TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lee, in the County of Strafford in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs: (L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Lee on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of highways.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for fire protection.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand eight hundred dollars (\$2800.00) for Old Age Assistance and Relief.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1000.00) to be set aside for the Lee Hook Road.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400.00) for the control of White Pine Blister Rust for the year 1951.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred forty-nine dollars and twelve cents (\$449.12) for the construction of Class V highways under the provisions of the T. R. A., so called. The State will contribute the sum of two thou-

sand nine hundred ninety-four dollars and twelve cents (\$2994.12).

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred fifty dollars (\$450.00) for the operation and maintenance of the Fire Department.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to complete the Fire House.
- 11. To raise and appropriate for economic advance of the town through publicity and promotional services of the Seacoast Regional Development Association, in cooperation with other regional communities, a sum not exceeding one one-hundredth of one per cent of assessed valuation, namely fifty-five dollars (\$55.00).
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

LEE VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT 1950 REPORT

During the year the department answered 13 calls. Three were chimney fires: Feb. 27 at LaRoche's; March 29 at D. Davis'; June 6 at the Central school. Two were building fires: April 22 at the Mone's where more than \$1,000 damage resulted from an attic fire; August 29 at W. Welch's where a lightning fire caused about \$50 damage in a shop. Help was given in extinguishing two brush fires in town. The tank truck stood by to keep three permitted fires in grass or rubbish under control. The department assisted in fighting one woods fire in Nottingham. Through the Interstate Emergency unit the department responded to calls to fight a woods re in Durham and a farm buildings fire in Epping. The Durham and Newmarket departments each came in to Lee for a chimney fire.

During the year equipment was improved by the installation of a more powerful pump on the tank truck and the purchase of an extension ladder, a roof ladder, a fog nozzle, a new booster hose, and a booster hose reel.

The most important development was the erection of the fire house. From the cutting and sawing of the

timber on the town wood lot to the erection of the building, this was done by volunteer labor. Although more than two dozen men contributed labor, special mention should be made of the time put in by Robert Keniston, chairman of the building committee, Willis Fernald, V. C. Morey, Charles Piper, Carl Sanders, Everett Sackett and Charles Brady. Shop classes from the University under Prof. Paul Gilman also assisted. The electrical work was done by Ralph Farmer. The timber was sawed by Oliver Kennard, and some of it was planed by Harry Munroe.

A siren is mounted on the roof. This can be operated either from inside the building or from a standard fire alarm box on the outside. It will be sounded for tests each Saturday noon.

The timber was cut in April. Although some finishing still remains, the building was put into use on December 20.

The lot on which the building stands was donated by the Lee Church. This land and the building itself belong to the town. Many cash contributions were received from individuals, ranging from \$2 to \$25.

Claims resulting from unauthorized sale of the pumper in June, 1949, finally were settled. About \$360 will be realized when collections are completed.

To call the Fire Department by telephone ask the operator of any of the exchanges serving the town for the Lee Fire Department. Be sure to give full information about the kind and location of the fire. Call an outside fire department only if the Lee department cannot be reached promptly. If outside help is needed, the Lee department will call adequate help promptly through the Interstate Emergency Unit.

Consolidation seems to be in abeyance. Madbury sends its pupils to Dover. Nottingham is taking steps toward a new school. As Lee does not seem to be ready to complete its new school. for which plans have been made, it might be possible to construct a single classroom with service units, leaving the rest unfinished, to be completed as opportunity affords.

On the day before school closed for the April vacation, the pupils of both schools, under the direction of Mrs. Holloway, presented a demonstration of their attainments in physical education at the Town Hall, before an interested group of parents and other vis-

itors. Practically all pupils participated in the folk games, stunts, and other features. The various stages of accomplishment shown were even more impressive than the finished performance of a few highly trained and selected individuals would have been. Following the program, a social time with refreshments completed the enjoyable occasion.

The School Nurse, Miss Myrtle Fletcher, examined 50 pupils, including the use of the modern eye and ear tests owned by the supervisory union. Nearly all defects found were corrected or improved, with the cooperation of parents and doctors. The school lunch has been continued, under the management of Mrs. Mary Elizabeth George. The program has received some equipment and quantities of foodstuff through government agencies; but judicious economy has to be exercised to furnish the complete and balanced meals at such a moderate price to the children.
