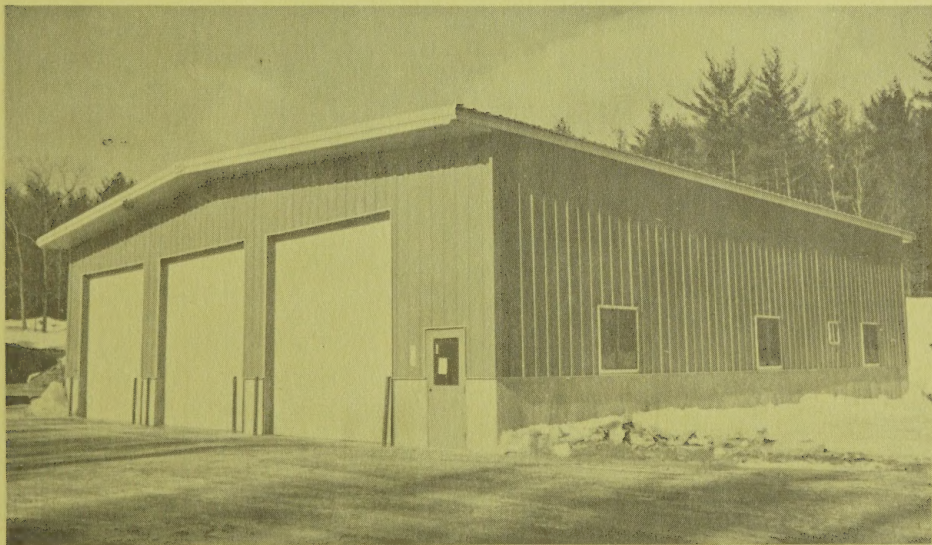

TOWN WARRANT The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New Hampton, New Hampshire in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the New Hampton Town House on Tuesday, the second day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to cast your ballots for Town Officers and for questions required by law to be on the ballots. Polls to close not earlier than 6:00 P.M.

The remainder of the warrant will be acted upon at the New Hampton Town House, Tuesday, March 9, 1976 at 7:00 P.M.

1. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
2. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance and repair of Highways and Bridges.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$26,013.89 for the principal and interest on the Road Grader Note; funds for principal provided by authorizing the withdrawal of \$25,000.00 from Capital Reserve Fund entitled Revenue Sharing Trust Fund.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$964.39 for Town Road Aid, the State to contribute the sum of \$6,429.28.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,202.78 for the principal and interest on Highway Building Note.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,350.00 for the purchase of two Highway Spreaders as defined in the lease with option agreement between New Hampton Road Agent and E. W. SLEEPER CO.
7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for a new Highway Truck.
8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize repair of Central Bridge, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,299.00 as its share of estimated cost of repair; the Town of Bristol to contribute the sum of \$42,701.00; the State of New Hampshire to contribute \$63,000.00.
9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a new Police Cruiser and to authorize the sale of the old police cruiser.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,866.37 for the principal and interest on the Fire Truck Note.
11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,500.00 to be put into the Capital Reserve Fund for a new Fire Truck.
12. To see if the Town will vote to petition the New Hampshire

Revenue Administration to reassess the Town for tax purposes, and to draw a tax map as required by R.S.A. 33:95A; and to appropriate the sum of \$10,625.00, or 50% of estimated cost.

13. To see if the Town will vote to establish a permanent Conservation Fund to which annual appropriations will be credited and allowed to accumulate from year to year. This fund to be established in accordance with the provisions of R.S.A. 36-A:5.

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept on behalf of the Town, any Federal or State funds which may be made available during 1976. Further, to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to make application for said funds and then expend the same for the purpose designated within applicable Federal or State regulation.

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to extend the Flood Disaster Note in the event any due Federal funds for same are not received in 1976.

16. To see if the Town will vote to pass the following resolution:

WHEREAS, certain areas of New Hampton are subject to periodic flooding from (Streams, Rivers, Lakes, Oceans, etc.), causing serious damage to properties within these areas; and

WHEREAS, relief is available in the form of Federally subsidized flood insurance as authorized by the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of this Town Meeting to require the recognition and evaluation of flood hazards in all official actions relating to land use in the floodplain areas having special flood hazards; and

WHEREAS, this body has the legal authority to adopt land use and control measures to reduce future flood losses pursuant to New Hampshire RSA Chapter 31, 36, 156 and 156A.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That this Town Meeting hereby:

1. Assures the Federal Insurance Administration that it intends to enact and maintain in force for those areas having defined flood hazards, adequate land use and control measures with effective enforcement provisions consistent with the Criteria set forth in Section 1910 of the National Flood Insurance Program Regulations; and

2. Vests (the Planning Board or Town Manager or other duly authorized Municipal Officer) with the responsibility, authority, and means to:

(a) Delineate or assist the Administrator, at his request, in delineating the limits of the areas having special flood hazards on available local maps of sufficient scale to identify the location of building sites.

(b) Provide such information as the Administrator may request

concerning present uses and occupancy of the floodplain.

(c) Cooperate with Federal, State, and local agencies and private firms which undertake to study, survey, map, and identify floodplain areas, and cooperate with neighboring communities with respect to management of adjoining floodplains in order to prevent aggravation of existing hazards.

(d) Submit on the anniversary date of the community's initial eligibility an annual report to the Administrator on the progress made during the past year within the community in the development and implementation of floodplain management measures.

3. Appoints the Building Permit Officer (Board of Selectmen or Building Inspector) to maintain for public inspection and to furnish upon request a record of elevations (in relation to mean sea level) of the lowest floor (including basement) of all new or substantially improved structures located in the special flood hazard areas. If the lowest floor is below grade on one or more sides, the elevation of the floor immediately above must also be recorded.

4. Intends to take such other official action within its powers as may be reasonably necessary to carry out the objectives of the program.

17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to act as the Inspector of Buildings or to appoint a Building Inspector, pursuant to N.H. RSA 156 1-5 and to establish the following Building Regulations for Flood Hazard Areas as follows:

SECTION I. It shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen or appointed official to administer the provisions of the Ordinance. The person appointed shall be known as the Building Inspector.

SECTION II. The Building Inspector, before issuing building permits must ensure that all building proposals comply with Town Ordinances and By-Laws, and if a subdivision of land is involved, the Planning Board must approve the developer's plan before the Inspector may issue a building permit.

SECTION III. No person, firm or corporation shall erect any new building or structure, or make substantial improvements to an existing building or structure, or cause the same to be done within the "special flood hazard area" of the Town of New Hampton without first obtaining a permit from the Building Inspector.

SECTION IV. The Building Inspector shall review all building permit applications for new construction or substantial improvements to determine whether proposed building sites will be reasonably safe from flooding. If a proposed building site is in a location that has a flood hazard, any proposed new construction or substantial improvement (including prefabricated and mobile homes) must:

1. be designed (or modified) and anchored to prevent floatation, collapse or lateral movement of the structure;
2. use construction materials and utility equipment that are

resistent to flood damage;

3. use construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage.

SECTION V. "Substantial improvement" means any repair, reconstruction, or improvement of a structure, the cost of which equals or exceeds 50 percent of the actual cash value of the structure, either (a) before the improvement is started, or (b) if the structure has been damaged and is being restored, before the damage occurred. Substantial improvement is started when the first alteration of any structural part of the building commences.

SECTION VI. Any person, firm or corporation violating the provisions of this Ordinance shall be subject to a fine not to exceed \$10.00 for each day of each violation, plus all legal costs in connection with settling the issue; all penalties due Treasurer, Town of New Hampton.

SECTION VII. Appeals shall be as provided in RSA 156:4—a, b, c.

18. To see if the Town will vote to pass the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the Town of New Hampton has adopted and is enforcing Building Regulations and Subdivision Regulations; and

WHEREAS, Section III of the Building Regulations prohibits any person, firm, or corporation from erecting, constructing, enlarging, altering, repairing, improving, moving or demolishing any building or structure without first obtaining a separate building permit for each building or structure from the Building Inspector; and

WHEREAS, the Building Inspector must examine all plans and specifications for the proposed construction when application is made to him for a building permit.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED by the Town Meeting of March 9, 1976 as follows:

1. That the Planning Board amend their Subdivision Regulations pertaining to the flood hazard area to assure that (1) all such proposals are consistent with the need to minimize flood damage; (2) All public utilities and facilities, such as sewer, gas, electrical, and water systems are located, elevated and constructed to minimize or eliminate flood damage, and (3) adequate drainage is provided so as to reduce exposure to flood hazards; and

2. Require that new or replacement water supply systems and/or sanitary sewage systems be designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood waters into the systems and discharges from the systems into flood waters, and require on-site waste disposal systems to be located so as to avoid impairment of them or contamination from them during flooding pursuant to N.H. RSA 36:21.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for patriotic purposes; \$200.00 - Old Home Day; \$100.00 - Memorial Day; and \$500.00 - Bicentennial celebration.

20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize:

(A) Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

(B) Selectmen to dispose of property acquired by Tax Collector's Deeds.

(C) Tax Collector to accept pre-payment of taxes.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,953.00 for Regional Associations: Lakes Region Planning Commission - \$753.00; N.A.N.A. - \$1,500.00; Bristol Community Center - \$600.00; N.H. Humane Society - \$100.00.

22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of hospitals.

23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of cemeteries.

24. (By Request) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be expended for the improvement of the so-called Winona West-side Road; \$500.00 of said appropriation to be provided by Winona Lake Improvement Association.

25. (By Request) "To see if the Town will vote an expression of its willingness at the biennial election to adopt both of the following questions:

(1) "Shall state stores be operated by permission of the State Liquor Commission in this city or town:

(2) "Shall malt beverages (beer) be sold by permission of the State Liquor Commission in this city or town.'

26. (By Petition) "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$447.45 for the continuation of services to low income residents of New Hampton through the Meredith Outreach office of The Community Action Program, Belknap-Merrimack Counties, Inc."

27. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

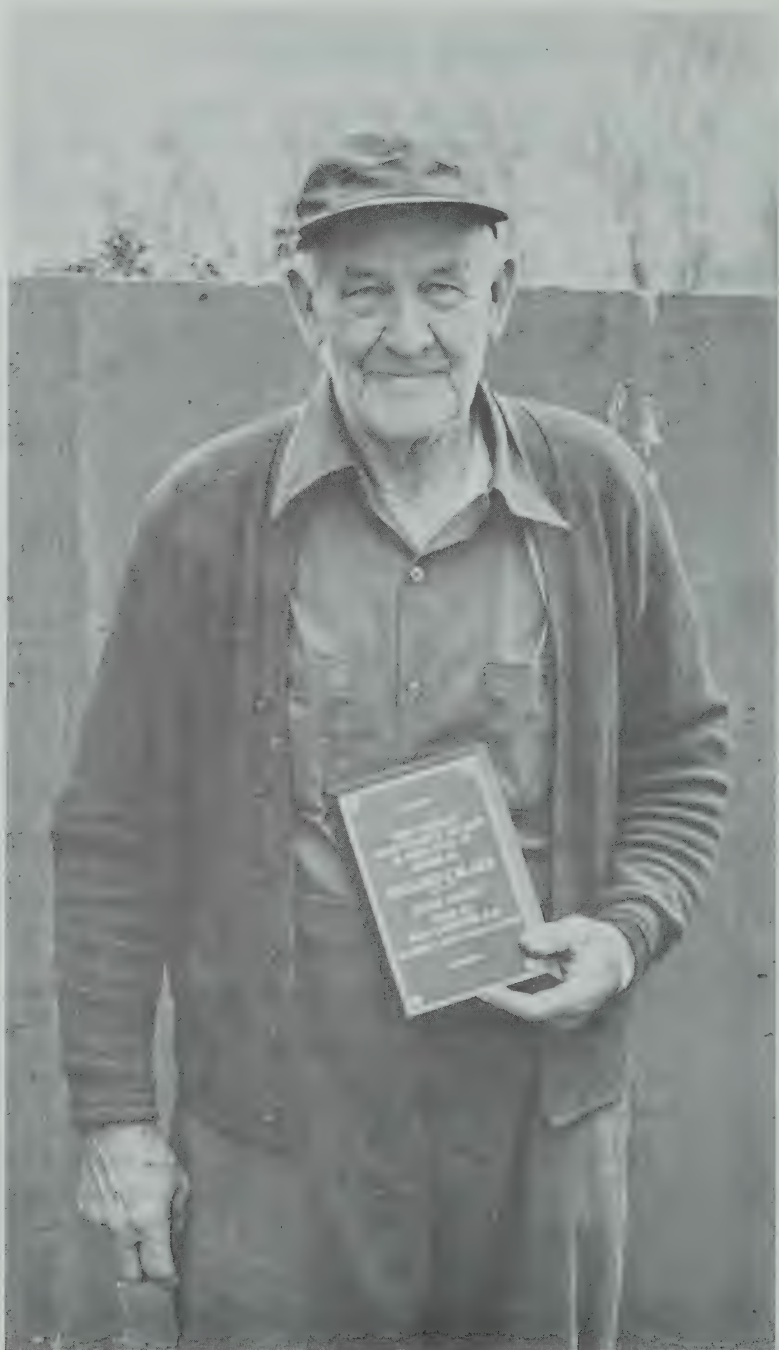

NEW HAMPSHIRE POLICE DEPARTMENT 1975 Annual Report

As we enter this our bicentennial year, we should unite our effort in reducing the tremendous increase in crime that we have experienced over the past decade. Some of the things we can do in the fight against crime is to urge our lawmakers to put teeth in the criminal laws, and speak out for judicial reform in the complete reorganization of our judicial system so that when a law breaker is apprehended he is not allowed to run the streets for months committing more crimes while awaiting trial. We've got to change our attitude from that of apathy to one of interest because crime is like a cancer and if we don't cut it out of our society it will consume all of us. Even we people who are fortunate enough to live in small communities such as New Hampton can do our part in preventing certain crimes by recording serial numbers of our personal property and marking our personal property with code markings that will identify it, installing burglar alarms if you are going to be away from extended periods of time, and taking the keys out of our vehicles when we shut off the engine.

Since the establishment of a full-time man for the Police Department in 1971, there has been a steady growth and demand for the services of the department. The department provides 24-hour telephone service and the dispatch center recorded 1505 calls in 1975, a 16½% increase over the past year. Because of the increase in the requests for services of the department, it has put a greater burden on the number of hours that I must work and be available for calls on a 24-hour a day basis and I find myself in a position where weeks go by without a day off. To continue to provide effective coverage the time is fast approaching when you must consider the addition of a second full time police officer to the department.

The department continued to vigorously enforce the motor vehicle laws especially in the areas of speed and driving while intoxicated which are two of the major causes of the senseless slaughter on our highways. We completed 1975 without a single fatality. There was a total of 215 arrests and summons, a 58% increase over last year and the Laconia District Court levied \$6,070.00 in fines from this case load. Once again, I thank you for your cooperation and support.

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FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

In 1975 we answered 48 alarms with three of these major structural fires requiring full Mutual Aid. We had

- 12 structural fire calls .
- 10 mutual aid to other towns
- 6 brush/grass fires
- 4 auto fires
- 5 chimney fires
- 2 dump fires
- 2 gas washdown
- 7 investigation calls

The fire incidence has increased slightly in the last year in New Hampton as it has in most areas. Some of the causes are the increased use of wood for heat, overloaded electrical circuits, and leaving a fire in a fireplace. These above causes can be eliminated by watchfulness on the part of the homeowner.

Our protective clothing has arrived and is of tremendous value when fighting fire in below zero weather. This year, I have allocated money for additional hose so that we may have extra hose on hand to allow used hose to dry and still have enough dry hose to put on the truck in case of another call. In the past we have been fortunate but how long can it last.

It is apparent that some homeowners do not know what number to call for a fire in New Hampton. It is 1-524-1545. This is the number of the Lakes Region Dispatch Center in Laconia of which the Town is a member. (This is not a toll call to the homeowner.) The dispatcher will take the call and send the nearest member of Mutual Aid, depending on your location in town. If a neighboring town fire truck arrives after you have reported a fire, it is usually because they can get to you quicker and your own equipment will be arriving soon if needed.

Remember, this is your equipment and your fire department. If you think you have a problem call the above number and someone will be there. We would rather arrive and find nothing than to arrive too late to be of any help.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The regular scheduled meeting of the New Hampton Planning Board is held on the third Monday of each month at the Gordon Nash Library. Additional meetings were held in order to expedite the development of Zoning Ordinances. Board members are John Conkling, Chairman; T. Holmes Moore, Robert Moulton, Dan Sharp, Raymond Germ, and Gordon Huckins who represents the Board of Selectmen. As of this writing, a vacancy exists and the Board would like to hear from anyone who might like to serve. Hopefully, enough volunteers will come forth that alternate members can be selected to serve when a regular is absent.

The board has been busy reviewing subdivisions and approving them when in conformance with existing regulations. A fee structure for this service has been established in order to cover the expenses involved in this operation.

The major portion of the Board's time has been spent in developing a set of zoning ordinances designed to protect the quality of life as it now exists in New Hampton but to allow for orderly growth. Assisting us in this endeavor is the Lakes Region Planning Commission which has been very helpful in furnishing maps and other material as well as consulting with our group. A preliminary public hearing on the first draft was held on December 15, 1975, at the New Hampton Elementary School with thirty-five residents in attendance.

NEW HAMPTON CONSERVATION COMMISSION

During the past year the commission has continued the tree replacement program on Main Street and to implement professional suggestions of some years ago. Five Crimson King maple trees (the deep red color remains throughout the season) were added in the village and euonymous bushes (the firebush) and flowering pink crabapples, at the Town House. Thanks to Hans Susskind, John Warthen, Daniel Seufert and Pete Schlesinger, transportation and labor costs were eliminated in this year's project.

The Norway Spruce in the Common was fed and appears to have regained vigor. The Common received top soil. This year we plan to work at entry points to the town in addition to more shade trees, including a memorial to Edwin Madan and a Bicentennial tree.

At least 80 per cent of the town's roads have been viewed for possible scenic road designation. Residents and landowners on a particular road will be invited to meet with the commission as we proceed; however, any such designation must be approved by a Town Meeting.

Members attended the annual meeting of the New Hampshire Association of Conservation Commissions, a joint meeting of the Planning Board with Lakes Region Planning Commission and viewed the proposed landfill site. Joseph Quinn, N.H. Department of Recreation and Economic Development; William Phinney, N.H. Fish and Game Conservation Officer, Frank Denormandie, Laconia City engineer, and Don Scott, Belknap County Forester, guests at meetings, further added to the education of the commission. The views of townspeople have been helpful and we thank those who have attended.

A good deal of thought and discussion still centers on the acquisition of land for conservation and recreation purposes. A town beach search continues and we would appreciate comments and suggestions.

A nice-to-have: approximately an acre of land suitable for a town nursery to raise ornamental evergreen and shade tree seedlings for transplanting as needed in the year's ahead.

During the summer, as our part of the Bicentennial celebration, the commission will announce a special heritage trail with home visits.

NEWFOUND AREA NURSING ASS'N REPORT

Since January of 1975, the Newfound Area Nursing Association has undergone many changes. Mrs. Kathleen Almeida was hired as back-up nurse and trained to take over full time when Mrs. Mary Lee Bourcier left due to pregnancy. Since April, Mrs. Almeida has been charge nurse and learning new aspects of home nursing all the time. The N.A.N.A. office was moved in December after the generous offer of Bristol Community Services was made to them. The office is now located in the lower level of the B.C.S. building. This space is rent free and was made so to this non-profit organization.

Two blood pressure clinics were held this year. One in May with approximately 70 people availing themselves and one in August with 75 people taking advantage of this free service. Both clinics were co-sponsored by N.A.N.A. and the local Ambulance Association. N.A.N.A. also participated in two blood mobiles sponsored by the American Red Cross. A flue shot clinic was also given, sponsored by the Bristol Woman's Club and N.A.N.A. This was open to the public at a cost of \$1.50 per shot. It was attended by 52 people. Dr. Walsh was on hand to administer the injections.

Due to financial burden of tightened Medicare reimbursements, the nurses have curtailed any meetings other than those required. But education is ongoing with a large quantity of printed material coming into the office.

Skilled nursing visits numbered 1325. These visits are made by a professional nurse to give a patient medical treatment. Medicare defines what type of procedures will be termed skilled.

46 physical therapy visits were made this year. These are done by a registered physical therapist. A second service is required by Medicare for all V.N.A.'s who are Medicare approved. Physical therapy was chosen because the demand seemed to be greater in this area for that type of service rather than for services such as Occupational Therapy or Home Health Aides.

During each year, all residents are entitled to one free home visit. These are termed health promotions. 268 of these were made this year. After the initial visit, all subsequent visits are made under the orders of a Dr. Our two local Doctors are most helpful. Throughout the year, we have had approximately 12 referrals from Dr. Bell and 15 from Dr. Walsh, with 24 referrals coming from other area doctors. These subsequent visits are charged to the patient. If there is no third party payment involved, we try to use a sliding scale where the charge is established by what the patient can afford. The difference between actual cost of a visit (\$14) and what is paid to the agency is termed free service. \$1,426.50 of this was given this year.
