## GRAFTON COUNTY CONVENTION MEETING

Date: Wednesday, January 10, 1973

Place: Room 108 - State House - Concord

Time: Meeting convened at 12 noon for organizational purposes. Twenty-seven members

were present.

Rep. Nelson Chamberlin served as temporary chairman and Rep. John Tilton served as temporary clerk.

Motion by Rep. David J. Bradley, seconded by Rep. Richard Bradley to nominate and vote on each officer and member of the Executive Committee separately. Motion was voted

and passed

Representative Merrill moved the Executive Committee be limited to eight members: three ex-officio officers and five elected members. Rep. Chamberlin suggested the motion be amended to read six members elected to the Executive Committee; two from each Commissioner district. Rep. Merrill seconded the amendment. The amendment was voted and carried. The motion as amended was voted and carried.

Nominations for Chairman were in order. The following nominations were made: Rep. Nelson Chamberlin and Rep. Ezra Mann. Nominations were closed. Rep. Stevenson moved the vote be by a show of hands. The motion was voted and passed. Rep. Chamberlin receiving seventeen votes, Rep. Mann receiving seven votes, Rep. Chamberlin was elected the new Chairman.

Nominations for Vice-Chairman were opened. Rep. Shirley Merrill and Rep. Carl Altman were nominated. Nominations were closed. Rep. Merrill received twenty votes, Rep. Altman immediately moved to make her election unanimous. Motion carried. Mrs. Merrill was elected Vice-Chairman.

Nominations for Clerk were opened. Rep. Madeline Townsend was nominated. Nominations were closed. Rep. Townsend was elected Clerk.

Rep. Stevenson moved the Commissioner districts caucus to nominate members to the Executive Committee. The motion was seconded and by mutual consent the Convention caucused. The district caucuses nominated and the following were elected to serve on the Executive Committee,

District 1 – Rep. Marion Copenhaver Rep. Albert Jones

District 2 – Rep. Ezra Mann Rep. John Tilton

District 3 – Rep. Harold Buckman Rep. Richard Bradley

The Executive Committee agreed to meet the first Monday every other month beginning February 5, 1973, at the Court House in North Haverhill at 10:00 a.m.

Rep. Tilton explained that by vote of the last Executive Committee at their last meeting the County would go on the same fiscal year as the State which would mean the next county budget would cover eighteen months instead of the usual twelve. It was agreed this information should be well publicized. Motion to adjourn was made and passed.

## GRAFTON COUNTY EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

Date: Monday, February 5, 1973

Place: County Courthouse, No. Haverhill, N. H.

Time: 10:00 A.M.

Members present: Representatives Chamberlin, Merrill, Townsend, Richard Bradley, Tilton, Mann, Albert Jones and Copenhaver. Commissioners Bell and Hill were in attendance also.

Rep. Tilton moved the Executive Committee reconsider its action taken on RSA 31:94 A, B, C and D, at the meeting of December 26, 1972. Reps. Merrill and Buckman seconded the motion.

The discussion brought forth these points:

- 1. The idea has merit and should be implemented in due time.
- 2. The decision was too big an issue to be made by only eight persons and should be considered by the whole convention.
- 3. Selectmen should be informed (legislative bodies of the municipalities).
- Education of the public should be implemented through public hearings and other media.

The reconsideration having been discussed at some length Rep. Mann moved the question, Motion carried unanimously.

Rep. Merrill then moved that the motion of the Executive Committee on December 26, 1972 be rescinded and that it be recommended to the Convention at the annual budget meeting in April that Grafton County go on a July fiscal year to be initiated January 1, 1974. Rep. Mann seconded the motion. Motion passed unanimously.

The Committee then entertained Sheriff Herbert Ash for purposes of discussing the 1973 radio equipment and dispatch system budget requests. With Sheriff Ash were Chief Paul Gelinas, New Durham, Communications Committee member of the Governor's Crime

Commission; Richard Wright, Concord, Wright Communications; and Benjamin Thompson, Hanover, Coordinator for the Governor's Crime Commission.

Major points brought forth in discussions were:

- 1. The Sheriff is asking for four dispatchers (three new ones).
- 2. Although the dispatch system was never fully implemented from Lebanon it is thought that Lebanon is a poor geographical location for the system. Equipment there can be moved to the courthouse.
- 3. The Courthouse is the most logical place for the base location with a transmitter located on Cannon Mountain and another on Moose Mountain.
- Twenty-four hour coverage for the system would also give coverage for the courthouse at all times.
- 5. The County, with assistance from the Crime Commission, would finance the system the first year in an effort to prove its need and the towns would pick up the financing after the first year, one dollar per capita per year.

Chairman Chamberlin asked if the need for a radio system could be justified when we have the State Police network.

Mr. Thompson answered, "Unequivocally yes."

Sheriff Ash remarked, "In ten years the Sheriff's Department will be the right arm of all the police departments in the county. The radio dispatch system is the Grafton County Law Enforcement Communications System."

Discussion ended and Sheriff Ash invited the committee to view the communications room downstairs after the meeting.

Rep. Kenneth Curran appeared before the committee with a letter citing requests for information pertaining to courthouse and hospital construction. Letter is on record.

Rep. Merrill moved that we invite the architect and Rep. Curran to meet with us on April 2 in the Commissioners room, and that any records we have be made available to him. Motion seconded by Rep. Jones. Motion carried unanimously.

Rep. Merrill suggested that Evelyn Smith could inquire from Mrs. Scott-Craig if the records of the planning committee were available.

Commissioner Barbara Hill informed the committee of the problem with the leach field at the hospital and jail. The field has never functioned adequately although it was constructed to the specifications of the Water Pollution Control Board. The WPCB and engineers selected by the Commissioners will meet to discuss and decide what should be done. The WPCB is recommending an aerated lagoon. The County will have to pre-finance the project estimated to cost \$250,000 with about 90% of the cost filtering back to the county from federal and state programs.

In an effort to expedite work on the budget as soon as the budget is ready (perhaps three weeks) Chairman Chamberlin will call the Committee together with two consecutive days notice in the calendar.

The motion by Rep. Buckman to adjourn was seconded by Rep. Tilton and unanimously accepted.

## GRAFTON COUNTY EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

Date: Monday, February 26, 1973

Place: Grafton County Courthouse, No. Haverhill, N. H.

Time: 9:30 A.M.

Members present: Chamberlin, Jones, Tilton, Mann, Buckman, Copenhaver, Townsend.

Meeting called for review of the budget.

Discussion of Revenue Sharing monies for the sewage disposal system at the hospital revealed that use of federal matching funds would prevent the use of the revenue sharing funds for this project.

The proposed Fire Protection Division was favorably discussed but laid over for the

public hearing when the fire chiefs would explain in detail.

Hospital, Jail and Farm budgets were reviewed with Mr. and Mrs. Siegmund. No action was taken. The Executive Committee and the Press were invited to have dinner at the County Home and also to take a tour of the buildings after dinner.

County officers' budgets were reviewed. Rep. Buckman moved to increase the County Treasurer's salary \$200 dollars, up from \$500 to \$700. Rep. Copenhaver seconded. Vote was unanimous.

was unaminous.

County Attorney's budget was held over for afternoon when Mr. Eames would be available.

A \$7,500 item for microfilm equipment for the Register of Probate was discussed. The special item is needed due to lack of space in the vault for expansion.

Meeting re-convened at 2:00 p.m. Commissioner Hill announced the Lisbon Lion's Club is sponsoring a blood drawing on March 8 at the United Church of Christ from 1:00 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. The goal-100 pints to replenish the blood supply used by George Brummer.

The County Attorney's budget was reviewed with Mr. Eames. Mr. Eames indicated he wished to continue to work from his own office in Woodsville and suggested the budget amount in item 129 be deleted. The Committee decided it would be well to have at least a desk and chair and bookcases in the office so it could be used.

Sheriff Ash reviewed his budget with the Committee. Items 151.2 - 151.3 - 151.4 were discussed at length. Sheriff Ash explained the reason for asking the court deputies be put on salary. Deputies who were on per diem pay had to moonlight to earn enough to live on. They also could not transport prisoners which cost the County money. If they were on salary moonlighting would be stopped and all could assist in all the work of the department. Fees would be turned over to the county.

Rep. Jones: "If the deputies who are on per diem and moonlighting now were put on salary would the moonlighting be stopped?"

Sheriff Ash: "If all deputies were on salary none would be allowed to moonlight. I would prefer it that way."

Rep. Jones: "Not even the one who is working for the Senate now?"

Sheriff Ash: "That's right."

Rep. Jones: "Do you know how many radios the county has?"

Sheriff Ash: "Yes, sir, the equipment list is in the office."

Rep. Chamberlin: "Could we have a list of all deputies, regular and part time?"

Sheriff Ash: "You tell me what you want and you can have it. Many special deputies are in service to the county but are not paid by the county. They work as volunteers."

Rep. Copenhaver: "Why is the cost of phones under communications and postage so much higher than other departments?

Evelyn Smith explained that telephone rates are by numbers of phones and extra lines. The Sheriff has 5 desks with phones plus 4 extra lines and the line to the jail. Also the deputies have credit cards because they are scattered in different places.

Rep. Jones: "Do you have a list of the mobile units?" The list was brought in and discussed. Sheriff Ash explained that all equipment used in the communications system is recorded in the Sheriff's office because the system is in reality the Grafton County Law

Enforcement Communications System and the equipment is partially paid for by grant from the Crime Commission.

Rep. Chamberlin: "Do you handle State Police dispatching?"

Sheriff Ash: "If a breakdown occurs, we do. The equipment takes quite a beating in these mountains, so there are breakdowns."

Rep. Chamberlin: "In item 151.2 you requested 4 dispatchers but the Commissioners' recommendation is for only one. How do you feel about that?"

Sheriff Ash: "We should not do away with them. The Crime Commission will pay for half their salaries."

Rep. Chamberlin: "But for only one year?"

Sheriff Ash: "I don't understand it that way. The Crime Commission would pick up for one year with the towns picking it up after that. I am already working with the towns on it now. Remember this is the County Law Enforcement Communications System. It is for all the towns in the county."

Rep. Jones: "Why wasn't it given a fair trial in Lebanon?"

Commissioner Hill: "Some of the equipment didn't arrive until November."

Sheriff Ash: "The Chief has driven all around the Lebanon area and cannot trip the Moose Mountain transmitter."

Com. Hill: "Chief Wooley is reluctant because it would be something of a burden on his men. He would have to train some of his special officers. He was nervous about how much of a burden it would be on them."

Rep. Jones: "Once the men learn to handle the radio it would be no problem."

Comm. Hill read a resolution from the Lebanon City Council stating they would honor their agreement to try the system in Lebanon. Mrs. Hill also mentioned a memo from the City Manager to Roger Duhaime that specified problems. This memo is incorporated in the minutes of the meeting of December 11, 1972.

Discussion indicated some reservation in minds of the Committee members that the County might have to pick up the total cost this year if the Crime Commission failed to do so. Also, how can we be sure the towns will do so after the first year.

Sheriff Ash commented, "We will not get the towns to pick up the amount until they have something in return for it. The equipment is here and ready to use. Let's use it."

Rep. Jones: "Why can't the towns use the State Police network?"

Sheriff Ash: "They are not on the State Police frequency."

Rep. Jones: "I don't understand why they can't use the State Police network."

Sheriff Ash: "Because the State Police are not on repeater."

Rep. Jones: "Do you mean there are towns in the county that cannot reach the State Police system?"

Rep. Buckman testified to this and gave a personal experience clarifying the necessary involved procedure.

Rep. Chamberlin: "Can you get along with 3 criminal deputies?"

Sheriff Ash: "I have that many now and feel I need one more."

Rep. Chamberlin: "The five deputies would serve the civil papers?"

Sheriff Ash: "Yes."

Rep. Chamberlin: "Do you think the fees would bring between five or ten thousand dollars?"

Sheriff Ash: "That is very difficult to tell. There is a good chance the Crime Commission will pick up full dispatcher salaries. It would give a year from July to convince the towns."

Com. Bell: "Except for the dispatchers, with the three criminal deputies and the two court deputies could you get along with the rest of the budget?"

Sheriff Ash: "Yes."

Rep. Chamberlin read from RSA 478:24 and asked for a motion. Rep. Tilton moved the clerical help for the Register of Deeds be set at \$22,000. Rep. Jones seconded. Motion so voted.

Rep. Buckman moved adjournment. Rep. Jones seconded. Adjourned at 4 p.m. Next meeting called for Monday, March 5 at 9:30 a.m. at the Courthouse in No. Haverhill.

## GRAFTON COUNTY EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

Date: Monday, March 5, 1973

Place: Grafton County Courthouse, No. Haverhill, N. H.

Time: 9:40 A.M.

Nine members present: Chamberlin, Copenhaver, Jones, Tilton, Bradley, Mann, Buckman, Merrill and Townsend.

The meeting was called for discussion and final review of the budget. Mrs. Smith met with the committee to answer questions.

In the section on Administration, Rep. Merrill asked for an explanation of code 106, Travel & Expenses. Mrs. Smith explained that this covered Grafton County Association dues, travel for treasurer and commissioners. She also stated that Commissioner Hill is serving on extra committees and will be traveling more. She suggested more money would be needed. The Committee decided to raise item 106 \$400.

County Agricultural Agent Joel E. Nordholm met with us for review of the County Extension Service budget. This budget had been discussed with the staff members and the assistant to the director and then approved by the County Council. Budget was approved.

Mr. Nordholm asked that one member of the Delegation be appointed to act as liaison between the Executive Committee and the County Council, such member to attend the County Council meetings. (Agreed by Executive Committee – N. Chamberlin act as liaison.)

Discussion of the budget for the County Attorney. Rep. Merrill moved the County Attorney's salary be set at \$10,000. Rep. Jones seconded. Motion carried. Further discussion, i.e., clerks salary, brought out again that Mr. Eames will not be using the office in the Courthouse and that there is no way to determine how much time is spent on County business. Committee decided to call Mr. Eames in.

Mr. Eames felt that it would be very difficult to use the office on a part time basis. At the present time the records and papers are at his office in Woodsville. It would be impractical for him or his clerk to be working out of two offices. He would rather be in Woodsville all the time or at the Courthouse all the time. However, he felt the County wouldn't approve having him use the County office for private business.

After more discussion the Committee set the clerk's salary at \$2400. Rep. Merrill said she would like an estimate of the attorney's time and the clerk's time spent on county business for next year's budget review so we would have a better idea of what we were considering. The Chairman instructed the Clerk to write such instruction to Mr. Eames.

The Committee reviewed the budget for Register of Deeds with Mr. Wood. His budget

was approved at \$50,900 as presented.

Budgets for Register of Probate, Maintenance of Courthouse and Superior Court were approved with no changes. Public Welfare was approved with a change in item 227, Rent, Lebanon Office. Rent has been raised \$25 per month. Item 242, Court House improvements, was explained as the need of a humidifier and emergency lights.

Item 250 is the amount paid to Robert Jones for searching the deeds to the Plymouth Courthouse. Mrs. Smith commented here that she understood Mr. Jones would like to give the County \$1,000 if the County would match it with \$1,000 for the installation of kitchen

facilities in the Courthouse cafeteria.

Discussion of the Sheriff's budget. Item 151.2, Salary, Dispatchers. Rep. Townsend said, "Unless we can call on some disinterested trained person who can appraise the situation and give us a better idea of what it will cost to implement the system in Lebanon I am against trying the system there. The information that I have been able to gather, or the lack of it, has convinced me the program will cost Lebanon. The equipment is already installed at the Courthouse. I think the question before us is, do we want the system?" Further discussion.

Rep. Jones moved to overturn the Commissioner's recommendation and provide one year's funding for the dispatchers' services at the Courthouse starting July 1, 1973, contingent upon 50% funding by the Crime Commission, and that two of the Senate interns will be used to conduct a study of the duplication of services in law enforcement in Grafton County. Rep. Richard Bradley seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Code 151.3, Criminal Deputies. Sheriff Ash is asking for four at salary of \$8700. Commissioners' recommendation is three at \$6857. Executive Committee recommends three at \$7200 for a total of \$21,600. Code 151.4, Court Deputies, Committee decided on two at \$7200. The five deputies will serve all legal papers and the fees will be turned over to the county — with records.

Discussion of codes 153 and 153.1, Communications & Postage and WATS Line. Rep. Copenhaver questioned Sheriff Ash about the high telephone bills. Sheriff Ash did admit that his five telephone lines were not in service except perhaps in emergency situations. Further discussion did not result in clarification of the cost and Rep. Jones was appointed a committee of one to research this matter and report back to the next meeting.

Rep. Buckman moved adjournment at 4:00 p.m. Motion carried unanimously.

## GRAFTON COUNTY BUDGET INFORMAL PUBLIC HEARING

Date: March 21, 1973

Place: Municipal Building, Hanover, N. H.

Time: 8:00 P.M.

Commissioner Hill, Mrs. Evelyn Smith, Reps. Copenhaver, Albert Jones, Townsend and twenty-four interested citizens were present at the meeting.

Commissioner Hill chaired the meeting. This report records some of the comments and

questions brought out during the discussion of the budget.

Com. Hill explained that the county had received \$91,000 (about) in Revenue Sharing monies. We have 2 years in which to spend it. It had not been considered revenue at this point. That the County Convention has the power to spend it. The Commissioners have gone through the budget and considered how it could be spent. If it is used as intended we may get more, but if it is misused we may get less. The Commissioners are suggesting the following as possible uses: Lebanon airport \$2,000, Recycling program \$2,000, Juvenile cruiser \$3,400, Station wagon ambulance \$3,200, Bathrooms and plumbing at the Home

\$14,500 and the Fire Protection Division \$16,050.

Town Manager Neal Berlin, Hanover, commented that it would be unfortunate if the convention does not spend the money because it will have a great influence on the tax rate.

Chief Wood, Hanover, explained the proposed Fire Protection Division. Some interesting points were that only five out of thirty-nine communities in the county have full time fire personnel of one sort or another while nine have none at all and depend on nearby communities. The remainder exist on volunteer help altogether. Chief Wood said, "Good fire protection will stop fires and until we get together we are in trouble."

Mr. Berlin commented on the archaic accounting procedures pointing out that inconsistency in the accounting makes it difficult to follow the budget. He pointed out some examples. Mr. Berlin suggested that the commissioners should investigate a new system.

Mr. Myron Cummings, Hanover, said he believed a \$2 million budget cannot be run by three part-time commissioners and the county delegation. He suggested the hiring of a full time manager.

Discussion of the Superior Court budget and the \$2500 item for expenses of the Lebanon office of Probate Judge Robert Jones again pointed out how helpless the county is in budgeting in this area. Mr. William Baker, Lebanon, said, "This merely points up that the work of the courts is the obligation of the state and not the county, but that it is a requirement imposed upon us."

Sheriff Ash defended the salaries for the deputy sheriffs. He said, "I would like to get the base salary up so they would have a decent pay." He further explained that State Police start out at a higher rate of salary and work a forty hour week with built in overtime, whereas the deputies are on call 24 hours a day. He said, "The work they (deputies) do is demanding with many unexpected overtime hours." When asked, "What part of their activities are in law enforcement?" Sheriff Ash said, "All deputies' activities are logged and they also have a work sheet. Prisoner transfer is the major part of their services and the Hanover-Lebanon area is the busiest area in the county." When asked, "Do any part of their duties make up for lack of police protection in towns without protection?" the Sheriff explained that only five communities have full time police departments and the Sheriff's department does aid in twenty-five communities.

Com. Hill explained that the Plymouth courthouse had been sold for \$49,000 to be paid \$10,000 a year. The first payment has been incorporated into the budget this year. No decision has been made on the Woodsville courthouse as yet. Mr. Baker, Lebanon, suggested that the convention give the commissioners authority to sell the Woodsville courthouse now.

The budget for the Institute, Farm, and Jail came under considerable questioning. It was agreed that Mr. and Mrs. Siegmund were excellent administrators but that the farm could not be justified on a dollars and cents basis. Justification would have to be on rehabilitation or something else.

Com. Hill explained the move to go to the fiscal year in January 1974. The commissioners feel some of the Revenue Sharing should be kept for relief when we move to

the eighteen month budget at that time.

There were a number of representatives from various social service programs that will be hurt because of the impoundment of funds by President Nixon and the new regulations from the department of HEW. There was discussion of the use of the Revenue Sharing monies for the social services programs. The consensus of the meeting was that consideration should be given to programs that are serving on a county level. The following social services wanted to go on record as having presented their needs: Mental Health Services, Lebanon Day Care, Planned Parenthood, Women's Information Services and LISTEN. All were advised to bring their proposals to the budget hearing in No. Haverhill.

Mr. Henry Selle, Hanover, stated that welfare and social services are county matters but that penal functions are properly state matters and shouldn't be dumped in the county lap. The overlap is losing money. We should get the counties out of jail. He further stated that it was too much to ask that three commissioners and the representatives to administer this amount of money. It is time the county hired a fiscal administrator for good business management.

Mr. Berlin stated again that he believed the Revenue Sharing monies should be used to

the fullest extent possible in an effort to reduce the 1973 tax rate.

Those present expressed their appreciation for the effort on the part of Com. Hill and the Representatives to hold the meeting in Hanover.

## GRAFTON COUNTY BUDGET PUBLIC HEARING

Date: March 26, 1973

Place: Courthouse, No. Haverhill, N. H.

Time: 8:00 P.M.

Convention members present: Chamberlin, Townsend, Copenhaver, Richard Bradley, Buckman, Krainak, Mann, Gallen, A. K. Jones, Curran, Stevenson, Gemmill, and Commissioners Bell, Hill and Clement.

The budget was considered by sections. The Chair requested Fire Chief Wood, Hanover, to explain the proposed new Fire Protection Division. In his remarks Chief Wood pointed to the lack of fire protection in the smaller communities in the county. Also, the understaffed and underfunded Fire Marshal's department at the state level. Many communities go without inspections and training of personnel.

Rep. Gallen spoke in favor and endorsed the plan.

Atty. John Eames spoke against the plan.

Mr. Bromage spoke in favor of the Fire Protection Division.

Mr. Jack Colby could see the need but asked, "Why is the Legislature blocking the enlargement of the State Fire Marshal's department to do the job that needs to be done."

Rep. Chamberlin commented on the freeze in state jobs and the lack of funds.

Rep. Curran spoke against the Fire Protection Division.

Mr. Hubert Merrill, Littleton, spoke against the Division.

Mrs. Jordan, Bethlehem, spoke for. Mr. Stanley Snell, Lisbon, spoke in favor.

Chief Tupper, volunteer fire department, Lyme, spoke in favor.

Madison Sears, Plymouth, spoke against.

Assistant Chief, Orford Fire Department, "We would like to go on record as favoring this project."

Mr. Lennox, Dorchester, spoke against.

Discussion of Public Welfare brought no serious comments. Mr. Nordholm explained his budget for County Extension Service.

Com. Bell explained the need for searching the deeds to the Plymouth Courthouse.

Discussion of necessity for reconstruction of the leach field at the nursing home. Although approved by the Water Pollution Board it has never functioned as planned and designed.

Mr. Siegmund explained the budget for Hospital, Home, Farm and Jail. He commented that his budget was figured back in December so food, fuel, and feed might go higher than estimated.

Rep. Chamberlin stated all salaries reflect the 5.5% cost of living increase. Mr. Siegmund explained the raise in item 760, Occupational Therapist and Aid, is due to his having been notified the support from Manpower Act will terminate June 1973 and the county will have to pick up the cost. The program is very important. Mr. Siegmund invited all to visit the program and suggested we might purchase some items from the residents.

In answer to questions on Item 459 the Chair stated it was for station wagon, 6 beds, 6 mattresses, dryer, curtains and miscellaneous furniture, wardrobe type chairs, steam iron and laundry basket. Item 454 was for new showers, piping on first and second floors of the

Home and for toilets.

Discussion of farm brought out problems with rise in feed costs. Also, the houses, barns and farm lands are taxed the same as any other property in No. Haverhill, but no tax is paid on the institution.

Mr. Henry Selle, Hanover, commented on the budget and suggested hiring a county manager. He pointed out that no one single person is responsible for the large county budget and said this wasn't a good operating system. Mr. Selle offered his services at no charge to the county to at least make a detailed analysis in studying rates and the options for such a plan.

Rep. Curran questioned the raise in the treasurers' salary. Mrs. Smith explained that \$2,000 was requested, the commissioners cut it to \$500 and the Executive Committee raised it to \$700. Rep. Curran thought it should stay at \$500.

A comment was made by Mr. Whitney about the large discrepancy between what the state is responsible for in the cost of patient care and what the state is now paying. It was further suggested that legislators present might bear this in mind when this subject comes up for discussion later in the session.

The following representatives or directors of the various social services programs testified on the damages impoundment of Federal Funds will have on their programs.

Susan Levin, representing WISE, requested that \$16,000 be included in the Grafton

County budget and that her report be read into the minutes of the meeting.

Elizabeth Gibson, director of Grafton County RSVP, wondered just how much everyone realizes the effect the cutting of Federal Funds has on these programs ... the state has shirked its obligation over a period of years.... town budgets have been set ... we should take a long hard look while the legislature is in session and this budget is fluid... many people in Grafton County will be very badly hurt.

Rep. Curran spoke against money for programs. Rep. Gallen rose to say he hoped no decision and no allocation of the revenue sharing funds would be made until the committee

had heard the cases, set up priorities and then acted upon them.

Dr. Whybrow, Hanover, for Mental Health Agencies in Grafton County area, requested that Mr. Harlan Logan read a presentation of needs representing the Citizens Council Mental Health Committee in Grafton County.

Mr. Glen Eastman spoke about the Tri-County Community Action Program of which he is director.

Rep. Chamberlin advised that all program requests for budgetary needs presented at the meeting be presented to the Commissioner's office within two weeks.

Senator Poulsen, Littleton, reminded the Commissioners and the Executive Committee of the property assessment suit involving Littleton and New England Power Company which could result in the repayment of three year's tax monies (\$30,000). He said, "Monroe and Lebanon may also be involved."

Mr. Ray Burton supported Glen Eastman's proposal for Tri-County Community Action Agency.

Mrs. Marcia Boutin, director of LISTEN, Lebanon, called attention to item 232 of the 1972 budget and explained that surplus was due in part to LISTEN.

The proposed fiscal year change was discussed and it was suggested consideration be given to what effect it would have on tax rate to the towns. Senator Poulsen urged that we retain the Revenue Sharing to be used for financing the fiscal year change.

The meeting closed at 10:45 p.m.

Those present were: Reps. Tilton, Chamberlin, Bradley, Mann, Jones, Buckman, Copenhaver and Townsend.

Rep. Chamberlin explained the reasons for the meeting.

- 1. On January 10 the Executive Committee voted to meet the first Monday of every other month to review the running budget.
- 2. Rep. Kenneth Curran had requested to meet with the Executive Committee, the Commissioners, the courthouse architect and building contractor on this date.

Rep. Chamberlin, with comments from Mrs. Smith, explained that so far as the running budget is concerned there was nothing ready for review. The quarterly report will not be available until the end of April. Rep. Chamberlin suggested perhaps we should change the motion of January 10 and meet the last Monday of every other month instead.

Rep. Copenhaver moved that the meeting of the County Executive Committee which ordinarily would be on the first Monday of the month be the last Monday of the month. Rep. Mann seconded the motion. Discussion. Copenhaver motion withdrawn.

Commissioner Clement explained the statute concerning calling of the Executive Committee by the Commissioners. Also, the Chairman may call a meeting when necessary. The Committee agreed to have Chairman Chamberlin notified by the Commissioners when the quarterly report would be ready and the Chairman would notify the Committee of the meeting.

Rep. Mann called for a Committee Report from Rep. Jones on the communications in the Sheriff's budget.

Rep. Jones: "I still don't have my figures from the telephone company but it looks like they will be able to save, and I hope to have them in time for when the whole delegation approves the budget. But, it looks like the Sheriff's department can save some money by, I. putting in an outward WATS line. 2. by informing the local police departments that are into the WATS line that it is for emergency use only. As near as we can determine the local police departments, and by local I mean in the county, have been calling in on the WATS line for rather routine business and talking 15 to 20 minutes at a crack. We only have 50 hours a month on the WATS line and it should be more than adequate for emergency calls. But, what we've been doing is putting the towns' telephone calls onto the county. It really wasn't intended for that purpose and Sheriff Ash agrees with that. What we will possibly do as a result of this is send a letter out to all police departments, but whether or not it will do any good I can't tell you."

Rep. Chamberlin then opened the meeting to Rep. Curran.

Rep. Curran acknowledged that those persons he had requested to attend the meeting were not present, and since he did not wish to take up our time he would merely request that a new meeting date be set up. Discussion followed.

Com. Clement suggested that we meet with the architect, the contractor, Mr. Curran, Mrs. Townsend and Mrs. Smith along with any others who wished to attend, on a Monday suitable to all. Mrs. Smith was delegated to set up the meeting.

Treasurer William Bromage explained the construction costs budget. He reported the cash balance, less interest, to date is \$80,619.11. Mr. Bromage suggested that this money can be transferred into the operating budget. This action will be considered when the Convention meets to vote on the budget.

Rep. Copenhaver suggested that a sign or marker for the driveway to the courthouse is a necessity. The Committee is in full agreement with this suggestion and a suitable sign will be erected.

Commissioner Bell explained to the Committee a problem at the Courthouse with water and the transformer. In the early spring, or during an excessive rainfall, the presently constructed drainage does not take care of the water so there is danger of the transformer being flooded (it having been set at ground level) as well as the Sheriff's Department. The Commissioners have inquired of the architect what can be done to correct this problem. The architect has said the transformer can be raised for a cost of \$600.00. He also suggested the construction of two dry wells, one at each corner of the building to take care of the excess water.

Further discussion of the unexpended balance in the construction budget. Com. Bell suggested we wait until Rep. Curran had asked his questions of the architect and then by vote of the Convention transfer the balance to the operating budget. Com. Hill suggested the money could be used toward the eighteen-month budget when we go to the July first fiscal year.

Rep. Buckman commented on the public budget hearing and then moved that all funds received by the County Treasurer be used to expedite the business of Grafton County.

Reps. Jones and Tilton said the motion was premature.

Treas. Bromage said the wording was wrong because we receive Crime Commission monies and it will bind us in other areas.

Rep. Townsend said there is need to consider the social service programs. If we do not fund some of these programs we will be spending more on social welfare.

Com. Hill said we will be making a grave error if we take action on these monies now before we know the full implication of Federal cut back on the social service programs.

Rep. Buckman withdrew his motion.

Rep. Jones moved adjournment. Unanimously accepted.

The total amount of these items to be replaced with revenue sharing funds and the \$62,369.00 of county tax monies so replaced shall be budgeted to support social service programs. Seconded by Rep. Copenhaver.

Points of interest brought out in discussion: Com. Bell spoke against using Federal

Revenue Sharing Funds for social service programs.

Rep. Altman stated for clarification, that he understood if FRSF's are used strictly for reducing taxes the next apportionment of funds will be less. Rep. Hough, a member of the House Appropriations Committee, believed the biggest share of the amount budgeted for community mental health centers in the state budget will go to the Manchester Center to put that center into operation.

Com. Hill stated she had received information from the Dartmouth-Hitchcock Center

that state money will not take the county off the hook.

Rep. Gemmill suggested we go into consideration of the budget to see how monies will be used then discuss the Federal Revenue Sharing Funds. Com. Clement said he would like to apply FRSF's to reduce taxes under bonding and fiscal year.

Rep. Townsend withdrew her motion until the budget could be discussed. Rep.

Copenhaver withdrew her second.

Chairman Chamberlin began review of the budget.

Rep. Gemmill spoke to deleting the Fire Protection Division for the budget discussion. Rep. Merrill moved to delete the amount of \$16,050.00 for the Fire Protection Division from the budget. Seconded by Rep. Mann. Vote showed 19 yea; Rep. Copenhaver no; chairman abstaining; motion carried. The chairman declared the Fire Protection Division deleted from the budget.

Rep. Gemmill questioned item 146.1 in the budget for Judge of Probate, Robert Jones' office in Lebanon. The amount of \$2,500.00 was requested to cover phone, clerical help and court hearings held there. Discussion. Rep. Copenhaver moved that item 146.1 under question be a part of section Register of Probate. Rep. Merrill seconded the motion. Vote showed 17 yes, 4 no, motion prevailed.

Rep. Gemmill suggested the executive committee request Mr. Jones keep a record of expenses for next year's budget. Rep. Stevenson suggested it be called Probate Court office expense for clarification.

Sheriff's Department: Rep. Gallen moved that the pay scale for the five deputies be put back to \$8,700, as originally requested, effective July 1, and make appropriate adjustments

in related expenses. Seconded by Rep. Krainak. Discussion. Vote showed, 16 yes, 4 no, 2 abstentions. Motion carried.

Rep. Gallen moved we appropriate \$540.00 to obtain Crime Commission funds for the hiring of one additional person as a criminal deputy. Seconded by Rep. Krainak. Discussion. Vote showed 15 yes, 7 no. Motion carried.

Rep. Copenhaver moved that the Executive Committee recommend the salary of the deputy hired by the Crime Commission be the same as the other deputies, \$8,700. Seconded by Rep. Merrill. Vote showed 19 yes, 2 abstentions. Motion carried.

Dietary Section: Rep. Copenhaver questioned Mrs. Siegmund about item budgeted for food. Mrs. Siegmund explained the budget figure showed a 10% increase over last year, but expenditures for the first quarter are 6% more, a total increase of 16% over last year. Discussion. Rep. Gallen moved that we add \$2,500. to item 52 and \$2,000. to item 522 to reflect the increase in cost of food since the budget was set in January. Rep. Copenhaver seconded the motion. Vote showed 21 yes, Rep. Curran opposed. Motion prevailed.

There were no further questions on the budget. Rep. Townsend restated the motion on the use of Revenue Sharing Funds deleting the amount for Fire Protection Division so the total amount read \$46.319. Rep. Copenhaver seconded the motion.

Com. Hill suggested that we consider only those programs having definite application for funds, CAP, WISE, LISTEN, RSVP, UV. Reg. Training Center and Mental Health. Rep. Townsend distributed information about the various programs. Discussion of social service programs.

Rep. Stevenson moved to fund the Community Action Program for \$16,212. Seconded by Rep. Gallen.

Rep. Curran said, "We've got to stop putting in money from the local level and getting it from Santa Claus. We all know who Santa Claus is. We are throwing oil on the fires of inflation. We've got to stop!!"

Vote showed 15 yes, 6 no, 1 abstention.

Rep. Merrill moved that WISE be deleted from the budget for social services. Seconded by Rep. Gemmill. Discussion. Vote was unanimously in favor of motion. Rep. Curran was with us.

Rep. Merrill moved that LISTEN be deleted from the budget for social services. Seconded by Rep. Mann. Discussion. Vote showed 20 yes, 1 no. Motion prevailed.

Rep. Gallen moved to fund the program for RSVP (Retired Service Volunteer Program) for the amount of \$6,987.00. Seconded by Rep. Mann. Discussion raised the question on the amount needed. At a previous meeting in Concord the convention had approved the sum of \$2,000. as recommended by the Executive Committee. Mrs. Smith was requested to reach Mrs. Gibson by phone to clarify the issue. RSVP was passed over temporarily.

Rep. Chamberlin moved that the Upper Valley Regional Training Center be funded for \$2,000. Rep. Duhaime seconded the motion. Discussion. Vote showed 19 yes, 1 no, 1 abstention. Motion prevailed.

Rep. Tilton moved that the sum of \$58,000. for the Community Mental Health Centers be included in the social services budget. Seconded by Rep. Gallen. Discussion. Rep. Tilton revised his motion and moved that \$58,000. for Mental Health be incorporated into the Grafton County Budget. Seconded by Rep. Gallen. Vote showed 17 yea, 5 no.

Mrs. Smith reported no contact with Mrs. Gibson.

Rep. Stevenson moved to reconsider the motion on RSVP. Motion was withdrawn. Rep. Stevenson moved to reconsider our action on item 237 section, Public Welfare, and amend line 237 to read \$6,987. the amount requested by RSVP. Seconded by Rep. Gallen. Discussion. Vote showed 19 yes, 1 no, 1 abstention.

Com. Hill stated that we must notify Washington how we are going to spend the Revenue Sharing Funds by June 20, 1973.

Rep. Merrill moved that the amount of \$3,310.90 allocated for microfilm equipment in Register of Probate be added to the figures in the Townsend motion and taken from Revenue Sharing Funds. Rep. Copenhaver seconded the motion. Vote was unanimously in favor of the motion.

Rep. Merrill moved the Grafton County Budget he set at \$2,129,294.90. Seconded by Rep. Eaton. Vote showed 21 yes, 1 abstention.

In the absence of Chairman Chamberlin, who was ill, and with no Vice-Chairman in office, Rep. Man was appointed temporary chairman.

Temporary Chairman Mann read the agenda for the meeting as follows:

Elect a Vice-Chairman and to fill the Executive Committee vacancy

Vote 1973 Revenue Sharing Expenditure

Consider Fiscal Year

Discuss anticipated budget problems, ie:

Energy Crisis and effect on County budget;

Effect of State assistance grant changes and Food Stamps on County budget.

Other items as deemed necessary.

Nominations were called for Vice-Chairman. Rep. Duhaime nominated Rep. Mann for Vice-Chairman. Rep. Copenhaver seconded. Rep. Chambers moved nominations close. Rep. Altman moved for a unanimous vote for Rep. Mann. Rep. Copenhaver seconded. The vote was unanimously in favor of Rep. Mann for Vice-Chairman.

Nominations were in order for filling the vacancy, left by Rep. Mann's move to Vice-Chairman, in the District 2 representation on the Executive Committee. Rep. Copenhaver nominated Rep. Fimlaid, seconded by Rep. Gallen. Rep. Chambers moved nominations close. The vote was unanimously in favor of Rep. Fimlaid to serve on the Executive Committee.

The meeting then turned its attention to a discussion of the 1973 Revenue Sharing Expenditures as recommended by the special committee of Representatives Tilton, Copenhaver and Buckman.

The special committee recommended to the Convention that the Revenue Sharing Funds be applied under Nursing Service. A lengthy discussion followed. Treasurer Bromage assured the Convention that the action would be proper.

Rep. Copenhaver moved to apply \$199,630 of Revenue Sharing Funds under Nursing Service in the County budget. Rep. Altman seconded the motion. The vote was in the affirmative.

The clerk read a letter from Rep. Jones; a report on his investigation of the Sheriff's Department WATS line and communications system. After some discussion Rep. Gallen moved that the letter be turned over to the Commissioners and let them take action on the matter. Rep. Symons seconded the motion and the vote was in the affirmative.

The energy crisis and its effect on the County budget was discussed at great length. However, no formal action was taken because the majority of the members felt that nothing could be done until there was some direction given from the State and/or the Federal Government.

Commissioner Hill informed the members that the town of No. Haverhill indicated interest in buying the old Courthouse in Woodsville. The financing will be handled the same as for the Plymouth Courthouse, ie, \$10,000 per year for five years.

The meeting turned its attention to the State assistance grants and the Food Stamp Program. Since the Surplus Foods Program will be ending in June it is imperative that the Legislature at the special session approve the Food Stamp Program. Rep. Gallen explained the program and the bill to be considered by the Legislature. It was the feeling among the members that the County and the municipalities would bear the expense of higher welfare costs if the Food Stamp Program fails to pass and if the Flat Grant assistance is not raised

above the 1969 cost of living index to one more in line with that of today.

Rep. Altman moved adjournment, Rep. Duhaime seconded and the meeting adjourned. For the record the clerk would mention that by default no consideration was given to the Fiscal Year.

#### REPORT OF THE GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

To the Citizens of Grafton County;

As required by Statute, the Commissioners of Grafton County submit herewith the report of the various County officials for the year ending December 31, 1973.

This year, for the first time in County history, the Board of Commissioners included a woman. Mrs. Hill is also the first Democrat on the Board of Commissioners for more years than can be remembered.

The anticipated change-over to a Fiscal Year in 1973 fell through in February 1973 when the new Delegation rescinded the Executive Committee vote of December 1972 and voted to stay on the calendar year temporarily. This necessitated re-budgeting on a 12-month basis and delayed passing the budget until mid-June.

Grafton County realized a large budget surplus in 1973, largely due to Old Age & Disabled Assistance Programs not reducing income as had been forewarned under the Nursing Home Account, yet decreasing liability reimbursements more than anticipated under the Commissioners' Welfare Account. Receipts in excess of budget anticipation for the Register of Deeds and the County Farm added to the surplus, along with underexpenditures in the general County welfare assistance and boarded children accounts (which ran under 1972 expenditures), as well as underexpenditures in the Sheriff's Dept. and Clerk of Court accounts.

Federal reallocation of Revenue Sharing Funds greatly increased apportionments to Grafton County over the original allocation, thus leaving a surplus of some \$44,000 unappropriated in the Revenue Sharing Account.

Surplus Foods Program continues to be an outstanding program for needy households in Grafton County with 1800 to 2000 eligible recipients participating monthly. The commodity program for the needy household is, however, being terminated by the Federal Government as of June 30, 1973, and it appears that the commodities may be replaced by food stamps.

This year the County, in conjunction with the Office of Manpower Affairs, sponsored the Summer Youth Enrichment Program which provided supervised employment for more than 150 disadvantaged young persons in the County. Job classifications were varied and included clerical work, maintenance, recreation assistance and others. Evaluations from the participating towns and school districts indicated that the program was highly successful not only in services provided but also for the youths themselves.

A new sewage system for the Nursing Home Couples is needed, and Environmental Engineers, Inc., of Concord, N. H., have been contracted to set up the ground work for the \$250,000 more/less project.

We wish to express our appreciation to our staff of employees, the County Delegation, the various town officials, and the State Welfare Department for their continued cooperation.

The supplementary data consisting of Cost Statements for the Hospital, Institution and Jail are unaudited but are provided as additional information for County officials.

In accordance with the accounting practices followed by municipalities, the accounts are kept on a modified accrual basis under which the more important revenue and expenses are accrued. Expenditures for property, plant and equipment are expensed in the year of purchase.

In our opinion, the accompanying Balance Sheet and related Statements of Revenue and Expenses present fairly the position of Grafton County as at December 31, 1973 and its operations for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles for municipalities applied on a consistent basis.

#### REPORT OF GRAFTON COUNTY NURSING HOME ADMINISTRATORS

To the Honorable Board of Commissioners of Grafton County:

The past year has been rewarding, frustrating and, as usual, most challenging!

Rewarding episodes have been the profit the farm financial statement reflected even in the face of rocketing grain prices, a crop destroying cold and wet spring, and a devastating summer flood. It is therefore proper that we thank Douglas Bigelow, Farm Manager; Charles Page, Head Herdsman for their excellent management; and Joel Nordholm, County Agricultural Agent for his valuable consultations.

We were frustrated in our efforts to institute work on the oxygen outlets and the bathroom renovations. Although approved bids were accepted on these jobs, shortages of valves, fixtures, etc., delayed work actually being started until the very end of 1973.

We, as did everyone else, had a year of gas shortages, spiraling prices and other problems similar. With the cooperation of everyone, we did come in within our overall budgeted figures, for which we consider ourselves fortunate.

As in each year past, we formally thank Cyrus D. Eastman, M. D., our Medical Director and Mrs. Evelyn Bigelow, R. N., our Director of Nursing Services, for their usual 'job well done'. Indeed, each and every employee, each and every volunteer, and the media have all been instrumental in making our nursing home one of the very best facilities delivering health care services!

R.S.V.P. has again been most helpful in recruiting volunteers for us. So successful have they been that their number has swelled from the original 12 to 45 dedicated people. Under their guidance, we were able to have our second annual Christmas Bazaar and booth at the North Haverhill Fair. At both of these functions, our patients sold articles they had made at their occupational therapy classes. The Grafton County Home Association, our auxiliary, has also been instrumental in affording our patients field trips, programs, etc.

Each year we have a continuing maintenance program. This assures the upkeep of county property within our complex. This, together with small renovation work, is most ably handled by Leo Fortier, whose mechanical expertise is second to none.

Our Jail and House of Correction had a non-dramatic year, with a stable population and a minimum of problems.

A project that was begun in the fall of this year, but will only come to fruition in the spring of 1974, is the new mini-park for the bed patients. This was designed by Everett Hensen and Steven Maurice of the Conservation Dept., with all shrubs being donated by individuals, service organizations and/or the Grafton County Home Association. This should make available to our patients an opportunity to go out-of-doors this summer on paved (donated by Arthur Bigelow) paths within this tiny garden.

Needless to say, the year was blessed by talented and cooperative personnel; dedicated clergymen; and a 'caring' public. Our gratitude to all, and also to you Commissioners for your supportive spirit.

#### REPORT OF THE GRAFTON COUNTY ATTORNEY 1973

To the Commissioners and Voters of Grafton County:

Herein is my first annual report of the activities of the office of the Grafton County Attorney for the year 1973. This office handled 130 felonies, 257 misdemeanors, and 22 petitions under the Uniform Reciprocal Enforcement of Support Act. In addition, approximately 12 people in Grafton County requested that this office initiate proceedings under the Uniform Reciprocal Enforcement of Support Act against individuals within other jurisdictions. At times this office has received inquiries from individuals concerning town matters as well as inquiries from the Probation Department, the Welfare Department, and the County Farm.

In August your County Attorney was requested by the Attorney General, at the suggestion of the Chief Justice of the New Hampshire Superior Court, to represent all of the towns within Grafton County in their efforts to obtain federal disaster assistance funds due to the extensive flooding in June and July. This request turned out to be quite time consuming but far more practical than having each town obtain separate counsel.

During the past year, this office was involved in approximately 27 cases involving mostly college students in Hanover who were charged with refusing to withdraw upon order from certain establishments in Hanover and Lebanon. These individuals were engaging in a protest demonstration against the Vietnam War at the time of their arrest. Irrespective of the fact that we may have seen the end to protests involving the Vietnam War in particular, there will continue to be other cases that will take its place. This type of an offense is considered a misdemeanor, but it is my position that there are times when misdemeanors must be pursued in Court to the same extent as felonies. In these cases the Court was faced with balancing the rights of individuals to gather and be heard on one hand and the interest of the County in protecting its citizens by maintaining order and a respect for the freedom of others. These cases were also time consuming for this office and for the Court but a legitimate question had to be answered.

The new Criminal Code took effect on November 1, 1973. As with anything new, time will tell how workable it will be for the law enforcement officers in the County. Most of the cases now pending before the Superior Court took place prior to November 1st.

In conclusion, I feel that it is the duty of the County Attorney to not only prosecute criminal cases in the Superior Court and sometimes in the district courts when requested or needed, but also to use his own practical judgment in determining when a case should simply be dismissed or lowered to a lesser offense. During this past term, your County Attorney has lowered some felony cases to misdemeanors after determining that it was in the best interest of society and the individuals involved. Your County Attorney has also made some decisions that resulted in complaints not being brought in the first instance. Each individual case is carefully thought out and there is always an effort made to confer with the law enforcement officers involved prior to any action being taken.

I wish to sincerely thank all of the law enforcement personnel within Grafton County for their assistance and cooperation during my first year in office.

#### REPORT OF GRAFTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT YEAR of 1973

Honorable Chairman of the Grafton County Delegation, Delegation members, and Voters of Grafton County:

As Sheriff of Grafton County, I respectfully submit the following report of the activities of the Grafton County Sheriff's Department for the Year of 1973.

I personally would like to thank my Grafton County Delegation and Commissioners for the concerted efforts in modernizing and up-dating the Grafton County Sheriff's Department by putting the entire department on a line item budget, salaried personnel and deputies, and County owned cruisers. I feel that this reorganization of the department has made tremendous strides to provide more efficient services throughout our entire county.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Governor's Commission on Crime & Delinquency for the funds they have made possible for our dispatch center, an additional criminal investigator, for the County juvenile officer, two summer cadets, and the modernization and up-dating of the County Communication system.

It should be noted that in the 1972 Grafton County Report, the Ex-County Attorney, N. George Papademas, filed a petition in the Courts, alleging "Public Misconduct" of a County official and the "Removal" of this County official.

I am pleased to point out that his petition for "Removal" went to the Superior Court and was from there referred to the Supreme Court of the State of New Hampshire.

On October 31, 1973 a unanimous decision was made by the Supreme Court of the State of New Hampshire, which exonerated the Grafton County Sheriff of any "public misconduct", and the case against me was "dismissed". The decision was written by Chief Justice Kenison of the New Hampshire Supreme Court with the entire Supreme Court concurrent.

I would like to at this time, take the opportunity to thank law enforcement agencies throughout the County, State and Federal for their Whole-hearted cooperation, mutual interests and support.

I take this opportunity to again thank the Grafton County Sheriff's Auxiliary for their hundreds of man-hours rendered to the citizens of this County during two separate flood disasters, and the many hours given to this department for the security and surveillance of prisoners at the Mary Hitchcock Memorial Hospital. Their performance has been of excellence.

Following this report are summaries of activities, which are all self-explanatory.

Again we have had a busy year. We have been at 100 per cent capacity most of the time and with a waiting list. At present there are seventeen on this list.

Our locked rooms have also been more than average filled as we use them for women prisoners at times, and this practice seems to be increasing.

There have been numerous changes in our Administration dictated to us by State and Federal regulations. There have been changes in billing for patient care and medications. The State and Welfare Department requested everything by code number so that it can be computerized. This has caused a number of changes in Administrative procedures.

The Occupational and Physical Therapy Units have been used extensively with a great deal of benefit to the patients and residents.

In general I think we have had a good year with a minimum of difficulties.

#### GRAFTON COUNTY HOME ASSOCIATION, INC.

The Grafton County Home Association, a non-profit organization operating with donated funds and volunteers, was established in 1971 with contributions realized from a Dartmouth student radiothon for the purpose of providing extra activities and entertainment to enrich the lives of our Grafton County Home residents/patients.

In the early part of 1973 a program schedule was set up by the members of the Grafton County Association which would give the residents a monthly movie and birthday party as well as seasonal trips and holiday parties.

Mrs. Theda Bassett has been invaluable as coordinator of volunteers and works tirelessly

in arrangements for the movies and parties.

During the summer a number of the male residents, with the help of Mr. Fred Parker in the wood work shop, made picnic tables for use on the Home grounds. Money for the lumber was provided by the Association and much pleasure was gained both by those making the tables and those using them.

The lady residents also enjoy the facilities of the beauty parlor, run by volunteers, and always look well groomed. Everyone continues to use the library and again we are indebted to volunteers for keeping the service open. Hospital patients have a welcome "Commissary cart" which visits them to take the place of the Country Store to which ambulatory residents have access.

A bright spot in the year was the North Haverhill Fair in August. A booth was set up, for the second year, to display and sell the work of the residents done in the Occupational Therapy department. The sales from the booth brought in additional funds for arts and crafts supplies as well as making known to the public the type of activities the residents enjoy.

A Fall foliage tour was greatly appreciated by those participating as was the picnic lunch provided.

The mini-park on the Home grounds had an addition of a shade tree donated by Hanover area members of the Catholic Daughters of America. Mrs. Northrop, president of the group, handed over a plaque to be placed by the tree commemorating the event.

An eventful year ended on a high note of success with the second Annual Christmas Bazaar. Sponsored by the Association, the bazaar raised over \$700.00 to be used solely for

the recreation of the residents.

It is hoped by making our presence felt in the community even more in the coming year we may perhaps increase the benefits to the residents and patients. Only by constant awareness of their needs and persistent effort can we continue the work begun. To this end the Association plans many projects in the next year.
