WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING
State of New Hampshire

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Canterbury in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Canterbury on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

(Polls open from 10:00 a. m. to 6:30 p. m.)

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. Meet at eight of the clock in the evening to act on the rest of the articles in the Warrant.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

4. To see if the town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell, lease or otherwise transfer real estate property acquired by the town by Tax Collector's deed in a manner for the best interest of the town.

5. To see if the town will vote to accept the rules and regulations for the operation of cemeteries as printed in the Report of the Cemetery Commissioners.

6. To see if the town will vote to increase the number of Library Trustees from three to six, all to serve three year terms with two trustees standing for election each year. If voted, the Moderator will appoint three new members this year for terms of one, two, and three years. By petition.

7. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the practice of electing a Road Agent and give the Selectmen authority to appoint the provided, however, that if the Selectmen replace a Road Agent he shall, if desired have the right of a Public Hearing within 10 days of this action. By petition.

8. To see what compensation, including fringe benefits shall be paid employees of the Town Highway Department.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 as authorized by RSA 31:4, Par. XIX for the Annual budget of the Merrimack Valley Region Association.

10. To see if the town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to use accumulated funds from the Sam Lake Trust Fund, with the approval of the Trustee, to develop recreational facilities on Sam Lake property in accordance with plans submitted by the Planning Board.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for renovation of the interior of the Town Hall.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$790.00 for the purchase of a trailer rake for road finishing for the Highway Department.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

ANNUAL MEETING OF MARCH 10, 1964

Meeting called to order by the Moderator Carl A. Thunberg, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon. Posting of the Warrant, Budget, and posting and certification of the checklists were read. It was voted to work under Article One of the Warrant until six o'clock p. m. and to close the polls at that time, but due to voters present and desiring to vote the polls were not closed until seven forty-five p. m. After the polls were closed the items of the Budget were taken into consideration. It was voted to take each item of the Budget separately for consideration and then to accept the budget as amended. The result of which resulted in an approved budget of \$38,158.69 for the ensuing year.

Then work was started on the articles of the Warrant.

Article Two. To choose delegates to the Constitutional Convention.

Article Three. To vote on the question "Shall sweepstakes tickets be sold in this town."

Article Four. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of same.

Article Five. To see if the town will give the Selectmen authority to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Accepted as read.

Article Six. To see if the town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell, lease or otherwise transfer real

estate property acquired by the town by Tax Collector's deed in a manner for the best interest of the town. Accepted as read.

Article Seven. To see if the town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to use the accumulated funds from the rent of the Sam Lake house, plus income from the Sam Lake trust fund, with approval of the Trustee, to repair the floors, install a cellar drain, remove the old barn, and install central heating in the Sam Lake house. Approved except for central heating which was denied.

Article Eight. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee of three to make a plan for the development of the area in the rear of the town garage for use as a recreational area, said plan shall be submitted to the annual meeting of 1965 for its consideration. Accepted.

Article Nine. To see if the town will vote to establish a board of cemetery commissioners to be responsible for the care, maintenance, and operation of the cemeteries in Canterbury, under the following terms and conditions;

1. The Selectmen shall establish the original board by appointing three persons, one to serve one year, one to serve two years, and one to serve three years. At the expiration of each term the town, at the annual town meeting, shall elect one commissioner to serve three years. The Board shall appoint its own chairman annually at a meeting to be held within ten days following each annual town meeting.

2. The Board of cemetery commissioners shall (a) establish rates, subject to change as conditions warrant, at which graves and lots shall be sold and all proceeds from such sales shall be deposited with the Trustees of the Trust Funds for investment in a common trust

fund the income from which shall be used as needed for cemetery maintenance and, or improvement, (b) be solely responsible for the development, care and maintenance of the cemeteries and expend the income from the trust funds, and funds appropriated by the town for cemetery maintenance, and improvement in accordance with its best judgment; (c) maintain record of grave and lot ownership and establish regulations for the transfer of title to such graves and lots; (d) maintain records of burials as required by law and (e) establish and publish such regulations as it deems necessary for the efficient operation and protection of the cemeteries which will be presented for approval to the Town Meeting of 1965.

Article Ten. To transact any further business that may legally come before the meeting.

1964 PLANNING BOARD REPORT

Planning, whether for your family or your community, is a mental exercise by which decisions are made. Planning is never easy and all plans do not work out, some take root and others die on the vine. Our report for 1964 follows the pattern.

1. Survey of the Sam Lake Property:

A survey to locate bounds of the property, place the buildings, and establish elevations was one of our 1964 assignments. This survey was completed by a civil engineer and the map was prepared by Fred Bruner who worked on this project as a consultant to the Planning Board. This map will be displayed at Town Meeting. We are convinced that the future value of this property to the town of Canterbury is of such importance that we have not wanted to endorse any plans involving this property in important changes until this map was prepared.

2. Re-Location of the Highway in the Center:

If the time is not here now, it will certainly be here soon when something will need to be done in the Center about separating through traffic from cars which are parked. We believe an improvement in Traffic Flow through the Center, and better, safer, parking can be accomplished by straightening out the main highway as it passes through the village. We suggest moving the road back to what appears to have been its original location, following the stone wall of the cemetery. A map on display at Town Meeting will illustrate the idea. The cost of this project might run to \$4,000.00 with the cost shared 50/50 by the town and state.

3. Recreation Area in Rear of Town Garage:

The Spaulding-Potter Trust furnished us the services of a specialist in the development of recreation areas. He spent a good deal of time in looking over this area and the entire Sam Lake property. He developed a plan for the use of the leveled area in the rear of the town garage. This plan has been presented to the Board of Selectmen and will be displayed at Town Meeting. Our recommendations are to pave the area in back of the town garage to make multiple use of this area possible. We are not convinced that a skating rink should be established here although this can be a use of the area if necessary. We think a skating rink is best located on a body of water, if one can be created.

4. The Cider Mill Dam Project:

We investigated the possibility of developing the glen where the old Sam Lake cider mill and dam is located. We were enthusiastic over this as a possibility for a swimming, skating and picnicing area. The engineers of Soil Conservation were less enthusiastic and have discouraged us from proceeding with this project. We are not entirely convinced that the repair of the dam and the development of this area should not get further consideration.

The Planning Board has considered other matters which are of interest and concern to the community. The Canterbury-Boscawen bridge remains as a problem with legislation now proposed whereby the State will assume no further responsibility for Class II bridges. Our Representative is watching this development for you. There has been correspondence regarding our Industrial Site. We have registered this property with the State Industrial Development Commission but intend to choose prospective clients with care. If the best use of

this property does not come along for ten years, we are certain the wait will be worthwhile. We have expressed to officials our reaction to the racetrack development in Loudon. Our concern is proper policing.

REPORT OF CEMETERY COMMITTEE

Report of the Cemetery Committee as directed by Article 9, paragraph 2; Section E of the 1964 Town Warrant.

1. All lot owners shall be governed by the rules of the Cemetery Board.
2. The Cemetery Board shall be responsible for all cemetery affairs — revising rules and rates as conditions change — subject to approval of the town meeting.
3. All outlying cemeteries to be mowed annually. The Maplegrove and Center cemeteries to be kept in such condition as to be a credit to the community.
4. All lots sold shall include Perpetual Care. The price shall be such that the cemeteries will become mostly self-supporting. Suggested price at this time to be \$50.00 per grave unit.
5. Lots to be sold to resident families only.
6. Perpetual Care shall mean the annual upkeep only. Initial grading, seeding, purchase of stone and stone maintenance to be the responsibility of the lot owner. Trust Funds may be established to assure stone maintenance and will be administered by the Cemetery Board as the funds are made available by the Trustees of Trust Funds.
7. A concrete vault or liner will be required for all burials.
8. All grave markers to be flush with ground level. One stone per lot. No marker above ground level on single grave lots.

9. All graves shall be at least 5 feet deep.
10. No curbings shall be permitted.
11. No change of grade without approval of the Board.
12. All work done in the cemeteries shall be subject to approval of the Board.
13. No breakable containers to be used for plants or flowers.
14. The Board shall keep all records as required by law.
15. The Cemetery Board shall compile and have printed a list of rules and regulations and make them available to all interested parties.
16. In cases of hardship special consideration will be granted at the request of the Selectmen.

ELKINS PUBLIC LIBRARY

Trustees' Report

This has been a banner year for the Elkins Library, which manages to get busier with each passing season. Book circulation goes up, the number of borrowers increases, and the demand for reference and special services rises to meet the increasing needs of students of all ages in our community. Many people are involved in this growth.

Mrs. Andrew Fowler, the librarian, graduated after four years of summer sessions at the University of New Hampshire from the Public Library Techniques Course. She is one of only 12 layman librarians in the state to have completed the course, and her training in book selection, reference work, and cataloging will directly benefit the library. Much credit is due to the New Hampshire Federation of Women's Clubs which granted Mrs. Fowler partial scholarships to this school.

The professional skills and experience of Mrs. William Hopkins, a trained librarian, former member of the State Library staff, and now one of our trustees, have been significant. She directs what promises to be a long-term project of cataloging the library. Perhaps one-fourth of the book collection is now cataloged by title, author and subject headings. The greatest asset of any library is its book collection. Cataloging increases the value of each book by making the information within it immediately available. Volunteers have assisted in the typing of catalog cards.

Because of the cataloging progress made under Mrs. Hopkins' leadership, the Elkins Library was one of 11 libraries chosen in New Hampshire to receive state aid.

This grant of \$150 was designated for cataloging supplies. The trustees have used it largely to order sets of Wilson printed catalog cards for non-fiction books, which are usually most difficult to catalog because of their more numerous subject headings. One of the side benefits of this project has been the thorough weeding out of obsolete books, essential where space is at a premium.

Mrs. Quentin Hutchins and her crew of volunteer librarians have again allowed the library to serve as the school library. Once each week students take out books. It should be added here that the trustees are able to keep the juvenile section as current as it is on a small book budget, only because of Mrs. Thomas Rudkin. She donates many hundreds of dollars worth of adult books to our library each year, enabling us to keep adult purchases at a minimum at this time. Mrs. Robert Dudley has organized a second group of volunteer librarians who serve on Tuesday evenings. New recruits to any of these groups of volunteer *Friends of the Library* are always more than welcome.

The Used Book Stall at the summer Church Fair was very successful. New paperbacks also sold well. Many people assisted that day, and many others donated books. The library profit of \$196.10 was used to purchase a new typewriter, some cataloging supplies, and new books. The trustees would like to dedicate this profit each year to books, since our trust funds and town book monies go less each year, as the cost of books rises. To be as successful another year, our merchandise needs replenishing from the attics and bookshelves of thoughtful Canterbury people.

The free film program has continued under the care of Mr. James Lilly. Films and projector are provided through the State Library.

The library, as it ages, needs increasing maintenance attention. This year, front steps were replaced that had

proved dangerous to the public. The pillars on the porch had rotted and were also replaced. In the immediate future the trustees see need for new equipment such as a librarian's desk and chair, and an after-hour deposit box. The floors need sanding and refinishing, and the excellent new lighting reveals quantities of evidence of the need for an interior paint job. A long-range project is the need for water in the library for cleaning and sanitation purposes.

Of pressing need are additional book funds, as the cost of books rises, as our circulation increases, and as school use increases. We are now one of several libraries who buy their books through the state library, and thus enjoy up to a 36% discount. Next year, as an affiliated member of the Statewide Library Development Program, we will also receive free catalog cards with our newly purchased books. The benefits of membership in the program, largely financed so far through federal aid, include not only those mentioned above, but also increased professional help and more frequent bookmobile visits. If the state legislature so provides, annual grants for reference books and matching funds for book purchases may also go to members. Although we already fulfill many of the requirements of membership in the program, we will eventually need to increase somewhat the hours we are open.

Great thanks to all volunteers who man the desk, the film projector, the typewriter, or the sales desk at the summer fair. Special thanks go to those who donate books for either library use or for the summer sale. We are all ever indebted to those farsighted people who set up trust funds for library purposes.

You will find an article in the warrant increasing the number of library trustees to six. As the public demands increased library service in Canterbury as elsewhere, more trustees are needed to do the job well. As the com-

munity grows, it is also wise to broaden the base of public involvement in library policy.

Your librarian and trustees always welcome suggestions. The public library exists to serve, and our chief purpose is to expend the usefulness of this significant investment of time and money to ever more people.

New equipment purchased this year were 2 Scott Air Paks, 2 Fog Nozzles and a Rescue Truck.

The Department purchased the 1947 Dodge Rescue Truck from the Penacook Rescue Squad. This truck will be used primarily to help the Fire Department at all fires. It is carrying protective clothing and rescue equipment.

Despite the lack of rainfall, resulting in a very dry year, public cooperation, early detection and rapid response kept many potential fire disasters from becoming a reality. There were only 14½ acres burned.

Fire prevention is good common sense.

1. Take your rubbish to the Town Dump. If you must burn, obtain a permit and watch your fire until it is completely out.

2. Instruct your children in fire safety. Keep matches from young children. Explain to them the dangers of lighting matches and making outdoor fires.

3. Be sure discarded smoking material and matches are out.

CIVIL DEFENSE REPORT

1964

This year showed good progress in the C.D. program. The Ladies Auxiliary to the Fire Department helped to supply the Fire Department with two Scott Air Pacs w/audible alarm and two spare cylinders thru matching funds to the amount of \$248.43.

A 5KW Generator was purchased after considerable thought as to the advantage for which it could be used. This item would be used to supply emergency power, in the future, to the Town Shed, Town Hall, Fire Station, Vestry, with a line to the store for emergency supplies.

Items that are purchased through the Distributing Agency, which is mostly new equipment, is being used throughout the town offices and units where they are needed to meet with emergencies. Some items are kept in storage until needed.

The Rescue Truck, is also important, as the need for special equipment and protective equipment must be transported to and from emergencies with care. Funds were made available from the sale of the 4 x 4 army truck for this purpose.

Civil Defense alerts and tests have been made on several occasions, without public participation, sounding of alarm, or emergency measures.

Each time there has been an alert called, Canterbury has received and acknowledged the test.

Plans for the coming year are to maintain a good system of warning and communications for the town with thought of increasing better communications to the state level.

Article 2 — To Choose a Clerk for the ensuing year. Clerk elected: Charles H. Smith.

Article 3 — To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing 3 years. School board member elected: Mary Ellen Fifield.

Article 4 — To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year. Treasurer elected: John Malcolm.
Auditors: Robert Lockwood and Donald A. Frary.

Article 5 — To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district. Neal Andrew moved the motion. It was seconded and accepted as read.

Article 6 — To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto. D. Ruesswick moved and was seconded. Accepted as read.

Article 7 — To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant. Paul Scripture moved this article be taken up after Article 9. Passed.

Article 8 — To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and

for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town. Moved and seconded the budget be taken up item by item. Dick Stevens seconded and passed. After the budget had been taken up item by item, Ralph Keeler Jr. moved the budget be accepted as read. Seconded and accepted as read.

Article 9 — To see if the district will create a cooperative school district planning committee and to elect the members thereof or determine that they shall be appointed by the moderator. Ralph Keeler Jr. made motion a committee be appointed by the moderator. Marshall Gifford seconded. Neal Andrew spoke on this and in favor. Mr. Alexander Standish spoke in favor of an amendment that an appointment by the moderator of an additional special committee of three persons to study the feasibility, advantages and disadvantages of some form of long-term understanding with the Concord school system to accept Canterbury students in Concord Junior High or Senior High Schools, or the formation of a Cooperative School District with Concord and other communities, as compared with the merit of joining a cooperative school system that does not include Concord. Cp. 33 and any amendments thereto, or otherwise, and to authorize the school board to execute any and all contracts relating thereto, and to take such other action with respect thereto as may be necessary or advisable. A. Standish moved. It was seconded by Rebecca Fowler. Accepted as read.

Article 11 — To see if the District will vote to authorize the sale of the Center School to the Town of Canterbury for the sum of one dollar (\$1.00). Robert Lee moved. Seconded by Sabin Guertin. Accepted as read.

Article 12 — To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting. A Mudge moved that the minutes record appreciation of this assembly for Mr. Richard Stevens long service with the school board. Neal Andrew recommended that this assembly show their appreciation of Mr. Fox long service in connection with Canterbury School District. Meeting adjourned at 10:10.

Canterbury may well be pleased with its school plant and with the dedicated service of its principal, teachers, and staff members. It has been a pleasure to be associated with them in the operation of the school.

The Superintendent's salary of \$10,200 is partly prorated as follows: Andover \$598.00; Boscawen \$972.40; Canterbury \$416.00; Chichester \$395.20; Loudon \$613.60; Penacook \$1679.60; Salisbury \$270.40; Wilmot \$254.80. The remaining \$5000 is paid by the state.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

Several things have occurred this year that have complicated the normal functions of your school board. The foremost is the process of changing from the Tilton-Northfield Union to the Penacook Union which forced us to get our own nurse, art teacher, music teacher, and bookkeeper. We also lost the Union teacher consultant thus placing a greater responsibility on our principal and board.

Last summer accounted for jangled nerves and a lot of time for the board on the drainage system and the baseball field. Hopefully the 750 feet of drainage pipe installed under the supervision of the Merrimack Soil Conservation, will eliminate the mud problem around the building. Also two asphalt pads of regulation size were

laid for basketball and volleyball courts. Last but not least a baseball field was carved out of the woods which includes built-in bleachers and less broken windows. This was done with the Pettingill Fund.

The Cooperative School Study Committee and the Special School Study Committee put many hours, effort, and thought into their respective duties of which you have heard the results.

In the middle of all this activity, Neal Andrew resigned and Arthur Mudge was appointed by the remaining board members to fill out the remainder of the term expiring March 1965.

We are glad to say we have a very good faculty and with the coming year should complete the installation of the Modern Math in all grades and bring the other study texts up to date.

Financially, the past year has given us a respite. However, our year of grace is over and we must face the reality of the ever rising school costs and numbers of children. We are ever striving to gain the most and best for our students without adding more of a burden than is absolutely necessary to all taxpayers.
