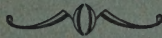

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pembroke in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in the Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Community House in said Pembroke, on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of beano in this town.
3. To hear and act upon the report of the Town Ways and Means committee.
4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
5. To see if the Town will vote to charge twenty (.20) cents on and after September 1, 1950, on all unpaid 1950 Poll Taxes.
6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to sell any real estate which the Town may have acquired by deed as a result of non-payment of taxes; and to authorize the Selectmen to give a deed in the name of the Town to the purchaser of such land.

7. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following named funds, in trust, the income to be used for the perpetual care of the cemetery lots indicated:

- (a) Hattie Baker Fund of One Hundred Fifty (\$150.00) Dollars, the income thereof to be used for the care of the Charles Baker Lot.
- (b) Frederick B. Eaton Fund of Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, the income thereof to be used for the care of the Frederick B. Eaton Lot in the Pembroke Street Cemetery.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Fourteen Dollars and Fifty-Nine Cents (\$614.59) for the maintenance, construction or reconstruction of Class V highways, thereby receiving State aid for said highways.

9. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to accept a deed, from Victor R. Girard Company, Inc., to a strip of land Forty (40) Feet in width and approximately Five Hundred (500) feet in length, said land being an extension of Elm Street as surveyed and laid out on a plan of Pembroke Hill Development, and to use and maintain said land as a Town street; and to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars to grade and gravel the same, as houses are built thereon.

10. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred (\$600.00) Dollars for the construction of a sewer from the end of the present sewer on Elm Street northerly along said street for a distance of Six Hundred (600) Feet.

11. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars for a series of Band Concerts.

12. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to accept a proposed street, to be known as Fairview Avenue, now laid out Forty (40) Feet in width and Four Hundred (400) Feet in length, leading westerly from Broadway and located between the residence of Gendron on the North and Carr on the South.

13. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to accept a deed from J. Herbert Good to a strip of land known as Grand View Road in said Pembroke, as now laid out, the same being Forty (40) feet in width, beginning on the Pembroke Hill Road, so called, and running in a general northerly direction approximately Six Hundred (600) feet. This land to be used and maintained as a street. Said Good to remove the top soil and the Town to grade and gravel the same as houses are built thereon.

14. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars to be set aside as an accumulative Library Fund for building purposes.

15. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Hundred (\$1,200.00) Dollars to build a sidewalk from North Main Street to Glass Street on Chester Turnpike, said sidewalk to be built on the west side of said street.

16. To hear the reports of auditors, agents and committees or officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The polls will be open until six o'clock in the afternoon.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN REPORT OF PEMBROKE FIRE DEPARTMENT

Forest Fires — Our Most Shameful Waste

Everyone apparently fears fire but too many are careless with it. This is particularly true of fires in and near woodlands. Official figures show that more than 98 per cent of all forest fires result from human carelessness and can be prevented. Consequently, we may say "Forest fires are our most shameful waste."

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects far reaching. Such fires destroy the raw products of the forests, the protection forests provide for game and the supply of ground water. They upset local economies by drawing men from gainful employment and requiring the expenditures of public funds to extinguish them.

Our forest fire organization is doing a good job in keeping the size of fires small but the number of fires is increasing. In 1949 there were 100 more fires in New Hampshire than in 1948, but they burned 500 acres less. For the warden and his deputies to do the job they are capable of, they must have the cooperation of the public — YOU!

The primary objective of all fire fighters is PREVENTION — fire stoppage. This is the goal toward which your local forest fire warden and his deputies are constantly working. It can be achieved ONLY if YOU and YOU and YOU cooperate with them. It is worth YOUR effort and can be accomplished by:

1. Being careful with fire in or near woodland, being particularly careful with matches and cigarettes.
2. Securing the required written permit from the warden when the ground is not covered with snow.

3. Insisting that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
4. Calling the warden promptly when fire is detected and aiding him to extinguish it.

Let's reduce the number of forest fires and eliminate our most shameful waste.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Pembroke:

It is with considerable pride that I present to you my third annual report of the Schools of Pembroke. With this report I wish to express my appreciation and thanks for the wholehearted support given by the members of the board as well as all organizations and individuals who have had a part in the education of the youth of the town.

The teaching staff was reduced by two members because it was necessary to send grades seven and eight to Pembroke Academy in September. Therefore, the persons who have had the fortunes of your children under supervision at the grammar school are:

Probably the greatest force in the town of Pembroke during the past year and for the next ten years, is increased enrollment—the increased number of pupils who are and will continue to enter the schools of the town for the next decade. This is a positive fact and the taxpayer of the town and every town must face it directly without any reservation both physically and financially.

This force has been very vivid during this year. You will recall that grades seven and eight were housed at Pembroke Academy because of the overcrowded condition at the grammar school. There were 232 children registered at the school for the entire school year 1948-1949. This number included grades one to eight. So far this year, 1949-1950, there have been registered in grades one to six, 207 pupils with 51 more at the Academy in grades seven and eight. To state it another way, there are but 25 pupils less in grades one to six than a year ago for eight grades. This picture does not show any decrease in the number of children for the next five to eight years. And this increase is not peculiar to grades one to eight alone. If you study the data showing the probable growth of the Academy, you will find very positively that within the next ten years Pembroke Academy must find housing space for 260 and more even if grades seven and eight are refused admittance. If, however, the town should make no provision for the increase of the school children at the grammar school, the Academy must make arrangements to house about 400 pupils and the town must pay the tuition.

It seems obvious, therefore, that within the next year the citizens of the town of Pembroke must decide just what the pattern is to be in regard to the education of its children. Whatever the decision, plans must be made to either enlarge the grammar school building or the academy building.

Attached to and included in this report is a survey with a prediction of the growth of both the grammar school and the academy. The material from which this study was made was compiled from data published by the United States Government, the National Education Association, the State Department of Education, and the census of this town and the other towns upon which the schools of Pembroke draw for pupils. My only request is for the citizens to spend a short time studying these figures because whether

you want to face this fact or not, these figures will tell the story.

Just to focus your attention, I should like to present a few of the facts which are directly dependent upon this problem of increased enrollment.

Because of the will of the 1949 New Hampshire Legislature, the Town of Pembroke lost about \$13,600.00 in State Aid to education. Since these funds had to be replaced, the tax rate was increased and it will be impossible to reduce the budget for 1950-51 to get any relief unless the legislature restores this aid.

With this increase in the school population such items as books, supplies, new equipment, repairs and replacements must be increased also if each child is to be adequately supplied with materials.

Directly proportional to the number of children is the problem of tuition. In many communities the high school is under the direct control of the School Board which eliminates the tuition. In Pembroke, however, the high school or academy is an independent unit and in order to survive must charge a tuition rate until such time when it will either become insolvent like many of the old academies in the state or be absorbed by the town district. We must not forget, however, that whichever the solution the town must eventually pay the bill. The budget for 1950-1951 for this item alone calls for \$27,600.00, more than the entire school budget in 1944. During the past year housing conditions were such that the tuition was increased to take care of grades seven and eight at the academy. Then, too, there have been more children attending the academy from the town than ever before. Add to this number of children the ever increasing tuition rate from about \$123.74 in 1947-48 to \$181.02 in 1949-50, and it can be readily understood why the school budget has increased.

If we add to the above items the increase in transportation which will have to be revamped to meet existing route changes because of population fluctuations; the repairs and improvements that must be made each year for the maintenance of the school plant; the increase in the per capita tax, retirement, and health supervision caused by increased enrollment, it is very clear that school costs cannot be reduced for the next few years at least.

It has been my purpose to show the taxpayers of the town of Pembroke as briefly as possible the important changes made in the school budget for 1950-51 in order that they may in some degree understand the problems which have faced and will continue to face the School Board during the next 5 to 10 years. For their enlightenment also, it should be stated here that State Aid to education did not handicap the children of the town, but it did place the burden upon the taxpayer and especially upon the real estate owner.

It seems to me that some relief must be forthcoming in this direction if education is to survive either through increased state aid or in some other manner because the time has arrived for the building of additions and making improvements which are necessary to house the children of Pembroke. These are your children, your responsibilities, and your problems and the solution can be reached only by the people of the town.

Again, please accept my thanks for your interest, cooperation, and loyalty to the children, the teachers, and those persons who have been associated in any way with the educational growth of the community.

Teaching Staff and Enrollment

School opened at Pembroke Academy on Wednesday, September 7, 1949, with eight regular and two part time teachers and 163 pupils. One new pupil has entered since to make the total 164. In addition to these pupils, we are also housing the seventh and eighth grades with 22 and 29 pupils respectively. This makes a grand total of 215 pupils for the present school year.

Activities and responsibilities are divided among the teachers according to their teaching load and individual training. Mr. Gerald Crotty is a graduate of Springfield College, and is well equipped to supervise and train young people in health and physical education. For the first time in many years boys and girls are getting training in posture, in health, in rhythmic, and formal and informal gymnastics. Interest has been keen in square dancing and with the aid of the local Parent Teacher Association a series of these dances has been planned with Mr. Wayne Rich of Concord as supervisor. A gym night is being planned for some date in late March or early April.

Pembroke Academy is a member of the New Hampshire Central Interscholastic League this year again. Mr. Crotty is coaching the boys' basketball teams with the aid of Mr. Currier. Recently he and his basketball boys were given a real thrill when they attended a double-header basketball game at Boston Garden upon the invitation of Mr. Laurence Whittemore.

Cross-Country

The boys of the Academy were again interested in Cross-Country this year, and were in charge of Mr. Burkhart. After a season of keen competition, during which each individual member trained faithfully and worked hard, results began to show up. First, the team won the league championship at Concord, and later journeyed to Durham where they won the class B State Championship title. As a result of this showing, several of the town citizens contributed about \$200 and sent the Cross-Country team to the New England meet at Wesleyan University, Middletown, Connecticut. Although the boys did not win any prize at the meet in Middletown, they gained valuable experience.

Prize Speaking

Mrs. Elizabeth Morrill is again training pupils in prize speaking. This fall, the Austin Memory Contest was held on Thursday, December 15 and the winners were: Judith Swallow, first; Peter Murphy, second; Nancy Morse, third and Richard Hammond, fourth. Worthy of comment is the fact that all four of these pupils participated in the State contest at the University of New Hampshire and all four were in the finals.

Debating

Pembroke Academy is entered again, this year, in the Bates Debating League. Miss Mabel Hayes is the instructor in speech and debating. The time has come when we need, very much, a tape recording machine to intensify training in speech and to help pupils correct their speech defects.

Miscellaneous

The Noon Lunch Program at the Academy has grown yearly, so that this year it requires a cook and an assistant in addition to the help of several pupils, both in preparing the meals and in cleaning up afterwards. Meals are served in the gym to about 80 pupils each day. Mrs. John Farnum is the cook this year and Mrs. Everett Mozier has been helping since Christmas.

Music

Mrs. Mabel Reed is again in charge of music this year. She has been working with the Girls' Glee Club, the General Chorus (for graduation) and with Freshman and Seventh and Eighth Grade groups. The school pupils under her direction are planning an Operetta for the middle of May.

D. A. R. Best Citizen

Under the sponsorship of the local Buntin Chapter of

the D.A.R., Barbara Mosher, Epsom, N. H., was chosen by Seniors and Faculty as "Best Citizen" of the senior class.

Conclusion

The interest and spirit has been good. To date, only six pupils have left school, and three of these are continuing their studies in other schools in the state. The average attendance at the academy has been 152.99, while the average age membership has been 159.91 and the per cent of attendance 95.67.

In closing, I want to thank teachers, parents and friends who have helped in the various problems which have arisen. Special thanks go to Supt. Watson and the members of the Board of Trustees for their understanding and cooperation.
