SELECTMEN

It is our pleasure and privilege to bring you the town report of the activities during the year 1970 and planned programs for the year 1971.

A sound highway rebuilding program was continued and with state help saw 18 miles of roads resurfaced with hot top plant mix and 18 miles of shimming in preparation for hot topping in 1971. Three thousand feet of culverts were laid and a number of catch basins to accommodate the culverts. In 1971 similar work will have to be postponed due to budget cuts and the absolute necessity of rebuilding the Goffstown Back Road. Closing of the Biron bridge in Manchester forces us to accelerate this project and complete it as soon as possible.

New housing developments are springing up in different areas in Goffstown and because of the foresight and guidance of the planning Board, these will, in the future, become valuable assets to our town.

During the year the Goffstown Industrial Development Corporation was formed and became active in attempting to attract industries to Goffstown. Three desirable industries, totalling close to a million dollars in taxable properties, were lost for lack of water, sewers and available land. With the sewer commission now in existence and working with the industrial corporation, these problems should be overcome in 1971.

By mid-year, your town was again under the leadership of three selectmen. The courts having reached a decision, Mrs. Barbara Poehlman officially became the first woman to serve the office of selectmen. She was a welcome addition to the Board and served faithfully and with enthusiasm.

Due to good management and tight controls in all departments the town finished the year 1970 with \$70,000. in the surplus account.

The Board of Selectmen feels indebted and wants to express its appreciation to all department heads and thanks the personnel for performing their duties so satisfactorily and to the many boards and committees for giving so much of themselves and their time.

1971 TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Goffstown in said County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs and to the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Goffstown qualified to vote in School District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Goffstown High School in said Town on Tuesday, the 9th of March at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

The polls will open at 10:00 A. M. and close at 6:30 P. M. at the Central Polling Place and will open at 10:00 A. M. and close at 6:30 P. M. in the Fifth District Bartlett School. Business meeting will take place at 8:00 P. M. at Goffstown High School, Tuesday, March 9, 1971.

None of the articles in the warrant, except those relating to the election of officers and those covering questions on the ballot shall be considered during the time that the polls are open.

1. To choose all Town Officers, Trustees and Commissioners, and School District Officers for the ensuing year, including a member of the Board of Selectmen for three years.

2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$8,500.00) to purchase approximately 15 acres of land adjoining Town land on the Goffstown Back Road to be used as a gravel pit. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a Front End Loader for a sum not to exceed Thirty-Eight Thousand Five Hundred Forty-Five Dollars (\$38,545.00) said sum to be taken from the Highway Capital Reserve Fund. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Thousand (\$300,000,00) Dollars to eliminate the surface water from the Town of Golfstown sewer system and repair the same. Said sum of Three Hundred Thousand (\$300,000.00) Dollars to be raised through the issuance of serial notes or bonds under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 33 of Revised Statutes Annotated) and any amendments thereto; and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and the time and place of payment and condition of sale thereon, and to take such action as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such notes or bonds as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Goffstown. Said bonds or notes to be paid from the revenue of the Goffstown Sewer Commission. (2/3 Majority). Recommended by the Budget Committee.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) to install approximately 1200 feet of underdrainage and hot top on Warren Avenue. Without recommendation of the Budget Committee.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-Eight Thousand Dollars (\$38,000.00) to rebuild Worthley Hill Road to town specifications from Wallace Road to Merrill Road, install underdrainage from Mast Road to Merrill Road and to pave said road from Wallace Road to end of Worthley Hill Road and to install 300 feet of sewerage pipes. Without recommendation of the Budget Committee.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and

appropriate the sum of Twenty-Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$23,500.00) to finish Pinardville Fire Station as in original plan. Not recommended by the Budget Committee.

8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a car for the Goffstown Fire Chief for the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred Fifty-Nine Dollars and Fifteen Cents (\$3,559.15) said sum to be taken from the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund. Not recommended by the Budget Committee.

9. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Boca Book National Building Code. (By Official Ballot).

10. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Goffstown Zoning Ordinance and maps as adopted at the Town Meeting, March 14, 1961 and subsequently amended, by striking out Articles I-X inclusive, and inserting Articles I-VIII which have been placed on file with the Town Clerk. (By Official Ballot).

11. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee in the amount of One Million Two Hundred Sixty-Seven Thousand One Hundred Ninety-Two Dollars and Sixty-Three Cents (\$1,267,192.63) and raise by taxes the sum of Six Hundred Seventy-Seven Thousand Three Hundred Nineteen Dollars and Sixty-Three Cents (\$677,319.63). (County Tax not included). Recommended by the Budget Committee.

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow from time to time, such sums of money in anticipation of taxes as may be needed to meet the necessary running expenses of the Town.

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the

Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deed, purchase, prescription or gift.

14. To see if the Town will vote to sell to Kendall-Hadley, Inc. for the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) a tract of land situated next to the former Grange Hall, on the northerly side of Church Street, westerly of the brook and containing approximately eight tenths of an acre according to a plot plan attached and two pages of description of property. (Inserted by Petition).

15. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to convey to the Town Conservation Commission certain land now unclaimed – owner unknown. (Inserted by Petition).

16. To see if the Town will vote for the sum of One Dollar (\$1.00) and other valuable considerations to accept a quitclaim deed from John E. and Vera W. Webster of the passageway to be known as Kendall-Hadley Row which is twenty-two (22) feet in width and approximately one hundred eighty-five (185) feet in length between Church Street and the Boston and Maine Railroad right of way and westerly of the factory building of Kendall-Hadley, Inc. according to plot plan attached. This is the most used short street in the Town. (Inserted by Petition).

17. To hear the reports of Town Officers, Auditors, and Committees and to pass any vote relating thereto.

18. To see if the Town of Goifstown will vote to continue the Sewer Commission as adopted at the 1956 Town Meeting and as it presently exists.

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Goffstown Police Department realized many changes during 1970, many of which were predicted in the last year's Town Report. Although the "serious crime index" increased slightly, the index of strict felonious crimes decreased, while the "general crime index" increased by a significant 21.6%. The increases in crime during the past year were generally lower than anticipated, particularly when related to similar areas throughout the nation. The accident increase, however, was an unanticipated 25%, with a 10% reduction in injuries over the previous year. Unfortunately, Goffstown's accident statistics for the year 1970 include four fatalities, three of which were sustained by out-of-town motorists.

FACTS AND FIGURES:

The following table represents pertinent statistics recorded and evaluated by the Goffstown Police Department.

IMPROVED SERVICES:

The past year was highlighted by a move by the police department from its former quarters to the current Municipal Building. This change in location has meant great increases to the Town of Goffstown in terms of the effectiveness and efficiency of its police operations.

The department initiated an Explorer Program which currently boasts a membership of over 30. The post has participated in numerous functions, has gained extensive knowledge in law enforcement and allied fields, and has recently started to accept female members. It is reported that the post is one of the strongest of such organizations in the State of New Hampshire.

Bicycle safety remained a priority for the past year and many parents received letters advising of their children's misbehavior while operating their bicycles. This intense campaign resulted in a marked decrease in bicycle accidents.

The police department further initiated a program in Goffstown High School to instruct high school students in the various aspects of the law and the criminal justice system in the United States. The course is one of its kind in the Eastern part of this country.

The department sought federal funds extensively during the past year and received a total in excess of \$15,000.00 for a variety of projects at no additional cost to the taxpayers of Goffstown. Included in such funds was a \$2,600.00 riot control project including equipment for a 20 man squad, a \$10,000.00 communication console for headquarters, the first of its type in the State of New Hampshire, \$750.00 in a training grant for recruit police officers, and \$2,415.00 in funds to continue sending officers to the St. Anselm's College Program.

The department intensified its training program and instituted a new method of accident reporting. Representatives of the department also participated in a project to assure uniformity of reponse in criminal emergency situations.

PROPOSED SERVICES:

The current plans for the year 1971 include the development of several programs to be funded federally. Among the proposals currently anticipated are the following: a juvenile officer program; an extension of our communication system revision: a stenographic reporting system: a research project in juvenile delinquency; and, a cadet officer summer program. Such programs will not require expenditures of additional funds by the town. Plans also include the continuance of training grants.

It is also anticipated that the County Communication system will be housed in the department's headquarters. In addition to the rent available to the town, it would include equipment thought to be valuable to police operations in Goffstown.

The department also plans to extend the current short-term programs run during the past year: the patrolman of the month (School Safety Patrols); competitive safety events; public information program regarding drug abuse; bus driver's seminar; and, youth problems seminar for the school district.

As in past years, the members of the Goffstown Police Department are appreciative of the assistance and support of the citizens of the Town of Goffstown. However, Chief Robert Wike urges the public to participate more in calling or writing the department with suggestions or criticisms regarding the performance of law enforcement in Goffstown. It is only through such mutual cooperation that the police force can function efficiently and effectively.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

In 1970 the people of Goffstown seemed to be more fire conscious than ever. Our records show that from the number of calls for fires in buildings only five had substantial losses. One fire was caused by a faulty gas heater, another was determined to be spontaneous combustion, the cause of the third was a short circuit in the electrical wiring, the fourth was caused by a combination of spilled gasoline and welding, the fifth was intentionally set by the occupant.

Fire protection for the village was greatly increased this year by the installation of two dry hydrants in the business area. These hydrants, capable of supplying a total of 1780 gallons per minute, increases our effectiveness by eliminating the need of cutting through the ice on the river in order to draft water plus the freeing of a man which would be needed to keep the hole clear of ice. A third dry hydrant has been installed in Moose Club Park with a capability of 810 gpm. Due to the number of homes in the area more hydrants are needed. Tentative plans call for the installation of two more hydrants in the park areas of Pinardville.

In the last year the men of both fire companies have participated in 1,592 hours of training. This includes use of the apparatus, special schools in Laconia and Fitzwilliam N. H. and classes at Industrial plants in the area.

In 1970 the Goffstown Highway Department was responsible for the construction, repair and maintenance of many of the roadways throughout the Town of Goffstown. Many projects were completed and additional projects have been initiated and proposed.

COMPLETED PROJECTS

The maintenance of a municipal highway system is difficult and time-consuming. Besides the obvious repairs necessary from year to year, major work is required periodically to assure that the roadways will be maintained in a condition that suits safe and convenient travel. To this extent installation of culvert pipe in various locations throughout the town was necessary. Over 3000 ft. of pipe being used this year.

As in previous years, dust control procedures consisted of application of re-claimed motor oil on the gravel roads of the town. This has proved to be the cheapest and most enduring of the methods of dust control and does no harm to the finish of vehicles.

Mechanical work except for major work requiring special tools, is done by the various personnel of the department as there is no regular mechanic. ALL the town vehicles were repaired and painted by personnel of the department.

Woodhaven Acres received two new catch basins and approximately 260' of culvert pipe for underdrainage and was tar-patched.

Mast Road: approximately 140' of culvert and one catch basin, in conjunction with Orchard Street drainage job.

Tirrell Hill Road was widened in several places and given a coat of hot top shim to help the riding surface.

Tibbetts Hill Road was also widened and culverts added and given a hot top shim coat to smooth the riding surface.

Wallace Road was also given a hot top shim to improve the riding surface.

Mountain Road also received a hot top shim to help improve the surface. It must be kept in mind that some of these roads were not completed due to the lack of money available. It is hoped this year to finish these that are started, and to continue on with our hot top shim. Other roads that received a hot top shim were North Mast, New Boston Road, Elm Street, South Mast Road and 114 in Pinardville. Route 114 in Pinardville also received a 5/8ths of finish P. M. S. T which completes this mile. South Mast Road and the traffic circle area also received a finish 5/8 coat of hot top so this one is also done. A short strip of about 300 ft, was hot topped on North Mast by Hall's TV to protect the small bridge which has been taking a beating from heavy trucks.

Orchard Street in Pinardville was given underdrainage and a shim coat and a finish coat of hot top which has improved this road to some extent.

First Avenue received new underdrainage also along with the cleaning of the brook from there to the river at Merrimack Farmers, some of this work was done by hand some by bulldozer and some by backhoe. To date we have had no problems at all with this brook, even with all the heavy fall rains that we have had.

All our roads are being ditched with the grader as fast as we can and weather allows, this helps to keep water and ice off our roads, and at the same time widens the roads and makes it much easier on our snowplows.

Extensive tar-patching has been done this year and much more is needed, however, we cannot get them all when we would like to, but we are working towards an end that we can now see.

Some guard rail work was done on Mill Street, New Boston Road and across from the Dugas building in Pinardville also at the end of Edmond Street.

APPROXIMATELY 18 MILES OF ROADS WERE HOT-TOPPED THIS YEAR EITHER AS A SHIM OR FINISHED (2 coats).

We resurfaced with I-1 bituminous concrete OVER 5 MILES of our sidewalks with an approximately 1/2 inch overlay all done by hand and rolled. This included sidewalks in all areas of Goffstown, Grasmere and Pinardville.

Extensive tree and brush cutting has been done in all areas of the town. Also the mowing of the sides of the roads has been started again this year with good results.

The highway department excavated for the new swimming pool at the Barnard Playground, installed a new sewer line complete with manholes, did some grading and other necessary work for the light and telephone companies, along with other work that had to be done from time to time. The road to the playground was paved also to improve the area and to keep down the dust.

Most of the catch basins have been cleaned TWICE this year. There are 296 of them and they have to be cleaned by hand as we have no machine.

The sludge beds at the Sewer plant have to be cleaned twice each year, and new sand installed. There are four of these beds.

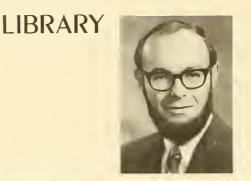
The sanitary landfill is a large job itself. We can no longer just push the fill cover material with the bulldozer. We now have to use two trucks and the loader and buildozer. If we had a larger loader we could for some time just use that and not have to use the trucks except when we had to haul in gravel for the maintenance of the road itself. The land fill area is rapidly filling in and consideration should be given to likely new areas. No burning will be allowed.

The Lions Club rubbish barrels and other barrels were repaired and painted again this past year, and set back in their respective places ofter being stored for the winter. These containers are not left out during the winter months they suffer damage from ice and for the amount of rubbish picked up in them during the winter months, the damage to them dictates that they should be put under cover for the winter.

The highway department wishes to advise the citizens of Goffstown that we try to be fair and to serve everybody as equal as possible. We do make mistakes and we do try to please everybody but it seems impossible. However, we will continue to try to please everyone. Almost everything we do except for regular work, is done at the request of the Selectmen, Police Department and of course, ultimately from a complaint or a request of the taxpayer-citizen, through one of these departments, or directly from the person involved with the highway department making whatever decision is necessary. It is a rare occasion indeed, that the highway department is ordered to do something without first being gone over by and with the Selectmen the respective department and the party himself, or all together, to serve the best interest of the whole, in general,

The highway department at this time wishes to thank the Selectmen, the Police department, the Fire department, the Office girls and the citizen-taxpayer for the help and consideration and patience with our department. We will continue to serve the public to the best of our ability. I would like to thank my highway employees and their families for the many times I awaken them in the middle of the night, and for their faithful service to the general public.

Trustees Report

This has been a year of change for the Goffstown Library. In June Mr. H. Donley Wray assumed the position of librarian. We feel fortunate in obtaining a man of his capabilities who is interested in promoting our services and facilities to the community.

The Board of Trustees gratefully acknowledges Mrs. Thomas Elliot's services as acting librarian from January to June. Without her cooperation the library would have had to curtail its service to the community.

A Book Committee consisting of one trustee and five patrons of the library was formed to assist in book selection. A Friends of the Library group was also organized and was active in helping with displays, decorating, holding book sales and sponsoring a weekly pre-school story hour. They also help Mr. Wray with his program for shut-ins.

Improvements include new draperies, new front walk, new lighting, a hot water heater, a file cabinet for pamphlets, emergency lighting and a lawn mower. The majority of these improvements were dependent on monies from trust funds left to the library. The funds allotted to the library by the town are sufficient only to cover the basic yearly operating expenses. For several years the Goffstown Library has been a member of the New Hampshire Library Association. This association provides many valuable services especially to the smaller libraries. These include free catalogue cards for all new books, state library cards available to our patrons, films, materials for handicapped and the use of any resources in other member libraries.

We commend our Librarian, Mr. H. Donley Wray, and his capable staff for their untiring and conscientious services.

CHARTER COMMISSION

Your Charter Commission has completed its task to the extent of formulating a charter for Goffstown for your consideration.

Our report begins with relating the events that led to the many decisions that were made.

In January of 1970, we were asked to reconvene by the Board of Selectmen to continue our studies and to propose a new form of government for our town. At a subsequent meeting with the Board and Town Counsel, the commission recommended a councilor-manager type of municipality as we had advised previously.

An article was written for insertion in the 1970 warrant to authorize the commission to proceed with drafting a charter of this form of government. The article was approved at the March 10, 1970 Town Meeting.

From that point on, many meetings were held with city managers and other town and city officials in New Hampshire. A consultant, Professor Thomas M. Stauffer of the Political Science Department of Keene State College, was retained and he advised at each of our meetings, plus writing the document, as we decided upon each article.

The final version, with minor technical corrections, was adopted and presented to Goffstown's delegation to the New Hampshire Legislature on Saturday December 12, 1970.

We feel that the city charter (N. H. statutes provide that councilor-manager requires a city charter) we present to you, is the only form of change in our local government that will meet the requirements that the growth of Goffstown will demand.

We would like to point out in brief, some of the highlights

A nine-member Council would be elected on a partisan basis, from three wards; 2 from each ward and 3 at-large. Ward divisions are based upon the one-man one-vote principle. They also reflect geographical and population divisions as known and popularly accepted at present.

The Council will absorb the duties of the present Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee.

The Clerk, Treasurer, Tax Collector retain their duties. Planning Board, Industrial Committee etc....remain in effect.

The Goffstown and Grasmere Village Water Precinct Boards would become advisory boards to the Council.

Trustees of Trust Funds, Library Trustees, Fire Wardens, Recreation Trustees, Board of Adjustment etc.... would be appointed by the Council.

All present board and committee members remain in office until their terms expire, whereupon they may be re-appointed or re-elected as provided.

The Council will hire, and may replace, a full-time city manager to serve as daily administrator at the Council's direction.

Councilmen will be paid at the rate of \$20.00 per meeting after the first 10 regular meetings, for full attendance only. They shall meet regularly on the first and third Monday of each month. No payment will be made for committee or subcommittee meetings.

The School Board retains its present ninemember board, to be elected on a non-partisan ballot of 3 from each ward. Their autonomy regarding school affairs remains the same.

The School Board budget must be approved by the Council in total, but the Council may not make any line item budget changes.

The presiding officer of the Council will be the Chairman of the Council as elected by members of the Council from one of its members at-large.

All Council and School Board meetings will be

public. Councilmen and other officials shall not buy from or sell goods to, or services to the city while they hold office except by competitive bidding.

A fiscal year beginning on the first day of July 1972 would be established.

The completed Charter will become a bill in the New Hampshire General Court session of 1971, sponsored by Goffstown Representatives Mrs. Barbara Poehlman (D), Mrs. Alice T. Knight (R), Roland Barnard (D) and Robert Monier (R). Upon approval by the General Court, the town is empowered to call a special meeting in September 1971 to vote upon the charter.

The charter will become effective on the first day of January following an election subsequent to its adoption.

In conclusion, we want to thank the publicspirited citizens who gave much of their time and assistance to this charter: Harold Hapgood, Lloyd Sorenson, Gerald Aubin, George Swanburg, Richard Poehlman and Carl Hecker. Members of the Goffstown Planning Board and Keene State College that provided much of the necessary material, also clerical assistance from the Selectmen's office as well as the Board of Selectmen.

PLANNING BOARD

The Goffstown Planning Board meets bi-weekly and since the inception of sub-division regulations much of our time is taken up viewing and acting upon sub-division requests.

Our "701" program forecast that Goffstown was going to be a fast growing community. The number of sub-divisions and the increasing size of these developments is living proof of these projections. We have tried to bring to your attention the problems that have to be faced in developing community by urging you to adopt new regulations to make our growth an orderly one.

A change in sub-division regulations makes the developer responsible for the completion of roads with the town acting as supervisor.

We are urging the adoption of new zoning regulations that should prevent some of the problems we have seen develop in other communities. A new zoning map and the adoption of a Building Code under the supervision of a building inspector are some of the considerations which you have not yet seen fit to approve. Sewer and water problems are other areas of prime consideration that have to be faced and these will be of such magnitude that we urge you to approve each part of the program as it develops.

We extend our thanks to every board and commission that has extended its hand in helping us to develop programs for your consideration.

BARNARD PLAYGROUND REPORT

Your Trustees are very happy to report that we have completed many of our planned projects, namely the Swimming Pool and Bath House, the Shelter Building and four new Tennis Courts.

The Swimming Pool speaks for itself as does the most modern filtering system for pools in the state. The new Tennis Courts were built to professional specifications and the Shelter Building provides for much needed storage space as well as the need for toilet facilities.

We have acquired a small parcel of land just to the Southwest of the pool area in order to round off the physical requirements of our long range planning program. This new acquisition enhances the over seventeen (17) acre original grant.

Mr. and Mrs. Leon Konieczny have again conducted a very successful playground program during the summer weeks. They have also instituted a swim team which has competed with surrounding cities and towns, with good results. We hope to continue the swim team program as well as extending the playground facilities into the evening hours.

This coming season we hope to provide a slide for the younger children at the shallow end of the pool. We also wish to seal the playing surface of the tennis courts and to also provide lighting for night tennis play.

We are in the process of developing a Master Landscaping Plan which will include a parking area. Each year we hope to implement a portion of the Landscaping Plan so that eventually we shall have a playground facility compatible to young and old.

The Trustees wish to thank all those that so generously gave of their time and talent to the success of last year's construction. Without the aid of the Town facilities our project would not have been completed.

PLANNING COMMISSION

REPORT OF THE SOUTHERN NEW HAMPSHIRE PLANNING COMMISSION

INTRODUCTION:

In just four years the SNHPC has grown to be the most progressive area-wide planning organization in the State of New Hampshire. Under the able leadership and support of the Board of Commissioners and member communities, a fulltime staff of Executive Director, Regional Planner, Planning Technician and Secretary now occupy the Commission offices at 815 Elm St., in Manchester.

The primary function of the Commission is to provide the administrative and technical mechanism that is necessary to identify and resolve "area-wide" problems; develop programs to carry out "area-wide" comprehensive plans; and to effect cooperation between local governments within the Region in order to implement programs that will assure coordinated, progressive development in a Regional perspective.

The SNHPC staff works closely with local planning boards. A full time staff representative regularly attends Goffstown Planning Board Meetings as an advisor. Mr. James Tethers is presently working with the Goffstown Planning Board. He keeps them informed about the SNHPC regional planning activities and helps the Goffstown Planning Board relate the regional plans to the Town's present and future development plans. In addition, the SNHPC staff assists the Goffstown Planning Board in its review of subdivision application, zoning controls, and many other activities.

THE COMMISSION:

The Southern New Hampshire Planning Com-

mission was formally organized in August of 1966 in accord with State of New Hampshire Statutes – a direct result of recommendations set forth in the Metropolitan Manchester Planning Study.

Present Commission membership consists of the City of Manchester, and the Towns of Auburn, Bedford, Goffstown and Hooksett, each of whom is directly represented in metropolitan affairs by delegates appointed by their respective governing bodies.

The Commission's first priority is to insure that each member qualifies for maximum financial-aid for the planning and construction of necessary highway improvements, public sewer and water facilities, airport improvements, hospital facilities, parks, playgrounds and open-space and a number of other facilities. Financial-aid programs established by the Federal Government require that "Comprehensive Area-wide Planning" be completed before specific projects are funded. In meeting these planning needs, the SNHPC is utilizing the financial resources of the Department of Housing and Urban Development under the "701" program to match and extend local appropriations.

THE PROGRAM:

The area-wide Comprehensive Planning Program being carried out by the Commission provides a significant benefit to each municipal member in the form of substantial Federal and State financial-aid for planning and constructing needed facilities to insure progressive and growing communities.

The SNHPC program is designed to "encourage the most appropriate use of land, such as the agriculture, forestry, industry, commerce, and housing; the facilitation of transportation and communication; the proper economic location of public utilities and services; the development of adequate recreational area; the promotion of good civic design; and the wise and efficient expenditure of public funds." Major components of this year's program are described in the following sections.

Water and Sewerage Facilities

In December of 1970 the Commission presented the Interim Report for Water Supply and Water Pollution Abatement in the Metropolitan Manchester Regional Area to area-wide officials for their review and comment. Alternative proposals outlined in this document will afford municipal officials an opportunity to evaluate immediate and long-range programs designed to serve local and regional needs.

Area-wide water and sewerage facilities planning qualifies the SNHPC member communities for as much as 95% Federal and State financial assistance for construction of major sewer interceptors, trunk lines, and treatment facilities or as much as 50% Federal assistance for the construction of water supply and distribution facilities.

TRANSPORTATION PLANNING:

The SNHPC has established a continuing transportation planning process in conjunction with the New Hampshire Department of Highways. This planning process provides for a continuous means of evaluation and revision of the Metropolitan Manchester Planning Study completed in 1966. Continual transportation planning is required by the 1962 Federal Highway Act in order to qualify certain highway projects, such as the relocation of the Mammoth Road and Route 3 intersection; the proposed I-93 extension through Manchester and Hooksett; the Route 3 project in Bedford; and the Route 114 By-pass in Bedford and Goffstown. In addition, the Governor has designated the SNHPC as the Agency responsible for carrying out the Regional transportation planning process by coordinating the region's transportation facility and

service needs through the year 1990, as well as tentative transportation investment programs for 1975 and 1990.

COMMUNITY SHELTER PLAN:

The SNHPC has completed the Community Shelter Plan for the Metropolitan area. The six basic objectives of the Community Shelter Plan are:

- To prepare a workable plan for allocating and moving people to the best available shelter space in the event of a nuclear emergency.
- (2) To inform people of where to go and what to do in the event of a nuclear emergency.
- (3) To define unfilled shelter requirements, both present and future, so that efforts to develop new shelter can be applied in the deficient areas.
- (4) To encourage the incorporation of shelter in new private and public buildings.
- (5) To provide for periodic updating of shelter allocation plans, and
- (6) To provide a basis for updating local Civil Defense emergency plans.

One remaining item is the publication of the Emergency Readiness Document. This will be published as a supplement to the Manchester Union Leader, the first part of May, 1971.

OPEN SPACE AND RECREATION:

As 1970 drew to a close, the SNHPC staff completed a draft of an Open Space and Recreation Plan including a comprehensive inventory of recreation opportunities available to residents of the Region, deficiencies in Open Spaces and Recreation areas, and projections for future requirements. This plan will be finalized in 1971.

STORM DRAINAGE:

Late in 1970 work was initiated on a Regional

Storm Drainage Study designed to identify existing and potential drainage and flood hazards within the Southern New Hampshire Region. Preliminary investigations have enabled the SNHPC staff to map flood hazard areas and potential storm drainage impoundment sites. This report, scheduled for completion in early 1971, will evaluate Regional alternatives and establish appropriate relationships between Storm Drainage programs and other Commission planning activities, such as Open Space and Recreation, Water and Sewerage, and land use.

PROGRAM REVIEW AND COORDINATION:

Section 204 of the Demonstration Cities and Metropolitan Development Act of 1966 requires that --

"all applications made after June 30, 1967, for Federal Loans or Grants to assist in carrying out open space land projects or for planning or construction of hospitals, airports, libraries, water supply and distribution facilities, sewerage facilities and waste treatment works, highways, transportation facilities and water development and land conservation projects within any metropolitan area *shall* be submitted for review to the area-wide agency which is designated to perform metropolitan or regional planning for the area within which the assistance is to be used."

The need for greater cooperation between State and Local governments involved in planning and development programs, especially those supported by Federal loans and grants, resulted in the expansion of the 204 Review procedures. The Intergovernmental Cooperation Act which became effective in October of 1969 was designed to: (1) encourage State and Local initiative and responsibility for the development of organizational procedures that would provide effective coordination of functional comprehensive planning activities; and (2) eliminate conflict, duplication and competition in State and Local planning programs.

FINANCES:

Membership Fees of 25c per capita, based upon the latest census were set by the Commission in June 1967, effective July 1, 1968. The fees are as follows:

These membership fees are used by the Commission to match Federal Grants for Regional planning projects, and to provide local planning assistance to members. Since 1968, the Commission has received \$97,800 from the Department of Housing and Urban Development and nearly \$23,000 from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. The Commission anticipates receipt of

\$30,000 – \$40,000 in Federal Grants during 1971. These grants are based upon a 2/3 Federal and 1/3 local matching basis. Membership fees used for matching Federal Grants to date, total \$49,394. SEWER COMMISSION REPORT FOR THE TOWN REPORT

The Selectmen of Goffstown have created a Board of Sewer Commissioners under the provisions of Chapter 252 of the Revised Statutes of the State of New Hampshire relative to the operation of sewers and sewage treatment facilities in the Town of Goffstown.

Your Commissioners have been very busy during the past few months since their appointment and we wish to inform the citizens of Goffstown as to what has been done to date and also what the Commission proposes to do in the near future.

The Commission has adopted a Sewer Ordinance of which copies are available at the Town Hall. This Ordinance not only regulates the use of public sewers but also sets forth Charges and Rates to defray the costs of operating and maintaining the sewer system in the Town of Goffstown.

The Commission has taken the sewer facilities out of general taxation and has set it up as a utility. The Sewer Use Charge will be paid by only those who are on the sewage system. If one does not have the advantage of sewage, he will not have to pay, however, if one benefits from the sewage system he will be billed according to the rates set forth in the ordinance.

The money raised through the sewer use charge will be used to maintain and repair the existing system. This money will also be used to retire the \$300,000.00 bond issue which is requested in the Town Warrant. It is most important for the citizens of Goffstown to understand that this \$300,000.00 bond issue has no effect on the tax rate. Owners of property that are served by the sewer system will pay the Sewer Use Charge. This money in turn will be used to retire the bonds issued. Please keep this in mind when voting for the Article in the Town Warrant.

The \$300,000.00 is to be used solely for the program of separating the ground and surface water from the sewer system in the village section of town. Our Engineering study clearly programs this step as the first project to be taken in the up-grading of our system. Other areas of town will be up-graded and repaired as soon as this initial project is underway.

Your Commission is working closely with the Selectmen, Planning Board, Regional Planning Commission and other agencies associated with Water Pollution Abatement Work. Much interest in our program has been shown by state and federal agencies concerned with water pollution and your commission hopes that it has backing of the citizens of Goffstown in proceeding with a planned, orderly, up-grading of our sewer system.

6. To see if the voters of Goffstown would authorize the School Board to appoint a study committee to determine the need for a public kindergarten in the Goffstown School System, and for this committee to present a proposal with appropriate costs to the voters of the Goffstown School District at the 1972 School District Meeting. (Inserted by Petition)

7. Shall the School District accept the provisions of RSA 195-A (as amended) providing for the establishment of an area school located in Goffstown to serve grades 7 through 12 from the School Districts of Goffstown, Dunbarton and New Boston in accordance with the provisions of the plan on file with the district clerk.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

September 28, 1970

The School Board Goffstown School District Goffstown, New Hampshire 03045

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Goffstown School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1970, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board, School District Treasurer, School Lunch Account and the High School Student Funds.

FINANCIAL INFORMATION Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative balance sheets as of June 30, 1969 and June 30, 1970 are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$83,583.71, from \$1,062,348.47, to \$978,764.76, during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1970.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures – Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1970 are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$17,992.01, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$11,756.77, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$6,235.24.

TREASURER

Classified Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A classified statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1970, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts is included in Exhibit 8-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1970 is included in Exhibit 8-2.

Cash With Fiscal Agents: (Exhibit B-3)

A summary statement of the activity in the cash with fiscal agents (Bond & Coupon) account is included in Exhibit B-3.

Statement of Building Fund Account: (Exhibit B-4)

A statement showing the activity in the Building Fund Account during the fiscal year is presented in Exhibit B-4.

OTHER DEPARTMENTS AND AGENCIES School Lunch Account: (Exhibit C)

A statement of the school lunch account is included in Exhibit C.

School Tax Account: (Exhibit D)

Exhibit D presents a statement of the School District tax account with the Town of Goffstown. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1970 the School District had received the total of the 1969-70 School tax in the amount of \$1,021,001.04.

Bonded Indebtedness: (Exhibit E)

A statement of the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1970, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit E.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) decreased by \$1,416.29 from \$7,651.53 to \$6,235.24 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1970 as shown herewith:

Fiscal Accounting Records Prescribed for E. S. E. A. Title I Funds:

Regulations governing fiscal accounting records for "E. S. E. A. – Title I" funds granted the District require separate accounts with accurate line item records of receipts and expenditures to be kept for each approval project. The use of separate purchase orders for the procurement of supplies and services, special vendor invoices, as well as segregated vendor and payroll manifests is likewise required. Accordingly, appropriate control and detail ledger accounts should be maintained for each individual program. These records should reflect the financial activities for the entire fiscal life of the program.

Overdrafts of Appropriations and Application of Municipal Budget Law:

As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit A-4), there was a net overdraft of 1969-70 appropriations amounting to \$11,756.77. Total expenditures exceeded budgetary appropriations as indicated herewith:

Overdrafts of Appropriations \$42,686.17 Unexpended Balances of Appropriations 30,929.40

Net Overdraft of Appropriations \$11,756.77

In accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law (R. S. A. 32:10) which was adopted by the Town of Goffstown, if an emergency necessitates making an expenditure in excess of budgetary appropriations, the School Board with approval of the Town Budget Committee is required to apply to the State Board of Education for a certificate authorizing such emergency spending.

Authorization was requested and granted for an emergency certificate of S2,500.00.

Signature of a Majority of School Board Members Required on Manifests:

Many vendor manifests examined by the auditors during the course of the audit had not been signed by a majority of the School Board members, as prescribed by law. With respect to the Goffstown School District, signatures of at least five (5) members of the School Board are required to be affixed to all vendor and payroll manifests (school board orders) when the Treasurer is ordered to pay funds from the District Treasury.

Supporting Documents Required For All Vouchers Paid:

In a number of instances, vendors invoices or other documents supporting payments made from district funds were not attached to paid vouchers and/or were not available in the district files.

All disbursements, including petty cash transactions, should be fully and accurately substantiated. Detailed invoices should be attached to vendors' statements; petty cash expenditures should be supported by itemized paid receipts. Where applicable, freight bills, bills of lading, packing slips, metered delivery slips and other evidentiary matter should be attached to invoices and vouchers. Receipts of goods or services billed should be acknowledged by appropriate District officials and employees; bulk deliveries, such as heating oil, should be verified by suitable means. Mathematical verification of extensions and discounts should be made prior to payment by the Treasurer.

Conclusion:

Publication of the Exhibits included in the audit report is optional, at the discretion of the School Board.

The growth in the enrollment of the Goffstown Schools has exceeded 2000 with a total of 2049 pupils with the following distribution:

The statistics in the tables indicate the phenomenal school population growth in Goffstown in recent years. The building capacity and current enrollment table shows that our schools are overcrowded by approximately 400 students. Overcrowded conditions exist at Goffstown High School, Goffstown Junior High School and Maple Avenue School, with Bartlett School rapidly reaching capacity.

In the light of the extremely overcrowded conditions in our schools it is evident that Goffstown must undertake a building program in the immediate future. The Goffstown School Building Committee will present its recommendation to the voters at the annual school district meeting in March.

The AREA School Plan

The citizens of Goffstown will have an opportunity to make available to the Town of Goffstown additional revenues in the form of 50% extra State of N. H. building aid on present Goffstown High School bond payments, additional per tuition pupil incentive aid payments from the State of New Hampshire, 50% additional State of New Hampshire building aid on future construction and reduced interest rates on state guaranteed loans.

The proposed AREA Plan is essentially identical to the present long-term contracts currently in effect with New Boston and Dunbarton. The advantage of substantially increased State of New Hampshire payments to Goffstown will result from an endorsement of the AREA Plan by the Goffstown voters at the March district meeting.

Goffstown retains complete control of the school system under the AREA Plan.

Tuition payments from Dunbarton and New Boston and additional State of New Hampshire payments to Goffstown under the AREA Plan will amount to approximately \$200,000 annually and will increase as educational costs increase. The Goffstown AREA Planning Committee Report states the following:

"The Goffstown AREA School Planning Committee consisting of the three member committees of Dunbarton, Goffstown, and New Boston has studied the feasibility of establishing an AREA High School and an AREA Junior High School in Goffstown. The study was undertaken as a result of the voters action at the March 1966 School District meetings in Goffstown, Dunbarton and New Boston which directed that a study be made. The Planning Committee has involved the personnel of the office of the Superintendent of Schools and consultants from the State Department of Education.

RECOGNIZING THAT THE PRESENT TUITION CONTRACTS NOW IN FORCE AMONG THE THREE TOWNS ARE TO ALL INTENT AND PURPOSE AN AREA PLAN IN BEING, IT IS THE INTENTION OF THIS COMMITTEE TO ADJUST THE PRESENT PLAN TO CONFORM TO THE STATUTE CHAPTER 195A, AND TO THUS BE ELIGIBLE FOR THE ADDITIONAL STATE AID THAT IS AVAILABLE."

The Committee makes the following recommendation:

"THE PLANNING COMMITTEE BELIEVES THAT THIS PLAN WILL PROVIDE FINANCIAL AND EDUCATIONAL BENEFITS AND LONG-TERM SECURITY FOR THE THREE SCHOOL DISTRICTS INVOLVED AND RECOMMENDS THE ADOPTION OF THE AREA PLAN TO THE THREE SCHOOL DISTRICTS."

Title I of the Federal Elementary and Secondary School Education Act

Funds received under Title I continue to provide valued support for the remedial reading program in Grades 1-12. More than 100 students receive individual instruction in the reading improvement skills which are essential to success in all areas of school work. Of particular interest is the High School program conducted by Mr. Boivin. Several students have made particularly significant advances in reading skills which have in return been reflected by increased achievement and a desire to remain in school. The state Title I Office this year cited the program as one of the outstanding reading projects at the secondary level.

Goffstown High School

The Goffstown High School enrollment as determined in December was 740 students, and increase of approximately 100 over the previous year. A survey of eighth grade students in contributing schools indicates an increase of another one hundred youngsters during the 1971-72 school year.

Program of Studies

Robert Moulton, Principal of Goffstown High School states that in mathematics we operate what amounts to a four track program. Curriculum work in this area was completed this year with additions and reorganization of



senior offerings to allow for a choice of analytical geometry, senior mathematics or calculus. With some 70% of our students electing mathematics as course choices, we feel that needs are being met as far as course choices are concerned.

This year we are developing our own general science program, scheduling all students electing this course during the same period and using four teachers teaching to their strengths to provide more meaningful instruction. Each class will have the benefit of working with all four teachers prior to the completion of the course. With the institution of this course for non-college pupils, we feel that the needs of this group are being met and hope to add courses in ecology for all students and advanced physics and chemistry for college bound students. As the program now stands, college preparatory youngsters may elect earth science, biology, chemistry, physics and advanced biology. Non-college preparatory youngsters may elect earth or general science, life science or biology and physical science.

We have been experimenting this year with the offering of electives. These courses are being offered in the English area at the senior level. Students may substitute Shakespeare or the humanities program for a full year of English IV and advanced composition for a half year of English. We plan to add a film studies course as a half alternative for 1971-72. The humanities program, which we team teach, is a popular course encompassing much found within a regular English program, as well as materials in such other areas as art, music, history, and current problems. Also offered within the area of English is a course in speech and dramatics.

This year in our social studies program we added a half year course in sociology and economics. During the second semester we plan half-year programs in psychology and law enforcement, the latter to be a cooperative venture with community resource people.

Our foreign language program continues to expand and in 1971-72 we will offer four years curriculums in French and Spanish. We will continue to offer two years of Latin in order to meet student requests.

Art, industrial arts and home economics courses are very popular with our students. It is interesting to observe that over the past three years there has been a growing interest among girls for industrial arts courses and boys in the foods class within the home economics program. Interest in art and industrial arts courses has required a limitation in class sizes causing some students to select alternative courses.

Although some classes are larger in size than is desirable, all physically able students whose programs do not conflict are required to take physical education. Freshmen and sophomores are scheduled for three periods per week and juniors and seniors for two.

Program-wise, Goffstown High School has made great strides in the past few years. However, the needs of youngsters these days have become increasingly demanding, and we must continue to expand our offerings to meet these needs. Vocational education courses within the business and home economics areas are needed and a priority should be placed on those within the industrial arts program. We are, at present, considering the possibility of developing a work-study course for students not planning to pursue educational endeavors beyond the high school level. There is evidence to support the contention that the town has need for an adult education program. Unquestionably, our weakest instructional program is music. We have a fine band and an adequate program in instrument instruction, but little is available by way of courses in general music instruction. Specifically we need courses in choral instruction, music theory, music appreciation and music history.

Goffstown High School is not without problems. Our student body population is now more than 150 over building capacity and for 1971-72 will undoubtedly be close to 240 over capacity. A shortage of classrooms has required us to increase class sizes to accommodate students. As noted earlier it has been necessary to turn students away from classes. As one might imagine, congestion within the building has created numerous problems concerned with administering the program.

Equipment-wise we are lacking in the areas of business, art, industrial arts and science. Increases in student numbers plus demands for program improvement requires an increase in available funds. These funds have just not been forthcoming and, as a matter of fact, cuts in audio-visual budget requests over the years have left us with very limited resources in this area. Mr. Moulton states that the proposed reduction in expenditures for Goffstown High School for 44

textbooks, audio-visual equipment and supplies as well as in library requests will make the operation of a quality education program for 1971-72 difficult if not impossible.

Guidance

Prior to the time the schedule is prepared by the administration, members of the Guidance Department meet with each student including incoming eighth graders to advise him relative to course choices. As time allows, Freshmen receive information through the media of orientation sessions. Testing conducted by the department include the Otis Lennon and National Educational Development tests for ninth graders, the N, H. Sophomore Testing Program for tenth graders, as well as specific achievement tests of the college boards for some youngsters, the Otis Gamma, the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Tests, the Kuder Interest Inventory, as well as the National Merit Scholarship Tests for juniors. The department also assists in arranging for juniors and seniors to take college board exams and for seniors to take the General Aptitude Test Battery.

Much effort is made by the department to provide individual counseling for students with scholastic as well as individual problems. As might be expected, considerable time is spent in advising youngsters in selecting and making application to college.

Interesting statistics made available by the department relative to the school year 1969-70 are as follows:

Of the 118 members of the Class of 1970

36% enrolled in 4 year colleges
20% enrolled in post high school programs of less than 4 years
32% entered immediate employment
6% entered the military
6% married or were uncertain about future plans

The drop-out percentage for Goffstown High School in 1970 was 2.3%.

Library

The 1969-70 school year was a busy one in terms of library use with an average weekly attendance of 672 students and a total circulation of 4,412 books.

There has been an ever increasing demand on the part of the students to use audio-visual materials, namely recordings, tapes, and filmstrips. The library of today is not the steriotyped book repository of the past but is in the jargon of today, a "resource media or center dispersing not only printed materials but also audio and visual materials."

With the increased enrollment, however, the library facilities have not been adequate and the problem will become acute in the near future.

Reading Program

The purpose of the reading program at Goffstown High School is to help students especially in grade 9 who are experiencing difficulty in improving their reading skills. The remedial program designed for students who fall far below grade level caters to individual differences. Through diagnostic testing and remedial techniques, students proceed along a path of learning tailored to their specific needs and difficulties. The program stresses the individual and his particular reading difficulties, consequently classes are kept small (5 - 7) and a variety of approaches and materials are employed for remediation. The developmental program, although it is somewhat less individualized than the remedial program, is designated for groups of students whose needs are similar and whose reading and listening comprehension, oral and silent reading, rate and further development of reading and study skills, students receive help in reading improvement. The program presently involves approximately 25% of the students in the 9th grade in the course of a year. Reading instruction is provided for upper-classmen upon request or teacher recommendation. Progress reports are issued in February and June.

Nursing Services

We have been pleased this year to have the services of a full-time nurse for four days a week. With 740 youngsters enrolled, our nurse has a busy schedule in handling the various health problems experienced by our students as well as medical emergencies. Nursing services at Goffstown High School include the provision of eye and ear examinations, and the arranging of physical examinations by the school doctor for athletic teams and the student body as a whole. She provides counseling on medical problems, arranges for referrals, makes home visits and records pertinent information that is beneficial to our youngsters.

 $\mathsf{Mrs.}$ Doris Bailey, R. N. also serves as advisor to a very active Future Nurses organization.

Maple Avenue School

William Brendle, principal, reports that this school year grade five has a fourth group in place of the special fifth grade class. With the fourth group, more flexibility in grouping is made possible. There are two teachers teaching the Science groups which makes it possible to move students with less effect on other subject areas.

The grouping has made it possible to decrease the overall size of all classes, making the learning process more advantageous to the students and teachers.

The fourth grade students this year are changing classes in the afternoon sessions only. Students are grouped heterogeneously by numbers only. Each teacher is teaching reading and mathematics to their respective classes, in the homerooms. In the afternoon, Mrs. Steenbergen is teaching all of the Social Studies, Mrs. Mahoney all of the Science, and Mrs. Soutiere all of the English.



The teachers had selected the areas which they felt were their stronger areas of teaching and correspondingly, were assigned.

After a full year curriculum study, Maple Avenue School instituted a new English series, which is the Robert's English. This is presently being used in grades one through five. Mr. Brendle states that at the end of this year we will be in a good position to evaluate our new series, and that the teachers indicate it is much more effective in the teaching of the basics in English than our previous series.

We are presently in the process of resuming and completing a Social Studies curriculum study, whereby we can update this area next year. This study was started last year, and will be completed during this present school year.

Through the New Hampshire Council of Better Schools, we are attempting to initiate a Volunteer Teacher Aid program to free the teachers from some duties of a non-academic nature. We are accepting applications from interested parents.

Additional library books, through the monies allocated in the school budget, and under the federal government Title II, will improve our present library by adding about two hundred books.

White Building

The White Building is involved in a curriculum study in Social Studies which was undertaken early last year and will continue this year. Based upon this, we will adopt an updated series in this curriculum area.

With the purchase of additional overhead projectors for the White Building, the audio-visual instruction is much improved, and at this grade level there is a great educational value in its use. The White School does not have a central library, nor easy access to one. We are attempting to build individual classroom libraries, making appropriate books available to all students at the sixth grade level. Under budgetary allocations and Title II monies from the federal government, we hope to increase our present number of books available to these students.

Through our present reading series suggestions are made for supplemental reading lists.

This is the fourth and final year in the replacement of the old furniture in the White School. Within the next few years, the only additional furniture which we will require will be for increased enrollments.

The sixth grade students will attend camp in Groton, Massachusetts this spring for a one-week period of study in the area of Science. The subject areas covered are the ones requested by us to correspond with our present science curriculum.

Some of the areas to be studied are: plant life, pond life, animal life and astronomy. The students also learn the use of a compass, and in their travels will study earth and rock formations. This for most students is a most delightful educational experience.

Bartlett Elementary School

The public school enrollment of the grades 1 through 5 students attending Bartlett School is no longer a small portion of the total educational system in Goffstown. The enrollment is continuously increasing with the current number of 281 pupils taught by 13 faculty members. At the recent rate of increase we



will need additional classrooms very shortly. By the next school year, we will have all available space and rooms occupied.

Mr. Leon Cote, principal, reports that Bartlett School groups grades two through five according to the ability of individual pupils. He adds that this method has worked out well so far to date and that teachers find that more can be accomplished during the school year.

Supported by Government Title II Funds, Town Appropriations and Mother's Club Funds, the library continues to grow. Each year a number of books have been added to widen children's horizons through reading. The Mother's Club continues to operate the library and staff it daily with volunteer mothers.

The Mother's Club has provided the school with a new electric spirit duplicator which was a welcome change from the old manual one and has underwritten the repair of the TV antenna and lead in wires going into the building.

The New Careers Program has provided a teacher aide for Bartlett School. The teacher aide services relieve teachers of non-teaching duties and assist teachers in preparing materials to be used in the classroom.

Goffstown Junior High School

Mr. Emil Nawoj, Principal of Goffstown Junior High School states "The curriculum at the Junior High School level is being constantly updated, the addition of new courses, or expanding activities is impossible because of the lack of space. An effort is being made to implement new methods and techniques in



our classrooms to keep abreast of the times, and provide our children with the best possible education required in this day and age."

Mr. Nawoj adds, "A sincere interest in the community and its problems is being demonstrated by our children, with a mature and intelligent attitude. Community projects and studies are being undertaken, hopefully, to find ways to improve our environment and face up to the problems at hand."

The Goffstown Junior High School is inadequate to meet the needs of the boys and girls attending the school:

1. It is overcrowded by nearly 150 students

2. It is understaffed and lacks facilities to provide for the educational needs of the students (no vocal music, art, guidance, foreign languages, inadequate science laboratory and library facilities, no band or orchestra practice rooms (to mention but a few of the real shortcomings)

3. It is without lockers to provide students with reasonable security for their books and clothing.

4. The complete building and heating plant need extensive renovation to prevent further deterioration to a point of no return.

School Staffs

The Schools of Goffstown are staffed with capable and dedicated teachers and principals. To relieve the heavy pupil load at the secondary and elementary school levels, additional teachers will be required to cater to the educational needs as more than 2100 students will enroll in the Goffstown public schools in September 1971.

Dual Enrollment Plan

The Goffstown School enrollment could be increased by nearly 200 elementary school students in the event that St. Edmund's School were discontinued. The additional tax burden to the Goffstown School District including additional facilities would be substantial. George Hebert and Emile Bourque of the Goffstown School Board who also serve on the Parochial School Board have kept the Goffstown School Board apprised of the parochial school problem.

Through recently enacted State of New Hampshire legislation, the Goffstown School Board is requesting the voters of Goffstown to approve participation in the State Dual-Enrollment Plan under which state funding is available for local school district services to supplement the parochial school educational effort.

Our Future Nurses Club was sponsored by the school nurses and completed an active year. Four of our five senior members have been admitted to collegiate and diploma schools of nursing.

Pre-school registration was held March 30th and 31st and the morning of April 1, at our Maple Avenue Elementary School. Eighty-nine pre-school children were present.

The Bartlett School had registration on May 4th and 5th and fifty-two children attended.

Vision and hearing tests were given on each student. Heights, and weights recorded, and a dental examination was given. Mrs. Burton, a dental hygienist from the State Department of Dental Health, was present for this program. Recommendations for follow-up care was made at this time.

Pre-school screening tests are most valuable. The importance of early case finding enhances correction of defects at an optimal time and before the child enters school.

Our cafeteria workers received routine physical examinations including throat cultures and serology.

A Menstrual Hygiene Education Program for all sixth grade girls was presented. A film was shown, discussion period followed, and appropriate literature was given to each girl.

A film on Drug Abuse was shown to all sixth grade students.

Dr. Underwood and Mr. Wiita from the Concord YMCA gave a very interesting and informative talk on the effects of smoking on general health to all fifth and sixth grade students.

A Rubella vaccine clinic was conducted by Dr. Albert Snay, the State Board of Health and the School Health Service. At this time 494 students were immunized. One of our students, Arlene Hodgkins, had the honor of being the fifty-thousandth student to be immunized in New Hampshire.

Mrs. Knapp's kindergarten, Villa Augustine students, Goffstown Mothers Club Kindergarten, and the Merri-Loo kindergarten were given this opportunity.

Our School Health Department in cooperation with the Pinardville Lions Club, held an amblyopic screening on May 9th for pre-school children. Future Nurses from the Goffstown High School and Senior students from the Sacred Heart School of Nursing were also present for this clinic.

Our school health services have had complete cooperation from all community agencies; our local Lion's Clubs, the Goffstown Mothers Club and the Salvation Army.

We have completed one year of our Pilot Program. As part of the Pediatrics course, senior student nurses participated in a Pilot Program set up by the School Health Department and the Sacred Heart Hospital School of Nursing. Students were assigned to a school nurse in order to observe the function of the school nurse in the School Health Program.

The objectives as far as the School Health Service Department is concerned, are as follows:

A. Provide practicum: a. Curriculum b. Experience

 ${\sf B}, {\sf Promote}$ educational role of the school to the community.

C. Provide an opportunity for nursing students to observe the total education process and personnel involved.

D. Provide an experience for students to observe and work with the well child.

The program was evaluated in June, 1970, and approval received to expand the program beginning September, 1970.

Health is a primary objective of modern education. The Educational Policies Commission has stated that "An educated person understands the basic facts concerning health and diseases – he protects his own health and that of his dependents, and works to improve the physical fitness and leisure-time objectives among our youth as does the school. These opportunities are so important in the development of youth that it should be the aim and function of all schools to provide an adequate three-point health program: comprehensive health instruction, selected health departments, and a healthful environment. Emphasis in this program should be on the health education of the child and in creating a healthful environment for learning.

We wish to express our thanks to the Superintendent, parents, teachers, and the school board for their cooperation.

THE VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION of MANCHESTER 622-3781

The services of the Visiting Nurse Association, a United Fund Agency, are available for all of the residents of Goffstown regardless of age, race, creed or ability to pay. The Visiting Nurse provides bedside nursing care, treatment and instruction and the Registered Physical Therapist provides physical therapy; all services are carried out according to directions by the patient's physician on a part time basis in the home. Home Health Aides are available on the same basis. The Association is a home health agency certified to care for Medicare patients.

Maternal and child health guidance and instruction is given before and after the arrival of new babies and classes for instruction of expectant parents are held three times yearly in Manchester.

Family health guidance is also given with special emphasis on prevention of disease and promotion of health.

926 visits to Goffstown residents were made in 1970. Mrs. Grace Gage R. N. is the nurse in the area.

A Goffstown – Bedford Regional Immunization program is being planned for March, April and May 1971. Details to be announced later.

Dr. Francis Bresnahan examined 52 children at four Well Child Conferences in his office, with Mrs. Gage assisting.
