SCHOOL REPORT.

Citizens of the School District of Westmoreland :

The pupils have been under the instruction of the following teachers :

No. 1.—Sara E. Phelps.

No. 3.—Mary L. Britton, Flora L. Merrifield.

No. 4.—Annie L. Burt.

No. 6.—Grace E. Clark.

Select school.—Flora L. Merrifield.

Each school has received 29 weeks of instruction, and 130 pupils have been instructed.

The schools, taken as a whole, have been very successful : many of them reaching far out beyond the average of common schools in thoroughness and completeness.

In two or three instances there has been a partial failure on the part of teachers, of the necessary qualifications to rank their schools with the best. It should be one of the motives of teachers to make each succeeding term the best, and only by so doing can a high degree of commendation be attained : a little indiscretion and lack of interest will soon disable a teacher of a reputation that has taken years of hard study to secure.

Important as it is for teachers to be fully equipped, it is none the less important that they should be placed among

associations which will give them cordial support, which is an impetus that will redound more to make a school a success than all other agencies outside of the school room. To effect any good purpose, in its fullest extent, requires the co-operative action of all interested; to maintain and build up the cause of education, requires the co-operation of teachers, pupils and parents. If children are ever to receive a fair profit, if they are ever to be relieved of supernumary and unjust burdens, these benefits must come through united and concerted action. There is no cause more worthy of at least an effort than the cause of education. When we throw down our interest in our schools we carelessly unarm ourselves of a mighty prestige that was only achieved through fortitude, trials and tribulations, and invite ignorance and vice to take and guide our State.

The select school was maintained 10 weeks, and proved a valuable school. A large amount of ground was thoroughly covered.

As we expected, the book account has footed up considerably. It has been the experience of all the first year it has been adopted, and should grow less every year.
