TOWN MEETING MARCH 8, 1966

Called to order at 1:30 P.M. by Moderator Ralph Bemis.

Ballot Clerks: John F. Priest, Arthur Wikman, Jennie Main, Rita Rathburn, and Mary Gilman.

After a short recess to allow the reading of the School Warrant, the Polls were opened under Art. 1. to choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing by Australian Ballot.

Business meeting called to order at 6:30 P.M. with salute to the flag and prayer by the Rev. Mary B. Upton.

Continuing under Art. 1., Clarence H. Peterson was reelected Trustee of Trust Funds for 3 years.

Fire Wards: Alton Chamberlain, Justin Chamberlain, Ralph Clark, David Schmitt, William Bemis, and Gordon Getty, Sr.

Surveyors of Wood and Lumber: John F. Priest and William P. House.

Fence Viewers: John F. Priest and Ralph B. Bemis.

Library Trustees: Due to the resignation of Charles M. Bergeron and Corrine Trudelle, it became necessary to choose three this year.

Marjorie Colony for 1 year Elaine House for 2 years Edna M. Heald for 3 years

Harrisville Beach Committee: Mary Gilman, Warren Thayer, Lawrence W. Rathburn, and Gordon Getty, Sr.

Chesham Beach Committee: Robert Lake, William Sawyer and Roy Williams.

Article 2: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

A motion to accept the Budget as printed on pages 12 and 13 of the Town Report passed.

Article 3: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes.

A motion to accept as printed passed.

Article 4: To see if the Town will vote to accept Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) received from the Doris LaPoint Estate for care of cemetery lot.

A motion to accept as printed passed.

Article 5: To see if the Town will vote to accept One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) received from the Edward VanZile Estate for care of cemetery lot.

A motion to accept as printed passed.

Article 6: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$229.50 to the Monadnock Regional Association, an agency to advertise, promote and preserve the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperation with the other 37 towns of the Monadnock Region.

A motion to accept as printed passed.

Article 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$396.00 in support of the operating cost of the Elliott Community Hospital for the year 1966.

A motion to accept as printed passed.

Article 8: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to be placed in a Sinking Fund for the replacement of Highway Equipment under provisions of the Capital Reserve Act of 1943 as amended.

A motion to accept as printed passed.

Article 9: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) to be placed in a Sinking Fund for the replacements of Fire Trucks under provision of the Capital Reserve Act of 1943 as amended.

A motion to accept as printed passed.

Article 10: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$325.00 to hold an Old Home Day and to appoint committee for same.

A motion to accept as printed with a committee to be appointed by the Moderator passed.

Committee: Lawrence W. Rathburn, Mary Clark, Alma Allen, Gordon Getty and Frances Doore.

Article 11: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$875.00 to install a hot air heating system in the Library and Selectmen's Office.

A motion to accept as printed passed.

Article 12: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a new Hough Payloader complete with bucket at a price not to exceed Fourteen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$14,500.00) including the present Town owned Payloader. The amount to be raised as follows: Withdraw \$7,500.00 from Sinking Fund, Two Thousand raised by Taxes in 1966 or if appropriated under Article 8, withdraw from Capital Reserve. The

balance at the rate of Two Thousand Five Hundred per year by taxes in 1967 and 1968.

A motion to accept as printed passed.

Article 13: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a used Hough Payloader (1958 model) complete with Bucket and new plow at a price not to exceed Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500.00) including present Town owned Payloader. This machine to be guaranteed as completely reconditioned by the seller. The amount to be raised as follows: Withdraw \$7,500.00 from the Sinking Fund.

A motion to lay this article on the table passed.

Article 14: To determine and appoint the Salaries of Town Officers and fix the compensation of any other agent of the Town.

A motion to increase the Selectmen's salary by \$100.00 passed.

Article 15: To hear reports of agents, committees or officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

The Moderator called attention to the various reports of the agents, committees, and officers chosen as printed in the Town Report and a motion to accept them as printed passed.

Article 16: To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

A motion made and seconded to thank Mrs. House and Mrs. Colony for their work at the Library passed.

A motion made and seconded to thank Mr. Philip Trudelle for his good care of the Cemeteries for the past several years passed.

Mr. Trudelle retired because of ill health.

After some discussion, it was voted to have the Moderator appoint a Committee to start making plans for the Town's Centennial in 1970.

A motion made and seconded to elect the Road Agent for 3 years in the future, if legally possible passed.

Note 1. — The law says this is not legal.

A motion made and seconded to have the Selectmen and the Town's Representative contact the State Highway Commission in Concord about the condition of the road from Harrisville to Dublin and Harrisville to Chesham passed.

After considerable discussion about the odor at the lower end of Harrisville Village, a motion was made and seconded to add the names of Keith Messer, Gordon Getty, Sr., and Harley Davis to the existing Committee of William P. House, Charles M. Bergeron and John M. Clark passed.

A motion came at 8:00 P.M. to close the Polls and so voted.

The ballots were then counted with the following results:

Selectman for 3 years: Warren G. Thayer had 112 votes, declared elected. Lawrence W. Rathburn had 1 vote.

Town Clerk for 1 year: Edwin T. Heald had 105 votes, declared elected. Eleanor Smith had 5 votes, Jennie Main had 4 votes, Judith Davis had 1 vote.

Town Treasurer for 1 year: Dorothy E. Luoma had 110 votes, declared elected. Eleanor Smith had 2 votes, Jennie Main had 1 vote.

Road Agent for 1 year: Ralph Clark had 91 votes, declared elected. Wesley R. Tarr had 24 votes.

Cemetery Agent for 1 year: Gordon A. Getty, Sr. had 111 votes, declared elected.

Constable for 1 year: Leon P. Dion had 109 votes, declared elected. William St. Peter had 2 votes, Gordon Getty, Sr., had 1 vote, John Oja had 1 vote.

Fire Chief for 1 year: Alton A. Chamberlain had 90 votes, declared elected. Francis F. Parker had 22 votes, Roland Knight had 1 vote.

Question on Beano — Yes 68 — No 23.

A motion to adjourn came at 8:35 P.M. and passed.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Harrisville in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Wells Memorial School in said Harrisville on Tuesday, the Fourteenth day of March, next at six thirty of the clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money on the credit of the town in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to accept One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) received from the Alfred Watt Estate for care of cemetery lot.
- 5. To see of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$405.00 in support of the operating cost of the Elliot Community Hospital for the year 1967.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to install a street light in front of the residence of John Sutcliff on the Lake Skatutakee Road and to appropriate \$50.00 for same. (By request)
- 7. To see of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.41 if the state will contribute \$4,002.73 of T.R.A. Funds.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not exceeding \$13,800.00 for the purpose of rebuilding the Bonds Corner Road in East Harrisville under the T.R.A. Accelerated Program. Such sum to be raised through the issuance of notes under and in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 241 RSA, as amended, and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the date and place of payments of such notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other steps as may be necessary to negotiate such notes as shall be to the best interest of the Town of Harrisville.

- 9. To see what action the Town will take to accept as a gift the meeting house known as the Vestry from the Congregational Society subject to certain restrictions and contingencies in the proposed deed.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a new fire truck at a price not to exceed \$18,500.00. Said truck to be that unit which in the opinion of the Town Fire Wards is the best suited and in the best interest of the Town. The sum of \$18,500.00 to be raised as follows: To withdraw \$2,000.00 from the Capital Reserve Fund. To raise \$3,000.00 by taxes in 1967. The balance of \$13,500.00 to be raised by the issuance of five equal notes of \$2,700.00 each. The first note coming due in 1968 and one note coming due each year for a period of four years thereafter. To further authorize the Selectmen to determine the date and place of payments of such notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other steps as may be necessary to negotiate such notes as shall be to the best interest of the Town of Harrisville.
- 11. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to serve as matching funds to those donated as a gift from Wellington Wells, Jr. Such monies to be used for improvements to Willard Hill Cemetery.
- 12. To hear reports of agents, committees or officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: December 31, 1965-December 31, 1966: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1965 and December 31, 1966, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein the Surplus decreased by \$11,968.59 in 1966.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial conditions of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures — Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1966, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$2,581.30, less a revenue surplus of \$1,912.71, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$668.59.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1966, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1966, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit F)

A statement of the outstanding long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1966, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit F.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) decreased by \$6,968.59, from \$32,437.46 to \$25,468.87 in 1966, as shown herewith:

REPORT OF THE HARRISVILLE FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Fire Department answered 14 alarms for the year, three building fires, two chimney fires, one flooded oil burner, one car fire, four dump fires, one recusitator call and two mutual aid calls to Nelson. We received Mutual Aid assistance five times.

I would like to express my thanks to the people and the selectmen for the help given the fire department. Also thanks to the

fire wards for the extra effort put in this year.

FIRE RECORD

Fire records are made by people — those who cause fires and those who control them. Your forest fire warden, deputy wardens, fire chief and firemen have, in spite of a prolonged drought, made one of the best fire control records in recent years. Despite a very dry spring, we in New Hampshire working together, have substantially reduced our fire incidence (885 in 1965 to 595 in 1966.)

This enviable record is largely due to two factors:

1. A closely coordinated and integrated state-town organization jointly carrying out programs of forest fire prevention, training and suppression with dedicated personnel.

2. Your appreciation of our forest fire control program and

your individual effort in practicing fire prevention.

Statistics show, however, there is room for improvement. Major problems are still with us: (1) the careless disposal of cigarettes; (2) the householder's carelessness in burning rubbish; (3) the failure of woodlot owners and contractors to completely extinguish their brush burning fires; (4) failure to extinguish camp fires; (5) unsupervised children playing with matches.

New Hampshire has 4,339,000 acres of woodland to be protected. In 1966 we experienced 595 forest fires on this area and restricted acreage burned to 395 acres . . . a fine testimonial to the efficiency and dedication of the men who make up our forest

fire control organization.

I. If you must burn you will need a permit. Permits are not issued between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. except on rainy days. Permits are not needed when the ground is covered with snow. To minimize risk the best way to dispose of rubbish is at your authorized town or municipal dumping area.

2. Be sure all discarded smoking material is out.

3. Don't leave a live camp or cooking fire.

4. Most important — Instruct your children that matches are not play things.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE HARRISVILLE TOWN LIBRARY FOR 1966

If you haven't visited the Library recently, you are in for a pleasant surprise. A great many new books have been purchased and a large number of books are available on loan from the Bookmobile. There is a fresh coat of paint put on by Phillip Trudelle last winter and an automatic hot air furnace to replace the old wood burning stove. With the help of the State Library Consultants, a group of townswomen have almost completed the recataloguing of the books with a subject, title and author card typed for each book it is now possible to locate a needed reference in a few minutes. We urge you all to come and enjoy the new books

and catalogue.

In the spring of 1965 our library became affiliated with the Statewide Library Development program which while not interferring with local administration brings many benefits. It enables us to buy books at great savings through the Cooperative Book Purchasing Plan. As an affiliate we also receive grants of money from the state for the purchase of books as well as the free services of the State Library Consultant. The Librarians of all surrounding towns are brought together for work shops, book displays and other meetings which help them improve their services. The Bookmobile visits the Library about every 10 weeks. We are encouraged to borrow as many books as we like. Also available free are records, films and specific books needed from the State Library. Anything the State Library has in Concord our Librarian can get for you free, simply for asking.

In June, Mary Clark submitted her resignation as Librarian to take over the management of the general store. We were fortu-

nate to get Mrs. Louise B. Bergeron to take her place.

We are saddened by the death of our trustee and treasurer, Mrs. Edna M. Heald. The Selectmen have appointed Mrs. Sandra Harlow as trustee. Mrs. Harlow had previously demonstrated her interest in the Library by taking home and typing a good many hundreds of cards for the catalogue.

With the new Librarian we increased the Library hours from two to four hours per week. This is still well below the State recommendation of eight hours per week for Towns of 500 and under.

We hope to achieve this goal by 1972.

We wish to thank most heartily all those who have given donations of money, books, magazines and other gifts to the Library. We do not believe the donors realize how much these are appreciated by our Library patrons. We note with great satisfaction the increasing use of the Library.

This report covers the period from July 1, through December 31, 1966, the time when I acted as Librarian.

Library hours chosen by the Trustees and the Librarian, with the advice of the State Consultant, are at present:

Mondays—6:30-8:30 P.M. Wednesdays—2:30-4:30 P.M.

A number of interested townswomen had been working for some time on setting up the Dewey Decimal Cataloguing System, the system approved by the State Library Association and in use in most Libraries, and this work was well under way. We are happy

to report that it is nearing completion.

Due to the fact that we are now affiliated with the State Library Development Program, we received \$100 for reference books, which were purchased. With money on hand 94 Children's Fiction and Non-Fiction books, were purchased. Only three much requested Adult books were purchased, but we were fortunate to have 58 Fiction and eight Non-fiction books donated to the Library, by some Townspeople. Current magazines were also donated. The State Bookmobile supplied an additional 91 Adult and 178 Children's books, which circulated very well.

The School District meeting opened March 8, 1966 at 1:30 P.M. Mr. William House, moderator, read the warrant and declared the polls opened for voting.

Article 1. Voting for school District officers by Australian ballot.

Article 2. Motion was made and seconded that the salaries of school board members and truant officer, and the compensation of any other officer or agent of the district be considered and determined under Article 5.

Article 3. It was voted to accept reports as read.

Article 4. Motion was made and seconded to appoint Mrs. Mary Thayer as auditor.

Article 5. Motion was made and seconded that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$72,986.69 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the district. It was so voted.

Article 6. It was voted to authorize the school board to enter into tuition contract for the school year 1966-67 with the Union School District of Keene at the rate of six hundred five dollars (\$605.00) per pupil for high school instruction and five hundred nine dollars (\$509.00) per pupil for junior high school instruction, and with Marlborough School District at the rate of five hundred twenty-one dollars (\$521.00) per pupil for high school instruction and four hundred sixty-seven dollars (\$467.00) per pupil for junior high school instruction, and with other approved schools.

Article 7. It was moved that the district will authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district any or all grants or other funds for education purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the state of New Hampshire.

Article 8. It was voted to appropriate a sum not to exceed two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) toward the construction of a school entrance with a material of a lasting character.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Harrisville:

I hereby submit my fifth annual report.

STAFF CHANGES: For the second year in a row it became necessary to find replacements for two-thirds of our teaching staff. Mrs. Barbara Hewitt, a graduate of Keene State College and an experienced teacher, replaces Mrs. Harriet E. Marshburn as teacher in grades one and two.

Mrs. Harriette C. Wyman, who taught grades three and four, decided to retire from teaching. Mrs. Marjorie M. Capron was secured to fill this position. Mrs. Capron, also a Keene State College graduate, has had previous teaching experience in Massachusetts public schools.

Mrs. Helen E. Murray continues as principal in addition to teaching grades five and six.

The current enrollment reveals a total of 118 young people enrolled in grades one through twelve. This is a net decrease of four over a year ago.

The possible future first grade enrollments are figures derived from the school census accounting performed during the summer. They do not include any births or migration, in or out, which may have occurred since.

Possible future elementary enrollments are projections of census and current enrollment figures. They do not reveal any significant increase or decrease in future enrollments. However, because of the relatively small school population, one or two families moving in or out can affect the enrollment picture.

SCHOOL FACILITIES: In addition to the normal summer maintenance program, the facilities were enhanced, both from a practical and an aesthetic standpoint, by the construction of a new brick entryway. This project, which was approved by the voters at the last district meeting, was built by the Bergeron Construction Company of Keene.

Among current needs is consideration for the purchase of a new kitchen range. This is due to the termination of Public Service Company's policy of annually lending a range to the Wells Memorial School. Also, because of the condition of the oven in the range owned by the district, its usefulness is questionable.

The kitchen area needs painting and attention should be given in the future to repair and/or replacement of corridor ceiling tiles.

EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM: The AREA School Plan which was voted on by five area school districts, Harrisville, Chesterfield, Keene, Nelson and Westmoreland, is now a reality. This plan guarantees a common high school for the area communities under a long term tuition arrangement with Keene.

As this is being written, the State Board of Education has voted to further unite these communities as well as Marlborough under a common supervisory umbrella. This means that, although each district will govern its own schools with its own school board, they will share the services of a central supervisory union office, which will undoubtedly be located in Keene. The purpose of the reorganization is to provide expanded administrative services and better coordination in the total school program in an area which already has common economic, geographic, educational and social ties.

As a result of the supervisory union reorganization, this will be the final annual report for your superintendent of the last five years. I have enjoyed the good relationship with everyone in the community. It has been an experience which will be remembered with fondness in the years to come. I wish to express my sincere gratitude to the teachers, pupils and parents, the School Board, and all the patrons of our school for their understanding and cooperation during the time that I have been associated with the school system of Harrisville.

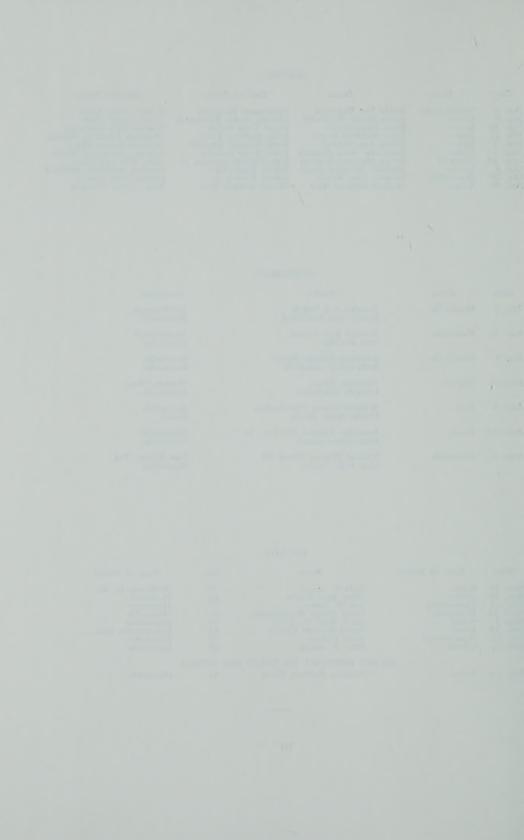
