THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 10:00 A.M. TO 7:00 P.M.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Wakefield in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Paul School in said Wakefield on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2. Are you in favor of the adoption of the amendment to the existing Town Building Code as proposed by the Planning Board which would adopt the Building Officials and Code Administrator's National Building Code, delete sections of the current ordinance which would conflict with provisions of the BOCA code, and revise the method of compensation of the Building Inspector?

ARTICLE 3. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: this amendment would clarify the provisions for lower minimum lot requirements in the Residential 1 Zone on lots serviced by Town sewer or Sanbornville Precinct water?

ARTICLE 4. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: this amendment would clarify the provisions for lower minimum lot requirements in the Agricultural Zone on lots serviced by Town sewer or Sanbornville Precinct water?

ARTICLE 5. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: add to Article III.3 to create an Aquifer Conservation District which would provide for the protection of the Town's water resources from contamination by polluting, hazardous, or toxic materials by restricting certain uses of property found within the district?

ARTICLE 6. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No.4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: add to Article III.3 to create a Wetlands Conservation District which would control and guide the use of land areas which have been found to be subjected to highwater tables for extended periods of time?

ARTICLE 7. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 5 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: this amendment would expand and define the Permitted Uses in all zones?

ARTICLE 8. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No.6 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: this amendment would establish provisions for the development of local earth excavation regulations?

ARTICLE 9. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No.7 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: this amendment would establish provisions for and define Special Exceptions in the Business & Commercial, Light Industrial, and Agricultural Zones? This amendment includes an allowance for earth excavation by special exception in the Agricultural zone.

ARTICLE 10. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No.8 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: this amendment would delete Lot 33 on Tax Map 28 from the Business & Commercial Zone and add it to the Light Industrial Zone?

ARTICLE 11. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No.9 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: amend Article VI, paragraph 10 so as to redefine 'Light Industrial Uses'?

ARTICLE 12. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No.10 as proposed by the Petition of the voters of this Town for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: under Residential 2, section 3, minimum lot requirements section 2, require an additional twenty-five feet for each dwelling planned over four or for a group development the provision of six linear feet per individual for whom the facility is proposed? (APPROVED BY THE PLANNING BOARD)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Paul School in said Wakefield on Saturday, the eighteenth day of March next at seven o'clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of two hundred sixteen thousand, seven hundred sixty-two dollars (\$216,762) for the purchase of two new fire trucks, authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply the existing trucks, authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply the existing East Wakefield Fire Truck Capital Reserve funds of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) plus interest to said purchase and issue and negotiate bonds and notes, in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, NH RSA 33, as amended, for the balance of the appropriation; determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the

best interests of the Town of Wakefield. (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) (Written secret ballot - 2/3rds vote required for approval)

ARTICLE 14. Are you in favor of entering into a contract with the Union Fire Precinct to furnish fire protection for the rest of the Town outside the Precinct in the amount of fourteen thousand three hundred sixty-eight dollars (\$14,368)? (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fourteen thousand dollars (\$14,000) for the purchase of a police cruiser. (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy thousand dollars (\$70,000) for the purchase of a highway loader. (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand, four hundred dollars (\$5,400) for the purchase of a plow and wing for the Highway Department. (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirteen thousand dollars (\$13,000) for the purchase of a used grader for the Highway Department. (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five thousand, five hundred forty dollars (\$25,540) for Town Hall maintenance/renovations. (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand, three hundred thirty dollars (\$3,330) for driveway paving at the East Wakefield station. (NOT RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand, five hundred dollars (\$5,500) so as to use State Highway Safety Grant monies. (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000) to add to the existing Capital Reserve fund for the future cleanup and closing of the Wakefield Landfill site. (BUDGET COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS \$62,000)

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one dollar (\$1) to add to the existing Capital Reserve fund for the future purchase of a fire truck for the East Wakefield Station. (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty-five thousand dollars and 00/100 (\$55,000) to lease two (2) fire trucks for one year. The lease payments may be applied toward the purchase price of said trucks. (BY PETITION) (NOT RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred thousand dollars and 00/100 (\$100,000) to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of fire trucks. (BY PETITION) (NOT RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$295.00 to assist the Family Health Centre. (BY PETITION) (NOT RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town of Wakefield will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) for THE CENTER OF HOPE, INC. (BY PETITION) (NOT RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will allow alcoholic beverages to be consumed at the Wakefield Fire Station for the purpose of fund raisers, such as a dance, etc. The sponsor will provide all liability insurance and police protection for the event. (BY PETITION)

ARTICLE 29. Are you in favor of changing the name of the previously designated 'Wakefield Municipal Building' to the 'Wakefield Fire Station'?

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to instruct its Selectmen to search for and appoint an expert highway agent, who, under the direction of the Selectmen, shall have the same power and perform the same duties as a highway agent elected by the Town, effective March 1990, as provided for in NHRSA 231:64.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to rescind its action of March, 1978 in accordance with NHRSA 41:47 and authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint the Chief of Police, effective March 1990, in accordance with NHRSA 105:1.

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Planning Board to prepare and amend a recommended program of municipal capital improvement projects in accordance with NHRSA 674:5-8.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Planning Board, in accordance with NHRSA 674:43-44, to review and approve or disapprove site plans for the development or change or expansion of use of tracts for

nonresidential uses or for multi-family dwelling units, whether or not such development includes a subdivision or resubdivision of the site, and instruct the Town Clerk to file with the Carroll County Registry of Deeds a certificate of notice showing that the Planning Board has been so authorized, giving the date of such authorization.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed by public auction (or advertised sealed bid) or in such a manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to pay Town bills in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to make application for and to receive and expend, in the name of the Town, such advances, grant-in-aid or other funds for municipal purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government and/or separate agencies and/or other sources, in accord with provision of NHRSA 31:95B.

ARTICLE 37. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of (\$1,677,633.) one million, six hundred seventy-seven thousand, six hundred thirty-three dollars and no cents, inclusive of previously approved individual warrant articles, to defray town charges as submitted by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 38. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Auditor's Report on Financial Presentation

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen
Town of Wakefield
Wakefield, New Hampshire

We have examined the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Wakefield as of and for the year ended December 31, 1987, as listed in the table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Assets Account Group is not known.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Town of Wakefield at December 31, 1987, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements and schedule listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Wakefield. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

Additional Auditor's Note

The accounts of the Town of Wakefield for the year of 1988 have been examined by the independent auditing firm of Carri, Plodzick, & Sanderson of Concord, NH. Their report, although not available in time to be printed in this report, will be available for public inspection at the Selectmen's office by the end of March.

Wakefield Area Ambulance Report

The Wakefield Area Ambulance Corps responded to 243 calls during 1988, representing an increase of 14% over 1987. These included 91 motor and water accidents, 159 home accidents and sudden illnesses, 22 fire standbys. A total of 180 patients were transported to the hospital, 8 responses were for mutual aid to other communities, and 9 responses were for mutual aid to Wakefield.

We currently have 17 members of which 10 are Emergency Medical Technicians. We have 5 members who are Advanced First Aid qualified, of whom 3 members have expressed an interest in the next EMT course to be held in our area. During 1988, the Corps members logged 1616 hours of voluntary man hours on ambulance calls; this does not include the many hours of monthly training, courses at Huggins Hospital, and the one day continuing basic, advanced, or refresher courses. Presently 5 EMTs are being trained at Huggins Hospital under the direction of Dr. Andes for Intravenous and Advanced Life Support for which the Corps will probably be licensed in 1989.

Statistics proved this year that we responded to more calls on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays, and that the busiest months were May through September.

The Wakefield Ambulance Association, made up of interested townspeople and Corps members, donated over \$5,000 in equipment from Memorial Donations, regular donations and regular sponsored money raising activities. This includes an Advanced Blood Pressure and pulse monitoring instrument by the Promise Family. The Association also went halves with the Fire Association to purchase the illuminated sign to inform the community of social events.

The Association also recently purchased a micro-wave oven for the fire station.

Any person who would like to help the ambulance, but has no desire to be a medical attendant, could do so by joining the association. Any interested person can call Charlotte Palmer.

Please remember the Corps still holds a monthly Blood Pressure Clinic, the First Wednesday of each month at the Town Hall from 10:00 AM till noon. Anyone is welcome to come in and have their blood pressure checked free of charge.

We are always looking for new people to become Corps members. Any interested person can call the Selectmen's Office or get in touch with a Corps member. The more people we have, the better job we can do for Wakefield residents and visitors when they need medical assistance.

1. Pine River Road - reconstruction of approximately 3700 feet, and chip seal surfacing of that section as well as the 2500 foot section which was rebuilt in 1987.
2. Canal Road - reconstruction of 3000 feet, shimming of approximately 3300 feet, and chip seal surfacing of the entire road.
3. Stoneham Road - shimmed a small section.
4. A small amount of gravel resurfacing was done on Oak Hill Road, Brackett Road and Pray Hill Road.
5. Bonnyman Road, Randall Drive, Mountain View Drive, Hill Top Drive and Sanborn Road were sealed.
6. Brush was cut back within the rights-of-way on Old Stage Road, Fellows Road, Acton Ridge Road.
7. Ditching and drainage work was done on Garney Road, Willey Road, Pray Hill Road, Access Road, Wansor Road, Pond Road, and Brackett Road.

Due to the addition of another full time position on the Highway crew in March of 1988, the Department was able to complete more brushing, ditching and drainage work than was originally scheduled, and was better able to keep up with normal maintenance.

For 1988 eleven applications were presented for public hearings. One application was for a gravel operation, one was for a commercial office park, and the other nine were in connection with housing. Three variances were granted at the initial hearing; one applicant was given a six month continuation of the hearing in order to produce needed evidence, and six requests for variances were denied. Of the six that were denied, four applicants applied for a rehearing. Rehearings were denied in three cases because in the Board's opinion, no new evidence was presented. One rehearing was held at which the variance was granted.

The responsibility of the Zoning Board of Adjustment is to act only in accordance with state regulations, and local zoning ordinances. This board does not have the power to change the zoning ordinances. Your ZBA hears appeals and administers special provisions by the ordinance, dealing with variances, special exceptions, and administrative decisions.

Wakefield Historic District Commission

The Wakefield Historic District Commission continued to carry the Town's program celebrating the Bicentennial of our Constitution. Our Tree Planting nationally proclaimed as the "Plant a Living Legacy" program gained special community prominence and was indeed successful. Mr. William Twombly generously gave free rock maples to all who chose to plant them, Mr. Artis Remick gave free concolor firs and balsam trees and Mr. Joseph Ruma discounted all trees to those who participated in the program. In all 63 properties were involved and land owners reminded us of the old adage "He who plants a tree, loves others besides himself."

All of this took place the week of April 18, 1988. These residents were all honored with official "Plant A Living Legacy" Certificates on Pride Day. On April 21 the Commission planted trees at the East Wakefield Firehouse, the Town Hall, the Paul School, the Union School and at the Little Red Schoolhouse—the meeting place of the Wakefield-Brookfield Historical Society. These trees will have appropriate plaques placed near them.

Many of the School children participated in Bicentennial projects, building an awareness of our freedom and opportunities in the United States, and in turn in Wakefield. The young people were appropriately recognized for their historic efforts and accomplishments as well. One group of the Paul School Junior High students cleaned the brush, leaves and debris from the Town Pound. Another group of children from the elementary grades planted seeds, nurtured them and then planted the resulting flowers in front of the Town Hall. Everyone enjoyed their blossoms all summer long. Another class planted flowers at the School while still another class painted the picnic tables at the Town Beach—and there were other equally worthwhile activities by other classes, reminding us all once again of the greatness of our Country and especially of Wakefield after 200 years with the same Constitution. We must recognize our Wakefield Chamber of Commerce which also joined in the Celebration and sponsored some very exciting contests.

The Historic District Commission's float in the Pride Day Parade depicted the signing of the Constitution in 1788.

Our two year long program of events closed on June 21, 1988, the date when two hundred years earlier, New Hampshire, as the necessary ninth state, ratified the Constitution, making it the law of the land. On that day, Ellen Yeaton Perry, a descendent of Wakefield's Samuel Yeaton and his son Captain Samuel Yeaton, spoke at a public meeting in the Town hall on "Why Celebrate the Constitution." At the same time, with the help of the New Hampshire Council for the Humanities, the Commission sponsored an Exhibit—"The Blessings of Liberty."

Since then we have been meeting to discuss concerns of historic interest in Wakefield and we are especially pleased to report that the Wakefield Historic Area has been included in a book "A Guide to National Register Properties in the Lakes Region." Twenty-seven structures in our Town are on the National Register of Historic Places—a statistic so many towns would like to equal. These are all National Treasures. Every person in Wakefield should stand tall and be so proud to realize that these are a part of our Town.

Report of Town Forest Fire Warden and State Forest Ranger

Between July 1987 and June 1988, we experienced more fires than normal. The three leading causes of forest fires were again children, fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden and debris burning. All causes are preventable, but only with **your** help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden, Concord Forest Protection Headquarters at (603) 271-2217, or local Forest Ranger.

On January 1, 1989, the Deceptive Forestry Business Practices Law (RSA 224:54) goes into effect. This law, in summary, states that a person is guilty of a misdemeanor if, in the course of buying or selling a forest product, uses a false weight or measure for falsely determining any quality or quantity of a forest product. For more information, contact one of the persons mentioned above.
