The meeting was called at 11:00 A. M., January 29, 1942.

After being shown the new Annex by the Commissioners, the Delegation went to the County Farm. After a fine turkey dinner, Sam Philbrick moved that a rising vote of thanks be given Mr. and Mrs. Sanborn for the excellent dinner.

Chairman Rollins called on Charles Hopkins for a reading of the budget for the present year.

Elmer Tilton then asked for an explanation of the expenses of the Commissioners which was given by Mr. Colby. Also, the appropriation for the County Farm was explained by Mr. Colby. Explanations of the cost of the Annex to the Court House were made by Chairman Rollins.

A request for an explanation of the deficit at the Airport was made by Elmer Tilton; it was then explained that this was on account of land purchased for the building of more roads.

Mr. Colby then mentioned the repairing of the chair tow and the expense of the maintenance.

Mr. Lydiard explained the expense of the Map Project, and Mr. Colby explained further in relation to this.

It was moved by David O'Shan and seconded by Mr. Philbrick, that the Delegation accept the budget as recommended, the vote was unanimously in the affirmative.

Mr. Colby asked for a discussion in regard to two purchases of coal and gasoline that were made in October. This discussion referred to a \$50.00 account of purchases of coal, gas, etc. This was spoken on by Chairman Rollins, Elmer Tilton, and Commissioner Lydiard. It was moved by Charles Hopkins, seconded by Elmer Tilton, that we approve of the action of the Commissioners in the purchase of the coal and gasoline, and that in the future they will see that this offense is not repeated. The vote was unanimously in the affirmative.

Mr. Philbrick thanked the Delegation for their co-operation in the building and improving of the road between Belmont and Laconia.

Mr. Pynn seconded by Mr. Philbrick, moved that the County Commissioners at their discretion allow at least one week vacation to the Superintendent and Matron of the County Farm. The vote was unanimously in the affirmative.

Commissioner Colby then thanked the Delegation for their co-operation.

Chairman Rollins thanks the Delegation for their splendid co-operation and friendly attitude with him through his administration.

COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

To the Citizens of Belknap County:

In compliance with the laws of the State of New Hampshire, the Commissioners of Belknap County present the annual report of the County Commissioners, Treasurer, Superintendent of Farm and House of Correction, Clerk of Superior Court, Sheriff, Solicitor, Farm Physician, Chaplain and Auditors for the year ending December 31, 1942.

For the first time in many years the cost of relief during the past year is one of the smaller items of the budget. At the airport the W.P.A. completed two of the runways and connecting roads and the airport was accepted by the Airport Authority. A school for Army and Navy candidate flyers is now being operated by Skyhaven, Inc.

All W. P. A. work in the county, except the school lunch program, ceased in October.

Belknap Area earned about Ten Thousand Dollars and the expenses were about Seventeen Thousand Dollars. This deficit is largely in the following three items which are permanent improvements of the Area;—purchase of the Kitchen and Eating Equipment, building the dam for the pond at the rear of the Recreation Building and the construction of the Viking slope and tow.

Rationing of gas and rubber has forced the closing of the Area for the duration of the war.

It is the opinion of your Commissioners that the Area in normal times is self supporting and a definite asset to our county.

Mr. and Mrs. Ned Sanborn resigned as Superintendent and Matron of the County Farm in October to take a similar position in Cheshire County.

Mr. and Mrs. Leon Flanders are now in charge. Mr. Flanders is well acquainted with his duties, having been employed at the farm for several years while Mr. Hartford was superintendent.

Rev. Frederic W. Fitzpatric of Belmont, chaplain at the County Farm has contributed a great deal to the spiritual well-being of our people and we wish to thank him for his efforts.

We extend our thanks to all those who have helped us in our efforts to make conditions better and life more pleasant for those in our care.

**DIVISION OF MUNICIPAL ACCOUNTING
STATE TAX COMMISSION**

Gentlemen:

In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 209 of the Session Laws of 1941, an audit of the accounts of Belknap County has been made by the Division of Municipal Accounting of the State Tax Commission. The period covered included the fiscal year ended December 31, 1941, and the current year from January 1 to June 30, 1942. Submitted herewith is the report of this audit, including Schedules as hereafter listed.

Scope of Audit

Included in the audit and examination were the accounts and records of the County Commissioners, County Treasurer, Clerk of Superior Court and Superintendent of the County Farm.

Finances

In order to present a comprehensive picture of the financial condition of the County during the past ten years and the changes which have occurred in this period, certain statements have been prepared and will be referred to in the comments which follow.

**Comparative Balance Sheets—1932 to 1941,
inclusive: (Schedule A)**

It will be noted that during this period the Net Debt of the County increased from \$96,099.80 to \$213,288.32. In the same period the Bonded Debt increased from \$58,500.00 to \$234,000.00.

**County Tax Apportionment—1933 to 1942,
inclusive: (Schedule B)**

The apportionment of the County tax to towns and cities during the years from 1933 to 1942, inclusive, is shown in this Schedule. The highest County tax was \$331,745.07, in 1939. From this peak it has dropped to \$168,786.77 in 1942. It is evident that the County tax levied in 1939 was considerably in excess of actual requirements, inasmuch as a cash surplus of \$60,000 was accumulated in that year. In the following year (1940) the amount of this surplus was added to estimated revenue in arriving at the County tax, reflecting the sharp decrease which took place in that year.

It is likewise apparent that the County budgets and County taxes in other years during this period were insufficient in amount to meet actual requirements. This is evidenced by the fact that it was necessary to issue refunding bonds to liquidate short term loans as follows:

**Receipts and Expenditures—1932 to 1941,
inclusive: (Schedule C)**

Summaries of receipts and expenditures, classified in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, for the years 1932 to 1941, inclusive, are presented in Schedule C.

Bonded Debt and Annual Maturities: (Schedule D)

The outstanding bonded debt of the County, as of December 31, 1941, amounted to \$234,000.00. This was made up of the balances of refunding bond

issues of 1933, 1935, 1937 and 1939, which have heretofore been referred to. Final maturities on these issues take place in the years 1943, 1945, 1948 and 1957. The bonds issued in 1933 bear an interest rate of $4\frac{3}{4}\%$ as compared to a rate of $1\frac{1}{4}\%$ for the 1939 issue.

**Appropriations and Expenditures—1941:
(Schedule I)**

A comparative statement of Appropriations and Expenditures, for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1941, is made in this Schedule. Unexpended balances of appropriations amounting to \$18,071.96, less appropriation overdrafts of \$11,895.68, resulted in a Net Budget Surplus of \$6,176.28.

It is recommended that when the County budget is made up appropriations be made on the basis of estimated gross expenditures. Income should be treated as estimated revenue in the budget. The present practice is to make appropriations on the basis of estimated net expenditures while income is credited to various appropriations.

**Accounts of Commissioners and Treasurer
(Schedules E, F, G, and H)**

All orders issued by the Commissioners and Clerk of the Superior Court during the fiscal year ended December 31, 1941, and the period from January 1 to June 30, 1942, were examined and compared with corresponding entries in the Treasurer's records. The classification of expenditures was noted. Payments made by the Commissioners were properly supported by vendors' invoices and relief orders issued by town overseers acting as agents of the County.

Totals of receipts and expenditures, as indicated by the Treasurer's records, were verified. The Treasurer's receipts for 1941 were actually overstated in the amount of \$160.97. This resulted from stopping payment on six County checks, the total of which equalled this amount. As all of these checks were recorded in the expenditures when issued, receipt entries totalling \$160.97 were made to balance the Treasurer's accounts.

The Treasurer's cash book balance as of December 31, 1941 and June 30, 1942, was in agreement with the reconciled bank balance on each of these dates.

**Clerk of the Superior Court
(Schedules K and L)**

In order that the audits of County accounts made by this Division might include the accounts of the Clerks of the Superior Court authorization of such procedure was requested of the Court. Permission was granted, under date of May 15, 1942, in a letter to the Tax Commission from Chief Justice Oscar L. Young, which reads in part as follows:

"In connection with the county audits which by law your commission is required to make, you or your representatives are hereby given permission to examine the financial records of the clerk of court in any of the counties of the state so far as they have to do with county funds."

Accordingly the accounts and records of the Clerk of Court of Belknap County were examined for the period covered by the audit of other County accounts. Court receipts were checked by source, insofar as possible, and found to be properly recorded. Court orders issued by the Clerk were

supported by invoices, vouchers and payrolls bearing the approval of a Superior Court Justice.

County Farm Accounts (Schedule M)

The Superintendent issues receipts in triplicate for all funds which he receives and remits all income from the County Farm directly to the County Treasurer. Bills rendered against the Farm, after examination, are approved by the Superintendent and sent to the Commissioners for payment. A petty cash fund of \$200.00 was set up for the Superintendent in April 1942. Out of this fund the Superintendent pays small bills in cash. The fund is reimbursed from time to time upon presentation of the proper receipted bills by the Superintendent to the Commissioners.

One check is issued to the Superintendent for each payroll period, covering the total amount of the payroll. Disbursements to individual employees are made in cash and receipts obtained which are subsequently filed with the payroll voucher.

The record of fines and costs collected from house of correction cases was examined. This consisted of duplicate receipts issued upon the collection of fines and costs and receipts from Municipal Courts to which such fines and costs were remitted. It was suggested that a cash book record of this account be kept. (Schedules N and O)

Welfare Expenditures (Schedules P and Q)

Schedule P indicates the amount expended by the County each month during the years 1940 and 1941, for all classes of relief, viz:—direct relief, old age assistance, board and care of children and sol-

diers' aid, as well as the cost of administration. Also indicated therein is the proportionate cost that each class bears in comparison to the total welfare expense expressed in terms of percentage.

Schedule Q shows the amount expended each month for old age assistance during the years 1939, 1940, 1941 and the first six months of 1942. Also shown are the number of cases and the average cost per case.

General Comments

Competitive Bidding

Chapter 108 of the Session Laws of 1941 provides that "Any purchase of equipment or materials made by a county in an amount exceeding fifty dollars shall be by competitive bidding, provided that the county commissioners by unanimous vote may waive the provisions for such bidding."

In order that the interpretation of this law might be clarified the following question was asked the Attorney-General:

"In your opinion does this act apply in cases where orders are made up of different articles, the total amount of which exceeds fifty dollars? This might apply to groceries, provisions, clothing or grain for the County Farm, medical supplies for the Hospital or any other merchandise purchased by the County".

The Attorney-General has ruled as follows:

"Your second inquiry is whether or not Laws 1941 c. 108 requiring competitive bidding in purchases made by County Commissioners applies to groceries, provisions, clothing, grain, medical supplies and other merchandise purchased by the County. The law, Public Laws c. 38 s. 7a (Laws 1941 c. 108) requires competitive bidding for 'any

purchase of equipment or materials'. The quoted phrase has no technical meaning and is to be interpreted broadly to effectuate its purpose. A narrow construction of the quoted phrase 'equipment or materials' would be contrary to the legislative intention and would emasculate the purpose of the statute. The act is intended to apply to any purchase including these purchases mentioned in your inquiry. Nor can the dictate of the statute be avoided by consciously and deliberately making consecutive purchases of less than fifty dollars in order to avoid competitive bidding. The fifty dollar limitation was intended to take care of purchases which were made occasionally and was not intended to be a device by which the purpose of the act could be frustrated. The statute does not define competitive bidding but it has been interpreted generally to mean a bona fide attempt to obtain offers or bids from several sources in order that the county may benefit by the lowest price. Since the statute does not determine the manner of ascertaining these offers and bids, it rests with the sound discretion of the County Commissioners as to whether the bids will be in writing and the form which they will take. In cases where competitive bidding cannot fulfill its purpose, it may be waived by unanimous vote of the County Commissioners duly recorded in their offices, together with a statement of the reasons therefor, which are open to public inspection at all reasonable hours."

There is no question therefore as to the application of this law to all County purchases of equipment or materials exceeding fifty dollars in amount.

Although not mandatory it would seem as though a more effective system could be set up if

all purchasing was done by the County Commissioners and all requests for bids would in that case be sent out from the Commissioners' office. Suggested forms for this purpose will be furnished by this Division. It is also important that a record of all bids received and awards made be kept.

Accounting Procedure

The accounts and records of all County officials which were examined were found in good condition and the accounting procedure conformed to the uniform system prescribed by this Division. The records were very complete and accurate.

Section 31 of Chapter 211, Laws of 1939, provides that:

"Upon the completion of each audit, as herein provided, a report thereof shall be made to the proper local officials, and a copy of such report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual report of the county, city, town, school district, village district or precinct concerned."

In accordance with the provisions of this law, therefore, the text of this report and essential Schedules should be printed in the next annual County report.

We wish to express our appreciation and thanks to the County officials and their office staff for the assistance rendered while we were engaged in this audit.

REPORTS FOR YEAR 1942

REPORT OF COUNTY SOLICITOR

To the Board of County Commissioners and the Citizens of Beknap County:

At the March Term, 1942 eight indictments were returned against six persons. Five of them pled guilty and were sentenced. Trial by the court in the remaining case resulted in an acquittal. At the October Term, 1942, nine indictments were returned against nine persons. Pleas of guilty were entered in seven of these, of nolo in one, and a plea of guilty to a lesser offense was accepted by the court in another. There were two appeals to this term from the Laconia Municipal Court. One, for assault, was tried by jury and resulted in an acquittal. The second case, for resisting arrest, depended on the first and was therefore nol prossed. Of the total of seventeen indictments, six were for forgery or passing forged instruments, three were for breaking, entering and larceny, two for larceny, two for adultery, and one each for robbery, statutory rape, embezzlement and obtaining money by false pretenses. Of the seventeen offenses ten were committed in the city of Laconia and seven in other parts of the county.

In addition to prosecuting felonies this office has continued to handle the prosecution of many misdemeanor charges throughout the county, and to advise the county officials when called upon.

I have recently had occasion to recommend to the county delegation and commissioners the introduction and passage of an act of the legislature to establish the powers of the county in the operation of the Recreation Area in Gilford.

COUNTY OF BELKNAP

In ruling on the legal questions in welfare cases I have come increasingly to believe that a more uniform and orderly administrative procedure is desirable. I believe and recommend therefore that all welfare applications be made through and investigated by the welfare investigator, and that the application and report then be passed upon by your board as a whole. The first part of this recommendation should insure uniform records and orderly procedure, as for example, in the matter of forwarding affidavits to other counties and towns when the applicant is not a charge of this county. The latter part of this recommendation is a matter of your legal responsibility as a board.
