You are hereby notified to meet at The Town House in said Pittsfield on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

ARTICLE 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

**Appropriations Submitted Without Recommendation of Budget Committee.*

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$849.82 to reimburse the Pittsfield Congregational Church for expenses incurred in the repair of the Town Clock.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$22.00 to install a street light on Joy Street half way between the existing lights at the corner of Blake Street and at the Pittsfield Shoe Company.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,320.00 to raise the pay of regular firemen to \$100 and the Firewards to \$125.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$84.00 to pay the light bill for the Town Clock.

ARTICLE 7. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the purpose of Band Concerts for the summer season of 1952.

ARTICLE 8. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to instruct its Selectmen to publish annually in the Annual Report a detailed statement of receipts and expenditures of the Town the type as was last reported in the Annual Report of the Town for the year ended December 31, 1945.

ARTICLE 9. (By Petition) To have the sidewalk on Carroll Street, approximately 500 feet, repaired and resurfaced from the cement walk at the bridge over the Suncook River, by the park to the walk at Pelissier's Garage, said walk having been built thirty years ago and not repaired since.

ARTICLE 10. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000 for the construction of a hard surfaced road to the Upper City, so called, beginning where the present tarvia road leaves off, between the residences of Lawrence Perrino and Maurice True, to the tarvia road at the foot of Jenness Hill.

ARTICLE 11. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to provide a suitable black-top covering this year to the remaining mile and a fraction of unfinished main highway between our Village and that of Deerfield, passing the Friends' Meeting House and the School House in South Pittsfield.

ARTICLE 12. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to set aside sufficient funds in its budget for the year 1952, for the reconstruction of Joy Street; said reconstruction to consist of widening and resurfacing and also provisions for additional off the street parking in the vacant lot adjacent to the present Pittsfield Shoe Company parking lot.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of 1952 taxes the same to be paid from that years levy.

ARTICLE 13, To see if the Town will vote to accept the following trust funds:

1. Florence F. Merrill Admx.
Care of the Addie M. Kearns Lot, Floral Park Cemetery \$200.00
2. George D. Emerson Estate
Care of the George D. Emerson Lot, Floral Park Cemetery 200.00

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to permit playing games of Beano in Pittsfield in accordance with Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,400 to have a bulldozer blade installed on the Town Tractor.

ARTICLE 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

BUDGET COMMITTEE'S REPORT

To the Legal Voters of the Town of Pittsfield:

Members of the Budget Committee, in common with property owners generally, are keenly aware of the heavy burden of taxation to meet local requirements. Consequently, the committee again has made a thorough study of both the income possibilities and estimates under the heading of necessary expenditures for the town.

The Budget Committee's responsibility is to recommend to the voters at the Town Meeting expenditures for the wise maintenance and development of the town's property and facilities, keeping in mind a long-range perspective, and also, to assure an economical use of the town's funds and other assets.

Public Hearing of the Budget Committee was held at the Town Hall on January 24, 1952 agreeable to notice in the Valley Times.

Your Budget Committee, accordingly, submits and recommends the following report and Budget items for the Town of Pittsfield for the year 1952 to be acted upon at the Town Meeting, March 11th, 1952.

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A comparison of the above items with the estimates and actual costs for 1951 will reveal that the higher tax rate anticipated for 1952 will result chiefly from the increased costs of (1) highway maintenance and construction, and (2) public schools.

TOWN CLOCK

The Budget Committee received a request for consideration for aid from the town in meeting a bill of \$849.82 for repairs to the Town Clock. The Budget Committee submits this without recommendation.

TOWN ROADS

The Budget Committee recommends that \$10,000.00 be spent on summer maintenance, an increase of \$4,600.00 over last year. This will allow placing gravel on our rural roads. The Committee also recommends \$4,000.00 to be spent on new construction. This is in addition to the funds made available under Town Road Aid.

The Budget Committee received from citizens of Upper City area a petition for new road construction from top of Molly White Hill to foot of Jenness Hill, with a request for \$4,000.00. After due consideration the committee feels that this item should be submitted without recommendation. It is felt that the \$4,000.00 already recommended for new construction is an adequate project under the 1952 budget.

Another petition signed by certain citizens of the South Pittsfield area requested new road construction from the present black road to the Epsom line, this road to be black top. The committee feels that in this case also, the \$4,000.00 recommended for new construction is sufficient under the present budget.

A petition was received requesting that Joy Street be repaired and an off-street parking lot be constructed on the vacant lot adjacent to the present parking area at Pittsfield Shoe Company. The committee understands that Joy street will be repaired after the present water main construction is completed.

SIDEWALKS

The Budget Committee recommends that \$500.00 be spent on new sidewalk construction.

A petition was received requesting that a new sidewalk be installed from the corner at Pelissier's Garage to the Barnstead Bridge. Since this petition did not carry a request for funds, no action was necessary by the Budget Committee.

BULLDOZER BLADE FOR TOWN TRACTOR

The Selectmen's Budget requested \$1,000.00 for a bulldozer blade to be installed on the town tractor. The Budget Committee submits this item without recommendation.

BAND CONCERTS

A petition was received from certain citizens requesting an appropriation of \$500.00 for band concerts. The Budget Committee submits this item without recommendation.

SCHOOLS

The higher budget for schools is due to the increased costs of: (1) instruction due to addition of two elementary teachers, (2) maintenance due to enlarged plant and higher costs, (3) completion of the building program.

The budget contains an item of \$2,984.80 as a deficiency appropriation. Of this amount \$2,534.59 is for last years withholding tax withdrawn from this years budget. This practice has been followed for a number of years, and this appropriation would make it unnecessary in the future. The Budget Committee submits this item without recommendation.

To meet the cost of elementary and high school education for the School District, the Budget Committee recommends an appropriation of \$126,285.93.

FIRE AND POLICE SIGNAL SYSTEM

Report For 1951

Both systems have operated without failure, and there has been but slight expenditure due to damage of equipment caused by storms or otherwise.

A total of twenty-one box alarms has been transmitted over the fire alarm system. Of these, six were for causes other than fire. The remainder were for one, slight building fire; forest and grass fires; several chimney fires, and one flooded oil burner. The damage in these latter fires was slight. Two of the alarms were for aid to other towns.

Due to lack of funds, no new fire alarm boxes have been added. For the proper protection of property, there should be three additional boxes; located at the lower end of Blake street; the lower end of Chestnut street, and on Catamount street at Tilton Hill Road.

The storage batteries in the system will undoubtedly require replacement in 1953, as they have about outlived their reliability. And an appropriation for that purpose will be necessary in 1953.

We are fortunate in having a manually operated telephone exchange. As our operators take, and transmit, telephoned fire calls. They all have our thanks for the efficient manner in which they have done this work. Also the police calls.

But I will call to your attention the fact that in the not too distant future we will have a dial telephone exchange. And no operators. Then provision must be made for a prompt and efficient arrangement to handle all these calls, which will necessitate an increased expenditure for the Fire and Police Departments.

I desire to express my appreciation to the local staff of the Public Service company for the very necessary assistance given in maintaining and repairing the over head wires. As the Town has no facilities for doing this work, it is very fortunate that it can so receive assistance when needed.

REPORT OF THE TOWN FORESTRY COMMITTEE

For the Year 1951

The Town of Pittsfield owns five separate tracts of forest land containing in all approximately 110 acres, these are to wit: the Dr. F. H. Sargent tract; the Dustin Barker tract; the Pest House tract; the F. P. Green tract; and the Lane- Hartwell tract. On the first four mentioned tracts there have been set 43,700 pine transplants. There is at this time a worth while stand of fast growing pine on these lots, that a vast improvement is apparent where the trees have been pruned; and further that Blister Rust is taking a heavy toll of our pines on the Dustin-Barker lot. (Please do not say that this is not so until you go look).

Tract number five, the Lane-Hartwell lot, of fifty acres is well covered with a good growth of Pine, Spruce, Hemlock and Hard Wood, while this is a growing lot, there is a lot of good sized growth.

The only money appropriated in 1951 for the forestry program, however was the \$400.00 Blister Rust Control Appropriation, this amount was combined with the State fund and used for that purpose.

Recommendations

The trees on the first four mentioned lots should be pruned for the reason: First, to promote faster growth; Second, to improve the quality of the lumber to be cut in the future years; Third, if the lower branches were removed it would stop a lot of inoculation by the spore from the currant and gooseberry bushes, that causes Blister Rust. (We ask you. This being the fact, is it not worth while to prune our pines?)

Lot number five: The bounds should be established, and lot looked over and a price placed on it.

Your committee has been over this lot, but did not know just where the bounds were.

REPORT OF THE TOWN TREE WARDEN

The sum of seven hundred and fifty dollars was allocated at town meeting to protect and improve Pittsfield's parks and shade trees. The care of these trees was entrusted to your tree warden. While pursuing this work council has been taken with the State Forester and the board of Selectmen and suggestions that were in best interest of the Town have been acted upon as far as funds would allow.

All of the trees within the village limits including those within confines of the parks, school yards and cemeteries, have been sprayed once and elm trees have been sprayed the second time.

There have been seven old trees removed on account of decay, there have been six maple trees set out, there has been a number of trees repaired that were damaged, and some dead wood removed from some of the elm trees, the young trees have been fertilized, painted and cared for, there have been 367 maple trees set since 1925. Two of the five Spruce trees set in the Park are living and looking good.

Recommendations

Every one knows it is impossible to destroy all of the insects in any one year, although there were a lot destroyed as is evident by a comparison of Pittsfield's trees with trees in towns not sprayed. The undersigned believes that if we want to save our trees they should be sprayed in 1952. The elm should be sprayed before they leaf in the spring, and all trees about the middle of May, and the elm again about the first of August, there should be some old trees removed, there should be some young trees set out, and a lot of dead wood removed, and a number of trees should be braced if we want to save our trees.

Our trees are honorable Citizens let us respect them as such.

DUTCH ELM DISEASE IS COMING CLOSER, are we going to try to save our elm, or are we going to spend a lot of money in removing dead trees?

When we plant and care for trees let us trust that we are planting ourselves to be remembered, for the benefit of our town.

REPORT OF POLICE DEPARTMENT

For Year 1951

During the year 1951 there has been a wide variety of activity requiring action by your Police Department. With assistance from the State Police and the office of the county solicitor, in some cases, nearly all complaints have been successfully solved. Court action resulted in those cases where the necessity was

indicated. The criminal investigation department of the State Police has been most helpful during the year. Their interpretation of evidence uncovered by local officers has helped materially in the solution of numerous cases.

Motor vehicle and parking violations continue to top the list of offenses. During the year several intoxicated drivers have been apprehended and brought into court. Driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor, or excessive speed, particularly on busy streets or in congested areas, show a complete disregard for the safety and rights of other people as well as the driver's own life. This department intends, within the limits imposed by the hours of active patrolling, to reduce the number of these violations to a minimum. Your cooperation in this respect and in the problem of parking vehicles on the town streets will be greatly appreciated.

During the past year all public functions requiring the presence of a police officer have been attended. It was necessary to employ special police during such activities as the summer and winter carnivals and upon a few other occasions.

One or two persons have complained that they had to hunt all over town to find a police officer. All officers of the department have telephones and the telephone operator can usually locate an officer very quickly. If you need an officer for any reason call the operator.

(b) Report of the Superintendent

Five new teachers are employed in your schools this year. Mrs. Sybil Pease, a graduate of Framingham Teachers College, with fourteen years of teaching, has a third grade in the Memorial School and replaces Mrs. Peterson, who left to go with her husband to Pennsylvania. Miss Pearl McCoy, a graduate of the University of Chicago, with teaching experience in Massachusetts, Maine, Illinois, Canada and Pennsylvania has the second grade, formerly taught by Mrs. Perkins. Mr. Everett Keyes, a graduate of Boston University, with one years experience, replaces Mr. Lloyd Sprague, who has accepted a principalship in Massachusetts. Mr. Leonard Littlefield, a graduate of Keene Teachers College, with two years experience in Milton, N. H., has assumed the duties of Mr. Peterson as shop teacher. Mr. Paul Chasse, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, with graduate work at Laval University in Quebec, Canada has replaced Miss Kuzmich, a high school teacher who has returned to teach in the schools in her home town in New Jersey.

Mr. Carlsen, in addition to his duties in the high school, goes to the Memorial School one half day each week this year to assist the teachers in their Physical Education program.

Since 1947, your school boards have been endeavoring to build additional classrooms but each year the costs have gone higher. Realizing that additional classrooms were a necessity by September, 1952, your board, in May of last year, directed the architect, Mr. Hersey, to suggest just what he felt could be built for the money available. After several conferences between the architect, building committee (Mrs. Mary Osgood, Courtland Paige, Thomas McKoan, William B. Ely, John Perkins, Jr.) representatives of the Budget Committee (Paul Brewster, Kenneth Danis, D. MacDonald) and parents, (Mrs. Fred Avery, Mrs. Kurt Bleckmann, Mrs. James D. Adams) the board decided to try to build four classrooms and a separate shop building.

Bids for these projects were received in August. L. E. Martel and Son of Manchester submitted the lowest bid of \$85,287.68. Included in the construction were four elementary classrooms, toilets, and a teachers room on the north side of the present high school building, and the shell of a two story shop building across the drive from the present building on the south side. Since the \$80,000 has been in savings banks for more than four years, the fund has grown to over \$85,000 and was, therefore, adequate to cover this construction. Because of a technical question not covered by law, the right to spend the accrued interest was placed before the voters in September. Because of another technically, you will be asked to approve this again at the coming school meeting.

An amount of \$3,033.60 is being requested to complete the interior of the shop building and the \$2,508.00 appropriated out of state aid for desks and chairs for the four classrooms has been spent. This furniture has been delivered and is stored in the high school.

Since the signing of the building contract was delayed until after the special school district meeting in September, the steel which had been reserved for the building could not be obtained without federal approval. This entailed considerable correspondence and caused some delay. The first release allotted the steel over a nine months period with the major portion coming in July. Realizing that this would prevent the completion of the building by September, a further appeal was made to Washington and only a few weeks ago authority was received to purchase all of the steel by April first. We are happy to report that the first carload has been delivered. We trust that the building will be ready for September occupancy.

The heating engineer brought in by the architect, examined the present furnace and recommended that it be converted to oil in order to heat the additional four classrooms. The School Board plans to do this at a cost of \$2,200.00, the money to be paid over a period of three years. The coal bin will be used for much needed storage space and will provide an area as well in which the custodian can repair furniture and other equipment.

With the completion of the shop building, the lunchroom facilities, now in the Home Economics room and the room across the hall, will be moved to the present shop. This will make available the fifth classroom for the elementary grades and will relieve the crowded condition in the Home Economics room. The increased seating space in the new lunchroom will be adequate for both the high school and the five elementary classes. When the lunchroom is not being used for feeding, it will be available to the high school for classes or study hall.

While no major repairs were made to any of the buildings this past summer, they were thoroughly cleaned and all permanent floors properly looked after. Since school opened, two leaks in the water pipes at the Grammar School have been repaired, and the air pump on the heating system in the Memorial School came in for some attention when it failed to function.

Mr. Ames and Mr. Tuttle are to be commended on the fine job they do in maintaining the buildings. They take care of many minor repairs themselves and, last summer, when the heavy rains and lack of help caused a real maintenance problem at Drake Field, they both transferred their activities there for several days until the field was once more in satisfactory condition.

The hot lunch program in the high school, under the direction of Mrs. Swanson and the one in the Grammar School, operated by Mrs. Emma Laro, are serving more children this year than last year. If you have children eating at either of these programs, you know what a splendid job these ladies are doing. The high school program purchased a deep freeze with money they had accumulated and the Grammar School bought a baking oven and more dishes with their limited funds at the end of last year.

The standardized achievement testing program in grades 1 through 8 was conducted again this last year. Some national tests were also used in the high school. Parents are urged to come to school and see the results of these tests after they are given each May.

PART V. AUXILIARY ACTIVITIES AND SPECIAL REPORTS

(a) Report of the Principal

Both students and faculty enjoyed a good year during 1951. It was a year during which the students learned, worked and engaged in the numerous activities of the school. In an atmosphere of mutual respect and friendliness, staff members continually gave help and guidance to students in an attempt to solve their problems. Students returning to school in September were helped in choosing not only their years program, but a program of studies for their remaining time in school.

On the evening of June 13, twenty-eight members of the Class of 1951 were graduated. The graduation program featured a choric-ode written by Miss Dalton and Miss Kuzmich.

Also in June was held what is probably the biggest social event the school has ever had; namely, the Alumni Reunion. The attendance and enthusiasm displayed far exceeded the expectations of the committees. Every class from 1899 was represented. Also members of the class of '95 and '96 were present. It was indeed a thrilling sight to see nearly 400 alumni seated at banquet tables in the auditorium, enjoying the excellent meal prepared and served by the homemaking department.

In order to give students practice in our democratic form of government, general elections were held in the fall. These were sponsored jointly by the Social Science Department and the Student Council. Elections were complete with two party political rallies, nomination of candidates, the use of check lists, and the use of Australian ballots, etc.

The school was fortunate in having a low turnover in its teaching staff. This was in pleasant contrast to the 50% turnover of 1950. It cannot be too strongly stated that a high rate of teacher replacement very adversely affects the progress and efficiency of the school.

The staff joins the Principal in expressing appreciation to the people of the town for the friendliness and the many enjoyable experiences we have had during the past year. It has been a pleasure to serve your young people and to live as citizens in the community.

Through the cooperation of the State Board of Education and the State Board of Health, and especially Dr. Shirley Dwyer, head of the dental section, we were able to have cleanings and Sodium Fluoride treatments given to 232 children. This was followed with a dental clinic by Dr. Thurston Carpenter, who treated 163 children. Twenty-four children had their dental work completed. This dental work was sponsored by the state and local organizations and was of great benefit to the children. We hope to continue with it as it is very much needed.

The health examinations in some of the grades were done

by the local doctors and several important defects were found and reported to parents.

The State Board of Health Nurse, assisted by our local doctors and Dr. Robert Lake, child specialist from Concord, held the annual immunization clinics and examinations. The triple vaccine was given to sixty-one pre-school children.

Seven children have been taken to the Mental Hygiene Clinic this year.

We have used the Massachusetts eye test this year, and hope it will be helpful in finding defects.

The hot lunches at school are a great help to the children and the Women of Rotary have taken care of one child's hot lunches during the year. We do appreciate the help given to us through the Red Cross, Rotary, Women of Rotary, Salvation Army and different organizations, and want to thank parents, teachers and school officials for their kind cooperation with the school health work.

(c) Drake Field Report for Summer of 1951

The Pittsfield Playground opened for the summer on July 9th with seventy-two children in attendance.

As the largest age group was made up of pre-school and early school children, emphasis was placed on learning various sports applicable to age in playing games interesting to the group.

Days were spent by the younger children in supervised game periods, and in participating in such sports as volley ball, softball and bowling. Some interest was shown by the younger children in learning to play tennis and the racquets given us by the Softball League came in handy. As usual, the rings, the giant strides and the jungle gym, were popular among the younger children.

The older boys and girls spent much time playing tennis, peggyball, volleyball, and softball. The boys organized softball teams and played a few games with out-of-town teams. Those teams were made up of groups from Camp Koauaukee, Camp Fatima and Barnstead. Our boys showed good account for themselves, winning most of their games.

Tournaments were organized again this year for both boys and girls. Tournaments for boys included tennis, horseshoe pitching and badminton. Those for girls included badminton and checkers. Tournament winners are as follows:

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees, in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income, the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate, in addition to the original appropriation for 1951-52, sum of \$2,984.40 to be made available to the school district prior to July 1, 1952 in order to meet unanticipated obligations. (Submitted with out recommendation by the Budget Committee).
10. To see if the School District will appropriate the interest of \$5,802.40 already accrued or will have accrued on the previously appropriated sum of Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$80,000) or any portion thereof, and authorize its application toward the aggregate cost of the construction of the proposed addition and manual training shop. (Recommended by the Budget Committee).
11. To see if the School District will vote to instruct its School Board to publish annually in the Annual Report a de-

tailed statement of receipts and expenditures of the School District, the type as was last reported in the Annual Report of the Town for the year ended December 31, 1945. (By petition).

12. To see if the school district will vote to adopt a non-partisan ballot system as provided in Chapter 34 of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire and as amended by the Laws of 1943, Chapter 22.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
