One of the more significant accomplishments of 1971 was the work that was completed on the Goffstown Back Road. The road was done with fine workmanship and also without the benefit of advance funding by the State as was originally planned.

The Safety vehicle that was discussed for so long finally arrived and its presence has been credited with the saving of lives. The investment of the community was definitely well placed in saving

just one family the torment of losing a child.

The Parks and Recreation Commission was formed this year by combining Roy Memorial Park and Barnard Playground Trustees. Their duties have been expanded to include community recreation as a whole and the commission has accepted the responsibility with great enthusiasm.

A Juvenile Study was performed in Goffstown by Stuart Langton and Associates which has brought about the formation of a Juvenille Advisory Committee whose impact will certainly be felt in the years ahead.

Another significant occurrence of the past year is that we are having a TOWN MEETING and so

The polls will open at 7:00 A. M. and close at 7:00 P. M. at the Central Polling Place and will open at 7:00 A. M. and close at 7:00 P., M. in the Fifth District Bartlett School.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Goffstown High School, Wednesday, March 8, 1972 at 7:00 P. M. where the business meeting will take place

None of the articles in the warrant, except those relating to the election of officers and those covering questions on the ballot shall be considered during the time that the polls are open.

- 1. To choose all Town Officers, Trustees and Commissioners, and School District Officers for the ensuing year, including a member of the Board of Selectmen for three years.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the non-partisan ballot system for the election of Town Officers. (By Official Ballot).
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Boca Book National Building Code. (By Official Ballot).
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Goffstown Zoning Maps as adopted at the Town Meeting March 14, 1961, and subsequently amended by changing the classification of property at 607 Mast Road from Commercial and Residential (RA) to a classification of Commercial. (By Official Ballot).
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Goffstown Zoning Ordinance and Maps as adopted

at the Town Meeting March 14, 1961, and subsequently amended by deleting and amending Art. V-A, 3, f; Art. V-A, 4a, 1-3; Art. V-B, 2, (A). Said amendments are on file with the Town Clerk. (By Official Ballot).

- 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow from time to time, such sums of money in anticipation of taxes as may be needed to meet the necessary running expenses of the Town.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deed, purchase, prescription or gift.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to designate the following roads as "Scenic Roads", in accordance with RSA 253:17: Ferson Road Shirley Hill Road. (Inserted by Petition).
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a committee to make a study of the feasibility of operating the Town on a July First to June Thirtieth fiscal year and to make their recommendations known at the 1973 Town Meeting. (Inserted by Petition).
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Four Hundred (\$10,400.00) Dollars for a survey of the sewerage system in the Pinardville area. (Recommended by the Budget Committee).
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Eight Hundred (\$6,800.00) Dollars and authorize the Selectmen to purchase a Bombadier Tractor Sidewalk Plow. (Without recommendation of the Budget Committee).
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventeen Thousand Three Hundred Fifty (\$17,350.00) Dollars and authorize

the Selectmen to purchase a back hoe. (Without recommendation of the Budget Committee).

- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-One Thousand Three Hundred Sixty-Seven (\$21,367.00) Dollars and authorize the Selectmen to extend the highway garage located on Depot Street. (Without recommendation of the Budget Committee).
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to rebuild Desaulnier Street, (Inserted by Petition).
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee in the amount of \$1,061,452.25 and raise by taxes the sum of \$706,926.25. (County Tax not included). (Recommended by the Budget Committee),
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and direct the Selectmen to enter into a lease for a term of five (5) years with the Goffstown Citizens Committee, to lease, for a nominal consideration, the premises on South Mast Road, being Lots 18 & 19, Map 31, Goffstown Town Map, to be used for scouting and related activities. The Municipal Budget Law was voted in 1970 town meeting, and the Budget Committee's first year was preparing the 1971 Town & School Budgets.

This committee consists of 12 elected members at large, one member of the Board of Selectmen, one member of the School Board, and one each from the Goffstown & Grasmere Water Precincts, making a total of 16 members.

It is the budget committee's responsibility to prepare a budget for the Village District & School Districts' expenditures. Budget preparations are started in November. Two sub-committees are formed, one to work with the town selectmen and department heads, and the other to review the school board & principals' requests. These two sub-committees investigge the requests and needs. and make recommendations to the entire Budget Committee for a vote. This recommendation is taken to the town public hearing after which possible changes are made and another final vote is taken by the entire Budget Committee. This final recommendation is then submitted to the State Tax Commission, and in the town & school warrants, for the town people's decisive vote.

The Budget Committee is constantly aware of the financial needs & expenditures of the town and the school, by its monthly meetings, in order to have a complete understanding and background in both budgets. Aware of the constantly increasing tax burden, being put upon the property taxpayer, the budget committees' recommendations are a check and balance between the needs of the town and school and the ability of the taxpayer to pay. After many months of work, the budget committee sincerely hopes that their recommendations are considered and voted without alterations.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

REPORT of the FOREST FIRE WARDEN and DISTRICT CHIEF LEST WE FORGET — IT CAN HAPPEN HERE

Disastrous forest and brush fires that destroy hundreds of homes are more prevalent on the west coast with their dry seasons and strong dry hot winds but 25 years ago this fall is the anniversary of a disaster that devastated large areas of northern New England leaving villages in ashes with rows of cellarholes and chimneys in a number of summer vacation home locations. Many lives were lost on that destructive day of October 23, 1947 nothing could stop the wind driven flames.

It is true that such conditions are unusual for New Hampshire but they happened once, they can happen again. The fuel for fires is all around us. All it takes is a firebrand. Only by cultivating a habit of carefulness with fire at all times can we meet the challenge of protection when dry conditions prevail. Please let these reminders by your guide:

- Never, either when walking, riding or driving, discard a firebrand – a lighted match or a glowing cigarette.
- Always obtain a permit for any outside burning. The burning of household rubbish is not permitted if your town has rubbish collection. Burning of grass or garden litter can be dangerous. See your warden first.
- If you camp or picnic, be sure open fires are allowed and if they are, put them dead out when leaving.
- 4. Most important instruct your children in the danger of the lighted match. A lighted match and dry grass or forest litter is a dangerous combination which leads to destructive loss and can lead to tragedy.

The past year — 1971 was a favorable year for the control of fires. There were too many fire starts in some towns. We thank those who remembered, and ask others to heed Smokey's message.

ANNUAL FIRE REPORT

Fire losses for 1971 were approximately the same as 1970. This record could have been bettered if it had not been for the careless use of welding equipment.

At the beginning of 1971 this department strictly enforced the Air Pollution regulation banning the use of back yard incinerators. This regulation states in part that, Towns which have public disposal service are banned from open burning. Permits issued in 1970-346, in 1971-192.

1972 brings us to the time when a new fire truck is needed for the Pinardville section. Realizing that most of the streets branching off both sides of Mast Rd. do not have water mains of fire hydrants this involves laying of large supply lines of hose which is very time consuming. A tank truck in most cases would eliminate this costly delay.


There were two more dry hydrants installed this year for better fire protection. One is located at the N. H. Doors Factory, the other is at lower Lynchville Park.



POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Goffstown Police Department experienced a year of continued increase in activities and responsibilities in 1971. Although the Serious Crime Rate increased only 2.68%, the General Crime Rate increased 5.8% over the previous year. The accident rate increased 11.2% over 1970 when the rate of increase was up 9% over the previous year. The greatest categorical increase was in burglaries, constituting a jump of 52%. Thankfully, there were no fatal accidents in 1971, compared to the four experienced in 1970. Complaint-activity load increased an unanticipated 25.2%, while the number of full-time police personnel remained the same.

IMPROVED SERVICES:

The new headquarters of the Goffstown Police Department are finally completed, with communication facilities for the Town as well as the County of Hillsborough. The Town of Goffstown receives rent from the county for maintaining the County Communication System. The system, highlighted with recording equipment and a county map projection system, is one of the most advanced systems in the State of New Hampshire.

The Goffstown Police Explorer Post has grown to approximately 45 members making it the



largest post of its kind in the New England states. Its success and size has made it a model for the state, and posts being created by police departments throughout the state have been formulated on such model.

The department has continued its drive to obtain federal funds. Federally funded projects initiated during the past year include education grants, a dictator reporting system grant, a juvenile delinquency and youth study grant, a cadet officer program, and the renovation of patrol vehicle radio equipment to meet the standards established by the County Communication System. These programs were effected without any cost to the taxpayers of the Town of Goffstown.

The department was represented at several specialty schools for the purpose of training police personnel in fingerprinting, photography and firearms utilization.

The Goffstown Highway Traffic Investigation Vehicle has completed a very active first year,

attending many health emergencies and motor vehicle accidents. The unit has been credited with the saving of several lives during the past year. This piece of equipment has been evaluated to be one of the most advantageous purchases made by the citizenry of Goffstown.

PROPOSED SERVICES:

The Police Department is making plans to undertake a homeowner crime prevention program that will include the filing of serial numbers of personal property, and the serialization of properties without manufacturer's serial numbers. The program is intended to reduce the ease with which house burglars operate, especially in view of the 52% increase in burglary experienced this year in Goffstown.

The department plans to continue its ongoing programs in safety, drug education and public information services.

In 1971, the Goffstown Highway Department had a very busy season with three major projects along with the normal maintenance of the roads, cemeteries and sewer and sanitation departments, and other projects that had to be taken care of in conjunction with private work being done by contractors.

All of our big trucks and equipment are Diesels and most of it is quite new except for the grader 1957, and one loader 1964. Since we have switched over to Diesel equipment we have realized nearly 100% work time without any breakdown to the trucks which has made our service to the public much faster and more efficient. We have had to keep six of these trucks outdoors because of the lack of garage space, plus three pickups which must stay out also, so this year we are asking for a garage addition of 40' by 80' at an estimated cost of \$21,367.00 to house these vehicles. Right now it is very important to get this equipment under cover even without heat, as this equipment is valued at around \$300,000.00 and should last us at least 10 years, if we can help protect it by getting it under cover.

The Highway department has no mechanic and we do all our own mechanical work except major repairs that require special tools, etc. We are fortunate indeed to have drivers and operators that can weld, cut steel and do most repairs by themselves.

COMPLETED PROJECTS:

Hot top shim was placed on or in part on the following roads: Back Mountain Road -1,308 tons, Wallace Road -372 tons, Shirley Hill Road -1,380 tons, Kennedy Hill Road -108 tons, Horace Shirley Road -60 tons, East Dunbarton Road -348 tons, Black Brook Road -1,920 tons, Montelona Road -180 tons, Paige Hill Road -438 tons, Warren Avenue, Goffstown Back Road and Worthely Hill Road were also paved both with a shim then with the paver.

Warren Avenue received new drainage before being paved in part. Worthely Hill Road received new drainage and also an extended sewer line and rebuilding, graveling and excavation and widening before new paving.

The Goffstown Back Road was rebuilt completely for 8,000 feet, excavated 50 ft. wide, with new underdrainage where needed and several large fills to bring the road up. Much ledge excavation had to be completed. New gravel was installed for a width of 34 ft. a minimum of 18 inches thick with a six-inch layer of finish gravel, graded and watered during the building so as to get the maximum of compaction on this road and to help keep down the dust. Slopes were graded and loamed and for the most part seeded down before the winter. Striping of the road was done before the spow arrived

A total of 5,430 feet of culverts was installed this year at a cost of \$13,279.06 just for the culverts and collars alone. On these roads, a total of 7,740 tons of hot top was used this year for a cost of \$74,691.00.

A new comminutor was installed at the sewer plant by the department. Also the sludge beds were cleaned out again.

Much work is involved at the Sanitary landfill area this year and much more is needed as it is rapidly filling up and especially with outsiders using our area the Town is advised by this department that we will need another area very soon. It is well to keep in mind that the Sanitary landfill area is not town property and therefore when we have to move, and again I stress SOON. we will probably have to buy and it will cost us dearly. At present, we do not have to pay for cover material like other towns so we are indeed fortunate to be using other people's land at no expense whatsoever. Most towns have to pay a large fee for the use of land to begin with, then have to haul material a long way to cover the waste and compact properly.

Extensive brush and tree cutting has been done and much more is needed especially on the school bus routes to widen out as there are many places where the buses in meeting traffic endanger our children due to low limbs hanging out into the roads, and therefore this department would like to clear as much of this as possible for the safety of our buses.

NEW PROJECTS:

The Highway department this year would like to do some badly needed road widening of curves, banks and general repair work. We also have to remove rocks, stumps and replace culverts, etc. ahead of the hot top crews and this takes considerable time and keeps a crew busy just on this work. This year we want to install guard rails on the new portion of the back road and a bit of cleanup on erosion problems will have to be taken care of. The usual repair and painting of sanders

and plows will be done to keep our gear in the best possible shape. We would like to place hot top on many of the gravel portions of roads that have previously been accepted by the Town.

It is imperative that we run the hot top paver over the roads that we have shimmed two years ago so that we don't lose them. These roads have no good gravel under them so we compensate by running a good layer of hot top to help the riding surface. We should stay on this hot top program until every road has at least one good coat of hot top. It is costly this way but it is much more costly to try to rebuild all our roads.

The Highway department wishes to advise the citizens of Goffstown that we try to serve everybody on a fair basis. Most of our work is done in answer to complaints to either the Selectmen's office, Police department or to our own department. We try to serve the best interest of the majority of the people, whenever possible.

The Highway department wishes to thank the people of Goffstown, the Police department, the Fire department, the Office girls for their patience with this department. I personally wish to thank the wives and families of the men of our highway department for their patience. When I call their men out in the middle of the night, or during the turkey dinner that has been so laboriously prepared, I know a sacrifice is being made. I say "Thank you" on behalf of the Town of Goffstown.

The Highway department wishes to acknowledge with gratitude the untiring efforts in behalf of the Town of Goffstown, particularly the Highway department, of Mr. Charles Weilbrenner, Selectman and liaison officer for this department. He was instrumental in picking up the Highway department, by improvements and new equipment, to what it is today. He passed away this past summer before we could complete all the projects that he and this department had started together.

And to my employees: Thank you, gentlemen, for a job well done.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

CHARTER COMMISSION

The preservation of the natural resources of the town is included in the responsibilities of the Commission, acting under the authority of State Statutes. Accordingly, cataloging of scenic areas, wet lands, marshes and lands owned or acquired by the Town has been completed during the year. The better utilization or development of these areas is the goal for a better Goffstown by 1980, providing open areas for the public good.

The Commission has:

Acquired land for Conservation purposes of unknown owners listed in the 1970 Tax Warrant.

Initiated easement procedures for the ultimate development of the top of the South Uncanoonc Mountain as a multi-purpose recreation area.

Cleared the top of the South Mountain of trees that obstructed the view northwest to southeast. This view is now open for the first time in years.

Cleared a suitable picnic area and installed two picnic tables on the east side of the South Mountain top with suitable signs designating the area as "Goffstown Conservation Area".

Sponsored the roadside cleanup drive in May when volunteers picked some fifteen truckloads of trash from our roads.

Joined with other groups in town to provide the books "People and Their Environment — Grade 1-10" to the local schools.

Worked with State Agencies to take advantage of funds available for conservation — a commission such as the Ford Fund which most recently has made up to \$5000 available to the Commission in each town in seven states of the Northeast. These funds even when matched by Town money will buy no land nor clean up the Lake. They will, however, provide funds for expert consultant opinion on land development, pay for scenic easements and other land involved documents.

With the provision of the Scenic Roads bill – SB138 – inserting a special article in the 1972 Town Meeting warrant to designate the following roads as "Scenic Roads"

Ferson Road Paige Hill Road Stinson Road Bog Road Shirley Hill Road Worthley Hill Road Also inserting a Special Article in the 1972 Town Meeting warrant for the establishment of a Capital Reserve Fund for Conservation purposes — with a 1972 request for \$5000.

The Commission is interested in the preservation of lands that should belong to all the people. Considering the tremendous growth projected for the area (see what happened in Merrimack) open spaces should not be lost to indiscriminate buildings.

This report sums up the activities that we hope will meet with your approval and initiate more individual participation in the effort to preserve our town's natural beauty.

The Commission welcomes your suggestions and assistance in furthering these many projects.

Many residents, who have read the Charter, advise they would like parts of it adopted . . . it is the Commission's belief the present government will use some of these ideas.

The City Charter is still available for consideration. We will be ready to reintroduce it upon sufficient demand.

We are confident that this demand will arise in the foreseeable future.

We will continue to serve and to update our proposal of home rule to accommodate the influx of population and its added costs, particularly for education and environmental control, also all other inevitable growth problems.

We have the solution!... You, the taxpayers, have the challenge.

PLANNING BOARD

1971 was a busy year for your Planning Board. There have been many subdivision applications to process. On site inspection, working out details with the subdivider, and public hearings take a lot of time but we feel that it is to the mutual benefit of the town and the subdivider to follow the subdivision regulations.

The amended zoning ordinance adopted at the 1971 Town Meeting has been well received. Hearings are being held and we ask you to approve the minor changes that the Planning Board suggests. The purpose of one change is to allow private sewer systems for multi-family dwellings if the system has the approval of the N. H. Water Pollution Board. The Board wishes to make a correction in the Zoning Map in the Pinardville District. We have a lot in the commercial district zoned half commercial and half residential. It is used commercially and should be zoned that way.

Nearly all our planning these days is being done on a regional basis through the Southern N. H. Planning Commission. The three areas of most concern are: the extension of our water supply – the disposal of our sewage – and a long time solution to our solid waste disposal.

The planning process involves local, state and federal funds, It is complicated, time consuming and often frustrating but we are convinced that the regional approach is our only salvation. State and Federal Funds for construction are available only on a Regional basis.

You may have noticed there is a lot of new construction in Goffstown. There will be much more. For the good of the Town and your own protection we urge you to vote to adopt the Boca Basic Building Code. The question will be on the ballot.

RECREATION

A successful recreation program was enjoyed again this summer at Barnard Playground and Roy Park with a good variety of activities along with excellent participation.

The citizens of Goffstown will always be grateful for the generosity of the Stark Family in making the pool at Barnard Playground a reality. In appreciation of this, Stark Memorial Pool was officially dedicated in July.

This year saw continuing improvements at both parks. Landscaping projects were initiated at both parks and further work is planned on this project in 1972. The tennis courts were completely resurfaced and relined at Barnard Playground. Vinyl mesh covers were installed at both pools along with the erection of a swimming pool slide at Barnard.

This year's budget request includes funds for the implementation of a Senior Citizens' program, to be arranged through the recreation co-ordinator.

PLANNING COMMISSION

REPORT OF THE SOUTHERN NEW HAMPSHIRE PLANNING COMMISSION

Since 1966, the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission has been actively serving the Town of Goffstown. Goffstown's representatives on the SNHPC Board are Mr. Roland Barnard and Mr. Lawrence Shirley. Mr. Shirley presently serves as Vice-Chairman and is a member of the Executive Committee.

The primary function of the SNHPC is to provide member communities with administrative and technical mechanisms that are necessary to identify and resolve "area-wide" problems; develop programs to carry out "area-wide" comprehensive plans; and effect cooperation among local governments in order to implement a planning program that will assure coordinated, progressive development in a regional perspective.

Through communication, planning, policy-making, coordination and technical assistance, the Commission serves local governments and citizens in the region by dealing with needs and issues which cross city, town and county boundaries.

In order to meet its obligations, the Commission has established both local planning assistance and regional planning programs. Under the local planning assistance program, the SNHPC provides direct services to municipal members on an individual basis. Among these are the attendance of a professional planner at local planning board meetings to assist with subdivision review; advisory services to the Board of Selectmen concerning industrial development programs; the preparation of materials for subdivision regulations and zoning ordinance changes; and other direct services to the planning board on a contract basis. In addition, the Commission's informational resources are made available to other municipal agencies, commissions and departments.

Under the regional planning program, the SNHPC is charged with the responsibility of developing "area-wide" plans for land use, water supply and water pollution abatement facilities; storm drainage facilities; highways; public transportation systems; solid waste management; housing and other services of regional significance. In a related capacity, the Commission is responsible for the review of applications for Federal financial aid for such programs as those noted above and a wide variety of others for which member communities may be eligible.

LOCAL PLANNING ASSISTANCE

Mr. James Tethers, Regional Planner, regularly attended bi-weekly meetings of the Planning Board to assist with local development problems and coordinate local and regional planning activities.

SNHPC professional staff members attended over 25 meetings in Goffstown and provided the Planning Board and Selectmen with numerous administrative and technical services among which were:

- subdivision site inspections
- subdivision plan review and recommendations
- preparation of minutes and correspondence related to Planning Board meetings
- preparation and review of proposed revisions to Zoning Ordinance
- preparation of Zoning Map
- preparation of notice of public hearing
- clarification of state regulations
- update of Planning Enabling Legislation
- preparation of application for earth removal permit and occupancy permit
- update of land use plan

Under a special contract with the Goffstown Sewer Commission, the SNHPC completed a land use inventory during the summer of 1971. This project involved identification and mapping of existing components of the Goffstown Village and Pinardville sewer systems; a comprehensive survey of all abutting land uses and coordination with the Manchester Highway Department, Manchester Water Works and the Goffstown Village Water Precinct.

REGIONAL PLANNING

The SNHPC worked to coordinate activities of the Goffstown Planning Board, Sewer Commission and Industrial Development Corporation and relate their programs to regional, state and federal agencies.

SNHPC programs of a regional nature completed during 1971 were:

- A Report on Social Planning
- Metropolitan Manchester Community Shelter Plan
- Metropolitan Review A-95 Handbook
- Roles and Responsibilities for Update of Transportation Plan

Regional planning activities initiated during 1971 were:

- Final report on the water and sewerage facilities program
- Regional housing study
- Regional land use plan proposal
- Update of the transportation study
- Forum of local elected officials
- Storm drainage facilities
- Recreation and open space plan
- Capital improvements program

LOOKING AHEAD

The Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission had witnessed significant developmental activity in Goffstown and shares with your officials the optimism for a bright future.

Coincident with coordinated and planned development is an increase in local demand for professional services as occurred this past year. In response to these demands, the SNHPC, in 1972, will strengthen its capabilities to respond to local problems.

Local Planning

The Commission is currently developing an expanded scope of professional planning services to be made available to Goffstown. It is our hope that implementation of this program will relieve the Goffstown Planning Board of some of the more routine duties, thereby enabling your plan-

ning board to become more involved in advance planning activities.

Regional Planning

Growing functional responsibilities have placed increased pressures on the SNHPC to raise and act on controversial and sensitive issues. The Commission accepts this challenge, but it is going to insist upon local commitments to support regional planning.

There must be a consensus and willingness to innovate to solve some of our regional challenges. Local government officials cannot simply raise issues and react to proposals. They must make a commitment to allocate local resources to regional issues; formulate regional policies; and openly support regional planning.

RECORD OF ANNUAL PRECINCT MEETING

March 16, 1971

ARTICLE III. It was voted to accept the report of the Budget Committee of Forty-three Thousand Three Hundred fifty (\$43,350.00) Dollars and appropriate same.

ARTICLE IV. It was voted to allow the Water Commissioners the right to hire money in excess of Three Hundred (\$300.00) Dollars due to any emergency.

ARTICLE V. Mr. Laurence Whitten, Chairman, reported for the past year telling of the many freeze-ups due to the very cold weather, and expressed appreciation to Superintendent, Charles Gutterson and his men for outstanding work. He also reqported that the Precinct had purchased Thirty Acres from the Gibbs Estate and that Twelve Thousand feet of pipe had been laid.

Mr. Richard Duclos and Mr. Ernest Fletcher reported on their audit of the Precinct books.

ARTICLE VI. It was moved and seconded that the Precinct rescind the vote taken on Article IV of the 1954 Warrant to hold the Annual Meeting on the Third Tuesday in March. The motion was laid on the table.

The meeting adjourned at 7:50 P. M.

- 1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.

- To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Goffstown School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1971, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board, School District Treasurer, School Lunch and Milk Program and High School Student Activities Funds.

FINANCIAL INFORMATION

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative balance sheets as of June 30, 1970 and June 30, 1971 are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt of the District decreased by \$125,880.36, from \$978,764.76 to \$852,884.40, during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1971.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit A-4), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$21,524.96 plus a revenue surplus of \$25,590.40 resulted in a net budget surplus of \$47,115.36.

A classified statement of general fund receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1971, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance — general fund — as of June 30, 1971 is included in Exhibit B-2.

School Tax Account: (Exhibit D)

A statement of the School District Tax account with the Town of Goffstown is presented in Exhibit D. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1971 the School District had received the total of the 1970-71 School Tax, the amount of which was \$1,057,348.96.

Bonded Indebtedness:

A statement of the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1971, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit F.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased by \$40,880.36 from \$6,235.24 to \$47,115.60 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1971 as shown herewith:

I herewith submit my tenth annual report relative to the schools of Goffstown.

The Goffstown School population continued its growth, with a September 1971 enrollment in excess of 2300 students with the following distribution:

The citizens of Goffstown voted favorably at the March 1971 School District Meeting to appropriate nearly two million dollars for the construction, equipping and furnishing of an addition to Goffstown High School. The present school with the addition which will be larger in area than the high school will provide for housing grades seven through twelve. It will be completed by September 1972 for more than 1200 grade seven through twelve students.

The voters of Goffstown are to be commended for realistically facing the physical plant needs of the growing school population of the community in order to maintain a healthy educational climate in Goffstown. The new facility will allow for correcting the overcrowded conditions at Bartlett School, Maple Avenue, the Junior High School and High School. It will provide a modern facility for grades seven and eight that can accommodate a

curriculum that will meet current and future educational needs of the students in grades seven and eight and simultaneously relieve the present overcrowding at Goffstown High School.

Present plans for September 1972 provide for the Maple Avenue School and Bartlett School to house grades one through four, the present Junior High School to house grades five and six and the High School to house grades seven through twelve.

THE AREA SCHOOL PLAN

The voters of Goffstown adopted the AREA School Plan at the March 1971 School District Meeting. The adoption of the plan provides a 50% increase in State Building Aid and provides a lower interest rate on the State Guaranteed Bonds and further additional incentive aid as the legislature fully implements legislation which has previously been enacted.

STATE DUAL ENROLLMENT PLAN

Goffstown is participating in a dual enrollment plan with St. Edmunds School for the 171-72 school year. Under the plan adopted at the March Goffstown School District meeting Goffstown provides a mathematics teacher, a science teacher, books and materials in classrooms rented from the school. The program is 30% funded by the state with other costs divided between the Goffstown School District and the City of Manchester on a per pupil cost basis as both Goffstown and Manchester pupils attending St. Edmunds school participate in the program.

GOFFSTOWN JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL CLASS AWARDED GRANT

Through the efforts of Mrs. Adeline O'Brien, Teacher, in preparing a project to enter into state-wide competition, Goffstown Junior High School was awarded a \$1,000 kmin-Grant for a project entitled "Vocational and Avocational Guidance." This was one of the fifteen projects in the state chosen for funding by the New Hampshire Elementary and Secondary Education Act Title III office. The purpose of these grants is to give teachers an opportunity to innovate with the meaningful learning situations for their pupils.

The grant has already enabled her class to take weekly bus trips to learn to travel to and within the city, to visit agencies and institutions that can help find employment, to show better ways of utilizing leisure time, and to help in their transition to the adult world.

They have enjoyed the music and teenage rooms at the Manchester Library, a trip in the Snorkel at the Fire Department, a session on closed-circuit television at the Concentrated Employment Office, and a treat to colonial living at Gen. John Stark's home. Other trips were to the Historical Museum, the New England Telephone Company, the Union-Leader Publishing Company, and the Syntextile Company.

With the help of Mr. Barry Morgrage of the Goffstown Police Department, the students have set up a dark room where they are learning to print pictures taken on their trips. Their other current project is an opportunity to learn to bowl. At the conclusion of the tournament, they will have a chance to dine banquet-style at one of the finer restaurants.

Mrs. O'Brien, Special Class Teacher, stated that "With the help of the community, we hope to make the second semester as enlightening as the first so that each student will realize that education means a more abundant and satisfying life".



GOFFSTOWN HIGH SCHOOL 1971-1972

In September 1971, Goffstown High School enrolled some 800 students, 250 more than the building was designed to house. Robert Moulton, Principal, despite sorely trying situations of crowding encouraged the staff to continue with its plans for program improvement in order to better meet the needs of the students. Electives were offered for upper grade pupils in the areas of English and social studies to allow for choice and thus take advantage of interest factors. A work experience program was instituted partly in preparation for cooperative education programs to be scheduled in the future but mainly to provide special training for a number of students planning to go into occupations immediately following graduation. Under this program, students are in attendance at school for required classes and are excused for two hour work sessions in cooperating organizations and credit is granted by the school toward graduation requirements.

With the construction of additional facilities at Goffstown High School, the school year 1972-73 will witness a move to a 7-12 organizational arrangement. The addition will furnish space and facilities to allow for completion of program plans for the high school. Most important to mention is the fact that it will also allow for many needed junior high school programs heretofore unavailable.

With changes in organization about to occur, the staff has been involved with program and operational re-arrangements that must take place. Such efforts are interesting and indeed exciting, especially when consideration is given to the fine educational opportunity that will result.

Among new programs are the following:

Foreign Languages — for those so electing, level I of French will begin in Grade 7. For those involved, the equivalent to five years of this foreign language will be provided. For high school students, offerings of four years of French and Spanish will be continued as well as three years of Latin.

Business – In the business area, programs now in operation will be continued. We will add courses in record-keeping and business machines to the clerical program and record-keeping to the general program. A vocational program in clerical practices will be instituted.

Social Studies — Programs in the area of the social studies will undergo a complete change prior to the opening of school in September. Seventh grade students will take "Recent course entitled "Cultural and Political Geography". Eighth graders will take "Recent American History and Government". Ninth grade social studies students will be offered a choice between a full credit course in World History and two ½ unit courses in Western Civilization. Four ½ unit courses in non-western history will be offered to sophomores. These courses deal with African, East Asian, Middle Eastern and Latin American history.

Juniors will have a choice of two ½ unit American history survey courses and two ½ credit electives dealing with specific areas in American history. Seniors will be allowed choices of full credit courses in Sociology, 20th Century World History, and Micro Economics, and ½ credit offerings in General Sociology, Consumer Economics, Comparative Economic Systems, Comparative Political Systems and Psychology.

Science — General Science will be offered in a three year sequence for 7th, 8th, and 9th grade students. Some 9th graders will be allowed the selection of Biology along with Earth Science. For senior science students, we hope to add Advanced Chemistry to the program.

Mathematics — In the area of mathematics, there will be no course title changes, although content within some will be reviewed. Plans call for the addition of a shop mathematics course.

Music — Plans in the music area call for the continuation of band and instrument. Chorus and courses in vocal music, music appreciation, history and theory will be added.

Art — We will continue with the three year art sequence for high school students but will add art for junior high students as well.

Industrial Arts — Offerings will be expanded in industrial arts for both junior and senior high pupils. New areas will be added in the form of a power technology course and a graphic arts course.

GUIDANCE

The following guidance statistics for the year 1970-71 are typical of the activity in the department. Tests administered included the Otis Lennon and National Educational Development Test for freshmen, the Sophomore Testing Program and College Entrance Examination Board Achievement Tests for sophomores, the Otis Gama, Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Tests, Kudar Interest Survey, National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test and College Entrance Examination Board for juniors, and the College Entrance Examination Board and General Aptitude Test Battery for seniors.

One hundred forty-seven students graduated in June of 1971. Of these 44% went on to college. For these, scholarships, grants-in-aid, loans and campus work guarantees amounted to some \$17,000 in total financial aid. Of the scholarship funds made available, \$4,200 came from local groups and the student body. Activities participated in by the Guidance Department included the following:

Newsletter — A Newsletter from the Guidance Counselors was published several times during the school year in an attempt to inform students of coming speakers, test dates, and various deadlines for college applicants. Most importantly the Newsletter is an attempt to share with students information on careers, colleges, and new programs.

Health Careers Seminar — Forty-four students attended the Health Careers Seminar sponsored by the Health Careers Council at the New Hampshire Technical Institute in Concord. There was considerable positive feedback from students who attended.

Freshmen Orientation — Freshmen were spoken with individually or in small groups to give them a general orientation to guidance and counseling services with particular emphasis on counseling. Orientation seems to be an important function since many freshmen enter the high school with the impression that the primary function of a counselor is arranging schedules.

Self-Referral — Approximately 249 students voluntarily met with counselors for guidance and counseling services between October and June. Many of these students came in numerous times for a variety of concerns.

Twenty-five students left school between September and June 1970-71 for a drop-out percentage rate of 3.5.

MAPLE AVENUE SCHOOL

REMEDIAL READING

Miss Ruth E. Powers, Remedial Reading Teacher, states that the basic purpose of the remedial reading program at the Maple Avenue School is to support the developmental reading programs of the classrooms and to arrange learning situations in which selected children are enabled to grow in learning skills. The remedial reading teacher works with children selected by the classroom teachers, in groups ranging from one to twelve or more.

Perhaps "corrective" or "supportive" programs in reading would be a better title than "remedial". Some of the children in the program are disabled readers while the others, the majority, are in need of reinforcement in one or more skill areas.

The reading lessons are highly individualized so that the different phases of reading are made meaningful to each learner. Materials and exercises are used that are suited to the child's present ability and instructional needs.

The program changes during the course of a school year, with some children being dropped and others added. Children who are new to our school system often need extra help to attain expected levels.

Above all, consideration of a child's personal worth is a necessary and vital part of the program. Often a poor reader has a poor view of himself and his abilities. Success is very important. In our Maple Avenue School Reading Room many gains are being made daily and children have greatly benefited.

CURRICULUM STUDY

Mr. William Brendle, Principal, reports that a curriculum study in arithmetic will be undertaken in the Maple Avenue and White Schools. The purpose is to strengthen and update the present arithmetic curriculum. This study is an involved process whereby the teachers and administration will first arrive at evaluative criteria that can be used to determine the value of the various texts that are published.

Sample textbooks have been requested from thirteen different companies.

A committee of teachers will be formed with at least one teacher at every grade level and its function will be to review the materials available in arithmetic. The materials will be evaluated with the criteria we have developed for an elementary arithmetic program. When the study of these books has been completed and possibly narrowed to two or three companies the representative of these companies will be called in to discuss their specific programs.

Textbooks from the various companies will be considered at each grade level relative to the established criteria.

BARTLETT SCHOOL

All available classrooms at Bartlett School are in use this year and with this continued rapid growth, it would appear that grade five must be bused to the Upper Elementary School starting in September 1972. This will allow classrooms to be made available for the increased enrollment in grades one through four. Bartlett School now has three first, second and third grades, and two fourth and fifth. Next year we will have three of each grades one through four.

Our present enrollment is approximately 330 pupils which represent an increase of about 50 students over last year.

The active Bartlett School Mothers' Club has provided an opaque projector, a new microphone, projection screens for most classrooms, and a record player. The Club Funds paid for the grade five class trip to the Boston Science Museum. The Mothers' Club continues to be active in the School Library. This wonderful organization has proven to be most beneficial to Bartlett School.

The Pinardville Lions Club in appreciation for using the school a few times has donated 100 folding chairs complete with two racks which can be used as coat racks when the chairs are in use.

Under the guidance of dedicated community leaders the new Pinardville Unit of the Boys Club is a reality. Through their efforts the boys of Goffstown now enjoy a beautiful new building in Pinardville where the boys can enjoy many well supervised sports and activities after school hours. The Boys Club formerly operated at Bartlett School for many years. The new boys club is a tribute to the men of the Pinardville area who have a sincere concern for the youth of Goffstown.

SPECIAL READING PROGRAM

At the present time, less than ten percent of the Bartlett School students participate in special reading program under Phyllis A. Leonard, Reading Specialist, who devotes two days a week at Bartlett School and three days at Goffstown Junior High School, Nearly half of the children are new to Bartlett School, having transferred from schools in other communities.

The students receive individual and small group instruction twice weekly. Much of the time is spent in reinforcing phonetic skills, developing both auditory and visual perceptual abilities and working on vocational skills. Emphasis is also placed on vocabulary development, enrichment, and silent reading comprehension skills. Emphasized is listening as an aid to sharpening comprehension techniques and developing word-attack skills.

A variety of materials are utilized. The students are provided with varying types of multi-level materials, diagnostic reading workbooks, an electric tachistoscope for rapid word recognition, high interest and low level vocabulary books and phonics activity books.

The program incorporates extensive individual diagnostic testing of children with specific reading problems, general supervision of all the testing in the school, visitation of reading classes, and consultations with the School Nurse relative to possible referral to the Rehabilitation Center because of perceptual or similar difficulties.

Pre-school registration was held April 5, and 6 at the Bartlett School. Fifty-six pre-school children were registered.

The Maple Avenue Elementary School registration was held May 3, 4, and 5 and eighty children attended. Vision and hearing tests were given each student. Heights and weights recorded, and a dental examination was given by Mrs. Burton, a dental hygienist from the State Department of Dental Health.

A topical flouride program was made available through the Mothers' Club and the school health services. This program consisted of cleaning the teeth plus an application of topical flouride. A referral program was also incorporated with this service. Mrs. Sally Rising was the hygienist who conducted this program. Mrs. Burton, a state dental hygienist, visited the classrooms following this program with films and educational material appropriate to each grade level.

A Crest dental health educational program was conducted in the third grades.

Our cafeteria workers received routine physical examinations including throat cultures, stool specimens, and serology.

A menstrual hygiene education program for all sixth grade girls was presented. A film was shown, discussion period followed, and appropriate literature was given to each girl.

Educational films on smoking, drug abuse and dental health were shown to all fifth and sixth grade students.

A representative from the New England Dairy Food Council met with the elementary teachers at Maple Avenue and Bartlett Schools to acquaint and advise them of the services and educational material available for classroom use.

An inservice education program for elementary teachers, on children with learning disabilities was held at Bartlett School. This program was made possible through the cooperation of the Manchester Rehabilitation Center and the School Health Service.

This is the second year that the senior students from the Sacred Heart School of Nursing have been assigned to a school nurse in order to observe the function of the school nurse in the School Health Program.

The Future Nurses visited the Massachusetts General Hospital for open house. Forty members belong to this club. The year ended with their usual banquet. Many guest speakers visited the students during the school year.

Dr. Snay, in cooperation with the American Cancer Society, conducted an educational program for Senior girls and all mothers of Senior students.

All tenth and eleventh grade students were presented an educational program on venereal diseases. Mrs. Marie Erickson from the Bureau of Communicable Diseases presented the program and was available for a follow through discussion.

Children need more than crisis-care. We need to understand and appreciate the needs of all children, if we are to succeed in promoting healthy family life and healthy school life for the children of our community. Health maintenance and health instruction are part of the school's responsibility.

No longer can school health people go along "doing their thing" in the local scene by following the path of least resistance. Schools still have a vital function in terms of general surveillance of pupil health, the early recognition of health defects, and the prompt referral of cases.

Preventing illness and disease among our youth helps stem the mounting costs of corrective procedures when they reach adulthood.

Not only are we a "decade against disease," but we are a decade in which we hope to promote school health to new horizons of acceptance, and new altitudes of health knowledge and health practice.

Our School Health Services have had complete cooperation from all community agencies; Goffstown Lion's Club, Pinardville Lion's Club, Goffstown Mothers' Club and the Salvation Army.

We wish to express our thanks to the Superintendent, parents, teachers, school lunch personnel, and the school board for their cooperation.

THE VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

OF MANCHESTER 622-3781

The services of the Visiting Nurse Association, a United Fund Agency, are available for all of the residents of Goffstown regardless of age, race, creed or ability to pay. The Visiting Nurse provides bedside nursing care, treatment and instruction and the Registered Physical Therapist provides physical therapy; all services are carried out on a part time basis in the home according to directions by the patient's physician. Home Health Aides are available on the same basis. The Association is a home health agency certified to care for Medicare patients.

Maternal and child health guidance and instruction is given before and after the arrival of new babies and classes for instruction of expectant parents are held twice yearly in Manchester.

Family guidance is also given with special emphasis on prevention of disease and promotion of health.

704 visits, including 31 new calls, to Goffstown residents were made in 1971. Mrs. Grace Gage, R. N. is the nurse in the area.

Three Goffstown – Bedford Regional Immunization Clinics were held in Pinardville with an attendance of 236 children receiving polio, DPT, smallpox, rubella and rubeola immunizations. Another series of clinics is being planned for March, April and May 1972. Details to be announced later.
