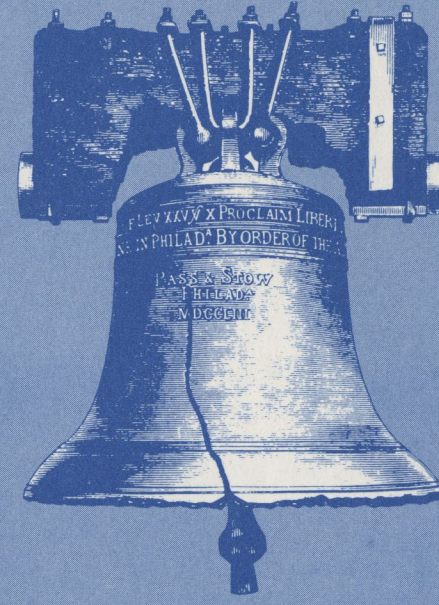
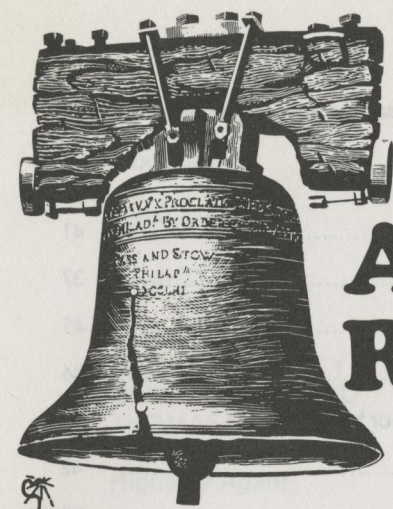

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Several major projects were completed this year, some of which were started several years ago. The tax map and the property reappraisal is complete and final. However, the cost of keeping both of these up to date is approximately \$3,800 per year which is included under Town Offices Expenses. The vault in the Selectmen's office has been completed and all of our records are now safely filed. More Town Office building repairs have been completed and both this building and the Town Hall are in good repair. We are planning to revise and add more lighting to the upper Town Hall, put in a good supplemental heating unit in the library room, replace the sewer system at the fire house and insulate the walls of the Town Offices.

The grading in the center cemetery is mostly completed. We intend to provide a through road in the center cemetery by tearing down the old fire house and acquiring a small piece of land from Mr. Currie and Mr. Shanton. We've also included money in this year's budget to start straightening the stones that have been knocked over or are leaning.

The Gorham Pond Road was completed this year as well as a portion of the Town roads within the Lake Gorham development. Also a portion of the Guinea Road from Grapevine Road to Jim Stone's farm was tarred this year. Construction was also started on the Montalona Road. This year we expect to complete the Montalona Road construction, complete the tarring of town roads within the Lake Gorham Development, reconstruct the top of Hammond Hill and start reconstruction of portions of the Black Brook Road.

The Town refuse now has to be hauled to the Concord Sanitary Land Fill. We got a deferral on hauling until January 1, 1978 but now we are required to haul it to Concord. This summer we expect to get larger containers and set them in a ditch so that they can be filled from the top.

Expenses for Town operations have increased significantly this year. However, the tax rate should decline next year if we purchase the fire truck now. The minimum wage increase which we passed along to all town employees who were at the minimum wage significantly increased several budgets. Additionally, many more hours are being spent on Town business. The printing costs of town reports, ballots and warrants have increased considerably. Rates for all equipment, snowplowing and summer maintenance have been increased to compensate for the increases in fuel, labor and parts experienced over the last few years. The Fire Department maintenance budget also has been increased significantly as we now have six vehicles to maintain and equip.

The new Dog Leash Ordinance has been successfully administered primarily due to the efforts of Don Andrews, dog officer, and Sylvia Grenier who has agreed to take the dogs. The Selectmen are most grateful to Sylvia for her help.

There has been a considerable amount of surplus property available from the State. The Selectmen have applied for a grader, some data processing equipment and a quonset hut to provide for town equipment.

The Fire Department has a generator which can operate the entire fire house if electricity should be cut off. The Civil Defense Coordinator Ed Ballam will attempt to procure a generator for the Town Hall as well. Then in an emergency or disaster situations the Town will have 2 buildings to provide shelter, heat and food for those who need it.

The Selectmen decided to hold a special town meeting in 1977 to legally ratify the referendum items. After discussion with Town Counsel, it was found that the referendum items were not legally adopted at the regular town meeting in 1977 as the warrant was not in proper order.

We worked with the Selectmen in the Towns of Weare and Goffstown to perambulate our mutual town line. We have found several bounds missing and some broken. The State is in the process of replacing the missing bound on Route 77 and we are contacting the Army Corp of Engineers to replace a bound in the Everett Dam area. Also, we put money in this year's budget to replace several broken bounds on the Goffstown line. We expect to perambulate the Hooksett town line this Spring.

The Selectmen had a bulletin board placed outside the Town Offices where we post all public notices and any other public information. The Selectmen hours remain 8 to 12 noon on Monday mornings and 7 to 9 P.M. on the third Thursday of every month.

NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS

A new law effective April 1, 1978 imposes a penalty for failure to file a fully completed inventory form.

RSA 74:7-a Penalty for Failure to File. Any person who fails to file a fully completed inventory form on or before April 15 unless granted an extension under RSA 74:8, shall pay a penalty of one percent of the property tax for which he is liable. In no case, however, shall the penalty be less than \$10.00 or more than \$50.00. Any person who fails to file an inventory form and who becomes liable to pay the penalty specified in this section shall lose his right to appeal any matter pertaining to the property tax for which he is liable or exemptions to which he may be entitled. This penalty has all the force of taxation and shall be treated as incident to the tax.

Inventory blanks are mailed before March 25 as required under RSA 74:5, but if for any reason you fail to receive one, you should contact the Selectmen to obtain one and complete it as required above.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF DUNBARTON IN THE COUNTY OF MERRIMACK IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 10:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Dunbarton on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon; and cast ballots from that hour until at least seven o'clock in the evening of said day for such town officers and school officers as they may be listed on the ballots.

You are also notified to meet at the same place at seven o'clock in the evening of the same day to act upon the following subjects: None of the articles in the warrant, except those relating to the election of officers and those covering questions on the ballot shall be considered during the time the polls are open.

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

2. To see if the town will vote to amend the Dunbarton Zoning Ordinance as adopted March 10, 1970 and subsequently amended so that Article IV, Section A, Paragraph Mobile Homes be changed to read as follows:

Article IV - General Provisions
Section A - Definitions
Paragraph - Mobile Homes

Mobile Homes - Any vehicle or structure so developed or constructed in such manner as will permit occupancy thereof, as living quarters for one or more persons and so designated that it is or may

be mounted on wheels whether dismantable or not and used as a conveyance on highways or town streets, propelled or driven by its own or other motive power.

Lots shall be a minimum of five (5) acres with a minimum of three hundred (300) foot frontage.

6. To see if the town will vote to amend the Dunbarton Zoning Ordinance as adopted March 10, 1970 and subsequently amended so that Article V, Section C, Village District (Zone V) pp. 10 be changed to read as follows:

Article V - Zoning District Regulations
Section C - Lot Sizes and Areas
Village District (Zone V) pp. 10

Lots shall be a minimum of two (2) acres with a minimum of two hundred (200) foot frontage.
(by official ballot)

7. To see if the town will vote to amend the Dunbarton Zoning Ordinance as adopted March 10, 1970 and subsequently amended so that Article IX, Section D, Paragraph 2, pp. 13 be changed to read as follows:

Article IX - Board of Adjustment
Section D - Special EXceptions
Paragraph 2, pp. 13

The Planning Board has made a recommendation as to the suitability of the site.
(by official ballot)

8. To see if the town will vote to amend the Dunbarton Zoning Ordinance as adopted March 10, 1970 and subsequently amended so that Article V, Section D, Rural Residential District (Zone R.R.) on pp. 8 and Village District (Zone V) pp. 10 be changed to read as follows:

The set back requirement pertaining to buildings shall be fifty (50) feet. (Inserted by petition) (recommended by Planning Board) (by official ballot).

9. To see if the town will vote to amend the Dunbarton Zoning Ordinance as adopted March 10, 1970 and subsequently amended so that a new section, Section E, is added to Article V, Rural

Residential District (Zone R.R.) pp. 8 and Village District (Zone V) pp. 10 will read as follows:

E(1) Septic systems shall not be placed within two hundred (200) feet of a permanent body of water or running water. (Inserted by petition) (Not recommended by Planning Board) (by official ballot).

10. To see if the town will vote to amend the Dunbarton Zoning Ordinance as adopted March 10, 1970 and subsequently amended so that a new section, Section E is added to Article V, Rural Residential District (Zone R.R.) pp. 8, and Village District (Zone V) pp. 10 which will read as follows:

E(2) Septic systems shall not be placed within fifty (50) feet of a property line. (Inserted by petition) (recommended by Planning Board) (by official ballot).

11. To see if the town will vote to amend the Dunbarton Zoning Ordinance as adopted March 10, 1970 and subsequently amended so that a new section, Section E, is added to Article V, Rural Residential District (Zone R.R.) pp. 8 and Village District (Zone V) pp. 10 which will read as follows:

E(3) Septic systems shall not be allowed in areas where the seasonal high water table is within two (2) feet of the surface. (Inserted by petition) (Not recommended by the Planning Board) (by official ballot).

12. To see if the town will vote to amend the Dunbarton Zoning Ordinance as adopted March 10, 1970 and subsequently amended so that a new section, Section F is added to Article V, Rural Residential District (Zone R.R.) pp 8 and Village District (Zone V), pp 10, which will read as follows:

F. We the townspeople, do hereby authorize the Selectmen to adopt wafer pollution control regulations for the Town of Dunbarton. (Inserted by petition) (Recommended by Planning Board) (by official ballot).

13. To see if the town will vote to amend the Dunbarton Zoning Ordinance as adopted March 10, 1970 and subsequently amended so that a new section, Section G, is added to Article V, Rural Residential District (Zone R.R.), pp 8 and Village District (Zone V), pp 10 which will read as follows:

G. The maximum number of residential building permits issued per year shall be three (3) percent of the then existing number of residences. (Inserted by petition) (Not recommended by Planning Board) (by official ballot).

14. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the

15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$835.09 for Class V roads to match a sum of \$5,567.28 to be contributed by the State.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$742.00 for the continuation of services to low income residents of Dunbarton through the Concord Area Center of the Community Action Program. Belknap-Merrimack Counties Inc., and withdraw this amount from the Town Revenue Sharing Fund.

17. To see if the town will vote to withdraw the interest of \$929.98 from the Winslow Town Forest Fund, the same to be used as determined by the Town Forest Committee.

18. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to grant a right of way over town land shown as lot number D4-2-4 on the Dunbarton town map, the right of way to be fifty (50) feet in width and approximately fifteen hundred (1500) feet in length, to Leo Abbott, Thomas, McGary and Ernest Dugrenier in return for a right of way to be granted by them over land they own to the Town of Dunbarton. (Inserted by petition).

19. To see if the town will vote to withdraw the sum of \$19,524.70 from the Town Equipment Capital Reserve Fund (Amoskeag Bank), for the purchase of a new fire truck.

20. To see if the town will vote to withdraw the sum of \$6,413.47 from the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a new fire truck.

21. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$8,099.00 for the purchase of a new fire truck and authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Revenue Sharing Fund.

22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$19,962.83 for the purchase of a new fire truck.

23. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to withdraw the monies from the Town Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund, (Manchester Federal Savings and Loan) for the potential purchase of a road grader.

24. To see if the town will vote to accept a gift of a tract of land from J. Willcox Brown to be added to the Dunbarton Town Forest in south Dunbarton with this entire property to be named the Charles Little Town Forest.

25. To see if the town will vote to allow the Selectmen to apply for, receive and pay the freight charges for surplus property.

26. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a library building committee of 5 members with 2 year terms, this committee to last for ten years. The funds raised by this committee will be used to offset the committee's administrative costs.

27. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to tear down the old fire house and salt shed.

28. To see if the town will vote to allow the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend State and/or Federal funds for the purposes for which they are granted.

29. To see if the town will grant to the Selectmen authority to dispose of any property acquired through Tax Collector's Deeds.

- 30. To see if the town will vote a fixed rate of remuneration to be paid the tax collector for the collection of taxes.
- 31. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting.
- 32. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 33. To see if the town will vote to accept all trust funds not heretofore accepted.
- 34. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, and other officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 35. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

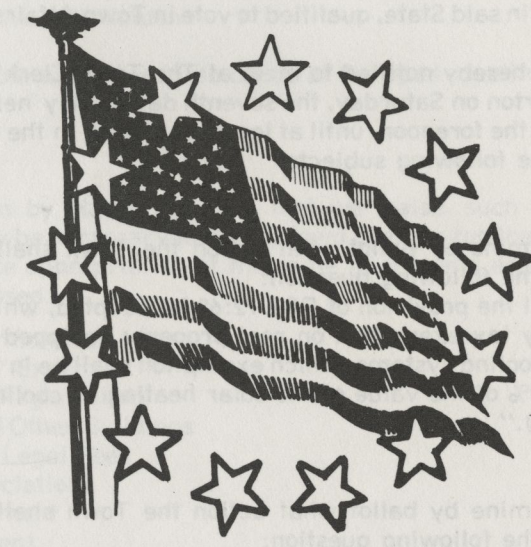

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Dunbarton in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at The Town Clerk's Office in said Dunbarton on Saturday, the seventh day of May next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, until at least six o'clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1:

To determine by ballot what action the Town shall take with respect to the following question:

"Shall the provision of RSA 72:62 be adopted, which provide for property tax exemption on real property equipped with solar heating or cooling systems, which exemption shall be in the amount equal to 100% of the value of the solar heating or cooling system? (yes) (no)."

Article 2:

To determine by ballot what action the Town shall take with respect to the following question:

"Shall an amendment to the Town Zoning ordinance be adopted which changes a lot size from a minimum of 40,000 square feet (.918 acre) and 100 foot frontage to 2 acres and 200 foot frontage? (yes) (no)."

Article 3:

To determine by ballot what action the Town shall take with respect to the following question:

"Shall an amendment to the Town zoning ordinance be adopted which eliminates the definitions of front yard, rear yard, side yard and yard, depth and width of; and add a definition of setback, and a definition of height to conform with Legislation passed at a special Town meeting on 6/7/72? (yes) (no)."

Article 4:

To determine by ballot what action the Town shall take with respect to the following question:

"Shall an amendment to the Town zoning ordinance be adopted which replaces the present restoration article under non conforming uses and structures to permit with certain qualifications, restoration, remodeling and operation of non conforming property? (yes) (no)."

The motion by Ernest Dugrenier that the town appropriate the sum of \$4,255.63 for mapping and property reappraisal and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from Revenue Sharing Fund passed.

Article VIII

The motion by Ernest Dugrenier that the town vote to withdraw the interest of \$671.26 from the Winslow Town Forest Fund, the same to be used as determined by the Town Forest Committee passed.

Article IX

The motion by Leslie Hammond that the town vote to withdraw a

sum of money not to exceed \$4,500.00 from the Capital Reserve Fund for Town Equipment for the purchase of one Model E Body spreader passed.

Article X

The motion was made by Ernest Dugrenier that the town vote to adopt the provisions of an ordinance restricting the running at large of dogs in the town of Dunbarton.

The Town of Dunbarton hereby ordains as follows:

Any dog found running at large outside the limits of its owner's property and not under the owner's control or supervision within the Town of Dunbarton will be impounded.

The word "owner" as used in this ordinance shall mean a person who owns or keeps a dog.

The owner of any impounded dog, when known, may retrieve said dog upon payment to the Town of Dunbarton a fee of \$5.00 for the impounding and an additional charge for board each day that said dog is confined by the Dunbarton Police Department.

In the event that the owner of any impounded dog is unknown the description of said dog will be advertised. If the owner is found, the same fees and charges must be paid as well as any additional cost caused by the advertising before said dog is released to the owner. If the owner cannot be determined after ten days confinement, the dog will be humanely disposed of by the Dunbarton Police Department.

This ordinance shall take effect April 1, 1977.

An amendment by Berel Firestone that "After 10 days the animal be delivered to a dog sanctuary where the animal will be kept for life, and an appropriation of \$500.00 be made thereto" did not pass by voice vote.

The original motion passed Yes 75; No 71. This was by written ballot, the request for a secret ballot having been received prior to the meeting.

Article XI

The motion by Harold Mooney that the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to purchase the Page field, so-called, surrounding the North Dunbarton Cemetery, to be used solely for extension of the cemetery passed.

Article XII

The motion by Susan Koerber that the town raise and appropriate \$10,000.00 to finance the building of a structure to store recyclable materials and to cover the cost of transporting non-recyclable materials to the Concord landfill site with separation of trash by town residents required, with the provision that the selectmen be authorized to take advantage within the foregoing fiscal limits, of any interim legislation relating to the disposal issue was defeated.

Article XIII

The motion by Susan Koerber that the town raise and appropriate \$15,000.00 to finance the erection of a recycling center on the present dump site, the purchase of an incinerator and the payment of necessary salaries and overhead with separation of trash by town residents required, with the provision that the selectmen be authorized to take advantage, within the foregoing fiscal limits, of any interim legislation relating to the disposal issue was defeated.

Article XIV

The motion by Harold Mooney that the town vote to authorize the selectmen to negotiate a contract with the City of Concord for use of its sanitary landfill facilities at an assessment not to exceed \$2.16 per capita for the first year and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,270.16 for such purposes with the provision that, if the Legislature grants relief on open burning, we shall continue with our present operation, passed.

Article XV

The motion by Leslie Hammond that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,600.00 for pickup of solid waste at the Dunbarton town dump and transportation of the same to the Concord sanitary landfill site, with the provision that, if the Legislature grants relief on open burning, we shall continue with our present operation, passed.

At this time a standing vote of thanks was given Armand Audef for his years of service as Road Agent. (16 years)

Article XVI

The motion by Ernest Dugrenier that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,400.00 for the purchase of a new police cruiser, this cruiser to replace the 1973 Plymouth cruiser now being used by the department, with all monies realized from the sale of the old cruiser to revert back to the town passed.

Article XVII

The motion by Harold Mooney that the town vote to allow the selectmen to apply for, receive and expend State and/or Federal Funds for the purposes for which they are granted passed.

Article XVIII

The motion by Jane Grant that the selectmen be granted

authority to dispose of any property acquired through tax collector's deeds, provided such disposal be made by sealed bid or auction and only after review by the Planning Board and the Conservation Commission as to public use of such properties passed.

Article XIX

The motion by Ernest Dugrenier that the town vote a fixed rate of remuneration to be paid the tax collector for the collection of taxes at 1/2 of 1% on all taxes collected less resident taxes and abatements passed.

Article XX

The motion was made by Harold Mooney that the town vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting.

An amendment by Peter Hecker that the word "NOT" to petition be included in the amendment passed.

The original motion passed as amended.

Article XXI

The motion be Leslie Hammond that the town authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes passed.

Article XXII

The motion by Ernest Dugrenier that the town vote to accept all trust funds not heretofore accepted including those of E. G. and Doris Shirley, Helen Dodds, Alice Benoit, Eva Tucker and Arlene Bailey passed.

Article XXIII

The motion by Harold Mooney that we accept the reports of agents, auditors, committees and other officers heretofore chosen, as printed subject to printer's errors and omissions, and pass any vote relating thereto passed.

Article XXIV

The recommendation was made that the selectmen and cemetery trustees make a study of the available space at the Center Cemetery and report at the next town meeting.

In response to the question regarding a recount of the ballots cast on Article #10, the following procedure was stated: ten voters shall apply in writing to the town clerk for a recount of the ballots before the expiration of 15 days from the town meeting.

The moderator stated he was in favor of this procedure concerning a recount.

The meeting adjourned at 11:25.

PROPERTY ASSESSMENT EVALUATION

COMPARATIVE ANALYSIS

R. P. Daigle and Associates signed a contract with the Town of Dunbarton on May 10, 1976 for \$16,400 to reassess the entire town which consists of approximately 900 separate tracts. The last reappraisal was done for tax year 1964. A sales study compiled in 1975 using 1974 sales in the Town of Dunbarton, done by the Office of Revenue Administration of the State of New Hampshire, indicated that properties in general were being assessed at a ratio of 39% of market value. The total assessed valuation of properties in Dunbarton for the tax year 1976 was \$6,718,345, after reappraisal the total assessed valuation this year is \$17,629,045 or a 163% increase.

The Selectmen published a booklet in April of 1977 entitled Property Tax Assessments, showing both the 1976 and 1977 assessments for each piece of property in Town. Additional changes have been made since this booklet was published correcting errors and omissions in both the booklet and our new tax map. Therefore, please contact the Selectmen's Office if you have a question on your assessment.

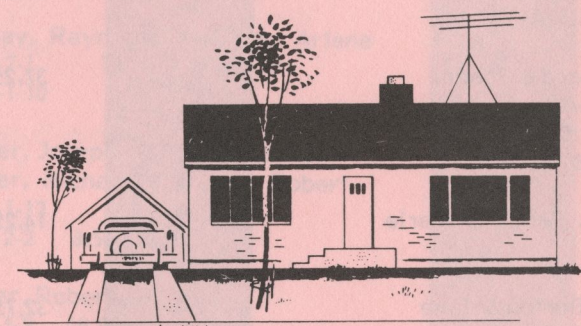

CURRENT LAND USE

The Selectmen of Dunbarton received 42 applications for current land use which comprised 85 parcels of land and 3,812.87 acres for a total assessed valuation of \$900,450.

Eleven applications were denied totalling 27 parcels and 1,234.77 acres. The remaining 31 applications were accepted totalling 58 parcels, 2,578.1 acres and an assessed valuation of \$595,150. Land use classification reduced this total valuation from \$595,150.00 to \$372,750.00 for an average parcel reduction of \$3,824.48 in assessment.

The current land use application forms include a set of instructions which must be reviewed carefully. If your form is incomplete or additional necessary information is not included, we must reject your application. All new applications must be submitted to us by April 15th and we will send a notice to you by July 1st of our decision. For all land now under current land use, we must receive a reapplication by April 15th.

The following is a checklist of items necessary for current land use. If you have any questions, please contact the Selectmen before completing a current use form.

1. You must submit, at a minimum, a fully completed current use form and detailed map for each parcel of land or portion of a parcel. By parcel we mean a lot of record as shown on the town tax map. Please remember, also, to indicate whether you want the recreational factor or not.

2. The map must be of sufficient detail so that we can locate the parcel and compute distances and acreages. There must be distances recorded on the maps for each boundary of a current use category. You must define the parcel by putting on it the map, block and lot numbers from the town tax map. You must show all buildings and deduct all acreages for buildings and lawns from the current use category. If you have a house on the parcel you must deduct at least one acre for a house lot.

3. The total amount of acreage shown for a parcel must agree with our tax map or be resolved prior to current use application.

4. You must have easily identifiable boundaries for each current use category applied for.

5. All current use categories except wet land must have a total of 10 acres. However, if your property is divided by a road, it is still considered contiguous and you may have five acres on one side and five on the other and still qualify for land use.

6. Review very carefully the categories for land use and pick the appropriate one.

a) All land categorized as farm land must be actually devoted to the production of horticultural or agricultural crops.

b) If categorized as forest land, you must also include in your application a statement from your forester or a notarized statement from yourself that the land is receiving currently acceptable silvicultural practices.

c) Wild Land

1. Unproductive--in our opinion is virtually non-existent in Dunbarton and we probably will not approve any land so categorized.

2. Unmanaged farm and forest land requires that the land has been left in its natural state for the last five years and is continuing to be kept that way. The Selectmen require a notarized statement to this effect for any land so categorized.

d) Any application for natural preserve land must include a letter of recommendation from the Dunbarton Conservation Commission and the Dunbarton Planning Board.

e) The recreation factor can be applied to any land use category if you so indicate on the application form. However, in order to qualify for this factor there must be no restrictions or fee for public use of and assess to your land for such recreational uses as described in the current use instruction manual.

f) The 27 parcels denied current land use this year, were denied for one or more of the following reasons:

1. Land inappropriately classified.

2. Less than 10 acres in one land use category.

3. Map not sufficiently detailed to allow computation of land use acreage.

4. Did not fill out current use form completely.

5. Did not deduct acreages for buildings.

6. Acreages shown on current use map did not coincide with acreages on tax map or property cards.

g) The 31 parcels accepted for current land use were categorized as follows:

1977 was a year of new events for the Conservation Commission. A new chairperson, David Woolpert, was elected to fill the vacancy left by Jane Grant, who stepped down from that position after nine years of steady guidance of the Commission and energetic commitment to the natural resources of Dunbarton.

The Commission finalized its negotiations with Ted Lenda which resulted in the donation to the town of an attractive piece of land bordering Kimball Road.

The Commission also worked hard to get town voter approval of the referendum question regarding solar heating tax exemption.

Although a printing error cause a second vote in June, this exemption was finally adopted by the town.

1978 will probably be just as challenging as 1977, but it could never be the same.

REPORT OF DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF AND TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Forest fire control in New Hampshire is a joint state and town/city responsibility (RSA 224).

The Director, Division of Forests and Lands (State Forester) appoints a forest fire warden and several deputy forest fire wardens in each town/city upon the recommendation of local authorities.

The local forest fire warden is responsible for forest fire prevention and suppression activities in his town. He regulates the kindling of outside fires when the ground is not covered with snow by the issuance of written permits only when conditions are safe. He is responsible for suppression with the town/city and state sharing the cost. Suppression costs in excess of 1/4 of 1% of the assessed valuation of the town are assumed by the state.

The state provides training for the local fire organization and helps coordinate activities between towns/cities. The state also supports local forces with backup personnel, equipment, and supplies for suppression and prevention.

This combination of state and local cooperation, started in 1893, works well, for New Hampshire has enjoyed one of the smallest acreage losses due to forest fires in the United States for the past 25 years.

Report of the Dunbarton Public Library Trustees

Our Library continues to grow in purpose and popularity.

Total circulation figures are favorable as we compare them for a 3-year period:

1975 - 10,803 in all categories;
1976 - 12,216 an increase of 1413
1977 - 12,694 an increase of 478, significant considering the preceding Bicentennial year.

Purchase of books - hardcover and paperback - and magazines, for the same 3-year period go from 390 to 742 to 608. The last figure, lower by 134, partially reflects the sky-rocketing price of books, which is a restricting factor in making selections for our library.

Gifts of books, including memorials, totaled 504 in 1975; 689 in 1976 - an increase of 185; and 222 in 1977 - a sharp decrease of 467. Magazine gifts of the same period totaled 356, 418 and 321.

Memorial gifts are a fine tribute to family or friend; they have an added value as they strengthen and uphold the integrity of our library's heritage.

A further boom to the viability of our "stock in trade" evolves from borrowing books from the State Bookmobile. This valuable service is brought to us 3 times yearly and has consistently proved its worth as indicated by the "instant" borrowing and renewals to savor well the contents. In comparing the last 3 years, records show that books lent to us by the Bookmobile numbered 3,032 in 1975; 3,350 in 1976; and 3,446 in 1977. The actual physical interchange of books - removal of more than 1,000 and replacement with a similar number - is accomplished within a 3-hour period. Mrs. Blanchard, Mrs. Dunbar, the 3 Trustees, and 1 or more additional volunteers select the new books and assist with recording and filing after the Bookmobile has left. A great deal of additional work must then be done by Mrs. Blanchard before the books are ready for public perusal and appraisal.

If we have not anticipated specific interests, do not hesitate to speak to Mrs. Blanchard who will do her best to obtain from other sources the book or books you request.

We believe that the school reading program is an asset to the community, especially as a tax nonentity. The adequacy of our Public Library fulfills the State's requirement that a minimum of 6000 volumes be available for as few as 125 children, and obviates the necessity for a duplication of staffed library facilities within the school. As the program is operated, entire classes come to the library at specified times, with their teachers, to select reference or other books for classroom reading. This provides a learning experience in Library procedure, exposure to a wide range of subject material, and a growing ability to relate their reading to school work or special interests. Our assistant librarian, Mrs. Dunbar, works closely with the school to ensure the success of the program. Books borrowed during the school years of 1975, 1976, and 1977 were 3,395, 2,824, and 3,347 respectively.

We hope you enjoy the exhibits each month: beautiful craft work by talented 4-H members and other youth and townsfolk, as well as items of historical significance, and travel and collectible items. We invite you to display your handicrafts, hobbies, and memorabilia; our librarian will be glad to supply co-ordinating material.

Don't forget the children's reading program. Attractive permanent records are kept by the children, and there is a popular party at the close of the several-week period, with games and refreshments provided by the trustees.

So many people have enriched our Library during the past year: our Librarians; Mrs. Agnes Marshall, Mrs. Helen Dodds, and other volunteers; donors, exhibitors; and essentially our readers who inspire our every effort. We thank you!

DUNBARTON VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

During 1977 the Dunbarton Volunteer Fire Department has responded to 66 calls for assistance. These are broken down into the following categories:

Structural Calls	10
Medical Emergencies	17
Mutual Aid Responses	13
Brush or Forest Fire Calls	10
Trips for Dump Problems	7
Standbys for Accidents	7
Car Fire	1
Lost Hunter	1

The Dunbarton Firemen are the only firemen in this area who serve without any compensation. The other towns have some type of compensation program such as annual salary or hourly wage for fires and drills, and some combine both. I am opposed to volunteers being paid as this causes many internal problems to say nothing of expense.

The Capital Area Mutual Aid System has been a great assistance to the fire protection in this area. We now have automatic ambulance

response from Hopkinton on all medical emergencies. The availability of special equipment is great as there is a list maintained at fire alarm headquarters. This is made available by a simple radio request. The purchasing power of the system saves the taxpayers quite a sum of money.

Presently we have 6 pieces of equipment

- 1 - 1954 500 gpm Pumper with 500 gal water
Purchased new as a firetruck
- 1 - 1965 750 gpm Pumper with 750 gal. water
Purchased new as a firetruck
- 1 - 1954 60 gpm Tank with 1200 gal. water
Used oil truck
- 1 - 1952 300 gpm Tank with 1200 gal. water
Used Army 6 wheel drive
- 1 - 1953 750 gpm Tank with 1500 gal. water
Used Army 6 wheel drive
- 1 - 1952 Forestry Truck, with 275 gal. water
Used Army 4 wheel drive

This used Army equipment is expensive to maintain and due to the lack of availability of parts makes them rather undependable. When the town purchased the fire truck in 1954, it was felt that every 10 years a new truck should be purchased. Another truck was purchased in 1965 and we are now past due for the 1975 unit. We are now recommending the purchase of a new fire truck to replace the 1954 used oil truck.

We would like to thank everyone who has assisted our efforts this past year and look forward to continued cooperation in the coming year.

DUNBARTON PLANNING BOARD

The Dunbarton Planning Board held regular monthly meetings on the third Wednesday of each month. During 1977 the board received 21 applications. The applications totaled 70 lots, affecting a total acreage of approximately 1,020 acres. The following action was taken on the above applications:

Approved	8
Denied	9
Pending	4

On-site inspections were made on the majority of these subdivisions as one of the bases for the above decisions.

The board was represented at three Zoning Board meetings in regard to special exceptions of the town's Zoning Ordinance. The board also held four public hearings concerning changes in the Zoning Ordinance, one hearing in regard to petition articles, and one special Planning Board meeting. In addition, the board approved two ten-year non-subdivision agreements under Current Use Assessment. The board also discussed numerous sub-divisions with potential applicants.

On the March 1978 ballot the voters of the Town of Dunbarton will find two items concerning changes in the Dunbarton Zoning Ordinance, the first of which is a proposed change in the lot size and area in the Rural Residential District from two acres with 200' frontage to five acres with 300' frontage. The second proposed change is in the lot size and area of the Village District. This would be changed to two acres with 200' of frontage, regardless of available utilities.

The reasons for the proposed zoning changes are, first, a direct response to the results of the 1975 Planning Board questionnaire which showed that a majority of those responding prefer the uncrowded living conditions and want the town to remain rural in character. This was reinforced by the overwhelming majority of townspeople who voted in 1977 for the increase in the minimum lot size of one acre with 100' frontage to two acres with 200' frontage.

Secondly, the town has limited soil capability and limiting topographical features. Large areas in Dunbarton have a high water table, hardpan layer, numerous wetlands, ledge outcrop, and excessive slope.

It is the opinion of the Planning Board that, with the ever increasing number of sub-division applications, the uncrowded living conditions and rural character of the town cannot be maintained in the future unless the above recommended changes to the Dunbarton Zoning Ordinance are approved.

Two new members were appointed to the Planning Board during 1977; Barry Lussier in March and Richard Henderson in June. Arlene Bailey resigned and Richard Hammond, former Chairman, was not re-appointed. Richard Hammond was appointed to the Central Regional Planning Commission in March 77. The Board thanks Richard Hammond for his service to the Planning Board and Arlene Bailey for her services both on the Planning Board and the Central Regional Planning Commission.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

1977

The Board of Adjustment is scheduled to meet on the second Monday of each month and met as business required during 1977. The following cases were heard:

Variances

Sam Piper - Granted permission to have a dwelling built too close to the town right of way resulting in less than minimum yard requirement of 30 feet.

Walter Voydetch - Granted permission to replace existing mobile home with a larger mobile home.

David Rines - Granted permission to build an addition that would make building setback less than required 30 feet.

Hilda Coleman - Requested permission to build a cottage on lot too small on Gorham Pond. Application withdrawn by applicant.

Special Exceptions

Jan and Linda Van deBogart - Denied permission to operate a home body shop for small auto repairs on Montelona Road.

Ralph Mank (Dubois Property) - Denied permission to operate a chain saw sales and fencing sales on Route #13.

Maurice Leighton - Seeking permission to operate a gravel pit on Ray Road. Still pending.

In considering an appeal, the Board must act on the evidence before it and make its decision. In making its decision, the Board often stipulates certain restrictions, which the appellant must adhere to. In any case involving a conflict of interest with a Board member, the Alternate member sits with the Board of Adjustment. The member with the conflict of interest is excluded from all deliberations and the vote on the decision. The Board of Adjustment must act within the limits set by the Dunbarton Zoning Ordinance and enforcement of its decision rests with the Selectmen.

The Board of Adjustment attended Public Hearings held on January 26, 1977 and February 16, 1977 conducted by the Planning Board regarding proposed changes in the Zoning Ordinance relating to setback, non-conforming uses and minimum lot sizes. These changes were voted on at a Special Town Meeting held in May 1977. Suggested changes were approved by the voters.

The Board of Adjustment also attended a Public Hearing held December 12, 1977 conducted by the Planning Board regarding proposed changes in the Zoning Ordinance relating to minimum lot size and action by the Planning Board on Special Exceptions. These changes will be voted upon by the voters in 1978.

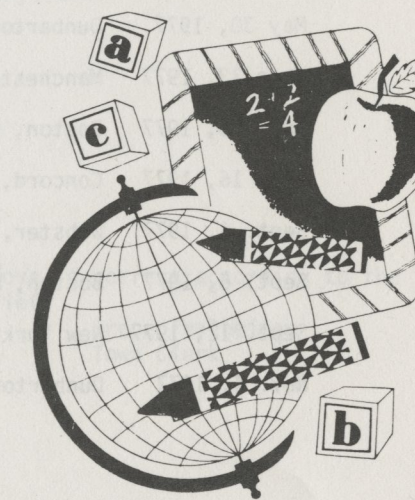

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Dunbarton qualified to vote in District affairs.

YOU ARE HEREBY NOTIFIED TO MEET AT THE TOWN HALL IN SAID DISTRICT ON THE ELEVENTH DAY OF MARCH, 1978, AT EIGHT O'CLOCK IN THE EVENING TO ACT UPON THE FOLLOWING SUBJECTS:

1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officer or agent of the District.
2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
3. To choose Agents and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
4. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the District, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States.
5. To see if the School District will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the School District the benefits of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated amended by Chapter 302 and 332 of the Laws of 1955 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600, to defray the School District's share of the cost thereof.

6. If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the School District will authorize the School Board to execute on behalf of the School District the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the School District will designate the Superintendent of Schools as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

7. To see if the School District wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions filled by popular election.

8. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for School District Officials and Agents, and for the payment of the statutory and contractual obligations of the District.

9. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

RECORD OF THE
ANNUAL MEETING OF THE DUNBARTON SCHOOL DISTRICT

March 5, 1977

The meeting of the Dunbarton School District was called to order by Moderator Richard C. Kohls at 8:00 p.m. in the Dunbarton Town Hall.

A motion was made and seconded to waive the reading of the warrant and to take the articles as they appeared, one at a time. Motion passed.

It was requested by the Moderator that all motions be in writing to avoid the possibility of error, that all questions and comments be addressed to the Moderator and not to each other and that no one speak until he is recognized.

After receiving a petition from members of the assembly, the Moderator stated that smoking would be prohibited during the meeting in the upstairs hall but would be permitted in the entryway.

ARTICLE I - The motion made by Charles E. Frost, and seconded, to accept the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officer or agent of the District, as listed in the budget, passed. There was no discussion on this Article.

ARTICLE II - The motion made by Betty Ann Noyes, and seconded, to accept any reports of Agents, Committees or Officers chosen as printed in the Town Report passed without discussion.

ARTICLE III - The motion made by Peter C. Hecker, and seconded, to pass over Article III passed after discussion as to the purpose of this Article. It was stated by the School Board that this was merely a standard Article and would probably be omitted from the warrant next year.

ARTICLE IV - The motion made by Charles E. Frost, and seconded, that the School District authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the District, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States passed after a brief discussion of whether or not educational funds would be received from the State as a result of

revenue from the sweepstakes. The School Board stated that they had had no direct communication that funds would not be received this year.

ARTICLE V - A motion was made by Peter C. Hecker, and seconded, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$309,751 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for School District Officials and Agents, and for the payment of the statutory and contractual obligations of the District.

The budget was discussed section by section with teachers' salaries being discussed at length. An explanation for the rise in salaries was given — special courses to teach special children, cost of living, an individual who is an administrator and/or teacher. Salary raises for the school nurse and the custodian were also discussed.

Under this Article transportation was discussed as was the problem of discipline on the school busses. The School Board stated that there had been dissatisfaction on behalf of many parents with regard to the quality of the busses and their drivers. The School Board advised the assembly that the problems with the busses, drivers and troublesome students were being resolved and that discipline on the school busses was not strictly enforced. Vandalism on the busses was also mentioned.

It was brought to the assembly's attention by Frederick Mullen that the lower heating costs in this year's budget were due to the efforts of the Elementary School Principal, William Zeller, in organizing volunteers to insulate a third of the ceiling in the present school.

The number of students in the elementary school and the high school and the tuition cost per pupil at each level were also discussed.

The assembly was informed that the School Lunch Program was working well with an average of 90 out of 130 pupils per day participating, with participation being as high as 115 on occasion.

A motion was made by Frederick Mullen, and seconded, that the budget be decreased by \$3,947. The School Board stated during a brief discussion that a decrease in the budget could not be taken in any specific area. Motion was defeated in a rising vote — in favor —

12, balance of assembly — opposed.

The original motion was then voted on and passed.

ARTICLE VI - A motion made by Sarah Becker, and seconded, that the name, address and records of applicants for the job as school bus driver be submitted to the School Board for approval prior to the hiring of the applicant was defeated after a brief discussion. It was stated to the assembly that the Superintendent of Schools must approve the job application of each individual applying for the job as school bus driver.

A rising vote of thanks was given to Richard C. Kohls for his services as Moderator in the past years.

On motion made and seconded, it was voted to recess the meeting until 10:00 a.m. March 8, 1977, when the polls for the School District elections would open. Motion passed.

Meeting recessed at 9:45 p.m.

For better or worse, depending upon your viewpoint, the idea of education has changed considerably. No longer do we just assist the student in his intellectual development through instruction in reading, writing and arithmetic. The demands and changes in society have required much more of the educational system until it has ballooned into a complex of social agencies. Schools must give students specific skills, knowledge of various careers, assist them in the locating of suitable work-positions. In a sense, we have become the doorstep at which society has placed many of its problems. The schools feed students, bus others, treat psychological problems, and provide health and dental services.

If there is an integration problem, the schools are singled out as the place in which the problem is attacked; if there is juvenile crime, schools are called upon to assist in its elimination. If there is discrimination, schools bear the brunt of righting the wrong that has plagued our society for years.

Much of these changes have occurred because of forces that exist beyond the local school agency. In fact, much of what has happened in education can be directly related to court orders, regulations promulgated by federal agencies spawned by bureaucrats with vision, tunnelled by private priorities.

In some of these areas, however, the prodding by agencies outside of the school system has been necessitated by the lack of initiative on the local level. A case in point is the recent legislation addressing the needs of the handicapped individual. The Federal government, recognizing the neglect, has passed two major pieces of legislation creating a potent impact on the local educational system.

Although we have reported on our efforts to meet the needs of the handicapped students, the changes caused by these laws deserve highlighting and our serious attention.

The two laws dealing with the education of the handicapped are Public Law 94-142, the Education of the Handicapped, and section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973.

P.L. 94-142

Public Law 94-142, the Education of the Handicapped Act, includes provisions which are designed (1) to assure that all handicapped children have available to them a free appropriate public education; (2) to assure that the rights of handicapped children and their parents are protected; (3) to assist states and localities to provide for the education of handicapped children; and (4) to assess and assure the effectiveness of efforts to educate such children.

The law defines "handicapped children" to mean those children evaluated as being mentally retarded, hard of hearing, deaf, speech impaired, visually handicapped, seriously emotionally disturbed, orthopedically impaired, other health impaired, deaf-blind, multi-handicapped, or as having specific learning disabilities, who because of those impairments need special education and related services.

The special education and related services needed for the handicapped child must be appropriate and free to the individual's family.

If the local school district cannot provide the particular program and/or service, then it is the responsibility of the district in consultation with the parents to place the child in a program that will suit the child's needs, even if it means going outside the district.

The financial responsibility for these programs rests with the State and the local district. The State supposedly carries the amount that exceeds the State average cost to educate the student. However, the appropriation for this purpose does not approach the funding level necessary. Thus, in practice the local school district pays the entire bill.

Transportation for the handicapped is another service that must be provided. At this time, we have been able for the most part to render the service through the utilization of a mini-bus, or private vehicles.

Probably one of the most complex and perplexing problems confronting the classroom teacher has been the concept of mainstreaming. The law mandates that if a handicapped student can be placed in a regular classroom situation, then this is the action that must be taken. In some cases, the teacher is not fully trained to provide the proper education for that child. It also has become difficult to maintain a proper balance between the handicapped and non-handicapped student in the classroom setting. Much work is needed in this area.

Section 504.

Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 provides that all educational institutions must be barrier free within three years. Simply stated, the law demands that all educational programs and services be accessible to the handicapped student. At first glance, the financial implications of these regulations are staggering as one envisions installation of all sorts of equipment including elevators, ramps, and new alarm systems. However, our preliminary study indicates that the Dunbarton Elementary School will not have to undergo any remodeling to comply with the regulations. There may be, however, some changes and adaptations. In relation to these laws, our school has been bringing and will continue to bring to the handicapped student the necessary skills and tools to insure them that they will have the equipment to compete for their rightful place in our society.

Specifically, the most needy in the Dunbarton Elementary School District are referred via the school core team to a Union wide placement team by the case manager from the elementary school. If this team feels that the student in question needs a program that cannot be met in the local school, they recommend placement in a special school where the students' needs can be met.

Most needs of the educationally handicapped student are met in the regular classroom through an individualized program. This plan is determined by a team of at least three teachers in the local school. It also often includes input by specialists in various fields.

Within our school, we have a learning disabilities assistant and two teachers with extensive background in the area of special needs and/or educationally handicapped students. We try to identify and meet the needs of the handicapped student starting even before they enter school. This is done through a series of pre-school tests administered by the school staff and necessary specialists. This process identifies students with special needs before they start school and helps us to be prepared for them.

By the time most students reach the third or fourth grade, they are no longer in need of a special program, but are able to keep up with regular class work. In the case of some students, retention for one or two years might be necessary to accomplish this goal.

Special challenges arise when handicapped students move into the school system from a system where they have not had special help. This is an even greater challenge if the student is in the 5th or 6th grade largely because of social promotion. In cases like this it takes longer to identify the needs and set up an individualized plan.

The program for an educationally disadvantaged child in the Title I program can also meet the needs of some of the handicapped children. Other cases involve the need for speech therapy or other services that are provided by a specialist in addition to the regular class placement. These may be during or after regular school hours.

Although the emphasis of this report has been the handicapped student, in no way can it be interpreted that our educational program for the non-handicapped student has been neglected. This report is only offered to give the community some indication of the implications, financially and educationally, of the new laws and their demands.

I wish to express my appreciation for the assistance and cooperation provided me by the principal, teachers, school board members, and citizens of Dunbarton. Without this assistance and cooperation, many of the things accomplished would have been left undone, and I look forward to another prosperous year -- a year of continued cooperation.

SCHOOL NURSE REPORT 1976-1977

In October, Dr. Albert Snay, School Physician, examined 49 students. Seven students had minor health problems and parents were encouraged to obtain follow-up care.

In November, fourth grade participated in The School Dental Disease Program. Teaching materials and tooth brushes are provided by the Bureau of Dental Public Health.

A Swine Flu Clinic was offered in December and attended by fourteen first graders and three adults.

During January and February, 91 students participated in our D.O.E.S. sponsored Dental Program. Follow-up care for 15 students was encouraged. Jody Warburton is our Volunteer Program Coordinator and Mrs. Susan Dudley of Concord was our Dental Hygienist.

In March, Health Education Classes were held in Grades 1-6. Subject matter included Dental Health, Nutrition and Personal Hygiene. A measles clinic was offered with 53 students receiving injections.

In April, a program on the menstrual process and hygiene was presented to the fifth and sixth grade girls.

A pre-school vision and hearing was held for all 3-5 year-olds in May with a poor response. Only twelve pre-schoolers were examined. One referral for vision check was necessary. The program is made possible through the State Department of Health and local volunteer efforts of the Dunbarton Women's Club. Many volunteer hours go into planning and carrying out the valuable screening to detect lazy eye and hearing impairment, which often are overlooked by parents.

Communicable diseases this school year included chicken pox at an epidemic rate of 58 cases, only two cases of head lice, one scabies.

I thank everyone for their valuable help and cooperation during the past school year.
