## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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To the Inhabitants of the Town of Plymouth in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Music Hall in said Plymouth on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the support of the Free Public Library.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance and construction of highways.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the oiling of streets.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for state aid construction of highways, or town road maintenance in cooperation with the state.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day.
8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for cemeteries.
9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for expense of the District Nurse.
10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Emily Balch Soldiers and Sailors Memorial Hospital.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Band Concerts during the summer of 1939 by the Plymouth Community Band.
12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Plymouth Common.
13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for issuance of printed matter in co-operation with other towns of the Lakes Region.
14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to establish and maintain suitable coasting and skating places in the town.
15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to issue and distribute circulars and other written and printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town.
16. To see what action the town will take with regard to municipal ownership of an electric light plant.
17. To choose a Library Trustee for a term of three years.
18. To choose a Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years.
19. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
20. To see if the town will vote to give a discount on the early payment of taxes.
21. To see what action the town will take in regard to hiring or leasing a parcel of land for parking purposes in the rear of the Rand Block.
22. To see what action the town will take to authorize the selectmen to make necessary expenditures and to perform necessary acts for the purpose of rehabilitation of town property.

23. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

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### New Construction

A 6 inch Main was laid from Cummings Street dead-end through Avery Street to dead-end at Highland and Avery Streets, also dead-end of the Wooden pipe on Hawthorne and Cooper Streets was connected with the Avery Street Main by the same size iron pipe: eliminating these 3 dead-ends increased the volume of water and since cutting in these new lines there has been no complaints in regard to water and it has not been necessary to flush the mains in these localities as in former years.

### New Service Lines

Five new services were put in, including that for the New School Building on Summer Street; also a new and larger hydrant was installed on Summer Street at the High School.

### Meters

Ten new meters installed including one new 2 inch Commercial: 26 meters were taken out (including two Commercial) repaired and put back into service.

### Breaks

Five breaks occurred during the year, viz:—On Main, Bridge, Highland Avenue, Weeks and High Streets.

### Reservoirs

Both reservoirs were cleaned thoroughly, a portion of the North bank on the large reservoir was filled and rubble (occasioned by spring storm damages): a cement bulk head put in on West side of the large reservoir and a ditch dug on this same side so that the dirt from the hill on that side would not get into the reservoir as the bulkhead is now shut off at storm time; brooks were cleaned and small wooden dams put in so that the dirt could be easily taken out in the streams after a storm.

September 21 the gale came and when it was over the Reservoir lots were covered with most of the pine and timber blown down; the Superintendent and three men were at the large reservoir "cleaning-up" when the storm struck and they got out through the falling timber without injuries but the truck was covered by the debris and it took a crew of 10, a week to cut through so that the truck could be taken out.

Timber being all down on the Fletcher, Seavey and Batchelder lots (between the reservoirs and Main Highway) it was necessary to cut away the debris and clear out over our main pipe line through those lots so that when the lumber was removed from those lots the workmen could know where the District Mains were located so that a break could be eliminated as this is cement pipe and in places in near the surface and a break in these locations would mean cutting off both reservoirs till repaired.

All water from the water-shed was shut out of the reservoirs on September 21st and is still kept out of the reservoirs and all water since then has come from the well at the "Peg Mill" lot and will so continue until we are allowed by the State Board of Health to use the water from the Reservoir Lots. Average use of water in the District is 241,000 gallons per day and the reservoirs supply averaged 127,000 gallons per day so the additional pumping is double what it was before the "Blow-down": in fact to keep the necessary reserve in the reservoirs it is now necessary to pump, at times, 24 hours per day and the average since September 21st is more than sixteen hours per day.

If it was not for the Deisel Pumping Plant, and the District was obliged to pump wholly by electricity, the cost for **Power alone** would be around \$4,000.00 per annum.

Shortly after the 21st of September a representative from the State Board of Health came around on an inspection trip to look over the reservoirs and give us orders: we were then told to clean up the lot, keep all water from the watershed from entering the system, repair the wells and clean out the brooks and



ditches, burn the brush and not to allow the water back into the reservoirs till after this was done and permission given by the State Board of Health to again use that supply: in January a Board Inspector went over the reservoirs and found that the District was complying with the Board's orders and informed us that cleaning would have to be completed soon as possible in the Spring and then the Board would make an inspection and he hoped we would be able to have this done so that we could again use the water from the lots sometime in May.

The net debt of the District would have been reduced at least \$6,500.00 if the September gale had not occurred.

## REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

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To the School Board of Plymouth:

Following is the report of the School Nurse from September 1937 to July 1938:

The usual periodic weighing was done with special attention given to those underweight, for whom the Woman's Club and Red Cross furnished milk and Cod Liver Oil.

Six children who had lived in close contact with tuberculosis cases were skin-tested and the two who reacted had chest X-rays given by the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association. Seventeen others were examined at the Chest Clinic sponsored by this organization.

One child was taken to Hanover Hospital every two months for treatment paid by the Cancer Commission.

At various times children were taken to the local physicians and the Memorial Hospital for diagnosis and treatment.

As usual the Sight Conservation Division of Public Welfare has helped with some of the cases requiring glasses. Most of these cases were re-refracted by our local optometrist. A few were taken to Hanover.



134 children were treated at dental clinics, 51 of whom were Plymouth children. 19 of these cases were financed by the Community Chest, 1 by the Red Cross, two by State Mother's Aid.

The local dentists kindly gave satisfactory rates. Much stress has been made in the schools on diet, mouth sanitation and need of bi-annual visits to the dentist and we feel that something has been accomplished in this line.

Twenty-nine children were operated on for diseased tonsils from the district, nine of whom were Plymouth children. Special rates were also given for these clinics.

386 home calls, 261 school calls and 155 business calls were made by the nurse.

Except for chicken pox in the lower grades, there has been very little illness in the schools this year and attendance has been good.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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To the Plymouth School Board and District:

I hereby submit my second annual report as Superintendent of Schools. The statistical tables for the year 1937-1938 follow this report.

### High School

The report of the Headmaster gives details of the year's work. Regis A. Horace resigned her position in June and Alice C. Downing of Lincoln was appointed to replace her. Miss Downing is a graduate of the Plymouth Normal School and has had successful experience in the state. During the summer, ample and modern illumination was installed in the commercial rooms and study hall. The building has a capacity enrollment with the present number of classrooms. With the auditorium of the new grade school building available for high school assemblies and basket ball there will be more classroom space available on the upper floor of the high school. An additional teacher is needed for general and remedial work, owing to the increasing enrollment of the school. As the tuition rate is based on the actual cost of operation of the school, exclusive of overhead and indebtedness, the additional cost to the district would be borne about equally with the towns sending tuition students to the school.

### New Grade School Building

The outstanding development of the district is the erection and equipment of a new grade school building. Dire necessity for a new plant and the availability of federal funds brought out a preponderant vote to proceed with the project. The district bonded itself for \$63,800.00 at 2¼%, the indebtedness to be liquidated in twenty years. The government grant was \$52,200, or 45 per cent of the \$116,000 planned for the erection and equipment. The capacity of the building is over 400, which is large enough for the elementary enrollment of the entire district, with a reasonable allow-

ance for growth of the town. The building is so constructed that four more classrooms can be added at any time and be in accordance with the architectural lines of the building.

The building is of brick and fireproof throughout. There are eleven classrooms, an auditorium-gymnasium, library, nurse's room, teachers' room, office and storage room. Stairs are all metal with granolithic treads and landings. All walls and ceilings are finished with hard plaster. All interior partitions in general will be metal, there being no wood except trimmings. All classrooms are asphalt tile floor with wooden base. There will be electric clocks and interior telephones throughout the building.

The ground floor will have two classrooms, 30x23, a nurse's room, and an auditorium-gymnasium, with a floor space of 77 feet long and 56 feet wide, and also a balcony. There will be a stage of generous proportions. It will have an opening 15 feet high, 26 feet wide, and depth of 21 feet, 6 inches. The stage area will be thirty-five feet by twenty-one feet, six inches. There will be boys' and girls' toilets with locker-rooms and showers. These toilets and locker-rooms, with the auditorium, can be shut off from the rest of the building, as when the general public and high school people are using the auditorium. There is still another boys' toilet on the ground floor.

The first floor will have four classrooms, approximately 30x23 feet, with metal locker wardrobes. There will be a girls' toilet there. The office of Supervisor of Training and Superintendent of Schools will be on this floor with adjoining toilet and ample storage room.

The second floor will have one classroom, 35x22 feet, another 32x22 feet, and three classrooms 30x22 feet. There will be a teacher's rest room and toilet for both boys and girls. The interesting feature of this room will be a library 14',6" x 22'. There will be ample shelves.

Heating will be by steam and illumination fixtures will be modern and complete throughout. It is assumed that the present house occupied by the kinder-

garten will eventually be razed and I believe Summer Street from the Model School to High Street will be thrown up and the trees removed.

### **Centralization**

The district is now in a position to properly consider the expediency of the gradual absorption of the rural schools by the new grade school building. School opportunity will not be equal throughout the district until this is accomplished. While some teachers are doing good work in rural schools, particularly in the first six grades, in general, this type of school is operated by necessity rather than choice. Owen D. Young, an outstanding man of national prominence and not an educator, as Chairman of the Regents Inquiry into Character and Cost of Education in New York State, is reported to have reached certain definite conclusions as to centralization. While granting that a good teacher can give good instruction in rural schools, and transportation in some cases may be impracticable, he believes that the one-room school lacks the stimulation, the exhilaration and richer curriculum of the central school. More and more it is becoming apparent to educators and parents that more than the "3Rs" must be taught to assure success in life. Physical and mental competition available in larger groups, with better equipment, makes for higher personal success, broader citizenship and greater democracy.

While centralization would set up a transportation account, it would appear that the children in the six one-room schools could be educated at probably one-half the present expense.

### **Contract With the Normal School**

The contract of the district with the Plymouth Normal School expires this June, and a new one is being drawn up. The present plan seems admirable both from the viewpoint of the state and the district. While a few may occasionally be apprehensive of the effect on the children of the dual and simultaneous process of instruction to both children and cadet teachers, there is no conclusive evidence that there are any grounds for concern. All school systems have problem

children. Every child is under the control of a successful and experienced teacher. The instructors either hold the Master's Degree or have credits toward the same. As much advanced study is scarcely ever realized in towns of this size and location. A ready supply of cadet teachers gives more opportunity for individual help than is ordinarily available. The length of service of teachers shows a stability and interest making for long range successful work. It is my earnest recommendation that the contract be renewed.

### Adult Education

The federal adult education classes were transferred to the Normal School in the late fall as the regular school budget had no provision for extra janitor service, heat and light incident to the classes. At the present time there are 35 active members and if the high school typewriting room were available there would probably be nearly fifty. The lack of typewriters in the present location is a marked disadvantage to the school. All the members of the classes are residents of the town. They are commended for their ambition to continue their studies and seem to be working earnestly and conscientiously.

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### HEADMASTER'S REPORT

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To the Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit my tenth annual report as the Headmaster of Plymouth High School.

#### Class of 1938

A class of 52 received their diplomas at the Plymouth Theatre on Monday, June twentieth at 10:00 A. M. 36.5% of this number enrolled in post secondary institutions or continued their work as post graduates in this school. They are distributed as follows:

In addition there were two members of the class of 1937 who enrolled, one at the University of New Hampshire, and one at Plymouth Normal School.

First semester reports of work done by Plymouth High School graduates now enrolled at Plymouth Normal School and New Hampshire University have been received, which show that our boys and girls have been doing splendid work. The ranking student at the Plymouth Normal School for the first semester is a member of the class of 1938 from the Plymouth High School.

### Enrollment

The enrollment for the year 1938-1939 to date has been 355, of this number 181 are boys and 174 girls. There are 207 tuition pupils included in this enrollment.

### Attendance

Although many of the students must travel several miles, some by automobiles, some by train, and some by both methods, the attendance has been very good in spite of the handicaps of weather and road conditions. Nevertheless, as was stated in last year's report, the parents can help greatly by insisting on habits of regular attendance and punctuality. The school work of absent pupils is greatly impaired, while punctuality is a characteristic much to be desired at all times.

Parents should not ask to have their girls and boys dismissed from school unless it is for a matter of great importance.

## Extra-Curricular Activities

Under the direction of Mrs. Agnes Potter, all members of the school have met once a month for chorus work. The other weekly periods of the month have been devoted to voluntary chorus of about sixty members. This course is a great help especially for those attending Normal School, later.

Due to the lack of material, the orchestral work was omitted this year. There seems little opportunity at the present time for girls and boys to learn to play musical instruments with the exception of the piano.

It was again made possible by the Plymouth School Board for members of the school to learn not only to dance but also to acquire proper posture and good manners in dancing. The class was limited to the members of the two lower classes with a few from the upper classes who did not avail themselves of the opportunity last year. This instruction has been ably carried on by Mrs. Mary A. Kimball and Mrs. Inez P. Adams. It has proved itself a worth-while project.

The Thirteenth Annual Prize Speaking Contest under the supervision of Miss Ruth I. McKinnon and Mrs. Ruth F. Frink, of the English Department was held on April 1, 1938. The prizes were awarded as follows:

The contest for this year will be held on March twenty-fourth.

A scholarship team of three students from Plymouth High School won first place in the United States Constitutional History Contest on Scholarship Day. This tenth annual competition was held on May seventh at Plymouth and Keene where teams from many High Schools of the state competed in various subjects.

This year the High School is making a special effort to keep alive some of the fundamentals acquired

in the elementary schools. On appointed days a part of the English recitation is devoted to spelling. In Biology and History a portion of the time is taken for the study of new words found in these subjects. Two tests in the fundamentals of arithmetic have been given this year between which tests home room teachers have conducted "set up exercises" and have drilled each pupil.

### **Athletics**

Football, baseball and basketball for boys have been school activities under the supervision of Mr. Dawson. Basketball for girls has been under the direction of Miss Collin, a teacher at Lower Intervale. The girls' basketball team won the Pemigewasset League Championship this year. A winter sports team was organized this year and under the coaching of Mr. Hilty and the help of Richard Person has done very well for its first year. All athletics are conducted on an educational basis with the good of the participants in mind.

### **Recommendations**

The Headmaster would again recommend the introduction of a course in mechanic arts for the boys to parallel the one in domestic arts for the girls. There is a great need of such a course to take care of those boys whose abilities are vested in doing things with their hands.

Another teacher is needed to meet the requirements of a school growing in numbers and to assist the other teachers in helping the slower students of all classes.

### **Conclusion**

I wish to take this opportunity to thank you, Superintendent McCurdy, the School Board, the Citizens, the teachers and pupils for the fine support and hearty cooperation which I have received during the past year.
