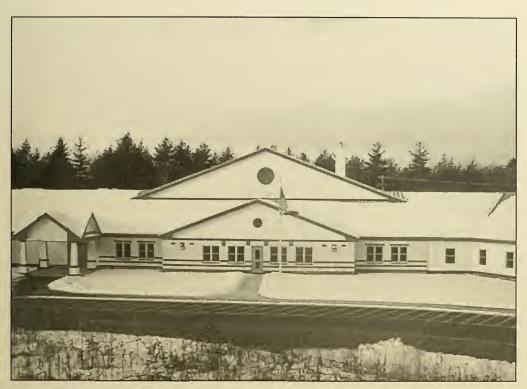

He took his duties as a resident very seriously and served his community and school system well over the past 18 years. In 1984, Lee was appointed to the Sandown Planning Board and, in 1985, he was elected as a regular member. SHALL THE TOWN VOTE TO DEPOSIT AN ADDITIONAL 25% OF THE REVENUES FROM LAND USE CHANGE TAX COLLECTED PURSUANT TO RSA 79-A FOR A TOTAL OF 50%, IN A CONSERVATION FUND FOR THE PURPOSE OF PURCHASING OPEN SPACE LAND FOR CONSERVATION USE IN ACCORDANCE WITH RSA 36-A:5 III AS AUTHORIZED BY RSA 79-A:25 II. RECOMMENDED BY THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN. RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE.
- 22. WARRANT ARTICLE. RECOMMENDED BY THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN.
- 24. WARRANT ARTICLE. TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO AUTHORIZE THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN TO CONVEY A CONSERVATION EASEMENT TO THE ROCKINGHAM COUNTY CONSERVATION DISTRICT OR OTHER APPROPRIATE CONSERVATION ORGANIZATION ON THE FOLLOWING PARCEL OF TOWN-OWNED LAND: TAX MAP 13 LOT 16; NEAR WELLS VILLAGE ROAD IN ORDER TO PERMANENTLY PROTECT SAID AREA FROM DEVELOPMENT AND RETAIN THEM FOR NATURE STUDY, PASSIVE RECREATION, MAINTAINING AND IMPROVING TOWN-OWNED FOREST LAND AND TO ENHANCE AND MAINTAIN SCENIC, WILDLIFE AND OPEN SPACE THAT ARE AN ESSENTIAL PART OF SANDOWN'S VALUABLE RURAL CHARACTER FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE TOWN OF SANDOWN AND ITS CITIZENS. RECOMMENDED BY THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN.
- 25. WARRANT ARTICLE: SHALL WE MODIFY THE ELDERLY EXEMPTIONS FROM PROPERTY TAX IN THE TOWN OF SANDOWN, BASED ON ASSESSED VALUE, FOR QUALIFIED TAXPAYERS TO BE AS FOLLOWS: FOR A PERSON 65 YEARS OF AGE UP TO 75 YEARS, \$50,000; FOR A PERSON 75 YEARS OF AGE UP TO 80 YEARS, \$60,000; FOR A PERSON 80 YEARS OF AGE AND OLDER, \$75,000. TO QUALIFY, THE PERSON MUST HAVE BEEN A NEW HAMPSHIRE RESIDENT FOR AT LEAST 5 YEARS, OWN THE REAL ESTATE INDIVIDUALLY OR JOINTLY OR, IF THE REAL ESTATE IS OWNED BY SUCH PERSON'S SPOUSE, THEY MUST HAVE BEEN MARRIED FOR AT LEAST 5 YEARS. IN ADDITION, THE TAXPAYER MUST HAVE A NET INCOME OF NOT MORE THAN \$22,500 OR, IF MARRIED A COMBINED NET INCOME OF LESS THAN \$32,400 AND OWN ASSETS NOT IN EXCESS OF \$50,000. RECOMMENDED BY THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN.
- 26. WARRANT ARTICLE. TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO ALLOW THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN TO ACCEPT THE GIFT OF PROPERTY AT TAX MAP 28, LOT 25. RECOMMENDED BY THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN.

- 27. WARRANT ARTICLE. TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO ALLOW THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN TO SELL THE PROPERTY KNOWN AS TAX MAP 28 LOT 25 BY PUBLIC AUCTION OR SEALED BIDS. RECOMMENDED BY THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN.
- 28. WARRANT ARTICLE. TO SEE IF THE TOWN AGREES TO PARTICIPATE IN THE NATIONAL FLOOD INSURANCE PROGRAM (NFIP) BY DIRECTING THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN TO COMPLETE THE ELIGIBILITY APPLICATION AND SUBMIT THE REQUIRED INFORMATION TO THE FEDERAL INSURANCE ADMINISTRATION. RECOMMENDED BY THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN.
- 29. WARRANT ARTICLE. WHEREAS, CERTAIN AREAS OF SANDOWN ARE SUBJECT TO PERIODIC FLOODING FROM STREAMS, RIVERS AND LAKES CAUSING SERIOUS DAMAGES TO PROPERTIES WITHIN THESE AREAS; AND WHEREAS, RELIEF IS AVAILABLE IN THE FORM OF FEDERALLY SUBSIDIZED FLOOD INSURANCE AS AUTHORIZED BY THE NATIONAL FLOOD INSURANCE ACT OF 1968; AND WHEREAS, IT IS THE INTENT OF THIS TOWN MEETING TO REQUIRE THE RECOGNITION AND EVALUATION OF FLOOD HAZARDS IN ALL OFFICIAL ACTIONS RELATING TO LAND USE IN THE FLOODPLAIN AREAS HAVING SPECIAL FLOOD HAZARDS; AND WHEREAS, THIS BODY HAS THE LEGAL AUTHORITY TO ADOPT LAND USE AND CONTROL MEASURES TO REDUCE FUTURE FLOOD LOSSES PURSUANT TO NEW HAMPSHIRE RSA 674:16, 674:36, 674:43.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, THAT THIS TOWN MEETING HEREBY:

- A. ASSURES THE NFIP THAT IT WILL ENACT AND MAINTAIN IN FORCE FOR THOSE AREAS HAVING FLOOD HAZARDS, AS DELINEATED BY THE FLOOD HAZARD BOUNDARY MAP ISSUED BY THE NFIP DATED AND ANY PUBLISHED REVISION TO THIS MAP, ADEQUATE LAND USE AND CONTROL MEASURES WITH EFFECTIVE ENFORCEMENT PROVISIONS CONSISTENT WITH THE CRITERIA SET FORTH IN SECTION 1910 OF THE NATIONAL FLOOD INSURANCE PROGRAM REGULATIONS; AND
- B. VESTS THE BUILDING INSPECTOR AS THE LOCAL COORDINATING OFFICER WITH THE RESPONSIBILITY, AUTHORITY AND MEANS TO:
- 1. ASSIST THE ADMINISTRATOR, UPON REQUEST, IN THE DELINEATION OF THE LIMITS OF THE AREA HAVING SPECIAL FLOOD HAZARD.

- 2. PROVIDE THE ADMINISTRATOR, UPON REQUEST, WITH INFORMATION CONCERNING PRESENT USES AND OCCUPANCY OF THE FLOODPLAIN AREAS.
- 3. COOPERATE WITH FEDERAL, STATE AND LOCAL AGENCIES AND PRIVATE FIRMS WHICH UNDERTAKE TO STUDY, SURVEY, MAP AND IDENTIFY FLOODPLAIN AREAS AND COOPERATE WITH NEIGHBORING MUNICIPALITIES WITH RESPECT TO MANAGEMENT OF ADJOINING FLOODPLAIN AREAS IN ORDER TO PREVENT AGGRAVATION OF EXISTING HAZARDS.
- 4. SUBMIT ON THE ANNIVERSARY DATE OF THE COMMUNITY'S INITIAL ELIGIBILITY AN ANNUAL REPORT TO THE ADMINISTRATOR ON THE PROGRESS MADE DURING THE PAST YEAR WITHIN THE TOWN IN THE DEVELOPMENT AND IMPLEMENTATION OF FLOODPLAIN MANAGEMENT MEASURES.
- C. APPOINTS THE BUILDING INSPECTOR TO MAINTAIN FOR PUBLIC INSPECTION AND TO FURNISH UPON REQUEST, FOR THE DETERMINATION OF APPLICABLE FLOOD INSURANCE RISK PREMIUM RATES WITHIN ALL AREAS HAVING SPECIAL FLOOD HAZARDS IDENTIFIED ON A FLOOD HAZARD BOUNDARY MAP OR FLOOD INSURANCE RATE MAP, ANY CERTIFICATION OF FLOOD-PROOFING AND INFORMATION ON THE ELEVATION (IN RELATION TO MEAN SEA LEVEL) OF THE LEVEL OF THE LOWEST HABITABLE FLOOR (INCLUDING BASEMENT IF HABITABLE) OF ALL NEW OR SUBSTANTIALLY IMPROVED STRUCTURES AND INCLUDE WHETHER OR NOT SUCH STRUCTURES CONTAIN A BASEMENT AND IF THE STRUCTURE HAS BEEN FLOODPROOFED THE ELEVATION (IN RELATION TO MEAN SEA LEVEL) TO WHICH THE STRUCTURE WAS FLOODPROOFED.
- D. AGREE TO TAKE OTHER OFFICIAL ACTION AS MAY BE REASONABLY NECESSARY TO CARRY OUT THE OBJECTIVES OF THIS PROGRAM. RECOMMENDED BY THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN.

Z-1. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment # Z-1 as proposed by the Planning Board of the Town Zoning Ordinance?

To adopt as Article I, Part C, Floodplain Development Ordinance, the wording listed below and to renumber existing Article I, Part C, Business District (Be) as Article I, Part D, business District (Be).

This ordinance, adopted pursuant to the authority of RSA 674:16, shall be known as the Town of Sandown Floodplain Development Ordinance. The regulations in this ordinance shall overlay and supplement the regulations in the Town of Sandown, NH Zoning Ordinance, and shall be considered part of the Zoning Ordinance for purposes of administration and appeals under state law. If any provisions of this ordinance differs or appears to conflict with any provision of the Zoning Ordinance or other ordinance or regulation, the provision imposing the greater restriction or more stringent standard shall be controlling.

The following regulations in this ordinance shall apply to all lands designated as special flood hazard areas by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) in its Flood Insurance Rate Maps dated January 3, 1975 which are declared to be a part of this ordinance and are hereby incorporated by reference.

- Section 1 Definition of Terms: The following definitions shall apply only to this Floodplain Development Ordinance, and shall not be affected by the provisions of any other ordinance of the Town of Sandown, NH.
- A. "Area of Special Flood Hazard" is the land in the floodplain within the Town of Sandown, NH subject to a one-percent or greater possibility of flooding in any given year. The area is designated as Zone A on the FHBM and is designated on the FIRM as Zone A.
- B. "Base Flood" means the flood having a one-percent possibility of being equaled or exceeded in any given year.
- C. "Basement" means any area of a building having its floor subgrade on all sides.
- D. "Building" -see "structure".
- E. "<u>Development</u>" means any man-made change to improved or unimproved real estate, including but not limited to buildings or other structures, mining, dredging, filling, grading, paving, excavating, or drilling operation.
- F. "FEMA" means the Federal Emergency Management Agency.
- G. "Flood" or "Flooding" means a general and temporary condition of partial or complete inundation of normally dry land areas from:
- a. The overflow of inland or tidal waters, or
- b. The unusual and rapid accumulation or runoff of surface waters from any source.

- H. "Flood Insurance Rate Map" (FIRM) means the official map incorporated with this ordinance, on which FEMA has delineated both the special flood hazard areas and the risk premium zones applicable to the Town of Sandown, NH.
- "Floodplain" or "Flood-prone area" means any land area susceptible to being inundated by water from any source (see definition of "Flooding").
- J. "Flood proofing" means any combination of structural and non-structural additions, changes, or adjustments to structures which reduce or eliminate flood damage to real estate or improved real property, water and sanitation facilities, structures and their contents.
- K. "Floodway"-see "Regulatory Floodway"
- L. "Functionally dependent use" means a use which cannot perform its intended purpose unless it is located or carried out in close proximity to water. The term includes only docking and port facilities that are necessary for the loading/unloading of cargo or passengers, and ship huilding/repair facilities but does not include long-term storage or related manufacturing facilities.
- M. "Highest adjacent grade" means the highest natural elevation of the ground surface prior to construction next tot he proposed walls of a structure.
- N. "Historic Structure" means any structure that is:
- a. Listed individually in the National Register of Historic Places (a listing maintained by the Department of Interior) or preliminarily determined by the Secretary of the Interior as meeting the requirements for individual listing on the National Register,
- b. Certified or preliminarily determined by the Secretary of the Interior as contributing to the historic significance of a registered historic district or a district preliminarily determined by the Secretary to qualify as a registered historic district;
- e. Individually listed on a state inventory of historic places in states with historic preservation programs which have been approved by the Secretary of the Interior, or
- d. Individually listed on a local inventory of historic places in communities with historic preservation programs that have been certified either:
  - (i) by an approved state program as determined by the Secretary of the Interior, or
  - (ii) directly by the Secretary of the Interior in states without approved programs.
- O. "Lowest Floor" means the lowest floor of the lowest enclosed area (including basement). An unfinished or flood resistant enclosure, usable solely for parking of vehicles, building access or storage in an area other than a basement area is not considered a building's lowest floor; provided, that such an enclosure is not built so as to render the structure in violation of the applicable non-elevation design requirements of this ordinance.
- P. "Manufactured Home" means a structure, transportable in one or more sections, which is built on a permanent chassis and is designed for use with or without a permanent foundation

- when connected to the required utilities. For floodplain management purposes the term "manufactured home" includes park trailers, travel trailers, and other similar vehicles placed on site for greater than 180 days.
- Q. "Mean sea level" means the National Geodetic Vertical Datum (NGVD) of 1929 or other datum, to which base flood elevations shown on a community's Flood Insurance Rate Map are referenced.
- R. "100-year flood"- see "base flood"
- S. "Recreational Vehicle" is defined as:
- a. built on a single chassis;
- b. 400 square feet or less when measured at the largest horizontal projection:
- c. designed to be self-propelled or permanently towable by a light duty truck; and
- designed primarily not for use as a permanent dwelling but as temporary living quarters for recreational, camping, travel or seasonal use.
- T. "Regulatory floodway" means the channel of a river or other watercourses and the adjacent land areas that must be reserved in order to discharge the base flood without increasing the water surface elevation.
- U. "Special flood hazard area" means an area having flood, mudslide, and/or flood-related erosion hazards, and shown on a FHBM or FIRM as zone A, AO, A1-30, AE, A99, AH, VO, v1-30, VE, V, M, or E. (See-"Area of Special Flood Hazard")
- V. "Structure" means for floodplain management purposes, a walled and roofed building, including a gas or liquid storage tank, that is principally above ground, as well as a manufactured home.
- W. "Start of Construction" includes substantial improvements, and means the date the building permit was issued, provided the actual start of construction, repair reconstruction, placement, or other improvement was within 180 days of the permit date. The actual start means either the first placement of permanent construction of a structure on site, such as the pouring of slab or footings, the installation of piles, the construction of columns, or any work beyond the stage of excavation; or the placement of manufactured home on a foundation. Permanent construction does not include land preparation, such as clearing, grading and filling; nor does it include the installation of streets and/or walkways; nor does it include excavation for a basement, footings, piers, or foundations or the erection of temporary forms; nor does it include the installation on the property of accessory buildings, such as garages or sheds not occupied as dwelling units or part of the main structure.
- X. "Substantial damage" means damage of any origin sustained by a structure whereby the cost of restoring the structure to its before damaged condition would equal or exceed 50 percent of the market value of the structure before the damage occurred.
- Y. "Substantial Improvement" means any combination of repairs, reconstruction, alteration, or

improvements to a structure in which the cumulative cost equals or exceeds fifty percent of the market value of the structure. The market value of the structure should equal:

- a. the appraised value prior to the start of the initial repair or improvement, or
- b. in the case of damage, the value of the structure prior to the damage occurring. For the purposes of this definition, "substantial improvement" is considered to occur when the first alteration of any wall, ceiling, floor, or other structural part of the building commences, whether or not that alteration affects the external dimensions of the structure. This term includes structures which have incurred substantial damage, regardless of actual repair work performed. The terms does not, however, include any project for improvements of a structure required to comply with existing health, sanitary, or safety code specifications which are solely necessary to assure safe living conditions or any alteration of a "historic structure", provided that the alteration will not preclude
- Z. "Water surface elevation" means the height, in relation to the National Geodetic Vertical Datum (NGVD) of 1929, (or other datum, where specified) of floods of various magnitudes and frequencies in the floodplains.

#### Section 2 Permits:

All proposed development in any special flood hazard areas shall require a permit.

#### Section 3 Construction Requirements:

The building inspector shall review all building permit applications for new construction or substantial improvements to determine whether proposed building sites will be reasonably safe from flooding. If a proposed building site is located in a special flood hazard area, all new construction or substantial improvements shall:

- a. be designed (or modified) and adequately anchored to prevent floatation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure resulting from hydrodynamic and hydrostatic loads, including the effects of buoyancy,
- b. be constructed with materials resistant to flood damage,

the structure's continued designation as a "historic structure".

- c. be constructed by methods and practices that minimize flood damages,
- d. be constructed with electrical, heating, ventilation, plumbing, and air conditioning equipment, and other service facilities that are designed and/or located so as to prevent water from entering or accumulating within the components during conditions of flooding.

#### Section 4 Water and Sewer Systems:

Where new or replacement water and sewer systems (including on-site systems) are proposed in a special flood hazard area the applicant shall provide the Building Inspector with assurance that these systems will be designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood waters into the systems and discharges from the systems into flood waters, and on-site waste disposal systems will be located

to avoid impairment tothem or contamination from them during periods of flooding.

#### Section 5 Certification:

For all new or substantially improved structures located in special flood hazard areas, the applicant shall furnish the following information to the building inspector:

- a, the as-built elevation (in relation to NGVD) of the lowest floor (including basement) and iclude whether or not such structures contain a basement.
- b. if the structure has been floodproofed, the as-built elevation (in relation to NGVD) to which the structure was floodproofed.
- c. any certification of floodproofing.

The Building Inspector shall maintain for public inspection, and shall furnish such information upon request.

#### Section 6 Other Permits:

The Building Inspector shall not a grant a building permit until the applicant certifies that all necessary permits have been received from those governmental agencies from which approval is required by federal or state law, including Section 404 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments of 1972, 33 U.S.C. 1334.

#### Section 7 Watercourses:

- In riverine situations, prior to the alteration or relocation of a watercourse the applicant for such authorization shall notify the Wetlands Bureau of the New Hampshire Environmental Services Department and submit copies of such notification to the Building Inspector, in addition to the copies required by the RSA 482-A:3. Further, the applicant shall be required to submit copies of said notifications to those adjacent communities as determined by the Building Inspector, including notice of all scheduled hearings before the Wetlands Bureau and Zoning Board of Adjustment.
- The applicant shall submit to the Building Inspector, certification provided by a registered
  professional engineer, assuring that the flood carrying capacity of an altered or relocated
  watercourse can and will be maintained.
- 3. The Building Inspector shall obtain, review, and reasonably utilize any floodway data available from Federal, State, or other sources as criteria for requiring that all development located inZone A meet the following floodway requirement:

"No encroachments, including fill, new construction, substantial improvements, and other development are allowed within the floodway that would result in any increase in flood levels within the community during the base flood discharge."

### Section 8 Special Flood Hazard Areas:

- In unnumbered A zones the Building Inspector shall obtain, review, and reasonably utilize
  any 100-year flood elevation data available from any federal, state or other source including
  data submitted for development proposals submitted to the community (i.e. subdivisions, site
  approvals).
- The Building Inspector's 100-year flood elevation determination will be used as criteria for requiring in Zone A that:
- a. All new construction or substantial improvement of residential structures have the lowest floor (including basement) elevated to or above the 100-year flood elevation.
- b. That all new construction or substantial improvements of non-residential structures have the lowest floor (including basement) elevated to or above the 100-year flood level; or together with attendant utility and sanitary facilities, shall:
  - (i) be floodproofed sot hat below the 100-year flood elevation that structure is watertight with walls substantially impermeable to the passage of water.
  - (ii) have structural components capable of resisting hydrostatic and hydrodynamic loads and the effects of buoyancy; and
  - (iii) be certified by a registered professional engineer or architect that the design and methods of construction are in accordance with accepted standards of practice for meeting the provisions of this section;
- c. All manufactured homes to be placed or substantially improved within special flood hazard areas shall be elevated on a permanent foundation such that the lowest floor
- Z-2. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment # Z-2 as proposed by the Planning Board of the Town Zoning Ordinance?

Adopt the following Floodplain Building Regulations as Article III, Part B of the Zouing Ordinance and renumber the existing Article III, Part B, Signs to Article III, Part C, Signs.

To see if the Town will vote to establish the following building regulations pursuant to RSA 156 as follows:

#### Section 1

The Building Inspector shall review all building permit applications for new construction or substantial improvements to determine whether proposed building sites will be reasonably safe from flooding. If a proposed building site is in a location that has a flood hazard, any proposed new construction or substantial improvement (50% or more of the market value of structure including prefabricated and mobile homes) must:

- A. be designed or modified and anchored to prevent floatation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure;
- B. use construction materials and utility equipment that are resistant to flood damage; and
- C. use construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage.

#### Section 2

The Building Inspector shall obtain, review and reasonably utilize any base flood elevation data available from a federal, state or other source, until such other data has been provided by the Administrator, as criteria for requiring that all new construction and substantial improvements of nonresidential structures have the lowest floor (including basement) elevated or floodproofed to or above the base flood level.

#### Section 3

The Building Inspector shall require that all manufactured housing to be placed within Zone A on the community's Flood Hazard Boundary Map or Flood Insurance Rate Map shall be anchored to resist floatation, collapse, or lateral movement by providing over-the-top and frame ties to ground anchors. Specific requirements shall be that:

- over-the-top ties be provided at each of the four comers of the mobile home, with two
  additional ties per side at intermediate locations and mobile homes less than 50 feet long
  requiring one additional tie per side;
- frame ties be provided at each corner of the home with five additional ties per side at intermediate points and mobile homes less than 50 feet long requiring four additional ties per side;
- 3. all components of the anchoring system be capable of carrying a force of 4.800 pounds; and
- 4. any additions to the mobile home be similarly anchored.

#### Section 4

Require permits for all proposed developments in any area of special flood hazard. The term "development" is defined to mean "any man-made change to improved or unimproved real estate, including but not limited to buildings or other structures, mining, dredging, filling, grading, paving, excavation or drilling operations."

#### Section 5

Review permits for proposed development to assure that all necessary permits have been received from those governmental agencies from which approval is required by Federal or State law.

7.-3. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment # 7.-3 as proposed by the Planning Board of the Town Zoning Ordinance?

#### Amend Article I, Part B, Section 3 to read as follows:

"Approval may be granted by the Planning Board for the following uses within the Wetlands Conservation District.

- A. Streets, roads and other access ways and utility right-of-way easements including power lines and pipelines if such location is essential to the productive use of land not so zoned and so constructed as to minimize any detrimental impact upon the Wetland Conservation District. Subject to criteria in Paragraph C.
- B. The construction of wharves, footbridges, catwalks, fences, water impoundments and beaches after review by the Planning Board for adherence to normal construction practices.

  Subject to criteria in Paragraph C.
- C. The following criteria must be met for approval:
- 1. Dredging, filling or crossing shall result in no net loss of wetlands.
- There is no other logical placement.
- 3. Application or approval from the State Wetlands Board.
- 4. Acceptable report from the Conservation Commission.
- 5. Demonstration that this proposal best utilizes the property.
- Complete set of engineered plans must be submitted along with drainage calculations and written impact statement.
- 7. Report from the Planning Board Engineer.
- 8. Report from Rockingham County Conservation District.
- 9. The proposed use would not diminish surrounding property values:
- 10. Approval would be in the public interest.
- 11. Approval would do substantial justice.
- 12. The proposed use is not contrary to the spirit of the ordinance.
  (Amended April 8, 1997)"
- Z-4. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment # Z-4 as proposed by the Planning Board of the Town Zoning Ordinance?

### Amend Article II, Part A, Section 7.E, F. and G. to read as follows:

E. An inspection of every sanitary disposal system which is installed, whether it be a new design or a repair/replacement, is required at the completion of each phase of construction of work and shall be in compliance with the Town of Sandown Zoning Ordinance and any state statutes. When said inspection is performed by a Town Official on behalf of the Town of Sandown or the State of New Hampshire, there shall be a fee of \$60 per system installation, to be borne by the applicant.

#### Phases of Construction are to be defined as follows:

- 1. Basal inspection: excavation before sand placement.
- 2. After sand placement.
- After hed construction and before backfilling. Local approval and state approval (where necessary) shall be obtained prior to backfilling.
- After backfilling.
- F. All test pits and percolation tests for a septic system design shall be inspected and logged by a Sandown Board of Health Official or its agent. The cost of said inspection shall be borne by the applicant and shall be \$30.
- G. All septic system plans submitted for review or re-review shall be subject to a \$20 per dwelling unit plan fee to be borne by the applicant.
- Z-5. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment # Z-5 as proposed by the Planning Board of the Town Zoning Ordinance?

#### Amend Article II, Part A, General Regulations-All Zones, Section 13.G to read as follows:

- "Addition to, or expansion of dwelling units and/or structures on lots not meeting 39,999 square feet is prohibited."
- Z-6. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment # Z-6 as proposed by the Planning Board of the Town Zoning Ordinance?

## Amend Article II, Part A, General Regulations-All Zones, Section 15 to include the following definition and re-number existing definitions:

"Shed' shall mean a small storage building less than 200 square feet in size."

Z-7. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment # Z-7 as proposed by the Planning Board of the Town Zoning Ordinance?

#### Add a new Article II, Part A. Section 18 to read as follows:

- "There shall be no outside storage of more than two (2) unregistered and uninspected motor vehicles allowed in any zone. (This does not prohibit garaged vehicles).

7.13. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment # Z-13 as proposed by the Planning Board of the Town Zoning Ordinance?

#### Amend Article III, Part A, Section 1.D to read as follows:

"No structure shall be constructed to within fifty (50) feet from the high water mark of any lake, stream or surface water system including wetlands. No high water mark shall be moved or disturbed without Planning Board approval. (Amended 4/8/97)"

The town celebrated 100 years of Old Home Days celebrations in 2001 and Bill Stewart was chosen as Sandown's Citizen of the Year for his continuing dedication to the youth of the community.

The firm of Plodzik and Sanderson, CPAs was chosen to audit the town's books. Some changes were recommended by the auditing company, however, on the whole, the records received a passing grade.

As we moved into the fall of 2001, the new Sandown North School was opened to Sandown children (grades 1 through 3).

On September 11, 2001, the country was thrust into a war against terrorism which will long be remembered by American citizens. Sandown Police Officer John Sable was called to service and, at this time, is stationed with the Air Force Police outside of Washington, DC. Also, in November of last year, Mike Devine and 17 other New Hampshire firefighters were selected to fight fires in West Virginia.

Those that manage the town's day-to-day affairs did an outstanding job in spite of all that was going on around them.

Sandown is, indeed, a special place to live and the Selectmen are grateful to all of the citizens who helped in making 2001 a successful year. As we look to the future, we hope that we will continue to serve one another to make Sandown a better place to grow and live free.

#### 2001 Planning Board Report

The Planning Board met 19 times during 2001, which includes regular meetings, special meetings and workshops. 18 land subdivision plans that proposed 208 additional new building lots (7 commercial) were reviewed. One plan was denied; one withdrawn, one revoked, 14 plans approved, and one 86 lot plan continued in review into 2002. The 14 plans approved create 81 new residential building lots. In addition to subdivision plans, two lot line adjustments, one commercial site plan and one excavation plan were reviewed and approved.

Your approval of three proposed zoning ordinance amendments in 2001 (commercial subdivision ordinance, expansion of the "Hampstead" business zone and the elderly housing ordinance) have established a basis for increasing Sandown's tax base without adding the high cost of public education to the Town. During 2001 we reviewed one commercial subdivision under the new ordinance and development of these commercial lots should commence in 2002. In addition, a site plan for a cell tower was approved. This plan will add approximately \$0.5M to our tax base.

In April, the Town was served with a lawsuit challenging Sandown's Growth Management Ordinance (GMO) and Impact Fee Ordinance. An Answer to the suit's pleadings was submitted in late June, and hearing of this suit is now scheduled for April, 2002 in Rockingham Superior Court. In July, the Board approved continuing the restriction on building permits through July, 2002, but nearly doubled the number of permits allowed to 45, as several indicators of excessive growth were evident in June. In late October, the Board received updated school enrollment numbers from the Superintendent of Schools, and scheduled a second public hearing for the Notice of Growth Impact. After a December public hearing, the Board voted to remove building permit restrictions as the main indicators of growth were Sandown's equalized tax rate is higher than the abutting town average, and the number of approved lots above could result in dwelling unit and population growth at rates above the average of the five towns surrounding Sandown. The existing GMO will sunset in March, 2002 and your Planning Board is not recommending that it be renewed, under advice from legal counsel. Sandown has had some form of growth management since 1995.

The Planning Board is proposing 17 amendments to the Zoning Ordinance for your approval. Most of these are clarification of existing language, although the first two will establish a floodplain development ordinance and building regulations so that property owners in these areas may apply for federally subsidized flood insurance. Your support of all proposed Zoning Ordinance amendments is sought.

Your Planning Board acts to reflect the needs and vision of Sandown. We rely heavily on our members' volunteer time and input, but also your input at public meetings throughout the year. At year's end, Lee Wilmot is ending 17 years of service; Vicki Wilson eight years and Donna Fugere six years. The contributions of these members will be missed. Other residents interested in this important town function need to step forward to work with those who remain.

#### ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT ANNUAL REPORT

#### Background:

The Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) is a volunteer committee appointed by the Selectmen, consisting of 5 voting members and 3 alternates. Typically meeting on a monthly basis, the ZBA is responsible for making determinations on appeals by property owners for variances, special exceptions, appeals of administrative decisions, or equitable waivers of dimension.

Variances are requests for waivers from the exact terms of the town's land use ordinances. An example of a variance request is seeking permission to construct a home on property that does not meet the current lot size requirements.

Special exceptions are requested when a property owner determines that intended use of the property is restricted. Explicit criteria set forth in the town ordinances must be met in order for the special exception to be granted. An example of a special exception request is seeking permission for a commercial use of your property (e.g., a home business).

Appeals of administrative decisions are made when a property owner believes that a decision made by a Town official or board unjustly affects the landowner's property rights.

Equitable waivers of dimension are considered when, through an honest mistake, a structure is improperly sited. The cost of correcting the error must outweigh the public benefit of enforcing the ordinance, and the waiver must not diminish surrounding property values.

#### Financial:

The ZBA is run as a 'zero-sum' operation – the money collected in user fees is intended to offset actual costs. Given a shortfall in 2000, the base application fee was increased from \$60 to \$80 to cover estimated operating costs. In 2001, income was \$2162 against a projected \$2670, and expenses were \$3377. The difference of \$1215 is due to several factors:

- Less revenue from new applicants than estimated.
- Case continuations and several rehearings, which generated no revenue but incurred advertising and administrative costs.
- An additional meeting in October, necessitating additional advertising and administrative costs.

#### Overview of Cases:

Variances were considered for issues of filling wetlands for driveway crossings, insufficient frontage and setbacks, and expansion of structures on undersized lots. Applications for special exceptions included conversions from seasonal to year-round dwellings, home business establishments, and accessory apartments.

#### **Building Inspector/Code Enforcement**

#### 2001

2001 has seen approximately a 25% increase in the total number of building permits. As a result of a court case two dozen permits were issued last calendar year, which were not included under our Growth Control Ordinance. This resulted in a total of 61 permits issued for new homes but only 23 new homes were occupied last year.

Historically the size and selling price of a Sandown home was drastically less than that of a similar home in other area Towns. Recently the average price and size of new homes in Sandown has been increasing. These more expensive new units appear to have fewer children than would be expected and therefore are a more positive impact on the tax base.

We finally have our new elementary school in North Sandown. The new physical plant has been well received, but the lack of sufficient playground space is a concern.

Most area contractors and sub-contractors and are still very busy and sometimes it can be difficult to get jobs scheduled as quickly as desired.

Sandown is still awaiting its first "cell tower", which received Planing Board approval last year. When this is operational it should fill in the many "dead zones" that a lot of us experience.

#### SANDOWN CABLE TELEVISION ADVISORY BOARD 2001 ANNUAL REPORT

2001 was a very important year for the Sandown Cable Television Advisory Board. Most of our efforts went into contract re-negotiations, a long and complex process in which a municipality's options are limited by Federal and State laws. We are pleased to report that after three years of negotiations, Sandown signed a new cable contract with AT&T Broadband.

This milestone agreement will provide more service to Sandown than we received under our original contract. As one benefit, AT&T Broadband provided a cable connection to the new Sandown North School at no cost to the taxpayers. More importantly, this contract paves the way for a new local access television channel serving Sandown.

Right now, our Board is working with AT&T Broadband to plan and implement the new public access channel. By mid-2002, Sandown viewers should be able to watch Selectmen's meetings, Town Meeting, and other public hearings live. And most importantly, all Sandown residents will have the opportunity to produce their own television shows.

At one time, Sandown had opportunity to broadcast occasionally on a Continental Cablevision station, and a few individuals produced "Sandown Today." Unfortunately, this channel was taken away several years ago. With the new dedicated channel, local producers will be able to create and broadcast shows on nearly any topic Local access programs throughout the country cover such diverse areas as youth sports, local history, antique cars, social and civic events, local personalities, recreation, and even religion. Future programs are limited only by your imagination.

Community involvement is essential. We will continue to need your help. When the new channel is ready to broadcast, we will present a seminar on TV production.

Several openings exist on the Cable TV Advisory Board, and we invite residents to apply. The Board serves as liaison between Sandown subscribers and AT&T Broadband, and we handle other customer issues. If you have a problem with cable service, which is not resolved by AT&T Broadband, or if you are interested in getting involved with cable TV, please call Tom Gainan at 887-2897.

# Report of the Sandown Sanitation Department Transfer Station.

The year 2001 was a year of some changes at the transfer station. We have worked hard in cleaning up the area. We have removed some of the sheds, and disposed of the old recycling walkway that was falling down. We have also worked hard at keeping the flow of traffic moving, but this can be difficult during the busy times. On Saturdays and Sundays, we fill both compactors completely each day. Sometimes when we are extra busy, we fill one or both of these containers early. This forces us to use the open-top containers. On Wednesdays, we use only two lanes, because we generally only receive enough trash to fill one container. This does, at times, cause a line to form. Since it costs the town \$185.00 each time a container is hauled to the landfill, it makes sense to only use one container on Wednesdays instead of using two containers at half a load each. This saves the taxpayers over \$9000.00 a year. We have also made a change regarding wood and building materials. For years, we burned all wood. Now we can only burn untreated, unpainted, raw wood. For the past few years we separated these painted and treated woods from the burn pile and this wood was hauled to the landfill at a cost of \$54.00 a ton disposal fee with a \$185.00 haul charge. We were also disposing of other building materials into our regular waste stream and this too was going to the landfill at these high disposal costs. We now have joined The Northeast Resource Recovery Association. As members, we now are in a program where we can dispose of all building materials: treated and painted woods, sheetrock, shingles, etc. into the same container. These containers are hauled to a recycling facility in Epping. Not only are we saving a disposal cost of \$7 a ton and \$55 less in each haul (approximately \$10,000/yr savings) but we are recycling this material, it is not entering a landfill. Our Budget has reflected this change, the hauling and disposal in 4324.0 has reduced and the hauling and disposal in 4326.0 (recycling) has increased because this material is now recycled.

This year we hope to improve our recycling area. The plan involves some site work at the top of the entrance road. As you enter the facility, you will go to recycling first, then proceed to the compactors and the bulky items area. The new recycling area will contain two co-mingle containers for bottles, cans, and plastic. The newspaper container as well as a container for cardboard, paperboard, and mixed office paper will all be in this new recycling area. We hope this new area will improve the traffic flow.

State regulations are very strict in regards to disposal of trash. The "old days" of the dump are long gone. It is imperative that you follow the instructions of the custodians at the transfer station so that this facility is running properly. The State constantly inspects our facility to insure we are complying. Please be patient and cooperative. If you are not sure how to dispose of something, please ask any of the custodians. If we witness something that is being disposed of incorrectly, the custodians are obligated to correct the situation. The town can get in serious trouble if something is disposed of incorrectly, so your cooperation is greatly appreciated.

The Sandown Conservation Commission was assigned a new liaison in March. Angela Sherwood was our new liaison for this year.

The SCC held their fifth annual fishing derby, May 5th 2001. This year's derby was once again held on Sal & Sheila Genualdo's property at 45 Main St Sandown. We were able to get trout stocked again. We had over 75 children participate.

Sandown Girl Scout Junior Troop 299 did their yearly cleaning of the Exeter River. Again this year the Sandown Conservation Commission ordered pizzas for the girls, to thank them for all their efforts.

This year the Conservation Commission is looking to see if the town will vote to deposit an additional 25% of the revenues from Land Use Change Tax collected pursuant to RSA 79-A for a total of 50%, in a Conservation Fund for the purpose of purchasing open space land for conservation use in accordance with RSA 36-A:5 III as authorized by RSA 79-A:25 II.

We also want to see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to convey a conservation easement to the Rockingham County Conservation District or other appropriate conservation organization on the following parcels of town-owned land: tax map 7 lots 17 and 18; Near Snow Lane, tax map 15 lot 9; Fremont Road Town Forest, tax map 13 lot 16; Near Wells Village Road, in order to permanently protect said area from development, and retain them for nature study, passive recreation, maintaining and improving town-owned forest land, and to enhance and maintain scenic, wildlife, and open space that are an essential part of Sandown's valuable rural character for the benefit of the town of Sandown and its citizens.

The Sandown Conservation Commission was able to hire an Environmental Consultant last year. Jeffrey C. Orchard was able to help with issues we would not be able to do on our own. Included is Jeff's yearly report for the services he was able to support the commission and town with.

Dear Ms. Chaput,

2001 was an active year for the Sandown Conservation Commission. My work during the year on behalf of the Commission was primarily review of wetland dredge and fill applications for large developments. Sandown is in a part of New Hampshire that is subject to intense development pressure, due to its desirable location, its small town character and the proximity to Massachusetts which provides a source of employment for residents. The work of the Conservation Commission has been to look closely at these development proposals and provide assistance and insight to the Planning Board in order to protect the rural character of the town and, perhaps even more importantly, to protect groundwater supplies and the wetlands which are sources of recharge for the water supply.

In spite of the trend to build medium to large scale residential subdivisions, there are still large tracts of undeveloped land within the town. The Commission has, over the years, expressed interest in protecting some of those parcels from development by implementing bylaws and warrant articles to encourage land to be set aside for conservation purposes. This year, the commission has placed articles in the Town Warrant which will provide a basis for working with developers to protect unique and important natural areas, and also provide funding sources to acquire the rights to some of those areas. I was able to provide some technical assistance to the Commission in these matters.

Also, during the year, there were several complaints which I investigated, most of which were of a minor nature and in most cases I was able to work with landowners and officials to minimize or eliminate the impacts to the environment. Only one complaint was officially sent to the Department of Environmental Services, Wetlands Bureau in Concord for action. That is ongoing, and under investigation at this time. Additionally, I assisted the Recreation Commission in obtaining a State Wetlands Permit to replenish beach sand at the Town Beach, and other Commission members helped with the work, early enough in the season so that the beach was able to open with a new layer of clean sand for the enjoyment of residents.

Once again, it has been a pleasure for me to serve the Town in my capacity as environmental consultant, and I look ahead to working closely with the dedicated members of the Conservation Commission in the coming year.

#### 2001 Annual Report Exeter River Local Advisory Committee

The Exeter River Local Advisory Committee (ERLAC) had another busy and productive year. Education and public outreach were top priorities, with the 1<sup>st</sup> Annual Exeter River Alewife Festival headlining events in 2001. Held on May 19<sup>th</sup> in Founder's Park in downtown Exeter, the Festival attracted hundreds of people interested in the river's history, watershed wildlife, and natural resource protection. A tour by Cherie Patterson of NH Fish and Game of the recently refurbished fish ladder provided an opportunity to watch the annual migration of alewives and other fish. Music by Doug Clegg, a presentation by noted author and naturalist David Carroll, and a discussion on the role the river played in growth and development of the region by Matthew Thomas combined to make the event a true success. Mark your calendar for May 18, 2001 for the 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Exeter River Alewife Festival! Better yet, join ERLAC and help us create an even bigger and better celebration!

For a second year, ERLAC representative Patrick Seekamp of Brentwood and his brother Michael led another wonderful workshop on vernal pools in April. Children and adults spent hours in the Chester town forest identifying salamanders, turtles and other creatures.

A workshop on Land Protection and Estate Planning was held in East Kingston in October. Sponsored by ERLAC, the Rockingham Land Trust, The Nature Conservancy and the East Kingston Conservation Commission, landowners from across the watershed learned more about conservation easements and other mechanisms for protecting land from development.

Wildlife habitat protection was the focus of the last workshop of the year in Sandown in November. John Kanter of NH Fish and Game and Amanda Stone of the UNH Cooperative Extension Service detailed ways in which local land use regulations can be designed to protect and create wildlife habitat.

For 2002, ERLAC will be hard at work on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Exeter River Alewife Festival, held along the river on May 18<sup>th</sup> in Founder's Park in Exeter. Other workshops are planned for the year as well; Danville will host the vernal pool workshop in late April, and river history and wildlife habitat will be the topics for additional events.

ERLAC enters is sixth year and continues to meet the fourth Tuesday of each month at 7:00 p.m. in the conference room at the Rockingham County Nursing Home in Brentwood. Please call the Rockingham Planning Commission at 778-0885 for more information.

#### SANDOWN RECREATION COMMISSION

The Recreation Commission has recently completed an exciting and busy year that saw some much needed improvements to town recreational facilities. In addition to providing recreational activities for residents of all ages, the Commission also serves as the overseer for the maintenance and scheduling of the Roy L. Miller Recreation Area, Seeley Beach and the scheduling of Town Hall. Through private donations totaling some \$10,000, the Commission was able to purchase and install an irrigation system for two playing fields at the Roy L. Miller Recreation Area. This much needed improvement will insure that prior investments would be protected.

The new concession stand was completed and electricity was added last summer. The old concession trailer was removed and we thank the generous donor who removed it free of charge as we had received two bids of \$1,000 each for it's removal.

The Commission was finally able to work through the mountains of red tape necessary to make what we considered to be minor improvements at Seeley Beach. Following long delays by the State in approving a 'dredge and fill' permit application we were finally able to move forward to add some much needed sand to the waterfront. We would like to thank the Conservation Commission for it's help in lending us their environmental consult, Jeff Orchard, and special thanks to Senator Jack Barnes who acted as our liaison with state officials. We would also like to thank Sal Genualdo who volunteered his machinery and labor to spread the many tons of new sand. We would like to make improvements to the stairs at the beach this coming year and again hope to work with a Boy Scout interested in taking this on as an Eagle Scout project.

The town is fortunate to have a dedicated staff of certified lifeguards and water safety instructors available to provide a safe beach area for town residents. Please note the posted rules of the beach before you use it. Lifeguards are authorized to enforce the rules and those not following them will be asked to leave the beach. The police will be notified if beach patrons do not adhere to these rules. Any complaints about the beach should be directed to the Recreation Director.

Please note that the lifeguards are not hired as babysitters. An adult must accompany children under the age of 12 or they will be asked to leave the beach. No alcohol, glass or animals are allowed on the beach. Please do not feed any waterfowl as it attracts them to the beach, which may raise the bacteria level at the beach. When the bacteria level is too high, the beach is closed to all residents. If your child is not toilet-trained, please keep them in diapers while in the water.

The Recreation Director organizes scheduling of our recreational fields. Our fields are utilized by a wide variety of organizations and individuals. If you reserve a field and then have to cancel your activity, please notify the Recreation Director as soon as possible. Please be observant of the leash law in out town. Pets are not allowed to roam free on our fields. These fields are in constant use and children and dog waste are not a healthy mix. Golfers are asked to refrain from practicing their golf swing on our beautiful fields. Vehicles of any type are not allowed on the fields.

Many of the accomplishments of the Commission would not take place without the large core of volunteers that step forward to help. Local teens donated close to 500 hours this past summer to serve as counselors-in-training during the six-week summer program. Other volunteers helped with special programs such as the annual senior luncheon, bus trips to major and minor league baseball, hockey and soccer games, flower show, senior foliage trip, ice skating show, theater, craft programs, concerts, shopping tours, Old Home Days, Foxwood Casino and more. Trips are arranged by the Commission and paid for by those who participate.

The commission would be remiss if it did not single out long-time member Ron Dulong for his dedication this past year. Mr. Dulong spent time every weekend this past spring and summer watering the fields until the irrigation system was installed. He monitored the installation and activation of the irrigation system, performed labor at the new concession stand, and built a retaining wall at the town beach and numerous other tasks. We thank him for his outstanding efforts.

We give many thanks to those who made monetary contributions as well as contributions of time and labor. Your efforts are gratefully appreciated.

Several people are enjoying their ticket to the world at the Sandown Public Library. In 2001 27,032 people visited the library to check out books, magazines, audiotapes, or videotapes, to use the computers, enjoy a program, read a newspaper or even to just visit with a friend. We enjoy welcoming everyone to our community library. Circulation of materials at the library continues to increase - 33,113 items were circulated, almost 900 more than last year.

The library continues to adapt to changing technology. Due to the passing of last year's warrant article the library was able to replace some of our older computers, upgrade our card catalogue system and make the card catalogue available online. Now through our web page Sandown residents may browse the catalogue or use one of the several databases we offer. This past year, while we continued to offer Proquest and Facts on File, we also added a new database, LearnATest. This database offers several practice tests from academic (SAT, GED, etc) to law enforcement to real estate. Tests may be tried and correct answers are given.

Programming remains to be an intricate part of our services. Over 4,400 people enjoyed the variety of programs offered at the library. Children continue to enjoy story hour and after school craft classes. The summer reading program remains popular, this year's theme was *Octopi Your Mind... Read*. Children enjoyed various activities and read 1,156 books. As usual the program ended with a great concert by The Works and the Friends of the Library's Hot Dog Feast.

Two new programs offered at the library this past year were our weekly meeting Computer Club assisted by Hugh Stouppe and our monthly meeting Chess Club with Steve Clifton. We are able to offer several of our programs due to our wonderful volunteers and the support of several groups in town. Girl Scouts have helped out with several programs. Krista Warren from the Recreation Committee leads our monthly book discussion. The race from Old Home Days helped sponsor entertainer Steve Blunt during National Children's Book Week. The Lion's Club donates money to our museum pass program. The Sandown Rogue Runners with the Friends of the Library participated in the Reach the Beach race. Proceeds raised from the race went to a new display case dedicated to the True Family.

The Friends of the Library continue to be a hard working volunteer group. This past year they took on the challenge of republishing A View from Meeting House Hill, The History of Sandown by Richard Holmes. The books finally arrived and now more people are delighting in discovering information about our town's past.

Come enjoy learning about your town and the world at your local library.

#### SANDOWN FIRE DEPARTMENT

The year, 2001, was a very busy year for the Sandown Fire and Rescue Departments. The number of emergency calls increases as the town grows.

The fire and safety-related inspections of daycare, foster homes and all child care facilities require a lot of hours.

As more homes install wood stoves, pellet stoves and gas heating units, much more time is involved in inspections by the Fire Chief and other members of the Fire Department.

The rescue boat, purchased after the town meeting of 2001, was placed into service after a few training exercises. It was used on a call at Angle Pond and it is working very well.

The equipment needs of the department, such as the rescue boat, ice rescue sled, etc. are realized by the great support of you, the voters.

I am pleased to report that, even though a lot of communities are finding it difficult to get new volunteers for Fire/Rescue Departments, we do not have that problem here in Sandown. The number of calls increases, especially for vehicle accidents and medical emergencies, but the dedicated members of the department always respond.

I would like to thank our fire prevention crew for a great program this year. All of the officers and members give a lot to the town of Sandown and make the Chief's job much easier.

### COMMUNITY FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER REPORT

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands cooperate and coordinate to reduce the risk of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing <u>ALL</u> outside burning. Fire permits are mandatory for any open burning unless the ground where the burning is to be done (and surrounding areas) is completely covered with snow. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs. Open burning is a privilege, NOT a right. Help us to protect you and our forest resource! Build small brush piles that can be quickly burned and extinguished.

New Hampshire experienced over 940 wildland fires in 2001. Most of the fires were human caused. Due to dry conditions fires spread quickly impacting more than 20 structures. Homeowners can help protect their homes by maintaining adequate green space around the house and make sure that the house number is correct and visible. Only You Can Prevent Wildland Fires. #### **Municipal Space Needs Committee**

The Municipal Space Needs Committee (MSNC) was formed following the conclusion of last year's annual town meeting. It's mission is to serve as an advisory committee to the Board of Selectmen in seeking a solution to the town's current and future municipal space needs.

The committee began meeting late last spring and quickly concluded that it would most likely take in excess of one year in order to research and present a viable plan to the town that would address space needs. It was not the committee's intent to put forth a warrant article this year.

During the past fact-finding months the committee solicited information from department heads in order to begin gathering and analyzing the needs of each department. Property maps were researched and town owned properties identified with the possibility of some being suitable for new construction once a plan was formulated. Information has been gathered through the United States Department of Agriculture Community Facilities grants and loans programs including information from the local Rural Development office. Eventually the committee hopes to qualify the town for grant money. Members have researched information on bond purchasing and investment of bonds.

In the midst of performing this research the former Peabody Funeral Home, located on Main Street, became available on the real estate market. Although this was an unexpected turn the committee felt it would be prudent to research whether this property would be a valuable asset should the town acquire it.

It was the conclusion of the committee that this property would present a number of opportunities for the town. Several site visits were made to the property with committee members, Realtor, contractors, building inspector and selectman. The Board of Selectmen agreed to the request of the committee and gave it's recommendation to place two warrants on this year's ballot; one for the purchase and renovation of the building and one for just the purchase of the property with the intent to develop a municipal office plan over the next year and to present that to voters in 2003.

Under very limited time constraints the MSNC was only able to present a conceptual rather than an actual plan to the Budget Committee for the use of the building. Subsequently the Budget Committee did not recommend either of the two articles

The consensus of the MSNC was that without the recommendation of the Budget Committee the warrant articles would most certainly fail, particularly in light of the two-thirds majority vote that would be necessary in order to fund the project through the purchase of a bond or note. The MSNC concluded it would be best to request that the Board of Selectmen not pursue this avenue and you will therefore not see it presented. It is the mission of the MSNC to explore possibilities and we feel we did that with this property and under these circumstances.

The MSNC has begun to identify needs the town is facing in the area of municipal space which includes emergency services and town office space. Those needs include new space for the police department that should include room to interview subjects in a private area; holding cells; separate area for juveniles; garage space; records, office, and training space, most of which is now non-existent or very limited.

By moving the police department out of it's current location the needs of the fire department will be met as space for a dispatchers office, officers and rescue training room, storage room, garage for forestry truck and rescue boat; laundry facilities and a fire chief/rescue captain office will become available in space now occupied by the police department.

Currently their are two offices available at Town Hall which are used to serve the needs of the Board of Selectmen, administrative aide, bookkeeper, assessor, treasurer, health officer, building inspector, Planning Board secretary and recreation director and meeting room space. The offices also serve the needs of the Conservation Commission, Budget Committee, Recreation Commission, ZBA, sanitation dept. and more. The Town Clerk/Tax Collector's office are housed in a third office.

Ideally each department should have it's own separate work area where records and a telephone line can be kept. There should be a separate large meeting room for board meetings which could also be utilized for interviews of town assistance applicants. Currently there is no space available where those interviews can be conducted in private and kept confidential. With the newly negotiated cable television contract now completed residents can expect to see meetings broadcast once space becomes available to house broadcast equipment. The library has not requested additional space since 1990.

In looking back over past town reports dating back some 12 years the MSNC finds that the town has spent approximately \$86,000 to address space needs. The breakdown is as follows:

1990 Town Meeting approves spending \$105,000 to expand the library with \$40,000 in interest offsetting the expense and \$65,000 raised through taxes.

1994 Town Meeting approves spending \$10,000 to remodel the police station.

 $1997\,$  Town Meeting approves spending \$4,000 to upgrade lower Town Hall for handicap accessibility.

1998 Town meeting approves spending \$7,000 to build the housing for the generator at fire station.

The general consensus of the MSNC is that the town is basically trying to make do with the same amount of municipal space it was using when the population was half it's current (5,000) size.

It is our goal to gain the approval of the voters by developing the most cost effective plan that will serve both the immediate and long-range needs of the town. We welcome your input and encourage you to attend any of our meetings which are generally held on the third Thursday of the month. We would also like to encourage new members to join the MSNC. #### SANDOWN POLICE DEPARTMENT TOWN REPORT 2001

The year 2001 will be a year that none of us will forget. The tragedy of September 11<sup>th</sup> affected each one of us in different ways. The most common being sorrow and fear. The tragedy also focused on what Police, Fire and Rescue personnel are all about and what we choose to do. The possibility for injury or death is a reality when performing our duties. I can speak for Police and I believe for our Fire and Rescue personnel when I say that we perform our duties with dedication and pride.

Our Officer John Sable is a Reservist who was activated for duty to assist with our Country's pursuit of terrorists. We are very proud of him but hope he returns to us soon.

The D.A.R.E. program was a huge success once again. This year there were 124 fifth graders who were involved in the classes. Several of the DARE students marched in the Old Home Day Parade. Officer Morrow decorated his Ford Lightning Truck with our D.A.R.E. banners to be part of the parade.

2001 showed an increase in our arrests and the severity of the offenses. We had several incidents involving drugs, one of which yielded two pounds of marijuana with the intent to distribute. We investigated seven sexual assaults.

A Firearms Safety class was given by myself to the Boy Scouts. Officers' Fardella and Morrow held a Child Fingerprint Registry in November and prior to his leaving Officer Sable held a bike safety program. Our Explorer Program is still going strong with many members.

We have been in the process of gathering information and assistance in developing a plan for future construction of a new police station. I would like to sincerely thank those who have assisted with this effort.

The two grants received from the New Hampshire Highway Safety Agency were a success. These grants offer approximately 60 over-time hours for patrol concentration on specific traffic problems or D.W.I. enforcement. These patrols were 100 % funded by the Highway Safety Agency through federal grants.

Thank you to my officers for their dedication and hard work and Thank you to the residents of Sandown for your support and confidence.

#### REPORT OF ROCKINGHAM COMMUNITY ACTION Services Provided To Sandown Residents July 2000 - June 2001

Rockingham Community Action (RCA) is a private, non-profit organization. Our mission is to prevent, reduce, and work toward the elimination of poverty. RCA has been addressing these needs for thirty-five years.

Greater Salem Community Action Center is an outreach office of RCA that serves residents of Sandown and 11 other communities, and as such acts as Sandown's central resource for information regarding all available human services. RCA also offers intake, clinic and distribution sites in over half of the county's thirty-seven communities for the application and provision of various Community Action services.

Community Action provides a wide range of services that are unduplicated elsewhere in the county. Many of our services meet immediate, critical needs, while others are designed to help families achieve long-term economic self-sufficiency. The following services were provided by Community Action to eligible residents of Sandown from July 1, 2000 through June 30, 2001:

- **42 households received one of a group of Fuel Assistance Programs**, services that provided financial grants of up to \$1,200 to low-income households to assist with energy-related expenses through the Fuel Assistance Program (some households also receive furnace cleaning and budget and energy counseling, and elderly support services), and grants of up to \$300 for fuel and utility emergencies for households not eligible for the Fuel Assistance Program through the Neighbor Helping Neighbor and the Senior Energy Assistance Service.
- 5 households were enrolled in Workforce Development, which is the "umbrella" for a variety of programs designed to foster long-term self-reliance: Disadvantaged Adult and Dislocated Worker Programs; COMPASS Adult and COMPASS Youth; Welfare to Work; The Employment and Education Marketplace; and Wheels to Work. Each component helps clients determine goals and develop strategies to overcome barriers to employment. Wheels to Work offers affordable car ownership to low-income individuals moving from public assistance to the workforce.
- 2 homes received Housing Rehabilitation & Energy Conservation services through the Weatherization or Energy Management Programs, which provide high quality energy conservation materials and skilled labor to weatherize the homes of low-income and high energy-using households to reduce heating costs and conserve energy, and provides major repairs or replacement of heating systems for low-income homeowners; through the H.O.M.E. Program, provides major rehabilitation of single-family, owner-occupied homes, emphasizing health and safety related repairs, including water and septic systems, structural, roofing, electrical, and heating system work; through the Lead Paint Program, provides the removal and containment of lead paint hazards in homes with children 6 and under.
- 6 Family Day Care children and child care providers participated in the Family Child Care Program, which provides services that assist family child care providers and benefit the children in their care, including training, technical assistance and sponsorship of the USDA Child and Adult Care Food Program.
- 27 child care referrals were arranged through the Child Care Resource and Referral Program, which maintains an inventory of all available child care options, provides child care referrals to employees of participating companies and to the general public, and expands the supply of quality child care by recruiting, training and assisting new child care providers, including the training of TANF participants.
- **52 individuals received help through the WIC or Commodity Supplemental Food Programs**: WIC provides supplemental nutritious foods, nutrition education, breast-feeding support and health care screening/referrals to pregnant women, nursing mothers, infants, and children up to the age of five; the Commodity Supplemental Food Program provides monthly allotments of commodity foods and nutrition education materials to senior citizens, postpartum women, and 5-year-old children.

- 1 child was enrolled in Head Start, a comprehensive early childhood development program that provides education, health, nutrition, disability, and family support services to low-income pre-school children and their families
- 99 individual food allotments were provided through the Emergency Food Assistance Program, which distributes USDA surplus food to emergency food pantries and homeless shelters throughout Rockingham County.
- 6 household food allotments were provided through the Emergency Food Pantry, which provides emergency food allotments of non-perishable food to households facing severe economic hardship in areas in which other locally-based emergency food pantries are understocked or unavailable.
- 18 household allotments of personal care items were provided through the Personal Care Program, which provides allotments of personal care items, including basic cleaning supplies and personal hygiene items, to households facing economic hardship.
- 2 households were enrolled in the Emergency Response System, a program that installs and maintains emergency response systems for disabled individuals in order to ensure their safety and maintain their independence and quality of life by providing immediate access to emergency medical responders.
- 4 individuals received help through the Health Insurance Counseling, Education and Assistance Service (HICEAS), which provides the services of trained volunteers to assist Medicare recipients with a wide range of health insurance needs, including supplemental health insurance options and Medicare and Medicaid benefits and claims.

In addition to these major programs, much of our staff time is devoted to working with people who come to us seeking help. During the past year, we logged 87 calls or visits from Sandown residents, many of which were crisis calls involving evictions or foreclosures, fuel or utility problems, the lack of food or clothing, or general financial needs. By working closely together with local and state welfare administrators, landlords and mortgage lenders, fuel and utility companies, other human service agencies, and interested clergy and civic groups, we are able to link those in need with the services available to them.

The services provided by our staff, together with the programs provided by our agency, have a direct and significant effect on Sandown's welfare budget. If our services were decreased due to lack of funding, the town would experience a resulting increase in requests for local welfare assistance.
