the annex by Messrs. Hopkins, Fred Tilton, Colby, Langlois and Chairman Rollins.

The meeting was then recessed at 12:10 P.M.

The Delegation, with the County Commissioners, then proceeded to the Belknap County Farm where they were met by Supt. Sanborn, Dr. Brown (county physician) and the Rev. Fitzpatric.

Supt. Sanborn then invited the Delegation and other visitors to the dining room and after prayer by Rev. Mr. Fitzpatric, a most delicious turkey dinner was served by the Matron Mrs. Sanborn.

Following the dinner, a report of the Budget Committee was given by Chairman Charles Hopkins. Remarks were then made on the subject by Mr. Rollins, Hopkins and O'Shan.

Mr. Fred Tilton then moved, seconded by Mr. Rivers, "That we make the budget \$191,717.57 for the year 1941," with a vote in the affirmative. Moved by Mr. Philbrick, seconded by Mr. Guay, "That we make the tentative budget \$175,000.00 for the year of 1942." The vote was in the affirmative.

Chairman Rollins then appointed a building committee of five for the annex to the Belknap County Court House, consisting of Mr. Hopkins, chairman, and Messrs. Guay, Fred Tilton, Pynn, and Rogers. Moved by Hopkins, seconded by Pynn, that we now adjourn.

Meeting was adjourned at 2:20 P.M.

The Delegation then drove to and inspected the new Airport and the Belknap County Area.

#### Meeting of the Belknap County Delegation

The meeting was held in the Recreation Room of the State House in Concord, April 30, 1941, at 9:30 A. M., with the following members present: Chairman Rollins, S. P. Philbrick, C. E. Nichols, Arthur H. Lord, David O'Shan, George W. Tarlson, Leo Langlois, Elmer S. Tilton, Joseph H. Roucher, Alfred Guay, John M. Ewing, C. O. Hopkins, J. Frank Neal, L. G. Pynn, J. W. Smith, Walter D. Woodman and Ned C. Rogers, also County Commissioners Colby and Lydiard.

Mr. Hopkins, Chairman of the Building Committee, reported that the lowest bid covering new annex and changes in present building was \$31,761.00. This does not include architect's fee, vault doors and accessories, which, as estimated, would bring the total cost to \$33,762.12.

There were remarks on county expenses by Elmer Tilton who asked if there was not some way to reduce costs of the building. Remarks on Belknap County expenses were made by Chairman Rollins. Mr. Hopkins asked that we take up the question of financing. It was moved by Elmer Tilton, seconded by Mr. Lord, that the vote recorded "in the affirmative" in the minutes of the meeting of February 24, 1941, should be recorded as being unanimous.

Commissioner Colby spoke against a bond issue. Discussion followed upon the matter of financing the building project.

It was moved by Mr. Hopkins, seconded by Mr. Philbrick, to authorize the County Commissioners to raise an amount not to exceed \$35,000 for the erection of a new court house annex and alterations to old building, according to plans and specifications drawn by Norman P. Randlett, architect, by direct taxation for the current year.

Mr. O'Shan offered an amendment to extend time of payment over a period of two years. After discussion, in which the Chairman of the Commissioners opposed this plan, the motion was withdrawn.

After further discussion, the Chairman put the motion of Mr. Hopkins and it was carried unanimously.

Meeting adjourned at 10:30 A. M.

#### **COMMISSIONERS' REPORT**

#### To the Citizens of Belknap County:

In compliance with the laws of the State of New Hampshire, the Commissioners of Belknap County present the annual report of the County Commissioners, Treasurer, Superintendent of Farm and House of Correction, Clerk of Superior Court, Sheriff, Solicitor, Farm Physician, Chaplain and Auditors for the year ending December 31, 1941.

One of the laws enacted by the 1938 legislature changed the term of office from April 1st to January 1st. Edward L. Lydiard, 1st District, Charles W. Small, 2nd District, and Oliver M. Colby, 3rd District, were given the oaths of office by Clerk of Court Harry Trapp on January 1, 1941.

Relief still demands the largest appropriation although less than one-third of three years ago.

New offices and vault have been provided for the Register of Deeds and Register of Probate, also a new Probate Court Room. This addition was paid for without issuing bonds.

A standard form of insurance has been adopted that results in greater coverage without increase in cost or change in Agency.

The Airport in Gilford has been finished as far as the County is concerned although the C. A. A. have the finish surfacing of the runways to complete this spring. Some W. P. A. crews are at work completing the road and clearing ground to allow better visibility between the two runways. The landing field at the County Farm will be under cultivation this spring.

The County Farm as a Farm and as a Home compares very favorably with any other in the state and your commissioners as well as Mr. and Mrs. Sanborn invite your inspection.

For the third consecutive year your County closed its books with an unborrowed cash balance and the taxes for 1942 will be about \$58,000 less than 1941.

#### **REPORT OF COUNTY SOLICITOR**

## To the Honorable Board of County Commissioners and the Citizens of Belknap County:

It is my pleasure to submit at this time my first report as County Solicitor.

More than seventy criminal cases have been prosecuted by this office in the various municipal courts and the Belknap County Superior Court during the past year. At the March Term of Superior Court, out of five persons indicted, three pled guilty and were sentenced by the Court. Final disposition of the other two defendants has been delayed by their imprisonment for offenses in another county. All eight persons indicted, for nine offenses, at the October Term, 1941, pled guilty and were sentenced by the Court. Of the fourteen indictments, five were for breaking and entering, four for larceny, four for morals charges and one for passing a forged instrument. Nine of these fourteen offenses were committed in the City of Laconia and five in the towns throughout the county. Cases prosecuted in municipal courts have been of something over twenty-five types of offenses, including particularly assaults, larcenies, non-support cases, morals charges and motor vehicle law violations.

In addition to the cases actively prosecuted as above mentioned there have been many matters of a public nature on which this office has been consulted by private citizens. I have endeavored particularly to give full cooperation to various town officials, and to the County Commissioners in both criminal and civil matters affecting the county. There has also been full cooperation with various state departments who have asked for assistance.

In at least two instances I have been requested by complaining witnesses to drop prosecution of the respective cases for reasons personal to them. Consistently with the principle that criminal prosecutions are public matters and not personal actions between the complainant and the defendant, I have refused these requests and insisted that the cases come before the proper court for disposition.

Several deaths by accidental drowning have occurred, at some expense to the County in recovering the bodies, the heaviest expense being \$159.75 in the case of a double drowning. Except for investigation on the possibility of a crime having been committed, the County has no legal obligation in these matters. However, it has been the practice in this County, and I understand throughout the state, to make every reasonable effort to recover the body of a drowned person. In one instance during the past year two boys, one reportedly a draft evader, simulated a drowning and it was not until some weeks later that one of them was located in the middle west. In this instance the County expenditure ran only to \$41.00, because, in view of the lack of any specific information which might lead to locating the bodies and the lack of any criminal aspect, it was not deemed reasonable to institute dragging operations.

I have had and appreciate the full cooperation of the County Sheriff's department under Sheriff Frederick D. Elliott.

In submitting my tenth annual report as Chaplain of Belknap County, I find that the success of the past year has been made possible through the spirit of cooperation which you have manifested and the interest which you have shown in my work as Chaplain.

As usual, it is rather difficult to correctly estimate the amount of good which has been achieved among the people during the past year, but I do sincerely believe that some good at least has been accomplished. I have been greatly aided in my work by the kindly consideration which has been shown by Superintendent and Mrs. Sanborn who have assisted in every way possible that the work might be successful. During the latter part of the year there has been a marked decrease in the number of men in the jail and the house of correction. Perhaps the most outstanding of all our gatherings was the Christmas Party which was held Christmas night, when after singing carols and special music each inmate of the institution received two Christmas presents and fruit from the beautiful and bountifully laden tree which had thoughtfully been provided by Mr. and Mrs. Sanborn.

I feel that we are most fortunate in having such kind and thoughtful people in charge of the work as Mr. and Mrs. Sanborn and I have always found them ready to do all in their power to make those under their care happy and contented.

I realize full well that the coming year will no doubt be one of great difficulty along all lines of administration and I trust that guidance and wisdom from above may be given you in the conduct of the affairs of our fine county.

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
