# Town Warrant.

## State of New Hampshire.

{ L. S. } To the inhabitants of the town of Claremont, in the county of Sullivan, in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs :

You are hereby notified to meet at the Congregational church in said town on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools the ensuing year.
3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of Stevens High School.
4. To choose a committee for the Stevens High school for the ensuing year.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of highways and bridges for the ensuing year, and determine how it shall be paid.
6. To raise by vote the necessary amount of money to pay legal expenses of the town for the ensuing year.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay the debts of the town.
8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Fiske Free Library.
9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor.
10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay firemen.
11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay for the use of hydrants.
12. To see what action the town will take in regard to lighting the streets and raise and appropriate money therefor.
13. To determine the rate of discount the town will allow persons paying their taxes within such period as the town may designate.
14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the expenses of Memorial Day.
15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for the benefit of the American band.
16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay the Board of Education.
17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to appropriate in aid of the Claremont Cottage hospital.



18. To see if the town will vote to issue bonds in the name of the town of Claremont for the purpose of raising money to defray the expenses of the new town hall.

19. To see if the town will vote to borrow money on the credit of the town to defray the expenses of the new town hall.

20. To see if the town will vote to provide suitable quarters for the fire department, purchase land and buildings, or erect suitable buildings for the same, and raise and appropriate money therefor.

21. To see what action the town will take in relation to laying out lots, making roads, fencing or otherwise improving the Ball and Wheeler land purchased for cemetery purposes, and raise and appropriate money therefor.

22. To see what action the town will take in relation to the disposal of the buildings on the Wheeler lot used for a small pox hospital.

23. To see if the town will vote to engage a suitable person to arrange and index the town records and raise and appropriate a suitable sum for said purpose.

24. To hear the report of the committee appointed to investigate the subject of a free bridge between the towns of Claremont, N. H., and Weathersfield, Vt., and pass any vote relating thereto.

25. To see if the town will vote to dispose of the liquor now on hand belonging to the town.

26. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$2500 for macadamizing Tremont street from Tremont square to Broad street, and Broad street from Tremont street to the upper bridge.

27. To see if the town will vote to exempt from taxation for a term not exceeding ten years, the Bailey Mfg. Co., or any additions they may build thereto, and the capital used in operating the same, agreeably to Sec. 11, Chap. 55, of the Public Statutes.

28. To see if the town will vote to instruct the town treasurer to have the custody of all trust funds and securities held by the town, and to keep a separate account with each trust, in accordance with Sec. 21, Chap. 43, of the Public Statutes.

29. To see if the town will direct the selectmen of the town to manage and invest all trust funds held by the town, in accordance with Sec. 8, Chap. 43, of the Public Statutes.

30. To hear the report of the selectmen, in accordance with Sec. 11, Chap. 43 of the Public Statutes, with special reference to each trust fund held by the town, showing its income, the expenditures made in its administration, and the investment of its funds.

31. To see if the town will appoint an agent to collect the legacy due from the estate of the late Paran Stevens.

32. To see if the town will appoint an historian to prepare and publish a history of the town, or to appoint a committee to superintend the preparation and publication of such history.

33. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of preparing and publishing a town history.

34. To see if the town will provide a suitable compensation (not less than one hundred dollars per annum) for a justice of a police court in said town, and to see what disposition the town will make of the fees accruing to the justice of such police court.

35. To see if the town will, by ballot or otherwise, nominate suitable persons to be recommended to the Governor and Council for justice and special justice of a police court in said town.

36. To see if the town will adopt the provisions of Chap. 79 of the Public Statutes of the state of New Hampshire.

37. To see if the town will vote to discontinue so much of Bond street (so called) as lies south of a line running east from the southeast corner of land of Florence L. King to the southwest corner of land of Kate A. Washburn.

38. To see if the town will vote to place an electric street light at the south end of Bond street as a safeguard against accidents now liable to teams by the driving off of embankment to R. R. track or meadow fifteen to thirty feet below.

39. To see if the town will vote to place an arc light on Fairview park at such point as shall seem most advisable.

40. To see if the town will vote to place a hydrant near the corner of Lincoln and Dexter streets.

41. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

# The Town School District.

## Report of the School Board for the Year Ending February 15th, 1896.

We respectfully submit the following report for the fiscal school year ending February 15, 1896 :

The work of the spring term of 1895 was seriously interrupted by the small pox scare, so reducing the attendance that your Board felt obliged to close most of the schools, whereby nearly all of the pupils lost several weeks.

Early in the fall the Board were notified that the parochial schools had been closed, which placed upon our hands something over two hundred additional pupils, for whom schools must be provided. We immediately opened the school at the Washington street school house, the only one at our command, and looked about for accommodations for the remainder of the scholars. The only place we could find fitted for the purpose were the rooms used by the parochial schools on Central St., which Rev. Father Finnegan very kindly consented to rent to the district. These rooms had been furnished with desks and heating apparatus in a manner that made them superior to any school rooms owned by the district. We feel that we were very fortunate in being able to secure such comfortable and commodious quarters for our pupils. The rent agreed upon was \$500 for the school year for the four rooms, which includes the care of the rooms, janitor's services, and heating them by the steam heat with which they were provided. The district can probably do no better than to continue this arrangement until a new building, having four or more rooms, is erected.

We find great trouble in providing janitors for the different buildings, and in spite of all the efforts we can make, the rooms are wretchedly cared for, and the children are exposed to constant injury from too much and too little fire. We have frequently reminded the various teachers of the necessity of keeping their rooms at even temperature and properly ventilated, but for some reason many of them seriously fail in this matter, and we are subjected to constant complaints from parents that their children are exposed to cold or over heated. The only remedy for this is to secure a good location and build a school house of sufficient capacity to accommodate all of our pupils. If the schools were all in one building, an efficient janitor

could be secured, and all the rooms could be properly ventilated and be kept at an even temperaturē, better discipline and better instruction would also result. We believe the various small buildings now owned by the district, and the lots on which they stand, if properly managed, could be sold for a sufficient sum to pay a large portion of the expenses of such a building.

The efficiency of our school work has been improved by the addition of five teachers who have received training in normal schools. The superiority of their work is so apparent that it is inevitable that at no distant day no teachers will be employed in our public schools who have not received such training.

The course of study upon which our teachers have so long been at work has at last been completed and published in pamphlet form, thus enabling each teacher to see what must be accomplished in each room each term. We recommend the employment of a teacher in penmanship who should give instruction in all the schools in the same way as music and drawing are now taught. This would secure regular and uniform instruction and prevent the mischief arising from pupils copying the various methods of the various teachers under whom they come in their course.

The School Board desires once more to impress upon the town the necessity of employing a superintendent of schools. It is impossible for men whose time is necessarily taken in other occupations, to give the schools that attention which is absolutely necessary not only for their most successful management, but for the comfort and health of the pupils. The school buildings are neglected, neither teachers nor such janitors as we are able to employ, take the necessary care of the buildings. Broken windows often endanger the health of pupils, neglect of repairs often causes freezing of water in the basement. Windows in basement and elsewhere are allowed to be open in the coldest weather to the damage of water pipes and the injury of pupils, to say nothing of loss of fuel. The School Board do not, never have, and cannot look after these matters sufficiently. All this though important, is insignificant compared with the inefficiency in *school management* which with the School Board practically ends with *hiring the teacher*, whereas that should be but the beginning. The Board, neither individually nor collectively, are trained as professional educators and are incompetent for this work of superintending our schools and fortunately do not attempt it.

In a system of graded schools, where to a very large extent every class passes into the hands of a new teacher at the end of each year, and where each year's work is based on the past year's work and is preparatory for the next, it is of the highest importance that a competent, faithful person with the training essential for such professional work should exercise a careful supervision of the work in every school room from the first primary to the graduating class of the High School, and see to it that everything is done in progressive and systematic order and make himself familiar with the capacities and needs of individual scholars and so be able to classify and arrange

them that each one shall be obtaining the most benefit from his work. Until there is such an efficient head of our school system to take charge of and direct the work of the teachers, it is impossible to get the best results and many pupils will work at great disadvantage, their parents will justly feel that they are not making the progress they should, and none will accomplish what they might. Teachers, however faithful and painstaking, need the aid of such a superintendent, and without such one cannot possibly plan or perform their work with the best results.

We expend for school purposes in one way and another about \$14,000 annually. The interest on a fair valuation of our school buildings would make from \$3000 to \$4000 more, making the cost of schools from \$17,000 to \$18,000 each year. To this must be added the care, trouble and expense of parents and time of the pupils in the attendance.

How long will the district pursue the policy of permitting our school system to drift under an incompetent management and without an efficient head, such as is invariably employed in every private enterprise of a tenth the importance?

We hereto append statistical tables furnishing the information required of us in regard to the schools as follows: Number pupils registered, average daily attendance, length of schools in weeks, number of pupils in district between 5 and 15, wages of teachers per month including board, and the roll of honor for two terms, to wit, the winter term of 1894 and 1895 and the spring term of 1895.

In consequence of a statute passed at the last session of the legislature, the report for this year as to the roll of honor ends with the spring term of 1895, and next year's report will contain such roll of honor for the school year beginning under the new law with the fall term of 1895, so that this report does not include the roll of honor since Sept. 1st, 1895.

# SCHOOL WARRANT.

## State of New Hampshire.

To the inhabitants of the School District of the Town of Claremont, qualified to vote in District affairs:

YOU are hereby notified to meet at the Grammar school house, in said District, on the seventh day of March, 1896, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a moderator for the ensuing year.
2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
4. To choose a member of the school board for the ensuing three years.
5. To hear the reports of the auditors, committees and officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
6. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the repair of school houses.

7. To see if the District will vote to purchase a site for a new school house and to build thereon and to raise and appropriate money therefor.

To see if the Claremont School District will vote to establish and maintain a High school in said District, in which the higher English branches of education, and the Latin, Greek and modern languages may be taught, in accordance with Sect. 9, Chap. 89, of the Public Statutes of the state of New Hampshire, so that our entire school system shall be managed by the District instead of a portion being managed by the District, and the High school by the Town, as at present.

9. To elect or appoint a Superintendent of Schools for the school District, or to authorize the School Board or some other committee to employ one.

10. To determine and provide for the term of office, the compensation and the powers and duties of the Superintendent of Schools, and appropriate money therefor.

11. To see if the District will vote to move the school house in old No. 5 to a location near Claremont Junction, or build a new one there, and appropriate money therefor.

12. To choose agents, auditors and committees in relation to any subjects embraced in this warrant.

## Report of Stevens High School Comm.

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The committee of Stevens High School submit the following brief statement of the condition, needs and standing of that institution.

It was thought advisable at the beginning of the school year to add another assistant to the corps of teachers, to allow more time for general supervision of the work in the school by Prof. Smart. To that end the services of Miss Belcher, a graduate of Vassar and Radcliffe were secured, and the fall term opened auspiciously with Prof. Smart, A. M., teaching Greek and German, Miss Twitchell, B. A., Latin and French, Miss Jones, B. A., Science, Miss Hubbard, Mathematics, Miss Belcher, B. A., English and History, Miss Walker, Music and Drawing, and Miss Wilmot, Elocution and Physical culture. The vacancy caused by the very sad and unexpected death of Miss Twitchell, in September, was filled by Miss Ralston, instructress in French and English, and after some readjustment of the work among the teachers, due to this change, the school began in earnest the labors of the year.

The number of pupils in attendance, larger last year than any previous year in the history of the school, it is thought will be exceeded the present year, and the lack of a sufficient number of recitation rooms necessary for the growing demands of the school is becoming a serious matter; it frequently happening that more classes are to recite at a given hour than there are class-rooms to accommodate them. At the present rate of increase in attendance provision for this necessity cannot be long delayed.

The nine hundred dollars raised and appropriated for repairs on the High School Building at the last annual meeting of the town, was placed by the selectmen, in the hands of the committee, to spend as they deemed advisable, and Messrs. Brown and Holt constituted a sub-committee for the purpose. Accordingly, the hall, the class-rooms in second story, ante-room and hallways were re-floored with hard wood and properly finished, fifty new chairs and desks purchased to replace those which had become worn beyond repair, forty old desks renovated, eight new tables and cupboards added in the laboratory for use of students in science, blackboards dressed over and a book-case added, thus putting the interior in good condition. The roof was temporarily repaired, and all concrete on the school grounds dressed over

and made practically as good as new. More money could be profitably expended on the exterior of the building in painting the wood-work, and repairs (or better still) alterations to the gutters and roof. But being uncertain as to what might be done in the event of realizing the Stevens' legacy, it was thought best by the committee to allow these items to remain unchanged; they will, however, need attention in the near future. The repairs made are of a permanent character and need not be destroyed in the event of an addition to the building, and certainly not if the growing needs of the school should be met by the erection of a new structure, supplementary to the present one, thus forming a nucleus of what may develop into a preparatory school of larger scope, offering facilities to students from other towns to come here for their preparatory work, or by meriting the diploma of the school be well equipped with the liberal education it is here possible to obtain.

Already the certificate of the school admits its graduates without examination, to many of the colleges. Its standard has been raised from time to time to meet the advancing requirements of the colleges and universities, and it is believed that from an educational standpoint the school has never been on so high a plane as it is to-day.

It is doing splendid work and is worthy the generous support it has always received, and without doubt will continue to receive as its necessities demand.

## Report of Board of Health.

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The present year has been a very busy one for the Board of Health, especially during the small pox epidemic, which cost two lives, a great deal of suffering, about \$4,500 direct expense to the town, many thousand dollars loss to trade, and an unknown indirect loss to business enterprise and prosperity. In fact the town has hardly yet fully recovered from its influence, as many thought the dread disease would break out afresh this winter, but which we are happy to say has not yet appeared, and we do not in the least expect such a result, as we have been very careful to fumigate and disinfect all the houses in which it occurred, and also to burn all clothing, bedding, carpets, etc., which might have been infected as we were determined to thoroughly eradicate all sources of contagion if possible.

There were in all 26 cases, of whom 24 recovered and two died. It was first known to the Board that there was small pox in town on April 28, when it was found that there were eleven cases, nine of which were reported as measles and two not reported at all. On investigation we found that the first case came from Newport on March 19, just forty days before we were aware of the disease being in our community. Within the next two weeks 12 more cases appeared, so that 23 out of 26 had contracted the disease before it was known to the Board or to the public that there was a case in town, and only three other cases were contracted afterwards, of which two contracted it before we were able to provide a suitable building for a hospital and the other and last one was from a family in which three of the preceding cases had occurred, so we believe all will concede that the spread of this serious and highly contagious disease was very speedily stamped out. The means we employed to effect this result were: Quarantining all infected families, a daily inspection of all persons known to have been exposed, and vaccinating or causing to be vaccinated all persons who were unprotected, and our experience is such as to fully warrant us in recommending that all children should be compelled to be vaccinated before being allowed to attend school, and we believe it a wise provision for all persons to be revaccinated as often as every seven years and oftener if in the influence of an epidemic. We feel certain that had the people not been well protected there would have been hundreds of cases instead of twenty-six.

In conjunction with the selectmen a building was purchased and remodelled into a very convenient hospital within a week from the time we knew the dire malady was in our midst, and on May 6th all the cases were moved into it, the last case being discharged from the hospital July 9. The building was then closed and has not since been opened, which leads us to say in regard to the disposal of this that if the land upon which it stands is not to be used for any other purpose we recommend that it be allowed to remain as it is, as no one knows how soon it may be needed again, but if the land is to be used we advise that it be burned with its contents, as we consider that tearing down or removing it would be too dangerous to be attempted.

There have been 17 cases of diphtheria reported to the Board, of which six died. Antitoxin was used in ten cases with three deaths; seven were treated without it with three deaths, so that while we had hoped for good results from the use of this new remedy, the facts do not warrant too great a reliance upon its use.

There have been 312 cases of measles reported to the Board and we have no doubt that there were 200 cases not reported as we found a good many cases that were not attended by any physician, and again in many families the first case only was reported while other members afterwards had the disease. At first we were careful to quarantine the sick ones but they soon became so numerous and the type of the disease so mild that we were not so careful for in all the cases there were no deaths.

We had one case of scarlet fever which recovered, also 15 cases of typhoid fever, and while several of these were very sick, all recovered except one; but of the three cases of croup reported, all died.

No exact record of the number of complaints made to the Board has been kept as many were verbal and made to the different members, but several hundred have been recorded. While many were worthy of our attention, a great many were not in our line at all. A great many were for cess-pools and privy vaults and in most of these cases a great lack of cleanliness, was found, in many of which it was a question as how to abate the nuisance. We are not going to say anything about the greatest need of Claremont, but until that need is supplied the people will have to do, we suppose, the best they can, and the prospect is poor of anything being done until some great epidemic of typhoid fever shall arouse the people to action.

We have found the carcasses of three dead horses unburied and the body of one dead hog beside the road. We have condemned two cattle slaughtered for beef and they were buried instead of being peddled out for consumption. We have brought two suits for violation of health laws and have recovered for the town in fines beside the costs, Dr. J. H. Theriault \$100 and costs for failure to report small pox cases, Peter Noley for breaking quarantine, \$10 and costs, and the town received from the E. D. Baker estate \$20 and costs for a fine imposed two years ago. We have made many enemies and few friends. We retire from the Board feeling that we have tried to do our duty and recommend to our successors the need of carrying out what we started to do late last fall and were unable to complete before the ground was frozen so as to prevent satisfactory results, namely, a house-to-house inspection. We believe this work ought to be done in the spring, and all the sink drains should be put under ground and privies should be cleaned out at least twice a year, all heaps of rubbish and accumulations from kitchen and stable should be removed as well as empty fish and fruit cans, which in some cases are found in the rear of premises. "Cleanliness is next to Godliness" is an old saying the truth of which we believe. It is discouraging for one to try and keep clean when his neighbors are allowed to throw their rubbish all around, and too often we are compelled to breath the atmosphere vitiated by decaying organic and vegetable matter left in the open air to decompose and thus endanger the public health.

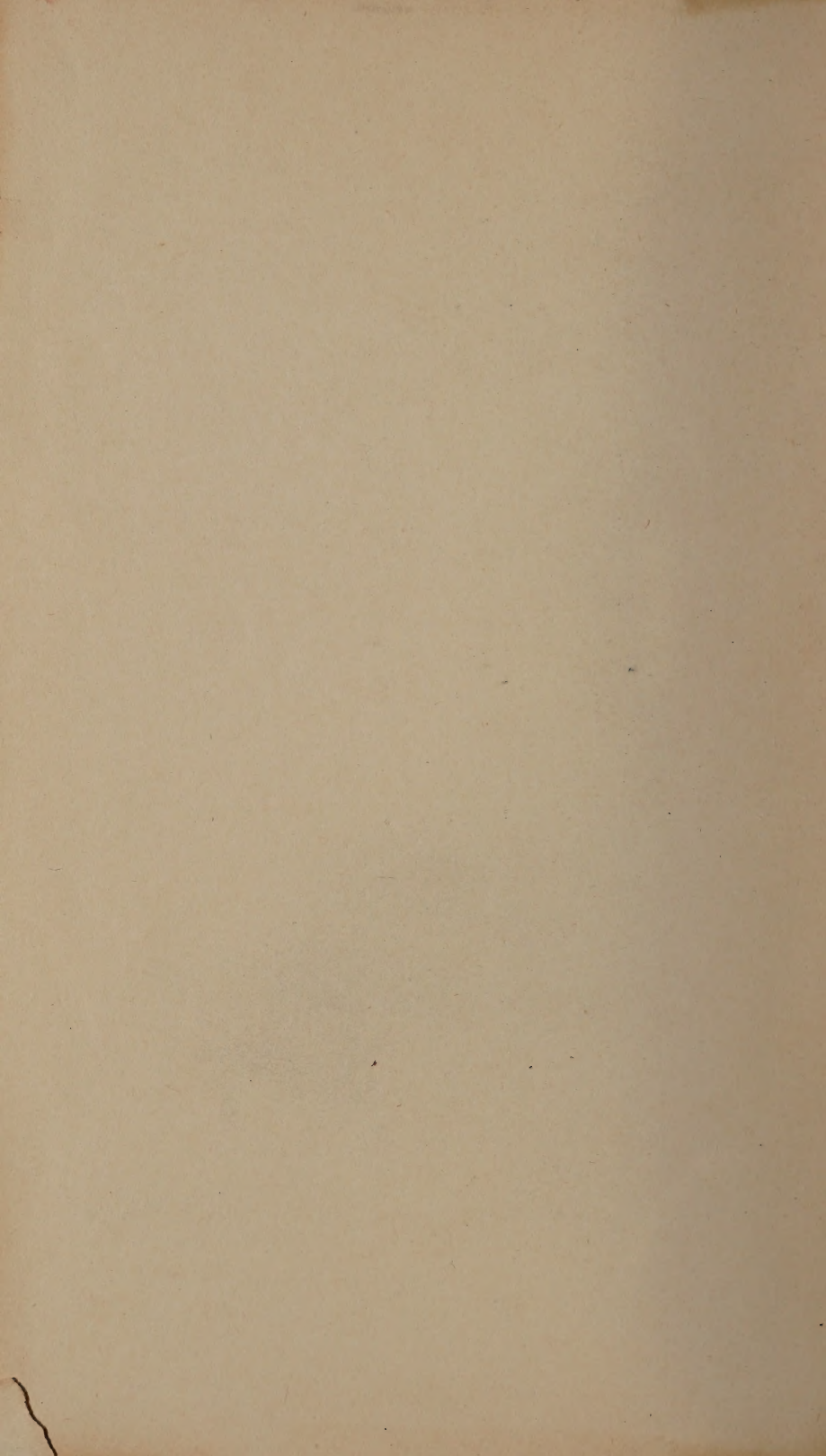
