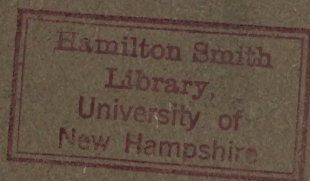

### LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

To the president and trustees of the Frost Free Library, the librarian submits the following report for the year ending Oct. 12, 1927.

The library has been open 104 times, with a total circulation of 6,580 books; 3,787 of which were adult fiction; 2,303 juvenile fiction; 272 adult non-fiction; and 218 juvenile non-fiction. The total circulation of magazines was 3,561.

Seventy-four volumes of popular fiction have been rebound, and one hundred and seventy-two new books have been added during the year. 149 adult and 23 juveniles. Forty-four of the books were purchased from the library fund, of which "Who's Who" for 1927 is worthy of mention.

I wish at this time to express thanks to those who have so generously given to the library during the past year. Eleven books were donated by Mrs. Carrie K. Whitney; 27 by Mr. and Mrs. David P. Woods; 4 by Mrs. Evelyn Morrell; 10 volumes of O'Henry's work by Mrs. Beatrice Cooper-Ellis; 42 volumes by Mr. Kershaw who also gave a number of copies of "Country Life" magazine. One volume was given by Mr. S. Emerson Partridge of Keene, 1 by Mrs. Charles H. Fowle of Williamstown, Mass.; 16 by Mr. Charles Webb and 16 by Mrs. Charles Frost, in addition to the splendid set of "The World's Best Literature," in 45 volumes.

Thirty-two different magazines are to be found on the tables, including the four new ones added this year, namely:—"Children," a "Magazine for Parents," containing splendid instructive articles, "On Rearing Children From Crib to College," "Hygeia," the Health Magazine published by the American Medical Association; "Better Homes and Gardens," a family magazine containing many helpful suggestions, and "Radio News," an up to the minute magazine for those interested in radios.

In March the Dental Clinic was completed, a report in detail will be found under the school report.

National Child Health week was observed May 1st to May 7th.

Sunday, May 1st, all churches made reference to Child Health Week. Thursday, May 5th the second child health conference was held in Engine House Hall. The programme was under the direction of Mrs. Z. S. Hasham, R. N., of the State Board of Health and Eva J. Burke, R. N., local visiting nurse. Thirty-three children were given complete physical examination by Dr. W. F. Taylor of Keene and reports made to families. The conference was honored by the presence of Miss Grace Abbott of Washington, D. C., chief of the Children's Bureau and Miss Eleanor M. Crough, R. N., Director of State Maternity and Infancy Board. A committee from the Woman's Club composed of Mrs. Wm. Whitcomb, Mrs. Ralph Bissell and Mrs. James Stewart served tea and wafers to the mothers and milk and wafers to the children. The transportation committee was Mrs. Geo. R. Vigneault, Mrs. Beatrice Harrison and Mr. Roland Whitney. Those assisting the general committee were Mrs. Florence Proulx, Mrs. Rose Lang, Mrs. Nellie Erickson, Mrs. Mabelle Page, Miss Ruth Hemenway, R. N., and Miss Maybelle Philbrick, R. N.

Saturday, May 7th, free moving pictures were given for the children in the Town Hall, Mr. Chas. Beauregard giving his time operating the machine. The Marlboro Chamber of Commerce donated the picture "Out of the West." Two health pictures were shown "Then and Now" (a toxin anti-toxin for Diphtheria demonstration), and a "Crusade" picture dealing with daily health habits.

The association is indebted to its many friends for their co-operation, especially to the operators of the telephone office,

the firemen for the use of their rooms for the pre-school conference, to the American Legion and Ladies Auxiliary, also the local chapter of Red Cross, and friends who have donated the use of their cars.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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To the School Board and Citizens of Marlboro :

I submit herein my fifth annual report as superintendent of schools. A good school gives not only mental training, physical development, and righteous morals, but also good habits of work and living.

We must continue to place strong emphasis on the word "Work."

To emphasize the fundamental fact that to have our boys and girls able to read comprehensively, to spell correctly, to write legibly and to express their thoughts in clear, pure English is our paramount issue. Indeed, a full and satisfactory knowledge and command of English so as to be able to talk it and write it clearly and well is our aim.

I believe our teachers in elementary and high schools have had this goal in mind during the past year.

If these fundamentals are attained by our pupils, alertness of mind in numbers and cultural growth in geography, history, civics, etc., will usually follow. And the same basal elements are necessary for normal growth and achievement in high school subjects, such as modern or ancient language, science, economics or mathematics.

Statistics generally afford dry reading, but they are often suggestive and illuminating if carefully studied.

Consulting the table of statistics accompanying this report, you will note that your schools maintained a fairly good record in average attendance. The average of all schools taken together exceeded the state average by a small margin. Yet there is chance for improvement. Too many absentees ought to compel every parent to ask himself, "Am I responsible?"

Regularity and punctuality are business virtues, and are essential to a good school.

Some questions of discipline necessarily arose during the past year which demanded careful consideration, prompt and decisive action, but were treated by the teachers in a spirit of sincerity for the child's good. Indeed, when necessary, we believe in a strict and impartial school government, such as a wise, judicious and faithful parent would exercise in the family and which will unfold in every child the best qualities and stimulate in him the highest principles and purposes.

Your schools are created for the pupil, and their aim is to educate the young for fitness in life and its realities, and to do this, thorough discipline must be maintained.

### MARLBORO HIGH SCHOOL

Headmaster Bissell reports the following data:

"The following is a report in brief of the Marlboro Junior-Senior High School. The enrollment in the Junior High School is fifty-six, twenty-seven boys and twenty-nine girls.

"The enrollment in the High School is sixty-four, divided as follows: nine seniors, fourteen juniors, thirteen sophomores, and twenty-eight freshmen.

"This is the largest enrollment in Marlboro High School for several years.

"There are three courses given in High School: the Classical, Commercial and Domestic Arts and Science. The number of pupils in each course is as follows: Classical, fourteen; Commercial, thirty-six; Domestic Arts and Science, fourteen.

### LITERARY ACTIVITIES

"The annual prize speaking contest was held in the Town Hall in May. The following speakers competing: Rosamond Hart, Lucy Nason, Dorothy Harris, Linda Frechette, Cleo Frechette, Clara Beauregard, Marion Lawrence and Larry Arsenaault. The prize winners were as follows: first, Rosamond Hart;



second, Dorothy Harris; third, Linda Frechette.

"The annual high school play was presented Nov. 19, 1927, in the Town Mall. The play, "It Happened in June," was well cast and the audience enjoyed it. The play was under the direction of Miss Anna Larson, assisted by Miss Frances Copp.

### GRADUATION

"The graduation exercises of Marlboro High School were held in the Marlboro Town Hall on the evening of June 19. The names of the graduates were as follows: Lorea Arsenault, Merton Buckminster, Dorothy Bassett, Madolyn Clark, Linda Frechette, Dorothy Harris, Charles Ingalls and Alfred Lambert.

"Four of the class entered higher institutions of learning."

### ATHLETICS

To develop in the gymnasium, play field and debating society the power to use hand, brain and body, nimbly and effectively, and to co-operate freely and willingly with his fellows is a wholesome attribute in the development of our boys and girls.

Our teams in baseball and basketball during the last year have won no cups, but they have held honorable positions in the Monadnock League. These games developed leadership, co-operation and a sense of fair play. They demand courage and self control. They increase the loyalty and school spirit.

We wish to thank the citizens for their encouraging patronage and trust that they may realize that the future success of our teams in athletics will largely depend on the moral and financial support given them.

### ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

Promotions in elementary schools were based on results of following standard tests: Ayres's scale in writing and spelling, Stanford's achievement test and Cross arithmetic tests. These

were supplemented by frequent tests given by the teacher and a generous consideration of the pupils, individual daily work throughout the year.

The following numbers of pupils were promoted to the next grade in the respective schools:

At time of writing, the schools give promise of a successful year.

In conclusion, permit me to express my sincere appreciation of the loyal and friendly co-operation of teachers, and of the unfailing support and encouragement of the School Board and citizens.

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#### TO THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

The outstanding features for the Health project during the school year were the annual physical examination by Dr. L. G. Hildreth, the dental clinic by Dr. G. A. Danforth and the

clinic for children under average weight by Dr. R. B. Kerr.

All pupils enrolled were examined by Dr. L. G. Hildreth and reports sent to their parents. As a result four pupils were taken to the Elliot Community Hospital August 1st and had tonsils and adenoids removed. Other pupils have been taken by their parents for corrective work.

During the time Dr. G. A. Danforth conducted dental clinics, 150 pupils had complete dental work done including extractions, fillings and cleaning. Four pre-school children were given dental care, also 60 adults. Some of the adults having plate work done. The dental equipment at the school efficiently enabling Dr. Danforth to care for 214 patients. Mrs. Kelley very generously loaned an oil stove to use for sterilizing instruments. As a result of dental work there was a noticeable gain physically with many pupils when Dr. Hildreth made his examination.

Feb. 25. A clinic for pupils under average weight was held at the schoolhouse from 9 a. m.-4.30 p. m. by Dr. R. B. Kerr, Manchester, N. H., state chest specialist. He was assisted by Miss Mildred Gage, R. N., County T. B. nurse, Miss Elmira Hemenway and Eva J. Burke, R. N. Pupils examined 84. Of these 34 were pupils examined for the first time and 50 were pupils for re-examination.

Among the new patients 31 were found non-tubercular, and 3 suspicious. There were 36 of the old patients who showed improvement, one was reclassified as positive, 12 were unimproved and one an arrested case.

During the school year surgical dressings were done for pupils as a result of minor accidents.

Examination for pediculosis was ordered by the School Physician, Dr. L. G. Hildreth.

## REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

To the School Board and Citizens of Marlboro :

It is with keen interest for the development of music in the Marlboro Schools that I submit this report.

Co-operation between teacher and music supervisor is essential, and experiencing this in all lines of my labor, I can give the citizens of this town a report of the work already completed and an outline of the work to be accomplished before the school year closes.

In our attempt to teach music we do it for the joy, the happiness, the satisfaction which many gain from it, not to produce professional musicians for very few attain such heights.

According to our grades we follow no absolutely set course for circumstances alter cases, but an outline similar to this we use as our guide.

For Grades I, II, III, we teach as follows :

Major scale as a rote song.

Memorize first eight tones.

Staff reading.

Pitch names.

Finding "do" from signature.

Motions 1, 2, 3.

Also as many beautiful and rhythmic rote songs as the children can accomplish.

For Grades IV, V, VI, we teach :

Key names.

The chromatics.

Two part singing.

Position of signature, sharps and flats.

Use of chromatic characters in writing.

Beginning of three-part singing.

Arithmetic of music.

Common time.

Motions IV, V, VI, VII.

Compound time.

According to work and time, the pupils have accomplished this outline, and will finish the required plan as the year closes.

Again I wish to take this opportunity to acknowledge the cordial co-operation of the Grade Teachers and members of the High School Faculty and to express my gratitude to the school board for all they have done to better school music.
