

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

March 13, 1934

Two Hundredth and Third Annual Meeting

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford, and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall at Durham on Tuesday the thirteenth day of March, A. D. 1934, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk (*Charles Wentworth*), one Selectman for a term of three years (*Edward L. Getchell*), a Town Treasurer (*George D. Stevens*), a Collector of Taxes (*Esther Y. Burnham*), two Auditors (*Clement Moran and Harry C. Woodworth*) and all other town officers for the ensuing year.

2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds, for a term of three years. (*Stephen P. Chesley.*)

3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to obtain State Aid on the following:

(1) State Aid construction. (\$2,643.00.)

4. To raise and appropriate funds for the repair of Town Highways and Bridges. (\$7,500.00.)

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for current maintenance expenses, including State and County taxes as required. (\$8,705.00.)

6. To see if the Town will vote to cooperate with the University of New Hampshire in hiring a permanent Fire Station Attendant and raise money to pay half of salary for the same. (*Voted—Raised \$500.00.*)

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to be expended for further improvements in the Town Cemetery. (*Adopted.*)

8. To hear report of Zoning Committee and take any action relative to same. (*Report accepted and regulations adopted.*)

9. To hear report of Committee on water situation, and take any action that may seem necessary. (*No report and no action.*)

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to continue the work of White Pine Blister Rust control. (*Voted.*)

11. To see if the Town will vote to close a section of Piscataqua Bridge Road beginning at point of new road now being built and passing the property of E. J. Ackeroyd to Old Bridge Abutment. (*Rejected.*)

12. To see if the Town will accept a section of road leading from Dover Road to H. W. Loveren's residence, (known as Wiggin's Court). (*Accepted.*)

13. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for Town Officers as required by law. (*Voted.*)

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize collection of ashes and garbage and raise and appropriate money for the same. (*Voted—Raised \$200.00.*)

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes. (*Voted.*)

16. To see if the Town will vote to allow discounts for prompt payment of taxes as follows:

2 per cent. if paid on or before July 1.

1 per cent. if paid on or before September 1.

(Modified to read);

- 3 per cent. if paid on or before July 1.
- 2 per cent if paid on or before August 1.
- 1 per cent. if paid on or before September 1.

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

March 12, 1935

Two Hundredth and Fourth Annual Meeting

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford, and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall at Durham on Tuesday the twelfth of March, A. D. 1935, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for a term of three years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, two Auditors, and all other Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years.

3. To raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary to obtain State Aid on the following:

State Aid Construction. (*See budget.*)

4. To raise and appropriate funds for the repair of Town Highways and Bridges. (*See budget.*)

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for current maintenance expenses, including State and County taxes as required. (*See budget.*)

6. To see if the Town will vote to buy a tractor and snow plow and vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay one-third of the cost this year and authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow the balance on a note, the note to be paid one-half in 1936 and the balance in 1937.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to finish the work started on the wall at the Cemetery.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to continue the work of White Pine Blister Rust Control.

9. To see if the Town will vote to establish a permanent Police Department and vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay the salary and expenses of a full time officer.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to defray the expenses of an Old Home Day program to be held in connection with the Annual Durham Day and Picnic.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to assist in the work of the Red Cross Chapter.

12. To see if the Town will vote to install a street light on Rosemary Lane and vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay for same.

13. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget act.

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Moderator to appoint a committee of ten to investigate the possibility and feasibility of remodeling, rebuilding or adding to the present Town Hall or erecting a new one, provided Federal funds can be obtained for the same, and to recommend other public projects for which Federal funds may be obtained. Said committee to be authorized to have prepared all necessary data and present the same to the proper Federal officer or officers for approval and information regarding the availability of funds. Said committee to report its find-

ings at a special Town Meeting to be called by the Board of Selectmen at the request of the committee.

Also to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars to defray necessary expenses of the above referred to committee.

15. Section 1. Resolved that the Town of Durham shall adopt the following plan for nomination and election of the following named Town Officers: Selectmen, Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Trustees of Trust Funds, Auditors, and such other officers as the Town shall designate from time to time to be chosen by ballot.

Section 2. Any person desiring to have his or her name appear on the ballot, to be used at the Town Meeting, as a candidate for any of the above offices, shall file with the Town Clerk, at least five days prior to the date of the Town Meeting, a written request, on a blank provided by the Town Clerk, that his or her name appear on the ballot as a candidate for the stated office, and pay a filing fee in accordance with the following schedule of filing fees. Fees thus collected shall be turned over to the Town Treasurer to be used toward defraying expenses of preparing the ballots.

Schedule Filing Fees

Selectmen,	One dollar
Town Clerk,	One dollar
Town Treasurer,	One dollar
Tax Collector,	One dollar
Trustees of Trust Funds,	No fee
Auditors,	No fee

The filing fee for any other offices that shall, by vote of the Town, be hereafter made elective shall be fixed by vote of the Town.

The name of any voter who has complied with the above provisions shall be placed upon the ballot.

Provided, however, that upon petition, signed by ten legal voters of the Town, a voter's name shall be placed on the ballot. Such petition shall contain the name and address of the candidate and shall be signed by such persons only as are qualified to vote at the election of the candidate named in the petition. Said petition shall be filed with the Town Clerk at least five days prior to the date of the election.

Section 3. Conduct of Elections. Election of Town Officers shall be conducted in the manner prescribed by State Law for conducting State Elections insofar as said law is applicable to the election of town officers.

Section 4. Any legislation which is now on the Town records which is in conflict with this Article shall be hereby rescinded.

Section 5. This Article shall take effect upon its passage.

16. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for Town Officers as required by law.

17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.

18. To see if the Town will vote to allow discounts for prompt payment of taxes as follows:

2 per cent. if paid on or before July 1.

1 per cent. if paid on or before September 1.

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

HAMILTON SMITH LIBRARY

To the Town of Durham:

During the past year a total of 3,715 volumes were added to the library collection, including 137 books purchased from Durham Library Association funds, and 105 from funds apportioned by the town for the Durham Public Library. Total accessioned volumes in the library January 31, 1935, was 80,645. Total circulation, University and town was 42,766, including 3,527 books from the children's room.

The above figure for juvenile circulation represents an increase of twenty per cent over that for the previous year. This increase is due to increased appropriation of funds by the town which has enabled us to purchase more new titles and to rebind many old ones in attractive covers, and to attractive exhibits of juvenile books during the year. I wish to urge that the town continue the \$200. figure for its library as a permanent minimum, with a view to increasing it when feasible.

The death of Mr. Arioeh Griffiths and the subsequent breaking up of his household made necessary the discontinuance of the deposit collection to the Packer's Falls district. For several years Mrs. Edward Griffiths has been rendering a valuable service to her community by her very efficient aid in circulating collections of books deposited at her home by the library. The sincere thanks of the library and the town are due Mrs. Griffiths for this service. No arrangements have as yet been made to continue the service.

REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER

To the Town of Durham:

The Durham water supply was sampled at regular intervals during the year ending January 1, 1935, and was found in good condition at each analysis.

The dairy farms supplying milk to Durham were inspected by the State Inspector and local Health Officer and samples of milk were taken to the State Laboratory for analysis. Also the water supply at these farms was sampled and analyzed at the State Laboratory. By request, the State Health Inspector with the local Health Officer inspected all fraternity and sorority houses.

All the children, both in Durham Village and Packer's Falls schools, were vaccinated or presented certificates for Small Pox.

The inspection of stores and restaurants by the State and local Health Officer was made in April, 1934.

The Town of Durham has been fortunate with only very few cases of contagious diseases in the past year.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN**January 1 to December 31, 1934**

Only two forest fires occurred in 1934. One, April 30, was due to a careless smoker. The other, August 20, was due to the burning of a house. The first covered an acre, and the latter 2½ acres of woodland. The April fire was easily put out, but the August one had to be watched for four days and nights because it was in a dense stand of white pine and the weather was very dry.

The value of the lookout station on Stratham Hill was again demonstrated.

With the cooperation of the Lion's Club and the State Forester federal funds were secured to dig four water holes. These were located on Madbury Road, Broth Hill, in front of the D. Fogg place, and on the Beaudett farm. They gave much needed employment, will be easy to maintain, and are so located as to furnish a good supply of water during the dry months.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT
OF SCHOOLS IN DURHAM, SCHOOL
YEAR 1933-1934

To the School Board, and Citizens of Durham:

I am pleased to present my sixth annual report. The statistics are for the school year ending June 30, 1934.

A slight change in policy has been pursued this year. No married women teachers are employed at the village for full time positions, but by using Mrs. Louise Maxam in the Junior High School and Mrs. Delta Ham in grade three, both for part time, we have eliminated some cadet teaching and made possible the work of each grade to be carried on separately. There are now 28 pupils in grade 4 and 21 in grade 5, and if all of these are in the fifth and sixth grade room next year, an over-crowded condition will take place. It is proposed, to carry out a plan once before proposed, to divide this room and employ another teacher for grade 5. Cadets are now employed for French and to assist Mrs. Wilcox in Home Economics. The latter subject is taught on Friday afternoon and at the same time, Manual Training is taught at the college shops under the direction of Professor Batchelder and two cadets. Miss Talbot continues with music in all schools, but we are without an art instructor.

The operetta "What's the Matter With Sally," was presented last June and at this performance the orchestra, a group of pupils taught privately by Mr. Kuscious of Portsmouth, made its appearance and was appreciated very much.

Beginning with November Federal Funds were made available for the distribution of free whole milk and will continue through the winter of 1935.

Packer's Falls school had a new floor laid last summer and this has made the school room more comfortable in cold weather. A new set of swings was provided at the village school and both school yards improved with gravel.

The Good Citizenship Medal, provided by the New Hampshire Sons of the American Revolution was again awarded, this time to Harold Woodworth. Superintendent as well as teachers have felt that their efforts for good schools have been supported by the Parent-Teacher's Association and parents in general. It is only through the cooperation of all agencies that good schools can be maintained.

The report of the nurse follows and you will note that your schools have again been fortunate in escaping epidemics of those diseases which so often disrupt schools.
