CENTRE HARBOR TOWN MEETING

March 9, 1982

Total number of names on Checklist 453 Total number of ballots cast 98

The two ballot clerks, Alice Swinnerton and Elloyd Weeks, were sworn in by the Moderator William L. Taylor. Gladys Bickford, Chairperson of the Supervisors of the Checklist, was sworn in as an assistant to any blind voter.

The March ninth, nineteen hundred eighty-two, Town Meeting was called to order at 2:00 P.M. by the Moderator who announced that the polls were opened to act upon Articles 1-A through Article 1-D. At 6:45 P.M. the absentee ballots were accepted and deposited in the ballot box.

ARTICLE 1-A. All Town Officers for the ensuing year were voted on. At seven o'clock Lewis Hanson moved the polls be closed and that the meeting be resumed at seven-thirty P.M. in the fire station where Articles 2 through 32 be acted upon. This was seconded by Aaron Smith and voted in the affirmative. The ballots were counted at this time with the following results:

Article 1-B. Are you in favor of the adoption of the amendment to the Centre Harbor Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Centre Harbor Planning Board changing Section IV:3 so that driveways and roadways must have a minimum setback of 10 feet from any property boundary?

73 YES 23 NO

Article 1-C. Are you in favor of the adoption of the amendment to the Centre Harbor Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Centre Harbor Planning Board changing the sign Section V:3 so that commercial-industrial buildings may exhibit up to five signs based on the square footage of space per building?

64 YES 27 NO

Article 1-D. Are you in favor of the adoption of the amendment to the Centre Harbor Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Centre Harbor Planning Board changing Section XI:3C so that any Shorefront Lot must have a minimum of 150' on any lake or pond?

77 YES 20 NO

Article 2. Aaron Smith moved that the Town raise the sum of \$125,476.83 to defray Town charges for the ensuing year. The motion was seconded by Lewis Hanson. Robert Beem made a motion to amend the motion to add an additional \$10,000.00 for new exterior doors to the Municipal Building to bring the total sum to \$135,486.83. This motion was seconded by John Desmond. The amendment was voted in the affirmative by a show of hands, with 33 yes and 12 no. The original motion as amended was then voted in the affirmative.

Article 3. Lewis Hanson moved the Town vote to raise and appropriate \$67,963.00 for the maintenance of Town Highways and Bridges, including sidewalks, dead tree removal, and docks and fountain. The motion was seconded by Aaron Smith. An amendment to the motion was made by Gregory Garrick to add the following to the motion. "And to instruct the Selectmen to order the discontinuance of the use of salt in the maintenance of the town roads beginning in the winter of 1982-83." The motion was seconded by Audrey Garrick. The amendment was voted negatively. Roger Moulton moved to amend the motion by adding "and to direct the Selectmen to cute the use of the road salt by one third." The motion was seconded by Gregory Garrick. After much discussion, Orion Bickford moved the question, seconded by Gladys Bickford and then voted in the affirmative. The vote on the amendment was negative. The original motion was then voted in the affirmative.

Article 4. Lewis Hanson moved the Town vote to accept State assistance "TRA" for Class V roads and to raise the sum of \$316.35 (The State to contribute the sum of \$2,109.03 plus previous balance of \$483.82) provided this article is voted in the affirmative. Further that the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 as a supplement to the above project for a total of \$5,909.20 for the improvement of Centre Harbor Neck Road. (Highway Subsidy funds to be used for this prupose.) The motion was seconded by John Desmond. After much discussion the question was moved, seconded and voted in the affirmative. The motion was then voted in the affirmative.

Article 5. Aaron Smith moved the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 for a Capital Reverve Fund for the future purchase of a new dump truck. Kirk Meloney seconded the motion. The vote was affirmative.

Article 6. Stephen Gove made a motion that the Town vote to change the position of Road Agent for the Town of Centre Harbor from the present appointed position to an elected post. Elloyd Weeks seconded the motion. An amendment to the motion was made by Deborah Gove to add "beginning with the 1983 election year". The amendment was seconded by Katherine Weeks. The vote was taken by a show of hands. An affirmative vote of 19 yes and 13 no. After a lengthy discussion, Orion Bickford called the question which was seconded by George Lamprey and voted in the affirmative. Because of a petition received prior to Town Meeting for the vote to be taken as a secret ballot, the paper ballots were distributed with the voters being checked off the checklist. The ballots were counted with 19 yes and 43 no. The moderator declared the motion defeated.

- Article 7. Lewis Woodaman moved the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000.00 for the maintenance of the Centre Harbor Fire Department, and to authorize the Centre Harbor Volunteer Firemen's Association to expend said sum for the operation and maintenance of the Centre Harbor Fire Department, the amount of \$4,000.00 to be paid from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund, the balance to be raised by taxes. The motion was seconded by Lee Mattson and then voted in the affirmative.
- Article 8. John Merrill moved that the Town accept the Rescue-Utility Vehicle purchased with donations by the Centre Harbor Volunteer Firemen's Association and authorize the Association to sell the present Rescue Vehicle for the purpose of adding to the fund. Herbert Martin seconded the motion and it was voted in the affirmative.
- Article 9. G. H. Damon moved that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for a Capital Reserve Fund for the future purchase of a new fire truck. The motion was seconded by Bess Hanson and voted in the affirmative.
- Article 10. Lewis Hanson moved the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$22,430.00 for the operation of the Police Department (\$4,476.00 to be paid from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund and the balance of \$17,954.00 to be raised by taxes.) The motion was seconded by Aaron Smith and then it was voted in the affirmative.
- Article 11. Aaron Smith moved the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,575.00 for Parks and Recreation, to include Band Concerts, Holiday Celebrations and Life Guards. The motion was seconded by Diane Kline and voted in the affirmative.
- Article 12. Lewis Hanson moved the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,500.00 for the purpose of providing ambulance service to the Town. (\$5,000.00 to be paid from the Revenue Sharing Fund.) Charles Haines seconded the motion, and it was voted in the affirmative.
- Article 13. John Desmond moved the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,800.00 for the operation of the Library. Erin Way seconded the motion. Mr. Desmond encouraged all people to use the library and Merrill Beem distributed flyers. The motion was voted in the affirmative.
- Article 14. Aaron Smith moved the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,480.00 as Centre Harbor's share of the Refuse Disposal Capital Reserve Fund as authorized by RSA 35:1, 35:18 and to authorize the Selectmen to expend such amounts as may be necessary on major repairs as required. The motion was seconded by George Lamprey and voted in the affirmative.
- Article 15. Lewis Hanson moved the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for Welfare and Town Poor. Lee Mattson seconded the motion and it was voted in the affirmative.

- Article 16. Aaron Smith moved the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for a Capital Reserve Fund for the future reassessment of the Town by the Department of Revenue Administration. Motion was seconded by G. H. Damon and voted in the affirmative.
- Article 17. Christopher Williams moved the Town vote to raise and appropriate \$3,750.00 for the completion of the Centre Harbor Master Plan. The motion was seconded by George Burns. The motion was then voted in the affirmative.
- Article 18. John Desmond moved the Town vote to raise and appropriate funds in the amount of \$153.62 for the support of the Lakes Region Association. The motion was seconded by Donard Carr and it was then voted in the affirmative.
- Article 19. Ann Williams moved the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the support of the Lakes Region Family Service. The motion was seconded by Lee Mattson and voted in the affirmative.
- Article 20. Aaron Smith moved the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the Centre Harbor Historical Society. The motion was seconded by Orion Bickford and voted in the affirmative.
- Article 21. Eloise Coudert moved the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,965.47 for the support of the Inter-Lakes Day Care Center. The motion was seconded by Ann Williams and voted in the affirmative.
- Article 22. George Lamprey moved the Town raise and appropriate \$3,170.00 for the support of the Meredith Community Action Program. Christopher Williams seconded the motion and it was voted in the affirmative.
- Article 23. Bess Hanson moved the Town raise and appropriate \$2,745.00 for the support of the Meredith Public Health Nursing Association. The motion was seconded by Dennis Parshley and voted in the affirmative.
- Article 24. Kathleen Kozak moved the Town raise and appropriate \$800.00 for Huggins Hospital. Motion was seconded by Bess Hanson and voted in the negative.
- Article 25. Kathleen Kozak moved the Town raise and appropriate \$500.00 for Lakes Region General Hospital. The motion was seconded by Gregory Garrick and voted in the affirmative.
- Article 26. Robert Beem moved the Town vote to authorize the Selectmen to further investigate the feasibility of limited spraying for gypsy moths and if said motion carries, that a second motion be made to set a sum. Lewis Hanson seconded the motion. After considerable discussion the question was moved by Gladys Bickford, seconded by George Lamprey and voted in the affirmative. The original motion was then voted in the negative.

Article 27. On motion of Aaron Smith and seconded by Orion Bickford it was voted to allow a discount of two percent on taxes paid in full within fifteen days of issue of the tax bills by the Tax Collector.

Article 28. On motion of Gladys Bickford and seconded by Douglas Way it was voted to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 29. Bess Hanson moved the Town vote to authorize the Selectmen to grant an additional cable television franchise upon such terms and conditions as they feel are advantageous to the Town, all in accordance with and pursuant to the authority granted under New Hampshire RSA 53-C. The motion was seconded by Robert Heath. After some discussion Robert Beem amended the motion to "grant additional cable television franchises" and this was seconded by Edwin Kline and voted in the affirmative. The motion, now reading, "Vote to authorize the Selectmen to grant additional cable television franchises upon such terms and conditions as they feel advantageous to the Town, all in accordance with and pursuant to the authority granted under New Hampshire RSA 53-C," was then voted in the affirmative.

Article 30. On the motion of Robert Beem and seconded by Christopher Williams, the Town voted to Authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal or state grants, which may become available during the course of the year, and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money: provided: (1) that such grants and other monies do not require the expenditure of other Town funds, (2) that a public hearing shall be held by the Selectmen prior to the receipt and expenditure of such grants and monies, and (3) that such items shall be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32 relative to limitation and expenditure of Town moneys, all as provided by RSA 31:05-b.

Article 31. On the motion of Lewis Hanson and seconded by Aaron Smith it was voted to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by Tax Collector's deed.

Article 32. As there were no reports to hear or committees to choose, Dennis Parshley moved the meeting be adjourned. This was seconded by John Desmond and voted in the affirmative.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE TOWN OF CENTRE HARBOR

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Centre Harbor in the County of Belknap in Said State, Qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Cary H. Mead Meeting Room in said Centre Harbor on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at one of the clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose all necessary Town and School Officers for the year ensuing.
- Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. The sum being \$125,903.31.
- Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$66,360.00 for the maintenance of Town Highways and Bridges, including sidewalks, dead tree removal, and Docks and Fountain.
- Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to accept State assistance "TRA" for Class V roads and if so, to raise the sum of \$314.83 (The State to contribute the sum of \$2,098.87.)
- Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the continued improvement of Centre Harbor Neck Road.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$24,000.00 for the purchase of a New Dump Truck and to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw and expend the \$3,500.00 from the Dump Truck Capital Reserve Fund, further to authorize the Selectmen to borrow \$15,000.00 in the name of the Town. The balance of \$5,500.00 to be raised by taxes.
- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for the Maintenance of the Centre Harbor Fire Department, and to authorize the Centre Harbor Volunteer Fireman's Association to expend said sum for the operation and maintenance of the Centre Harbor Fire Department, the amount of \$4,000.00 to be paid from the Revenue Sharing Fund, the balance to be raised by taxes.
- Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for a Capital Reserve Fund for the future purchase of a new fire truck.
- Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$23,025.00 for the operation of the Police Department (\$3,875.00 to be paid from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund and the balance of \$19,150.00 to be raised by taxes.)

- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,625.00 for Parks and Recreation, to include Band Concerts, Holiday Celebrations, and Life Guards.
- Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,500.00 for the purpose of providing ambulance service to the Town. (\$5,000.00 to be paid from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund.)
- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the operation of the library.
- Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,400.00 as Centre Harbor's share of the Refuse Disposal Capital Reserve Fund as authorized by RSA 35:1, 35:18 and to authorize the Selectmen to expend such amounts as may be necessary on major repairs as required.
- Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for Welfare and Town Poor.
- Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for a Capital Reserve Fund for the future reassessment of the Town by the Department of Revenue Administration.
- Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate funds for the support of the Lakes Region Association. (\$153.62 requested for 1983. \$153.62 appropriated in 1982.)
- Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate funds for the support of the Lakes Region Family Service. (\$500.00 requested in 1983. \$400.00 appropriated in 1982.)
- Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the Centre Harbor Historical Society. (Funds to be used for the continued renovation of the Old Centre Harbor School.)
- Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate funds for the support of the Inter-Lakes Day Care Center. (\$2,033.25 requested for 1983. \$1,965.47 appropriated in 1982.)
- Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate funds for the support of the Meredith Community Action Program. (\$3,376.00 requested in 1983. \$3,170.00 appropriated in 1982.)
- Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate funds for the support of the Meredith Public Health Nursing Association. (\$3,394.00 requested for 1983. \$2,745.00 appropriated in 1982.)
- Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate funds for Huggins Hospital. (\$800.00 requested for 1983. No funds appropriated in 1982.)

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate funds for the Lakes Region General Hospital. (Request for 1983 did not include a dollar amount. \$500.00 appropriated in 1982.)

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to go on record in support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of the Town and to the health and welfare of the people of the town.

These actions shall include:

 Reduce by at least half the major cause of acid rain, sulfur dioxide emissions, by the year 1990.

2. Conclude negotiations and adopt a treaty with the government of Canada that will commit both nations to this same goal. The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation and to the President of the United States.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of two percent on taxes paid in full within fifteen days of issue of the tax bills by the Tax Collector.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 27. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal or state grants, which may become available during the course of the year, and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money; provided; (1) that such grants and other monies do not require the expenditure of other Town funds, (2) that a public hearing shall be held by the Selectmen prior to the receipt and expenditure of such grants and monies, and (3) that such items shall be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32 relative to limitation and expenditure of Town moneys, all as provided by RSA 31:05-b.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by Tax Collector's Deed.

Article 29. To choose agents or committees in relation to any article of the Warrant and hear reports of any heretofore chosen.



NICHOLS MEMORIAL LIBRARY REPORT

1982

Continued progress was made by your library in 1982.

Acquisitions remained steady with 260 new books purchased. In addition 160 volumes, including paperbacks, were donated by our patrons. We had a total circulation for all materials of 5,268 items. We currently have 660 registered patrons including 355 year round residents and 305 summer or non-residents. The total number of volumes in the library as of December 31, 1982 is 9,298.

Six new bookcases were purchased last year - three for the children's side and three for the adult side of the library. To make room for the new bookcases two oak benches and an oak table were sold as surplus to the library's needs. Proceeds were used to help defray the costs of the new bookcases.

A preheating device was installed on our boiler last year. It is expected to decrease heating costs by up to 20%.

During 1982 our income from trust funds exceeded our expectations. This was a result of the high interest rates prevailing and some modification in our investment program. As a result we have been able to reduce substantially our request for town funds in 1983.

Our trust funds increased in 1982 because of a most generous gift of \$1000 from the Garnet Hill Grange.

We have had some personnel changes in the library association and on the board of trustees. Kay Campbell has replaced Dot Simonds as President, and Ruth Hale became Vice-President. Greg Garrick has replaced Doug Way as Treasurer, and Amna Stabler replaced Athalie Rand as Trustee.

We look forward to continued service to the community during 1983.

Free monthly blood pressure clinics are held on the 2nd Wednesday of each month from 12 noon to 3 P.M. at the Cary Mead Room.

At the biennial Health Fair, held in conjunction with the Meredith Lion's Club, 78 area residents were screened for glaucoma, blood sugar, blood pressure, vision and hearing. We assisted the Altrusa, Jaycees and Jaycee Women with two blood drawings.

Equipment for loan includes hospital beds, wheel chairs, crutches, walkers, commodes and other small items necessary for patients' home care.

REPORT TO THE TOWNS

INTER-LAKES DAY CARE CENTER & NURSERY SCHOOL

While employment has slowed a bit in the past year, our child care services continue to be in great demand, especially when a parent finds that long sought-for position! During the last twelve months 123 children were served from 99 families from six towns in the Inter-Lakes region. Operating on a year-round basis from 6:30 AM to 5:30 PM, the Day Care Center has made it possible for the parents of 116 children to maintain employment bringing into the community a combined income of well over a million dollars! As a private, non-profit agency governed by a volunteer Board of Directors consisting of parents and other community citizens, the Center operates a comprehensive preschool program for three to six year olds, and before and after school program for children of elementary school age. In providing for social, emotional, physical, and educational development a full range of services is offered including education, health care, vision and hearing screening, immunizations, dental care, nutrition and information and referral. As a participant in the New Hampshire Child Care Food Program sponsored by USDA hot lunches, breakfasts, and two snacks are served daily. In the past year 6,176 lunches, 2,249 breakfasts, and 12,007 snacks were served.

The total budget of the Inter-Lakes Day Care Center for 1983 is \$88,249.00. Of this we will be receiving in tuition paid by parents \$43,700.00, \$4,900.00 from NH Child Care Food Program (USDA), and \$2,500.00 from CETA. This also includes the following: \$37,149.00 of which \$23,037.00 is Title XX, \$557.00 from Aid to Families with Dependent Children, and \$13,555.00 which must be obtained in local funding. The money we receive from the towns that we serve is matched three times by the Federal government.

Area residents are cordially welcome to visit the Inter-Lakes Day Care Center and Nursery School at 11 Lang Street in Meredith.

CENTRE HARBOR PLANNING BOARD

ANNUAL REPORT

Throughout 1982 the Planning Board was made aware of how the national economic situation manifests itself on the local level. Only six subdivisions were approved by the Board, a figure far below the annual total for some years during the late 1970s. Those approved in 1982 totalled only a modest number of lots and acreage compared to earlier years. Not only were subdivision submissions and approvals lower, but so too were building permits reviewed by the Board.

Work continued on the Town Plan with expected completion sometime during the first half of 1983. Robert Varney of Lakes Region Planning Commission has been working closely with the Board and the six committees described in last year's report. The slowdown in growth has given us time to work on the Town Plan without the pressures that too often accompany rapid economic and population growth. During 1983 public meetings will be scheduled for comments and reactions to the draft of the plan before it is put in final form and submitted to the town. We hope to see a large turnout at meetings called to discuss the Town Plan and its implementation.

The Board submitted three Zoning Ordinances for approval of the voters. They clarify setbacks for driveways, provide a table of business sign sizes for commercial/industrial establishments, and bring lake front lot usage in conformity with other parts of the Zoning Ordinances. The Board appreciates the support of the voters in these matters.

Members have discussed with the Selectmen ways in which the town can best use the property purchased at the corner of routes 3 and 25B. On this 14-acre parcel there are ample opportunities for recreation facilities and a highway maintenance facility. The town owes much to the generosity of Rawson L. Wood and the Arwood Foundation for making possible the purchase of this fine parcel of land. In the Town Plan the best ways to utilize it will be addressed.

During 1982 George Burns resigned from the Board. His contributions and observations will be missed. The Selectmen have appointed Kirk Meloney to take his place.

Looking ahead to 1983, the Board will have to work on the implementation of recommendations in the Town Plan. We hope that citizen involvement in this and other matters will enable the Board to maintain its good rapport with the residents of the town. Our regular meetings are the first and third Tuesdays of each month. All are welcome.

As chairman I wish to thank the members of the Board and the clerk for their dedication and good humor throughout the year. The town is fortunate to have such a fine group of volunteers.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

REPORT

The year 1982 was a typical one for the Zoning Board of Adjustment with three cases presented for consideration.

The Board granted a special exception allowing a large existing structure in the commercial zone to be converted to multi-family use.

A special exception allowing two-family dwellings was granted for a parcel of land in the agricultural and rural zone, and a variance on the same parcel for three-family dwelling units was denied.

The Board granted a special exception allowing earth removal from a parcel of land in the agricultural and rural zone subject to certain restrictions and time limits.

On an appeal of a 1981 decision, the Superior Court upheld the Board's denial of a request to display a non-conforming business sign in the residential zone.

LAKES REGION FAMILY SERVICE

Lakes Region Family Service has served six families from Centre Harbor in the first ten months of 1982, as compared with five families in 1981, and three families in 1980. Our services are easily available to residents of Centre Harbor in Laconia and in our one-day a week satellite office in the Meredith Congregational Church.

In 1981, Lakes Region Family Service served 458 families, an increase of 22% over the number of families served in 1980. So far in 1982 we have served 508 families. In short, there has been a significant increase in demand for our services. This may be due to a variety of factors, but below is an explanation of two programs which contribute to the increase in referrals:

Domestic Violence Program of Services:

Since November, 1981, we have offered a program of services to violent families. We provide a 24-hour crisis line, transportation, shelter, advocacy, peer counseling and professional counseling, and a support group for abused women. The agency is able to offer these services with the assistance of a 35-member Lakes Region Task Force Against Domestic Violence. Volunteers are recruited and trained by the agency, and assist in offering services under the supervision of our staff. The domestic violence program has served over 100 families since its inception; one family from Centre Harbor has been served through the domestic violence program in 1982 alone. No charge is made when people receive these emergency services.

Lakes Region Family Service is slated to receive HUD funds through the City of Laconia in 1983 to assist Laconia families who experience violence. In order for us to continue services to residents of surrounding towns, it is imperative that towns assist us with direct costs such as travel, phone, printing, and postage whice are involved in this important program. This year we must look to localities to assist us, since we have completed the first year of operation of the domestic violence program and have expended a one year grant from the New Hampshire Charitable Trust Fund which assisted us in initiating this program.

Services to Children and Adolescents:

Lakes Region Family Service is one of two professional counseling agencies available to residents of Centre Harbor who are experiencing problems of children and youth. We enjoy a good working relationship with the other agency, Lakes Region Mental Health, and referrals are made between us when appropriate.

Lakes Region Family Service has experienced a large increase in the number of children and youth served in the last two year.

In 1981 children and adolescents accounted for one-third of our caseload; so far in 1982, 41% of people we have seen as counseling intakes have been children and youth.

Lakes Region Family Service is able to make a real difference in family life. When we see a child or adolescent who has school, peer, family, or legal proglems we routinely involve the whole family as well as the school or any other agency that is involved with the young person. Experience has taught us that this approach yields results whereas seeing a child or adolescent on his/her own, without involving significant adults, is not productive.

Our staff includes an experienced psychiatric consultant who reviews with us the treatment plan for families. We have earned an excellent reputation in the community for assisting troubled young people. Our sliding scale fee enables any family to afford our service; no one is refused service because of inability to pay and the average client fee per session was \$7.63 in 1981. Any family who calls us is seen by an experienced, Master's level counselor.

In addition to the programs cited above, our agency provides marital counseling, family therapy, and personal adjustment counseling. So far in 1982, five families from Centre Harbor have used our counseling services, in addition to the one who has been served through the domestic violence program. The total number of Centre Harbor families served in the first ten months of 1982 is six, compared with five in 1981, and three in 1980. It is reasonable to expect that Lakes Region Family Service will serve at least ten Centre Harbor families by the end of 1982, at our present rate of referral.

Our agency has actively pursued the area of providing workshops for the community in 1982. Groups and workshops have been offered for children of divorce, for divorced adults, adolescents, and a group is run continuously to educate and support mothers. We also provided a community education night on domestic violence in September 1982.

We continue to offer a Family Life Library, and a sound-slide production is available describing the services of the agency.

REPORT OF CENTRE HARBOR FIRE DEPARTMENT

1982

At the outset, this department wishes to report the passing of its first honorary chief and benefactor, Mr. Edward Dane. His repeated aid to this department and to the Town will be sorely missed.

Probably the biggest event of 1982 was our purchase of a new utility vehicle. In January the men decided to seek a new truck without asking the town for tax money. Letters explaining our need were sent out and within six weeks we had sufficient funds to make the purchase. To all who contributed, a hearty "Thanks again" from the Fire Department.

Another item purchased by non tax money was a "Resusci-Anne" manikin which is used to train our rescue personnel in CPR skills.

We have also made available to the general public a complete set of chimney cleaning tools which are readily obtained on a loan basis. If your chimney needs cleaning, drop by, sign up, and borrow the tools. It's a lot better than a roaring chimney fire!

This department would like to publicly thank the local Lions Club for the gift of a very expensive Lucas Tool (commonly known as "Jaws of Life"). This tool was purchased for the use of the towns of Sandwich, Moultonboro, Melvin Village and Centre Harbor, and it is housed and ready to roll in the Moultonboro rescue vehicle.

As in the past, this department has run bingo games and a clambake during the summer months to raise funds. The object here is twofold. We sponsor movies every other Friday night throughout the winter for the youngsters, and we offer two cash scholarships to local students needing aid to further their education.

As 1983 gets under way, the fire department is launching a new project called "The Vial of Life Program". This program is aimed at those who regularly take some kind of medication and who in the future may need outside medical help. By the time you receive this report, "The Vial of Life Program" will be well advanced through publicity in the local papers and in stores. If you would like to know more about it, contact any member of the fire department at any time.

The work of a volunteer fire department such as ours is a labor of love, and those of us involved really do love it! Our training is hard work, time- consuming, and most often repetitive, but it is an absolute must for the protection of life and property in the town. Fire prevention is high on our priority list. If you have any fire safety problems, we will be all too glad to help at any time.

Please see to it that the Central Dispatch phone number is close by your telephone (524-1545, 24 hours a day). Never hesitate to call in the case of any emergency. Trained people are standing by ready to help you in any emergent situation. Remember, if you think you need help, you probably need it right now! Call your emergency number, explain your problem, and the proper help will be dispatched at once.

Your fire department wishes to thank all for their kind support throughout the year. We need it and really do appreciate it.

TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

REPORT

Forest fire prevention, our business, your business, good business! This slogan has been the motto of the N.H. Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Fire Service since 1909 when the first forest fire laws were passed by the Legislature.

These laws set in place a cooperative forest fire protection program of State and local forest fire personnel that has, in the past 75 years, established New Hampshire as a leader in forest fire prevention and control. Our annual acreage loss to forest fires of one-half acre per fire is the best in the nation. This fire record has come about through the cooperative efforts of our state/town forest fire protection program. The state provides detection of fires, training for local forest fire wardens, low cost forest fire suppression equipment to local fire departments, and technical advice at the fire ground. Local governments provide the volunteer fire fighters who are appointed as wardens and deputy wardens and who respond quickly to suppress reported forest fires.

This program has resulted in a steady decline in annual acres lost to forest fires since 1910 when the average fire burned 33 acres compared to the modern day loss of one-half acre per fire.

Only by the continued cooperation of the State/towns and our entire citizenry can this record be maintained.

PARKS AND RECREATION DEPARTMENT

The year 1982 was a very busy one for the Parks and Recreation Department. Many varied activities were available to both children and adults alike.

The first event of the year was the annual Easter Egg Hunt on the library lawn. This was run by the 4-H Club under the leadership of Mrs. Kozak.

In May the Memorial Day parade was held with support from the Meredith veterans, as well as those from Centre Harbor. Children were encouraged to decorate their bicycles in traditional patriotic colors.

The summer season started with adult co-educational volleyball scheduled on the lawn section behind the Town beach every Friday evening at 6:30. These games ran through October 3rd.

The Fourth annual foot race was sponsored by the Centre Harbor Sports Shop, with Mr. Ulm giving T-shirts to all participants. Approximately 200 took part in this event. In the afternoon the parade took place and prizes were awarded to the most patriotic (Historical Society), the most amusing (The Smurfs), and the most original (Class of '99).

Swimming lessons were again offered throughout the summer months. The lifeguards this year were Gary Miller, Susan Milne and Ann Shildneck.

Tennis lessons were offered this year using one Moultonborough court each Wednesday and Friday. On Mondays bike and walking hikes were alternated. Places visited were Chamberlain-Reynolds forest, Rattlesnake Mountain, Red Hill, Mt. Morgan, Squam Lake and Black Cat Island.

Arts and crafts classes were participated in on Tuesday and Thursday down by the beach. Friday was a "Discovery Day" for the children.

The Hershey Track Meet was held in Concord on July 15th, and many from Centre Harbor took part in this.

The Recreation Day Carnival was again held in July with fun and interesting booths and activities which included pony rides and games.

Two musical jam sessions were held, one on July 20th and the other on August 18th. These sessions were held in the evening.

Other summer activities included children's badminton and golf frisbee; the "Pa Smith" field day in Meredith on August 6th, at which Centre Harbor took second place; a trip to Fenway Park to see a Boston

Red Sox game; an African safari slide presentation at the fire station; two Walt Disney films which were shown in the Cary Mead room; co-ed softball games at Prescott Park; and a community beach party on August 29th.

Fall and winter co-ed adult volleyball has been held every Thursday and Sunday nights, and will continue until June 1983.

The annual Halloween costume party at the fire station was very successful. The children enjoyed cartoons and refeshments.

A Christmas party was held at the Cary Mead Room with the children making ornaments. They then participated in the lighting of the Christmas tree on the library lawn, singing carols and having hot chocolate and cookies in the library afterwards.

We feel this year has been successful in the variety of activities we have proposed, and we sincerely thank the many volunteers who have consistently given their help and support.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

Caleb's Clearing was named for Mr. Towle.

In the Morse Cemetery on Route 25B is the stone "erected in memory of $Ens \frac{N}{2}$ Caleb Towle who departed this life Oct. 1, 1822 aged 55 years, he was 5 feet 10 inch in headth his weight was 500 & 151b." (copied verbatim). Death was believed caused by edema or dropsy.

During the past year representatives of sixteen families called the historian seeking genealogical information. The potential for data for the genealogist is often found in Town records, Church records, and family bibles.

A tour of the various cemeteries is a rewarding experience. The inscriptions and epitaphs are very interesting, and gravestones provide an important record for town histories.

We find that great endeavor was made to commemorate the deaths of friends and relatives. There are a number of fieldstones which were used as markers in the 18th and 19th centuries and not recorded. The inscriptions include early settlers, prominent citizens and veterans of various wars, including those who gave their lives for their Country.

Centre Harbor residents have reason to be proud of all the Town's fifteen cemeteries. Each year monies are raised by the Town for a Cemetery Fund. The condition of the cemeteries attests to the work done by Charles A. Haines and his crew.

The Historical Society recognizes the importance of preserving this cultural heritage. Barbara B. Benoit and her committee are recording all gravestones in a systematic and uniform way by mapping, pictures and card filing of inscriptions, etc. Age and weather are threatening to destroy these valuable resources.

The Centre Harbor Historical Society is indeed grateful for the many genealogies given to the Society by residents, former residents and visitors whose ancestors years ago had called this town "Home".
