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# IN MEMORIAM REPRESENTATIVE PHILIP S. WILLEY



Philip Willey was born in West Topsham, Vt, May 20th, 1890 the son of Solomon and Rosie (Avery) Willey. He came to this section when a young man after serving in World War I. He built and operated The Comfort Cabins on Route 3 in West Campton and became head of the Northeastern Cabin Owners Association, holding this position for several years.

A veteran of World War I, he was a member of the Griggs-Wyatt Post American Legion of Meredith.

Always interested in town and state affairs, he became a State Legislator from Campton in 1949 and served as a Representative for 21 years until his death on April 12, 1968.

He served on many important committees while in Concord and was on the committee that made preparations for the dedication of Pease Air Force Base in Newington which honored the late Captain Harl Pease of Plymouth.



#### A TRIBUTE TO CAMPTON'S TOWN CLERK

STERLE A. CHENEY-Born in + Campton November 2, 1896, son of Dr. Harry A. and Sarah Cheney. Sterle attended Campton schools, graduated from Plymouth High School in 1917. Married Dorothea Hubbard in 1922. Sterle and Dorothea have two sons, Sidney L. and Harry W. Cheney, both of Campton, and six grandchildren.

Sterle started his clerking soon after high school days, working as camp clerk for Sid Tilton at Smart Brook. Then as company clerk for the Champlain Realty Co. formerly s'tuated at the present site of the Campton Pond Dam. Then to Boston as clerk messenger for the Liberty Trust Company. One winter of the city was enough for Sterle, so back to Campton and a business of his own, the S. A. Cheney Company General Store.



Leaving the storekeeping business in 1936, he went to work for Fred Emo Construction Co. in North Woodstock, N. H. for a few years, then for E. Dole & Co. during the war years. In 1945 Sterle started his own painting and decorating business which he operated until 1960, turning over same to his son Harry.

Sterle just couldn't keep away from clerking though, a job he thoroughly enjoys. Being of service to Campton as your Town Clerk and Treasurer for the last dozen years, as Precinct Treasurer for twenty years and as Financial Secretary for the Campton Baptist Church for "Umpteen" years.

Sterle's better half, Dorothea, having served twenty years on Campton's School Board, six years as Precinct Clerk and many, many committees has more than held up her half of the clerking "Combo" over the years.

Truly down-to-earth Campton Folks (as the new generation would say) Doing their "THING", to the very best of their knowledge and ability.

Just a parting story that typifies Mr. Town Clerk. Sterle was just about to leave the Plymouth Record office after a lengthy session in making final preparations for Campton's Bi-Centennial celebration in 1967, when good friend Bob Wherland said, "You seem to know quite a lot about Campton; have you lived there all your life?" Sterle said, "No - Not Yet."

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Campton in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town House in said Campton on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at two of the clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of its highways and bridges.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for Memorial Day.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50 for the White Mountain Region Association.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for the maintenance of Blair and other Cemeteries in Town.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,640 to reimburse the Campton Village Precinct for hydrant rental.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for the support of the Campton Volunteer Fire Department.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 to help with other towns in promoting "Ski 93".

12. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Town road, connecting Rte. 175 with the Depot Road in front of the former residence of Burton Pierce.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$850 for police radio facilities.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$440 for the Pemi-Baker Home Health Agency, Inc.

15. To see if the Town will vote to instruct its Planning Board to prepare a proposed zoning ordinance for the Town, after holding two public hearings and complying with the other requirements of RSA:63-A (Supp), said zoning ordinance to be submitted for approval or disapproval at the regular Town Meeting to be held in March 1970 or at a special Town meeting to be warned by the Selectmen at the request of said Planning Board.

16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a joint arrangement with the Town of Thornton, or any other group of Towns, if deemed in the best interest for the Town, to buy, lease, rent, or build dump disposal facilities.

17. To see if the Town will vote to subsidize the LaFontaine Ambulance Service, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$910, subject to approval by the other seven towns. (As requested by letter from Frederick LaFontaine.)

18. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the Pemi-Baker River regional planning agency. This agency will have membership of at least two Towns in the Pemi-Baker River area. This agency will have no jurisdiction over any matter of local affairs. It will be primarily advisory. Two members of the regional planning agency shall be from Campton to be appointed by the Selectmen.

19. If article 18 is accepted, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200 to finance studies to be conducted by the regional planning agency. These monies will be used for financing planning studies which must be approved by the regional planning agency. These funds may be used in conjunction with other State and Federal funds if available for planning purposes. The above appropriation to be used if this agency becomes operative in 1969.

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20. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of agents and officers.

21. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

# REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

New Hampshire is the fastest growing state in the northeast in terms of population increase. It is also an industrialized state and this growth is likely to continue, all of which means more families and homes. Our growing summer population is scattered throughout the state with a phenomenal increase in vacation homes.

Many new homes and practically all cottages are being located in woodlands and abandoned fields and forests crowd into the back yard of our village streets. In a state where the forests cover 86% of the land surface, it is necessary that everyone be aware all through the season, which comes with the disappearance of the snow until the snow comes again, of the need to be careful with outdoor fires and fire sources.

The following action will help:

- 1. To teach our children the danger of lighted matches.
- 2. To never discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
- 3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn
  - a. You need a written permit from the town fire warden for all debris burning except when the ground is covered with snow, Cooking fires in outdoor fireplaces or in charcoal brasiers in your own back yard is permitted on notification of the warden.
  - b. The warden is forbidden by regulation to allow burning of household rubbish on grass by householders between 9:00 A. M. and 5:00 P. M.
  - c. Have equipment on hand to control the fire before you light the match.
- 4. Promptly report any fire out of control to your fire warden or fire department.

Help to keep our town out of the fire occurrence column and save our tax dollars for useful purposes.

# SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT January 1, 1968 — January 1, 1969

The School Nurse visited the school thirty-eight times during the school year.

Inspections were made for vaccinations, signs of illness or infectious diseases, skin and scalp and hair inspections for infections in addition to general cleanliness, nutrition or orthopedic. Followup home visits were made when necessary.

First aid supplies were bought and taken to the school. First aid was given when needed while at the school.

Teeth were checked and a Dental Clinic was held in Plymouth. Twenty-eight received treatment at the Clinic.

The State Dental Hygienist visited each class room and talked on dental hygiene. She showed a film strip on Dental Health and demonstrated the proper way to brush teeth.

The Line T. B. Test was given to each first grader. The T. B. testing program is limited to the 16,000 first graders in New Hampshire schools and their family or household is tested if any have a positive reaction.

Each pupil was weighed and measured and a health record kept on each.

A Hearing and Vision Screening test was done on each and notices sent home on those who failed the test, advising to check with their family doctor.

Referrals were made to Guidance Clinics, Mental Health Clinics and Orthopedic and Sight Conservation.

The nurse attended workshops evenings, the State Teacher's Convention, school nurses' section, conferences with Director of School Health Services and held conferences with Guidance Psychologist in Concord and Social workers.

#### **REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL**

To The School Board, Superintendent of Schools, Parents, and Citizens of the Town of Campton.

I hereby submit my second annual report as Principal of Campton Central School.

September 4, 1968 marked the beginning of another school year. The enrollment of the student body has varied this year from a high of 175 to the present 164.

Some changes were made in staff assignments along with the addition of several new teachers. Mrs. Marjorie Broad is now the first grade teacher; Mrs. Phyllis Morse has Second grade, new additions to the staff include Mrs. Richard Knowles, who has the third grade and Mr. Wes Noyes, grade four. In the upper grades, Mr. Paul Montague is teaching English, Mr. Richard Ratten, science and social studies, Mr. Everett Barnes, principal, social studies and mathematics.

With the hiring of an additional teacher this year we were able to alleviate the crowded classroom situation somewhat. A new classroom was formed by partitioning part of the gymnasium. This new arrangement also allowed us to expand our library facilities.

The interscholastic athletic program, directed by Mr. Noyes, has been doing very well. Campton captured the flag football championship in November and is doing quite well in basketball although it is handicapped by not having a gym for games. In baseball the boys hope to be able to repeat their undefeated season's record of last spring.

Again this year Waterville Valley and the P.T.A. have combined to offer our pupils a fine ski program once a week. An average of 75 skiers a week from the school attended and the program stirs up a great deal of enthusiasm among the students.

The hard work of a fine staff combined with support and cooperation from parents, the school board, the superintendent of schools, and the citizens of the town of Campton has made it possible to offer the students of this area an ever improving education. We are trying our best to see that this trend continues and improves.

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Hereby submitted is my annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

To date we have had a good year at the Elementary School. There have been no major problems and the staff, with its new members, has worked well together. With the addition of an extra teacher to the staff, we replaced four teachers. Mr. Barnes has elaborated on the teaching staff in his report. We were fortunate in the employment of replacements. The time is here also when we should begin to consider what will happen when our student body grows to the point where we shall need a grade and a room for each teacher. The solution worked out for this year alright but should be considered only as a temporary measure.

You can be proud of your school. It is well run and as efficient as any school of its size anywhere. We have a fine lunch program which adds to the picture. My only reservation would be as I have mentioned previously, our preparation for high school of pupils from grades seven and eight. These factors involve mostly facility and teaching specialists which obviously at this point we cannot help. However, it does not stop us thinking and planning as to a solution.

The school participated in the State Testing program this year with good results. Our pupils placed well in state averages. This spring we will test all pupils on another achievement battery to evaluate our progress during the year.

Our primary concern with textbooks will be centered on upper grade mathematics and social studies this year. Nearly all our books in these areas are now outdated and need to be replaced. The teachers and myself would like to have books that include more so-called "modern math" and a better social studies series.

The school itself is in a good state of repair. The board has included in the budget some funds to institute a program of building maintenance, mostly painting this year. Although we are not in dire need at the moment there would soon come a time when more work would need to be done at once than the district might be willing to attempt in one year.

I am sure you have all been aware of the AREA school situation. In spite of some obstacles the program is continuing on schedule and at this point I see no reason why we won't occupy the building as planned in September 1970. Bids are out and are to be opened soon. If the weather is cooperative to any degree construction will have started by the time of your school district meeting. I am sure you look forward as I do to a new plant for your high school children.

There are so many things we can do better in a new facility. There is no question with the improvement of teaching stations and anticipated expanded curriculum all high school pupils will profit.

Please feel free to contact me if I can help you with questions or problems concerning your child or other questions related to education.

#### EXPLANATION OF SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

Chapter 189, Section 48 Revised Statutes Annotated of the State of New Hampshire, requires that the school district annual report show the total amount paid to the superintendent of schools as per the following quotation: "Reports. Each superintendent of a supervisory union shall annually prepare a report of the total salary paid to the superintendent, showing in detail the amount paid by the state and each local school district, and their share of same. Said report shall be filed with the school board of each school district involved and shall be included in the annual report of the respective school district as a separate entry. A like report and entry shall be made for each assistant superintendent, teacher consultant, and business administrators, if any is in service in the union."

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the school for the previous school year ending June 30th. The salary of \$11,500. which was received by the superintendent of schools of Supervisory Union #48 during 1967-68 school year was made up as follows: \$4500.00 paid by the State of New Hampshire and \$7,000.00 pro-rated among the several school districts. Allowances of \$1300.00 for travel within the union was also pro-rated as stated above.

The table below shows the portion of salary and travel charged to each school district.
