#### GRAFTON COUNTY EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

#### Monday, January 24, 1972 Woodsville Court House 10:00 A. M.

Members present: Chamberlin, LaMott, Dudley, Buckman, Gardner, Tilton, Brummer.

Vice-Chairman Chamberlin opened the meeting and said that the meeting had been postponed from January 17th to the 24th at the request of the Chairman and the purpose of the meeting was to review and balance the 1971 County budget.

Rep. Chamberlin reviewed the budget item by item.

Rep. Brummer asked if the Commissioners would notify the Executive Committee as to the date of the public hearing to be held by Judge Perkins on the County Attorney's suit against the county.

Commissioner Baker said they would.

Rep. Brummer asked Rep. LaMott if it was the intent of his motion of July 19, 1971, pursuant to RSA 24:15, that the Commissioners be restricted from transferring the numbered items on the CPA account or the totals on the Tax Commission form.

Rep. LaMott said it was the intent of his motion to mean the numbered items but the Tax Commission required the simple form.

Rep. Brummer asked the Vice-Chairman how he ruled on the motion.

Rep. Chamberlin ruled that the motion referred to the totals in the Tax Commission form.

Rep. Chamberlin asked Sheriff Ash if he had complied with Rep. Brummer's motion of November 8, 1971 instructing the Sheriff that all bills and vouchers of his department be current as of December 13, 1971.

Sheriff Ash said he had. Discussion followed.

Rep. LaMott moved that all bills of the Sheriff's department, both deputy salaries and expenses including also clerks and matrons be submitted to the commissioners' office not later than the 10th of the following month. Failure to submit will result in possible non payment.

Rep. Brummer seconded the motion.

Reps. LaMott, Brummer, and Sheriff Ash spoke in favor of the motion.

The motion was unanimously adopted on a show of hands.

Rep. LaMott moved that the Commissioners encumber the Crime Commission balance to the extent of \$10,553.85 for radio and radio equipment.

Rep, Tilton seconded the motion.

The motion was unanimously adopted on a show of hands.

Rep. LaMott moved that the Grafton County Commissioners cause an inventory of all County property be made during the next sixty days, this to include properties in all departments and buildings real and personal.

Rep. Brummer seconded the motion.

The motion was unanimously adopted on a show of hands.

Rep. LaMott moved that the county offer to sell the Plymouth Court House, land and building, to the town of Plymouth for the amount of \$50,000.00, said offer to be good until March 17, 1972.

Rep. Buckman seconded the motion.

Rep. Brummer read RSA 24:13 showing that such a motion would require the vote of the full delegation.

Rep. Chamberlin ruled the motion out of order.

Rep. LaMott moved that the county convention be polled on his previous motion.

The motion was not seconded.

Rep. Brummer said that the town of Plymouth was paying a yearly rent of \$1,805 for the use of the court house and that the yearly fuel bill came to \$2,000.

It was agreed that the rent for the Plymouth court house should be increased.

Rep. LaMott moved that the December 13, 1971 motions transferring the sums of \$16,590.95, \$22,000., and \$5,000. from available funds be rescinded and that the sum of \$58,138.87 be reallocated.

Rep. Tilton seconded the motion.

The motion was unanimously adopted on a show of hands.

Rep. Tilton moved adjournment, seconded by Rep. Buckman.

### GRAFTON COUNTY EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

#### Monday, February 28, 1972 North Haverhill Court House 10:00 A. M.

Members present: Brummer, Gardner, Tilton, Sears, Dudley, Chamberlin, Buckman, Duhaime, McGee.

Chairman Sears opened the meeting and said the purpose of the meeting was to review the 1972 budget projected figures.

Rep. Brummer said the budget hearing scheduled for 7:30 P. M. in Lebanon could not be considered legal as it did not conform to RSA 24:23.

Chairman Sears said the Lebanon hearing was a courtesy hearing for the convenience of the public and that the Plymouth public hearing scheduled for March 6, 1972, would be the legal hearing.

Commissioner Bell reviewed budget revenue figures, pointing out the increased revenue for the Institution was due to the fact that three private nursing homes had closed and the Institution had picked up 19 new patients paying \$12.00 per day.

Discussion ensued on revenue items.

Rep. Brummer questioned Plymouth Court House issue. Discussion followed on the subject property, appraisals, sale, etc. Delegation to take action at special meeting.

Rep. Brummer said the 2 auditors appointed by the Superior Court were not necessary and were a \$400 waste to the County. Discussion followed.

Expenditure items were questioned and discussed.

Chairman Sears recessed the meeting at noon for an hour lunch break.

Chairman Sears reconvened the meeting at 1:00 P. M.

Register of Deeds Wood was called in to give break-

down of salaries in his department.

Bid items and interest percentages on loans discussed in effort to save.

Rep. Buckman expressed anger at the way the Sheriff's Dept. had been batted around.

Rep. Chamberlin said the Sheriff should live within his budget.

Rep. Brummer said the Sheriff's Dept. had run \$22,000 over their budget, and he didn't think the County should pay for other town's police force and the deputies should not be doing duty at the Canaan and Plymouth fairs.

Discussion followed.

Rep. Brummer moved that the Executive Committee authorize the Commissioners to borrow \$500,000 in anticipation of taxes with the stipulation that the loan be put up for bid to banks both within and outside Grafton County.

Rep. Gardner seconded the motion.

The motion was unanimously adopted on a voice vote.

Rep. Tilton moved adjournment, seconded by Rep. Gardner.

#### GRAFTON COUNTY INFORMATIONAL HEARING ON THE PROPOSED 1972 BUDGET

#### Monday, February 28, 1972 Lebanon City Hall Auditorium 7:30 P. M.

32 to 40 people present sometime during the meeting.

Hearing was opened by Chairman Madison Sears of Plymouth.

During the discussion of revenues by Commissioner Baker, Earl Burke asked if the Plymouth and Woodsville court houses were rented or planned to be rented.

Rep. Shirley Merrill discussed her view of the Probate Department vault door.

Rep. George Brummer gave his views on projected revenues.

Chr. Sears and Rep. LaMott spoke about the sale of the Plymouth court house.

When the County Attorney's budget was discussed, Rep. Merrill reviewed the County Attorney's action relating to Lebanon City Council members. She indicated that he should have taken civil action, not criminal. She also indicated that because of this he should not get a raise from \$8,000 to \$12,000 and that the county should be liable for the legal fees of the city councilors.

Sheriff Ash asked to speak on his budget. He felt that the Dr. Bricker case of \$1,500 should not be charged to his department. Com. Baker said that this could be put into another department, thereby reducing the Sheriff's budget total to \$66,000.

Rep. Merrill asked for details making up the recommended \$60,000 total. Com. Baker explained that the Commissioners felt that \$60,000 was a reasonable amount and could be spent as the Sheriff saw fit.

Mr. Guialardi of Bond Optics, Inc., Lebanon (living in Grafton) strongly supported a Sheriff's budget of \$115,000. He expressed his opinion that Sheriff Ash gives protection to his town of Grafton at County expense.

Sheriff Ash continued his discussion on his budget. Deputy Sheriff John Roden spoke on the budget.

A manufacturer from Rumney spoke on the budget.

James Weschler of Lebanon wanted more details of the entire budget.

Rep. Brummer explained the budget process from inception to finalizing.

Com. Baker explained the remainder of the budget items.

Adjournment at 11:05 P.M. (a long day of hearings starting in North Haverhill at 10 A. M.)

#### GRAFTON COUNTY EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

#### Monday, March 6, 1972 Plymouth Court House 7:00 P. M.

Members present: Sears, Tilton, Gardner, Brummer, Dudley, Buckman, McGee, Chamberlin, LaMott.

Chairman Sears opened the meeting and said the purpose of the meeting was to give the County Treasurer emergency authority to borrow in anticipation of taxes.

Treasurer Bromage explained that the stipulation in the motion of February 28, 1972 requiring that the loan also be put up for bid to banks outside Grafton County necessitated a 3-week delay and a \$175 expense to get the approval of bond council on the validity of the vote, and that the county needed \$250,-000 this week for payroll and court house bills. He said if the executive committee wished, he could make the loan for 60 days and then refinance it. Rep. Brummer said he was not opposed to the emergency authorization but wanted to know why, if there had been proper planning, there was an emergency and what the court house bills entailed.

Treasurer Bromage said that in the past they had only borrowed money when they needed it and that the court house bills were for furnishings. He said he had not borrowed the \$183,000 on the 5-year serial notes, because using the \$70,000 interest money, he anticipated he would need only \$110,000 to complete the court house construction. He said he thought the serial note authorization would have to be revoted as he thought bond council would not approve it in its present form.

Rep. Tilton asked the Treasurer if he could spend the \$70,000 interest money without executive committee authorization.

Treasurer Bromage said yes, as long as he didn't go over the total authorization for the court house.

Chairman Sears asked if the money being borrowed now in anticipation of taxes for court house furnishings would later be reimbursed by money from the \$110,000 serial notes.

Treasurer Bromage said yes.

Rep. Dudley asked what rate of interest the county would pay.

Treasurer Bromage said 3.7% from the Littleton National Bank.

Rep. Brummer asked what rates were charged by other banks.

Treasurer Bromage said that with approval of bond council they could get 3% at the National Shawmut in Boston.

Rep. Brummer asked what rate of interest the Town of Littleton paid on their tax anticipation loans.

Treasurer Bromage said 4% on their last ones.

Rep. Brummer explained the benefits of tax exempt income to corporations and said that Hillsborough County got a rate of 2.71% from the Bank of New Hampshire, although Grafton County probably would have to pay a higher rate as it had a BAA rating.

Rep. Dudley moved that the executive committee authorize the Treasurer to borrow \$250,000 in anticipation of taxes, such amount to be in addition to the \$500,000 authorized on February 28, 1972.

Rep. Tilton seconded the motion.

The motion was unanimously adopted on a voice vote, all members present voting.

Rep. Tilton moved adjournment, seconded by Rep. Gardner.

## PUBLIC HEARING ON THE PROPOSED 1972 BUDGET

#### Monday, March 6, 1972 Plymouth Court House 7:30 P. M.

Chairman Sears opened the hearing.

Mr. Rutherford explained the Cooperative Extension budget.

Commissioner Bell reviewed the budget item by item.

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Rep. LaMott spoke against the proposed 50% increase for County Attorney.

Dr. Bricker explained the \$1,500 item in the budget for his services as a deputy in 1969 and said the figure represented 50% of his expense, and that he was not satisfied but had agreed with the court to accept the figure.

Sheriff Ash asked who set the figure for his budget as he had submitted four budget requests based on 3 years research and the \$60,000 was \$20,000 less than his lowest request and was not adequate.

Comm. Bell said the figure was determined by comparison with last year's budget figure.

Rep. Brummer said that 4 counties had full time deputies which had been established by statute, the precedent had been set, and it was too late to introduce a bill in the special session.

William Deachman said he disagreed, and the delegation had full power under the statutes to set salaries of the deputies. It was their responsibility and not the legislature's.

Rep. LaMott said the purpose of the budget hearing was to get public reaction to the budget and the Executive Committee had taken no action on the budget yet.

Sheriff Ash said if he had salaried deputies he could control his expenses and stay within his budget.

Dr. Bricker spoke against the radio contract with Lebanon.

Sheriff Ash spoke against the radio setup.

Rep. Brummer said the Commissioners had put the \$60,000 in the budget with the understanding that the delegation would review guidelines for the Sheriff's Department and make final judgment on his budget.

Chairman Sears said after next Monday's hearing in Littleton he would name a committee of 3 to go over the Sheriff's budget with the Sheriff and bring back recommendations to the executive committee.

Lockett Myers spoke against the Lebanon radio setup.

Atty. Papademas said the delegation should make judgment on how much work they wanted from the Sheriff's Department and then fund it.

John Cloud, Plymouth Chief of Police, spoke against the Lebanon radio deal.

George Plant, Police Officer of Holderness, spoke against the Lebanon radio deal.

Deputy Ingersoll spoke against radio setup.

Deputy Roden spoke against radio setup.

Meldrim Thompson questioned legality of the hearing as selectmen of towns had not been notified as required by statute, and said that the \$60,000 Sheriff's budget did not represent thrift but represented gross neglect. He gave comparison of Sheriff's budgets in other counties and recommended a budget of \$106,000.

Rep. Chamberlin stated that Merrimack County had larger population and a smaller budget.

Meldrim Thompson said that was a different situation as it involved a smaller area and the county was probably utilizing the services of the Concord police and the State police.

William Deachman said the Sheriff of Merrimack got a salary of \$2,500 plus writ fees.

Sheriff Ash said if the department owned its own cruisers, there would be a big saving to the county in gasoline and oil.

George Plant spoke again in opposition to Lebanon dispatch.

Chairman Sears declared a 10 minute recess at 9:30 P. M.

Chairman Sears reopened the hearing.

Commissioner Bell continued his review of the budget.

Rep. Tilton moved adjournment, seconded by Rep. Gardner. The hearing was adjourned at 10:20 P. M.

## GRAFTON COUNTY PUBLIC HEARING ON THE PROPOSED 1972 BUDGET

#### Monday, March 13, 1972 Littleton Town Hall 7:30 P. M.

Vice Chairman Chamberlin opened the hearing and turned the budget review over to Commissioner Clement.

Commissioner Clement said the purpose of the public hearing was to hear the views of the public on the budget and not to hear from members of the delegation.

Rep. LaMott spoke against the proposed 50% salary increase for the County Attorney.

Hubert Merrill of Littleton spoke against increasing the County Attorney's salary.

Kenneth Curran of Littleton spoke against increasing the County Attorney's salary.

Hubert Merrill inquired as to the status of the dispute on the location of the Probate vault door.

Commissioner Clement explained that the Superior Court had ruled in Mrs. Fortier's favor and that the Commissioners had appealed the decision to the Supreme Court.

Rep. Brummer read a letter from Mrs. Fortier explaining her position.

Discussion followed.

Commissioner Clement explained to the Littleton Selectmen that notification to the towns of the budget hearing had not been sent due to oversight, but they would be notified hereafter.

Sheriff Ash reiterated his position on his department's budget.

Rep. Brummer asked the Sheriff if he had full-time salaried deputies, would he allow them to keep the fees for serving civil processes.

Sheriff Ash said he was requesting 3 full-time deputies to do criminal investigations, and that the part-time deputies would do civil process and court work.

Deputy Ted Gardner explained the collecting of fees on civil process work.

William Deachman explained that the Sheriff wanted 3 full-time criminal deputies, and they would not do process work. The new law provided that all county salaries be set by the county delegation and not legislature.

Paul Dovholuk of Littleton spoke in favor of increasing the Sheriff's budget.

Rep. Chamberlin gave brief outline of the power structure of county government.

Rep. LaMott explained action of the Executive Committee in limiting the power of the Commissioners to transfer funds and in requiring the deputy vouchers to be submitted and paid monthly.

Chief Raymond Holland of Lisbon spoke in favor of full-time deputies.

Donald Bull, Littleton Selectman, said that the Sheriff's current expenses indicated that the \$60,000 budget was inadequate.

Dick LaMarsh supported increasing the Sheriff's budget.

Martin Crosby, Franconia businessman, spoke in favor of full-time deputies with county cars in Franconia, as the local officer was unable to cope with the situation.

Scott Sewal, Franconia merchant, complimented Deputy Meade's assistance.

Kenneth Curran said if Franconia needs police protection, let Franconia take care of it.

Rep. Brummer asked Martin Crosby why the county should support his police force when the town of Franconia had one of the highest assessed evaluations in the state.

Martin Crosby replied that the taxpayers were reluctant to give the money.

Deputy Knapp of Lisbon said the decision of the Sheriff's budget should be based on the will of the people.

Deputy Gardner said he wished to go on record as supporting a raise in the Sheriff's budget.

Deputy Roden wished to go on record supporting the Sheriff and increasing his budget.

Sheriff Ash and his deputies reiterated their oppo-

sition to having the radio dispatcher in Lebanon.

Commissioner Clement closed the public hearing at 9:30 P. M.

Members present: Gardner, Stevenson, Tilton, Higgins, McGee, Brummer, Chamberlin, LaMott, Nutt, Gemmill, Dow, Duhaime, Tremblay, Dudley, Altman, Krainak, Bell, Mitchell.

Vice Chairman Chamberlin opened the meeting and said that Chairman Sears had called the meeting at the request of Rep. Merrill who wished to get consensus of opinion from the delegation on whether the probate vault door should be moved.

Commissioner Bell gave an up-to-date report on the vault door controversy.

Rep. LaMott was opposed to taking a consensus of opinion as the case was pending and the delegation didn't have any authority and shouldn't influence the court.

Rep. Brummer gave his opinion of the situation, and stated Mrs. Fortier wanted to move but couldn't without approval of the Superior Court. He stated that he supported Mrs. Fortier's position that the door should be moved.

Comm. Bell stated they planned to have Open House in the spring, but he has not been in favor of the building construction from the beginning.

Rep. Stevenson supported Mrs. Fortier.

Discussion ensued.

Rep. Stevenson moved that a consensus of the delegation be taken as to whether the probate vault door be changed.

Rep. Tilton seconded the motion. Discussion followed.

Rep. Stevenson said if we vote our preference, it might influence the court decision.

Rep. Chamberlin and Rep. LaMott stated they would not vote.

Rep. Higgins said he didn't have all the facts or alternatives and hated to vote.

Rep. Mann asked how many people present had been in the new court house. Show of hands indicated 10 members had been in the court house.

Rep. Gemmill moved that Rep. Stevenson's motion be laid on the table.

Rep. LaMott seconded the motion. The motion was adopted.

Rep. Mann moved adjournment, seconded by Rep. Tilton.

## GRAFTON COUNTY EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

## Tuesday, April 18, 1972 No. Haverhill Court House 10:00 A. M.

Members present: Tilton, Buckman, Brummer, Duhaime, Chamberlin, Gardner, Sears, Dudley, Mc-Gee and LaMott.

Chairman Sears opened the meeting and said the purpose of the meeting was to review the 1972 budget requests and to take up other pertinent matters.

Evelyn Smith said the County was in need of money as the necessary papers required by Bond Council for \$500,000 loan authorized at the Feb. 28, 1972, Executive Committee meeting were tied up in red tape and borrowing on additional Serial Notes for court house construction was held up due to discrepancies in voted amounts.

Rep. Brummer said the Executive Committee could authorize additional borrowing until the red tape and discrepancies were cleared up.

Rep. Brummer said the public should be informed of Executive Committee meetings through news meddia and he read the "Right to Know" law.

Rep. Brummer moved that the Executive Committee first take up the matter of salary recommendations as required by statute.

Rep. Chamberlin seconded the motion. The motion was adopted.

Rep. Gardner moved that the County Attorney's salary be increased to \$10,000.00 as of July 1, 1972.

Rep. Sears seconded the motion.

Rep. Dudley asked if this increase didn't exceed the 5.5% limitation established by the Price-Wage Board.

Rep. Tilton said the limitation didn't apply as the County Attorney's job was part-time, and the salary increase reflected increased time on the job.

The motion was unanimously adopted.

Rep. Gardner moved that the Register of Deeds' salary be increased to \$12,200 as of July 1, 1972.

Rep. McGee seconded the motion. Discussion followed.

Rep. LaMott moved that Rep. Gardner's motion be amended to increase the Register of Deeds' salary by the amount of 5.5% as of July 1, 1972.

Rep. Duhaime seconded the motion. Rep. LaMott's motion was adopted.

Rep. Gardner's motion as amended was adopted.

Rep. LaMott moved that the employees of the Register of Deeds be given a 5.5% raise as of July 1, 1972.

Rep. Gardner seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously adopted.

Rep. LaMott moved that the salary of the Sheriff be increased 5.5% as of July 1, 1972.

Rep. Gardner seconded the motion. The motion was adopted.

Rep. Dudley moved that the County Commissioners' salary remain the same.

Rep. LaMott seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously adopted.

Rep. Dudley moved that the County Treasurer's salary remain the same.

Rep. LaMott seconded the motion. The motion was

adopted.

Rep. Chamberlin moved, having voted with the majority, that the Executive Committee reconsider its actions in voting a \$2,000 salary increase for the County Attorney.

Rep. LaMott seconded the motion. Discussion followed.

On a roll call vote, the motion lost 6 to 4. Tilton-no, Buckman-no, Brummer-no, Duhaime-yes, Chamberlin-yes, Gardner-no, Sears-no, Dudley-yes, McGee-no, LaMott-yes.

Chairman Sears said the Town of Plymouth would like a sale price on the Plymouth Court House before May 16th.

Rep. Brummer moved that the Executive Committee recommend to the Delegation that the Plymouth Court House be offered for sale to the Town of Plymouth for \$70,000.

Rep. Tilton seconded the motion.

Rep. LaMott moved that Rep. Brummer's motion be amended instructing the Commissioners to forbid the use of duplicate registration plates on private and county cars.

Rep. Chamberlin seconded the motion. Rep. La-Mott's motion was adopted.

Rep. Brummer's motion as amended was adopted. Sheriff Ash was called in to clarify the use of cruisers, registration plates on cruisers, and status of radio equipment in Lebanon.

Rep. Brummer wished to be recorded as frowning on the practice of any deputy sheriff taking any judge in a county car to a ball game.

Rep. LaMott moved that the Commissioners meet with the Plymouth Selectmen to effect the consummation of the Plymouth Court House sale on or before December 11, 1972, or else the Executive Committee will request another convention meeting to redetermine the disposition of the Plymouth Court House.

Rep. Gardner seconded the motion. Motion was unanimously adopted.

Rep. Chamberlin moved a resolution that the Executive Committee go on record as being opposed to Director Corson's closing the southern part of the state to deer hunting on November 22 and to the establishing of a deer line.

Rep. LaMott seconded the motion.

Treasurer Willard Bromage was allowed to speak regarding the responsibilities of treasurer, especially as pertains to borrowing money, and expressed concern over lack of cooperation and understanding from Executive Committee. Treasurer Bromage stated he anticipated overrun on Court House Construction Account and would need Convention approval to make payments in excess of appropriations.

Rep. Buckman moved adjournment, seconded by Rep. Tilton. Adopted.

SUBJECT: Grafton County Radio Network

I wish to submit the following information as a status report on the installation and operation of the Grafton County Radio Network.

An agreement between the County of Grafton and the Lebanon City Council was approved on December 6, 1971 establishing a method by which the city would provide night-time and weekend dispatch service to the Sheriff's Department upon the installation of an operational county radio network.

On the third week of November, 1972, a remote unit for the County Base Radio, with antenna, was installed in the Lebanon Police Department.

Problem: This remote unit provides communication with the county sheriff's base unit at the courthouse in Woodsville but *will not* trigger the repeater at Cannon Mountain. An attempt will be made to relocate the antenna to a location which will trigger Cannon Mountain, but until this remote unit has that capability, the Lebanon Police Department is unable to perform dispatch service.

The Watts telephone line has not been installed in

the Lebanon Police Station at this date. It would be of no value until the Cannon Mountain repeater can be triggered by the Lebanon remote unit.

A Crime Commission grant was utilized to purchase and install the remote unit at the Lebanon Police Department.

Assuming that a workable location will be found to allow the Lebanon Remote Unit to activate the Cannon Mountain Repeater, the County will be required to secure a Crime Commission grant for the purchase and installation of the following equipment in the Lebanon Police Department, as specified in the agreement.

- 1. Communications console with cabinet, turret and multi-station control panel;
- 2. Illuminated County Map to attach to console;
- 3. Recorder-reproducer for County radio channel;
- 4. Necessary installation and modification to correct present Lebanon radio system to console;
- 5. Assume financial responsibility for maintenance of above equipment and present Lebanon Police Base Equipment;
- 6. Necessary telephone lines for receiving Sheriff's Department calls;
- 7. Assume financial responsibility for one-half total cost of present teletype rental and paper;
- 8. Provide funds not to exceed \$500.00, to be made available to the Supervisor of the Communications Center to establish information systems of emergency resources for each town served by the Center, establishment of a radio procedural manual and locational index maps for dispatch use for the County area; such money to be paid through the Commissioners upon receipt of duly authenticated vouchers.

At the conclusion of the work listed above, the Lebanon Police Department would have the capability of providing dispatch service to the Grafton County Sheriff's Department sixteen hours per day (night time shifts) and twenty-four hours on weekends and holidays.

In summation, it appears that the following steps

must be completed at the earliest possible moment:

- 1. Lebanon: Relocate antenna to trigger Cannon Mountain Repeater.
- 2. County: Install Watts telephone line in Lebanon Police Department.
- 3. County: Secure a Crime Commission grant for the purchase and installation of additional equipment for the Lebanon Police Station as outlined in the agreement.

#### END OF REPORT:

Rep. LaMott asked about the status of the Plymouth Court House sale.

Chairman Sears explained that the Town of Plymouth had voted by the necessary 2/3rds to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate the purchase of the Plymouth Court House for a sum not exceeding \$49,-000. He said that the Commissioners were not empowered to negotiate as the Delegation had set the price and that Selectman Crowley thought the town had a better deal by just renting the court house.

Rep. LaMott moved that the Executive Committee recommend to the Delegation that a delegation meeting be held on December 26, 1972, to redetermine the disposition of the Plymouth Court House, if the County still owned the court house on that date.

Rep. Brummer seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously adopted.

Commissioner Baker said that the Commissioners would draw up a deed and mortgage and send it to the Plymouth Town Attorney for the Selectmens' signatures.

Rep. LaMott moved that the meeting be recessed until 1:30 P. M.

Rep. Duhaime seconded the motion. Motion adopted.

Chairman Sears reopened the meeting at 1:30 P. M.

The Commissioners requested authority to transfer funds within the budget from available funds.

Rep. Brummer and Rep. LaMott wanted to know the specific transfers and have an up-to-date budget report.

Rep. LaMott said that the exit corridors represented a safety hazard without proper lighting and warning signs.

Rep. Brummer wanted to know if painting the exit corridor walk was in the contract.

Treasurer Bromage said that the building had been accepted on January 24, 1972, and that the performance bond ran out a year from that date.

Rep. LaMott moved that the Commissioners determine within 24 hours who was responsible for the painting of the exit corridors and any other unfinished business and if the contractor was responsible, to take the necessary legal steps to have it finished.

To The Citizens of Grafton County:

As required by Statute, the Commissioners of Grafton County submit herewith the report of the various County Officials for the year ending December 31, 1972.

The new court house in North Haverhill was completed in early January, 1972, and most offices moved into the new building by mid January. The Sheriff's Department moved into their new quarters in mid February, and the Register of Probate's Office got settled in late August. The Departments are pleased with their new and spacious working areas. The new Court House dedication in July had a large turn out of interested citizens to tour the structure.

The most noticeable change in budget appropriation came about in the Sheriff's Department when it was voted to put three criminal deputies on a fulltime salaried basis, effective July 1st, with each to have a county owned cruiser.

Welfare, along with most expenditures, continues on the upward trend. State Welfare picked up the new program of Mentally Disabled effective July 1st, which had its effect on County Budget as an increased revenue for the home—hospital, but as an un-appropriated expenditure to the Commissioner's Welfare Budget as the legally liable agency must reimburse the State a percentage of such programs.

The 1972 Budget ended with a sizeable plus in revenue, and total expenditures ran slightly under appropriation, making an overall cash surplus of \$74,-000.

We feel that Grafton County has a model Surplus Foods Program due in most part to our capable Surplus Foods Administrator and conscientious town handlers. The program continues to expand and is still partially reimbursed under the Federal Monetary Support Program. We are pleased to report that of the 38 towns and 1 city in Grafton County, 36 are active in the program.

We wish to express our appreciation to our staff

of employees, the County Delegation, the various town officials, and the State Welfare Department for their continued cooperation.

### Gentlemen:

As usual, the year was busy, productive and diversified. Farm production exceeded the 1971 level, again thanks to the combined efforts of Douglas Bigelow and Charles Page and their men. The equipment purchased during the year has more than paid for itself in increased efficiency. A bulk tank and gas pump was installed to service both the Sheriff's Dept. and the farm vehicles. The County realized a great saving by buying gasoline through the State Agency. The farm houses were all painted by House of Correction inmates and a new sewage system had to be installed at the Duplex.

The Jail building was altered by our maintenance man to accommodate female prisoners sentenced here. He also brought in new wiring and outlets, as well as new hot water lines. A room was converted to a recreation room and the Episcopal Church of Lisbon donated a new television set. Visits by a social worker from White Mt. Community Services has proven to be a worthwhile endeavor. And, of course, the Jail's answering of the WATS line and the Haverhill Police and fire phones was a material savings for the citizens.

In the Main House, we finally had fluorescent lights installed in the rooms and corridors making a tremendous improvement for our residents. Again, with House of Correction inmate labor, twenty-one rooms were painted. This year saw three "firsts" of which we are very proud. The first booth at the North Haverhill Fair in August and the First Annual Christmas Bazaar. At both of these, our patients and residents displayed and sold articles they had made under the direction of our COTA, Mrs. Sally Apostalas. The Bazaar was sponsored by the Grafton County Home Association and raised over \$200.00 for future activities by our people. The third "first" was the first annual tea for the volunteers affiliated with R.S.V.P. and they, as well as all the volunteers and members of the Association are to be commended for their loyalty, and dedication . . . . we are all deeply indebted to them.

The Nursing Home Annex is full, with the usual waiting list. Dr. Cyrus Eastman, our Staff Doctor, and Mrs. Evelyn Bigelow, our Director of Nurses, and indeed all the employees, bring a sense of T. L. C. along with their enormous medical skill. Whenever possible, workshops, seminars, etc., are attended to maintain a fresh and current view of new techniques.

Our thanks go out to all who labor here, be they employees, volunteers, clergy, the interested public, and to the patients and residents from whom we can all learn a lot.

Our gratitude, too, to you Commissioners for listening to us and supporting us, and to your Staff at the Court House.

A final word of thanks and good wishes to Mrs. Rita Little who retired to sunny Florida the first of October.

# REPORT OF THE GRAFTON COUNTY ATTORNEY 1972

# .....

To Grafton County Commissioners Gentlemen:

This letter is being written in the form of an annual report for the calendar year 1972. It covers the activities of the Grafton County Attorney for the final year of his second term in office, and is to serve as the final report.

The office of County Attorney handled and disposed of 238 misdemeanors. 122 felonies. 2 juvenile matters, and 30 reciprocal support cases. This activity took your County Attorney into almost all of the District and Municipal Courts in the county, and all of the matters in the Superior Court. All pending criminal cases have been turned over to my successor in office, along with all pending civil cases. There are two cases pending against the Sheriff's department; one is a suit relative to an attachment, and the other is a petition for the removal of the Sheriff. There is also a case in the Federal Court pending against the Registrar of Deeds and also against the Sheriff, and this case is relative to the constitutionality of real estate attachments under New Hampshire law. This case in Federal Court is mainly to determine what functions the Registrar and Sheriff must carry on while the constitutionality of the issue must be determined.

In the final days of my term in office, I believe it is proper to again make recommendations to the Commissioners and the County Delegation as to requirements of the County Attorney's office. From the above indicated figures, you will notice considerable increase in activity, and it is recommended that the office of County Attorney be made full time with a salary commensurate with the time; and that this be made known to all prospective candidates long before the next election. I recommend the salary level at \$20,-000.00 per year plus added items to equip and run an office in the new Courthouse.

This office has received good cooperation from all

law enforcement agencies within the County. At the time of this writing of this report, the new program of three full time investigators in the Sheriff's department has been in effect for almost six months. This office has seen no results of any kind, or of any activity in the past six months, and as such, is unable to reach any conclusion as to the effect, if any, of the new program. It is recommended that the Commissioners and the County Delegation carefully examine this new program to determine what it has done and how it was done, if anything.

Lastly, I want to thank the County Commissioners for their cooperation during my years of service, and those members of the County Delegation who examined carefully the needs of the County Attorney's office. I strongly urge all of the members of the County Delegation to carefully examine the needs of the County Attorney's office and all other departments, and not to vote on issues based on personalities but on the needs and requirements as to what is best for the people of Grafton County.

### **GRAFTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT**

Honorable Chairman of the Grafton County Delegation, Delegation members, Grafton County Commissioners and Voters of Grafton County:

As Sheriff of Grafton County, I respectfully submit the following report of the activities of the Grafton County Sheriff's Department for the Year of 1972.

The Year of 1972 was an exceptionally busy year, from the outset of the year. We moved our entire office into our headquarters in the new County Court House in North Haverhill, New Hampshire. Upon doing so, we completely changed and dual-indexed our entire record system. The final phase of our communication system was completed, and handled 47,329 logged, radio transmissions for the year. The County initiated a Watts line telephone with 24 hour coverage, to be used throughout the County for any and all types of emergencies. Our case load for the entire year is 189 cases over those of 1971. (Criminal Case Load attached.)

This department hosted two summer cadets, provided to us by the Governor's Commission on Crime & Delinquency. We feel that this program was very useful and successful.

As of July 1, 1972 three deputies and one dispatcher were put on a full-time salary basis. In October three County cruisers were purchased, and a County owned gas tank and pump were installed.

This department carried on limited Drug Educational Programs throughout the entire County, the cut-back being due to lack of manpower and funds.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the law enforcement agencies throughout the County for their capable assistance rendered to this department. I wish to thank the Governor's Commission on Crime & Delinquency for funds for our various programs. I wish to thank the Grafton County Sheriff's Auxiliary for the thousands of man-hours of services rendered to the County. These services volunteered without any charge or expense to the taxpayer. In conclusion, I personally completed a two-week training course, sponsored by the United States Marshal's Training Academy in Washington, D. C., under the direction of the United States Department of Justice. This special training pertained, for the most part, to the security of the Courts, court personnel, jurors, witnesses, transportation of prisoners to and from the Courts, security of the prisoners in the Court, and security of the physical court facilities. This training program was made possible through a grant from the Governor's Commission on Crime & Delinquency.

## **GRAFTON COUNTY JUVENILE OFFICER**

The Grafton County Sheriff's Department wishes to offer the services of their new Juvenile Officer, Michael Guinan, to the various schools and police departments throughout the County.

Juvenile Officer Guinan holds a B. S. Degree in Business Administration with a concentration in Human Relations from Plymouth State College. He is also a graduate of the Delinquency Control Institute of the University of Southern California, where he has studied the latest techniques in handling juvenile delinquency.

The main underlying theme behind this juvenue program is to unite the efforts of the schools, the parents, the clergy, and the police into a common goal of curbing delinquency in the early stages of rehabilitation of the child in the more advanced stages.

In the school Juvenile Officer Guinan will function as an intermediary between the police and the school. Although it is virtually impossible for one man to handle all juvenile cases in the County, the seriousness of the offense is left up to the discretion of the school principal whether or not to call for outside help in the matter.

Some examples of the types of cases that would most likely, eventually lead to trouble with the police, would be repeated drinking in school after being punished for this offense, a child attacking another child with a knife, a child repeatedly playing with matches in school, or any combination of these acts, as well as similar acts that schools sometimes hesitate to bring to the attention of the police, because they feel the act may not be quite serious enough to warrant police attention. In the case of drugs the local police should be notified first, and if the police feel that Juvenile Officers Guinan's services could be of use, they would call him.

Juvenile Officer Guinan handles children up to the age of seventeen. In neglect cases seventeen year olds are considered juveniles. It should be noted that children under the age of seven are not capable of committing a crime by law. The dual-fold purpose of this program is to offer an alternative referral for the schools to turn to and most important, is to help the child before he gets involved with the police. However, may we again say that Juvenile Officer Guinan does handle all the schools in the County, and it is impossible for him to be in two places at the same time.

It is preferable to call Juvenile Officer Guinan in a reasonably short time after a child has gotten into some difficulty at school. Most of the time the more serious offender that needs help has been in repeated trouble at school, and each act becomes a little more serious. These are the children who need help the most.

Your cooperation is greatly needed to make this program successful, and we are looking forward to being of service to you.

On the Sundays in between the services have been handled. for the most part, by the pastors of the First Baptist Church of Groton and the Benton Bible Chapel. We appreciate their willingness to help out. In December residents were again transported to the United Methodist Church in North Haverhill to attend the annual Sunday School Christmas Program, From time to time I have also shown religious films to the residents and inmates of the Jail and House of Correction. Upon occasion we have, through my churches, made available Christian literature for the enjoyment and inspiration of the residents. I have also visited the patients in the hospital, the residents, and have been available for counseling with the inmates of the Jail and House of Correction.

I would like to express my deepest appreciation to our Superintendent and Matron, Mr. and Mrs. Siegmund, the correctional officers, and the staff for their friendly cooperation and for their friendly cooperation and for their help over the years since I began in the chaplaincy.

### JAIL AND HOUSE OF CORRECTION CHAPLAIN

A group of mostly young men, fluctuating in number, occasionally a woman joining us, sitting around a table with a loaf of homemade bread and a cup of wine on a Sunday evening, conversing informally, reading from Scripture, offering free prayers for those we love as well as those we don't — all of which becomes a kind of "sign" having to do with human liberation — this has been happening for over a year now, and it developed almost unsuspectingly: an inmate asked me to have Communion brought to him in jail. It became a regular event.

The event itself ranges on a continuum from something a little to the left of a "bull session," on the one hand, to some very serious end, at times, sophisticated Scripture study, on the other, with something approximating group therapy in the middle. In other words, practically anything can and does happen, depending on the starting point of each of the participants and the catalyzing effect we all have on each other. Sometimes we never see each other again, sometimes a formalized counseling relationship develops, sometimes friendships are kindled that last long after the inmates are no longer inmates. Whatever happens, happens.

I can't speak for the inmates themselves; for me personally this has been one of the most rewarding aspects of my ministry. These Sunday nights at the jail have given me a glimpse of what human community can become, when removed from some of the hypocritical structures of conventional religion.

#### To: Commissioners of Grafton County

#### Gentlemen:

This has been another extremely busy year, with 100% capacity at all times. In fact, the whole year, there was a waiting list.

There have been changes made: Mrs. Rita Little, Nursing Home Administrator, resigned and moved to Florida; Superintendent William Siegmund assumed the Hospital Administrator's duties, also. After a few hectic days, things have gotten back into a normal pattern again.

We have more and more patients receiving oxygen, which has created a bit of a problem, as we only have piped-in oxygen in four single rooms. Others receive oxygen from tanks by bedside.

A new intermittent positive pressure machine has been obtained and is in frequent use.

Our dental chair is installed and a dentist is seeing patients at frequent intervals.

We also, this year, have added an occupational therapy unit which is very busy with workers in all sections of the building. Physical therapy is also used daily.

Our dietary and kitchen service has cooperated well, and I feel our food is excellent in preparation as well as in service.
