THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Troy in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in Said Town on Tuesday, the 11th of March, next at 10:00 in the forenoon for balloting upon matters specified in Article I, listed below, and you are hereby further notified to meet at the Troy Elementary School on Wednesday, the 12th of March next at 7:30 p.m. to act upon the remainder of the listed Warrant.

Article I: To bring in your votes for one Selectman for three years, and for all other Town Officers elected by ballot, as passed by Town Meeting, or State Statute for the specified number of years.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the following Town expenditures for the ensuing year as recommended by the Budget Committee.

- a. Town Officers' salaries - \$20,000
- b. Town Officers' expenses - \$7,000
- c. Election and Registrations - \$1,600
- d. Town Hall - \$5,500
- e. Parks - \$900
- f. Vital Statistics - \$100
- g. Insurances - \$18,000
- h. Social Security - \$8,000
- i. Shade Trees - \$100
- j. Interest - Temporary Loans - \$5,000
- k. Memorial Day - \$500
- l. Town Dump - \$12,000
- m. Street Lighting - \$13,000
- n. Legal Fees - \$2,500
- o. Planning Board - Board of Adjustment - \$600
- p. Civil Defense - \$1,100
- q. Reassessment and Tax Map Update - \$1,500
- r. Conservation Committee - \$100

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to support public services as recommended by the Budget Committee.

- a. District Nurses Association - \$5,000
- b. War Memorial Program - \$7,000
- c. Grand Monadnock Arts Council - \$200
- d. Monadnock Regional Association - \$401

- e. Monadnock Family & Mental Health Service - \$850
- f. Meadowood County Area Fire Department - Membership Fund - \$500
- g. Friendly Meals/Meals on Wheels - \$500
- h. Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Authority - \$1,440

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums as necessary to support Town Departments as recommended by the budget committee.

- a. Highway - Summer & Winter - \$50,000
- b. Police - \$39,500
- c. Fire - \$19,897
- d. Overseer of the Poor - \$13,500
- e. Dog Constable - \$2,600

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$4,700 for the care of the cemeteries. \$3,700 to come from the Trust Funds.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$447.41 to which the State will contribute \$2,982.73, if voted and accepted, for the construction of Class V roads.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$7,917.18 to be withdrawn from the payment made by the State of New Hampshire from the special Highway Subsidy Fund for the purpose of construction and reconstruction of Class IV and Class V highways within the town or take any action relating thereto.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000 for use by the Troy Summer Arts Festival Committee. Of this, \$500 will be an art grant from the State of New Hampshire and \$500 in matching funds from the Town. This will be the third annual festival held on Troy Common.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$23,514.00 for the Water Department.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$7,000 for the Gay-Kimball Library.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 as amended for the Capital Reserve Funds for the following specific purposes and in the amounts indicated herewith or take any other action thereof:

- a. Fire Department - Truck - \$5,000
- b. Highway Department - Truck - \$5,000

- c. Police Department - Cruiser - \$1,000
- d. Reassessment of Town - \$1,500

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith or take any other action hereon:

- a. Fire Department - Roof - \$3,400
- b. Fire Department - Heating System - \$2,500
- c. Town Hall Repairs - \$1,000
- d. Senior Citizens Activities - \$2,000
- e. Highway Dept. - Repairs of Payloader - \$5,375.83
- f. Library - Operation - \$2,000

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to prohibit the storage of radioactive materials and dumping of radioactive waste from nuclear facilities within the town lines of Troy. (By Petition)

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to prohibit the transportation of radioactive materials and radioactive waste from nuclear facilities across town lines. Excepting materials used in medical treatments which shall be registered with local health and safety officials. (By Petition)

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to reopen and maintain that section of Bigelow Hill Road from the Richard Pelto residence to the top of the knoll at the Liimatainen property, approximately 4/10 mile. (By Petition)

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to have the Selectmen prepare proper legislative action to combine the water and sewer departments into a combined Town of Troy, Water and Sewer Department. This action will be taken with legal advice from Town Council and applicable State Departments.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for Federal Funds with the assistance of the New Hampshire Department of Resources and Economic Development.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money to pay charges and the interest thereon.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the

Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the town by tax collector's deed by public auction (or advertised sealed bid) or in such other manner as determined by the selectmen as justice may require.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 72:62 for a property tax exemption on real property equipped with a solar energy heating or cooling system which exemption shall be in an amount of 50% of the cost of the solar system up to \$10,000.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to abandon the following roads.

- a. J. Matson Farm to Richmond and Fitzwilliam lines, called Widow Gage Road.
- b. J. Matson Farm to Richmond line, Old Richmond Road leading to Liimatainen Farm.
- c. Maki Farm to Swanzey Town Line.
- d. South of the Eino Lane residence to the point where it connects the Old Richmond Road.

Article 23. To see whether the Town will authorize the Selectmen to convey the premises described as "Map 12 - Lot 49," assessed to Walter Maki, advertised and sold for 1976 taxes and conveyed to the Town of Troy by Tax Deed recorded September 12, 1979 at Vol. 973, Page 460 of the Cheshire Registry of Deeds, to Walter Maki, by Deed (without covenants) in consideration of property taxes of \$1,760.60 paid in full January 14, 1980.

Article 24. To see whether the town will authorize the Selectmen to convey the premises described as "Map 18 - Lot 56" assessed to Edwin A. and Mary E. Wainio, advertised and sold for taxes and conveyed to the Town of Troy by Tax Deed recorded September 12, 1979 in Vol. 973 Page 462 of the Cheshire Registry of Deeds, to Edwin A. and Mary E. Wainio by Deed (without covenants) in consideration of property taxes of \$1,344.00 and \$133.00 due to Water Department paid in full before the town meeting.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to have the Selectmen appoint a Committee of five (5) Citizens to work with a Committee from Fitzwilliam to study the consolidation of the Troy and Fitzwilliam Police Departments and to prepare a report with recommendations prior to the next annual meeting.

Article 26. To hear reports of committees, agents or officers heretofore chosen and take any action relative.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Members of the Board:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination of the financial statements of the Town of Troy for the year ended December 31, 1978, which was made by this Division in accordance with the provisions of R.S.A. 71-A:20. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

One of the enclosed audits must be given to the Town Clerk for retention as part of the Town's permanent records.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Analysis of Change in General Fund Balance: (Exhibit A-2)

On a budgetary basis, the change in Fund Balance is summarized as follows:

GENERAL COMMENTS

Public Library:

The records of the public library are limited to the check book, bank statements and cancelled checks. We strongly recommend the use of a cash receipts and disbursements journal which would not only facilitate the preparation of year-end reports, but also establish a permanent historical record of financial data.

C.E.T.A. Funds:

During 1978, the Town received and expended C.E.T.A. Funds of \$19,273, which were not budgeted for at the annual Town Meeting. We recommend that all expenditures from any source be budgeted in their gross amount.

War Memorial Account:

This account, funded almost wholly by Town appropriations, is currently in the custody of the Troy War Memorial Committee. In accordance with State statutes which provide that the Treasurer shall have custody of all funds belonging to the Town, we recommend the transfer of said funds to the Town Treasurer as soon as it is practical to do so.

Trustees of Trust Funds:

Approximately 51% of the total fund balance is comprised of investment shares, which are currently contained in the Town Clerk's safe. Our examination disclosed a small number of missing certificates, which apparently occurred during the transfer of certificates from a bank safe deposit box to the Town Clerk's safe, some years ago. We recommend that these certificates be again placed in a safe deposit box.

It is the current practice to discard the annual statements and tax information remitted by the various investment funds after recording the necessary information in the ledger. In the same respect, quarterly statements issued by the Ashuelot National Bank are also discarded, subsequent to recording the activity therein. The above statements should be retained for at least six years.

For the purpose of generating additional income, \$20,000 was transferred from the checking account to a savings account in 1972. Interest earned on this amount through December 31, 1978 amounted to \$8,596.78. This income has not yet, and should be, distributed to the applicable individual funds.

In 1951, all fund assets were converted to investment shares. At that time, the balances of the individual funds, including income earned from the date of creation to 1951 of \$4,105.99, were recorded in the investment ledger as principal, resulting in an overstatement of principal and understatement of interest by the same amount. A correction in the form of reallocation of both is reflected in Exhibit D-2. We recommend that an adjustment to the correct principal and income amount be made for each of the affected funds.

Tax Deeds:

As disclosed in the notes to financial statements, property which had been tax saled has not been deeded to lien holder, as provided by State Statutes. We direct your attention to R.S.A. 80:38, which specifies that; "...the collector, after two years from the sale, shall execute to the purchaser, his heirs or assigns, a deed of the land so sold and not redeemed."

Inventory of Fixed Assets:

There is currently on file with the Town, information regarding each piece of equipment in separate manila folders, and all real property owned by the Town is recorded on individual assessment cards. It is suggested that each item of the fixed assets category be supported by a ledger card, containing all pertinent information.

The value of fixed assets for all municipalities is substantial and usually far greater in value than the current assets; hence, adequate accounting procedures and records for fixed assets are essential to the protective custody of governmental property.

Troy Water Department:

Because of material weaknesses in the Department's system of internal accounting control, the scope of audit was considerably expanded. It should be noted, however, that the cost of implementing an adequate system of internal control would by far exceed the benefits derived by such implementation.

Our examination disclosed the following deficiencies in the operation and accounting of the Water Department:

1. The Water Department does not maintain fixed assets records as prescribed by generally accepted accounting principles. Fixed assets constitute the source of the enterprise's earning power, and their valuation is of paramount importance in the determination of rate structures under which consumers are charged for services rendered. In addition, said assets of the Water Department were found to be devoid of any form of insurance coverage.
2. Bills to be paid are currently approved by the superintendent, and not by the Commissioners. The authority to approve said bills or invoices is vested in the Commissioners in their capacity of the Department's Managers, as set forth in Section 4 of the Special Legislative Act establishing the Department in 1915.
3. Services rendered, exclusive of water service billings, are charged at cost, without consideration of indirect expenses such as payroll taxes and health insurance premiums. We suggest that a predetermined overhead rate be applied in the billing of said services.

Since the Department is a separate and distinct fund of the Town, it should be billed by the General Fund for services provided to it, such as water hydrants and use of Town Office facilities.

Troy Water Department: (Continued)

4. Annually, the Town raises by taxation, appropriations for the maintenance and operation of the Water Department, which are deposited to the Department's checking account. Water rent receipts are remitted directly to the Town Treasurer and are deposited in the Town's general fund. Since the Water Department is classified as an enterprise fund, established to account for the financing of self-supporting activities, we recommend the discontinuance of this practice. The receipt of water rents should remain in the Department to be applied against operating expenses. The voters at the annual Town Meeting will still be required to authorize appropriations for the Water Department, but such appropriations will be funded either by the Department's own operating revenues, by contributions in aid of construction, or by long-term borrowing.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 71-A, Section 21, require that the Auditor's summary of findings and recommendations shall be published in the next annual report of the Town. Publication of the Exhibits contained in this audit report is optional at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen. This letter, however, must be published in its entirety.

We extend our thanks to the officials and employees of the Town of Troy for their assistance during the course of the audit.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

As Troy is entering another decade, we can only hope it will be quiet and peaceful with moderate growth and a new industry to increase our industrial tax base. The past decade had some "ups and downs." All of us can recall with a smile the "ups" and we can pass off the "downs" with a grimace and pray that some we experienced will never come our way again.

The selectmen wish to pay a special tribute to the fire department for some very innovative money-saving schemes that were used. The Seagraves fire truck was rebuilt like new for about 2,000 of non-taxpayers money. This is due to the volunteers who serve breakfast every Saturday along with a few other money raising schemes. Many pitched in to build a new addition to the fire station; tax money was used for materials but most of the labor was gratis. We can be most grateful for such an excellent volunteer department, especially when we think back to some of the super alarm responses that were made - at least four saves with a minimum of structural damage.

The past year the highway department rebuilt about 1,000 feet of Bigelow Hill Road. This comprised digging the road, starting with a new base, and preparing the road for a new type of road surfacing material which was laid by Drugg Construction. We bring this to your attention to show what the cost is now to rebuild town roads. Roughly we used up the accumulated TRA money of \$9,000.00 and spent the special highway subsidy received this year of \$6,100.00. At the present time, the cheapest oil we can buy for the roads is 86 cents a gallon. The state now estimates that to rebuild a mile of road as cheap as possible will cost about \$100,000.00 a mile. This has to be considered when we consider trying to smooth out South Street, West Hill Road and Mackey Road. As of this date, the smoothest road outside of town remains Richmond Road, a dirt road.

In the future construction of the sewer, we are doing our best to have the contracts written to pave the roads when pipe is laid, not just to patch.

The Sanitary Landfill now comes under the highway dept. Mr. Arthur Hurst is in charge of the landfill operation. For the past year he has done an excellent job for the town and is responsible for the landfill operation meeting the requirements set by the State of New Hampshire. Mr. Hurst is responsible for the overseeing of where the different types of materials have to be placed, what can be burned and where, the selling of recyclable materials and he has the backing of the selectmen in his operation of the landfill.

We know that our cost for running the landfill is one of the

lowest in the state and most of this is due to Mr. Hurst.

He asks that people try to recycle more and deposit the papers and bottles at places provided. This helps expand the life of the landfill and realizes more revenue for the town.

Roger Smith stepped down as superintendent of the water department during the spring and for personal reasons decided not to file for town Treasurer for another term. We owe Roger a huge vote of thanks for his many years of dedicated public service to this town and its people.

The public service activities have continued. All contributed to a better town. Among these was the second annual Arts Festival, continued productions by the Troy Community Theater and the Senior Citizens are more active than ever before.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT GAY-KIMBALL LIBRARY

Evidentially our new hours are an improvement. The first day in September that we opened earlier in the afternoon our circulation figures zoomed past 100, and the same thing happened again in October.

The summer reading program was a success. Over 40 youngsters enrolled in the "Trail Ride;" a board game made by Mrs. Patty Packard, the Nelson librarian. Two toddlers began to learn to read. Thanks to Mrs. Patty Condon for making the ribbons. One was earned for every ten books read.

Some high school students have taken advantage of our new policy which extends the use of the Ripley room to include them, but too few older citizens come just for reading. You are always welcome when the library is open.

We were featured in a slide-tape presentation called "Looking Up" to be shown throughout New Hampshire. It is about the current and future use of libraries throughout the state. We were chosen because we demonstrate what a small public library can offer to the business community.

One of the nicest things that happened this year was to discover concrete evidence of the good will that exists towards the

library. An anonymous gift of \$100.00 was donated by a well-wisher. Bookshelves honoring the memory of Mildred Tichnor Stone, who died May 24, 1968 at age 79, were purchased and placed in the children's room. A plaque on each of them bears her name and the date they were given, March 17, which was Miss Stone's birthday. She was a small, dainty woman with black hair until it turned white in her twenties. Blind at 42 and physically deformed, she learned Braille, and then taught herself advanced Braille and how to use the telephone. She gave mandolin and piano lessons as well as taught Sunday school to the juniors. She loved cats, picnics and the out of doors. Miss Stone was remarkably self sufficient, endowed with a remarkable memory for facts and was a great reader. Because she herself was a charitable woman it is fitting that this gift carries her name, and we are most appreciative and pleased to be remembered in this very special way.

Our hours are: Tuesday and Wednesday 3:00 - 7:30, Thursday 1:30 - 7:30 and Saturday 2:00 - 5:00. Look for announcements of hours changes or other happenings at the library in the Co-op news notes in the Keene Shopper the first Wednesday of every month.

Many thanks to those who have donated their time and books to us during the year.

REPORT OF THE TROY WATER WORKS

This past year the Water Department was unable to complete some of the planned work, such as; the cleaning of the reservoir, the installation of an eight-inch valve on Mill Street and the well project.

In the coming year, around the middle of May or the first part of June, the reservoir must be cleaned. It cannot be put off a second year. Also, two valves should be installed this year: one on Mill Street and one on Monadnock Street. These valves will be used to shift the flow of water from one side of town to the other. This valve will also help keep water in as much of the main lines as possible. This will mean fewer customers will be without water when work is required.

In regard to the well project: The company we were working with on the test well didn't want to take part in the project. They suggested that a local firm be hired. One local firm was recommended, but after studying and checking around, it was decided not to hire them. We did not get back to this project. In December we asked the Selectmen if the funds could be held over. We were informed that a Geological Survey was in the works, and that it might help locate a good well site. It was decided to let the funds return to the Town, and wait to see if the Survey could turn up a good site.

In the coming year the Water Department will be holding public hearings on water rental rates. This will be your opportunity to ask questions and make suggestions.

TROY FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

Four major fires struck residential homes this past year. One, a trailer, was a complete loss; but the other three, although heavily damaged by fire, were saved because of the quick response and professional action demonstrated by the firemen.

Two of the above mentioned fires along with six partition fires were the direct result of poorly installed wood stoves.

Because of the disastrous winter storm two years ago and at the request of the Civil Defense Director, William Matson, the department has set up a four wheel drive vehicle to carry home heating oil and an electric generator. This equipment will be ready for use if a similar event happens again.

With the completion of the addition to the fire station (which should take place this spring), we will be able to offer emergency shelter to anyone who may need it during these times.

Members of the department will be undertaking to remodel the kitchen and meeting rooms at the fire station this year. They have already raised the money for the project.

Two of the department's vehicles have been repainted this past year. In the case of the Seagrave, a new and larger water tank was added, too, making it a more effective piece of fire fighting equipment. We would like to thank the members of the department who worked on the project and Kingsbury Machine Tool Company of Keene who built the tank for us.

This winter has been unusual because of the lack of snow fall and could lead to problems this spring. Woods and fields will be very dry if no snow or rain is received during the time it takes them to turn green. Grass and brush fires may occur more often this year. Caution will have to be used by people in this area.

Some town's people have asked where should they place smoke detectors in their home. The accompanying diagrams may help to answer these questions.

Where to locate the basic smoke detector

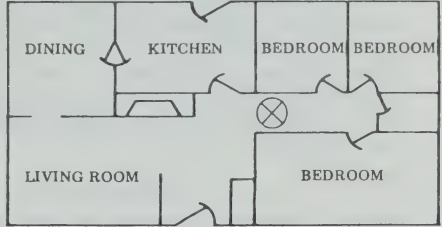


Figure 1. A basic smoke detector (indicated by cross) shall be located between the sleeping area and the rest of the house.

The major threat from fire in a dwelling is at night when everyone is asleep. The principal threat to persons in sleeping areas comes from fires in the remainder of the house, therefore, basic smoke detector(s) are best located between the bedroom areas and the rest of the house. In homes with only one bedroom area on one floor, the basic smoke detector shall be located as shown in Figure 1.

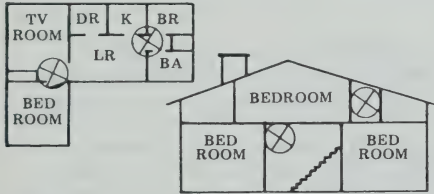


Figure 2. In homes with more than one sleeping area, a smoke detector (indicated by cross) should be provided to protect each.

Homes with more than one bedroom

In homes with more than one sleeping area or with bedrooms on more than one floor, more than one basic smoke detector will be needed as shown in Figure 2. Location of the smoke detector outside the bedrooms presupposes that the occupants sleep with their doors shut to provide a barrier to the smoke thus gaining additional seconds for escape.

Homes with stairways

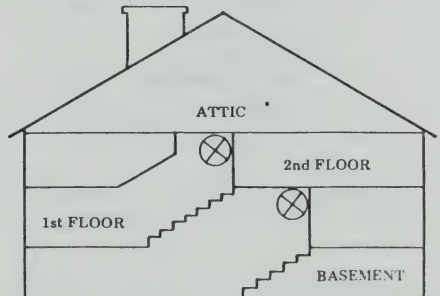


Figure 3. In homes with stairs a smoke detector (indicated by cross) should be at the head (top) of each.

Most homes have one or more stairs. Heat from fire will carry smoke and toxic gases upward into stairs. A smoke detector is needed at the head (top) of each stairs including the basement as shown in Figure 3. Stairs are usually a common path of exit and must be preserved as a possible escape route. Alternate escape routes should be planned and practiced during a fire drill at home. Note: A smoke detector is not required in stairs going to unoccupied areas, e.g. attic.

IMPORTANT NOTE: Above examples illustrate minimum smoke detection requirements in residential units. Additional smoke detectors or an early warning fire detection system should be considered.

TROY POLICE DEPARTMENT

As we enter a new decade we must accept the changes the 80's will bring concerning both the Town of Troy and the Police Department.

As of January 1, 1980, new state legislation has been passed which makes it mandatory for all part-time police officers to be registered and certified by the State of New Hampshire. This means that the town will have to make available funds for the required courses and training. The state's goal is to have all part-time officers certified by 1983, thereby raising the standards of part-time officers thru-out the state. The day of the "volunteer" police officer will be in the past and we shall all benefit from this change.

Growth has affected the town of Troy and will continue to do so. We are situated in Southwestern New Hampshire, an area that has seen enormous growth in the last few years. Troy has welcomed the wife of the Vice President of the United States and has seen the construction of a branch of The Monadnock Bank, something that will mean additional responsibilities for the police department in this town.

In my first year as Chief of Police our major case count was 115 cases (major incidences, felonies, and misdemeanors); in 1978 it was 65 cases and 1979 only 48 cases. The figures have decreased due to a constant effort on the part of all men now serving with the police department. I feel the men deserve much appreciation for the dedication and energy they bring to the job. I believe that the entire town has benefited from its "new reputation" one that is somewhat different than that of 3 years ago.

As indicated by the above statistics, the Animal Control Officer's responsibilities and activities are increasing yearly. More and more complaints are received of dogs running loose as well as problems with other animals.

New Hampshire State requires that every owner or keeper of a dog, three months old or over shall annually on or before April 30th, cause it to be registered, numbered, described and licensed for one year from the first day of the ensuing May.

Records of the Town Clerk show a noted decrease in the number of licenses issued, yet the dog population is on the increase. The licensing of dogs helps the Town of Troy in two ways.

1. We receive income for the Town which helps in defraying the expenses of the Animal Control Officer's activities.

2. The dog is readily identifiable by its tag which enables the Animal Control Officer to return the dog to its home rather than to the holding area or Humane Society.

The Town of Troy, as voted on by the people, has a leash law ordinance. This law requires the licensing of dogs whether they are tied or house dogs.

The Selectmen and Animal Control Officer request that the owners and keepers of animals in the Town of Troy abide by the laws that have been established and respect the rights of all residents of the Town of Troy.

PUBLIC WELFARE DEPARTMENT

The assistance provided by this department to qualified welfare recipients continues to be unpredictable. Although this department has managed, in the past year, to operate well within its budget, it is impossible to determine how many will apply for aid during 1980.

Aside from this department's obligations as established by state welfare and the court system, this department continues to investigate each applicant prior to administering town aid. In some instances, employment has been offered to able-bodied persons in lieu of welfare aids. This has proven successful. If applicants refuse employment, they are not qualified as welfare recipients.

1979 EXPENDITURES

Payment to State of New Hampshire for town's share of aid to permanently and totally disabled, old age assistance, nursing and medical care, amounted to \$5,482.21.

Paid to Cheshire County commissioners for food vouchers to recipients whose settlements were responsibility of Troy, \$205.00

Paid by town for foster homes, food, fuel, utilities, septic system repair, rent, rehabilitation and administration amounted to \$5,792.52.

Repaid to the town by welfare recipient, \$20.00.

Total expenditures for 1979, \$11,459.73.

TOWN OF TROY SEWER PROJECT

To bring the residents of Troy somewhat up to date on the progress of the Sewer Project for the town of Troy, we enter this short update. Following this up date are two schedules, one for the sewer contracts (the sewer pipes) and the second, the schedule for the sewer treatment plant.

As of this date, the design work for the sewer pipes and the blueprints have been furnished. Hopefully the actual construction of the contracts 7, 9, 10, and 11 will begin in August 1980. These contracts all deal with the sewer pipes and the pump station which is required at the far end of school street.

By looking at the prepared schedule, you can see that there are several kinds of permits required, reviews to be accomplished and many meetings and much paper work involved.

The second contract for redesign of the treatment plant (which is being done now) and construction of the plant in April 1981 we hope will be on schedule.

Redesign of the treatment plant is being done because now we do not need the sophisticated plant that was originally required by E.P.A. (Federal). Instead we will have a simple secondary plant that in the long run will be cheaper to build, cheaper to operate and to maintain. Basically, the simpler system will need only a part-time operator; this will cut expenses tremendously.

Because of a change in the laws affecting Municipal Budget Towns, which is the way Troy's finances are governed, we will be required to hold a special town meeting probably in late March or early in April to revote the article for the Sewer Lands. There will be a public hearing before the meeting; we urge everyone to come.

The funding for the Sewer remains the same; 75% by the Federal government, 20% by the State and 5% by the Town. We are still responsible for certain lateral pipes that are not fundable but are our own cost.

The selectmen have been working with Farmers' Home Administration through Senator John A. Durkin, who has been of tremendous help to us in solving problems and getting assistance. As of now we are almost sure of "grants" to the town of 300,000 in 1980, 400,000, 1981 and 300,000 in 1982 to assist us on our part of the project. These depend on "if" the federal government keeps the money coming to F.H.A. The government agencies and Senator Durkin know we are in the sewer business and are contacted frequently to remind them.

At the public hearing there will be more information about the steps we want to take and how we are handling the getting of funds and grants to reduce the expense of the Town and the people.

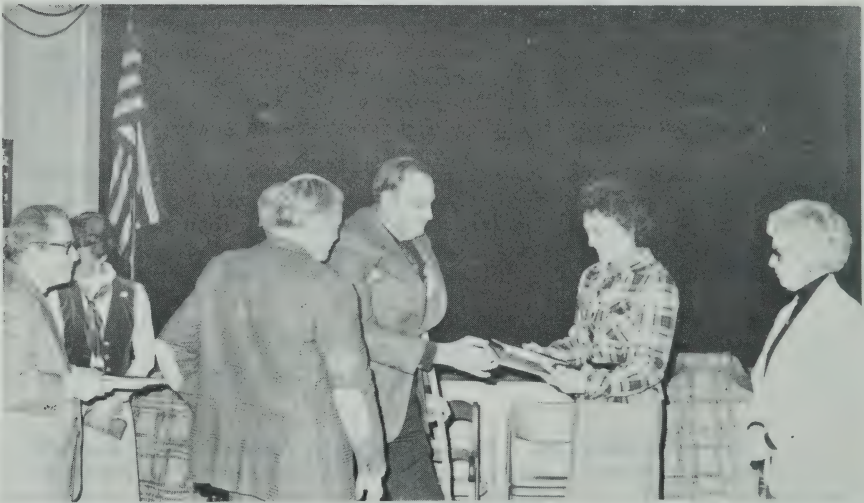
As of now, we are at the top of the list in the state to start construction in 1980. Many other towns are not and have been pushed back.

The main point we want to make is that the sooner we start the less expensive it will be.

With inflation we can estimate that if we delay or get held up for a few years, we can add about \$900,000 a year to the total cost.

We urge you to come to the public hearings that will be held soon after this year's town meeting.

ACTIVITIES OF YOUR REGIONAL PLANNING
COMMISSION IN 1979

Calendar year 1979 was a big one for Commissioners and staff of the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. It included major progress on master planning programs in 17 of the 29 member towns, development of citizens advisory groups in many of these towns, providing technical assistance for new zoning regulations in two communities, undertaking historic inventories in five towns, preparation of an Historic Manual for the State of New Hampshire, and the implementation of a mass transit system for the City of Keene.

Programs currently funded or being proposed include an economic profile of the Region, an energy "outreach" program, sub-regional coordination of plans and programs, and a water resources inventory program.

These activities have required daily contact with a number of communities, monthly and semi-monthly meetings with town boards and citizen advisory groups, and of course, special meetings in the Region and elsewhere throughout the State.

The Town of Troy has benefited directly from a number of Commission work program activities. The Basic Studies Report of the Town's Comprehensive Plan has been completed along with the necessary maps and charts. A citizen's advisory group has been formed to provide community input into the completion of the plan. In previous years, other work elements have been produced specifically for the Town of Troy. These include a Hydrology Study (1978), examining the Town's water resources and an Analysis of Government Expenditures (1978).

In the upcoming year, the Commission proposes to work towards the expansion of Keene's mass transit system to include service to the Town of Troy and other nearby communities. Furthermore, the Commission anticipates a successful application to the U.S. Department of Energy for funds to work on energy related issues in a sub-region which includes the Town of Troy. This work is of course, in addition to the Regional Planning Commission's commitment to assisting Troy in the completion of its Comprehensive Plan.

Commission meetings, themselves, have included programs having to do with housing; State highway improvements; information meetings about Class VI roads, variances, special exceptions and other zoning and planning matters; economic development; and a review of legislative changes to enabling legislation.

The Commission has hosted the annual law lecture series and will host the Annual Meeting of the State's Regional Planning Commis-

ioners this Spring. In addition, the staff and the Executive Committee play a part in the review process for Federal funding programs. The Executive Director is Catherine M. Larson, who heads a staff of nine, plus several interns. She also serves on the Governor's Council on Growth and plays an active role in providing information about regional planning to many civic and citizens groups.

Bi-monthly meetings, open to the public, are held regularly in Marlborough and Peterborough. Each town is entitled to two Regional Planning Commissioners (three from the City of Keene), to represent it. A six-member Executive Committee, elected from the Board of Commissioners, provides overall supervision of the program and staff.

Frank Dierauf, of Greenfield, is the current Chairman of the Commission and has stated on several occasions that the staff of the Commission is the staff of each of its member towns and provides full-time, technical capability in planning, zoning, subdivision and many other matters.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION - ANNUAL REPORT

The Conservation Commission meets the third Thursday of the month at 7:30 PM at the Town Hall. Members currently serving the commission are Brad Beaudoin, Charles Hannah, Bill Lake, Robert Harkins, Barrett Ripley, John Callahan, Selectman Representative, George Foskett, Secretary, and Peter Howe, Chairman. We have asked the Selectmen to appoint three additional members to serve in 1980.

The Commission has been working with the Planning Board to put forth our recommendations into the master plan that is currently being prepared. We are working with the N. H. Association of Conservation Commissions to make suitable proposals for the protection of Troy's wetlands and other natural areas.

We have been working with the N. H. Solid Waste Management Commission to monitor any potential problems within Troy's watershed. Solid Waste Management has recommended a plan to continue close monitoring in the future. This plan is being carried out at this time.

In 1980 we plan to continue our current programs and do further work in areas relating to conservation. Any citizen who is interested in conservation is invited to attend our meetings.

Meetings will be held this spring with Southwestern Regional Planning Commission, the Troy Planning Board and hopefully the interested residents of Troy to finalize the Master Plan which will be presented to the people at the next town meeting.

The town is fortunate to have a conservation commission and an industrial development committee to watch out for the interests of the Town and its residents.

At present the Conservation Commission is very active, and the industrial development committee is ready to become involved with the development of the Master Plan and the construction of the sewer.

We feel that when the sewer is operating in the near future Troy will have need for and space for some type of new industry which will broaden our tax base and help keep our property taxes within the reach of the average property owner.

We want to urge residents to attend the future meetings of the Planning Board when the Master Plan is being discussed, to become involved and to participate in designing this plan. We need the advice of residents and taxpayers on how to guide the future growth of Troy.

BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The Board of Adjustment was created to hear petitions for variances and special exceptions to the zoning ordinance and issue the permits to operate mobile home parks.

The Board holds regular business meetings on the second Tuesday of January, April, July, and October at 7:30 p.m. in the Town Hall. Hearings of petitions for variances and special exceptions are held upon request.

All meetings and hearings are open to the public and everyone is urged to attend.
