

REPORT OF GILFORD PUBLIC LIBRARY

To the Citizens of Gilford:

The undersigned, trustees of the Gilford Public Library, respectfully submit the following report for the year ending December 31, 1945.

Eunice L. Hunt was chosen to serve on the board again for three years. Bertrand Ames served as treasurer and Helen D. Watson acted as chairman.

Gifts of twenty books were received from interested friends with the addition of the library of the late Mrs. George Patton, presented by her husband, which has not been catalogued.

The Bookmobile has made the usual trips this year making a generous addition to our library service.

A highlight of our library year was the presentation of a flag by Mr. A. P. Aldrich, Jr. The pole was given by the Mt. Belknap Grange. It was painted by Mr. Frank Wright, and set under his direction with the assistance of Mr. Roy Page and men, and the Public Service. This flag was first raised on Flag Day but the official dedication took place July 4th on the Library lawn.

This dedication was under the able direction of the Rev. Paul V. Hostetter and Bertrand F. Ames responded in behalf of the trustees accepting the flag. Two local boys CM 1/c Norman DeHart and S/Sgt Donald Provencher assisted Mrs. Clara Yeaton, member of Mt. Belknap Grange, in raising the flag. The color guard were from the N. H. State Guard.

Frank Wright again planted and cared for the flower bed as he has done for several years past.

It was necessary this year to reshingle a part of the roof. This coming year it will be necessary to redecorate the interior. During the war years the library contributed space for the Red Cross for a time, and the basement was used as headquarters for the Air Raid Wardens. We expect to complete the Service Men's Scrap Book by next year.

There is an increasing demand for popular fiction and war stories by adults and for those concerning aviation and animals by our juvenile readers.

We wish to express our thanks and appreciation to all those who have contributed to our library for the past year.

PREVENT FOREST FIRES --- IT PAYS

An average of 7,300 acres of woodland are burned over by forest fires in New Hampshire each year destroying many thousand dollars worth of property of all description. It costs many additional thousands of dollars and requires valuable man hours, taken from other essential work, to extinguish them. These losses affect the personal fortunes of the owners and town and state economies. Everyone loses because of them.

Analysis of fire causes reveal the fact that more than 98 percent of all forest fires are, consistently, the result of human carelessness and are preventable!

We have been extremely fortunate during the past few years. Favorable fire weather and war time restrictions on travel which kept people off the highways and out of the woods have aided materially in reducing fire risks, keeping fires fewer and fire losses low.

We now face changed conditions. People can travel freely. Their love for travel and the freedom of the woods will bring them out in ever increasing numbers. This will step up fire risks materially. The accelerated cutting of the war years has resulted in additional thousands of slash acres. These factors, combined with a possible dry season and human carelessness could eaily produce a catastrophe. Everyone must, consequently, be on their guard. They should

1. Be careful with fire or when smoking in or near woodlands.

2. Cooperate with the local forest fire warden and his deputies by

- a. Abiding cheerfully with whatever restrictions it may be necessary to impose. They are intended only to be helpful.
- b. Securing permits to burn debris when the ground is not covered with snow.

- c. Seeing that others comply with requirements.
- d. Promptly coming to the warden's assistance when needed.

If these few fundamental practices are followed it will be possible to *prevent* a large proportion of *forest fires* from starting — that *pays*!

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Members of the School Board, Parents, and Voters of the Gilford School District:

It is a pleasure to state conditions under which the Gilford Grade School has been maintained since the last annual report. The war-time hardships experienced in Gilford were, in general, less burdensome than in many places in New England. The post-war period, into which we were thrust suddenly, may present more hindrances to good educational progress than the war years brought.

Building and Equipment

Maintenance, Operation, Repair

The auditorium stage lacked scenery last spring. The boys in the shop of the Laconia High School made frames to support back and side drops, at cost, and the pupils, with the help of teachers and friends, painted scenes for the stage background.

Complying with the action of the school district meeting, a chain link fence has been purchased and installed along 350 feet of the south line.

Spots in the roof of the school, from which shingles had broken or blown, were re-shingled and cemented.

The school board and the selectmen have agreed upon the installation of two electric lights on the rear of the school building, to illuminate the playground and back of the structure.

Health Work

The School Nurse, Miss Ruth S. Langille, has been conscientious in promoting the health program. She reports almost no epidemic diseases disrupted the Gilford schools last year. There were a few cases of whooping cough and mumps are on the way. Several cases of pediculosis needed treatment in the schools but were finally cleared up.

It was not possible to hold any clinics this year. All corrective work has been done by parents privately and more interest seems to be shown in getting the children in better physical condition. However, due to the presence of diphtheria in New Hampshire a Toxoid Immunization clinic will shortly be offered in the schools for all children from the age of nine months through the fourth grade group who have never been immunized to make the children of Gilford safe from this disease. There are about eighty-eight pupils who have never been protected.

The usual routine school health work was carried on with no very unusual interruptions. The hearing of all pupils was tested with the Audiometer presented to the schools of this region by the American Legion. Although there were several found with defective hearing, no case needed special education indicated for the Hard-of-Hearing.

Sale of War Stamps and Bonds

The final report on the purchase of War Stamps and Bonds by pupils in the Gilford Grade School from January 1, 1945 to July 1, 1945 shows:

75 pupils purchased stamps valued at \$607.00 53 pupils purchased bonds, maturity value \$3,550.00

School Lunch Program

The school lunch program is efficiently serving one hundred or more pupils a substantial noon meal each school day. The supervisor of the project is Mrs. Winnifred H. Varney. The head cook, Mrs. Edith James, has Mrs. Mary L. Haven and Miss Patricia Baker as assistants.

The school district appropriation of \$600 is supplemented by a lunch subsidy from the Agricultural Marketing Administration. The pupils pay 12 cents each per meal. There are many donations of canned goods, vegetables and farm products from parents and friends of the school, which are gratefully received.

Teachers' Retirement System

In the spring of 1945, the Legislature amended P. L. Chapter 135, Section 8, Revised Laws, to assess school districts a portion of the expense in the teachers' retirement system. The present rate is 4% of the annual salary of member teachers. In 1945-6 the charge to Gilford for this system will be \$169,00.

State Employees' Retirement System

The 1945 Legislature established the State Employees' Retirement System and charges each school district in this school supervisory union a portion of the total expense for the superintendent's retirement. In 1945-6, approximately \$17 will be Gilford's share.

Improvement of Instruction Through Teachers' Meetings

During the War years and gasoline rationing, it was not feasible to hold teachers' meetings in which all teachers in the supervisory union engaged simultaneously. With the release of the restrictions, we may now continue our former custom of holding meetings for the improvement of instruction.

The first meeting in the 1945-6 school year was held in Belmont on September 4th. The topics discussed were current problems.

- 1. Ways of teaching international understanding and brotherly love.
- 2. Teaching through pictures
 - a. In reading books.
 - b. By slides, films, and projected views.
 - c. In drawing lessons.

The second meeting was held in Tilton in conjunction with the Supervisory Union No. 59 Board meeting on November 14th. The points were:

- 1. Demonstration of Lip-Reading Teaching.
- 2. Devices to Correct Hearing Deficiencies.
- 3. Brief Histories of the Towns in which We Work.
- 4. Geography All Teachers Should Know to Interpret Commonplace Scenes.

Conclusion

In submitting this sixth annual report, I express my appreciation again to the members of the school board for their sincere consideration of school problems, to the teachers, nurse, and other workers for their individual efforts to promote the school program.

- 6. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrent.
- 7. To determine and appoint the salaries of the school board and other district officers.

- 9. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to pay a rate of tuition in high schools in excess of the state average cost of instruction.

- 11. To see if the district will vote to elect to have its officers and employees become eligible to participate in the State Employees' Retirement System.
