TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

The Polls will be open from 10 A.M. to 6 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hancock in County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hancock on Tuesday, the fourth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing; and, upon approval by the voters at that time, to postpone consideration of the balance of the Budget and Warrant until Saturday, the eighth day of March next at 1:00 p.m. in the afternoon.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a commission consisting of five members to oversee the development of the Camp Guild Property for Conservation and Recreational purposes; the commission to consist of a member of the Conservation Commission, a member of the Recreation Committee and three members-at-large to represent the taxpayers. The commission to serve for a period of three years, or to take any other action related thereto.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of the Camp Guild Buildings as recommended by the Study Committee, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate five hundred dollars (\$500) for use of the Town History Committee, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for the Water Reserve Fund, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate one hundred dollars (\$100) for the Fire Hose Reserve Fund, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500) to continue to implement the recommendations of the Dump Study Committee to establish a sanitary landfill operation for the Town, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate nine hundred ninety-five dollars and seventy-six cents (\$995.76) to be supplemented by sixty-six hundred thirty-eight dollars and forty-three cents (\$6,638.43) from the State for the Town Road Aid Program for this year, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw two thousand dollars (\$2,000) from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the Provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, for use as set-offs against appropriations for miscellaneous repairs and alterations required to meet safety and fire regulations in the High School Building, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate five hundred dollars (\$500) for the Conservation Commission, or take any other action relating thereto, this sum to be allowed to accumulate from year to year or to be expended by the Commission or to be added to by gifts of money.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Moderator to appoint a committee of three Hancock residents with the authority to modernize the Town's bookkeeping and accounting system, including, also, facilities for storage of all Town Documents and Records as required by law, subject to the approval of the Selectmen, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate five hundred fifty dollars (\$550) for the Recreation Committee, this sum to be used for work on the tennis courts, unused funds to accumulate from year to year, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate two hundred dollars (\$200) for the Bicentennial Committee, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate five hundred twenty dollars (\$520) to support the Mental Health program of the Monadnock Mental Health Service, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 16. To see if the Town of Hancock, N.H. will raise and appropriate the sum of one-thousand one-hundred forty-three dollars (\$1,143) to support the services of the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurse Association, Inc. This local request for financial support is based on a \$1.10 per capita formula, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 17. To see if the Town agrees to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal

Insurance Administration. Such information includes the following resolutions (summarized):

Resolution A

The community recognizes that there are flood areas in community; that federally subsidized flood insurance is available; that Town Meeting intends to evaluate land use in these areas; and that Town Meeting has the authority to enact appropriate land use control measures.

The Town Meeting resolves that assurances be given to the Federal Insurance Administration that the community will enact and enforce necessary land use control measures; that municipal officials and boards will be authorized to deal with the appropriate governmental agencies and private firms; and that elevations of buildings will be recorded when required.

Resolution B-1

The community recognizes that regulations governing building construction in flood hazard areas have been enacted and are enforced.

The Town Meeting recommends that the Planning Board require all proposals for their approval that are in flood hazard areas be designed to minimize or eliminate flood damage and that the Planning Board require new or replacement water.supply/sewage disposal systems be designed to eliminate or minimize flood damage.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept Prospect Hill Extension as a Town Road based on plans approved by the Planning Board, if and when the Selectmen are satisfied that all provisions of the Town Sub-Division Ordinances have been complied with, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept Carriage Hill Road as a Town Road based on plans approved by the Planning Board, if and when the Selectmen are satisfied that all provisions of the Town Sub-Division Ordinances have been complied with, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 20. To accept that portion of Route 202 which was abandoned when the highway was relocated, only that portion of the road between Tannery Hill Road and Route 123. This section of road shall become part of the Town's Class V highways under provisions of Chapter 229:13 R.S.A.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven-hundred six dollars and fifty-two cents (\$706.52) as the Town's share for the studies and operation of the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 22. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for the Library Capital Improvement Fund. This sum to be allowed to accumulate from year to year or to be expended by the Library Trustees or to be added to by gifts of money, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to acquire a strip of land twenty-five (25) feet wide by eighty-two (82) feet long adjacent to and easterly of the present Town Library from Thomas T. Pond, Jr. and Cynthia Pond to be used for library purposes, said acquisition to be by negotiation, purchase, and/or eminent domain, and that the sum of thirty-eight hundred dollars (\$3,800) be raised and appropriated to pay for the cost of the same, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 24. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) to purchase eight monitors for the Fire Department, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 25. To see if the Town of Hancock, New Hampshire will raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred dollars (\$600) to defray the cost of purchasing two (2) dry hydrants to be placed on Half Moon Pond for added fire protection to surrounding properties, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 26. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to enter into an agreement with the Department of the Army Corps of Engineers, New England Division, to raise approximately three hundred fifty feet (350) of Link Road in accordance with plans and specifications on file; cost on said project to be paid for by the United States Army Corps of Engineers directly to the Town of Hancock; said work to be done by a local contractor subject to the approval of the Selectmen and the Road Commissioner, it being understood that the cost of said project shall not exceed the sum received from the Army Corps of Engineers.

Article 27. To decide whether the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) shall be appropriated for the Monadnock Regional Bicentennial Committee to enable it to act as a regional coordinator for the celebration of the 1976 Bicentennial, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to convey to Robert English of Hancock, New Hampshire whatever rights the Town may have acquired, from whatever source, to take water from Eaton's Brook, also known as Davis Brook, and the Old Reservoir, so-called, and the rights to construct, enlarge and excavate said Brook and Reservoir and to enter upon adjacent land to install, maintain and repair any pipeline leading from said Brook and Reservoir, all as are situated westerly of the Kings Highway, and further authorize the Board of Selectmen and/or the Hancock Water Commissioners to Quitclaim to said Robert English all of said rights and any other rights the Town may have in said Davis Brook and the Old Reservoir, so-called, westerly of the Kings Highway, as far as they relate to the real estate of Robert English.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to accept from Robert English an easement giving the Town the right to install, maintain and repair the water

line and access road running from Jaggernaut Pond to the chlorinating station on Kings Highway.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 31. To see if the Town will accept gifts and legacies left in trust for the Town, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 32. To hear the reports of auditors and committees heretofore chosen, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 33. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT FOR 1974

The year 1974 was a very busy year with 23 alarms plus many calls to assist the ambulance, compared to 12 alarms last year. We lost two buildings this year, a cottage on Nubanusit Lake, and the other a camp on Forest Road. Otherwise there was very little damage done to property in town. There were 2 structure fires, 2 chimney fires, 4 car fires, 4 dump fires, 3 resuscitator calls, and 8 mutual aid calls.

In 1973 we had 37 members, while there was a decrease in membership, in 1974 there was a 34% increase in meeting attendance, 215% increase in response to alarms, 323% increase in time spent at fires and 92% increase in alarms.

Summarizing the year, I believe that the men deserve a lot of credit for their interest in the department and for the time they have put in, for they not only answered the alarms for the year, but they also turned out for 12 training sessions during the year and their only reimbursement for this is knowng how to use the equipment.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

All open burning when the ground is not covered with snow is controlled by the Town Forest Fire Warden to cooperation with the New Hampshire Forest Fire Service. Anyone wishing to kindle a fire out-of-doors when the ground is not covered with snow must have a written permit signed by the Town Forest Fire Warden. If the fire is to be kindled on land not owned by the person kindling the fire then he must have the permission of the landowner. No outdoor fires can be kindled between 3 A.M. and 5 P.M. unless it is raining, without the additional approval of the District Forest Fire Chief.

The 1974 forest fire season was one of the worst in the past two decades. Woodlands in central and southern New Hampshire became so dry in mid August that the Governor and Council, upon the recommendation of the State Forester, enacted a partial woodlands closure in Sullivan, Cheshire, Hillsborough, Merrimack and Belknap Counties and a complete woodlands closure in Strafford and Rockingham Counties plus the Towns of Barnstead, Gilmanton and Alton in Belknap County. Through the excellent corporation of the citizens of our State no major forest fire occured at any time during the year.

REPORT OF THE SEXTON

The weatherman was co-operative in 1974, and we were able to get and keep all three cemeteries in good shape.

New power mowers were purchased and should last another year or two. Continuous usage over such a broad area through late spring and all summer wears them out a a more than normal rate.

The task of placing corner grave site markers at Hillside Cemeter has been completed.

In the summer of 1975 it is planned to eliminate the moss which has been spreading in some parts of the cemetery. It is hoped that sprinkling lime will take care of this problem. Later we will re-seed this area and some lots where the grass has not grown well.

Our oldest burying ground, Pine Ridge Cemetery, has many historic stones which need repair. It will require a stone mason with experience in this type of restoration to do the work properly. Perhaps the Bicentennial Committee might consider this as a project of lasting value to the town.

Sixteen committal services were conducted in our cemeteries in 1974.

For his help in always having the graves prepared and later reseeded, appreciation goes to Louis Hugron. I also wish to thank Louis' wife Marion, other members of his family, Brian Higgins, Jeff Wilder and Rick Perry for their good work in keeping our cemeteries looking well during the past year.

The State Library Bookmobile visited the library several times during the year to leave us a total of approximately 1500 books. In addition we borrowed 76 books from the State Library at Concord on special requests.

At the end of our contract year with the McNaughton Book Service we arranged with them to add 50 books to our basic collection of 100, and under this arrangement the library will receive fifteen new books each month, instead of ten, on a continuous rotating basis. Also, at the end of the contract year the library was able to purchase for its permanent collection fourteen books at a greatly reduced price.

During the year the third and fourth grade pupils visit the library with their teachers each week on an alternating basis. Harriet Hampson has a story period for the third graders, and also reads to the pre-school children who visit the library every other Wednesday morning. Doris Rogers continues to have a story period for the first and second grades either in the library or at the school each Friday afternoon.

LIBRARY TRUSTEES REPORT

Your Library offers something for everyone — picture books for the preschooler, information for the student, recreational reading for all ages, records for the music lover. Besides access to thousands of books all over New Hampshire and an ever-changing art show. Patrons appreciate the atmosphere of friendliness along with the warm welcome from the Librarians.

The Library Trustees continue plans for acquiring much needed additional floor space and a more suitable work area for the staff. Guided by the very thorough report of the Library Space Committee which was submitted to the 1974 Town Meeting, the Trustees are preparing a master plan which may be implemented in progressive steps according to the availability of capital funds. The present plans are for alterations to the old building including complete removal of the fireplace and chimney, rearrangement of the present stairwell and toilet, an enlarged work area and a new second floor above the present middle room and stack room which will provide a combination children's room and meeting room for small groups.

The Space Committee recommended the creation of a Library Improvement Reserve Fund which the Trustees have started. The amount at present is approximately \$4,000, having been accumulated in the past few years, partly from current income, partly from contributions such as \$1,000 from the Hancock Woman's Guild in 1972 and \$1,000 from the Town in 1974. It is hoped that this Improvement Fund will be constantly increased from private sources such as gifts, bequests or organized fund-raising efforts, thereby reducing the tax burden.

A sizeable fund was established this year in memory of Albert Lyon who died on February 16th near the completion of his first year as Selectman. His special interest in the Library was in the Children's Room and although unrestricted, it is intended that the Albert M. Lyon Fund shall be kept separate and used to benefit the children. Mrs. Martha Lyon has also given in memory of her husband a twenty volume set, "Annals of America", helpful for historical reading and reference.

The Library lot frontage on Main Street is 57 feet and the length of the Library building along the front is 52 feet, leaving only about 2-1/2 feet of Library land on each end. As a result of this condition access to the basement bulkhead, the septic tank, or the yard area behind the Library requires trespass on private property. This situation has created a problem because the owner of the adjacent property has rightfully objected to its use for Library purposes. Accordingly, the Trustees have been negotiating for the acquisition of a narrow strip of this land so that access to the rear of the building can be had without trespassing.

The book storage area in the basement which was recently improved with

additional shelf space and new lighting has been put into full use but the dampness during the summer months was damaging. To overcome this a partition has been erected to separate the paved area where the books are stored from the unpaved portion and a dehumidifier has been installed in the area with the books.

The paving in the two walks approaching the front steps had broken, causing a tripping hazard. Both of these walks were rebuilt with heavy concrete construction.

The Library sponsored an entertainment for all the youngsters of Hancock on the afternoon of August 6th when the "Little Red Wagon", a project of the drama department of UNH, presented a hilarious, fun-filled open air theater program at the athletic field.

As a contribution to the 1976 Bicentennial celebration the Library will cosponsor with the Church, the Historical Society, and the History Committee a booklet on early town history.

The Library staff remains unchanged. Sharing the work is always a subject of mutual and harmonious agreement between Elsie Frank and Doris Rogers. Harriet Hampson, Children's Librarian, has this year completed two courses offered by the State Library in conjunction with UNH, "Introduction to the Public Library", and "Public Library Administration".

Sally Hamilton has procured and hung exciting art exhibits. Water colors, oils, foils, charcoal — everything from Old Testament to abstract provide continuous stimulation. In the display case the Librarians have shown Victorian jewel boxes, wood carvings, Eskimo Sculpture, Colonial lights, all pointing up the variety of subjects one can learn about in the Library.

As requested by the Selectmen, the town-owned public address system and film projector are stored in the Library. The Trustees have drafted rules for the use of these facilities by organizations which are established in Hancock.

Rampant inflation and acute paper shortages have increased the cost of hardback books over 45% in the last six years. The book budget does not stretch as far as it used to, so our gratitude to donors of good books, records, magazines, or the money for same, increases in direct proportion to the inflationary spiral.

REPORT OF THE HANCOCK PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board held 20 meetings in 1974, including public hearings on subdivision applications and on proposed amendments to the zoning ordinance, subdivision regulations and building code.

Three subdivision applications were approved; all were of minor nature. At year's end no applications were pending.

A zoning ordinance amendment has been prepared for consideration at Town Meeting, to provide for a Hancock Historic District. Building code amendments will also be offered. These represent numerous minor changes intended to up-date and clarify the code. The subdivision regulations were amended in 1974 to clarify various points and to provide somewhat more restrictive requirements.

HANCOCK HISTORIC DISTRICT COMMISSION

The Commission held five meetings during the course of the year. The principal business of the Commission was to research information relative to the establishment of Historic District Regulations for the town.

There were several interim reviews held with the Planning Board. On December 3, and January 10, hearings were held in conjuction with the Planning Board for public review of the ordinance.

The Commission has continued under the chairmanship of Mr. Herbert Johnson, Robert L. Fish, vice-chairman, and Mrs. Frederick Gleason. Changes in the Commission membership have come about with the departure of Kay Tailby, the expiration of Richard Amidon's term, and the appointment of the following members to three-year terms: John B. Wilbur, Wallace L. Ensor, and Peter Garland.

The Commission has completed the drafting of a Historic District Ordinance and preparation of a Historic District Map for consideration at the March 1975 Town Meeting. The full text of the proposed Ordinance and a copy of the map are to be made a part of the 1974 Town Report.

The Commission wishes to express appreciation to Edward P. Wells for his very capable assistance in preparation of the District Map.

HANCOCK TOWN HISTORY COMMITTEE

Monthly meetings of the Committee were held during 1974. Representatives of the Phoenix Publishing Company of Woodstock, Vermont, came to one of these and suggested various ways in which the material relating to the second century of the town's history could be presented.

A pamphlet is being prepared for the Bicentennial celebration in 1976. This will include excerpts from old records and manuscripts as well as talks given to the Historical Society, and a map of the town on which homes of Revolutionary soldiers are located.

Various members of the Committee are engaged in research and writing on topics to be included in the pamphlet and in the subsequent history of the second century. Work is proceeding on a summary of the town's earliest history and events covered by the first volume, on reports of the church, schools, library, store and railroad. Research is carried on, not only in our own library and historical files, but also in the libraries of nearby towns where microfilm copies of early newspapers are available. Interviews with older residents have been very helpful and have been tape-recorded to preserve the memories they have of Hancock many years ago.

Three members of the Committee attended a meeting at New Castle, New Hampshire, with representatives of historical societies from all over the state to hear a discussion regarding the preservation of historical documents. They had an opportunity to inspect the fireproof vault in which the New Castle town records are stored. At the request of the Committee, the New Castle Town Clerk was kind enough to supply blueprints and specifications of the vault, and these have been given to the Hancock Selectmen for their information.

A mimeograph machine and electric typewriter have been bought with previously allocated funds held in reserve for the History Committee. These will be available in the History Room for the use of other town committees.

We welcome help from anyone who is interested, both on the booklet and the story of Hancock's second century.

REPORT OF THE HANCOCK ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

During 1974, the Board held public hearings to consider four applications for variances from certain sections of the town Zoning ordinance. The first concerned a request by Alfred J. Dillon to sell land whereon access would be by private right of way. Since access was not to be by public road, the Board ruled that the provisions of the Ordinance relating to frontage need not be met.

Two public hearings were held in response to requests by Scorpion, Inc. relative to sections of the town Zoning Ordinance on industry in the Rural and Agricultural zone. The rulings of the Board restricted Scorpion's operations to warehousing, prohibited the operation of snowmobiles on the premises, and specified standards for the screening of outside storage.

Following a public hearing on a request by Jeffco, Inc., permission was granted to manufacture electronic equipment in the Rural and Agricultural zone subject to Board rulings on parking and disposal of sewage and industrial waste.

In other business, the Board revised sections of it's by-laws concerning the processing of applications to assure adequate notification of abutters and the public at large. An application fee of \$25.00 was approved to cover costs associated with the activities of the Board.

HANCOCK — 1974

What can one say for 1974 except, "Thank goodness it's over!" This year has left in its wake a nationwide wave of nostalgia. How many recall the "good old days" before every tragedy, confrontation, crisis and scandal on earth came screaming into our living rooms?

It has been a sad year, for we said goodbye to many old friends. Each has left an empty space which can be filled by no other.

There have been moments of joy too, as a peek at vital statistics shows. Happiness is wished for our newly-weds, congratulations to parents of 1974 babies and sympathy for Sue and Keith, and Pat and Ed also.

A frustration not soon forgotten was last winter's gasoline shortage. Lines of cars waited at Wilder's in the pre-dawn darkness for Bud, Bob and Mike to start pumping the daily ration of precious fuel. By 7:30 A.M. the sign "NO GAS" greeted optimistic latecomers.

Despite world clamor, national confusion and moments of sorrow, however, much was accomplished in our small town during the year.

In January the Selectmen summoned representatives from local organizations to meet and form a committee to plan the celebration of the country's birthday in 1976. With Bob Fay as chairman, the Hancock Bicentennial Committee has chosen the theme "Heritage and Horizons". Exciting and useful projects are underway. Most town buildings are already adorned with Bicentennial signs, beautifully designed and handcrafted by Mert Knowles.

Shortly before Election Day the town was shocked and grieved by the sudden death of Selectman Albert Lyon. After consulting Town Counsel and learning that legally it was too late to add to the list of previously posted town offices open, the Selectmen appointed Wallace Ensor to serve until the 1975 election.

Chairman of Selectmen, Dick Amidon, had decided to step down after twelve useful years on the Board. The race for this vacancy had six contestants, and the final count showed Dave Wilder a few votes ahead of his leading opponent, Bill Weston.

Dr. John Wilbur, Town Moderator for several years, also decided upon retirement. He persuaded the departing selectman to run for this less time-consuming position. Unopposed for the office, Dick assumes his new responsibility in 1975.

Other successful applicants for new posts were John B. Corser, Jr., elected to the New Hampshire House of Representatives and Al Daloz who won a seat in the State Constitutional Convention.

Appointed by the Selectmen to represent Hancock on the Conval Advisory Board was Frank Mason. Harry Casler was persuaded to join Parker Starratt on the town auditing team, and Mike Cass was sworn in as a "special" on the police force.

On Town Meeting Day in March the Town Hall was packed. Most challenging was the article in the Warrant asking the town to purchase the Camp Guild property on Norway Pond. The owners had offered this land to Hancock for \$125,000. No such sum had ever before been asked of Hancock voters for a single purchase. The Chairman of Selectmen explained both the advantages and drawbacks, leaving to the voters the decision as to whether or not Norway Pond would remain undeveloped and Hancock's rural atmosphere preserved. The discussion was lively and a ballot vote mandatory. As the meeting continued, tellers counted. Many people had already left the hall when the announcement was made that Hancock had voted, by an overwhelming majority, to buy.

Easter week was appropriately observed. A well-attended Maundy Thursday evening service at the Vestry featured a play-reading of the Easter story, written by Frank Bramley and directed by Dorothy Starratt. The Youth Group held their annual sunrise service in the bell tower, followed by breakfast at the Vestry. At the morning worship service, selections from Handel's Messiah were sung by the augmented adult choir. Wales Meisinger accompanied at the organ and Eleanor Amidon directed.

May 23, 1974, marked the end of an era. The Valley Farm registered Holstein herd of milk cows and heifers were sold at auction. The herd was first assembled thirty years ago, and some of the original stock were included in the sale.

The town-owned moving picture projector, bought with contributions from local organizations, has proven its worth. The Historical Society has borrowed it from its library storage space on several occasions, as has the Youth Group. Preschoolers have enjoyed watching story films provided by the New Hampshire State Library. During the summer Audubon films were offered on Tuesday nights at the Vestry as part of the Church's "Summer Thing".

This successful project, sparked by Reverend Alan and Dorothy Schroepfer, involved young people of all ages. First Grade teacher, Jane Bower, was named "Summer Thing Director", and the entire program was enjoyed by all who participated. The final phase, a week of bicycling around Martha's Vineyard, was a delightful experience for the high schoolers who took part.

Hancock's Jug Band has had a busy year, contributing their talents on many occasions. One April evening, sponsored by the Guild, they raised money for the projector fund with a cabaret-style dance and sing-a-long at the Town Hall. Again the group, with the addition of Herb Gardner's melodious trombone and vocal renditions, opened the Old Home Day festivities at the usual "night before" dance. The Band also provided entertainment at the annual potluck supper which, hosted by Del Eva and Kay Moore, traditionally opens the Guild season in September.

At a latter affair a Thirty-fifth Birthday Cake was cut by charter members, Del Eva and Mildred Upton. Helen Yeagle, minister's wife and chief instigator when the Club was formed, drove from Oxford, Massachusetts, to be present and "sang for her supper".

Bible-Study groups have enjoyed weekly meetings throughout much of the year. Although sponsored by the Hancock Church, all have been welcome, regardless of church affiliation. Stimulating discussions have resulted from diversity of opinion, freely expressed.

The Guild Thrift Shop, headed by Margo Meikle and Sue Burke, with Helen Lee handling the finances, had another profitable year. Money earned over the years has taken care of many a useful project for church and town. Not the least of these is providing yearly scholarships for some of our high school graduates who plan to continue their education.

The Woman's Club, which has been granting similar scholarships for over a decade, raised needed funds in May with a "Penny Sale and Mini-Auction".

Old Home Day didn't exactly dawn "bright and clear". The rain held off, however, until after the twenty-six entree parade, the exhibits, tract and field events, the shuffleboard tournament and the water sports. In mid-afternoon the skies opened, sending librarians and trustees scurrying inside with arm loads of books, remains of the annual lawn sale. The sky divers had to cancel, landing at the Bainton's for supper by more conventional means. The Fire Department's Chicken Barbeque was dampened, and the evening band concert almost drowned.

New enterprises have been initiated by some of our neighbors, and we wish them all good fortune.

The Hancock Toy Shop, a joint venture of Bob and Marilyn Kierstead and Jack and Sue Roper, is in full swing over the old garage at the foot of Norway Hill.

Jeffco, Incorporated, the Jesperson's printed-circuit business, moved from Greenfield to the former Fansteel building on Forest Road, replacing Scorpion Snowmobile.

Margaret Link and Phyllis Shattuck have opened a Yarn Shop in the front park of the Status Thimble rooms in Peterborough. Earlier in the fall another Hancock resident, Irene Moore, gave lessons there in Needlepoint. Incidentally, Mildred Phelps, a Status Thimble originator, is missed in the shop since her retirement.

Ken and Fran Tripp, agents for "Paw Prints" greeting cards, designed by son Wally, have added Christmas cards, note paper and an enchanting calendar to the items in their stock. We're happy that Wally and Marcie, after doing a bit of wandering, have decided to settle in Hancock and are now in their new home.

Several town housewives took advantage of an opportunity to learn more

about serving delicious and nutritious meals by attending a series of cooking demonstrations given by Grace Fay.

Employees of the John O'Donnell Tax Map Consultants have started a survey of all Hancock land.

When Police Chief Bruce Skinner moved to new Headquarters in the Town Office Building, the vacant room was taken over by the church property committee. It now serves as a fine church office. In the old town safe were discovered, among other valuable relics, the complete early records of the Historical Society and a few deeds. The most unique of these Tom Rhines has put under glass, framed and turned over to the Historical Society. Most exciting is the original deed to the town of land for the church, common and burying ground signed by Deacon Hosley.

Lack of space makes it impossible to do justice to the activities which keep Hancock folk occupied, or to the people who do the work. Committees and organizations strive constantly for the betterment of the town and to provide recreational and educational opportunities for young and old. Town committees have their own reports, and they do not have to be included in this one. Some organizations have been mentioned briefly. There are many others, and they are busy all the time.

The John Hancock Grange celebrated its hundredth birthday in 1974. The party which observed this anniversary was attended by State Master Norris Hall and his wife, State Ceres. Earle Otis and Joe Quinn provided part of the entertainment, swapping humorous tales of days gone by.

The Ladies' Sewing Circle, oldest organization in town with the exception of the church, held their annual meeting at Lake Sunapee's Woodbound Cottage.

The Men's Club sponsored a different kind of Christmas party for the children, a carolling hayride which ended at the Town Hall. There the youngsters were served hot chocolate and doughnuts by Mert Knowles and some of the mothers.

At the Sportsman's Club annual banquet, held at the John Hancock Inn, President Warren Owler presented the Carey Johnson award, given each year to the one who has done the most to further the aims of the club, to Dorothy Avery.

Other volunteer groups such as Hospital Aid, World Service, Fireman's Auxiliary, School Volunteer Helpers, Preschool Mothers, Boy Scout, Girl Scout, and 4-H Leaders are working constantly.

A much appreciated service is carried out by the Deaconesses of the Church. They offer, after a funeral or memorial, to serve refreshments either at the home of the bereaved or at the Vestry. There have been many occasions during the past year when these ladies have provided the one bright spot at a sad time.

The announcement by Boston University that they were reopening Sargent

Camp as an environmental education center came as a great relief to area residents. The gala open house was attended by many.

John Davy was appointed a consultant in Teacher Education and Professional Standards by the State Department of Education.

Richard Seeman received the Chancellors Award for academic excellence at the University of Wisconsin.

Cecil Crissey, President of the Monadnock Chapter of A.A.R.P. and Editor of the Golden Times Newsletter, has received commendation for the excellence of this publication.

Earl Otis celebrated his ninety-second birthday!

The contagious enthusiasm of Gloria Neary and several other Guild members has brighten the lives of inmates of the Sumner Nursing home in Greenfield with monthly visits.

Mr. and Mrs. Minot Inman celebrated their Golden Wedding Anniversary.

N.M. Bodecker received the Christopher Award for his delightful children's book, It's Raining Said John Twaining.

Paul Pollaro, new assistant director of the MacDowell Colony, designed and planned the graphics workshop which had its opening in May.

Sally Hamilton was accepted into the Jordan Marsh 45th Annual Exhibition of paintings by contemporary New England artists.

Ann Dillon Michlin was elected vice president of Batholomew and Dillon, Incorporated.

Dick Blood was named "Most Valuable Player" of the Plymouth State College baseball team.

Fifteen of our 4-H girls brought home ribbons for patchwork pillows and carry-all bags.

Ellena, Merrylyn and William Weston took blue ribbons at the Cheshire Fair for their sheep.

Ginnie Gleason and Irma Troesch designed and painted the wall decorations for the Monadnock Hospital's Chrysanthemum "Circus".

Bob Lee underwent successful heart surgery, and is feeling better every day.

Two events occurred of a lighter vein, but they should not be left out. One was the appeal from the pulpit one Sunday morning that the congregation, or those members of it who were spry enough, head for the Mathewson farm after church and help capture an escaped pig. That pig led the pursuers a merry chase. REPORT OF THE CAMP GUILD STUDY COMMITTEE

In conformance with their intention announced at the 1974 Town Meeting, the Selectmen subsequently appointed the Camp Guild Study Committee, which was directed "to make a complete analysis of the property" and to submit to the Selectmen "a report of its findings and recommendations as to the most desirable use of said property."

The property is comprised of approximately 15 acres, all but an acre or so located east of Depot Rd. (that is, between Depot Rd. and Norway Pond). Fourteen buildings are on the land. Their structural condition ranges from good to decrepit.

Summary of the Committee's Activities

During 1974, the Committee met 11 times. Four of these meetings were devoted to on-site inspections of Camp Guild; on two of those occasions, the public was invited to tour the grounds and buildings with the Committee. By sponsoring these tours, Committee members sought to encourage residents to familiarize themselves with the property in preparation for the discussion and vote at the 1975 Town Meeting.

Perhaps the most valuable of the Committee's 11 sessions was the public hearing on Camp Guild, held September 20, 1974. With about 40 residents in attendance, the hearing resulted in a number of constructive suggestions, many of which are included in the Committee's recommendations.

Findings and Recommendations

- 1. The Point should be designated as a miniwilderness or preserve and left undisturbed. Recreational activity in this area should be confined to walks (no camping, no picnic facilities). The Point is the 5.9-acre peninsula located generally to the north and east of the balance of the property.
- 2. The balance of the property, approximately 9.1 acres, should be designated as a family-oriented park. Recreational activity should be consistent with such a designation. For example, the following activities are in keeping with family-oriented use of the land: picnicking, walking, informal (unsupervised) swimming (assuming the Town would not incur liability for swimming-related accidents), fishing, horseshoe pitching, showshowing, skating, tennis, and the like. Inappropriate recreation includes, among other activities, hunting; organized sports, such as baseball and football; and use of snowmobiles, minibikes, trail vehicles, and the like. The emphasis should be on relatively tranquil family-oriented recreation.
 - 3. Land east of Depot Rd. should not be sold.
- 4. All structures on the property should be removed. The removal process should occur in two stages: (1) public auction and (2) demolition of those buildings not sold *and* removed through auction. The Committee believes that retention of the buildings would put the Town more in the real estate

business than out of it. In addition, a soil analysis disclosed that the land is very poor for septic systems.

- 5. Access by any type of vehicle to Norway Pond via Camp Guild should be prohibited; that is, a public landing should not be permitted on the property.
- 6. The Town Beach should not be relocated to Camp Guild. The present location of the beach is regarded as superior in terms of space, potential for expansion, and exposure to the sun.
- 7. The traffic hazard associated with Depot Rd. (adjacent to the Depot building) should be removed as soon as practicable.
- 8. Decisions regarding the future use of the property should be consistent with the objective of keeping Guild-related Town expenditures to a minimum.
- 9. An on-going committee should be established (1) to assure that the property is utilized in conformance with Town guidelines, regulations, and ordinances, (2) to make recommendations to the Selectmen about changes in, or additions to, those guidelines, regulations, and ordinances, (3) to oversee the general development of the property, and (4) to perform any other duties requested by the Selectmen. This committee should be composed of not less than five members, one of whom would represent the Town's Recreation Committee, another the Town's Conservation Commission, and the remaining members the public at large.
