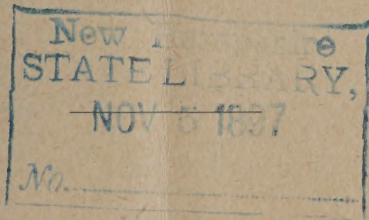

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newton qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at 9.30 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

1. To choose Town Clerk, three Selectmen, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Auditors, Road Commissioners, Commissioners of Public Library, Fish and Game Warden, Constables, Sealer of Weights and Measures, Surveyors of Wood, Bark and Lumber, Health Officers, Fence Viewers, and all other necessary town Officers and Agents for the ensuing year.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools, for paying the town debts and defraying the interest thereon, for the support and maintenance of the Public Library, and for other necessary charges arising in said town.

3. To see if the town will appropriate \$25 for "Memorial Day" purposes.

4. To hear the reports of the Town Treasurer and Board of Selectmen to the Town Auditors, the reports of the Auditors, Agents, Committees, or other officers heretofore chosen or appointed, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

5. To see if the town will vote to build a receiving tomb, and if so voted to appropriate money for the same.

6. To see if the town will vote to improve the old Town Burying Ground, and if so voted to appropriate money for the same as per petition of Edward Hayford and 15 other legal voters.

To transact all other business which may legally come before said meeting.

Report of the School Board.

In accordance with the statutes of the state, the School Board herewith presents its report for the year ending February 16, 1895.

The past year has been one, we think, characterized by harmony and progress. The teachers generally have been conscientious and faithful in their work, and a fair degree of application to study has been manifested on the part of the pupils in the several schools.

The school on Pond street, under the instruction of Miss Almira M. Day, has been pleasant and orderly throughout the year, and good work has been done. If the scholars in this school would be more self reliant and energetic much greater progress would be realized in their studies.

The school at Rowe's Corner, so long under the instruction of Miss Elvira Smith, has maintained about its usual course during the year. A special reference, perhaps, should be made to the improvement in the reading classes, which has been very noticeable.

Miss Anna L. George taught at the Junction, and though laboring under some discouragements, yet by her painstaking efforts and diligent service, commended herself to your committee as well deserving the success she has attained.

The Village Primary continued in charge of Miss Minnie E. Bemis, who pursued her former faithful efforts and approved methods to the gratification of all.

Miss Iva A. Woodward was secured to teach the High school at the beginning of the year, and continued in charge until its close. The school has been eminently satisfactory to the Board, and to the public generally. Perfect order and studiousness have characterized the sessions of this school and, consequently, it has advanced to a higher degree of proficiency and a more hopeful promise for the future. The fact has been demonstrated that Newton can have a High school that will compare favorably with that of any other town of like grade.

The greatest obstacle that now stands in the way of its ultimate success is the lack of a suitable school-room with modern conveniences for doing the best work. By the erection of another school-building, having two rooms, a comparatively good graded system can be established, affording much better school privileges than is possible with the present accommodations.

Any money judiciously expended for the education of the children confers a benefit upon them that is inestimable. Good schools, affording, as they do, moral and intellectual instruction, are certainly the "bulwark of our liberties."

We most heartily commend this matter to the legal voters of the town and ask them to provide for the schools as their best interests demand.
