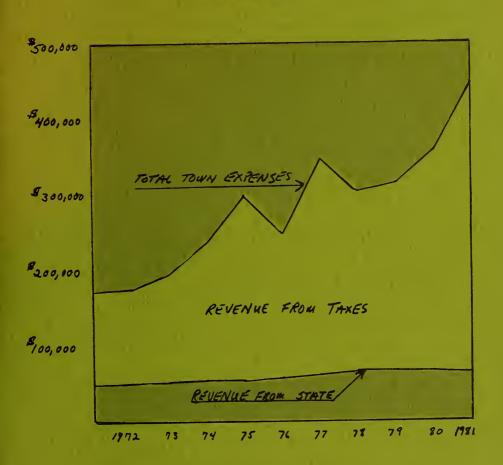

WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of South Hampton in the county of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday the 9th of March, at One o'clock in the afternoon to act on Article 1, 2, 3, and 4.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Wednesday, the 10th of March, at Seven Thirty P.M. to act on Article 5 and subsequent articles.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-F for the adjusted elderly exemptions from property tax / These statutes provide for the following exemptions, based on assessed value, for the qualified taxpayers; for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$ 10,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$ 15,000; for a person 80 years of age or older, \$ 20,000. To qualify, the person must have been a N.H. resident for at least 5 years; own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by his spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of less; than \$ 10,000 or if married a combined net income of less than \$ 12,000, and own net assets of \$ 30,000 or less, excluding the value of the person's residence.

To see if the town will vote to adopt amendments to the Zoning Ordinance, Town of South Hampton, as proposed by the Planning Board. Amendments as they will appear on the official ballot are as follows:

- 3. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1:
- 1. Amend Article III, Paragraph II, Section G to read as follows;

Every Building shall be set back from the front property line not less than forty feet. An exception can be made where the existing line of dwelling is less than forty feet. All dwellings shall be set back at least 25 feet from the rear and sidel lot lines except where a personal loses building by fire or other causes said person may rebuild on same location within a period of one year.

- 4. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2:
- 2. Amend Article V, Commercial District, Paragraph A, permitted uses: Add Section 7 to read as follows:

Mobile manufactured housing on individually owned lots.

- 5. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and to make appropriations for the same.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of 211.78 for the improvement of Class V roads.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administrate, sell, or otherwise dispose of any real estate acquired by Tax Collector's Deed, any sale to be either by private sale to the previous owner, or by public auction with the Selectmen retaining the right to reject any of all bids.
- 8. To see if the Town will authorize Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to make application for and to receive and spend in the name of the Town, such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for Town purposes as may or hereafter be forthcoming from Federal, State, local or private agencies that would be of benefit to the Town.
- 10. To see whether the Town will join the Southeastern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission and authorize the Town's representation and appropriate the sum of \$ 397.80 for this purpose.

- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 500.00 for the support of the Seacoast Regional Counseling Center.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 4,264.00 for the support of the library.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 169.00 for the support of the Rockingham Child and Family Services.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 186.00 for the support of Rockingham County Community Action.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 6,500.00 for the Police Department.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 500.00 for the maintenance of water holes and installation of a dry hydrant.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 50.00 for recreational purposes.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 5,000.00 to run the Fire Department.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote and appropriate the sum of \$ 2,500.00 to pay off the note on the fire truck and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$ 1,100.00 to purchase hose for the Fire Department, and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.

- 21. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$ 3,000.00 for the maintenance and upgrading of the Town Bridges on Hilldale Avenue and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$ 250.00 to be placed in the Crusier Replacement Trust Fund and to deposit pistol permit fees in that fund.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 6,000.00 to defray legal expenses for the ensuing year, specifically associated with the Town's actions to prevent the construction of overhead transmission lines.
- 24. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

ANNUAL SOUTH HAMPTON TOWN MEETING March 10th, 1981

At a legal meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of South Hampton, In the County of Rockingham, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in town affairs, held on the 10th of March 1981 at the South Hampton Town Hall, the following business was transacted;

The Town Warrant was read by Moderator Horace Cressy at 1:04 p.m. Ernest Bonah made a motion to open the polls, seconded by Peter Bryant and so voted.

Ballot clerks for the election day were Shirley Michaud, Annette Krafton, Francis Smith and Helen Smith. A total of 159 votes were cast out of 513 registered voters.

ARTICLE 1 - Town Officers were elected as follows:

Horace Cressy, Moderator, 2 yrs., 139 votes, elected A. Maude Harlow, Supv. of the Checklist, 6 yrs. 151 votes, elected.

Carol A. Baker, Town Clerk, 3 yrs., 149 votes, elected Anne W. Verge, Selectman, 3 yrs., 144 votes, elected Mary Mertinooke, Treasurer, 1 yr., 150 votes, elected Jewell E. Currier, Auditor, 1 yr. 142 votes, elected Robert W. Fraser, Auditor, 1 yr. 150 votes, elected John Santosuosso, Highway Agent, 1 yr. 123 votes, elected Charles Dennett, Trustee of Trust Fund, 3 yrs., 6 write-in votes, elected

Vincent H. Early, Trustee of Cemetery, 1 yr., 142 votes, elected

Albert Gray, Trustee of Cemetery, 1 yr., 147 votes, elected Madeline A. Burrill, Trustee of Library, 3 yrs., 145 votes, elected

John Santosuosso, Constable, 1 yr., 126 votes, elected.

ARTICLE II

shall the Town establish two historic districts as follows: Jewell Town [properties of Coffin, Merrill, Oldak, Amsler, Miller, Rice and portion of Capp] and Currierville [properties of Currier Heirs, Strickland, Verge, Riecks, and Dodge. YES-105 NO-49.

Donald Currier made a motion to close the polls at 8:00 P.M.. Seconded by Shirley Michaud and so voted.

Sworn in at open meeting by Moderator Horace Cressy were Mary Mertinooke, Treasurer; Judy Shivik, School Treasurer; A. Maude Harlow, Supv. of Checklist; Carol Baker, Town Clerk. Sworn in by Town Clerk, Carol Baker, were Horace Cressy, Moderator for Town and School and Vincent Early, Cemetery Trustee.

The following evening on March 11th, 1981, Moderator Horace Cressy called the meeting to order at 7:35 P.M. Rev. Everett Scruton opened the meeting with a prayer and Chief Hess led the Townspeople in the Salute to the Flag. Ernest Bonah announced that Selectman Anne Verge was unable to attend the meeting due to illness. The remaining articles were voted on as follows:

ARTICLE III

Ernest Bonah Selectman made a motion that \$ 56,300.00 be appropriated to defray town charges for the ensuing year and to make appropriation for the same, duly seconded by Peter Bryant. Mr. Bonah noted that this was \$ 600.00 less than last year. It was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE IV

Moderator Horace Cressy read article "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$212.82 for the improvement of Class V roads. John Santosuosso Highway Agent moved to accept the article as read, seconded by Paul Morris. It was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE V

Ernest Bonah Selectman made a motion to accept the article authorizing the Selectmen to administrate, sell or other wise dispose of any real estate acquired by Tax Collector's Deed, any sale to be either by private sale to the previous owner or by public auction with the Selectman retaining the right to reject any or all bids. It was seconded by John Santosuosso and so voted.

ARTICLE VI

Peter Bryant, Selectman, moved that the Town authorize Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes, seconded by Paul Morris and voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE VII

Moderator Horace Cressy, read article "To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to make application for and receive and spend in the name of the Town. such advances, Grants-in-aid, or other funds for Town purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from Federal, State, local or private agencies that would be of benefit to the Town." Peter Bryant, Selectman, moved that the article be accepted as read, seconded by Walter Hill and so voted.

ARTICLE VIII

Peter Bryant, Selectman made a motion that the Town join the Southeastern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission and authorize the Town's representation and appropriate the sum of \$417.60 for this purpose, seconded by William Courtney. The article was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE IX

Ernest Bonah, Selectman moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the Seacoast Regional Counseling Center, Seconded by Paul Morris and voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE X

Marise Fraser, Library Trustee moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,014.00 for the support of the Library seconded by Paul Morris. Vincent Early, Budget Committee Member, commented that the Budget Committee did not recommend the increase as they were trying to keep the budget down to last year's level. Mrs. Fraser explained that because of inflation the increase was needed to maintain the book-buying level of last year. Lawrence Baker amended the article to appropriate the sum of \$3,499.00. seconded by Peter Oldak. The amended article was voted and lost. The original article was then voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE XI

Peter Bryant, Selectman, made a motion that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$51.00 for the support of the Rockingham Child and Family Services, Seconded by Edward Hess and so voted.

ARTICLE XII

Ernest Bonah, Selectman, moved that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$102.00 for the support of Rockingham County Community Action, seconded by Florence Goldthwaite. A representative of the Agency explained the services offered and stated that the amount requested was 2.5% of the amount rendered for services to residents of the Town for 1980. The article was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE XIII

John Santosuosso, Police Chief moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,500.00 for the Police Department seconded by Peter Martin and so voted.

ARTICLE XIV

Edward Hess, Fire Chief moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of 500.00 for the maintenance of water holes and installation of a dry hydrant, seconded by Paul Morris and so voted.

ARTICLE XV

Peter Bryant Selectman, made a motion that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for recreational purposes seconded by John Santosuosso and so voted.

ARTICLE XVI

Edward Hess, Fire Chief, moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to run the Fire Department seconded by Paul Morris. Margaret Kiely asked for an explanation of the increase to which edward Hess responded. Robert Fraser spoke for the Budget Committee again stating that they wanted to keep expenses down to last year's level. Lawrence Baker amended the amount in the article to \$4,000.00 seconded by Mrs. Kiely. The amended article was voted and lost. The original article was then voted and passed.

ARTICLE XVII

Ernest Bonah, Selectman, made a motion that the Town apropriate the sum of \$2,700. to pay off the note on the fire truck and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund. The article was seconded by Paul Morris and so voted.

ARTICLE XVIII

Edward Hess, Fire Chief, moved that the Town appropriate \$ 1,055.00 to purchase hose for the Fire Department and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund. The article was seconded by Paul Morris and voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE XIX

John Santosuosso, Highway Agent, made a motion that the Town appropriate \$ 3,000.00 for the maintenance and upgrading of the Town Bridges on Hilldale Avenue and Whitehall Rd., and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund. The article was seconded by Norman Felch and voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE XX

John Santosuosso, Police Chief, moved that the Town authorize the establishment of a Police Cruiser Replacement Trust Fund, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for that purpose and to authorize Selectmen to deposit pistol Permit fees in that fund. The article was seconded by Edward Hess and voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE XXI

Moderator Horace Cressy read article "To see if the Town will establish a committee of at least five members to be appointed by the Selectmen, to investigate the acquisition of the Old Currier Farm [Vozella House] for use as a Town Hall Annex [on the petition of 18 voters]. Fred Anderson moved to accept the article as read. Seconded by Norman Felch and it was so voted.

ARTICLE XXII

Moderator Horace Cressy read article "To see if the town will vote to petition the Representatives and Senators who respresent the Town in the General Court to support in the current session of the General Court, the concurrent resolution to amend the State Constitution to limit the annual increase in property taxes to five percent and to limit the annual increase in spending by the State of any city town, or other governmental unit of the state of any city, town, or other governmental unit of the state to five percent. [on the petition of 13 voters]. Ellen Cressy moved to indefinately postpone the article, seconded by Laurie Ebacher. The motion to indefinitely postpone the article passed.

ARTICLE XXIII - Transaction of other business

Edward Hess requested a few minutes of silence in memory of Lloyd Currier.

William Carey moved that the Board of Selectmen notify the New Hampshire Public Utilities Commission and the Site Evaluation Committee that the town meeting request that they:

- 1. Require the Public Service Company of N.H. to investigate the feasibility of constructing two transmission lines out of the Seabrook Station instead of three as presently planned and
- 2. Require the Public Service Company to investigate a southerly route from the Seabrook Station going directly into Massachusetts following existing rights of way thereby avoiding an impact on South Hampton N.H. in terms of "aesthetics historic sites, air and water quality, natural environment and public health and safety" and,
- 3. Deny the petition of the Public Service Company for changes to the transmissions lines in South Hampton which are scheduled for a hearing Friday, March 20th, 1981.

The motion was seconded by Peter Oldak and voted in the affirmative.

Mr. Carey reviewed the progress the Society for the Protection of the Environment of Southeastern New Hampshire Inc. has had in their communications with Public Service Company in regard to preventing the power lines from going through South Hampton. The group appreciates the support the Town has given and hopes for continued support.

Fred Anderson made a motion to delcare the vote unanimous, seconded by Marise Fraser and so voted.

It was voted to adjourn the meeting at 10:15.

John Santosuosso, Highway Agent and Constable, was sworn in by the Moderator.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE VOZZELLA PROP.

The first meeting of the committee was held on April 23. 1981. The reasons for investigating the Vozzella property were reviewed. The decision was made to ask the Vozzella's for permission to view the property and to send them a copy of Article #21 of the Town Warrant. The letter was sent with no reply from the Vozzella's. On October 13th, Laurie Ebacher reported on a telephone conversation that he had with Mrs. Vozzella. She stated that she could not be bothered to come up and meet with us. On October 25th, Michael Santosuosso called Mr. Vozzella to discuss the property. Mr. Vozzella said the house was not for sale, and he would not consider dividing the property. He stated that if the town desired the property they could take it by eminent domain. He also mentioned the possibility of moving to South Hampton and remodeling. Mr. Vozzella expressed dissatisfaction with the town, but did agree to talk with his wife and give Mr. Santosuosso a price on the entire piece of property. To this date no further communication has been received from Mr. Vozzella. The members of the committee are: Sadie Embree, Chairman, Michael Santosuosso, Secretary, Peter Oldak, Thomas Harlow, Laurie Ebacher, Fred Anderson.

REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

During 1981 we began to see the first effects of the Federal Government's new approach to fiscal responsibility and the resulting reduction in state financial support. Unfortunately this comes at a time when the State of New Hampshire is confronted with a \$ 30,000,000 deficit. How the state cures this problem is uncertain, but with out question we at the local level will be affected.

Last year, we felt the combined impact of the Federal Government program and the state's financial problem in two specific areas, reduced funds from the state, and increased taxes paid to support Rockingham County. We expect both situations to continue and these coupled with higher school and town operating costs due to inflation, substantially add to the burden that our local real estate taxes must carry, As selectmen, we urge you to take an active interest in the town and school district meetings, the Annual Town Meeting, and if possible to participate in the operation of the town by serving on one of the several town committees.

The Board of Selectmen meets in open session at the Selectmen's office in the Town Hall on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month at 7:30 P.m. At this tme, in addition to its regular business of overseeing the operation of the Town, the Board is available to discuss matters with individual residents.

Chief Edward Hess, Fire Fighter Dan Goldthwaite and Fire Figher Melissa Goldthwaite completed our 84 hour course as Emergency Medical Technicians. This course was made possible by the Federal Government.

Smoke detectors are being installed in many homes. These detectors are a very wise investment. The detector will go off as a very little smoke enters into the detector, and will give a very early warning of fire. This is a very important tip in fire prevention.

Also any body with wood stoves--please make sure the stove is properly installed and the chimneys are checked for plugging!

REPORT OF YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN

In the spring of 1981, a Forest Fire Prevention Program was presented to grades 1 through 4. A film was shown and Smokey Bear talked to the students about forest fire prevention.

No written burning permit is required when there is snow on the ground. However, you must notify the Forest Fire Warden or one of his deputies when you are going to burn. When the ground is not covered with snow, a written fire permit is required to any resident wishing to burn. Burning without a permit is punishable by a fine up to \$1,000 or a jail term of up to one year or both.

In closing, I would like to say "Thank You" to Charles Dennett who will retire this year as a Deputy Fire Warden after 30 years of faithful service.

ANNUAL MEETING

The Annual Meeting of the South Hampton, New Hampshire School District was called to order by Moderator, Horace Cressy at 8:05 p.m. with 26 people in attendance. The warrant now attached to page 232 was read.

Audrey Miller made the motion "to let the representatives of Union #21 speak if they are called upon to answer questions". Barbara Knapp seconded, voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE I - Barbara Knapp spoke on behalf of this article and stated there was no need to postpone the meeting as an agreement had been reached on the teacher contract. Lawrence Baker made the motion "to accept this article as read", seconded by Phyllis Butt. The motion was opposed and defeated by the majority vote.

ARTICLE II - Walter Hill made the motion "to see if the District will vote and appropriate the sum of \$ 311,785", seconded by Lawrence Baker. Mr. Hill explained the difference from the figure in the budget. Teacher contracts were settled so account #1100 has an increase of \$ 941: account #1435 had only three coaching positions budgeted, the increase of \$ 678 would enable them to hire a boys softball coach; Blue Cross/Blue Shield has an increase of \$ 361 and the tuition for high school pupils has an increase of \$ 434. Lawrence Baker seconded. The special education account was discussed and Patricia Nelson explained state funding. Audrey Miller asked whether extra money was placed in the tuition account in the event another high school student comes. Dr. Hamilton stated there wasn't and if that happens they would have to ask for a supplement appropriation the next year. After discussion this article was voted in the affirmative and so carried.

ARTICLE III - Lawrence Baker made the motion "to accept this article as read", seconded by Walter Hill. So voted and carried in the affirmative.

ARTICLE IV - Walter Hill spoke on the accomplishment of students going to the Region 18 Vocational School in Exeter. Mr. Marinos explained the increases in the accounts Ann Zammitti questioned.

With no further business to complete, Thomas Harlow made the motion to adjourn at 8:35 P.M., seconded by Audrey Miller.

SOUTH HAMPTON SCHOOL DISTRICT REPORT SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

To the Townspeople of South Hampton, New Hampshire:

This board submits this report on the management of your school for the fiscal year 1981. In addition to the narrative portion of the report, financial and other aspects of the school follow this brief presentation. Each year we review with you briefly some of the signaficant developments in education, legislation and management.

We are constantly mindful of the criticisms, both locally and nationally, of schools and the costs of schooling. We are not insensitive to the financial strains on the taxpayer and, along with your principal and superintendents, we are constantly watching for ways to hold costs to a minimum. We believe that we have succeeded in carrying out the will of the majority.

This year the Budget committee has submitted without recommendation 1,950 for athletic and field trip transportation which they felt should be furnished on a volunteer basis by parents. The School Board agrees with this sentiment; however, due to so many families with both parents working today, this is not practical. Also, 6,300 for handicapped transportation was not recommended. With the new federalism, the laws may be changed, but presently federal laws mandates that we must pay this expense.

BUDGET

The School District budget for 1981-82, approved last March, was held to a minimum with no planned surplus. Due to unexpected, increased costs of special education and substitute teachers, we are forced to request an additional 6,500 deficiency budget to complete this fiscal year. This will bring the 1981-82 operating budget to 318,285 which is 8.8% greater than the previous year. While this increase is greater than was anticipated, it is still well below the inflation rate and the previous year's increase.

For 1982-83 we are requesting 326,843 which is only a 2.7% increase over this year. This budget again has no"fat" built into it, and while we have tried to anticipate all eventualities, this budget does not allow for the unexpected.

SAU #21 JOINT BOARD

Your School Board members are also part of the Supervisory Administration Unit #21, along with members from the Hampton, North Hampton, Hampton Falls, Seabrook and Winnacunnet School Boards. This board meets several times a year to set budgets and policy for the Superintendents Office in Hampton. We are the smallest School District in this unit, but your representatives hold many responsible positions on this board. Pat Nelson is a member of the Administration operations Committee, Walter Hill was the Chairman of the Accountability Committee, and Larry Baker was the Chairman of the Joint Board and also a member of the Negotiations Team.

TEACHER CONTRACT NEGOTIATIONS

A two year contract, effective until June 30, 1983, was signed last year after almost a year of negotiations. The major contract highlights were: additional payment of health insurance, a new dental insurance plan, and an 11% average salary increase for each year. To some this salary increase may seem excessive, but our teachers were just finishing a 3 year contract that had given them less than 7% per year during a period when inflation was running as high as 14%. Also, most school teacher settlements last year were running anywhere from 9% to 16%. With inflation tapering off and unions starting to lower their demands for high wage increases, the next contract negotiations should be for a lower figure.

We continue to have a good relationship with the Amesbury School System where we have 41 students enrolled. This year we also have 1 student at Sanborn in Kingston, 2 students at Winnacunnet in Hampton, 1 student in a special program in Poland Springs, Maine and 3 Students attending private school for which we give no financial support.

There are several people in town who would like to initiate a voucher system for high school tuition where a specified amount would be paid to the high school of the family's choice. Experiments in other parts of the country have found vouchering does not work, and your School Board feels that the decision where a student attends school should remain with the board. However, we will continue to accommodate, whenever possible, any parent who wishes to send their child to a different approved public high school. In these cases no transportation will be furnished.

The case of providing support for a student going to a private school is clear cut. It is illegal for the following reasons:

- 1. Article 83 of the State Constitution
- 3. RSA Law 194:27
- 3. State School Board Regulations

There also seems to be a lot of sentiment in town to get our high school children into a New Hampshire high school. Your Board continues to look for alternatives. To date, the only school system we have found that offers equivalent education opportunities to Amesbury is Exeter. However, they will not even consider allowing tuition students from South Hampton.

In closing, we extend our thanks to the Barnard School Trustees who have continued to keep the building in good repair.

SOUTH HAMPTON TOWN REPORT SUPERINTENDENTS REPORT

I hereby submit my annual report to the citizens of South Hampton.

As funding schemes change at the federal and state level it becomes more and more apparent that we at the local level will be paying a higher percentage of many of our public services. Also some programs once public will become part of the private sector. Your School Board members and administrators have worked hard at maintaining the offerings of the Barnard School at as reasonable cost to the taxpayers as possible.

I have asked Dr. Anderson, the Assistant Superintendent for Instruction, to bring you up to date on his area of responsibility. Most of the remainder of my report consists of his comments.

"A teacher affects eternity. He never knows where his influence stops", so said Henry Adams. The curriculum is the road on which the student and the teacher travel. Where that road leads is very important not only for the student but for our society. Equally important is how we travel that road. If we only walk instead of fly towards our goals, we obviously will take longer to achieve our goals; therefore, the Where, How, and the What become important.

This is what we have been trying to do in education at S.A.U. 21 and South Hampton not today, not yesterday, but continuously improve the WHERE, the HOW, the WHAT.

At present we have a workshop for teachers in "Assertive Discipline" to improve the HOW. This came about because principals and teachers expressed a need. The results of the workshop have been beyond our expectations. To quote one teacher, "I didn't realize how much more we could accomplish in my class with better discipline AND the children enjoy it so much more."

A teacher is more effective if the teacher has been down the road himself. We have just begun another workshop in "Writing." We all agreed that children need to learn to write better, to express themselves more clearly and more forcefully. The Exeter Writing Project which is part of a national program was aimed at just this: teachers learn to write better in order to teach their students to write better. We are learning how to get what we want to get with that: better writing.

Previous to this year we have had workshops on "Teacher Effectiveness Training" and "Mastery Teaching" which proved to be influential in making the teacher more successful in the classroom through improving student learning.

How do we know that we are improving? In the last eight years our IOWA Test of Basic Skills scores have risen as high as 23 percentage points. These tests examine achievement in Basic Skills: vocabulary, reading, spelling, capitalization, punctuation, language usage, map skills, graphs, references, math concepts and problems.

The introduction of the Microcomputers seven years ago at Amesbury High School ushered in a new era of education. We are trying hard to get with it. Every workshop for teachers has been over subscribed. We can't find enough instructors, computers, or room to do all we are requested. You ask, "What do microcomputers do?" They make it possible for the first fime, at reasonable cost, to individualize learning at the Where, How, What levels. Given the equipment -- hardware and software -- the teacher can meet the learning needs of every student. That means 25 students at 25 different levels of learning in 25 different ways all at the same time with one teacher!!

What else has been done:

Development and implementation of Basic Arithmetic Skills Test in math for grade 8. This is given in grades 6, 7, and 8 as a pre-test. In grade 8 it insures competency in basic skills.

- 2. Development of the Where in Reading, Math, U.S. History and N.H. History at three levels by teachers working with the Local Planning Group. This was mandated by the State Accountability Program.
- 3. Basic Arithmetic Skills Program for computer use at all levels.
- 4.
 Spelling practice and test for computer use employing the 100 words most frequently misspelled by high school students. This is available to all schools.
- Keeping track of computer software purchase and location in all districts.
- "Seven Keys to Successful Teaching" workshop for principals which had far-reaching effects for improvement of teaching and evaluation. This is now used by principals in their meetings through the showing of the Madelyne Hunter films.
- 7. Workshop on "The Where, How and What of Education in SAU 21" which created a climate of change.

This is by no means a complete or exhaustive description of what is happening in South Hampton and S.A.U. 21. Individuals are engaging in curriculum work constantly to the end that our service to students improves daily. We know we are affecting eternity.

I wish to thank all of you for the assistance and support you have given your school over the past year.
