TOWN WARRANT**TOWN OF BEDFORD****STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bedford, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State of New Hampshire; qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 9th of March, next, at 7:00 o'clock in the forenoon to set upon the following Articles:

ARTICLE 1. To elect necessary Town Officers and School Officers for the ensuing year and ensuing three years.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to reclassify the land of William Kelley, James Yakovakis, William G. Tucker et al, of approximately 77 acres located at the junction of 101 and 114 — formerly known as the Langdell property, from Residential-Agricultural to Limited Commercial. (By petition) Recommended by the Planning Board.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to reclassify land of 177 Granite Street Corporation formerly the Beau Reve property, approximately 97 acres located on both sides of Wallace Road near the junction with the New Boston Road from Commercial to Residential-Agricultural.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to reclassify land of Mr. and Mrs. Edmond Chouinard, known as the Chicken Roost, approximately 1¼ acres located on the west side of the Daniel Webster Highway south near the Merrimack line from Service Industrial to Highway Commercial. (By petition) Not Recommended by the Planning Board.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to reclassify all land previously classified Agricultural from Agricultural to Resi-

dential-Agricultural because of action by the 1968 Town Meeting when the classification Agricultural was eliminated from the Zoning Ordinance as the result of an oversight by the Planning Board.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to adopt an Earth Removal Ordinance for the Town of Bedford. (By petition) Recommended by the Planning Board.

EARTH AND STONE REMOVAL

PART I

Section 1. **Purpose.** It is the purpose of this ordinance to prevent excavations that will create pits in the earth leaving it in a hazardous and unuseable state, causing soil erosion, trapping stagnant waters, and endangering natural resources; and thus to remove the danger to health, safety and the general welfare.

Section 2. **Restrictions.** In any district the removal of soil, sand, gravel or quarried stone for sale or for profitable use on other premises shall be permitted only upon issuance of a Special Exception Permit by the Board of Adjustment. (But note

Section 8 Exceptions). The following provisions shall apply:

(a) No excavation or stock-piling of materials shall be located within twenty (20) feet of any property line or public road.

(b) No excavation of earth (soil, sand, gravel, clay or other fragmental earth product) shall be made greater than ten (10) feet below the established grade of the nearest public road unless the sidewalls remain at an incline of at least two (2) horizontal feet to one (1) vertical foot or are supported by retaining walls.

(c) No excavations slopes in excess of one (1) to one (1) shall be maintained for a period in excess of two (2) years.

(d) No excavation shall be made so as to pollute or otherwise detrimentally effect any water resource and any excavation tending to retain stagnant water, shall be refilled with clean solid fill within one year of excavation unless approved by the Board of Adjustment for recreational or agricultural purposes,

(e) When earth has been removed from any excavation area to the maximum extent allowed, such area or part thereof shall be graded to a smooth horizontal or gently sloping surface. Removal shall be considered complete when lawful excavation operations have ceased for a period of two years.

(f) No new excavation or substantial extension of preexisting excavation shall be made which would result in traffic, noise or dust in an amount constituting a threat to safety or peaceful enjoyment of their homes of reasonably affected residents.

Section 3. **Applications for Permit.** Before any excavation is commenced for the removal of earth or stone, the owner, lessee or agent of the premises shall obtain a written Permit therefore from the Board of Adjustment. For that purpose, such applicant shall file with said Board an application in duplicate containing a detailed statement of the proposed work and, if required, a plan with topographical contours prepared by a duly licensed engineer or land surveyor of the State of New Hampshire, setting forth:

(a) The three-dimensional extent of the proposed excavation and exact condition of the premises before the work is commenced and proposed condition of the premises after the work is completed;

(b) A duly acknowledged consent in writing of the owner of the premises and mortgagee, if any, including his or their address;

(c) The purpose of the proposed excavation;

(d) Structures and equipment to be used on the premises;

(e) Maximum size of vehicles to be used for transportation, the hours of operation and the maximum number of round trips per day.

(f) A definite proposed date of completion.

(g) Authorization for inspection of the premises by authorized representatives of the Town during consideration and term(s) of any permit hereunder.

Fee: The original application shall be accompanied by a fee of (\$25) dollars and renewal applications shall be accompanied by a fee of ten (\$10) dollars.

Section 4. **Bond or Deposit.** Before the issuance of a Permit, the Board of Adjustment may require the applicant

and the owner of record of the premises to execute and file with the Town Clerk, a bond in an amount fixed by said Board for the faithful performance of the conditions contained in the municipal ordinances and the Permit.

Section 5. **Geologist's Report.** The Board of Adjustment is authorized to require a geologists report certifying that the planned depth of excavation will not endanger water resources above or below ground.

Section 6. **Groundcover.** The Board of Adjustment is authorized to require that topsoil be replaced and the ground planted or seeded with suitable cover to reduce the damage of erosion and airborne dust.

Section 7. **Issuance of Permits.** Permits will be issued for periods of one (1) year. Permits may be issued for periods up to five (5) years upon showing of reasonable requirement in connection with operation contracts, leases, purchase of equipment, necessity of extensive preparation or the like. Permits may consist of a copy of the approved application with approval of the Board of Adjustment marked or affixed thereto. Permits may be renewed for one (1) year periods by the Board of Adjustment without hearing in the absence of objection from a reasonably affected resident. Permits shall not be issued or renewed to persons who stand in violation of this ordinance or with respect to property in a condition of violation of this ordinance.

Section 8. **Exceptions.** Nothing contained in this Ordinance shall require a person to:

(a) Obtain a permit hereunder for or prevent a person from removing earth or soil from one part of his lands to another part of the same premises, provided the other Restrictions in Section 2 hereof are met.

(b) Obtain a permit hereunder for or prevent a person from removal of earth or soil from his lands to a maximum depth of three (3) feet and a maximum volume of one thousand (1,000) cubic feet or as reasonably necessary for construction in accordance with a valid building permit or the like.

(c) Correct conditions, existing on his premises at the time of enactment of this ordinance and previously lawful, as a prerequisite to a permit hereunder.

Section 9. **Penalties.** For any and every offense against the provisions of this ordinance, the owner of the premises and the operator shall each be punishable by a fine of not more than ten (\$10.00) Dollars. Each day's continuing offense shall constitute a separate additional offense. Enforcement shall be as provided in the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Bedford.

Section 10. **Separability Clause.** Should any section or provision of this ordinance be declared by the courts to be unconstitutional or invalid, such decision shall not effect the validity of the ordinance as a whole, or any other section or provision thereof.

Section 11. **Time and Effect.** This Ordinance shall take effect at the time it is enacted by the Town. Preexisting earth and soil removal operations may be continued for three months beyond the date of enactment without a Permit provided all the other restrictions of Section 2. hereof are met with respect to such further operation.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Building Inspector, determine the term of such appointment, and establish a salary to be paid mainly from Building Permit fees. In addition to his duties of issuing permits and inspecting buildings, said official shall be charged with the enforcement of the ordinance and may bring action to enjoin such erection, construction, alteration, or reconstruction.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Building Permits Section of the Zoning Ordinance by deleting the entire ordinance and substituting in its place a Revised Building Permit Section.

BUILDING PERMITS

Article I: Application for Permit

A. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons, firm or Corporation to construct a new building of any type; enlarge an existing building, do exterior alterations or remodeling; remove or demolish any building; or construct or erect a swimming pool or tennis court without first filing an application with the Town Building Official, and obtaining the re-

quired permit therefore; except that ordinary repairs that do not exceed three hundred dollars (\$300.00) including both labor and materials shall be exempt from this provision.

B. The Building Official shall mean the Building Inspector appointed by the Selectmen, or if none is appointed, shall mean the Selectmen.

C. The application for a permit shall be submitted to the Building Official in such form as they shall prescribe and shall be accompanied by the required fee.

D. Application for a permit shall be made by the owner or lessee of the building or structure or his agent, or by a licensed engineer or architect employed in connection with the proposed work. If the application is made by any person other than the owner, it shall be accompanied by a duly notarized affidavit by the owner authorizing the applicant to make such application.

E. Each application should be accompanied by the following:

1. General description of the proposed work.

2. Not less than two (2) copies of specifications and plans drawn to scale with sufficient clarity and detail dimensions to show the nature and character of the work to be performed. The building official may waive the requirement for filing plans when the work involved is of a minor nature.

3. There shall also be filed a plot plan showing all boundary lines of the lot upon which the proposed work is to be done, the existing buildings, if any, on the lot, and the location of all new construction for which the permit is sought. Such plot plans shall also show the location of proposed or existing water lines or sewer lines, or on-site systems. Such plans shall also show distances from all lot lines and street lines to the buildings of both existing or proposed construction, together with the size of the building, the lot, and any other information the Selectmen may require.

F. Amendments to a building permit application or accompanying documents may be filed at any time before completion of the work for which the permit is sought or issued; and such amendments shall be deemed part of the original application and shall be filed therewith.

G. An application for a permit for any proposed work shall be deemed to have been abandoned six (6) months after date of filing, unless such application has been diligently prosecuted or a permit shall have been issued. For reasonable cause, the building official may grant one or more extensions of time for additional periods not exceeding ninety (90) days each.

Article II: Permits

A. The building official shall examine or cause to be examined all applications for permits and amendments thereto within a reasonable time after filing. He shall issue a permit therefor as soon as practicable.

B. Any permit issued shall become invalid if the authorized work is suspended or abandoned for a period of six (6) months after the time commencing the work.

C. The building official shall attach his signature to every permit; or he may authorize a subordinate to affix such signature thereto.

D. The building official may revoke a permit or approval issued under the provisions of the ordinance in case of any false statement or misrepresentation of fact in the application or on the plans or on which the permit or approval was based.

E. A true copy of the building permit shall be kept on the site of operations open to public inspection during the entire time of prosecution of the work and until the completion of the same.

F. Written notice of at least seventy two (72) hours of start of work under a building permit shall be given the building official.

Article III: Conditions of Permit

A. The permit shall be a license to proceed with the work and shall not be construed as authority to violate, cancel or set aside any of the provisions of the ordinance, except as specifically stipulated by modification or legally granted variation as described in the application.

B. All work shall conform to the approved application and plans for which the permit has been issued and any approved amendments thereto.

C. No lot or plot shall be changed, increased or diminished in area from that shown on the official plot plan, unless a revised diagram showing such changes accompanied by the necessary affidavit of owner or applicant shall have been filed and approved; except that such revised plot plan will not be required if the change is caused by reason of an official street opening, street widening or other public improvement.

Article IV: Demolition or removal of Structures

A. Before a building can be demolished or removed, the owner or agent shall notify all utilities having service connections within the building such as water, electric, gas, sewer and other connections. A permit to demolish or remove a building shall not be issued until a release is obtained from the utilities, stating that their respective service connections and appurtenant equipment, such as meters and regulators, have been removed or sealed and plugged in a safe manner.

B. Whenever a building is demolished or removed, the premises shall be maintained free from all unsafe or hazardous conditions by the proper regulation of the lot, restoration of established grades and the erection of the necessary retaining walls and fences.

Article V: Fees

A. No permit to begin work for new construction, alteration, removal, demolition or other building operation shall be issued until the fees prescribed in this section shall have been paid to the building official or other authorized municipal agency, nor shall an amendment to a permit necessitating an additional fee because of an increase in the estimated cost of the work involved be approved until the additional fee shall have been paid.

B. The fees shall be as follows:

1. Commercial and Industrial Structures	\$100.00
2. Residential dwellings	15.00
3. Alteration or remodeling	10.00
4. Demolition or removal	5.00
5. Swimming pool	5.00
6. Tennis court	5.00

Article VI: Penalties

A. Any person or persons, firm or corporation found to be in violation of this Ordinance, shall be fined not more than ten dollars (\$10.00) for each day such violation shall exist, to a maximum of one thousand (\$1,000.00) dollars for each violation.

Article VII: Appeals

A. In any matter where the appellant or his agent is aggrieved by a decision of the building official, he can appeal such decision to the Board of Adjustment. Thereafter, any person aggrieved by the decision of the Board of Adjustment may appeal to the Superior Court of Hillsborough County.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance by changing certain provisions of the existing ordinance to more clearly define the intent of the ordinance.

A. Article IV *General Residential District*

Para A. Section 6: Delete all except every building lot shall have a minimum lot frontage of one hundred fifty feet.

B. Article XI *Commercial District*

Para. A. Section 1: Add after "residences uses permitted in Article VI, Para. A., Section 3.

C. Section 3: Delete entirely and substitute, "Retail business including the following: retail clothing, appliances, hardware and department stores, automotive accessories, drug and variety stores, grocery and supermarkets, restaurants, cocktail lounges and liquor stores, business offices, banks, indoor theaters, florists, lawn and garden tool suppliers, fraternal and civic clubs, animal grooming and boarding."

D. Section 11. Add after last sentence — "Off-street parking shall be provided for business and professional offices permitted in this district on the basis of a ratio of one (1) square foot of parking lot for each one (1) square foot of building area plus one (1) off-street parking space for each employee."

E. Article XII *Limited Commercial District*

Para A. Section 1: Delete entirely and substitute the following: "It shall be primarily a district of business and professional offices excluding general farming and residences unless used to house such offices by the owner or tenant."

- F. Section 2: Delete and substitute the following: "Professional offices including doctors, dentists, lawyers, engineers, architects, as well as other operations normally considered as general business offices including morticians, insurance, real estate, banking and such retail businesses within these permitted buildings as are conducted for the convenience of the tenants, but excluding all operations which contain light manufacturing or on site retailing as a primary function."

G. Article XIII *Neighborhood Commercial District*

Para. A. Section 3: Delete entirely and substitute: "No enterprise in this district shall have more than eight (8) full time employees including the proprietor."

H. Article XIV *Highway Commercial District*

Para. A. Section 10: Delete all after "lot area shall" and substitute "be one (1) acre".

VOTING ON PRECEDING ARTICLES SHALL BE BY WRITTEN BALLOT. POLLS ARE TO OPEN AT 7:00 A.M. AND ARE NOT TO CLOSE EARLIER THAN 6:00 P.M.

ACTION ON THE REMAINING ARTICLES WILL BE AT THE McKELVIE SCHOOL AT 7:30 P.M.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following by-laws.

A. PARKING DURING SNOW STORM

1. From November 1 to April 1 of each year, no person shall park any motor vehicle on any public highway between the hours of 12 midnight and 8 a.m. or at any other time in such a manner as to impede snow removal operations,

2. Any vehicle parked in violation of section 1 hereof may be towed by the road agent, the chief of police or their agents or by independent contractors engaged by the road agent or the chief of police; any vehicles so towed shall be stored and released to the owner only upon payment of the cost of towing as established from time to time by the board of selectmen.
3. Any person violating section 1 hereof shall be subject to a penalty not to exceed twenty-five dollars for each offense.

B. PLACING SNOW UPON CERTAIN HIGHWAYS

1. No person shall put or place or cause to be put or placed any snow or ice upon the surface of the traveled portion of any Class V or Class IV highway or town-maintained portion of a Class II highway, except (i) that snow may be so placed to provide a place necessary for crossing, recrossing and traveling upon said highways by sleds, logging equipment and farm equipment, and (ii) that snow may be placed incident to the plowing of snow from land adjoining said highways, provided that such snow is promptly removed from said highway once said snow plowing operation is completed.
2. Any person violating these by-laws shall be subject to a penalty not exceeding fifty dollars for each offense.

C. REGULATION OF TOWN DUMP

1. No person shall make any use of any facility maintained by the town for the collection, or disposal of garbage, refuse or other waste materials unless he shall first have obtained from the Selectmen's Office permit for such use. Such permit shall be in the form prescribed by the board of selectmen.
2. The selectmen shall issue the permit in section 1 only to the following persons:
 - a. Residents of the town.
 - b. Any non-resident person owning or leasing real property within the town, provided any such permit shall be limited to the disposal of waste materials generated by activities carried on within the town.

- c. Any person engaging in the business of collecting waste material from residents of the town or from activities carried on within the town, provided such permit is limited to the disposal only of waste materials so collected.
3. The selectmen shall issue the permit described in section 1 upon application of any person enumerated in section 2 without payment of any fee.
 4. Any person violating the provisions of this by-law shall be subject to a penalty not exceeding fifty dollars for each offense.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to appoint a highway agent pursuant to RSA 245:6.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year:

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes if needed, and to raise and appropriate a sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) for the payment of interest on such borrowing.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand One Hundred Forty One Dollars and Sixty Three Cents (\$2,141.63) for the construction of Class V Highways within the Town provided that the State of New Hampshire will contribute Fourteen Thousand Two Hundred Seventy Seven Dollars and Fifty Six Cents (\$14,277.56).

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund: Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) towards the purchase of a new Fire Truck; Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) toward the purchase of a new Road Grader; and Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) toward the purchase of a new Tractor Loader.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighteen Thousand Dollars (\$18,000.00) for the purpose of publishing the up-dated edition of the Bedford Town History as compiled by the Town History Committee of

the Bedford Historical Society, said appropriation to be reimbursed to the Town upon the sale of the histories.

(See Report of Town History Committee, Page (90))

ARTICLE 17. Do you approve of having two sessions for the annual Town Meeting in this Town, the first session for the choice of Town Officers elected by an official ballot and other action required to be inserted on said official ballot; and the second session, on a date set by the Selectmen, for transaction of other business? RSA 39-2a. This ordinance to remain in force until rescinded by a later vote of the Town. (By petition)

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00 to be used in the preparation of a report for sewerage and sewage treatment facilities, including such land acquisition, easements rights-of-way, surveys and boring as are required. This sum to be raised by the issuance of not exceeding Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) in Serial Bonds or Notes under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 33 of the New Hampshire Statutes Annotated 1955 and any amendments thereto) and to authorize the Selectmen or other legally authorized representatives to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Bedford and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town of Bedford will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) to be used in the preparation of plans and specifications and contract documents for water system improvements. This sum to be raised by issuance of not exceeding Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) in Serial Bonds or Notes under and in compliance with the applicable provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 33 of the New Hampshire Statutes Annotated 1955 and any amendments thereto), and to authorize the Selectmen or other legally authorized representatives to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Bedford and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Nine Hundred Ninety Six Dollars and Thirty Five Cents (\$12,996.35) for the purchase of a Police Cruiser and one half of a Police Officer's salary for one year, of which the Town of Bedford will pay 60% (\$7,797.81) and the remaining 40% (\$5,198.54) to be paid by the State of New Hampshire Safety Commission.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) from Francis A. Curit for the perpetual care of the Arthur J. Bennett cemetery lot to be placed in trust, the income to be expended for the care and maintenance of the same in the Bedford Center Cemetery.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) from the Grace E. Hull estate to be placed in trust, the annual income therefrom to be expended for the purchase of books for the Public Library of said Bedford, in memory of her parents, the late Edmund B. Hull and Sarah M. Hull, of said Town.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to accept Kennedy Road for an additional 970 feet by 50 feet wide from 21 Kennedy Drive westerly to County Road.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to accept Edinburgh Drive for a distance of 2,780 feet by 50 feet wide, starting at Meetinghouse Road and ending at Liberty Hill Road.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to accept a continuation of Pinecrest Circle for a distance of 276 feet by 50 feet wide including the turnaround.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to accept Meadowcrest Drive for a distance of 2,026 feet by 50 feet wide including the turnaround from Back River Road westerly to the turnaround.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to accept Pine Drive for a distance of 400 feet by 50 feet wide and to discontinue the previous turnaround.

To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and other officers heretofore chosen, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

BUDGET COMMITTEE REPORT FOR 1971**TOWN GOVERNMENT BUDGET**

The Budget Committee held meetings with all department heads who presented their financial needs for the fiscal year 1971. In addition, a Public Hearing was held on February 2, 1971, and although the attendance of about 80 persons was disappointing, audience participation was lively, and constructive comments helpful to the committee. All items in the budget have been thoroughly discussed and accepted, or reduced, individually by a majority vote of the members.

The greatest increases appear in the Police, Roads, Historical Society and Sewer Study line items. The Police budget was reduced from the original request, but still shows a considerable increase. With the rapid growth of the town, it was felt that more protection is necessary and that more police officers were needed for efficient patrolling on a 24 hour basis. The money asked by the Historical Society will eventually be returned to the town from the sales of the book "History of Bedford." The Sewer Study item we feel is necessary because of the governments drive to end pollution in all areas.

The only Article submitted without recommendation is the Police Traffic Control item. This is a new undertaking for the town and the consensus of the committee was that this particular item should be decided by the wishes of the people. If this article is accepted, the state will contribute 40% of the necessary amount.

REPORT OF THE BEDFORD PLANNING BOARD

The year 1970 has been one of continued activity for the Planning Board, although not as hectic as some other years. It would seem to indicate a slowing down of the land development and home building industry. Also, the increase in the lot size for residences probably has curtailed the growth of the Town, as evidenced by fewer new subdivisions having been presented to the Board.

A new compilation of Zoning Ordinances was printed and distributed, and a revised map of the Town is about ready for publication which will contain all known existing streets and roads.

As far as the impact upon the Town is concerned, the most important single project promoted by the Planning Board is the recommendation to engage the engineering firm of Anderson-Nichols to perform a preliminary engineering survey to determine costs for construction of a sewerage and water system. The study performed by the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission will serve as the basis for this further proposal. Several alternatives will be explored and a recommendation will be made and presented to the Town next year.

Two things have occurred which made it imperative for the Town to move forward in this direction:

First, the State Water Pollution Control Board has stated there will be no further commercial or industrial development permitted in Bedford without an adequate sewerage disposal system. This in effect limits the tax base to private residences and existing commercial businesses.

Second, in the more heavily populated areas septic problems have occurred as well as the offensive conditions caused by the shopping centers and the Wayfarer Motel. These must be corrected.

In order to encourage new business to locate in the Town, we must provide a desirable climate; and water and sewers are two very important elements of this climate.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1970 forest fire season was a quiet one in this area, quiet in part because of your continued cooperation and favorable weather conditions.

Fires that did occur were, for the most part, caused by debris burning, children and smokers.

The elimination of these three causes of forest fires would drastically change this picture — to bring about this change we make the following suggestions:

1. When the ground is not covered with snow a permit to burn must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden. This permit covers waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, as well as garden trash and brush burning such burning is restricted by regulation prior to 9:00 A.M. and after 5:00 P.M. with the following exceptions:
Commercial or industrial burning is permissible at any time under normal conditions but only with the approval of the District Chief and a written permit from the Forest Fire Warden.
2. Fires caused by children can be prevented only with the complete cooperation of parents in the supervision of their children, keep matches out of reach of children, this action will help to prevent fires and may save a life, the life of your child. Try to explain this to your child, won't you?
3. Forest fires caused by smokers can be reduced in number by the exercise of more care in the discarding of matches and smoking material whether from a vehicle or by a hiker. In all cases, make sure that the butt or match you discard is out, dead out. Smokey says, "Thanks for your help", and invites you to join with him in setting a good example for others in the prevention of fires and the protection of our environment.

We have examined the balance sheet of the Town of Bedford, New Hampshire as of December 31, 1970 and the related statements of revenues and expenses and fund equities for the year then ended. In our opinion, except as noted in the preceding paragraph, the balance sheet and related statements of revenues and expenses and fund equities present fairly the financial position of the various funds of the Town of Bedford, New Hampshire, on December 31, 1970, and the results of operations for the year then ended, in conformity with accounting practices used by municipalities applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE BEDFORD PUBLIC LIBRARY

Year Ending December 31, 1970

The Columbia Encyclopedia tells us that "the earliest known library was a collection of clay tablets in Babylonia in the 21st century before Christ". For about 4000 years, then, libraries of one type or another have been in existence. It is interesting to conjecture as to what the Babylonians would think about the Bedford Public Library of 1971 A.D. One may even project one's self ahead and wonder about Public Libraries of 4000 years from now. Meantime we try to improve the quality and service of our Bedford Library every year. We feel proud and grateful for some of the accomplishments of the year 1970, which as Library Trustees it is our responsibility to bring before you in this Town Report.

The function of our Public Library is to serve the public. During 1970 the Bedford Library was open thirty-two hours per week. Starting in January, 1971, we have extended the hours of service to thirty-five (Again, as a year ago, we remind the public that in compliance with the State of New Hampshire Library Policy we should, by 1972, be open for forty hours per week.)

We employ two full-time Librarians, Mrs. Ralph Wiggin, Jr., as Head Librarian, Mrs. Byron Peck as Assistant Librarian, and a part-time Librarian, Mrs. Jack Thacher. For further service to the public, we are fortunate in having excellent volunteer helpers, as follows: Mrs. Robert Woods, Mrs. John Trott, Mrs. Craig D. Potter, Mrs. Norman Lee and Mrs. Earl Dudley. Two cadet Girl Scouts working for honors, Vivian Green and Patty Vose, come in several hours a week to assist. In addition to these volunteer helpers, we employ three Library Pages, Robin Deyo, Sharon Gilman, and Matilda Peters, who work after school hours and on Saturdays. These valuable helpers are paid for out of special funds.

Our Librarians are constantly working toward extra accreditation. Mrs. Wiggin, in a course sponsored by the New Hampshire State Library and the University of New Hampshire this past summer, received Full Certification on Public Library Techniques. Mrs. Peck is due to receive the same type of certification in the summer of 1971. The Library Trustees have authorized similar courses for Mrs. Thacher in the near future.

In April, during National Library Week, both Mrs. Wiggin and Mrs. Peck attended a worthwhile meeting at the University of New Hampshire. The following month they were present at the sessions of the New Hampshire Library Council (formerly the State Library Association) held for two days at the Wayfarer in Bedford. In addition to this type of meeting, they faithfully attend Book Meetings sponsored by the State Library, where new books are on display and book reviews given. This proves extremely helpful in book selection, which requires constant consideration.

The physical plant of the Library requires continuing attention. Since the completion of the addition in 1968, air-conditioners have been installed on the main floor. In the Bedford Room (on the Lower Level) new shelving has been installed, where all books relating to New England have been placed. This released much needed space on the shelves in the John Goffe Room.

On the second floor of the building, one of the three small rooms has been cleared out, repainted, and furnished for what is known as a "Research Room". This room is available, by arrangement with the Librarian, for students, adults, businessmen, for special study that requires privacy. Its furnishings include a study table, comfortable chairs, adequate lighting, and a typewriter. Its use is restricted to no more than two people at a time.

More and more community groups are making use of the Bedford Room as a headquarters for small meetings. These include the Bedford Historical Society and the Westerners. Sponsored by the Library were the German classes held during 1970 in this Room, taught by Sandra Bostwick Mann. Executive Classes, meeting weekly in spring and fall, have been conducted by Mrs. Robert Woods.

The Reading Group, sponsored jointly by the Library and the Bedford Women's Club, met regularly in this Room from January through May. This group is headed by a committee including the two Librarians and a representative of the Women's Club, with the reading directed by Mrs. Demeritt Ayer. Meetings include so-called "capsule reports" by Mrs. Wiggin on new books available in the Library, and individual reviews by members and guests, of current best-selling books. In addition the group read aloud, at the sessions, "Roseneranz and Guildenstern are Dead" by Tom Stoppard. Sessions of this group are held regularly on Monday

mornings, and are open to all Bedford residents, both men and women.

In the Children's Department, Story Hours were conducted throughout the summer, with volunteer mothers serving as story-tellers. Also during the summer, a Reading Enrichment Program for children of Grades 1, 2, and 3, was ably directed by Mrs. Norman Lee. An Incentive Reading Program for children of Grades 1 through 6, with the theme "Walking with Dorothy on the Yellow Brick Road", was capably handled by the Librarians. A party and film-showing in the fall wound up this program. The value of these summer programs cannot be over-emphasized.

Two successful Book Sales were held during the year, and proceeds from these and previous sales have been used for the purchase of a 16-mm. projector, a valuable addition to the Library's equipment.

Of great benefit to Library patrons, both young people and adults, is a copy machine, available for use at a small fee.

The Library's Phono-Record Collection is growing constantly. We are proud also of a big selection of Career Guidance Material and College Catalogs, helpful to young people and their parents. Art slides with appropriate books are available for loaning. A selection of 8-mm. films for loaning is proving extremely popular. Included are films on sports, nature, historic events, and old "movie flicks".

An extremely popular feature through the spring was the Annual Art Exhibit, held for one month starting with National Library Week, and with delightful displays of local talent in the John Goffe Room and the Bedford Room. Well over one hundred works of arts or crafts, all done by Bedford residents of all ages, were entered in the Exhibit. This proved of constant interest, and brought many visitors into our Library.

A community service, handled quietly and without flourish, is that of sending suitable library books to patients at a Bedford Nursing Home. The Librarians are also glad to select books to be sent to any of the so-called "shut-ins" of the town. In this connection, we remind the public that a great many large-print books are available for adults, young people, or children — anyone who

has a vision problem. This selection of books covers a wide variety of subjects, both fiction and non-fiction.

We cannot close this report without giving special thanks to many Bedford citizens and groups who have given thoughtful and valuable gifts to the Library. To list a few of these, given during 1970: Dr. Margaret Kennard gave the Library an excellent collection of books. Mrs. Ruby Ramig gave an Encyclopedia of Gardening which is proving very useful. The Westerners' Riding Club again gave a subscription to "The Western Horseman". Dr. and Mrs. John H. Kennard gave a gift membership in the Audubon Society, which includes a monthly publication. Mrs. Allan Richardson presented a book of great interest to antique-lovers: "The Dunlaps and their Furniture". Mr. Leon Hardy, a Bedford book-binder, rebound this book into a more permanent form, and gave this service as a gift to the Library. Mr. and Mrs. J. Edwin Gott presented and planted a gift of shrubbery for the Library grounds. Mr. and Mrs. C. Freeman Shaw gave a present of two books for children, in memory of Mr. Shaw's mother, Mrs. Myra Shaw. Mrs. Fred Hoyt gave a gift of money for a book in memory of her late husband. Mrs. Hans Standow also gave money for a book in memory of Mr. Hoyt. Miss Elizabeth Farrar again presented a subscription of "Atlantic Monthly" to the Library in memory of her mother, Mrs. Herbert Farrar. The Bedford Women's Club regularly gives memorial books for members who have died. For this type of gift the Library Trustees and Librarians are deeply grateful. It is suggested that these are suitable memorials to book-loving people.

The Trustees of the Library are happy at any time to give Bedford citizens additional information about the Library. Mrs. Wiggin, our Librarian, is available for reviews of new books received in the Library. Again, as in past years, the Trustees are proud and grateful that Bedford has excellent, alert, dedicated Librarians, who never tire in their efforts to make ours a better Library.

And shall we hope that the Encyclopedist of the 6000 A.D. may find our report for the year 1970 valuable and informative?

**THE VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION
OF MANCHESTER**

The services of the Visiting Nurse Association, a United Fund Agency are available for all of the residents of Bedford regardless of race, creed or ability to pay. The Association is a home health agency certified to care for Medicare patients.

The Visiting Nurse provides bedside nursing care, treatment and health guidance and the Registered Physical Therapist provides physical therapy; all services are carried out according to directions by the patient's physician on a part time basis. Home Health Aides are available on the same basis.

Maternal and child health guidance and instruction is given before and after the arrival of new babies and classes for instruction of expectant parents are held three times yearly in Manchester.

Family health guidance is also given with special emphasis on prevention of disease and promotion of health.

A Bedford — Goffstown Regional Immunization program is being planned for March, April and May 1971. Details to be announced at a later date.

448 visits to Bedford residents were made in 1970. Mrs. Grace Gage, R.N., is the nurse in the area.

Dr. Francis Bresnahan examined 52 well children at the Well Child Conference held in his office with Mrs. Gage assisting.

REPORT OF THE SOUTHERN NEW HAMPSHIRE PLANNING COMMISSION

INTRODUCTION:

In just four years the SNHPC has grown to be the most progressive area-wide planning organization in the State of New Hampshire. Under the able leadership and support of the Board of Commissioners and member communities, a full-time staff of Executive Director, Regional Planner, Planning Technician and Secretary now occupy the Commission offices at 815 Elm St., in Manchester.

The primary function of the Commission is to provide the administrative and technical mechanism that is necessary to identify and resolve "area-wide" problems; develop programs to carry out "area-wide" comprehensive plans; and to effect cooperation between local governments within the Region in order to implement programs that will assure coordinated, progressive development in a Regional perspective.

The SNHPC works closely with local planning boards. A full time staff representative regularly attends Bedford Planning Board Meetings as an advisor. Mr. James Tethers is presently working with the Bedford Planning Board. He keeps them informed about the SNHPC regional planning activities and helps the Bedford Planning Board relate the regional plans to the Town's present and future development plans. In addition, the SNHPC staff assists the Bedford Planning Board in its review of subdivision application, zoning controls, and many other activities.

THE COMMISSION:

The Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission was formally organized in August of 1966 in accord with State of New Hampshire Statutes — a direct result of recommendations set forth in the Metropolitan Manchester Planning Study.

Present Commission membership consists of the City of Manchester, and the Towns of Auburn, Bedford, Goffstown and Hook-

sett, each of whom is directly represented in metropolitan affairs by delegates appointed by their respective governing bodies.

The Commission's first priority is to insure that each member qualifies for maximum financial-aid for the planning and construction of necessary highway improvements, public sewer and water facilities, airport improvements, hospital facilities, parks, playgrounds and open-space and a number of other facilities. Financial-aid programs established by the Federal Government require that "Comprehensive Area-wide Planning" be completed before specific projects are funded. In meeting these planning needs, the SNHPC is utilizing the financial resources of the Department of Housing and Urban Development under the "701" program to match and extend local appropriations.

THE PROGRAM:

The area-wide Comprehensive Planning Program being carried out by the Commission provides a significant benefit to each municipal member in the form of substantial Federal and State financial-aid for planning and constructing needed facilities to insure progressive and growing communities.

The SNHPC program is designed to "encourage the most appropriate use of land, such as for agriculture, forestry, industry, commerce, and housing; the facilitation of transportation and communication; the proper economic location of public utilities and services; the development of adequate recreational area; the

promotion of good civic design; and the wise and efficient expenditure of public funds." Major components of this year's program are described in the following sections.

WATER AND SEWERAGE FACILITIES:

In December of 1970 the Commission presented the Interim Report for Water Supply and Water Pollution Abatement in the Metropolitan Manchester Regional Area to area-wide officials for their review and comment. Alternative proposals outlined in this document will afford municipal officials an opportunity to evaluate immediate and long-range programs designed to serve local and regional needs.

Area-wide water and sewerage facilities planning qualifies the SNHPC member communities for as much as 95% Federal and State financial assistance for construction of major sewer interceptors, trunk lines, and treatment facilities or as much as 50% Federal assistance for the construction of water supply and distribution facilities.

TRANSPORTATION PLANNING:

The SNHPC has established a continuing transportation planning process in conjunction with the New Hampshire Department

of Highways. This planning process provides for a continuous means of evaluation and revision of the Metropolitan Manchester Planning Study completed in 1966. Continual transportation planning is required by the 1962 Federal Highway Act in order to qualify certain highway projects, such as the relocation of the Mammoth Road and Route 3 intersection; the proposed I-93 extension through Manchester and Hooksett; the Route 3 project in Bedford; and the Route 114 By-pass in Bedford and Goffstown. In addition, the Governor has designated the SNHPC as the Agency responsible for carrying out the Regional transportation planning process by coordinating the region's transportation facility and service needs through the year 1990, as well as tentative transportation investment programs for 1975 and 1990.

OPEN SPACE AND RECREATION:

As 1970 drew to a close, the SNHPC staff completed a draft of an Open Space and Recreation Plan including a comprehensive inventory of recreation opportunities available to residents of the Region, deficiencies in Open Spaces and Recreation areas, and projections for future requirements. This plan will be finalized in 1971.

FINANCES:

Membership Fees of 25¢ per capita, based upon the latest census were set by the Commission in June 1967, effective July 1, 1968. The fees are as follows:

These membership fees are used by the Commission to match Federal Grants for Regional planning projects, and to provide local planning assistance to members. Since 1968, the Commission has received \$97,800 from the Department of Housing and Urban Development and nearly \$23,000 from the U. S. Army Corps of

Engineers. The Commission anticipates receipt of \$30,000 — \$40,000 in Federal Grants during 1971. These grants are based upon a 2/3 Federal and 1/3 local matching basis. Membership fees used for matching Federal Grants to date, total \$49,394. It is anticipated that an additional \$15,000 — \$20,000 of membership fees will be used for matching Federal Grants in 1971.

THE YEAR AHEAD:

Looking ahead to 1971 and beyond, the SNHPC has established the following objectives:

- * Preparation of the Final Report on the Regional Water and Sewer Facilities Plan.
- * Completion of basic planning studies including:
 - 1) Plan for Open Space and Recreation
 - 2) Identification of Storm Drainage Problems
 - 3) Prepare suggested Regional Development Policies
 - 4) Complete recommended development plans for the years 1975, 1990, and 2020.
- * Prepare a Regional Plan and Program for Solid Waste Disposal
- * Continue planning assistance to members on a more intensified basis.
- * Provide a continuous effort to insure members qualify for maximum Federal-Aid for implementation of plans and construction of needed facilities.

PROGRESS REPORT OF THE TOWN HISTORY COMMITTEE

The History Committee of the Bedford Historical Society, encouraged by the support given it at the last Two Town Meetings, has gone ahead and prepared a new Town History which is almost completed. Only two chapters remain to be finished. Many people besides the committee members have helped with research, pictures, and in some cases, the actual writing. Nobody has received any pay for this work except a typist and an indexer whom the committee hired.

A hard cover book of 800 pages is planned. Mrs. Jean Tallman has drawn a most attractive colored dust jacket which will add greatly to the book's appeal. The contents cover the complete history of the town from its very beginning to-date. Mrs. Esther Doerfler and Mrs. Bernice Wiggin have worked on a large genealogical section to which every family in town has been urged to contribute.

Mr. John Ballentine, of the New Hampshire Publishing Co., Somersworth, N. H. has contracted to print 3,000 copies for us at a cost of \$18,000.00. In fixing the price of the book we will also have to add the cost of advertising, printing the map insert, postage, etc. We are having a recent map of the town printed with the location of all the old houses on it which we will insert in a pocket in the back of the book.

We are asking the town this year to loan us \$18,000 to cover the cost of printing the new Town History, and as each copy is sold the money will be returned to the town. This is not a profit making venture, but strictly a labor of love in recording Bedford's growth.

If this loan is voted this year the manuscript will be ready for the printer by the end of March. After it is printed there will be time needed for proofreading and completing the index. The New Hampshire Publishing Co., has promised to have the final copies ready for sale by Next Christmas (1971). If the town turns down this request now there is no way of estimating what future publication will cost, as the printer's supplies and labor costs are constantly rising.

Also, the formation of an Association of New Hampshire Conservation Commissions which was established in November should be most helpful in providing information and professional assistance to the Member Commissions. Binnie Ellis, chairman of the Bedford Conservation Commission has been elected to the Board of Directors of the State Organization.

During the past year the board has met often and plans are underway for a clean up day in the spring in conjunction with other civic groups in town. A survey of land of special conservation interest is planned.

Article 2. To see if the District will vote to authorize and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$80,000 for the purpose of purchasing land or obtaining options on land for school use. Said sum to be in addition to any bond investment interest and other local, State or Federal funds made available therefor, and to raise the same by issuance of bonds or serial notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, Chapter 33 of the Revised Statutes Annotated of New Hampshire, as amended, and to authorize the Bedford School Board to so issue and negotiate said bonds or notes in the name of or on the credit of the District, said board to have discretionary powers described in Section 8 of said Chapter 33 in respect to said notes or bonds.

Article 3. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for payment of salaries for the school district and agents and for the statutory obligations of the District.

Article 4. To see if the District will vote to increase the membership of the Bedford School Board from three to five members effective for the purpose of the 1972 election if in the meantime authorized by the legislature.

Article 5. To see if the District will vote to authorize and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$150,000, for the purpose of contracting architect and engineer's fees to draw plans and specifications for school construction. Said sum to be in addition to any bond investment, interest and other local, State or Federal funds made available therefor, and to raise the same by issuance of bonds or serial notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, Chapter 33 of the Revised Statutes Annotated of New Hampshire, as amended, and to authorize the Bedford School Board to so issue and negotiate said bonds or notes in the name of or on the credit of the District, said board to have discretionary powers described in Section 8 of said Chapter 33 in respect to said notes or bonds.

Article 6. To see what sum the District will authorize and appropriate for principal and interest payments as voted in Article 5, said sum to be in addition to the appropriation voted under Article 3.

REPORT OF BEDFORD SCHOOL BOARD

The early months of 1970 saw a proposed addition to Memorial School defeated. As a result of this we were asked to project our future school needs. The thought of many at this time seemed to be that we should pursue a Bedford Secondary School Plan.

The School Board's answer to this was the forming of a School Study Committee consisting of 30 members. The Committee subdivided into three subcommittees, Elementary, Secondary and a Financial Study Group. Their report has been edited and distributed to the town and is now being discussed in public hearings. We have a great deal of praise for the efforts of this committee and its comprehensive report.

After many months of negotiations with the BTA we ratified a Professional Negotiations Agreement and a Master Contract, which we hope will be of great assistance in our future negotiations with the professional staff in years to come.

In October the State Board of Education informed us of a change in our Supervisory Union to take place on July 1, 1971. The new Union, consisting of Bedford and Merrimack, is to be known as Supervisory Union #26. We have met several times with the Merrimack Board, set up an annual budget and are now in the process of hiring a Superintendent and assisting personnel to implement this new program. We are looking forward to much closer supervision of business administration, curriculum and personnel recruiting. Though this set-up may cost more financially the first year, we feel this cost will level off in the years to come.

The Board through its legal counsel hired Hub Testing, professional consultants, to take cuts of the McKelvie roof, to assess its fault and place blame, if possible, on those responsible. This has been done and legal suit has been brought against the architect and contractor, in the hope of recovering damages for the cost of roof repairs. Thus far the cafetorium roof, North-South corridor and administrative wings have been repaired. The services of a clerk-of-the-works was sought by the Board to supervise these repairs. We hired Mr. Becker who has had years of experience

with roof construction. We highly recommend this type of service for any of our future school buildings.

As a result of excess traffic leading to the main access routes to both McKelvie and Memorial Schools the School Board has instituted a new transportation policy which includes the bussing of all pupils. With the increased number of pick up points as well as the over crowded conditions at some other bus stops, we ask the full co-operation of parents in reminding their children to exercise discipline and caution at these bus stops.

**BUDGET COMMITTEE REPORT ON
SCHOOL DISTRICT BUDGET**

JULY 1, 1971 TO JUNE 30, 1971

The Budget Committee held two regular meetings with the School Board, Mr. Leavitt, Mr. Dolloff and Mr. Little to discuss the needs for the coming school year. A public hearing was held January 27 with an approximate attendance of 70 persons.

Following the public hearing, the Committee met and discussed all items individually. The largest increases are in teachers salaries, bus transportation and student tuition plus two articles asking for a site appropriation of \$80,000 and architects fees for \$150,000. These two articles were originally submitted without recommendation by the committee but after consulting with the State Tax Commission, it was decided to submit them as recommended to avoid legal bonding problems in the event the townspeople approve these expenditures.

Originally the School Board and Budget Committee differed on six line items, but by mutual agreement this was changed to four. The items reduced are:

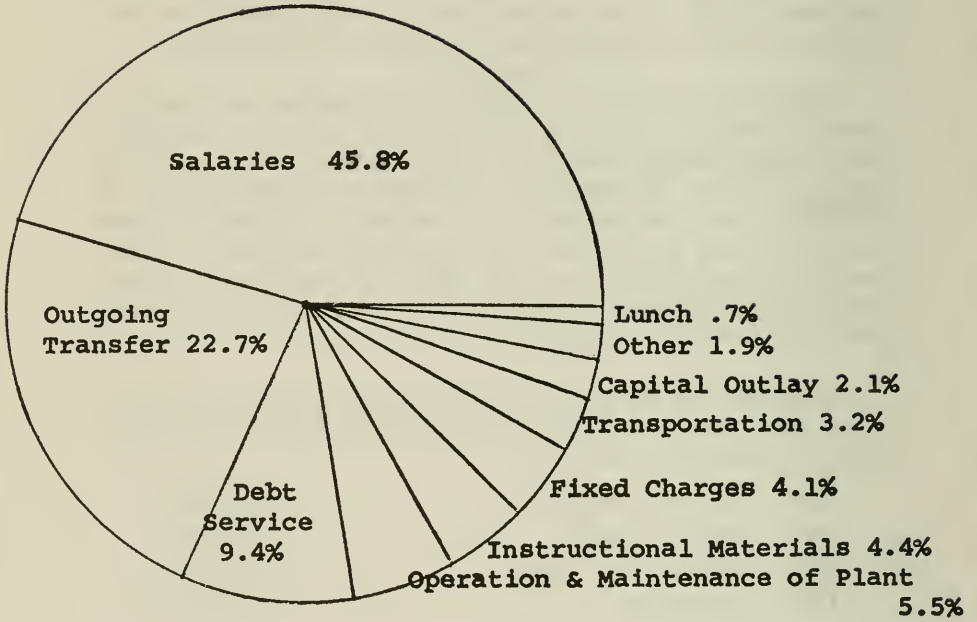

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Bedford School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1970, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board, School District Treasurer and School Lunch Account.

FINANCIAL INFORMATION**Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A-1)**

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1969 and June 30, 1970, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt of the District decreased by \$109,537.21, from \$1,125,000.00 to \$1,015,462.79, during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1970.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit A-4), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$22,928.01, plus a revenue surplus of \$1,609.20, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$24,537.21.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1970, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1970, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

School Lunch Account: (Exhibit C)

A summary statement of the School Lunch account for the fiscal year is included in Exhibit C.

School Tax Account: (Exhibit D)

A statement of the School Tax account with the Town of Bedford is presented in Exhibit D. As indicated therein, at June 30, 1970, the School District had received from the Town of Bedford the total of the 1969-70 School Tax, the amount of which was \$997,444.17.

Bonded Indebtedness: (Exhibit E)

A statement of the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1970, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit E.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Bedford:

Our Annual Report of a year ago predicted a September 1970 enrollment of 1,200 pupils in grades 1-8 and stated that "this growth requires additional instructional staff personnel and school building facilities." As of October 14, 1970, we had enrolled 1198 pupils and no new or additional school facilities were available to house either pupils or programs.

However, the past year served the purpose of education by providing ample opportunity for interested citizens of Bedford to join in the dialogue of Bedford's future educational building needs. The work of the Bedford School Study Committee which is reflected in the reports of three committees: Primary, Secondary and Financial and Site serve to give the resident of Bedford an understanding of the major educational problems confronting Bedford today. These reports represent untold hundreds of hours of labor by a representative cross-section of the community and offers clarity and direction to our problems.

Should Bedford continue to build elementary schools and tuition its high school pupils to Manchester or should it build a secondary school unit for 7-12? This is a serious question and merits the thoughtful consideration of each Bedford voter. A decision must be made and our Annual March Meeting should resolve this question.

For many years Bedford has been a member of Supervisory Union #27. The State Board of Education has voted to reorganize many of the supervisory unions in this section of the state. Accordingly, on July 1, 1971, Bedford joins with Merrimack to become a new Supervisory Union #26. The new administrative unit will retain the services of a superintendent and two assistants. As the cost to the district increases one must realize that the services available to our students and instructional staff will be immeasurably increased.

In concluding my seventh annual report, I take this opportunity to express my appreciation to the school board and instructional staff for their continued efforts on behalf of the children of Bedford.

Dear Mr. Leavitt:

The following report has been submitted in order to discuss in some detail the various curriculum aspects and related aspects which I have focused my attention upon as Assistant Supt. of Schools for the Bedford School District.

If 1970 can be used as a yardstick to judge the decade ahead one would have to conclude that education is indeed going to be a topic of constant discussion. With the rising cost of education the trend is toward looking for new methods of financing education. Fortunately this is but one avenue we have available to us in examining and compensating for this spiraling cost. Unfortunately often this is the only option examined. I suggest that indeed other options are available which we indeed should and are investigating, toward a more efficient, more effective educational program.

Such a topic which was viewed in the light of a more effective and efficient educational program was the year-round school plan. Much researching, reporting and discussing has taken place relative to this plan. Some have viewed this approach to school utilization with favor, other with disfavor. Yet this plan remains as one method of efficiency in school plant utilization.

A great deal of emphasis has been placed upon curriculum during the past year particularly in terms of investigation, evaluation and delineation.

Presently Bedford School District is, with the cooperation and assistance of other staff members of the other Districts of S.U. #27, investigating the following curriculum areas — reading, science and social studies. The Reading Curriculum Study Committee was instituted during this year — their tasks have been many but most importantly that of developing a reading curriculum

and related aspects which will enhance the reading programs of each individual district. Hopefully, the resulting study will reveal a program whereby language arts will be the focal point of all curriculum areas, a program whereby youngsters needs as well as their progress can be realized.

Several parent teacher conferences have been held throughout the school year. Many parents have visited the school during these designated days and have talked to teachers. Hopefully, a communications link between the home and the school has been formed which is much more effective than the traditional report card system. Certainly we feel the parent teacher type conference has indeed fostered an individualized approach toward the evaluation of each youngster.

This year marks the second year of operation of both the S.U. #27 Science and Social Studies Curriculum Committees. Many valuable and helpful suggestions and information have come forth from these committees. To date each committee is presently investigating the effectiveness of the multiplicity of materials available within these curriculum areas. Hopefully in the not too distant future a final report will be forthcoming from these groups.

As mentioned in last year's reports Bedford School District had a number of obvious needs relative to New Hampshire Elementary School minimum standards.

Many of these obvious needs have been recognized and have been eliminated or are in the process of being eliminated. Thus adequate staffing exists in the areas of physical education, art, music, nursing personnel, administration and guidance. Concern still remains in the area of library facilities and special education services as well as the size of the existing facilities to house an expanding student population.

In addition to the above a great deal of time has been spent on curriculum organization, planning, evaluation etc., as stimulated by the above mentioned standards.

As mentioned last year, and I will mention again this year, the importance of providing kindergarten and pre-school educational offerings. To date the Bedford School Board has not been able to provide these services due to increased enrollments and rising school costs. Unfortunately, I feel we are wasting important years of a child's life — his most formative years — the years which

indeed a preschool and kindergarten program could add much. Once again it becomes difficult to describe just what the above type program can do for a youngster and how it affects his development — actually the only way to describe this is to have a youngster of your own attend such a program or take the time to visit such a program in action. Then I am sure you will agree with me that indeed a need exists.

During this academic year a group of administrators of S.U. #27 were appointed and charged with developing suggestions and recommendations relative to the use of educational television. The committee found indeed many important uses for educational television toward the improvement of the various educational programs. Educational uses and necessary materials and equipments were noted in a report now complete and forwarded to each School Board of S.U. #27.

Many other groups, studies, programs and events have taken place during this past school year including; federal library grant programs, programs for the educationally deprived youngsters, educational testing, studies relative to educational philosophy and objectives, the development of a continuous progress program, etc.

Finally I would like to note the importance of the home to the total educational program and growth of each youngster. The home and school should indeed be partners in the education of each youngster. Understandably in our hectic society, many parents are unable to participate and/or become involved with school activities. Yet, all parents can indeed take the time each day to sit down with their youngster and discuss that particular day at school. Thus if you appear to be interested in your youngster's individual school day, I would guess each school day would be more enjoyable to your youngster.

The challenge is to both you and me — the challenge to provide not only a more efficient and effective educational program but a program that will prepare a youngster for the years that lie ahead of him — and also an educational program which each youngster will enjoy and want to be a part.

**REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT
OF SCHOOLS (PERSONNEL)**

Dear Mr. Leavitt:

The following paragraphs constitute my report as Assistant Superintendent in the School District of Bedford, New Hampshire.

The most significant item in the annual budget continues to be professional salaries. This is, as it should be, since the teacher "per se" is the heart and soul of the instructional program. Without teachers there ceases to be an instructional program and without *good* teachers there will not be good instruction regardless of the facilities, equipment or supplies.

In order to accommodate our ever increasing student body we found it necessary during the current year to add 3 classroom teachers, 1 art teacher, and 1 guidance counselor. In addition to those 5 people a total of seven additional personnel left the employ of the Bedford School District leaving a total of 12 positions to be filled. Following is a list of the new personnel.

The most significant factor in teacher recruitment over the past year has been the evident change in supply and demand. Where there has been a dirth of available teaching personnel over the past several years there suddenly has developed an abundance of teachers in most areas. This of course permits us to be more selective in the recruiting process. It should be noted however that the good experienced candidate is still a very marketable product and commands a competitive salary.

A new supervisory concept has been implemented with the appointment of 4 new curriculum coordinators in the area of language arts, mathematics, social studies and science. The overall function of these personnel will be to coordinate our programs in grades 1-8 and to correlate them with West High School. Their immediate task will be to review and implement the results of the self evaluation as completed by our staff last year.

One of our greatest concerns during the current year has been the severe limitations imposed upon us by lack of adequate space to house our programs. All of our fourth year students with the exception of one class are now located at the Bedford Memorial School and continue to function as part of the non-graded program. The remaining class at the McKelvie School however by necessity is selfcontained. The Library at Memorial has been converted to a classroom and the book stacks are now located in the Gymnasium severely limiting our library program. The Art Room at Memorial has also been converted to a classroom necessitating our primary art teachers in both buildings to operate on an itinerant basis which is considerably less efficient than working from a central location. The Guidance Counselors share the Principal's Office at Memorial and one of them must locate in the corridor at McKelvie when both are in attendance there at the same time. Two of our Middle School teachers at McKelvie do not have homerooms with one functioning from the supply closet and one sharing space with the school secretary.

During the coming year we will increase our pupil-teacher ratios in order to accommodate our increasing enrollments. However the space factor continues to be our most crucial problem that will reach critical proportions in 1972-73.

In closing I would like to thank the School Board and yourself for your direction and guidance, Mr. Little, Mr. MacDonald, and

the entire school itself for their unfailing cooperation and finally the citizens of Bedford for their commitment to excellence in the total educational program.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL
MEMORIAL SCHOOL

January 7, 1971

Dear Mr. Leavitt:

The following paragraphs constitute my first annual report.

This year, due to the growing student population in Bedford, the Memorial School has undergone some significant organizational changes. The all-purpose room which housed the art, music and remedial reading programs and the room that housed the library were converted into classrooms to make room for two additional fourth grade classes. This required the library to be relocated in the cafetorium, thus greatly modifying library services to the students and staff. The other alternative was to divide the books and distribute them to the appropriate grade level, but that would have negated all the benefits of a centrally located library.

The utilization of the all-purpose room as a classroom forced the art supervisor to give up her teaching station and storage facilities. Consequently, she must travel from room to room which, in turn, limits the type of comprehensive art program that she would like to conduct. Likewise, the music supervisor no longer has a teaching station for her program and must also travel from room to room which limits the quality of the program she would like to present to the students. Facilities had to be made available for the remedial reading program. The room that was formerly used as a guidance office has been converted into a remedial reading center. The guidance personnel, as a result, are now sharing the principal's office and, at times, have been forced to meet with students in the hall, teachers' room or cafetorium.

The present average classroom size at the Memorial School is 24.5 students. On the surface this number appears workable, but some thought should be given to the future. At present, when the non-graded classes are regrouped for language arts and mathematics, some of the classes are reaching a pupil-teacher ratio in the low thirties. When one considers the pupil projection for the

next few years, the implications for the future, using the same non-graded approach for grouping, would mean having many class sizes in the mid to high thirties. Class sizes in these numbers at the primary level are not conducive to the quality of education that the citizens of Bedford expect for their children. Hopefully the newly proposed school building program will eliminate these anticipated problems.

The new members of the Memorial faculty include Mrs. Nancy Goedecke, Mrs. Carolyn Grenert, and Mrs. Barbara Van Uden. All three are teaching fourth year students. Mrs. Beatrice Vose is serving as the full time school nurse. The hiring of an additional art teacher, Miss Jacqueline Pepin, has enabled each class to have art on a weekly basis for an hour. The addition of a guidance counselor, Ronald Conant, has increased the effectiveness of the guidance program.

This year the conversion to the new Addison-Wesley mathematics series has been completed at all grade levels. Supplementary mathematics materials intended for remediation in the area of computation have been introduced to the curriculum. Special emphasis is being given by the teachers to the teaching of computation skills due to the fact that this is not stressed in the modern math textbooks.

The spelling curriculum has been revised with the introduction of the Merrill Language Mastery Speller series at each grade level. Advanced material has been made available to students who have successfully completed the first four years of the spelling text.

Programmed instruction was introduced at Memorial School, under the direction of the reading specialist, Lisa Newall, in order to update and strengthen the existing reading curriculum. This new program has decided advantages over the traditional textbook approach in that it is completely individualized and requires each student to make an overt response to the material being taught. One of the essential features of programmed instruction is the non-paced nature of the response to the program. The student proceeds at his own pace, which is to the benefit of both slow learners and superior students. Furthermore, there is an immediate feedback to the student, based on the principle of continuous reinforcement.

Once established, programs can be expanded at relatively low cost. They are available in a wide variety of up-to-date materials spanning not only reading but all subject areas, resulting in better informed students. It is our goal, by judicious application of programmed instruction, to train students in independent learning, to stimulate thought, and to enhance the self-image of students by maximizing the probability of success for each individual.

The 1970 Bedford School District Summer School Program was the largest in its history. One hundred seventy-five children were enrolled in five different courses including driver education, elementary math and reading, sewing, typing, and a creative workshop. Children of grade one age through senior high school were serviced by the program. The program was varied to meet the different age and ability levels of the children. A staff of twelve teachers, a program director, and a teachers' aide worked with the children during the five week program. The class sizes were small and the emphasis was upon individual programs of instruction in all areas. A special program for deprived children in Bedford and Merrimack from both public and private schools was part of the summer school. This was partly financed by the federal government Title I Program and was primarily academic in nature providing basic instruction in language arts and mathematics.

I wish to take this opportunity to express my sincere thanks to all who have cooperated in helping to carry on successfully the educational process at the Memorial School. In particular I would like to thank yourself, the School Board, Mr. Dolloff, Mr. Chase, Mr. Little and the Memorial School staff for the cooperation and the support they afforded me during the past year.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL, McKELVIE SCHOOL

Dear Mr. Leavitt:

The following constitutes my fifth annual report; the first, as principal of the McKelvie School.

The staff at the McKelvie School is a veteran one and therefore, the change in administration has been accomplished with a minimum of difficulty.

There have been some significant changes in the curriculum and operating procedure this year. The students in grades 5-8 now meet in mixed ability classes for science and social studies instruction. This new procedure has been well received by both students and teachers. Students with less than average ability have benefited most from this arrangement.

Another change in operating procedure has been brought about by the creation of four new positions, namely: curriculum coordinators. The following people were appointed: Mr. Robert Cook, Social Studies; Miss Judith Wildman, Language Arts; Mr. Curtis Lombard, Mathematics; Mr. Richard Janelle, Science. The curriculum coordinators have been widely involved in the budgetary processes for next year and have organized their departments into efficient organizations. The curriculum coordinators have jurisdiction over their departments and meet with the administration on a weekly basis.

As alluded to in town reports in past years, we are still going through a period of student growth that is increasing yearly without additional space. Lack of classroom space made it necessary to transfer two classes of fourth year students to the Memorial School. It was also necessary for two middle school teachers to move from room to room with their students as rooms became scarce.

This year, study periods have been eliminated in grades 5-8. In their place Activity Periods have been offered to the students based upon individual choice. The following activities were offered: Gourmet Cooking, Intramurals, Music Appreciation, Chess Club, Ski Club, Knitting & Sewing Club, Art Club, Future Nurses of

America, Future Teachers of America, Scrabble Club, Library Club, Photography Club, Band, French Club and Boys' Athletics.

The Annual Testing Program has been revised so that, in effect, the Fall and Spring testing has been instituted to identify weaknesses in the program and to make a comparison of the test scores.

Although the school's enrollment has increased to 900 students, all staff members are constantly focusing their attention on the needs of the individual student. The administration and staff will continue to work for and with the students to make the McKelvie School an exemplary school.

I would like to thank the School Board, Central Office staff, citizens of Bedford, the teaching and non-teaching staffs and, especially the students, for making this the fine school it is.
