# The State of New Hampshire

#### TOWN WARRANT

#### THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 10:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Boscawen in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Boscawen on Tuesday, the Twelfth day of March, next at Ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) for repairs to the Lower End Fire Station and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) for a steam cleaner for the Highway Department and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) for the rebuilding of Town Sidewalks and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed one thousand six hundred thirty dollars (\$1,630.00) for a copier for the Police Department and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed four thousand six hundred thirty dollars (\$4,630.00) for ten (10) pagers and two (2) self-contained breathing apparatus for the Fire Department and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed four thousand two hundred seventy-five dollars (\$4,275.00) for repairs to the Town Hall doors and windows and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$5,000.00 to the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$4,000.00 to help support the Penacook Rescue Squad for its emergency medical services and rescue operations for the Town.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$2,500.00 towards the operating expense of the Penacook Youth Center.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed one thousand eight hundred dollars (\$1,800.00) for services to low-income residents of Boscawen through the Concord Area Center Community Action Program, Belknap-Merrimack Counties, Inc.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen on behalf of the Town to enter into a cooperative agreement, pursuant to RSA Chapter 53-A, for the purpose of joining together towns and cities in a joint and cooperative effort for the disposal of solid waste in a manner which will meet federal and state regulations and for the economical and efficient recovery of energy from said solid waste disposal. The Cooperative to be formed under the cooperative agreement will be designated the "Concord Regional Solid Waste/ Resource Recovery Cooperative". A copy of the current draft of the proposed cooperative agreement is posted with the warrant and is available at the Town offices during normal business hours. The Board of Selectmen is specifically authorized on behalf of the Town (a) to execute and deliver the cooperative agreement (with such changes therein from the posted agreement as the Board of Selectmen shall approve, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by the Board of Selectmen's execution thereof) and such other instruments, documents, and agreements as the Board of Selectmen may deem necessary or desirable in furtherance of the purposes of the cooperative agreement; (b) to cause to be performed all obligations which may from time to time be required pursuant to the terms of the cooperative agreement; and (c) to take action relative thereto.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to enpower the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses of the Town until the taxes are paid to the Treasurer.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to transfer or sell property taken by the Town in default of Redemption from the Tax Sale or otherwise acquired and such sale to be a public auction with the Selectmen reserving the right to accept or reject any or all bids.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make application for and to accept and to expend on behalf of the Town any and all advances, grants, or other funds for Town purposes which may now or hereinafter be forthcoming from the U.S.A. or the State of New Hampshire or any Federal or State Agency.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept and to expend on behalf of the Town private gifts an contributions for Town purposes.
- 18. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

#### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The year 1984 saw all bonded indebtedness being paid including the sewer treatment plant's cost overrun. As a result of our negotiations with the city of Concord, we effectuated a thirty thousand dollar saving on five years interest payments. As you may remember, we had been appropriating extra money realizing that the overrun payment was coming due eventually. The town should be proud of this "free and clear" status, but we are afraid it will be only temporary. Huge outlays of capital appear inevitable because of future solid waste disposal regulations and needs. We are still investigating ways and means of satisfying the town's solid waste needs.

As a general statement, 1984 was a positive one for the town. The Highway Department continued its road oiling schedule and completed oiling all the streets in the southern portion of town as well as many in the northern portion. We will continue with our schedule as it definitely is cost effective in the long run. The Conservation Committee was successful in completing the perambulation of all the town boundaries in 1984 which represents a first in this area in many, many years. The tax rate went down in 1984 due only to the prudent management of the town and the cooperation of the department heads and all the employees. County, school and precinct taxes all went up while town taxes went down by over \$3.00 per thousand. All vital services were delivered in 1984 in an efficient manner.

The requested budget for 1985 is down in the overall, but two areas deserve some explanation. First, the welfare budget is up 50% over last year due to the expectation of uncontrollable charges to the town imposed upon us by the courts. We considered leaving this budget at the same level as last year, but this is not very wise inasmuch as we are fairly certain that we will have some of these charges in 1985. The old age assistance portion and the direct aid portion of 1984's welfare budget were reasonably close to the actual expenditures, but we really have to increase 1985's request because of expected expenses incurred without any input on our part.

Secondly, the only other major area of increase is in salaries. As a result of last year's town meeting, adjustments were made in the salary scale of the Highway Department. The town employs seven full-time people; and in our opinion, in the spirit of fairness which Boscawen has always followed, this department was also deserving of reasonable salaries especially in view of the long term of service each member has. Our clerical and professional people also received increases. These increases were based on merit and no particular percentage increase was considered. Finally, to continue the selectmen's attempts to be open and above board, we gave ourselves an increase as well. Being a selectman is no longer a "two-nights a month" job (if it ever was?). Meetings, travelling, time and responsibility have all increased immensely. The management of the town should be worth 0.007% of the total budget.

We want to thank all of you who have aided us this past year. Those of you who call to remind us of things, complain about things or suggest things are a help to us, and we appreciate your interest and efforts. Once again we are soliciting volunteers for various committees. If you are interested, please let one of us know or call the office.

#### 1984 REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Conservation Commission meets on the third Wednesday of each month at the lower end library.

During the summer of this year, we were able to complete our first small selective timber cut at the Eastman-Barnard section of the Town forest. This cut involved about 75000 board feet of lumber and had been very difficult to arrange, as we had several problems getting a right-of-way and then had high water problems on our road. The cut was completed in early September, and we are preparing to have the entire Town forest surveyed, with bounds installed, hopefully by the spring of 1985.

Due to the generosity of several town residents, and a half scholarship obtained through the Society for the Protection of N.H. Forests, we were able to send one child, a girl, to a conservation camp at Deering.

At the request of the Selectmen, we perambulated the Boscawen-Salisbury, Boscawen-Franklin, and Boscawen-Concord town boundaries during the past year. N.H. State Law requires that this be done every five years.

We have reviewed several dredge and fill applications and looked at two proposed subdivisions at the Selectmen's request. Five of our members attended the annual meeting of the N.H. Association of the Conservation Commission.

As we are presently at the planning stage with regard to the Town forest, we are interested in suggestions and questions from town residents.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraph, the combined financial statements and the combining fund and account group financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Town of Boscawen, New Hampshire at December 31, 1983, and the results of its operations for the year ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole and on the combining fund and account group financial statements. The accompanying financial information listed as supplemental schedules in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the combined financial statements of the Town of Boscawen, New Hampshire. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined, combining fund and account group financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

## OVERSEER'S REPORT

January 1 to December 31, 1984

As is painfully evident, this year's welfare budget is terribly overspent. Court ordered juvenile expenses dealing with five clients accounted for \$5,442.75 of the \$6,000.00 requested for direct aid. Additionally, Old-Age Assistance is up over \$1,700.00 from last year. Direct aid accounted for \$5,601.68 which was clearly within the budget after deducting the court appointed costs.

The town aided fifteen different clients (not counting the court ordered juvenile cases) and some of these more than once and refused aid eight times. Liens totalling \$3,000.00 were levied. Housing and utilities were, once again, the most pressing needs. It is my opinion that the town handles the direct aid in a fair fashion, and we will continue to pay our share of Old-Age Assistance. When it comes to court appointed costs, we are at a disadvantage since we are never a part of the process and cannot adequately budget for it. There are rumors that public hearings may be held concerning court appointed costs; and 11 this comes to pass, I will be there making my concerns known on behalf of Boscawen.

Because of this year's expenses and knowing of some potential juvenile cases now pending, an additional \$5,000.00 for welfare is being requested.

## LIFE SAFETY AND HEALTH OFFICERS REPORT

The State of New Hampshire passed a law requiring multi-unit dwellings, new single family dwellings rental units old and new to have smoke detectors. This went into effect on July 1, 1984. A list has been compiled of all known units and we are in the process of inspecting for proper fire detectors. This law is RSA 153:10-a and anyone interested in a copy of it please contact the Selectmen's office.

On January 1, 1984 the Town of Boscawen adopted a Sanatation Code and inspection procedure relating to the inspection of restaurants and other facilities dealing in food. Inspections were made either by me or the state inspector during the year.

There were new Child Care rules adopted by the State this year. All child care facilities that have more than three unrelated children for any part of the day have to be licensed. For a copy of the requirements please contact the Selectmen's Office. If you or anyone you know needs to be licensed, please contact me for details.

Routine child care, foster home, kindergarten inspections were made along with complaints of faulty septic systems and illegal dumping.

## FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

In 1984, the Boscawen Fire Department responded to 147 calls; this is an increase of 20 calls over last year. We still have our usual number of chimney fires. The worst fire in 1984 was the warehouse at Brezner Tannery, and the longest fire was at the Boscawen Land Fill Area covering approximately 24 hours.

The department is still maintaining its ongoing training programs at Fitz-william's Drill Yard, Capital Area Compact and Lakes Region Mutual Aid Association. Training also includes departmental training on a mandatory and volunteer basis. In addition, some of the members this past year completed the "Certified Fire Fighter One Course," which is a one-hundred hour course conducted by state certified instructors. This course was sponsored by the State of New Hampshire Fire Standards and Training Commission.

I would like to take this opportunity to "THANK" all fire personnel for their cooperation, understanding, effort and time devoted to the department in the past year.

# REPORT OF THE TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Our first forest fire prevention law was enacted by our State Legislature 90 years ago. This early law set in place a cooperative forest fire prevention and suppression effort between city and town governments and State government. It simply stated that no open fire could be kindled, when the ground is free of snow, without the written permission of the town/city Forest Fire Warden. This law also stated that anyone kindling a fire without written permission shall be liable for the damage caused and subject to a \$1000 fine.

During the past 90 years, this law has worked so well that is has remained unchanged. All open fires when the ground is not covered with snow must be authorized by the local Forest Fire Warden. Persons kindling a fire without a permit when one is required are liable for damages caused, fire suppression costs and subject to a \$1000 fine.

This cooperative fire prevention law has contributed significantly to our nationally recognized annual forest fire loss record.

## BOSCAWEN POLICE DEPARTMENT Chief's Message

1984 was another very active year for the Boscawen Police Department. Statistically, most categories of crimes reported and calls handled by the department remained similar to that experienced over the past couple of years, with the exception of two categories. Burglaries and Assaults increased during 1984 and the department logged 531 arrests and summons, more than any previous year except 1980, when 535 arrests and summons were made.

The department again experienced personnel changes in 1984. In November, Mary E. Weeks was hired as Police Clerk to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Pamela Genest. Mark R. Pepler was hired in November as well, to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Officer Gary R. Davis. As most of you may know, Officer Pepler was previously employed with the Town before accepting employment in 1982 with the Merrimack County Sheriff's Department. We welcome Mark back with his knowledge of the Town and police experience and trust that he will serve the Town well, as he has in the past.

We wish to thank the other Town departments and you, the citizens, for the support and cooperation we received during 1984. For 1985, we will continue to strive to provide efficient and professional police service to the Town and remind you that your support and cooperation is very important to the success of our efforts. Please do not hesitate to call the police whenever you suspect a crime is taking place or notice something suspicious or unusual or whenever emergency help is needed. A comment that we frequently hear from citizens is: "I knew I should have called the police, but I didn't want to be a bother or nuisance." More often than not, our job would have been easier had those people called when they initially felt they should have.

I hope that none of you will hesitate, whenever you feel the need to call the police. Remember, your police department exists primarily to serve and protect you, the citizens. I hope that you will help us do our best throughout this coming year.

## CONCORD REGIONAL VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

The Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association, Inc. continued to service Boscawen for this past year. In the Home Care Program, service is provided under a physician's plan of treatment to patients who are essentially homebound with diagnosed illness. This service is rendered by health professionals (Registered Nurses, Physical Therapist, Occupational Therapist, Speech Therapist, Nutritionist) and paraprofessionals, (Homemaker/Home Health Aides, Home Assistants) according to the patient's and family's needs. Hospice care is provided to patients in the last six months of a terminal illness. The Health Promotion Program has services (child health, family planning, screening) that are provided to low income/high risk patients and families in group settings, such as clinic and screening sites.

Health Education and Instruction is part of each home visit or clinic visit.

Anyone in Boscawen may request service; patient, doctor, health facility, pastor, friend or neighbor. Patients are also referred by other agencies. All requests are answered, but continuing home care can be provided only with a physician's orders.

A call to the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association, Inc., (224-4093) between the hours of 8 a.m. and 9 p.m., seven days a week is all that is necessary to start services or make inquiries. Hospice staff are on call (224-4093) 9 p.m. to 8 a.m.

Federal regulations specify a charge is applicable to all visits. Fees are scaled for those unable to pay the charge if that person has no other funding source available. However, for fee scaling, federal regulations require a financial statement be completed and a fee appropriate for which the patient will be responsible. Town monies subsidize those visits that are scaled or that no fee is collectible.

This agency is accredited by National League for Nursing and American Public Health Association Certified for Medicare and is a member agency of Home Care Association of New Hampshire, United Way of Merrimack County, and National Association for Home Care.

The annual Town meeting was called to order at 10:00 a.m. by the Moderator who read the warrant and declared the polls open until 7:00 p.m.

The meeting was called to order by 8:20 by Robert Johnson, Moderator, who gave a report of the balloting.

ARTICLE 1: To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Official Weighers: Mr. Fred Supry made a motion that the incumbents be re-

elected. Mr. Ricky Trombly seconded the motion and the

motion was carried unanimously.

Surveyors of Wood and Lumber:

A motion was made that the incumbents be re-elected. The

motion was seconded and carried unanimously.

Fence Viewers: Mrs. Dorothy Sanborn made a motion that the incumbents

be re-elected. The motion was seconded and carried.

ARTICLE 2: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Mr. Jeffrey Johnson made a motion that the town consider the police appropriation as a separate item and Mr. Craig Nixon seconded it and discussion followed. Mr. Johnson felt that the police department was a very important part of our community and felt that the base pay of the Chief and officers be increased \$2,500.00 per man. After doing some research, he said that Boscawen was one of the lowest paying towns for their police department in the area. Following extensive discussion, the motion having been made and seconded, was carried and Article 2 was adopted and the budget was passed as posted in the amount of \$533,085.00 plus a \$5,600.00 increase in the police budget.

At this time, the Moderator read a message from the Fire Department to the Town of Boscawen inviting the Town to an open house on April 29, 1984, to view all of the Town fire equipment.

ARTICLE 3: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed nine thousand eight hundred and sixteen dollars (\$9,816.00) for a Police Cruiser and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.

Mr. Craig Nixon made a motion to accept Article 3 as read and Mr. Ray Fisher seconded it. Discussion followed whereby Chief Brian Estee explained the reasons for needing a new cruiser and why this year's cruiser would be higher than last year. The motion carried.

ARTICLE 4: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed seven thousand six hundred and seventy three dollars (\$7,673.00) for a replacement sander for the Highway Department and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.

Mr. Robert Knowlton moved that Article 4 be adopted as read and Mr. Daniel Carey seconded it. Discussion was had. Mr. Plourde explained that the new sander would be a replacement for the one that is fourteen years old. The motion carried.

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed one thousand eight hundred dollars (\$1,800.00) for the purchase of a new mobile radio for the Police Department and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.

A motion was made and seconded that Article 5 be passed as written. Discussion followed with Chief Brian Estee explaining the need to replace the radio that has been in service over ten years and the fact that a new radio would give the Police Department more frequencies. The motion carried unanimously.

ARTICLE 6: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$5,000.00 to the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association.

Mr. Larry Bird moved that the Article be accepted as read and Ricky Trombly seconded it. Discussion followed. Mr. Plourde explained the need for passing the Article. The motion carried.

ARTICLE 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$4,000.00 to help support the Penacook Rescue Squad for its emergency services and rescue operations for the Town.

A motion was made and seconded to accept Article 7 as read. Discussion followed and the motion carried.

ARTICLE 8: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$2,500.00 towards the operating expense of the Penacook Youth Center.

Mr. Walter Howard made a motion to accept Article 8 and it was seconded by Mr. Larry Bird. Motion carried.

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed one thousand six hundred dollars (\$1,600.00) for services to low-

income residents of Boscawen through the Concord Area Center Community Action Program, Belknap-Merrimack Counties, Inc.

Mr. Robert Knowlton moved that Article 9 be passed and Ricky Trombly seconded it. Mr. Plourde explained what this service is to the Town, such as oil during the winter for those that need it, Meals on Wheels, the cheese program. The motion carried.

ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00) to be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund for a town office building.

A motion was made by Mr. Larry Bird and Frances Rostron seconded it. Discussion followed. The motion failed.

ARTICLE 11: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,853.00 to the church for reimbursement for the "little building." (Selectmen's Office)

Frances Rostron made a motion to accept Article 11 and Mr. Alan Grill seconded it. Mrs. Rostron explained that this is to reimburse the church for repairs and services to the little building over the years. Mr. Ricky Trombly made an amendment to substitute the word church for the words First Congregational Church of Boscawen. A motion was made and seconded to the amendment. The amendment carried. The motion to Article 11, as amended, was carried.

ARTICLE 12: To see if the Town will authroize and direct the Selectmen to review the considerations which may be involved in participating with the City of Concord Solid Waste Resource Recovery Project, to enter into discussions and negotiations regarding the project and to report back to the Town as to their findings and recommendations. A decision by the Town to participate or not to participate in the project will be deferred to a special town meeting in the fall of 1984, or the regular town meeting in March of 1985.

Mrs. Dorothy Sanborn moved to pass over Article 12. There being no second to that motion, Mr. Thomas Danko moved for the adoption of the article and it was seconded. The problem of trash removal was discussed and the motion carried.

ARTICLE 13: To see if the Town will vote to empower the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses of the Town until the taxes are paid to the Treasurer.

Mr. Walter Howard moved the adoption of Article 13 as read and Mr. Ray Fisher seconded it. A discussion was had on semi-annual tax billing. The motion carried.

ARTICLE 14: To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to transfer or sell property taken by the Town in default of Redemption from the Tax Sale or otherwise acquired and such sale to be at public auction with the Selectmen reserving the right to accept or reject any or all bids.

Mrs. Dorothy Sanborn moved the adoption of the article and Mr. Alan Grill

seconded it. The motion carried.

ARTICLE 15: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to

make application for and to accept and to expend on behalf of the Town any and all advances, grants, or other funds for Town purposes which may now or hereinafter be forthcoming from the U.S.A. or the State of New Hampshire or any Federal or State Agency.

Mr. Walter Howard moved the adoption of Article 15 and Mr. Alan Grill

seconded it. Discussion followed whereupon the motion carried.

ARTICLE 16: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept and to expend on behalf of the Town private gifts and contributions for Town purposes.

Mr. Walter Howard moved the adoption of Article 16 and Mr. Alan Grill

seconded. There being no discussion, the motion carried.

ARTICLE 17: To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

The Moderator thanked the people who worked on the election, the ballot clerks and the counters and also the Boy Scouts for their part in the program. Mr. Ricky Trombly thanked Mr. Joseph Bowes for the time and effort he put into being a selectman of the Town of Boscawen. Mr. Alan Grill moved that the meeting be adjourned and Mrs. Dorothy Sanborn seconded it.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, the meeting was adjourned at 10:00 p.m.

# PENACOOK-BOSCAWEN WATER PRECINCT COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

The warrant article is to provide funds for the purchase of a new body for the Precinct pickup truck. The old one has become so rusty that some of the built-in compartment bottoms have holes through them. The new body should last longer because of rust-proofing measures. The current body was removed from the Precinct's previous pickup truck and has quite a few miles on it.

One of our current concerns is meeting any new water standards which may be enacted by Congress. The last session of Congress saw an attempt to pass legislation which would have ended the much more lax standards for water

departments serving populations of less than 10,000.

The state has wanted the Precinct to consider either a full treatment plant or purchase of water from a full treatment facility for several years, but we have been hesitant until appropriate standards were promulgated because of the costs involved. Now, it is beginning to look as if the federal government is about to legislate such standards because the attempt in the last session of Congress came very close to passage, with the combination of 1984 being an election year and of Congress wanting to adjourn to campaign defeating the attempt. Needless to say, we do not have these hurdles this year.

## 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

The accounting policies of the Penacook and Boscawen Water Precinct (the Precinct) conform to generally accepted accounting principles as applicable to governments which have utilities that are financed and operated in a manner similar to private business enterprises, except as indicated.

## A. Basic of Accounting

The Precinct's financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting. Under the accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recognized when earned and expenses are recognized when they are incurred. Estimated amounts have not been recorded for services rendered but not billed as of the close of the year as required by generally accepted accounting principles. Interest on general obligation is recognized when due rather than when incurred in accordance with State requirements. The Precinct believes that the effects of these departures are immaterial to these financial statements.

## B. Utility Plant in Service and Depreciation

Utility plant in service is stated at cost depreciation is provided over the estimated useful lives of the various components using the straight-line method. Estimated useful lives are as follows:

Although still in use, fully depreciated assets are removed from the accounts.
