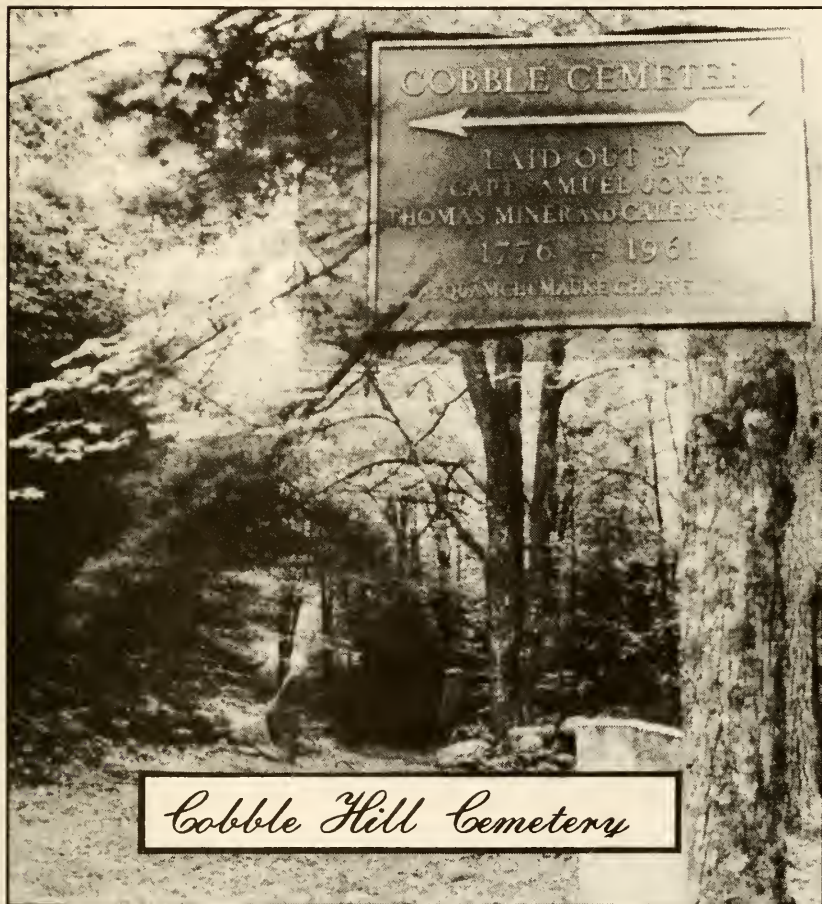

Important Points to Build On

Town of Canaan's Checklist

Building Permits:

As of April 1st all penalties will be imposed on all projects that are under construction without an authorized building permit signed by the Building Inspector and the Board of Selectmen. If you are replacing or installing a new furnace, you'll also need a permit from the Fire Department.

Septic Systems Designs:

The Town of Canaan is now on the State's "*Pre-Approval List*" for new or altered septic designs. All proposed designs must go to the Board of Selectmen for their approval prior to going to DES.

NH Energy Code:

All applicants filing for a Building Permit that pertains to new construction must fill out a NH Energy Application, which may be picked up at the Town Office.

Construction in a Flood Zone:

All construction or the installation of modular or mobile home must all be above the high water mark.

This past year, our K-9 team has conducted over 30 Calls For Service including building searches, evidence recovery, drug interdiction, and tracks. K9 Kipper is used primarily for Search and Rescue, and K9 Carmen is a general purpose patrol dog. The K-9 unit has also done many exhibitions throughout the school system and other organizations within the Community.

The Old Cobble Hill Cemetery

The burying grounds known as "The Cobble," were laid out by Captain Samuel Jones, Thomas Miner and Deacon Caleb Welch in 1776. Captain Jones was married to John Scofield's daughter Miriam, Thomas Miner was our second settler and the Deacons were only the eighth family to settle in town.

The first person to be buried in Cobble Hill was Captain Charles Walworth in 1782. Deacon Caleb Welch who died in 1815, was also buried there, however, the graves of neither men were ever marked with a stone. In 1803, the town voted to fence their cemeteries. There were five at that time. It was in 1838, that the stone wall was built to enclose the Cobble graveyard. This was done by family members of the people who are buried there. It is also interesting to know, when the cemetery was laid out, the old road went directly by it and came out on Gristmill Hill Road, near the old Alvin Davis farm.

In 1897 an article was printed in the Canaan Reporter regarding the condition of the cemetery. It read:

"In the southern part of Canaan, near South Road, is the old Cobble Hill grave yard, which has grown up into bushes and has several grave stones in great need of repair. This is a disgrace to our dead. There are some seventy graves, many having stones erected, but several have no markers of any kind. On some can be seen the following inscriptions;

Betsey W. Gilman, died 1833, age 88

James Morse, died 1818, age 49

Lois Morse, died 1820, age 45

Elisha Miner, died 1844, age 60

Nicah Porter, died 1811, age 68

George Harris, died 1790, age 70

Sarah Currier, died 1866, age 72

Benjamin Haynes, died 1836, age

Daniel Farnum, died 1810, age 62

Stop friend and read as you pass by

nor let me here forgotten lie

Remember, time flies swift away

and deaths a debt you soon must pay

Several townspeople have agreed to meet Saturday next at Sim Currier's place and give the old burying ground a face lift. Some fresh trees will be planted to take the place of the ones that blew down last spring and it is planned to reset several grave stones. The men will do the work and it is hoped the women folk will provide the food for the day."

These "Cemetery Bees" as they were called took place at our various cemeteries through out the years. In the 1930's several gravestones were stolen from the old Cobble. An investigation took place, but no trace of the stones was ever found. In August of 1961, when Canaan celebrated its Bicentennial, a special ceremony was held at the Cobble Hill Cemetery honoring the burial place of several of our early settlers. Leaving their cars along South Road, thirty-five people hiked about an eighth of a mile to the old Cobble where a wreath was placed. A commemorative stone was erected for Thomas Miner who served in the Revolutionary War and died in 1825. Taps were played, and the Legion firing squad sounded a salute.

Over two centuries have now passed since our first settlers were laid to rest in the Old Cobble. Today, there are only about thirty gravestones still standing and some of them are not legible.

Many thanks to Donna Dunkerton for making all the pictures in this Town Report available for our use so that we, as a community, can all enjoy and remember. It is much to her devoted efforts Canaan's history will live on.

ANNETTE B. BURNS

This year's Town Report is dedicated to Annette B. (Provost) Burns.



Annette B. (Provost) Burns was born in Ware Massachusetts, on January 26, 1911, the Daughter of Henri Provost and Blanche Manegre Provost. After graduating from Enfield High School in 1929 she graduated from Plymouth Normal School with a B.E. Degree. She later earned a masters degree in French from Middlebury College upon her graduation from Plymouth. Annette taught at Canaan High School for more than 20 years where in addition to teaching she coached several musical productions and plays. She retired from the Lebanon School District where she taught French at Lebanon Junior High School for several years. For several summers Annette supervised the summer programs at Williams Field in Canaan. She attended St. Mary's Church in Canaan where she was the organist for some time. She was married to William T. Burns at St. Helena's church in Enfield on June 29, 1942. Annette was very interested in music she was an accomplished pianist as well as a recorder player. She played recorders with several groups in the Upper Valley. She volunteered at the Meals-on-wheels program for many years. In addition to enjoying her music she enjoyed her home, books, flowers and rug hooking. She was a former member of the Beta Chapter, Delta Kappa Gamma Society, a society for outstanding women teachers. Annette B. Burns died at the Brookside Nursing Home on January 14, 1999.

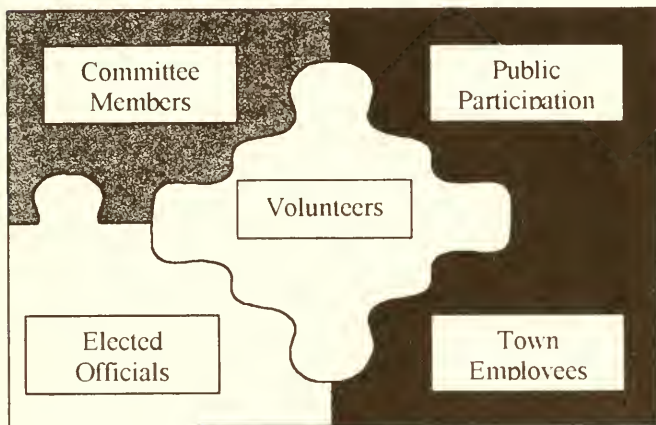

Town Warrant

State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Canaan, New Hampshire, who are qualified to vote in Town affairs.

First Session

The first session of the annual Town Meeting will be held on Saturday January 30th, 1999 at 10:00 AM at the Indian River School. The first session will consist of explanation, discussion, and debate of each of the following warrant articles, and will also afford voters who are present the opportunity to propose, debate, and adopt amendments to warrant articles, except those articles whose wording is prescribed by state law.

Second Session

The second session of the annual Town Meeting, to elect Town officers by official ballot and to vote on all warrant articles as they have been amended at the first session, will be held on Tuesday March 9th, 1999 at the Canaan Fire Station. Polls for voting by official ballot at the Canaan Fire Station will open at 8:00 AM and close at 7:00 PM, unless the Town votes to keep the polls open to a later hour.

Article 1: To vote by non-partisan ballot for the following Town Officers:

A Selectmen for a term of one year.

A Selectmen for a term of three years.

A Town Clerk/Tax Collector for a term of three years.

A Treasurer for a term of one year.

A Cemetery Trustee and Trustee of the Trust Funds for a term of three years.

A Human Resource Office for a term of one year.

Two Library Trustees for a term of three years each.

Two Planning Board Members for a term of three years each.

A Road Agent for a term of three years.

Three Budget Committee Members for a term of three years each.

Article 2: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000,000 for the purpose of a combined project to (1) renovate the existing town office building and library for the use as a town library and community center; and (2) construct a new town building for use as town offices, including the police station and FAST squad; and (3) to purchase any needed equipment that is related to either building, and to authorize the issuance of bonds or notes in that amount in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, RSA Chapter 33, and to authorize the board of selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon and other terms and conditions thereof.

(This article is not included in the operating budget.)

(2/3 vote required.)

(Board of Selectmen does recommend by the vote of: 3 – 0)

(Budget Committee does recommend by the vote of: 7 – 1)

Article 3: Shall the Town raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by Special Warrant Articles not included in the operating budget, the amount set forth on the budget posted with the Warrant, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$1,711,866.00? Should this article be defeated the operating budget shall be \$1,711,866.00, which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous actions of the Town or by law or the governing body may hold a special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only.

(Board of Selectmen does recommend by the vote of: 3 – 0)

(Budget Committee does recommend by the vote of: 8 – 0)

Article 4: To see if the Town will vote to establish a capital reserve fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of Town Landfill Closure, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,275 to be placed in this fund and to designate the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend this fund. Further, to transfer into this fund the sum of \$31,425 which was raised and appropriated for the purpose of town landfill closure under Article 7 at the 1994 annual town meeting and which was designated as a nonlapsing appropriation until December 31, 1999. The new appropriation of \$13,275 will be raised by taxation.

(*This article is not included in the operating budget.*)

(Board of Selectmen does recommend by the vote of: 3 – 0)

(Budget Committee does recommend by the vote of: 6 – 1 and 1 abstention)

Article 5: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$28,700 from the Capital Reserve title Revaluation Fund, to be used towards the third payment of the Property Valuation Update.

(*This article is not included in the operating budget.*)

(Board of Selectmen does recommend by the vote of: 3 – 0)

(Budget Committee does recommend by the vote of: 6 – 2)

Article 6: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$18,500.00 to be placed in the existing Highway Garage Capital Reserve Fund designated for the cost of constructing a new Highway Department Garage. Said sum (\$18,500.00), will be raised by taxation.
(*This article is not included in the operating budget.*)
(Board of Selectmen does recommend by the vote of: 3 – 0)
(Budget Committee does recommend by the vote of: 5 – 3)

Article 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be placed in the existing Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund designated for purchasing of new or used Fire Equipment. Said sum (\$1, 000.00), will be raised by taxation.
(*This article is not included in the operating budget.*)
(Board of Selectmen does recommend by the vote of: 3 – 0)
(Budget Committee does recommend by the vote of: 8 – 0)

Article 8: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$89,650.00 to purchase a new or used Equipment/Rescue Truck and related equipment and to authorize the withdrawal of \$57,000 from the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund which is designated for purchasing of new or used Fire Equipment; the balance will come from a transfer \$15,650 from the undesignated fund balance and \$17,000 from taxation.
(*This article has been designated a Special Warrant Article, therefore it is not included in the operating budget.*)
(Board of Selectmen does recommend by the vote of: 3 – 0)
(Budget Committee does recommend by the vote of: 6 – 2)

Article 9: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, (under RSA 41:9-a) to establish or amend fees for the issuance of any license or permit which is part of a regulatory program established by a vote of town meeting. This authority shall remain in effect until rescinded by a future vote of a town meeting.

(Board of Selectmen does recommend by the vote of: 3 – 0)

(Budget Committee does not recommend by the vote of: 4 – 5)

Article 10: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 to be donated to the Canaan F.A.S.T Squad to help defray the cost of a new ambulance. Said sum (\$20,000.00), to be transferred from the Town's undesignated fund balance.

(This article has been designated a Special Warrant Article, therefore it is not included in the operating budget .)

(Board of Selectmen does recommend by the vote of: 3 – 0)

(Budget Committee does recommend by the vote of: 5 – 4)

Article 11: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 to be used to purchase a new or used segmented recycling container for use at the transfer station. Said sum (\$6,000.00), to be raised from taxation.

(This article has been designated a Special Warrant Article, therefore it is not included in the operating budget .)

(Board of Selectmen does recommend by the vote of: 3 – 0)

(Budget Committee does recommend by the vote of: 7 – 1)

Article 12: To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the town created expendable general fund trust known as the "Tax Deed Acquired Property Clean-up Fund" pursuant to RSA 31:19-a, so that all sums contained in said fund will be transferred to the Town's general fund.

(This article is not included in the operating budget .)

(Board of Selectmen does recommend by the vote of: 3 – 0)

(Budget Committee does recommend by the vote of: 7 – 1)

Article 13: To see if the Town will vote to establish a Conservation Fund as permitted by RSA 36-A:5 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000 to be placed in said fund. The appropriation of \$6,000 to the Conservation Fund will be raised from taxation.

Article 14: To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or any other Officers.

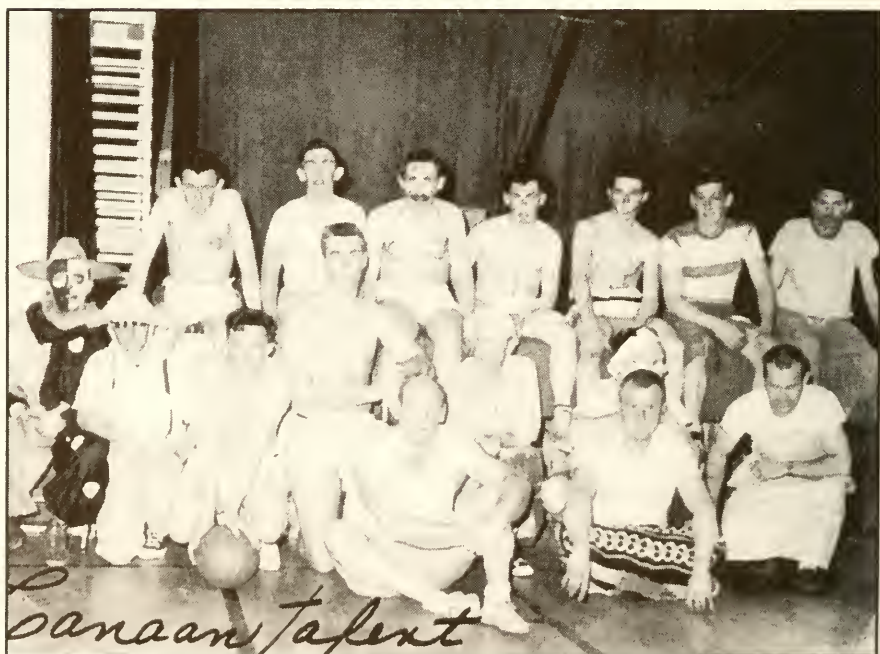

To the Board of Selectmen
Town of Canaan, New Hampshire

In planning and performing our audit of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Canaan, New Hampshire for the year ended December 31, 1997, we considered its internal control structure in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the general purpose financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control structure.

However, during our audit we became aware of several matters that are opportunities for strengthening internal controls and operating efficiency. The memorandum that accompanies this letter summarizes our comments and recommendations regarding those matters. A separate report dated February 3, 1998, on internal accounting control. This report does not effect our report dated February 3, 1998 on the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Canaan, New Hampshire for the year ended December 31, 1997.

Implication

Budgetary control maybe weakened and historical perspective may be lost.

Recommendation

Budget transfers should only be made by the Board of Selectmen as provided by State law. Reclassification of expenditures should be limited to error correction only.

CDBG REVOLVING LOAN FUND

Observation

During the years ending December 31, 1997 and 1996 the CDBG Revolving Loan Fund had no activity other than interest earnings.

Implication

These funds may have restrictions or be available for use by the Town.

Recommendation

We urge Town official to contact the regional planning commission who administered the original grant or the Office of State Planning to determine any disposition of the funds.

NON-LAPSING APPROPRIATIONS

Observation

At the 1997 Town Meeting an appropriation designated as non-lapsing by a previous meeting was reappropriated.

Implication

Additional tax dollars may have been unnecessarily raised.

Recommendation

We recommend that the Town adopt procedures which will insure that non-lapsing appropriations are properly treated.

WATER FILTRATION GRANT

Observation

The Town is the recipient of a State water filtration grant which is scheduled to be paid over the life of the 1989 water debt. The Town has not estimated this revenue when preparing the annual budget.

Implication

The Town may be raising additional tax revenue.

Recommendation

We believe Town official should obtain the grant schedule from the applicable State agency and include the revenue annually as part of the budget process.

INACTIVE BANK ACCOUNTS

Observation

The Dow Road and Canaan Celebration bank accounts have been inactive for several years.

Implication

Control over cash may be weakened when multiple inactive accounts are present. The potential for unintentional errors is enhanced due to the requirements of additional monthly reconciliation procedures .

Recommendation

The accounting system can easily record these restricted funds without separate bank accounts. We recommend that the accounts be closed to the Town's cash accounts. The Dow Road and Canaan Celebration balances would receive their proportionate share of interest earnings through book entry.

BUDGETARY ACCOUNTS

Observation

We observed that the budget on the accounting system was not reconciled to the voted Town Meeting budget. Budgeted amounts for capital outlay and special articles are entered when the applicable expenditures are made. A transfer was made to the Town Office Renovation Capital Reserve Fund in error.

Implication

Budgetary control may be weakened.

Recommendation

We recommend that the entire approved budget be entered immediately after Town Meeting. Any necessary modifications can be posted after the Department of Revenue Administration has approved the tax rate. Policies should be adopted to insure that all proposed expenditures have a budget line prior to check preparation.

BUDGETARY MODIFICATION

Observation

We noted that expenditures were reclassified within departments to conform to budgetary amounts.

We have audited the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Canaan, New Hampshire as of and for the year ended December 31, 1997, and have issued our report thereon dated February 3, 1998.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement.

The management of the Town of Canaan, New Hampshire is responsible for establishing and maintaining an internal control structure. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of internal control structure policies and procedures. The objectives of an internal control structure are to provide management with reasonable, but not absolute, assurance that assets are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of general purpose financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Because of inherent limitations in any internal control structure, errors or irregularities may nevertheless occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of the structure to future periods is subject to the risk that procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the effectiveness of the design and operation of policies and procedures may deteriorate.

In planning and performing our audit of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Canaan, New Hampshire for the year ended December 31, 1997, we obtained an understanding of the internal control structure. With respect to the internal control structure, we obtained an understanding of the design of relevant policies and procedures and whether they have been placed in operation, and we assessed control risk in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the general purpose financial statements and not to provide an opinion on the internal control structure. Accordingly, we do not express such an opinion.

Our consideration of the internal control structure would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control structure that might be material weaknesses under standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control structure elements does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that errors and irregularities in amounts that would be material in relation to the general purpose financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. We noted no matters involving the internal control structure and its operation that we consider to be material weaknesses as defined above.

However, we noted certain matters involving the internal control structure and its operation that we have reported to the management of the Town of Canaan, New Hampshire in a separate letter dated February 3, 1998.

This report is intended for the information of management and the Board of Selectmen. However, this report is a matter of public record, and its distribution is not limited.

Selectmen's Report 1998

This has been a good year for our Town. In November the Selectmen set the tax rate for the calendar year 1999 at \$29.92, rates identical to that set for the calendar year 1998; and don't forget that we voted a salary adjustment for our teachers. In fact the tax rate has only increased by five cents in the past five years! Keep in mind that we also purchased a new fire truck (\$150,000), a new police cruiser (\$21,700), and a one ton truck for the road department (\$34,000); all of which translates into increased protection for our citizens and their property and better road maintenance. There were also many other expenditures, large and small that added an additional (\$83,839), all designed to make ours an even better place to call "Our Town". How was all this possible with no increase in taxes? It was possible because of three elements: (1.) Capital Improvement Program (CIP), (2.) our Town investment program, and (3.) good management on the part of all of the Town's service departments.

This year we also had some unanticipated changes in personnel. Tom Rankin, the Town Administrator, left for greener pastures. A Search Committee was formed to find a replacement; after evaluating a number of candidates, the Committee decided the best candidate was Selectmen Steve Iacuzzi. Because of Steve's resignation as Selectmen, the remaining Selectmen asked Edward Labrie to serve for the remainder of Mr. Iacuzzi's term. Ed had been a selectmen in town for a period of time in excess of four years. Both choices have proved to be excellent ones for our town.

The Board has also played an active part in trying to resolve the Question of how to best meet the present and future needs of our town for the Library, Town Offices, Police Station and First Aid (FAST Squad). This was accomplished through the appointment of a Building Committee. The ten member Committee consisted of the three Selectmen, and the remainder of the members held elected Town positions. As a result of the Committee's deliberations the Selectmen authorized:

- (1.) A structural engineering study of our Town building
- (2.) The replacement of the leaking roof and structural correction of roof code deficiencies
- (3.) A proposed plan for the Town Offices, Library, Police Station, Fast Squad, and Community Center.

The solution of this longstanding renovation/building controversy will further improve the service to all Town people and enhance property values.

The Board of Selectmen, and Conservation Commission, acted to save the 100 acre (formerly the Monamey property on the Route 4 /

S - Curve) as a Conservation/Recreation area. For more details see the Conservation Commission Report.

In a similar vein the Board, and the Conservation Commission, has taken an active role to prevent the unlicensed spread of junkyards in our Town. These junkyards not only sharply reduce the value of all surrounding properties, but also are a potential source of ground and surface water pollution.

Most recently, the Board has authorized the construction of a new septage lagoon at our waste treatment facilities. The availability of this lagoon will permit the acceptance of Canaan household septic waste at a savings of an average of \$50.00 per septic tank cleaning to the home owner; it will also generate some additional revenue for the treatment facilities' long term needs.

Finally the Selectmen would like to thank the relatively small group of Canaan citizens who consistently attend the Selectmen's Meetings, as well as other Town Committee meetings. This group of citizen "watch dogs" serve an important function by providing a wealth of Town history and supplemental information critical to sound decision process. It is the Board's wish that more citizens join this group, and for all citizens to resolve to attend even just one meeting to familiarize themselves with "Our Town's" governmental processes.

The Board of Selectmen would also like to recognize and thank:

- The Lions Club for their offer to build and maintain, at no cost to the Town, a gazebo/band stand on the Town Green;
- The Main Street organization for their offer to build a Town Crier, for placement in front of the Town building, again at no cost to the Town;

The WISE Board of Directors and staff thank the residents of Canaan for their support in 1998. Thirty-one Canaan residents used WISE services from July 1997, through the end of June 1998. The total represents an unduplicated count, and does not reflect the total numbers of contact hours with each client.

Our services include a 24-hour hotline, crisis intervention, safehomes, help with Relief from Abuse Orders, court advocacy, support groups and community education. Last year, WISE provided services to more than 1,000 area men and women.

Also a growing component of WISE, the Youth Awareness Program has an increasing role in area schools, with considerable attention to the Mascoma School District. Last year WISE made 68 presentations to students at Indian River School and the Mascoma High School. WISE works with students throughout the region with the message that violent relationships are not healthy relationships. These programs are designed to help teens say "NO" to violence in their lives, and to work toward developing more equal and non-violent ways of relating to their peers.

Canaan's support of WISE allows us to accompany victims of abuse to court, hospitals, shelters, and safehomes. Your assistance also makes it possible for us to expand the training opportunities for those in our communities who are interested in becoming a part of our critical volunteer structure.

With Canaan's support, WISE can continue to offer all of our crisis services FREE of charge. We appreciate the positive working relationship we have with Canaan, as we all work toward violence free lives for the citizens of the Upper Valley.

1998 Police Report

Again this year was extremely busy for the Canaan Police Department. This opening is starting to sound like a record. Our calls for service seemed to have leveled out somewhat. The past two years took a major jump. But this year we are on par with last year. Each year seems to bring with it a new series of issues. In years past we have been inundated with animal complaints. This year we had a quarter of what we had last year. What has plagued us this year has been juvenile issues. If you are not aware we have actually had to place an officer in the High School to deal with the rising amount of crimes happening there. When this started we were receiving numerous complaints of students leaving the building who weren't authorized to. Once out, they were congregating on other people's property. There they were littering, smoking cigarettes and getting into fights. Officer Tony Bishop, who has been working at the school, has put a serious dent in this activity. His duties consist of patrolling the grounds for truant students tend to congregate, helping school administration deal with violent acts in the school, gathering information on drug issues within the school, dealing with truancy and any other criminal matters that come up within the school setting. He is also responsible for building a relationship between the students and the police. I think we all can remember when we were young and what we thought of any one in authority. You never thought of them as people, just someone out there trying to catch you doing something wrong. Tony has done a great job here in correcting that myth. He isn't there to laugh and joke with the students. He is there as a professional but also as a caring human being. The need for an officer is there. In the few weeks before Christmas break he made an arrest for possession of marijuana and found three students who were in possession of knives. Crime happens everywhere, whether it is in a small community or in a large city. Television has brought big city problems to every corner of the earth. I read this weekend in the paper where an 8-year-old boy and his mother were murdered in their home. He was a witness in a murder trial. What kind of WORLD do we live in were an 8-year-old can't be safe in his own home. Between Tony,

Principal John Moses and Vice Principal Victor Santiago they are chipping away and making a difference.

Sergeant Timothy Cohen has the new K-9 program going in full swing. It has been a great bonus to us here. Not only in the effectiveness in police work but in public relations, there have been many situations where the subject of the K-9 has really brought people in touch with the Police Department. The students at Cardigan Mountain School did a fund-raiser to help with costs of the program. Sgt. Cohen has been to almost all the schools to show off his dogs. He has done a great job and it seems to be a great success.

This year the federal agencies were good to the Canaan Police Department. We receive approximately \$7,000 dollars in technology grants. We were able to upgrade our computer system dramatically. We also were able to put a video camera system in one of our cruisers. Hopefully the guys in Washington, with all the money, will smile upon us again this year. I know this is a sore subject in the town but I will touch on it briefly. This year I was on the 1998 building committee, I believe that we have finally come up with a plan that will work for the town. We have put together a combination plan for building a new Police Station/ Town Hall/ Fast Squad Garage over by the existing fire department. The existing Town Hall will be renovated to house the Library and a community center. The library will be able to expand and the community center will fill a void in this town. The entire project will cost \$1,000,000. And yes, it will be a bond issue. But this is the breakdown and how it will be funded if it is approved. With the community center we will be able to go after few hundred thousand dollars in grant money. The bond will be paid for out of the interest made from the town's investments. We are receiving approximately \$80,000 a year now in interest. If we were to bond \$800,000 the interest would make the yearly bond payments with some to spare. Thanks to the good investments by the Town Treasurer and great money management, this project will finally come to a conclusion. Hopefully everyone will come out and vote with the future of Canaan in mind.

Hopefully 1999 will be a bright year for the town of Canaan. Together we can make our community a safe and enjoyable place to raise our families.

Canaan Highway Department

1998 was a busy year for the highway department. Multiple small snow storms 1" to 3" commonly falling on week ends we're a great strain on our material resources and man power. (Not much rest) However mud season was gentler than usual in part to mother nature and because our residents on the back roads kept there trips to a minimum reducing stress to the roads during this most vulnerable time of year. Many thanks to you all for your consideration. The exception, was Jerusalem road, although the resident's cooperated, Mother nature did not and we spent many hours in the rain hauling gravel to Jerusalem road. We experienced flooding on two occasions this year, and much of New England suffered major wash outs of there roads and bridges both on state and local levels. However I am proud to report that not one road in Canaan was washed out. Only minor was washing occurred, and all was repaired within weeks.

We crushed a large pile of asphalt we had collected over the years and will be using it to supplement our gravel roads in 1999. Again this year we screened 3,500 cu.yds. of winter sand, mowed the road sides, and continued our magnesium chloride program to keep the dust down on the back roads. We paver shimmed two more miles of road after removing countless stone, replacing culverts, and installing curtain drain to stop water from coming to the surface. These we're Talbert hill road, South road from route 4 to mud pond road, and a good portion of Clifford hill on South road. We also did patching of pot holes, and extensive asphalt hand shimming on several tar roads to smooth up some very rough spots.

On our gravel roads we replaced dozens of culverts, pulled stones, and graded. We also replaced several driveway culverts that we're failing and plan to do many more of these next year. We hired a tree company to remove trees on a sections of River road, and Gilman hill road, so we can widen the these sections as soon as possible. Apart from our road work like other small town highway department are called on to use our equipment and man power to help the parks and recreation, Transfer station and any other departments that needs our resources.

As I submit, this report on January 20th 1999, We have been enduring a terrible winter due to above average amounts of freezing rain. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the residents for there patients and support my crew for the many days and nights away from there families do to the nature of there jobs, and for the times they have put themselves at great risk to keep the roads open for the community. Trust me when I tell you it takes a lot of courage to drive a loaded truck down a long steep hill that's coated with a sheet of hard shiny ice that you can't even stand up on. Hats off to them all.

On behalf of the Trustees, I am thrilled to report that a generous donor, someone who believes in the transforming power of libraries, directed a substantial foundation grant to our computerization project, enough to bring our goal within reach. Galvanized by the foundation's requirement that we spend their money by the end of the calendar year, the library staff and trustees moved quickly to evaluate and select a library system. We are excited by our decision to purchase the same system available in our public school libraries. This is a great time to remember all the other donors to our automation fund. Gifts of every size have accumulated to put this important dream within reach. The ink on the purchase agreement was still damp when we learned of a magnificent bequest, large enough to enable us to set aside money for future computer upgrades.

I would like to make a few comments about our sources of support. While public libraries are a wonderful "free" resource for our communities, real dollars are needed to buy books and equipment and to pay for staffing. Once again, we are grateful for the town's support in funding a basic level of library service. We are also extremely grateful for a generous private grant that covers the cost of providing services to some of our surrounding communities that do not offer the same level of library service that we enjoy in Canaan. This year, many others contributed meaningful gifts and the gift of their time as volunteers. On behalf of the Trustees, thank you for your wonderful support. With the combined strength of all these resources-- town funding, private grants and donations, and volunteer staffing-- we have created, together, a strong public library, one that our community can be proud of.

Automating a library collection of 25,000 volumes is an enormous task. The trustees are gratified to see the energy our staff and volunteers are already pouring into the first phase of the project, getting the shelf list in

top shape so that it can be sent out to our vendor for converting to electronic form. All this may sound very technical and abstract, but rest assured that the system itself, which will take months to implement, is extremely user friendly. We look forward to inviting you to a big birthday celebration when we go live. The current plan is to bring up the circulation module first and then install a networked public catalog once the town decides on building renovation plans. But don't wait until then to visit the library. 1998 was also the year that the Internet came to the Canaan Town Library. Librarian, Marion Allen and her staff, along with some strong volunteers, worked miracles. By shifting a few pieces of furniture, they were able to fit a new "workstation" wired to the Internet close to the library entrance. If you've never "surfed the web," stop by and take a lesson from one of our staff, or if you're a regular cyberspace guru, come in and share a favorite Web site with us. The Web has definitely added a whole new dimension to our research capabilities. Another important development this year was the hook-up to the state on-line interlibrary loan system. This new tool has sped up the process of obtaining needed materials from other libraries throughout the state.

The mention of space, tight quarters, and miracles leads me to another remarkable 1998 achievement. I would like to thank Trustee Cynthia Neily for her solid work as the library's representative on the town's building committee as well as Trustee Pat Iacuzzi for her faithful attendance at many of the meetings. Due to the marvelous collaborative efforts of that group, the Trustees feel optimistic that the town hall will be preserved as a centrally located downtown site, with some much needed growth space, for the future. We congratulate the building committee for thoroughly investigating all the options for housing town services, and we fully endorse their conclusions.

Along with all these new initiatives, the Canaan Town Library has kept pace with increased circulation and managed to offer a variety of programs with wide appeal to the community. Once again, the Library hosted the popular Meeting House Readings last summer. Other programs have included the traditional children's story hours, a financial seminar on new tax law, gardening topics from our county extension agent, a naturalist from the New Hampshire Audubon Society and a fabulous town history presentation by Town Historian, Donna Dunkerton. We also allocated some of our automation windfall to fund a few staff hours on Friday morning in order to move the shelf-list conversion project along. This enabled us to realize a long term hope of opening the library on a weekday morning, extended service that our patrons have requested for years. The Trustees express great appreciation to our staff for embracing all the changes of the past year

with enthusiasm while maintaining an extraordinary commitment to excellent service every step of the way.

The Canaan Town Library is a thriving community resource that has moved ahead in significant ways during 1998. We have many challenges in front of us and always want to make sure that we have the support and involvement of our citizens as we shape the future. In closing, I invite you to visit the library and speak with the Librarian about our many volunteer opportunities. Whether you have subject expertise that you can lend to the book selection effort, an eye for detail, or just want to help make a very successful service even stronger, there are many ways you can help.

Report of the Building Inspector

1998 was a busy year for building permits, total of 62 permits were issued:

- 12 New Building
- 13 Mobile Homes
- 34 Renovations / Additions
- 3 Renewals

Every approved building permit will be issued a certificate, which must be posted in a conspicuous location. This will help to keep the community informed on the construction and renovation that takes place.

Generally speaking you do not need a permit for normal maintenance such as painting, roofing, etc. However you must obtain a building permit if the final valuation of the project increases the value of the property by more than \$500; i.e. decks, sheds, additions, etc. Applications for building permits may be obtained through the town offices during regular business hours.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Conservation Commission has had a busy and productive year. We've been engaged with both ongoing and new projects, all of which seek to protect Canaan's valuable natural, recreational and aesthetic resources.

Canaan is fortunate in having several parcels of conservation land, some of which are now protected by easement. At Bird-in-Hand Farm, Conservation Commission members worked with the landowners last Spring to clear and paint all the boundaries as required by the terms of the easement. An adjacent 100 acre property, consisting almost entirely of wetland was wisely retained by the Selectmen for conservation purposes, instead of being put up for tax sale. The Commission is working to develop a management plan for this parcel, which it will present to the Selectmen in the coming year. We look forward in the future to obtaining easements on more properties of significant conservation value.

Good planning is essential to maintaining the character of our town. One important function of the Conservation Commission is to develop a natural resources inventory which will identify areas of particular ecological importance. The Commission has contracted with UVLSPC to acquire computer-generated maps which will serve as a base for a natural resources inventory. Further maps may be obtained as necessary in the course of the study.

In April, the Commission organized a meeting, at the request of UVLSPC, which included a member of that group as well as representatives of several other town boards, the purpose of which was to identify Canaan's important natural and cultural resources in need of protection. On the same day, a member of the Commission attended a workshop sponsored by the UNH Cooperative Extension, focusing on how to use ARCVIEW for town maps and planning.

In August, we sponsored the second annual lecture at the Meeting House on Canaan Street. Ben Kilham of Lyme spoke, with slides, to a full house about his extensive work with local Black Bears. We look forward to presenting another speaker in 1999.

The State continues to monitor wetlands by enforcement of RSA 485-A, which requires a Dredge and Fill permit for any work to be done in or adjacent to a body of water, or in a wetland. Severe fines may result from non-compliance with this rule. Permit applications are available at the Town Office.

As always, the Conservation Commission is happy to help with any questions related to Conservation issues. We also welcome input from interested citizens, particularly as we embark on the considerable task of assembling a natural resources inventory.

At the beginning of this year, Susan Russell Kraatz resigned from the Conservation Commission after nearly two decades of service. Her knowledge of the Town, imaginative and astute approach to issues and delightfully straightforward and effective style of running a meeting were great assets to the commission and the Town. She was a pleasure to work with and will be missed.


- Town funds help provide care for people who require medically necessary services but who are unable to pay or who do not have adequate health insurance.

CANAAN PLANNING BOARD

1998 YEAR REVIEW

While the economic situation has resulted in a relatively light schedule for the Canaan Planning Board; members were kept busy with many new duties including the production of a Capital Improvement Plan and the final passage of a fully revised compendium of Planning Board Regulations.

The development of the Capital Improvement Plan, an advisory document that attempts to prioritize and schedule the capital projects and expenditures of the Town over a period of six years, is produced through the close cooperation of department heads, the Budget Committee, and the Selectboard. As the Town begins to travel the path of greater efficient fiscal management, the Capital Improvement Plan will become a more valuable guide for future growth and development.

The Planning Board, after long consideration, passed a new set of Planning Board Regulations. The effect of the new regulations was to insure compliance with the many state regulations that have evolved since the last edition of the regulations (1984), to limit development of those parcels not on town maintained roads, and to insure that appropriate waste disposal systems can be designed for all new lots.

In addition to the projects described above, the Planning Board approved eight minor subdivisions and two annexations via the new "Voluntary Merger" method.

The Planning Board continues to meet on the second and fourth Thursdays of each month and the public is welcome and invited to become involved.





CANAAN FIRE DEPARTMENT

1998 CANAAN FIRE DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT

The 1998 service year for the Canaan Fire Dept. has seen us respond to a wide variety of calls. The long list at the end of the report gives details of our service calls but does not cover the amount of time and energy that goes into training, maintenance and administration. While volunteer or call departments nationwide are experiencing severe shortages of firefighters able to respond to calls, we are presently able to respond to most calls. The mutual aid system for manpower and equipment is very helpful during the daytime calls. During the evening and nighttime hours we are lucky to have increased numbers of personnel to respond. This continued commitment to community service is a positive aspect of our community and we very much need your support and appreciation to keep this idea alive. We are always looking for members that can be trained and meet the standards necessary to operate as a firefighter. If you are looking to give something back to your community, you like training classes, long and strange hours, please contact us.

The 1998 year brought a new attack piece to the CFD. we took possession of a new engine "Engine 2" manufactured by the Smeal Fire Apparatus Co. Engine 2 has responded to structure fires, chimney fires and automobile accidents. The pumping capability and lighting features have been a great addition to our equipment. We are presently in the final stages of specifying the requirements for a new rescue /equipment truck to be purchased later this year. we have been comparing styles, construction materials, and design features to get the best possible truck to meet our needs. Our present van is old and needs to be retired this year so we are busy checking for a replacement that fits into our needs and the Town's Capital Improvement Plan.

We held training classes and went to classes sponsored by area fire schools. Among the subjects studied this year were below ground rescue, incident safety officer , Level I fire fighting, Cold water rescue, pump classes, emergency response driving, forestry topics, Firefighter response to terrorism- a haz mat class, and 2 firefighters training to become EMT's. We will continue in-house training and be sending firefighters to more fire schools during 1999.

January 1998 saw many communities hit hard by the Ice Storm of the Century. While Canaan appears to have been spared in our residential areas, many towns throughout the state were not. We may have significant hidden damage in our forested areas so residents need to be very careful with burning activities once our snow cover is gone. The CFD supplied firefighters to the statewide effort to clear roads and power lines. Eight firefighters responded as part of the recovery efforts supervised by the Division Of Forest and Lands. Taking part in this call-up were Brent Stevens, Bill Bellion, Todd Baravalle, Larry Belloir, Matt Bunten, Matt Dow , Drew Lazarus and Alan Ricard.

Canaan firefighters also contributed to national efforts to suppress wildland fires throughout the country. Drew Lazarus responded to an early spring call to go to Minnesota for their spring fire season . Drew and Matt Bunten were engine crew members

for the NH Engine Strike Team that went to Texas in late July. Brent Stevens, Bill Bellion, Larry Belloir and Special Deputy Rick Evans all went to Florida as part of a national wide call up during the Florida fire season . The four of them were recognized by the State of Florida for their efforts with the Florida Distinguished Service Award. These out of state assignments provide us with invaluable training and experience that can be applied to a variety of incidents to which we respond.



REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are ten Forest Rangers who work for the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Protection Bureau. State Forest Rangers are available to assist communities with forest fire suppression, prevention and training programs as well as the enforcement of forest fire and timber harvest laws. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws, please call our office at 271-2217.

There are 2400 Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Forest Fire Wardens throughout the state. Each town has a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens who assist the Forest Rangers with forest fire suppression, prevention, and law enforcement. Early in 1998 we experienced an ice storm, which caused severe damage to forests of New Hampshire. This damage created a greater potential fire hazard as well as safety hazards to many areas of the state. Your local fire warden and Forest Rangers need your assistance in preventing wildfires in these hard hit areas and throughout the State. If you need assistance or information dealing with ice damaged woodlands, please call 1-800-444-8978.

The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, 2 mobile patrols and 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments. This is a critical factor in controlling the size of wildland fires and keeping the loss of property and suppression costs as low as possible.

Grafton County Senior Citizens Council, Inc. provides programs and services which support the health and well being of our older citizens and assist them to remain independent in their own homes and communities for as long as possible. Through eight locations throughout the County, including Plymouth, Bristol, Canaan, Lebanon, Orford, Haverhill, Littleton and Lincoln, older adults and their families are able to make use of community based long term care services such as home delivered meals, senior dining room programs, transportation, care management services, information and referral, educational programs, adult day care, chore/home repair services, recreation and opportunities to be of service to the community through volunteering.

During 1998, 193 older residents of Canaan were able to make use of one or more of GCSCC's services, offered through the Mascoma Area Senior Center. These individuals enjoyed 3,463 balanced meals in the company of friends in a senior dining room, received 5,004 hot, nourishing meals delivered to their homes by caring volunteers, were transported to health care providers or other community resources on 1,561 occasions by our lift-equipped buses, were assisted with problems, crises or issues of long term care through 507 visits by a trained social worker and found opportunities to put their talents and skills to work for a better community through 4,828 hours of volunteer service. The cost to provide these services for Canaan residents in 1998 was \$63,493.71.

Community based services provided by GCSCC and its many volunteers for older residents of Canaan were often important to their efforts to remain in their own homes and out of institutional care despite chronic health problems and increasing physical frailty, saving tax dollars and contributing to the quality of life of our older friends and neighbors. As our population grows older, such support becomes ever more critical.

GCSCC very much appreciates the support of the Canaan community for services which enhance the independence and dignity of our older citizens and assists them to meet the challenges of aging in place.

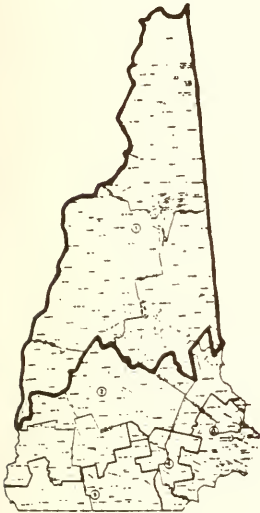

REPORT TO THE TOWNS AND CITIES IN DISTRICT ONE

By Councilor Ray Burton

As one of your elected officials, I am honored to report to you as a member of the New Hampshire Executive Council. This five member elected body acts much like a board of directors of your New Hampshire State Government in the Executive Branch.

In my twentieth year representing this District with 98 towns and four cities, there are many changes I've seen and been a part of in the past. My focus in this report to you is toward the future and some suggestions on how you as citizens might be encouraged to participate in the future.

The following are some ideas and suggestions. The Governor and Council have a constitutional and lawful duty to fill dozens of boards and commissions with volunteer citizens. If you are interested in serving on one or more of these volunteer posts, please send me your resume at the State House and I'll see that it is passed on to Kathy Goode, Governor Shaheen's liaison to the Executive Council, or you may wish to send them directly to the Governor's Office, State House, 107 North Main Street, Concord, NH 03301.

Other resources available to your town/city/county include 10 million dollars (\$10,000,000) through the Community Development Block Grant program at the **Office of State Planning**. Call Jeff Taylor at 271-2155 to see if your town or area qualifies.

Annually there is available some 10 million dollars (\$10,000,000) available through the **New Hampshire Attorney General's Office** for innovative programs for drug and law enforcement, stress programs dealing with youth at risk, assistance to victims, and special programs for victims of domestic violence. For information call Mark Thompson at 271-3658.

Communities may request assistance through the **NH National Guard Army, General John Blair's Office**, for services such as a Drug Detection Dog, Community Presentations on Drug Demand Education and Career Direction Workshops. Telephone number is 225-1200.

The **Office of Emergency Management** at telephone number 1-800-852-3792 is the proper call when an emergency develops in your area such as floods, high winds, oil spills and ice jams.

State and Federal Surplus items may be purchased at minimum cost. Call Art Haeussler at 271-2602 for a list and newsletter.

In **New Hampshire Correctional Industries**, there are many products and services of use to towns, cities and counties such as street signs, vehicle decals, printing, car repair, furniture and data entry services, including web page development, call Peter McDonald at 271-1875.

People and businesses looking for work - vocational rehabilitation, job training programs should call **NH Employment Security** at 1-800-852-3400.

NH Department of Environmental Services has available 20% grants for water/waste water projects and landfill closure projects, revolving loans for water/waste water and landfill closure, and also money for Household Waste Collection days call 271-2905. State Revolving Loans has available around 35 to 50 million dollars (\$35,000,000 to \$50,000,000) per year. For information call 271-3505.

Oil Funds – There are five petroleum funds which cover: oil spill cleanup and emergency response; reimbursement for cleanup by owners of: motor fuel underground and above ground tanks; heating oil facilities (primary home owners); and, motor oil storage facilities (service stations and automobile dealers). For information call 271-3644. Further, there is a municipal grant fund for construction of used oil collection facilities and operator training. For information call 271-2942.

Household Hazardous Waste Collection Days – Annual grants to cities and towns for collection of household hazardous waste provide dollar for dollar matching funds up to a total of 50% of the costs incurred. For further information call 271-2047.

REPORT OF TOWN MEETING DELIBERATIVE SESSION JANUARY 31, 1998

The Deliberative Session of the Annual Town Meeting was called to order by Moderator Dale Barney at the Mascoma Valley Regional High School on Saturday, January 31, 1998, at 1:05 p.m. After the Pledge of Allegiance and invocation, the moderator read the rules: 1) no smoking on the premises; 2) only legally registered voters from Canaan may exercise their voting rights (purple "Registered Voter" hand-held ballots were passed out prior to the meeting); 3) a person must be recognized by the chair prior to his speaking and then he should direct all comments through the Moderator; 4) all discussion must be germane to the article on the floor; 5) all amendments must be in writing and only one may be on the floor at a time; 6) all makers of motions and all those who second such should stand and give their names; 7) five or more signatures will be required for a petition for a paper ballot on any article; 8) in the case of a disagreement with a voice/hand count by the Moderator, five or more voters could present a written request for a paper ballot before the next article is taken up; 9) the right to speak as well as the right to be heard will be respected; 10) negative motions will not be accepted; 11) if a motion is passed to cease discussion on an article, all people currently standing in line at the microphone will be allowed to speak prior to a vote; and 12) comments should be limited to three minutes or less.

Article 2: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600,000.00 for the reconstruction and renovation of the existing Town Office Building, \$511,800.00 of said sum to be raised through the issuance of bonds and notes under and in compliance with the Municipal Finance Act, RSA 33:1 et seq., as amended, authorize to expend funds remaining from the 1995 Town Meeting Special Article for that purpose in the amount of \$44,200.00, and to transfer and authorize expenditure of \$44,000.00 in the Capital Reserve Fund established for that purpose; to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, obtain and accept federal, state or other aid if any, which may be available for said project and to comply with all laws applicable thereto; to authorize the Selectmen to issue, negotiate, sell, and deliver said bonds and notes to determine the rate of interest thereon and the maturity and other terms thereof; to authorize the Selectmen to take any other action or pass any other vote thereto. This article amount is not included in the operating budget article. This article will only take effect if Article 4 is defeated. (Two thirds affirmative ballot vote required.)

Steve Iacuzzi moved and Edward Morse seconded that Article 2 be placed on the ballot. Leon Kremzner moved and Judith Kushner seconded that Article 2 be amended to read:

"To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$525,000.00 for the renovation of the Town Municipal Building to make it safe, functional, and handicapped accessible on all three floors. \$44,200 of that sum to be expended from the 1995 Town Meeting Special Article for that purpose; to authorize transfer and expenditure of \$44,000 from the Capital Reserve Fund established for that purpose; \$436,800 to be raised from Undesignated Fund Balance. To instruct the Selectmen to negotiate options and changes to stay within budget and to instruct them and authorize them to apply for, obtain and accept federal, state or other aid if any, which may be available for said project. (This article amount is not included in the operating budget article.)"

After a lengthy discussion, the question was moved. The amendment was defeated by a hand vote.

Gary Wood moved and Judith Kushner seconded that Article 2 be amended to read:

“To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$575,000 for the renovation of the Town Municipal Building to make it safe, functional, and handicapped accessible on all three floors, and for provision of a parking lot. \$211,800 of said sum to be raised through the issuance of bonds and notes under and in compliance with the Municipal Finance Act, RSA 33:1 et seq., as amended. To authorize the Selectmen to expend funds remaining from the 1995 Town Meeting Special Article for that purpose in the amount of \$44,200, and to transfer and authorize expenditure of \$44,000 in the Capital Reserve Fund established for that purpose. The remaining sum of \$275,000 to be raised from Undesignated Fund Balance. To instruct and authorize the Selectmen to apply for, obtain and accept federal, state or other aid if any, which may be available for said project and to comply with all laws applicable thereto; to authorize the Selectmen to issue, negotiate, sell and deliver said bonds and notes to determine the rate of interest thereon and the maturity and other terms thereof; to authorize the Selectmen to take any other action or pass any other vote thereto. To instruct the Selectmen to negotiate options and changes to stay within budget. (This article amount is not included in the operating budget article.) (Two thirds affirmative ballot vote required.)”

After a discussion, the question was moved. The amendment was passed by a hand vote.

The Moderator declared that Article 2 will be placed on the ballot as amended.

Article 3: To authorize \$44,000.00 from Article 4, March 12, 1996 Town Meeting to be used for renovation or building of a New Town Building, and to change the intent of that Capital Reserve Fund to that purpose, and to authorize the \$44,200.00 balance from Article 6 of the March 18, 1995 Town Meeting to be used for renovation or building of a new Town Hall. This is submitted as a petitioned warrant article. (Two thirds affirmative ballot vote required.) (This article is not included in the operating budget.) (Budget Committee does recommend 7-1)
(Board of Selectmen does recommend 2-1)

Marvin Rocke moved and Milton Wilson seconded that Article 3 be placed on the ballot. There being no discussion, the Moderator declared that Article 3 will be placed on the ballot.

Article 4: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400,000.00 for the purpose of constructing a New Town Hall that includes the Town Offices, Library and Police Department, \$44,200.00 of that sum to be expended from the 1995 Special Article for that purpose, to authorize transfer and expenditure of \$44,000.00 from the Capital Reserve Fund established for that purpose, with \$311,800.00 to be raised from Undesignated Fund Balance. This article is submitted as a petitioned article. (This article is not included in the operating budget.) (Budget Committee does recommend 6-2)
(Board of Selectmen does not recommend 3-0)

Marvin Rocke moved and Steve Iacuzzi seconded that Article 4 be placed on the ballot. Gary Wood moved and Judith Kushner seconded that Article 4 be amended to read:

“To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$311,800 towards the construction of a new town hall that included the Town office, library and Police Department (estimated total cost \$400,000). Said sum to be raised from Undesignated Fund Balance. (This article is not included in the operating budget.) This article will only take effect if Article 2 is defeated.”

After a lengthy discussion, the question was moved. The amendment was defeated by a hand vote.

Gary Wood moved and Judith Kushner seconded that Article 4 be amended by adding "This article will only take effect if Article 2 is defeated." The amended was passed by a voice vote.

The Moderator declared that Article 4 will be placed on the ballot as amended.

John Dow moved and Phil Cobbin seconded reconsideration of Article 2. The motion passed. John Dow moved and Phil Cobbin seconded amending Article 2 by adding "This article will only take effect if Article 4 is defeated." The motion passed by a voice vote. The Moderator declared that Article 2 will be placed on the ballot as re-amended.

Cathy Cobbin moved and Steve Iacuzzi seconded restricting reconsideration of Articles 2, 3, and 4. The motion passed by a voice vote.

Article 5: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$44,000.00 for the Town Hall construction or reconstruction to be raised by general taxation. The Selectmen have designated this article as a special warrant article under the provisions of RSA 32:7 for the purpose of having these funds considered non-lapsing until December 31, 2002. This article will not take effect if Articles 2 or 4 are passed. (This article not included in the operating budget.)
(Board of Selectmen does recommend 2-1)
(Budget Committee does recommend 7-1)

Steve Iacuzzi moved and Marvin Rocke seconded that Article 5 be placed on the ballot. There being no discussion, the Moderator declared Article 5 will be placed on the ballot.

Article 6: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,300.00 from Undesignated Fund Balance to purchase Map 15-AS Lot 29 from John Dow for the purpose of the Sewer Pumping Station site. (This article not included in the operating budget.)
(Board of Selectmen does recommend 3-0)
(Budget Committee does recommend 7-1)

Steve Iacuzzi moved and Phil Cobbin seconded that Article 6 be placed on the ballot. John Dow moved and Marvin Rocke seconded that Article 6 be amended to read:

"To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,300.00 from Undesignated Fund Balance to purchase Map 15-AS Lot 29 from John M. Dow and Christine D. Dow for the purpose of the Sewer Pumping Station site." The amendment passed by a voice vote.

The Moderator declared Article 6 will be placed on the ballot as amended.

Article 7: To see if the Town will vote to accept Map 7 Lot 21 (located on the S-curves) from Philip D. Chura?
(Board of Selectmen does recommend 3-0)
(Budget Committee does recommend 5-3)

Steve Iacuzzi moved and Marvin Rocke seconded that Article 7 be placed on the ballot. There being no discussion, the Moderator declared Article 7 will be placed on the ballot.

Article 8: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$24,000.00 for the purpose of a new police cruiser, \$12,000.00 of said sum to be appropriated from Undesignated Fund Balance, and \$12,000.00 of said sum to be transferred from the Capital Reserve Fund designated for that purpose, the sum total of \$24,000.00 to be authorized for the purchase of a new police cruiser to be used by the Canaan Police Department. (This article not included in the operating budget.)
(Board of Selectmen does recommend 3-0)
(Budget Committee does recommend 8-0)

Steve Iacuzzi moved and George Shadowens seconded that Article 8 be placed on the ballot. There being no discussion, the Moderator declared Article 8 will be placed on the ballot.

Article 9: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 from Undesignated Fund Balance for the purpose of purchase and installation of a used compactor, concrete pad, and related site work at the Transfer Station. (This article not included in the operating budget.)
(Board of Selectmen does recommend 2-1)
(Budget Committee does recommend 7-1)

Steve Iacuzzi moved and Edward Morse seconded that Article 9 be placed on the ballot. There being no discussion, the Moderator declared Article 9 will be placed on the ballot.

Article 10: To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote taken at the March 1993 Town Meeting on Article 14 that the position of Chief of Police shall be filled by election of legal voters of Canaan as provided by RSA 105:1 and that beginning with the next vacancy or election that the position of Chief of Police shall be appointed by the Board of Selectmen.

Steve Iacuzzi moved and Milton Wilson seconded that Article 10 be placed on the ballot. There being no discussion, the Moderator declared Article 10 will be placed on the ballot.

Marvin Rocke moved and Cathy Cobbin seconded reconsideration of Article 8. The motion passed by a voice vote. Cathy Cobbin moved and Tom Rankin seconded amending Article 8 to change the word "purpose" in line 2 to "purchase." The amendment passed by a voice vote. The Moderator declared Article 8 will appear on the ballot as amended.

Article 11: To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint an Expert Highway Agent (per RSA 231:64), who under the direction of the Selectmen, shall have the same power and perform the same duties as the highway agent elected by the Town, this position to replace the existing Road Agent position.

Steve Iacuzzi moved and Wally Medeiros seconded that Article 11 be placed on the ballot. Tom McDermott moved and Sam Lowe seconded that the word "Expert" be deleted from the article. The motion passed with a voice vote.

Allen Lary moved and Phil Cobbin seconded that Article 11 be amended to read:

"To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen beginning with the next vacancy or election to appoint a Highway Agent (per RSA 231:64), who under the direction of

the Selectmen, shall have the same power and perform the same duties as the Highway Agent elected by the Town.”

The motion passed by a voice vote. The Moderator declared Article 11 will be placed on the ballot as amended.

Article 12: Shall the Town raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special Warrant Articles, or separate articles not included in the operating budget, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the Warrant, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$1,711,866.00? Should this article be defeated the operating budget shall be \$1,711,866.00, which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town or by law or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only.
(Board of Selectmen does recommend 3-0)
(Budget Committee does recommend 8-0)

Steve Iacuzzi moved and Cathy Cobbin seconded that Article 12 be placed on the ballot. Milton Wilson moved and Steve Iacuzzi seconded that Article 12 be amended to include “\$2,000 of said budget to be used for the purchase of hearing assistance equipment for use during town meetings.” After a brief discussion, the amendment was withdrawn.

The Moderator declared Article 12 will be placed on the ballot.

**Report of the Day of Voting
March 10, 1998**

The Day of Voting was called to order by Moderator Dale Barney at the Canaan Fire Station on Tuesday, March 10, 1998 at 8:00 a.m. The polls were declared open for the purpose of voting by ballots for town officials (Article 1), Articles 2 through 24, and school district officials and articles.
